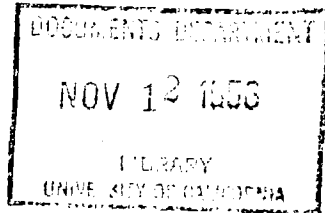

JOURNAL OF THE SENATE

SENATE CHAMBER,
DES MOINES, IOWA, MONDAY, JANUARY 10, 1955.

Senator Dewel, majority leader, in the absence of a presiding officer resulting from the death of the Governor which left vacant the office of Lieutenant Governor and President of the Senate when Governor Elthon took the oath of office as Governor, on behalf of the members of the Senate arose and recognized the Honorable Frank C. Byers, State Senator from Linn County, as a member of the Fifty-sixth General Assembly, and as such entitled to call the Senate to order according to section 2.2 of the 1954 Code of Iowa.

Senator Dewel asked and received unanimous consent that Senator Lynes and Senator O'Malley escort Senator Byers to the President's station for the purpose of calling the Senate of the Fifty-sixth General Assembly to order.

Senator Byers appeared at the President's station and announced that, in accordance with the provisions of section 2.2 of 1954 Code of Iowa, he claimed to be a duly elected member of the Senate of the Fifty-sixth General Assembly and immediately called the Senate to order.

Prayer was offered by Reverend Lloyd Scheerer, chaplain of the Iowa Methodist Hospital, Des Moines, Iowa.

Senator Dewel moved that Senator Byers be elected temporary President pro tempore of the Senate of the Fifty-sixth General Assembly, which motion prevailed, and Senator Byers was unanimously elected temporary President pro tempore of the Senate.

ELECTION OF PRESIDENT PRO TEMPORE

Senator Lynes placed in nomination the name of Senator DeVere Watson of Pottawattamie County as a candidate for the office of President pro tempore of the Fifty-sixth General Assembly.

Senator Lynes said:

I am very happy to have the opportunity this morning to stand before this body and to nominate a worthy and deserving man as our President pro tempore. The man of whom I am thinking came to this Senate fifteen years ago with me, and he has served his party and Senate well. The office of President pro tempore is one of great honor and warrants a holder of great capabilities. This gentleman has a strong clear voice, and a pleasing personality. His integrity is unchallenged and his ability is unquestioned. It therefore gives me great pleasure to place in nomination the name of Senator DeVere Watson of Pottawattamie County, as a candidate for the office of President pro tempore of the Fifty-sixth General Assembly.

The nomination was seconded by Senator O'Malley who asked that the election of Senator Watson be made unanimous.

There being no further nominations, Senator Byers declared Senator DeVere Watson of Pottawattamie County unanimously elected President pro tempore of the Senate of the Fifty-sixth General Assembly, and asked Senators Lynes, O'Malley and Dewel to escort Senator Watson to the rostrum.

Senator Watson appeared, took the oath of office and was presented to the Senate by Senator Byers.

In accepting the office Senator Watson said:

MEMBERS OF THE SENATE, OFFICERS AND GUESTS:

My acceptance of this honor and station is with humility—yet with pride and appreciation. The great task before us is not complicated by the imminence of an actual war, such as we have had in the past, although, because of the nature of our enemies, there is always some threat. May we not be plagued with war matters, so that we may be able to give more and better attention to our domestic problems.

Saddening events in recent weeks has created a situation whereby our regular officers cannot take their positions for a few days. In the meantime, we shall prepare the machinery of government by properly organizing so that we may soon get into the program of legislating wisely, adequately and economically for the people of our state.

We enjoy a two party system, in common with most of the states and our nation. These parties have chosen floor leaders in our body, Senator O'Malley from Polk, the minority party leader; and Senator Dewel of Kossuth, the majority party leader.

The Secretary, on behalf of the members of the Senate, presented President pro tempore Watson with a floral tribute of roses.

Senator Byers presented the gavel to President pro tempore Watson, who immediately took the chair, and called upon Senator O'Malley, the minority floor leader, who pledged the cooperation of the members of the minority party in the interest of all of the people of the State of Iowa and the success of the Fifty-sixth General Assembly.

SELECTION OF SEATS

The Chair announced that the next order of business would be the selection of seats.

Senator O'Malley asked and received unanimous consent that Senator McManus of Lee County be granted the privilege of occupying seat 38 for the reason that his great grandfather, the Honorable John Downey, was a former member of this body, and that his grandfather, the Honorable Edward P. McManus, was also a former member of the Senate who occupied seat 38.

Senator Prentis moved that the holdover and reelected Senators be granted the privilege of retaining the seats occupied by them during the Fifty-fifth General Assembly, or the privilege of selecting a new seat from the unassigned seats, and that any Senator having any defect such as defective hearing be allowed to select his seat first; then former members of the Senate or former members of the House of Representatives be granted the privilege of selecting their seats from the unassigned seats, their names being placed in a hat and drawn out, one at a time, by the Secretary of the Senate. Also, that the names of the remaining newly elected Senators be placed in a hat and drawn out by the Secretary of the Senate.

ANNOUNCEMENT OF RECOGNITION OF SERVICE

President pro tempore Watson announced to the Senate that Senator McFarlane was today celebrating his fortieth year as a state legislator and asked Senator Lynes to escort Senator McFarlane to the rostrum.

In appreciation, Senator McFarlane said:

MR. PRESIDENT AND MEMBERS OF THE SENATE:

This is really a surprise to me. I had no idea that I would be called upon to address this body so soon. It is true that it was forty years ago today that I walked from the Savery Hotel to the State House on my first day serving my first session in the legislature. Walking with me was "Dee" Kimberly, a newly elected Representative from Scott County, who later was elected to the Senate and holds the longest continuous

legislative record of service in the history of the state; and Senator Joe Frailey of Lee County. I thought that in sort of a celebration I would walk it again this morning—I did and am going to walk back. It took me just twenty minutes to walk it this morning and I doubt if I walked any faster forty years ago.

Forty years is a long time and it would be almost impossible for me to tell you what has transpired through these long years. My people in my home town and county have been good and kind to me. Members of the legislature have been cooperative and very gracious and I appreciate it very much.

The two members that I walked with to the State House forty years ago have passed away. The One above who has guided my destiny has been very kind to me and I am still here for which I am very thankful.

Forty years ago the entire appropriation for the state was less than nine million dollars. Last year it was one hundred twenty-two million dollars. The people are demanding more from state government and they are going to get it, but they are also going to have to pay more.

I appreciate the privilege you have extended to me this morning and I hope that I can be here forty years from now. If I am going to be able to walk back to the hotel this evening I certainly can't take much more time to address you, so again I appreciate this courtesy and the many fine friendships I have made over these years. I restate that you have been very gracious to me and I appreciate it.

Senator Dewel moved that a committee of six, consisting of three members from the Senate and three members from the House, be appointed to notify Governor Elthon that the joint convention was ready to receive him.

Motion prevailed and the President appointed as such committee, Senators Dewel of Kossuth, Lynes of Bremer and Grimstead of Winnebago on the part of the Senate, and Representatives Stevens of Greene, Whitney of Cherokee and Wells of Lee on the part of the House.

The committee waited upon Governor Elthon and escorted him to the Speaker's station.

President Watson then presented Governor Elthon, who delivered the following address:

MR. PRESIDENT, MR. SPEAKER, MEMBERS OF THE FIFTY-SIXTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY, LADIES AND GENTLEMEN:

I am very fortunate indeed to be permitted to appear before you on this occasion to report to you on the condition of our great state, and to make certain recommendations that I believe should be considered by the Fifty-sixth General Assembly.

You and each of you are greatly honored, by your respective districts, in being sent here to speak and to act for them on the many matters that will confront you in the next one hundred days. You are the voice of your people. To you they have delegated the power to write into law their desires. They have entrusted you with the obligation of guarding their freedom. They expect you to promote the general welfare of this great state.

I congratulate each one of you upon your election, and because you are capable and willing to accept these responsibilities. I have no fear for the future of Iowa and for our republic so long as men of your caliber are willing to sacrifice your time and energies for the welfare of the citizens of Iowa.

Our nation is at peace and we are truly thankful to our God for His Grace and for delivering us from the scourge of war. In return we pledge our every effort to maintain the peace and humbly pray for His guidance toward the end that peace and righteousness shall prevail in Iowa, in the nation, and in the world.

Since you last met here in joint session, Iowa has suffered a tremendous loss in the accidental death of Governor Beardsley. Mrs. Beardsley is slowly recovering from injuries suffered in the same accident. We pray that her recovery will be complete. We extend to her and to the family our sincere sympathy.

In the past two sessions, Iowa has been very productive. Generally it has produced at a very high level. Prices have been good. Business has been above average. Labor has been well employed at good wages. Hardships have been experienced by only a few through unusual circumstances.

Iowa government has been carried on and developed in accordance with the laws and within the limits set out by the Fifty-fifth General Assembly. There have been a few instances where the appropriated funds were not sufficient to carry out the proper functions of government. In these cases the interim committee has come to the aid of the particular department in need and sufficient funds were made available.

Our road building program which was adopted by the Fifty-third General Assembly, and improved in the following sessions, has progressed well. This program is a "pay-as-you-go" program and is generally accepted by the people of Iowa. Under this program the pavements are widened, the curbs are removed, and curves are lengthened, and many

miles of new pavement are constructed. Our secondary road program is progressing satisfactorily although there are certain parts of the state that because of rough terrain conditions need additional assistance. Any of these improvements can be accelerated, of course, if the citizens of Iowa wish to furnish more funds for this purpose. Building roads is a continuing program and will never be completed. We will always want better roads. We shall continue to build the best and the most roads possible with the funds made available for that purpose.

The matter of a toll road should be considered seriously but should in no way interfere with our present road program.

There has been a marked improvement in the operation of our institutions under the board of control. A larger proportion of those treated in the state hospitals are returned to normal, useful lives. These encouraging results have come about: first, because the legislature has supplied increased appropriations needed for improvements in housing, equipment and care; second, because more and better doctors, more nurses and attendants have been provided; third, because a united effort has been made through a definite program of rehabilitation. The board of control, together with the legislature, should be commended. However, there is much yet to do.

Conservation of Iowa's natural resources is very important to the welfare of the state. Great strides have been taken in preserving Iowa's soil and water resources. In parts of the state where soil erosion was neglected too long steps have been taken to prevent the further washing away of the top soil. This development must be continued. The work of soil conservation districts should be encouraged. We are fortunate in Iowa in having all of our state in a soil district. Water resources must be conserved and protected against pollution and depletion.

Our state parks and beauty spots should be preserved and maintained for the recreation and pleasure of the citizens of Iowa as well as those who visit us from without the state.

Our native birds and animals that seem to have difficulty surviving the changing conditions will have to be further protected. Iowa should never again lose its deer population.

In looking to the future of Iowa we cannot overlook the fact that Iowa is primarily agricultural. The Creator endowed Iowa with the most of the best land compared with any similar area. Because of this resource and because of the type of people who dwell in Iowa, agriculture has been developed to the highest level of any spot in the world; and we shall maintain that position ever mindful of any improvement that might be made.

Our industries should be further developed because we are situated at the crossroads of the nation where plant sites are cheap, where adequate power is available, supplies of raw materials are close at hand, and there is a constant supply of good reliable labor. I think we should keep in mind that Iowa is agricultural and any advancement of industry that would be detrimental to agriculture would be adverse to the best interest of the State of Iowa. Let's not forget that agriculture is basic in our state.

Iowa labor should have every right and privilege compatible with the general welfare of the state. Unemployment insurance and workmen's compensation should be increased and adjusted to meet present day living conditions.

We have good schools in Iowa, and our people are literate. We rank first among the forty-eight states because we have the least illiteracy of any state in the Union. This seems to contradict the general opinion expressed by many educators in the state.

Our state schools of higher learning are each outstanding in its field and the people of the state can well be proud of them. The State Board of Education should be commended for its leadership and for its continued efforts to improve and advance the standing of these institutions.

The private colleges have done a wonderful job in their field and have certainly taken a large financial load off the state in maintaining schools of high type where many of the young people of the state have been educated at no expense to the State of Iowa.

The elementary schools and the secondary schools of Iowa are numerous and every child in the state is provided schooling at public expense.

It would seem that nothing could be wrong with such a fine system. However, I am convinced that there is much room for improvement.

In the rural areas of our state many of these school units are so small that the expense per pupil is entirely too high. This certainly can be corrected through a continuation of effort toward reorganization. The problems of reorganization are difficult and should be considered in this session. I recommend that some financial encouragement be given to those schools that comply with and meet the standards set up by the legislature. These standards should be reasonable and local conditions should be considered.

There should be the best of relations and a feeling of mutual trust and understanding between the legislature and the board of education for I am sure that we all have the same ideals and the same desire to make our schools the best that we can afford for we realize that the education of our youth and the training of our children, the developing of our young people into the best and the most capable men and women of tomorrow is without doubt our greatest and first ambition.

We point with pride to the outstanding educators we have in Iowa. Our colleges are well staffed with capable men and women. The funds must be provided to keep them and to add from time to time others of outstanding ability.

We must face the fact that there is need for larger facilities to make room for the enormous crop of youngsters who will soon be knocking at the door of our secondary schools and a little later at the doors of our colleges.

Seemingly every effort has been made to promote safety in Iowa. Safety at home, on the farm, in the factory, and on the highways. These efforts have not been sufficient. The deaths on our highways are tragedies. There is one bright spot, however, the driver training classes conducted in our high schools are showing results in better and safer drivers among those who have had the benefit of this training. These classes should be conducted in every school in Iowa. Our State Safety

Department is making a sincere attempt to better the situation, but we have been unable to stem the tide. Some of the contributing factors are too much speed, too much liquor, recklessness, and the lack of attention to the job while driving. This session should consider this problem and attempt the solution. One of my friends from Worth County sends me this slogan, "Drive to stay alive in '55". It will take the cooperation of the legislature, the Safety Department, press, radio, and television agencies, and the public to lick this problem, but lick it we must.

I would like to devote the remainder of my message to what I feel is the most important problem facing this legislature, and that is the matter of state finance. In recent years we haven't had to worry too much about the financial condition of our state—we had a reserve and our revenue collections were sufficient to meet the cost of services and expenditures deemed necessary by the recent legislatures.

During the last biennium, however, our expenditures exceeded revenue by some 18 million dollars. This is a serious situation and we must face it.

When I first came into the legislature twenty-two years ago our state was in a similar situation. The members of the Forty-fifth General Assembly were faced with a deficit of nearly twenty million dollars. At that time our state expenditures amounted to some 62 million dollars annually. Economic conditions at that time may have justified deficit spending—agricultural commodities were at a very low price level.

It is difficult for me to justify deficit spending during these current good times when our state income is at an all time high.

The members of the Forty-fifth General Assembly faced the financial problem of the state by adopting a broader tax base in a special session, and enacted the three point tax program which forms the basis of our state financial support today.

Incidentally, the rates established in the Forty-fifth General Assembly have been little changed. Over-all increased revenue over the years has come from the increase in income and from economic activities of the citizens of Iowa.

While I can understand the need and desirability of deficit spending at the national level, under certain conditions, this is not applicable to our state government. We have no choice but to live within our income.

On the national level we have seen a trend towards greater dependency on government. Many people and organizations look to the federal government for the solution to many of their problems. Are we having the same tendency in Iowa to look to our state government for assistance when the individual might well take care of himself and be better off in the long run? Incidentally, it is interesting to note that over fifty per cent of the general fund expenditures are various aids to the counties, cities, school districts and to individuals. This, of course, does not include road funds. In other words, the state is collecting large sums of money which are returned to the individual taxpayers through various forms of aids. We generally accept that some programs are and should be the responsibility of the state, but have we increased the state responsibility beyond the reasonable point? I raise this point because it is the

responsibility of the legislature to adjust these policies in line with the common good.

Now as to the current situation. During the current biennium total appropriations amounted to 244 million dollars while total income during the same period is estimated at 226 million dollars. This means that we are deficit spending at the rate of nine million dollars per year. At this rate our "rainy-day fund" established six years ago will be exhausted with this coming biennium. That, gentlemen, is the situation on this—the opening day of the Fifty-sixth General Assembly.

Certainly there are broad general policies on which we agree and they will guide our thinking during the next one hundred days. First, we must strive for greater efficiency in our state government. Second, we must strive to eliminate over-lapping and duplication in our state government. We must plug all leaks in tax collection. With the need for money as great as it will be for the next few years, tax collecting agencies must administer their responsibilities and get maximum return, and any loopholes in the state tax law should be corrected by this legislature.

Now it seems to me that the legislature faces three choices. First, we can decide to live within our present income. This would mean an actual reduction in state expenditures and it would, of course, mean a reduction in the services of the state. Is this a practical route to follow at this time? Our second choice then is to collect sufficient revenue to meet current expenditures. This would involve no expansion in state services but rather a hold-the-line policy for the biennium. Our third choice then would be to collect more revenue and expand the services of the state in the public interest. Certain appropriations are meritorious. In the educational field, for example, our state institutions of higher learning need additional financial support to meet the increase in enrollment that they will be facing in the next few years. If we are to provide reasonable educational opportunity to all children in the state, increases in state aid for equalization purposes are desirable. And, in my opinion, the appropriations for the Agricultural Land Tax Credit law should be increased in order that all claims may be paid in full.

Now, if the legislature in its wisdom decides to increase state expenditures, they then face the real problem—where is the money coming from? Let's discuss these income sources for a moment—property taxes are a stable source of revenue. This tax base fluctuates little from year to year and property tax is an acceptable method of raising revenue. This tax, however, in Iowa is the sole support of the many county, city and local governmental functions. Property taxes of this last year amounted to over 240 million dollars in Iowa. This represents a forty per cent increase since 1950, and this was practically all local taxes. In addition, ownership of property is no longer an accurate method of determining a person's ability to pay taxes. In my opinion, the property tax is an inequitable method of raising additional revenue. Incidentally, if the legislature does not provide needed revenue from other sources, we will by operation of law have a state property tax whether we like it or not.

So, what do we have left as a source of state revenue—we have the three point tax program which has been in effect for over twenty years. As I mentioned before, over this period there has been relatively little

change in the rates of these taxes. The income tax is a fair method of raising revenue because it is based on ability to pay. However, in my opinion, there is one major drawback to an increase in individual income tax, and that is the fact that this field has been preempted by the federal government. Our federal income tax rates are high and any increase in individual state income taxes would be burdensome to say the least.

The corporation income tax amounts to a little over two million dollars annually. A major increase in the tax rate would be necessary in order to bring in any significant increases in state revenue.

This leaves the matter of sales tax and use tax, which have been the backbone of our state financial structure. Last year collections from these taxes amounted to approximately 63 million dollars. This tax has a broad base. Everyone who makes purchases in Iowa makes a contribution to the support of the state government. It is an accepted tax and one which raises a considerable sum of money. This, it seems to me, is a possibility for increasing state revenue. An additional one cent sales tax, for example, will raise about 25 million dollars annually.

Now, there are other sources of revenue which the legislature could consider. Recently the congress reduced the federal luxury tax from twenty to ten per cent. A ten per cent state luxury tax would raise about two and one-half million dollars per year. There is also a possibility of expanding the sales tax to services—which are not presently included. The sales tax could also be made to apply to purchases of beer and cigarettes. In addition, consideration could be given to the elimination of certain exemptions of the present sales tax law which could produce substantial additional revenue.

Thus, this matter of state revenue, in my opinion, is a most serious problem. To borrow a phrase from my good friend, Gus Kuester, "We have reached the bottom of the barrel." Deficit spending cannot be continued. Within the coming biennium we will exhaust our reserve or surplus. We will be derelict in our duties if we do not solve this problem during this session.

There are a number of other problems that will come to your attention during the next one hundred days. There are many decisions that you will be called upon to make. These decisions should not be influenced by selfish motives, nor should they be based upon purely local conditions. We should always keep the welfare of the people of the whole state in mind, and let us remember that under our republic and in the Great State of Iowa that every citizen has every right and freedom guaranteed under our constitution and under our laws.

Let us remember that God is, and that He rewards good and evil, and that He is no respecter of persons. Let us, therefore, submit our lives and our thoughts to His will. Our nation was founded by men who were not too proud to bend a knee in prayer, who were willing to accept divine guidance, and who daily gave thanks for the blessings showered upon them. Let us follow their example in faith and obedience. Let us take advantage of every advancement in knowledge. Let us bend every effort to make a better, a richer, and a greater state. A state in which justice prevails for all, whether he be rich or poor, great or small.

Governor Elthon was escorted from the chamber by the committee previously appointed.

Report adopted.

Pim of Lucas moved that a committee of five, two from the Senate and three from the House, be appointed to escort Governor-elect Hoegh and Lieutenant Governor-elect Elthon to the House chamber.

Motion prevailed and President Watson appointed as such committee Senators Dewel of Kossuth and Lynes of Bremer, and Representatives Pim of Lucas, Tate of Cerro Gordo and Colburn of Shelby.

The Sergeant-at-Arms announced the arrival of Governor-elect Hoegh and Lieutenant Governor-elect Elthon, accompanied by the Governor's staff.

Governor-elect Hoegh and Lieutenant Governor-elect Elthon were escorted to the Speaker's station.

The invocation was delivered by the Reverend Walter A. Samp, D.D., pastor of the Methodist Church, Adel, as follows:

O Eternal God, who art infinite in wisdom and power and merciful and compassionate toward the children of men, we thank Thee for our great and good heritage; for a Christian civilization which has its roots in freedom's soil, for broad fields and fertile plains, for the wealth of the soil and the treasures beneath the soil. We thank Thee especially for the wealth of ideals in the hearts of our people.

We come today to ask Thy special blessing upon Thy servant whom the people of this state have elevated to the chief office in our state government. Grant unto him, we beseech Thee, physical vigor, strength of mind and heart, and above all, the wisdom to direct and order the affairs of state so that under his governance we may be blessed with honorable industry, sound learning and pure religion. Defend our liberties, preserve our unity. Save us from violence, discord and confusion, from pride and arrogancy, and from every evil way. Fashion into one happy people the multitudes brought hither out of many kindreds and tongues.

Endue with the spirit of wisdom all those whom we intrust in Thy name with the authority of governance, to the end that there may be peace at home, and that we may keep a place among the nations of the earth.

For the accomplishing of these ends, we here and now rededicate ourselves and humbly ask Thy divine guidance for those who lead and direct us. Amen.

Lieutenant Governor Elthon, President of the Senate, presiding, presented Governor Hoegh, who delivered the following inaugural address:

GOVERNOR ELTHON, MR. PRESIDENT, MR. SPEAKER, MR. CHIEF JUSTICE,
SENATORS, REPRESENTATIVES, STATE OFFICIALS, LADIES AND GENTLEMEN:

You, the members of the Fifty-sixth General Assembly, and I, as your Governor, are dedicated to serve the people of Iowa. Together, we accept the responsibilities and trust placed in us by the people of our

great state. With the help and guidance of Almighty God, I pray we will have the wisdom and understanding which will prove equal to their faith in us.

To be your Governor is an honor—and a challenge—and a public trust. In all humility I accept the responsibilities of this great office.

I have served with many of you in this beautiful chamber. As a former legislator I learned to respect and appreciate the pre-eminent place of the legislature in our republican form of government. You are here to interpret the people's will and to enact into laws that which is good for all Iowa. I consider it an honor and a privilege to counsel, cooperate and work with you to this end. The formulation and passage of legislation is the sacred province of the elected representatives of the people. It is my duty to suggest—not to direct.

Iowa is a great state. We have the finest people, the most fertile and productive land, excellent communities, schools and churches, many of the world's largest industries, and above all, clean and honest government. We are indebted to those who provided for us that which is right.

Under the able guidance of the late beloved Governor Beardsley our state administration has efficiently and courageously handled the administrative, fiscal and law enforcement problems. Governor Beardsley was one of our great governors. We are indebted to him for his tireless efforts and leadership for the betterment of Iowa. His untimely death was a tragic loss to Iowa. To Mrs. Beardsley and her family we extend our prayers and hope for their future comfort. We are grateful to Governor Elthon for successfully executing the tasks that were so suddenly his responsibility. In behalf of the people of Iowa, we extend thanks to him for a difficult duty, well performed.

We have the responsibility of carrying on—to face the future with the confidence of our forebears, in building an even greater Iowa.

Twelve years ago, dressed in khaki, I last stood in this chamber. We were then at war. How grateful I am to be here today, in time of peace. Our great President, Dwight D. Eisenhower, contributed mightily to gaining the peace. His life today is dedicated to the preservation of this peace, and to the maintenance of a prosperous and free America. His leadership serves as an inspiration for all.

EDUCATION

The destiny of Iowa and our country will soon be in the hands of our children of today. Well educated children are not only Iowa's greatest assets, but they are the bulwark of a free America. We should therefore consider a problem for bettering their education as our number one objective. To meet this challenge I suggest:

1. State aid for schools on the basis of twenty-five per cent, with the specific understanding that schools must remain under local control, and with more emphasis on wise expenditures and efficiency of administration.
2. A teacher education and certification program to assure every classroom of a well trained and highly qualified teacher.
3. A school district reorganization program controlled at the local level, to provide adequate facilities and able instruction in all school

units and to effect economies in maintenance and operation. Your attention is called to the recommendations of the state board of public instruction in the matter of amending the school district reorganization law.

4. Appropriations for Iowa's higher educational institutions sufficient to maintain leadership in education and research.

We must plan now to take care of our increased enrollment in all levels of education. While it may require some additional classrooms, we must first be certain that we make full use of our present facilities. In some respects, industry has set a good example for us to study.

I take this opportunity to pay tribute to the teachers in our schools and colleges, whose sacrifices and devotion have contributed so much to free government.

HIGHWAYS

Iowa, as an agricultural and industrial state, requires a balanced highway program. In devising our program we always consider the need for good arterial roads, farm to market roads, and local secondary roads.

Iowa has one of the largest and best secondary road networks in the nation—92,778 miles—a vast primary system of 8,600 miles, city and town streets of 10,200 miles, all needed to serve our great state.

Uppermost in the minds of all of us is highway safety. If we want safer roads—and there is ample evidence that wide roads with good sight distance are safer roads—it will be necessary to undertake a highway widening program of great magnitude. Death curves and death bridges must be eliminated. Improved sight distance is needed in many places. Iowa cannot afford inferior highways that invite death.

The legislature in 1949 wisely adopted a long range pay as you go highway program. Since then, our unprecedented traffic increase, the need for more adequate standards of construction, the upward spiral of road costs, the rising demand for safer and more serviceable highways, have placed this program behind schedule.

We have the responsibility to provide the improved roads the motorists of Iowa deserve. Iowa doesn't need elaborate roads, but it does need adequate roads.

To accelerate our road program, additional funds will be necessary. It should be carried out on a pay as you go basis. I urge a one-cent increase in the present gas tax rate and that the one-cent tax enacted by the Fifty-fifth General Assembly be made permanent. Let me assure you that the money which you authorize for this essential road program will be wisely spent.

Many miles of toll roads are being built in other states. Illinois to the east and Nebraska to the west have already established toll road authorities. Illinois initiates its toll road construction program this year. I suggest that you give immediate consideration to such a program so that Iowa may join its sister states in binding the East to the West. Such a program should be self liquidating and be financed solely through tolls paid by the actual users.

TRAFFIC SAFETY

The people of Iowa look to us for an effective traffic safety program. We must take immediate action to reduce the murder on our highways. I suggest the following:

1. Modernize our roads.
2. Establish fixed speed limits.
3. Strictly enforce our safety regulations.
4. Constantly stress safety education.
5. Encourage more instruction and training to improve our driving.
6. Increase the number of patrolmen on our highways, to be financed by an increase in driver and chauffeur licenses.
7. Strengthen our laws on vehicle inspection and on issuance and revocation of driver's license.
8. Emphasize the need for individual driver responsibility.

AGRICULTURE

Iowa is a great farm state. Yes, the record is conclusive—Iowa is the number one farm state. With the skill and technical ability of our farmers and with our rich soil, Iowa leads the nation in farm income. We produce seventeen per cent of the corn, fifteen per cent of the oats, nineteen per cent of the hogs and market ten per cent of the beef of the United States. Iowa is truly the breadbasket of America. We fully recognize that not only Iowa's prosperity, but that of our nation, is dependent upon a sound, stable and prosperous agriculture. The God-given new wealth produced each year from our soil is the very life blood of our economy.

Iowa is dependent upon its soil. We must therefore continue to encourage proper care of our greatest resource. Through expanded educational programs we can make great strides in the adoption of sound methods and techniques.

Through an expanded state water shed program, in conjunction with the federal government, we can attack the problems of upstream soil and water conservation and flood prevention.

Through tax credit for conservation expenditures similar to that enacted by the last federal congress, we can give further encouragement to the preservation of our resources.

We should examine our standards of quality and processing of our agricultural products to assure that Iowa's products receive their fair share on the markets. For example, it's apparent that a uniform egg grading law for retail purposes is needed in Iowa. Iowa eggs are the best and will command a premium at the market when properly identified by a uniform grading program. Giving the consumer quality eggs is good business and will benefit the producer by an increased price with no burden to the consumer. Another example—Iowa is one of the few states that does not have a marketing division in its Department of Agriculture to study marketing, transportation and consumption of farm products. Such a division would likewise benefit our farm economy.

We must assure the free flow of agricultural products into and out of Iowa, and place only such restrictions on these movements as are necessary to control disease and protect the health of our citizens.

A few years ago the legislature wisely established the agricultural land tax credit law in order to equalize property taxes for education. It is to the best interest of all Iowa that our property taxes be equitable to agriculture. To this end and in the interest of providing a financial incentive to school reorganization we should increase the appropriation for such a fund in order that all claims may be paid in full.

Right this minute the farmer's problem is not on the farm, but in the channels of trade after his products leave the farm. We must therefore expand research in marketing, production, distribution and industrial use of our farm products.

INDUSTRY

As you know, in the last decade the rural population of Iowa has decreased because of more efficient methods in production. Each year 6,000 young Iowans graduate from our colleges and 24,000 from our high schools. It is therefore imperative for the future growth of Iowa that additional job opportunities are created.

In 1945 you wisely created the Iowa Development Commission to promote our state. Since then Iowa has attracted over 860 new industries, which brought us one-half billion dollars in capital investment, 35,000 jobs with an annual payroll in excess of 120 million dollars, resulting in a 225 million dollar increase in purchasing power each year.

However, we have only scratched the surface. Now that industry is decentralizing, and is moving into the great midwest preparatory to using the facilities of the St. Lawrence Seaway, Iowa must leave nothing undone to attract industry within its borders. With what we have to offer Iowa can double its new industries within the next four years. I therefore urge that the activities of the Iowa Development Commission be immediately expanded.

Let me assure you that as your Governor I will render tireless service in the development and growth of our state. All of us should join in the selling of Iowa. With our skilled technicians, our good people, our abundance of natural resources and utility and power facilities, and our fine communities, Iowa is the most attractive state in the nation.

Iowa is America's bread basket, but Iowa can also be America's work shop.

LABOR

Industrial development in Iowa is increasing and we anticipate further expansion in the immediate future. The advancement of the health, safety and welfare of the working men and women in Iowa is therefore essential.

Economic conditions, such as an increase in wages and cost of living, require us to reexamine our present laws, in order that this important segment of our economic life is assured of progress. I therefore make the following recommendations:

1. That the unemployment compensation benefits be extended to twenty-six weeks of unemployment, and that the maximum weekly payments be substantially increased. The present "voluntary quit" law

should be amended, so that an employee does not lose all his past wage credits because he quits one job.

2. That the schedule of workmen's compensation benefits be re-adjusted and increased. Compensation to the injured, and to the survivors of those who lose their lives in the course of employment, should be commensurate with today's wages and cost of living.

3. That the bureau of labor be made effective to better serve Iowa, and that our safety, sanitary and child labor laws be strengthened.

4. That the distinction between the requirements for authorization of check-off of union dues and deductions for other purposes be removed.

5. That the principle of free collective bargaining be maintained, by permitting management and labor to agree upon a union shop if they so desire.

LAW ENFORCEMENT

Honesty and integrity in government—those are old words and old phrases. They mean nothing unless they are implemented with action.

We, who have been associated with the state government of Iowa, are proud of the honesty and integrity with which state affairs have been conducted. We are proud of the fact that unswerving law enforcement has been part of the state government's policy.

Strict and impartial enforcement of all the laws enacted by the legislature will be the cornerstone of this administration.

WELFARE

One of the most heart rending problems is the proper care and treatment of the mentally ill, the dependent and crippled children, the handicapped, the aged, blind and deaf, and those in need of medical and financial assistance. During the past few years, great progress has been made in this service. However, constant improvement must be our goal.

Recently the United States Congress increased social security payments to many of our citizens. Recipients of old age assistance were denied this increase because of certain technicalities. This should be corrected.

GOVERNMENT

In Iowa, we firmly believe that government closest to the people makes the best government. I am certain you feel as strongly as I do that local control of local matters is vital. I recommend your continuing effort in strengthening and making more efficient our local government.

For equitable representation the voice of all the people must be heard in our legislative chambers. One of the basic concepts of our republic is that of representation on both an area and a population basis as exemplified in the United States Congress. I, therefore, recommend an amendment to the constitution reapportioning the Senate on a population basis and the House on an area basis.

The terms of our state and county elective officials are too short. A four-year term would mean more efficiency and better government.

Iowa's young people of today are the best informed and most intelligent in our history. I think enough of today's young people to recommend that the minimum voting age in this state be lowered to eighteen years. I'm certain if they are given this important responsibility that they will respond. About half of our present voters did not go to the polls on November 2. If the eighteen-year-olds had the power of voting, it could well be that a greater portion of those twenty-one and over would be stimulated to vote in future elections.

After my short service in state government I have reached the conclusion that more adequate pay for the elected and other key governmental officials will make for better government. Our elected state officials should receive \$10,000; our supreme court justices \$15,000; our district court judges \$10,000 and the other positions proportionately thereto. Your own compensation is too low, as is that of the Lieutenant Governor and the Speaker of the House. I'm not urging a spending spree—instead I'm urging you to make it possible for our good citizens to serve in public office without undue sacrifice.

For example—only six states pay the judges of their highest court less, and only eight states pay their district court judges less than does Iowa. In order that our legal talent may accept judgeships without financial sacrifice, the judiciary should be paid salaries that are adequate.

Your attorney general, with the assistance of your interim committee and the county attorneys and clerks, made a detailed survey of the work load in Iowa's judicial districts. Some valuable statistics were compiled. They show that there is a need for a more exacting and continuous type of survey.

The objective of our judicial system is to accomplish justice, with promptness and with minimum cost to the public and the suitors. To obtain effective administration of our judicial system there must be some continuing organization to gather statistics, make studies and fact finding surveys of all our courts. Many states and the federal government have such a system, resulting in making the courts more efficient and lowering the costs. I, therefore, recommend that you establish a statistician in the judicial department under the supervision of the supreme court to gather and analyze such facts. Only in this manner can we obtain the correct answers to the questions:

Are there too many different courts?

Are there too many or too few judges?

Is there need for redistricting of our courts?

Is there need for an integrated court structure?

The cost of this service should be borne by those who use the courts, through a \$1 increase of district court filing fees. This would provide about \$20,000 annually, which is sufficient to finance this vital project.

Every two years you face the tremendous task of keeping our laws up to date and enacting new legislation for the betterment of Iowa. Many times difficult decisions must be made by you without enough facts at hand. I therefore recommend that you establish a legislative research council to perform this important role.

VETERANS

The men and women of Iowa who served in our armed forces during the Korean War should be given the same bonus and tax exemptions as provided for the veterans of other wars. As veterans they have rendered a special service to our state and nation.

TAXATION

Property taxes are now at the saturation point. The State of Iowa years ago showed good judgment by abandoning the property tax as a source of state revenue. The state is using income, sales and other taxes to support its functions and to relieve the burden on the local property taxpayer.

There are many inequities in our present tax structure. Our people recognize that governmental services cost money, and they expect us as their servants to make certain that taxes are levied fairly and justly, commensurate with ability to pay. For these reasons, I urge that you select a special committee to make a thorough examination and study of our whole tax structure. This survey should include assessment of all classes of property and all phases of taxation.

The people of Iowa desire that their state be a leader. I'm confident they are willing to invest their fair share to build a greater Iowa. Increases in taxes are not popular, but we must have the courage to provide the revenue needed for the essential services of the state.

First, we must exhaust every possible means of getting more for our present tax dollar. Let me assure you that we in the executive and administrative branch of government will diligently work toward the end of giving the people of Iowa full value for their tax dollar. We will constantly work for more efficient and economical administration of state functions and services.

To eliminate duplication and to establish efficiency and economy in administration I suggest the following consolidations:

1. Place all fire inspection responsibilities under the state fire marshal, as recommended by your budget and financial control committee.
2. Place enforcement of the laws pertaining to commercial vehicle weights (now under the highway commission), gas tax (now under the state treasurer), motor carrier tax and supervision (now under the commerce commission), under one department.
3. Place the parole functions of the board of control over state charges at Eldora and Mitchellville under the board of parole.
4. Examine all of our inspection functions with the view of consolidating those which are feasible.
5. Place all legal advisors to state departments such as now exists in the insurance department, commerce commission, the board of public instruction, and the employment security commission under the supervision of the attorney general.

Secondly, we should improve collection of income, sales and use taxes now imposed by law by more vigorous action.

Third, require that claims for soldier's exemption of property from taxation be filed annually.

Fourth, tighten the homestead credit law as recommended by the state tax commission.

Fifth, adopt the changes in the sales and use tax laws recommended by the state tax commission.

Sixth, tax capital gains similar to the federal law.

BUDGET

It is our responsibility to see that our state government operates on a well managed fiscal basis. There must be no deficit spending.

The difficult budget problem is under intensive study. It is my expectation to present for your consideration by the first week in February a detailed outline of the financial and taxation needs of our state.

CONCLUSION

In conclusion, I thank you for this opportunity to make suggestions for our future needs. Note that they are only suggestions. I have full confidence in your judgment. It will be a pleasure and a rich experience to work with you. Your counsel and cooperation will be most welcome at all times. One factor is beyond dispute: Your actions will be guided by what is good for all Iowa. And now, may God lead us in the accomplishment of this objective.

I come back to you knowing that I am welcome. I want to thank the President pro tempore, and the rest of you Senators for organizing and conducting this body in the high tradition established through the years. I also want to thank you for the many kindnesses and say that I am at your service; and I shall preside with pride in my heart, and with humility, I pray, in making my decisions that they be fair, honest, and just. Again may I thank you from the bottom of my heart.

Dear Sirs:

Attention: Mr. Martin Lauterbach, Chairman.

In response to numerous inquiries from legislative and other sources as to the revenue which might be derived from the adoption by the State of Iowa of certain taxes upon services rendered by various classes of businesses and individuals, I have communicated with various states

which have as part of their tax systems substantial taxes upon services and I have also made a study of income and sales tax returns received by the State Tax Commission which indicate, in many instances, the amount of revenue which might be anticipated through the adoption of service taxes in this state.

Service taxes of one form or another are imposed in some degree by most of the states. In Iowa, for example, we now impose a tax upon services as part of our general sales and use tax structure. These service taxes produce very material revenues. In Iowa, we impose a tax at two per cent rate upon public utility services, such as the supplying of water, power, gas, electricity, heat, telephone and telegraph services. We also impose service taxes upon numerous activities based upon the gross receipts derived from the operation of amusement enterprises, and other service taxes upon devices such as juke boxes, pinball machines, and billiard tables.

However, the State of Iowa does not, as a rule, tax as part of its sales tax system the rendering of personal services such, for example, as laundry services, beauty parlor and barber shops, the installation of plumbing and heating, services rendered by garages or other establishments in connection with the repairing of automobiles or machinery, and greasing or washing of cars, optical services, cleaning and dyeing, dental, legal, medical and other professional services and transportation services.

In a considerable number of the states, taxes upon services are a very important part of the revenue system. These states include Indiana, Washington, West Virginia, New Mexico, Mississippi, Louisiana, Florida and Arkansas. Of these states, Washington and Indiana are probably nearer akin to Iowa in general economic conditions than are the others named.

The service tax in general is a tax measured by gross income. The rates imposed vary greatly as between the states using service taxes as an important factor of their revenue systems. The revenue potentialities of the service taxes are very great. Such taxes are relatively simple of administration and are less costly in proportion to revenues collected than are net income taxes, either corporate or individual. There are also numerous court decisions of the states and of the United States Supreme Court which indicate rather clearly what may and what may not be done in connection with the imposition of taxes upon services.

Based upon data available from records of the State Tax Commission and from actual collections from service tax revenues in other states I have attempted to estimate what revenues might be derived from the imposition of a two per cent tax as is now imposed by our sales and use taxes upon services rendered in several fields within the State of Iowa.

In arriving at estimates of revenue to be derived from the imposition of taxes upon services in Iowa it should be understood that these estimates will be based upon the amount of money which would be derived from the imposition of a two per cent tax upon the services involved. These estimates will not consider the justice or equity of the imposition of such a tax and are not to be construed as representing

an advocacy of the taxation by any or all of the groups involved. In many of the fields which will be commented upon various complications will arise should such a tax be imposed, including conflict with the interstate commerce clause of the Constitution of the United States.

In general, states which apply the service tax upon a large scale differentiate in rates between various classes of business or individual activities. All estimates will be based upon a taxation of activities or transactions from which no revenue is at present derived through the operations of the sales and use tax laws. In other words, they do not contemplate a duplication of the present sales and use tax laws by additional tax upon the same transaction.

The validity of a tax upon services under the Constitution of the State of Iowa cannot be questioned. The Constitution of Iowa does not limit the taxing power of the General Assembly to any special method of taxation. The legislature has the right to classify various classes of property and individual activities and it can impose, if it so desires, a varied basis or a differential in rates so long as the tax is uniform as to the same class of business or activity. The only limit upon the taxing power of the General Assembly in the State of Iowa is that imposed directly or indirectly by the Constitution of the United States and laws enacted by Congress acting under its constitutional power.

The State of Indiana is the best known example of a state which derives its major revenue from a gross income tax which taxes virtually all services. The territory covered includes the scope of the present Iowa sales tax and individual and corporation income taxes.

In Washington, which also relies upon sales and service taxes for a large proportion of its income, the state has a straight three per cent sales tax law plus a business occupation tax, which includes extensive taxes upon services. Washington also has no state income tax.

In Iowa, if the tax upon services is to be extended, the line of legislation would have to be somewhat similar to that followed in Washington. Certain taxes upon services could be readily incorporated under the present Iowa sales and use tax law. In some cases, however, service taxes would require somewhat different procedure, especially when imposed upon professional or other personal services where the tax cannot readily be passed on by collection from the purchaser as is now done under the provisions of the Iowa sales tax law.

Reference has already been made to the fact that Iowa now has service taxes in connection with certain utilities services. Many states extend this policy of taxation of utility services to cover transportation services including the carriage of both freight and passengers. It is not difficult to determine the ultimate yield which might be derived by the State of Iowa from a tax imposed upon passenger bus service originating and ending within the State of Iowa, or upon taxicab service and freight transportation by common carrier. Accurate data as to the volume of business done in Iowa is available as to the operations of railroads, buses and truck lines through certain reports which they are required to make either to the state or to the federal government.

The following tabulation gives the total Iowa gross and interstate gross receipts of railroads, buses and truck lines based upon these re-

ports. These figures include both freight and passenger business, although, in the case of bus lines, practically all of the business done is passenger traffic. A two per cent tax imposed upon transportation of this character, originating and ending within the State of Iowa, would produce an estimated revenue of \$848,563.88. The state may also impose a tax upon a certain portion of the interstate business based upon the interstate business done in Iowa and that done by the entire transportation system.

A tax imposed upon taxicab fares in Iowa, based upon the gross amount of business done by some of the major companies, would produce a yield of not less than two hundred thousand dollars annually. Very few states attempt to impose a state tax upon the operation of street cars or buses within cities and towns. Those who do ordinarily provide for an exemption of fares of twenty cents or less. Possible revenue from this source is not considered in this report.

The figures thus arrived at for Iowa check rather closely with revenues derived from similar taxes in other states.

The commission has already made a study of what the effects would be if present Iowa sales and use tax provisions in regard to public utilities services, such as telephone, water and the production of electricity, were amended by striking out the present exemption from the two per cent tax now imposed upon sales of fuel for the purposes of processing and manufacturing, and has made a recommendation for the elimination of this exemption in its recommendations to the General Assembly. It is possible to rather accurately estimate what the effect would be of imposing a two per cent tax upon fuel consumed for such purposes as the generation of electricity or the process of manufacturing in Iowa. Because of the fact that accurate information is available as to the amount of electricity and gas which is now exempted from sales or use tax and other data is available from the larger establishments involved as to the amount of coal, gas or other fuel used in the process of generation or manufacture, an estimate can, therefore, be made to the effect that the application of a service tax to the sale of fuel used for industrial purposes would be approximately \$1,400,000 annually.

Proceeding now into fields into which the State of Iowa has not entered we discover a wide range of services which are subjected to taxation in many states but which are either exempt or not covered by provisions of existing Iowa laws. A very general form of service tax which is used by many states is a tax upon transient rentals of hotel accommodations of hotels and tourist camps. The yield from such

a tax based upon two per cent of the rental collected could be estimated at approximately \$500,000 annually.

In the field of personal services a wide variety of occupations and businesses are subjected to service taxes by many states. These include such classifications as laundry, dry cleaning, dyeing, storage of furs and allied activities. Upon the basis of the study of the gross income of some of the larger laundries and dry cleaning establishments, the yield from a two per cent tax upon these activities would probably not be less than one million dollars annually.

Another group of activities which are subject to service taxes under the laws of other states comprises operators in the motor vehicle field. In Iowa the sales tax does not apply to any portion of the cost of services rendered by garages, filling stations or automobile dealers. A tax is collected when a car is repaired or serviced upon the cost of the parts or materials used in connection with the job. If a tax were imposed upon the entire bill as presented to the motorist, obviously large revenue would be derived. Considerable data is available as to the cost of rendering these services. A large proportion of the final bill will be labor costs. Last year, during the fiscal year ending June 30, 1954, a total sales tax of \$4,319,675 was collected from filling stations, parking lots, auto hotels, garages, auto repair shops and dealers. This tax represents gross sales of about three hundred fifty million dollars and does not include any substantial number of sales of automobiles. It does include, however, all sales of tires and appliances, parts and accessories. The nearest estimate, based upon examination of a large number of sales tax returns in which deductions were claimed for sales of services, would indicate that at least one hundred million dollars worth of services were rendered by this group of businesses, and that a two per cent tax levied upon these services, including such items as parking fees, car washings and repairs, would net not less than two million dollars in revenue.

In addition to the classes of businesses enumerated, concerns engaged in the sale of accessories, bodies and parts did more than thirty million dollars worth of business in Iowa during the year in question. These establishments also rendered very considerable services. An estimate of two million dollars as a result of revenues from a general two per cent service tax from the motor vehicle group is conservative.

Another group in which large amounts of services are supplied in connection with the sale of tangible personal property is the hardware, implement and farm machinery group. The most important services rendered in this field are in the repairing of farm machinery, where a sales and use tax is now imposed upon the parts involved in the job but no consideration is given to the servicing. An application of a two per cent service tax in this field would net at least eight hundred thousand dollars in revenue.

There is still another important field in which substantial services are rendered. This is in the field of heating and plumbing. Examination of a representative number of sales and use tax returns in this field indicates that service charges in connection with the installation of plumbing and heating aggregate about forty-seven per cent of the cost

of installation. In the case of eleven larger concerns operating within the City of Des Moines a deduction from sales and use tax in the amount of \$1,101,927 of sales was claimed as being cost of services rather than material. A conservative estimate of the amount which would be derived from a two per cent tax upon services rendered by plumbing and heating establishments would be \$400,000.

Death and taxes have long been considered as allied in their inescapability. Under the present sales tax law funeral directors are taxed upon the cost of the tangible material used in the operation of the business, such as embalming fluids and caskets. An examination of a number of returns in this field shows that about forty-eight per cent of the actual cost of funerals is in services rendered. A service tax applied to all recognized funeral directors in the state would bring in about \$75,000 a year.

In the field of barbering and beauty parlors a very large proportion of the cost to the consumer lies in services. Sales tax is applied only upon materials actually used in the activities of barbers and beauty parlor operators. Ordinarily this tax is collected from the supplier unless the operator sells at retail such articles as hair tonics or beauty creams. It is rather difficult to estimate what the revenue would be from a service tax upon barber shop and beauty parlor operators. Based, however, upon experience of the State of Washington, a two per cent tax upon barber shop and beauty shop services in Iowa would net not less than \$200,000 annually.

Looking into the professional field, the experience of the State of Washington indicates that very substantial revenue may be derived from a service tax imposed upon engineers and architects, attorneys, physicians of all types and dentists. A Washington tax of six-tenths of one per cent upon the gross receipts of architects, physicians, dentists and attorneys produces about \$700,000 in revenue. At a two per cent rate imposed upon the services of architects, lawyers and doctors the yield in Iowa would be not less than \$1,800,000 of which architects and engineers would contribute about \$200,000, attorneys somewhat more than \$400,000, and doctors, dentists and physicians of all types would probably contribute the remainder or \$1,200,000.

In states that use service taxes on a major scale it is found necessary to impose service taxes upon contractors to avoid the evasion of the service tax through contracting for the performance of certain services by a business which would be subject to a service tax if it did the work directly. Many states also impose a service tax upon all contracting operations.

Under the Iowa sales and use tax law, a refund is made to the various taxing bodies in the amount of the sales or use tax paid by the contractor upon materials used in the performance of public contracts. These refunds for the fiscal year ending June 30 next will amount to approximately \$500,000. In view of this policy, it may be doubted whether a service tax upon contractors performing services for the various taxing bodies should be subjected to a service tax because of the fact that these taxing bodies would ultimately pay such a tax in increased cost of these projects. However, a service tax at a two per

cent rate upon all other contractors would produce a very considerable amount of revenue, in all probability not less than one million dollars.

Another field of service taxes relates to those imposed upon sales of real estate in the form of a service tax on commissions or in a tax imposed upon the gross volume of sales. It would hardly be practicable to impose a two per cent tax upon transactions of this character. For this reason no attempt will be made to estimate the revenues which might be derived from such a tax.

The State of Iowa already imposes what amounts to a two per cent service tax upon photographers and blueprint shops and upon job printing and the production of advertising material. Some states impose a service tax upon billboard operations and upon newspaper display advertising. Were a two per cent tax to be imposed upon newspaper display advertising, the returns would be very large. There are certain difficulties in this, however.

Such a tax would be easily collectable from Iowa newspapers. It would probably have to be imposed upon a basis of business done within the state of a proportionate share of the cost of display advertising based upon the amount of circulation within the state as compared to the total volume in cases where publication has more than statewide circulation. The right of the State of Washington to impose a tax upon display advertising in magazines published in the State of Washington has been upheld by the United States Supreme Court. It would be difficult, however, if not impossible, to impose a tax upon display advertising carried in publications made in other states which have wide circulation in Iowa because of the fact that such transactions are for the most part entirely carried out in interstate commerce.

Here, also, the amount of revenue which might be raised from this source would depend a great deal upon the nature of the law. It would be entirely possible, for example, to impose a service charge upon receipts for subscriptions in newspapers or other publications which would be probably more easily collectable and subject to fewer legal complications than a service tax upon advertising. It is also entirely possible to impose a tax upon the gross receipts of Iowa publications which, of course, would be a form of service tax. Revenue from a service tax upon publishing activities might be estimated at anywhere from two hundred thousand dollars to two million dollars, depending upon the nature of the tax and the rate imposed.

A list of activities subject to a service tax might be almost indefinitely extended by the adoption of legislation such as that effective in Indiana and West Virginia, where virtually all services are taxed. The Indiana law does not contemplate the passing on of the tax to the individual consumer such as Iowa does in the case of retail sales taxes. The tax is imposed as a tax upon the business for the privilege of engaging in business activities. The Indiana gross income tax law, which taxes all services, provides for a variation of rates as between various classifications. The amount which may be raised from a general service tax may be measured to some degree by the fact that collections under the Indiana gross income tax law last year reached a total of one hundred forty million dollars. The population of Indiana is roughly

fifty per cent more than that of Iowa. Under the Indiana law the rate of taxation upon retail sales is one-half of one per cent as compared with the two per cent rate in Iowa. Indiana has no state income tax, the same type of return being required from all persons or businesses having substantial gross incomes.

Summarizing this analysis, it would be easily possible by the more or less general application of service taxes to raise not less than twenty million dollars of additional revenue without duplicating taxes upon activities now covered by the retail sales and use taxes. The question is one which deserves a far more intensive study than is possible in arriving at the estimates herein contained which, as already stated, are made without regard to any factors other than how much money might be derived by a two per cent tax upon the services which have been enumerated.

That in sessions held by the House of Representatives and the Senate of the Commonwealth of Puerto Rico the fourteenth of January nineteen hundred and fifty-five, the following concurrent resolution was approved:

"CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

"To condemn the aggression which is being inflicted to democracy in Costa Rica, and for other purposes.

"Whereas, democracy is being attacked in one of its most prominent bastions in America, the Republic of Costa Rica;

"Whereas, the people of Costa Rica being an exemplary expression of democratic reality, the aggression which is being perpetrated against it there must of necessity put on the alert all Americans who profess the conviction that it is on the democratic reality that

the foundations of the freedom and the security of the peoples of the New World are settled;

"Whereas, the people of Puerto Rico firmly believe in the great virtue of democracy as well as in friendship and peace among peoples;

"Whereas, the Costa Rican people and the Puerto Rican people are fully identified by their common belief in the principles of democracy and by their mutual earnest desire that those principles be not impaired, so that they may contribute towards guaranteeing the subsistence and integrity of democracy in America;

"Whereas, any attempt at destroying by violence a government established by the free will of the governed constitutes a menace which makes it imperative, for the preservation of democracy in America, to mobilize, in a militant moral force, the conscience of the free peoples of the New World;

"Whereas, we Puerto Ricans firmly believe that any aggression against the democratic institutions in this hemisphere constitutes a serious danger to the integrity of these institutions in America.

"Be It Resolved by the Legislative Assembly of the Commonwealth of Puerto Rico:

"1. To condemn, as it does hereby condemn, the aggression which is being inflicted to democracy in Costa Rica;

"2. To express the respect and admiration of the Puerto Rican people for the men who in Costa Rica uphold, with a high spirit and a profound devotion, the integrity of the democratic principles against the aggression of those who pretend to destroy by force of arms a government established by the strength of the popular will;

"3. To ratify before the democratic peoples of the world its expression of solidarity with the people of Costa Rica, exhorting them to convey the same expression of solidarity, with their faith placed in the divine justice of Almighty God;

"4. To send a copy of this resolution to the Congress of the United States, the Parliaments of all the Republics of Latin America, the Legislative Assemblies of all the States of the United States, the United Nations Organization, the Organization of American States and to the free press of America.

In order to certify this, we give this certificate signed by us in our offices at the capitol, in San Juan, Puerto Rico, this fifteenth day of January, nineteen hundred and fifty-five.

Senate File 95, by Senators Shaff, Dewel and Molison, a bill for an act to legalize and validate proceedings providing for the organization, reorganization, enlargement, or change in boundaries of school corporations.

Senate File 96, by committee on toll roads, a bill for an act providing for the construction, maintenance, repair and operation of toll road projects; creating the Iowa Toll Road Authority and defining its powers and duties; granting it power to acquire necessary real and personal property and to exercise the power of eminent domain; providing for changes and reconstruction in the lines and location of highways, railroads and public facilities, the procedure and payment for cost or damage; providing for financing the construction of such projects by the issuance of revenue bonds of the Authority, payable solely from the revenues and funds provided for such payment; providing that no liability or debt of the state shall be incurred in the exercise of any such powers; providing for the collection of tolls and other revenues to pay such bonds and the interest thereon and the cost of maintenance, repair and operation of such projects; exempting from taxes and assessments such toll road projects and such bonds and the interest thereon, making such bonds eligible for certain investments; prescribing the power and duties of the Authority in connection with the foregoing and the rights and remedies of the holders of bonds issued under the provisions of this Act; authorizing the issuance of revenue refunding bonds; authorizing municipalities and state agencies to convey property to the Authority; providing for the operation and supervision of the projects after the retirement of such bonds, and for making an appropriation for preliminary expenses.

Read first and second times, and passed on file.

Senate File 97, by Senators Nelson, Stewart of Mahaska, Dykhouse, Walter and Scott, a bill for an act relating to the attendance of school children outside their home district and to amend various sections of the Code relating thereto.

HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION 5

Whereas, the large and increasing number of serious accidents occurring upon the highways of this state is a matter of major public concern, and

Whereas, efficient and uniform enforcement of traffic safety laws is necessary for the promotion of safety upon the highways, and

Whereas, such enforcement demands wholehearted cooperation between state, county and municipal enforcement officials, and

Whereas, it is the intent of the statutes of this state pertinent thereto that the Iowa Highway Safety Patrol shall supplement local and county officials in the enforcement of highway safety laws, therefore,

Be It Resolved by the House, the Senate Concurring, that the Fifty-sixth General Assembly of the State of Iowa earnestly urges all officials of the various governmental levels who have a direct responsibility in the enforcement of motor vehicle traffic laws, to wholeheartedly cooperate one with the other by the exchange of assistance and information which may be helpful in obtaining uniform and efficient enforcement of such laws and to coordinate their efforts in the best interests of the general public.

Be It Further Resolved, that the Attorney General shall forward a copy of this resolution to all officials of the Department of Public Safety and members of the Highway Safety Patrol, and to all county attorneys, county sheriffs, mayors and managers of municipalities, and the executive heads of all police departments.

The request was granted.

Whereas, the purpose of state aid to schools is to equalize educational opportunities and to equalize the tax load for heavily burdened property taxpayers, and

Whereas, state collected taxes are distributed in various ways toward direct and indirect relief of property taxes; the indirect relief being distributed by way of agricultural land tax credits, homestead tax credit and soldiers exemption tax credits, and

Whereas, approximately 48 per cent of all property taxes are spent for general school purposes, and

Whereas, there has been a good deal of misinterpretation and misrepresentation of facts regarding state school aid, and

Whereas, the people of Iowa are entitled to have a clear presentation of facts regarding the use of their tax dollars, and

Whereas, the adoption of this resolution is not an expression either for or against additional state aid for schools, and

Whereas, these indirect aids serve the purpose of lightening the property tax burden for those property taxpayers who benefit from said indirect aids, and

Now, Therefore, Be It Resolved by the House of the Fifty-sixth General Assembly of the State of Iowa, the Senate Concurring, that in the consideration of state aid to schools, credit shall be taken for five million dollars of agricultural land tax credits and 48 per cent of \$26,103,610, which was distributed as homestead and military service tax credits, amounting to approximately twelve and a half million dollars or an aggregate of approximately seventeen and a half million dollars of indirect aid which together with just under nineteen million dollars of direct aid resulted in a total of thirty-six and a half million dollars of direct and indirect aid or 27.57 per cent of all general school cost paid from the state general fund.

SENATE RESOLUTION 4

Whereas, on March 23, 1953, the Senate of the Fifty-fifth General Assembly did pass by the vote of 49 to 1, House File 365 which was a bill to provide for the construction of a nursing home for the care of Iowa veterans at the Iowa Soldiers' Home at Marshalltown, Iowa, and which was to be paid for by money available in the World War I bonus fund (see page 658 of Senate Journal, 1953), and

Whereas, House File 353 was approved by the Governor on March 25, 1953 (see page 333 of the Laws of the Fifty-fifth General Assembly), and

Whereas, since that date there has been no action or construction on this essential project in the public interest, and

Whereas, there has, as yet, been no explanation or report concerning this delay and the absence of any activity in the construction of this home, which is vitally needed by disabled veterans,

Now, Therefore, Be It Resolved by the Senate, that the military affairs committee of this body is hereby instructed to make immediate and diligent inquiry into this delay respecting a construction of a nursing home at the Iowa Soldiers' Home, Marshalltown, Iowa.

Be It Further Resolved, that the chairman of said committee is directed to prepare a full and complete report as the committee shall approve, for the information of the Senate, respecting the facts surrounding this delay in construction of said nursing home.

Be It Further Resolved, that said committee shall recommend such legislation as may be needed to expedite and carry forward the construction of said nursing home as it shall find proper, for action by this General Assembly.

TO THE FIFTY-SIXTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF IOWA:

In accordance with sections 684.18 and 684.19, Code of Iowa, 1954, the Supreme Court of Iowa has prescribed and herewith reports to you rules of practice and procedure in the nature of amendments to the following designated Rules of Civil Procedure heretofore prescribed. These amendments were recommended by the court's advisory committee on Rules of Civil Procedure:

RULE 102. WHAT ADMITTED

Rule 102 is revised to read:

Every fact pleaded and not denied in a subsequent pleading as permitted by these rules shall be deemed admitted except (1) allegations

of value or amount of damage, (2) allegations of a reply, and (3) facts not previously pleaded that are set forth in pleadings filed subsequent to the seventh day preceding the trial, all of which shall be deemed denied by operation of law.

(Explanation: This changes present Rule 102 by providing that facts set forth in pleadings filed subsequent to the seventh day preceding the trial, as well as allegations of value, amount of damage and a reply, are deemed denied by operation of law.)

RULE 185. CONSOLIDATION

Rule 185 is amended to read:

Unless some party shows he will be prejudiced thereby the court may consolidate separate actions which involve common questions of law or fact or order a single trial of any or all issues therein. In such cases it may make such orders concerning the proceedings as tend to avoid unnecessary cost or delay.

(Explanation: This changes present Rule 185 by substituting "shows," fourth word in new Rule 185, for "objects, stating that." Under the literal wording of the present rule a mere statement that a party will be prejudiced thereby prevents a consolidation of actions or single trial of issues. The new rule requires a showing, rather than a mere statement, of prejudice.)

RULE 294. ATTORNEY FEES

Rule 294 is amended by substituting for subsection 4 thereof the following:

4. On all sums in excess of one thousand dollars, two per cent. Provided further that in contested partition cases, plaintiff's attorneys shall receive such additional reasonable compensation as the court may allow, to be taxed as part of the costs.

(Explanation: This changes present Rule 294 by allowing as a fee in favor of plaintiff's attorney in partition cases involving real estate an amount not exceeding two per cent, rather than one per cent, on all sums in excess of one thousand dollars on the sale price of the real estate. The amendment also permits the allowance of additional reasonable compensation for plaintiff's attorney in contested real estate partition cases.)

Whereas, agriculture is the basic industry of Iowa, and

Whereas, dairying is an exceedingly large part of agriculture, and

Whereas, Iowa produced last year approximately 6,000,000,000 pounds of agricultural products, and

Whereas, there are in Iowa as of last year 1,145,000 cows and heifers kept for milk, and

Whereas, the cash income from milk, cream and other dairy products from the farm exceeds approximately \$160,000,000 each year, and

Whereas, milk is the basic component of all of our dairy products, and

Whereas, it is for the best interest of all citizens of Iowa that we encourage a greater consumption of milk, and

Whereas, the milk production on farms last year was 5,928,000,000 pounds, and

Whereas, there is from time to time a surplus of milk which has a reflection upon our dairy income;

Now, Therefore, Be It Resolved by the Senate, the House Concurring: That the members of the Fifty-sixth General Assembly go on record as endorsing the further advancement of the use of milk wherever practi-

cable in all of the public institutions, including county, city, state and school districts, and

Be It Further Resolved, that we encourage the manufacturing, wholesale and retail establishments to install milk vending machines to sell milk for consumption on the premises, and

Be It Further Resolved, that a printed copy of this resolution be distributed to Iowa manufacturers, wholesalers and retailers and all public bodies.

The motion prevailed and the resolution was adopted.

Senator Dewel moved that Senator McFarlane be appointed as a committee of one to contact the executive council and ascertain the possibilities of installing automatic milk vending machines in the State House and also in the State Office Building.

The motion prevailed and the Chair appointed Senator McFarlane as such committee.

PRESENTATION OF VISITORS

Senator Wormley asked and received unanimous consent to present to the Senate twenty-nine members of the junior and senior classes in government of the Sully High School who were present in the balcony with their superintendent, John H. Vandenberg.

Senator O'Malley asked and received unanimous consent to present to the Senate thirty Polk County Farm Bureau women who were present in the balcony with Mrs. Gabriel Nasr, home economist, and Mrs. Wilbur Goodhue, county chairman of the women's committee.

Senator Nelson asked and received unanimous consent to present to the Senate the Honorable Herman B. Lord of Muscatine County, a former member of the Senate who was present in the Senate chamber.

ADDITIONAL COPIES

Senator Stewart of Mahaska County asked and received unanimous consent to have 500 additional copies of Senate Joint Resolution 4 printed.

Senator Walker asked and received unanimous consent to have 500 additional copies of Senate Joint Resolution 2 printed.

Senator Elijah asked and received unanimous consent to have 500 additional copies of Senate File 176 printed.

COMMITTEE FROM THE HOUSE

A committee from the House appeared and announced that, in accordance with House Concurrent Resolution 9, duly adopted, the House was ready to receive the Senate in joint convention.

The Senate proceeded to the House under the direction of the Sergeant-at-Arms.

JOINT CONVENTION

In accordance with law and concurrent resolution duly adopted, the joint convention was called to order, President Watson presiding.

President Watson announced a quorum present and the joint convention duly organized.

Senator Watson of O'Brien moved that a committee of four consisting of two members from the Senate and two members from the House be appointed to notify Governor Hoegh that the joint convention was ready to receive him.

Motion prevailed and the President appointed as such committee Senator Watson of O'Brien and Senator Lucas of Boone, on the part of the Senate, and Representatives Pim of Lucas and Falvey of Monroe on the part of the House.

The committee waited upon Governor Hoegh and escorted him to the Speaker's station. President Watson then presented Governor Hoegh, who delivered the following budget address:

GOVERNOR ELTHON, MR. SPEAKER, SENATORS, REPRESENTATIVES, LADIES AND GENTLEMEN:

Your state budget is a dollars and cents declaration of policy. It is the financial interpretation of the demands made by our Iowa citizens for services, balanced by their ability and willingness to pay.

In preparing the state budget recommendations, we were guided by the following principles:

1. Efficiency and economy be given full application so that the people will receive full value for their tax dollar.
2. Provide for the essential services, and at the same time maintain the financial strength of our state.
3. Develop a greater Iowa.
4. No property taxes for state government.
5. No deficit spending.

EDUCATION

The future prosperity of Iowa, to a great extent, depends upon our investment in education today. As education is improved, income of our people increases.

The number of students in our schools and state supported colleges and university is expanding at an unprecedented pace. This expansion, plus the needs for better education, results in a greater financial demand upon our people. Unless the state responds with its indirect taxes, this need will have to be met by local communities and property taxes. We are fully aware that property taxes are already at a saturation point in many communities. For this reason, I advocate that we substantially increase our state aid for education, and that we meet today the needs for improving our educational institutions.

For state aid to schools, the amount recommended is \$40,196,500 for each year (which includes agricultural land tax credit), or an increase of \$16,249,000 annually (67 per cent). The recommendations increase:

- Aid to handicapped children by \$149,999
- School transportation aid by 1 million dollars
- School supplemental aid by 1 million dollars
- General school aid by 2½ million dollars
- Vocational education by 100 thousand dollars
- Agricultural land tax credit by 5½ million dollars,

and provide for equalization purposes 6 million dollars, with more emphasis on wise expenditures and efficiency of administration. When more progress is made in school reorganization additional revenue should be provided for this purpose.

For the Board of Education institutions, I have recommended an increase in the gross budget from \$30,755,957 to \$34,151,917.87 (11.04 per cent). Of this amount, our two colleges and university will be increased from \$22,758,686 to \$24,961,624. The gross budget includes estimated receipts, reflecting the increase in tuition rates. In addition, another \$3,767,500 has been budgeted annually for capital improvements at the various institutions.

The gross increase for education each year for the coming biennium totals \$20,842,791.87 of which \$18,975,742 is provided by appropriation and \$1,867,049.87 is provided by increased receipts. The Board of Education and the Board of Public Instruction have ably set forth the requirements of our schools. Their askings were in line with our educational needs, but I did not find it possible to grant all of them and keep the budget in balance.

BOARD OF CONTROL INSTITUTIONS

Iowa has made impressive progress in the treatment of its mentally ill, and in the operation of its correctional institutions. We have the responsibility of providing the needed trained personnel and adequate facilities for the proper care and treatment of the mentally ill, and keep our correctional institutions up to acceptable standards. To this end, the operating funds for the Board of Control institutions have been in-

creased to \$13,500,208 annually as compared to \$11,752,480 each year in the last biennium, and the capital improvements funds have been increased to \$2,000,000 from \$1,884,000 annually.

The net increase for these needs each year for the coming biennium totals \$1,863,728.

SOCIAL WELFARE

Recommendations of the Board of Social Welfare were accepted and approved as presented. Aid to the dependent children program was increased by \$850,000 annually, but the request for the whole social welfare program is \$20,000 less each year than during the last biennium. Legislative action should be taken to prevent abuse of our aid to dependent children program. I suggest the following:

1. Strengthen our divorce laws.
2. Child support by parents be made more effective.

The department's policy of enforcing the relative support laws has resulted in reduced asking for old age assistance appropriations.

ADMINISTRATIVE DEPARTMENTS

I recommend for the state departments the amount of \$12,006,959 as compared with \$10,267,086 during this biennium—an increase of \$1,739,873. This increase includes the amount necessary to pay the salaries of the state classification and compensation plan, and the salary raises recommended in my inaugural message.

You will recall that I then urged adequate pay for the elected and other key governmental officials, which makes for better government. These increases account for less than one-tenth of 1 per cent of the total budget.

However, the principal causes for the increase in departmental appropriations are attributed to:

- 1: The needs of the Department of Public Safety for strengthening the division of criminal investigation, maintaining the highway patrol at full strength, administering the new title law, providing two license plates each year, increasing the salaries in the vital division of radio communications, and increasing the state's contribution to the peace officers retirement fund as recommended by actuarial survey; accounting for \$570,985 more each year.

2. The needs of the Department of Health, and to provide state funds in certain instances, where federal funds are being decreased or dropped entirely; accounting for \$92,190 more each year.

3. The needs of the district courts for the increased salaries approved two years ago, and additional contribution to the judicial retirement system; accounting for \$177,500 more each year.

4. The needs of the Iowa Development Commission, including civilian defense, for expansion of its essential activities in promoting Iowa; accounting for \$51,520 more each year.

5. The needs of the State Conservation Commission for the proper care and maintenance of our lakes and parks; accounting for \$111,400 more each year.

6. The needs of the National Guard and State Guard for its expanded activities; accounting for \$105,520 more each year.

7. The needs of the State Tax Commission for improvement of its services and collection methods; accounting for \$211,864 more each year.

8. The needs of the Department of Agriculture, and to provide additional state assistance to agricultural associations for improvement of the agricultural industry and for promotion of Iowa farm products; accounting for \$93,900 more each year.

I hasten to point out to you that the recommendations made for state departments do not take into consideration the savings which can be perfected by the consolidations set forth in my inaugural message. If consolidations are made, and I again urge that such action be taken, appropriate reductions should be made.

We in the executive and administrative branch of government will constantly strive to be more efficient and economical in our operations.

MISCELLANEOUS

There are two essential items in the proposed budget which do not appear in the Fifty-fifth General Assembly appropriations. They are:

1. National Guard armories and armory construction program, \$587,600.

2. Resurfacing of the malls, streets, parking lots and alleys of the capitol grounds, \$140,735.

To meet the needs of an expanded soil and water conservation program, I am recommending an increase of \$200,000 a year in the soil conservation appropriation. The proper care of our great resources is a sound investment.

In compliance with the actions of the Fifty-fifth General Assembly, it is necessary to increase the amount for the Iowa public employees retirement system from \$500,000 to \$1,154,586 each year.

It is estimated that the homestead tax credits will total \$24,650,000 each year, an increase of \$650,000 annually.

RECAPITULATION

The total recommendations for each year of the coming biennium amount to \$146,073,996.50, an increase of \$23,701,300.57 over that appropriated by the Fifty-fifth General Assembly.

You are to decide whether the additional services are essential. I feel that the people of Iowa want them and will pay for them. In brief they are:

\$18,975,742.00 more for education (80.06%)

1,863,728.00 more for the Board of Control institutions (7.86%)

2,861,830.57 more for the other services (12.08%)

\$23,701,300.57

The proposed budget for the next biennium amounts to \$292,147,993. However, by perfecting savings through the consolidation previously urged, and by tightening the homestead credit law so as to comply

with its original purpose of encouraging bona fide home ownership, this figure can be reduced by \$1,000,000 each year making a net budget of \$290,147,993. The estimated income for the biennium is \$230,003,000, leaving a deficit of \$60,144,993, unless additional revenue is obtained.

TAXATION

The program suggested to you is essential for the building of a greater Iowa. The people of Iowa will invest their fair share to accomplish this objective. We must have the courage to provide the additional revenue for these worthwhile services. Without the funds, the program is destroyed, as we all subscribe to the sound fiscal policy of no deficit spending.

I suggest the following methods of securing the needed funds:

1. Limit the 10 per cent sales tax diversion to the road use fund to \$5,500,000 each year.
2. Extend the sales and use tax to cover:
 - (a) Services, except all forms of health service, \$20,000,000.
 - (b) Beer and cigarettes, \$2,800,000.
 - (c) Equipment not readily obtained in Iowa and used in processing, \$1,925,000.
 - (d) Property used in interstate transportation or commerce except as prohibited by the United States and state constitutions, \$500,000.
3. Extend the income tax to include capital gains, similar to the federal law, \$3,000,000.
4. Additional revenue to be collected by the insurance department, \$600,000.

The commissioner of insurance informs me that with modernizing amendments to the insurance law, this additional amount can be collected without injury to the Iowa insurance industry. I have instructed him to contact the appropriate committees that such amendments may be properly considered.

5. Step up our collection of income and sales taxes. Extend time for collection of income taxes on commission audits to three years. Require depreciation schedules of income tax returns be presented to the assessors for substantiation of property values. This would have the effect of either increasing property assessments or reducing depreciation values or both, \$1,000,000.

6. Return to the general fund the 5 per cent of gross liquor sales now used by the military tax credit fund. This should be effective January 1, 1956, resulting in making available for fiscal year ending June 30, 1956, \$925,000; for fiscal year ending June 30, 1957, \$1,850,000; or a yearly average of \$1,387,500.

These items make a total annual additional revenue of \$31,212,500, or income for biennium of \$62,425,000.

This amount with the estimated income totals \$292,428,000, plus the June 30, 1955, estimated unencumbered balance of \$26,933,254.42, provides total estimated funds available for the biennium ending June 30, 1957, of \$319,361,254.42, less this proposed budget of \$290,147,993, leaves an un-

encumbered balance on June 30, 1957, which is needed as a cash working balance of \$29,213,261.42.

Should you find it desirable to secure other revenue to finance your legislative program, I suggest that you give consideration to the full collection of the personal income tax. This source, with capital gains included, would bring in \$10,700,000 more revenue. Because it is geared to a person's ability to pay, it is a sound tax. No doubt, more revenue can be obtained from the liquor control commission by increasing the price of liquor. This should be fully explored. Other sources of revenue have been suggested. It is only wise that you consider them all.

While I favor a thorough tax study, I do not believe it wise to consider it as a holding action. Instead, we must courageously face our needs today, and proceed now with the program that will build us a greater and better Iowa.

CONCLUSION

Your comptroller, Mr. Sarsfield, his able staff and I, have devoted a great deal of time in the study of state services and in the preparation of this budget. I should like to thank them publicly for their conscientious and tireless work. We have no hesitancy in recommending the budget to you as one which meets Iowa's immediate needs and is within the capabilities of our state.

You have a great responsibility to determine the program of wise spending and of sound finances. The people of Iowa have confidence in your judgment. Let me assure you that I, as your Governor, and Mr. Sarsfield, and his staff, will work with you in your performance of this important task.

Governor Hoegh was escorted from the House chamber by the committee previously appointed.

The minutes of the joint convention were read and approved.

Walter of Hardin moved that the joint convention be now dissolved.

Motion prevailed.

The Senate returned to the Senate chamber and resumed regular session, President pro tempore Watson of Pottawattamie presiding.

On motion of Senator Dewel, the Senate recessed until 2:00 p.m.

AFTERNOON SESSION

The Senate reconvened, President Elthon presiding.

Senator Dykhouse asked and received unanimous consent to take up the following resolution and moved its adoption :

Whereas, United States Congressman Charles B. Hoeven of the Eighth Congressional District will be in Des Moines, Iowa, on Friday, February 11, 1955;

Therefore, Be It Resolved by the Senate: That an invitation be extended to Congressman Hoeven to honor the Senate by appearing before it to make some current remarks at 10:30 a.m., February 11, 1955.

The motion prevailed and the resolution was unanimously adopted.

REPORT OF THE SENATE AND HOUSE MEMBERS OF THE
IOWA COMMISSION ON INTERSTATE COOPERATION IN
ACCORDANCE WITH HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION 22

The report of the Senate and House members of the Iowa Commission on Interstate Cooperation, and a comprehensive report of the activities of the Council of State Governments in the interim is as follows:

For some years it has been the practice and custom for the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House to appoint an interim committee on Interstate Cooperation. This committee, upon adjournment of the legislature, is constituted as the Iowa Commission on Interstate Cooperation. The undersigned committee was duly appointed and has functioned as such in the course of the interim and has continued to maintain an active interest in legislation sponsored by the Council of State Governments in the course of the present session of the legislature.

By the terms of the act establishing the commission, Iowa has joined with the other forty-seven states of the Union in organizing and developing a Council of State Governments.

The Council of State Governments is a joint governmental agency established by the states, supported by the states, for service to the states. It acts as:

1. A medium for improving legislative, administrative and judicial practices in the states.
2. An agency for securing full cooperation among the states in solving interstate problems, both regional and national.
3. A means of facilitating and improving federal-state relations.
4. The Council exists to serve governmental progress within the individual states, among the states working together, and by the states in their relations with the federal government.

THE COUNCIL'S FOUNDATIONS

"The Council of State Governments is hereby declared to be a joint governmental agency of this state and of the other states which cooperate through it."

The Commissions, working for cooperative governmental action on numerous fronts, are the bases on which the Council is founded.

THE COUNCIL'S MANAGEMENT

The states themselves govern and control the Council. Its policies are determined by a Board of Managers, comprising forty-eight delegate members representing the forty-eight states, nineteen ex-officio members, and ten members at large.

Each state selects its own delegate member. Ex-officio managers are the nine members of the Executive Committee of the Governors' Conference; the presiding heads of eight other state organizations representing executive, legislative and judicial branches of government; the Honorary President of the Council; and its Executive Director. To provide continuity of membership, the Board itself elects ten Managers at Large who serve five-year, staggered terms.

The Board meets annually and at special call to consider Council policy. It has an Executive Committee which works with the Executive Director for solution of numerous problems. The Executive Committee comprises the President of the Council, who is a Governor; the Vice President, who is a legislator and who also serves as Chairman of the Board of Managers; two additional Vice Presidents; the Auditor, who is a state fiscal officer; the Honorary President of the Council; and the Executive Director.

The Executive Committee appoints the Executive Director, subject to the Board's approval. He selects all members of the Council staff, and they operate under his direction and supervision.

THE COUNCIL AS SECRETARIAT

The Council is the secretariat for America's 7,500 state legislators, organized through the American Legislators' Association; the Governors' Conference; the Conference of Chief Justices; the National Association of Attorneys General; the National Association of State Budget Officers; the Legislative Service Conference; the National Association of State Purchasing Officials; and an Association of Administrators of the Interstate Compact for the Supervision of Parolees and Probationers. The Council has a cooperative arrangement with the National Conference of Commissioners on Uniform State Laws and works closely with other organizations serving state government.

Because of its activities for many state associations and its day-to-day work with individual state officials and legislators, the Council is in a position to bring to the service of each a wide understanding of the problems of all.

WHAT IT DOES

As the responsibilities of modern government grow, the states increasingly are working together—for progress in their own internal affairs, for solution of problems that cross state lines, and for improved federal-state relations.

The Council of State Governments, as the agency of all the states, contributes to the realization of these goals by:

Conducting major research projects—making the results available to the states and to many interested agencies.

Maintaining an inquiry-and-information service available to state agencies, officials and legislators.

Serving as a clearinghouse through which the states exchange their own information.

Holding national and regional meetings in which state officials and legislators survey common problems.

Acting as secretariat for a number of interstate organizations.

SERVICE FOR INTRASTATE PROGRESS

Most of the work of every state government necessarily is concentrated on its internal affairs. But this does not mean working in isolation. Almost every home task of every state has its counterparts in other states. Through meetings, publications and informal communication aided by the Council of State Governments, the experience of all states in these matters is shared.

If, for example, a given state is considering introduction of a new governmental technique, or adoption of a new public service, or improvement of an old one, it can obtain information through the Council as to action of other states on similar problems, and the results. It can judge from such shared experience what practices have worked best elsewhere. Individual states repeatedly obtain such information from the Council or at its meetings.

Certain intrastate problems, moreover, are perennial for all states or assume special significance for all at certain times. The Council undertakes special studies of such subjects, often at the specific direction of the Governor's Conference.

Thus the Council in recent years has made extensive studies in the fields of public school and higher education, the state mental health programs, highway safety and motor truck regulation, state licensing systems, state governmental reorganization, legislative processes and procedures, state judicial systems, and state-local relations. In some instances, studies are conducted by research specialists under Council supervision; in others, by members of the Council's staff; in still others, by special Council committees assisted by staff members.

Such fact-finding and study among the states have contributed to steady progress in organization, procedure and public service of state governments throughout the Union.

SERVICE FOR INTERSTATE ACTION

Numerous problems that confront government call for interstate action. The states today are adding new programs to meet these needs. They are improving the interstate programs already in existence. Much of the work of the Council of State Governments is directed to their service in this broad field.

Functional areas of interstate agencies and agreements include civil defense, disaster relief, river problems, coastal fisheries, oil conservation, regional education, regional institutions for care of the handicapped, interstate problems of crime control, probation and parole. Some of the

agencies and organizations comprise a large number of states, some two or more states that adjoin each other. Many have been created through interstate compact, others through less formal arrangements. The Council of State Governments and the Commissions on Interstate Cooperation have assisted in the studies and conferences that led to the establishment of many of them. The Council and the Commissions continue to aid them in fulfilling their functions.

In addition, the Council serves the states continuously in a variety of common tasks not performed by separate interstate agencies. For many years the states have worked successfully through the Council to prevent or eliminate interstate trade barriers. They are working through it for greater uniformity in regulation of interstate highway traffic, including sizes and weights of trucks. The Council cooperates with the National Conference of Commissioners on uniform state laws, which sponsors legislation in various fields. In recent years, the Council's Drafting Committee of State Officials, in consultation with other groups, has prepared and sponsored a series of suggested legislative acts dealing with subjects on which uniform or similar state laws might serve the public interest. Many of these now are on the statute books.

SERVICE IN FEDERAL-STATE RELATIONS

In war and peace, federal-state cooperation has been increasing through the last decade. The Council of State Governments is a principal channel through which this has been fostered and through which specific federal-state programs have been devised, then put into effect.

During World War II the Council cooperated with the United States government and the governments of the states in setting up our nation-wide system of civilian defense. Similar cooperation led to state programs for selective service, rationing, conservation and salvage, soldier-sailor voting, motor transport regulation, and other related matters. Since the war the Council has continued to act for federal-state cooperation through numerous means, including its studies of federal grants-in-aid, overlapping taxes and other intergovernmental problems, followed by conferences with federal officials and members of Congress on these subjects. An extensive study by the Council, requested by the national Commission on Organization of the Executive Branch of the Government, served as a basis for that commission's recommendations on federal-state relations. Since 1950, as international tensions mounted, the Council again assisted in preparing and developing a nation-wide program of civil defense, based on state operation, and in other federal-state activities related to defense.

The strength of our federal, democratic system requires self-reliance and strength at each level of government—state, local, national. It also requires cooperation among all levels. The Council works for the effective operation of both those principles.

SERVICE TO THE PUBLIC

All of the Council's activities are directed to the public service. It was created by the states to assist them for that over-all purpose. The Council

contributes directly, moreover, particularly through its publications, to citizens information on state governmental affairs; thus it stimulates interest in them. Its standard reference works, its monthly journal and its special studies are in use in public libraries, schools and universities throughout the nation. Groups of citizens concerned with special civic problems—education, public welfare, highway traffic, public taxation, governmental structure and many others—study these materials.

An informed citizenry is the basis for good government. The Council of State Governments assists interested citizens in keeping themselves informed.

The Senate and House members of the Iowa Commission on Interstate Cooperation elected State Representative Fred Schwengel to head the Iowa delegation as chairman and to sit on the board of managers of the Council of State Governments. Representative Schwengel resigned at the Chicago meeting, and the Iowa commission elected Senator Walter to fill the vacancy.

The Iowa commission attended three meetings during the interim.

I. Mackinac Island, Michigan, July 27 and 28, 1953, at which the following resolutions were adopted:

A. "The Midwestern Regional Conference of the Council of State Governments, meeting at Mackinac Island, Michigan, July 27 and 28, 1953, commends the national administration and Congress for enacting legislation authorizing the establishment of a Commission on Intergovernmental Relations. The Conference urges the Commission to develop a series of specific recommendations, looking toward the reduction of federal grants-in-aid to the states for domestic and general purposes and the release by the federal government of tax resources needed by the states and localities to carry on these governmental programs.

B. The Midwestern Regional Conference of the Council of State Governments, meeting at Mackinac Island, Michigan, July 27 and 28, 1953, reaffirms the action taken at the 1952 conference urging the federal government to withdraw from the field of gasoline taxes. The Conference further urges that federal grants to the states for highway purposes be discontinued, provided, however, that special arrangements be made for those states in which there are special problems involving unusually great federal highway mileage in relation to population and large areas of federally-owned land.

It is further recommended that the delegates to this conference urge their representatives in Congress to work for the early enactment of legislation to accomplish these purposes.

C. Whereas, federal, state and local laws and departmental rules and regulations have grown to astronomical numbers and in complexity; and

Whereas, this increase in number and complexity of laws, rules and regulations has made it impossible for the average citizen to know when he is breaking a law, rule or regulation;

Be it Resolved, that the Midwestern Regional Conference of the Council of State Governments, meeting at Mackinac Island, Michigan, July 27 and 28, 1953, urges all governing bodies to work toward the reduction

in the number and complexity of their laws and departmental rules and regulations.

D. The Midwestern Regional Conference of the Council of State Governments, meeting at Mackinac Island, Michigan, July 27 and 28, 1953, expresses its thanks and appreciation to the Michigan Committee on Interstate Cooperation and to the State of Michigan for the cordial hospitality which has been extended to the members of this Conference and their parties.

The Conference wishes also to express its appreciation to the entire staff of the Grand Hotel for their many courtesies.

The Conference also offers its thanks to the Indiana Commission on Interstate Cooperation for the invitation to hold the 1954 meeting at French Lick, Indiana, and urges that favorable consideration be given to this invitation."

We hereby resolve and express our appreciation on the part of the delegates assembled this date for the increased dollars distributed back to the various states for federal-state highways and roads beginning July 1, 1955."

Therefore, we wish to be recorded as condemning the contemplated action above referred to which would make our government subject to any United Federalist or United Nations Government".

We particularly urge those states which have not entered any civil defense compact arrangement to take immediate steps to this end.

The Council of State Governments and the Federal Civil Defense Administration are requested to promote the accomplishment of the purposes of this resolution."

G. Further amend said section by adding to the first paragraph the following: "Any person who desires to avail himself of the benefits provided hereunder shall each year, commencing January first, 1956, and not later than July first of each year, deliver to the county or city assessor in whose jurisdiction the property upon which exemption is claimed is located, upon a blank form to be furnished by the assessor in conformity with section four hundred twenty-seven point five (427.5), as to information offered, a verified statement and designation of the property upon which exemption is claimed by him, and the assessor shall tabulate and deliver said statement and designation as made, to the county auditor with a recommendation for allowance or disallowance endorsed thereon. In case the owner of the property is in active service in any of the armed forces of the United States or of this state, including the nurses' corps of the state or of the United States, such statement and designation, if desired, may be delivered or filed by the owner's spouse, parent, child, brother, or sister, or by any person who may represent him under power of attorney."

Sec. 3. Section four hundred twenty-seven point five (427.5), Code 1954, is hereby amended by adding to said section the following: "Any person who has designated the property upon which said exemption is claimed may change such designation by filing notice of such change of designation with the county or city assessor in whose jurisdiction the property upon which exemption is claimed is located, not later than July first of the year for which said exemption is claimed or with the county auditor during the period between July first and August fifteenth of such year."

The amendment was adopted.

Senator Dailey offered the following amendment and moved its adoption:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON RULES

MR. PRESIDENT: Your committee on rules begs leave to report that it has had the permanent rules under consideration and recommends that the rules of the Senate of the Fifty-sixth General Assembly be as follows:

The rules of the Senate for the Fifty-fifth General Assembly shall be adopted as the rules of the Senate for the Fifty-sixth General Assembly except as hereinafter altered, amended, added or substituted.

Rule 22 of the printed rules of the Senate for the Fifty-fifth General Assembly is amended as follows: In line 2 thereof strike therefrom the numerals and letters "26th" and insert in lieu thereof the numerals and letters "24th".

Further amend said rule by striking in line 6 thereof the numerals and letters "26th" and inserting in lieu thereof the numerals and letters "24th".

Rule 32 of the printed rules of the Senate for the Fifty-fifth General Assembly is amended as follows: In line 2, after the word "bill", add the words "and resolution".

Further amend said rule, in line 4 thereof, by adding after the word "bills" the words "and resolutions".

Further amend said rule, in line 4 thereof, by adding after the word "bill", the words "or resolution".

Rule 37 of the printed rules of the Senate for the Fifty-fifth General Assembly is amended as follows: Strike therefrom in line 2 thereof, the numerals and letters "27th" and insert in lieu thereof the numerals and letters "25th".

Rule 47, captioned "Introduction and Presentation of Guests", to be added to the present rules, to read as follows: "Guests of the Senate or of a member thereof, may be introduced by any member of the Senate, by first filing a written request, with the President, for this personal privilege, and obtaining approval thereof. Thereafter, but not during debate or discussion on legislation, a member may request this personal privilege."

Senator Dailey offered the following amendment to Rule 45 of the Senate rules:

Amend Rule 45 of the rules of the Senate as follows:

1. Strike all of Rule 45 and insert in lieu thereof the following, to be known as Rule 45:

"Rule 45"

In all sessions wherein the voting on confirmation of appointments does occur, the procedure shall be as follows:

The Secretary of the Senate shall call the roll as provided by Rule 8 and, when the voting is concluded, the presiding officer shall count the

votes and shall announce whether the appointee being considered is confirmed or otherwise, and the roll call thereon entered on the Journal.

No report on confirmation of appointments made by the Governor shall be acted upon until after the expiration of seven days from the date the committee is appointed to make investigation of the appointee. This rule requiring a seven day delay shall not apply during the last seven legislative days of the session.

Senator Dewel raised a point of order that the amendment was out of order for the reason of the provision of lines 2 and 3 of section 11, chapter 114, Code 1954.

The Chair ruled the point well taken and the amendment out of order for the following reason :

The Chair understands an executive session to be one in which all proceedings thereof are secret. The Chair believes that because of the importance of an executive session, that all members of the Senate, and the desk force present, are sworn to secrecy.

The legislators, and that includes both members of the Senate and the House, have found fit, in several instances, to provide for secret proceedings in the matter of the confirmation of the Governor's appointees. The reason for this is that, when an appointee's name is being considered, each member of the Senate should have every reason and opportunity to consult his own mind and conscience, and should never be in jeopardy, by criticisms, from the one who is being confirmed, or by the press, or by any individual of the State of Iowa.

Therefore, the legislature has seen fit to provide that in the matter of confirmation of the Governor's appointees, that they be done in executive session.

An executive session, in line with this thinking, is a secret session. The amendment offered by the Senator from Des Moines would have the effect of making the executive session a public session, and therefore the Chair is compelled to rule the amendment out of order.

Senator Watson of Pottawattamie moved the adoption of the report, which motion prevailed, and the report was adopted.

On motion of Senator Watson of Pottawattamie the recommendations and the amendments contained in the report were adopted.

Senator Watson of Pottawattamie moved that the rules of the Fifty-fifth General Assembly be made the rules of the Fifty-sixth General Assembly, except as repealed, altered, amended or substituted, as recommended in the adopted report of the committee on rules, which motion prevailed, and the Chair declared the rules adopted.

President Watson presented to the joint convention the dean of the Iowa Senate, the Honorable Frank C. Byers of Linn, who introduced Dave Ennis, Explorer Scout, Troop 40, Mount Vernon. Explorer Scout Ennis addressed the joint convention as follows:

GOVERNOR HOEGH, PRESIDENT WATSON, SENATOR BYERS, REPRESENTATIVE KOSEK, SENATORS AND REPRESENTATIVES OF THE FIFTY-SIXTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY AND OTHER FRIENDS:

It is my rare honor and privilege to bring you greetings from the Boy Scouts of Iowa, and to report for them during Boy Scout Week.

We are celebrating this week the Forty-fifth Anniversary of the Boy Scouts of America, incorporated at Washington, D. C., on February 8, 1910. Six years later the Congress of the United States granted us a federal charter. Today, our honorable president is Dwight Eisenhower, and our vice presidents are the other living former presidents of the United States, Mr. Truman and Mr. Hoover.

We have grown in size as youth is destined to grow. Today over three and one-half million Cub Scouts, Boy Scouts, Explorer Scouts, and their adult leaders will observe this Forty-fifth Anniversary. This anniversary is celebrated in every state in the Union, in Alaska, Hawaii, Puerto Rico and the Canal Zone. The Boy Scouts of America has established local councils in Germany and Japan for the sons of American service personnel in those countries. Of course, the Boy Scout idea has spread to many other nations; our jamboree in California a year and a half ago saw representatives from twenty-eight nations.

The theme for this Forty-fifth Anniversary of American Scouting is "Building for a Better Tomorrow." The particular method used by the Scouts in applying this theme this past year was through Conservation of Our Natural Resources. Thus Boy Scout Week—this week—will mark the completion of the National Conservation Good Turn, which was undertaken at the request of President Eisenhower. In this activity we have had the splendid cooperation of many agencies; the Soil Conservation Service, State Conservation and Forestry services and many other groups. We count ourselves a part of the "Plant Iowa" program. Thus reports are being made to local, state and federal agencies to show our accomplishments to date, and to aid in arousing "public recognition of the need for adequate protection and wise management of our soil, water, mineral, forest, grassland, and wildlife resources."

What have the Iowa Scouts accomplished in Conservation Good Turn? First, it may be said that almost 20,000 Iowa boys and leaders participated directly. Thus almost half of all the Scouts in the state engaged in conservation work. In an agricultural state like Iowa, you will be interested to know that Iowa Scouts carried out 572 projects in soil and water conservation. This included working on 193 eroding gullies and 79 eroding stream banks, 248 acres of land planted in grass, 220 soil conservation talks given and 67 exhibits built.

Another part of our Iowa Conservation Good Turn consisted of 778 projects carried out in forestry. Over 85,000 trees were planted, 566 acres of woodlot were improved, two forest fires were fought, and over 13,000 fire prevention posters were distributed.

A third part of our Conservation Good Turn included 900 projects in outdoor manners. Scouts spent over 14,000 hours helping conservation officials, 115 boat and fishing safety demonstrations were given, and over 12,000 Outdoor Code posters were distributed.

All 12 of the Iowa Scout Councils reported that conservation plans had been completed for their camp properties.

This, then, is my factual report from Your Iowa Scouts on their Conservation Good Turn. This is the report of Iowa Scouts attempting to "build for a better tomorrow." This is an effort to conserve both natural resources and boy resources.

The Honorable Jack Schroeder, Senator from Scott, presented to the joint convention the Honorable Fred Schwengel, Member of Congress, First District of Iowa, who delivered the following address:

TODAY—WHAT MIGHT HE SAY

GOVERNOR HOEGH, DISTINGUISHED COLLEAGUE REPRESENTATIVE HOEVEN, SENATOR SCHROEDER, MR. PRESIDENT, MR. SPEAKER, FELLOW LEGISLATORS, FRIENDS:

It would appear less than grateful if I didn't tell you that I deeply appreciate the invitation and honor you have extended to one of your kind today. . . . My friends, it is good to be back where there are so many of with whom I have worked so long and whom I have known so well. Now, let me make a confession: This will be appreciated most by those with whom I have served, when I say to you I have coveted and now covet my place here in this Assembly at seat number 6. You see, this is the first opportunity I have had to make a speech since I have been a Congressman. That's because, in Congress, they have what labor circles call seniority rights.

So, thank you—every one of you—for the fine compliment you have shown me.

But, I have been very happy and am pleased in my position as a Congressman and adjustment has come quickly and easily because I have had and have the benefit of sympathetic help and advice from the finest Congressional delegation of Senators and Representatives of any state in the Union—Hickenlooper, Martin, Talle, Gross, LeCompte, Cunningham, Dolliver, Jensen and Hoeven. I am herewith authorized and pleased to extend to you greetings and best wishes from every member of the Iowa delegation in Congress to each of you.

(Congressman Schwengel read the following letter:)

Dear Congressman Schwengel:

It is good to learn that you have been honored by an invitation to address the Iowa General Assembly on its annual observance of Lincoln Day. I am sure this will be a most happy occasion, out in the heart of the Middle West, in the kind of country Abraham Lincoln himself knew and loved.

Please extend my greetings to the members of the General Assembly and, through them, to all the Iowans who will participate in Lincoln Day celebrations all over their State.

Very briefly now, I feel constrained to give you an impression of the greatest legislative body in the world. I do this against the background and knowledge of the fact that I believe that within the hearts and minds of men and women that make up the Congress, are or must be, the way to

domestic tranquility and to peace and good will through understanding. If our government fails to meet the challenge, continued domestic difficulties and world-wide conflagration will surely ensue. Realizing this makes one stand in awe and wonder. If you and I, as the people's representative, can grasp this challenge and lead the way, as I believe we must, then peace and understanding among the peoples of the world can be our reward.

History can at least point the way. We must harken to the voices coming to us from the many great patriots of the past, who, also, in difficult circumstances sought and found the fundamental philosophies and/or those things spoken of in the great Book as the truth. All this, I believe, makes it very necessary for you and me to consider these fundamentals. It is our custom in Iowa, especially on occasions like this, to pause and heed the great signposts that point toward success along the road of past history. The principal objective of history is to make sure that right decisions, correct and decisive actions, clear thinking and the plain speaking of the past are not forgotten. An even more important objective of history is to see that the wrong decisions, careless actions and ill-considered words haunting us from other days are not repeated. If we would hold the gains we have made in popular government of, by and for the people we must never forget the importance of understanding history and the great and significant contributions made by the patriots and philanthropists of all ages of the past to the cause of the people—of the people because this is what the Holy Doctrine teaches. If it were not so, to sacrifice oneself for others would be extreme folly. The devotion of these patriots to the cause of the people has made them illustrious and their memories the richest inheritance of the human race. We in Iowa can be proud of having shouldered our full load in every great national crisis and we do pause and reflect—the record shows that the Iowa General Assembly is one of the first official bodies in these United States to recognize this day and to set it aside for special attention in the memory of that Great American, the Emancipator. We have been doing this in Iowa since 1909. My authority for this claim is Claude Cook, curator for the Archives here in Iowa, and it is substantiated by the Library of Congress where we have been doing some research and we have not yet found a state which began this idea before we did.

So—in the words of Abe—"Hats off to Iowa."

When I received your invitation I thought a great deal about what I could say that might challenge your thinking and be mutually beneficial. I finally arrived at the topic announced in your program, and will try for a few moments to apply what Lincoln has said to a few areas of government and the problems of mankind that face us today.

This will include what he thought about history; why education is a great undergirding influence; why sound and sober reasoning is important; his attitude toward foreign policies; and then will touch briefly on Lincoln, the man. I make no apologies—nor should any of us—for quoting Lincoln. He is cited and quoted by Democrats, Republicans and Socialists, Liberals and Conservatives, labor leaders and capitalists, World Federalists and extreme Nationalists, agnostics and ministers (though

he never belonged to any church), wets and dries, colored people and white people, and men of every race, creed, walk of life, and age group.

I spoke earlier of the importance of history. Lincoln believed history was important, too. Let me quote him. He said, on one memorable occasion: "We cannot escape history. . . ." My, how that fits today! "We of this Congress and this administration . . .", he said, ". . . will be remembered in spite of ourselves. No personal significance or insignificance can spare one or another of us. The fiery trial through which we pass will light us down in honor or dishonor to the last generation." This he said on December 2, 1862, during his second annual message. Who can deny that this applies to me, to the Congress, to the Chief Executive? Who can deny that it applies to everyone of you here in this General Assembly? In studying his life we find that he referred often to the early pioneers and the contributions they made in their time to the up-building and strengthening of this our government—these patriots of the past were his guide for the present and inspired his faith in looking to the future.

Though he had less than a year's formal education and none of the advantages of modern education, it seems I can hear him say "That every man should receive at least a moderate education, and thereby be enabled to read the histories of his own and other countries, by which he may duly appreciate the value of our free institutions, appears to be an object of vital importance, even on this account alone, to say nothing of the advantages and satisfaction to be derived from all being able to read the Scriptures, and other works both of a religious and moral nature for themselves. For my part I desire to see the time when education—and by its means, morality, sobriety, enterprise and industry—shall become much more general than at present, and should be gratified to have it in my power to contribute something to the advancement of any measure which might have a tendency to accelerate that happy period." In fact, he did say this in a speech in Sangamon County, on March 9, 1832, at the age of twenty-one. Further on education, we find his name on this resolution written in the Record of the Illinois Legislature on December 2, 1840: On teacher qualification—"That the committee on education be instructed to inquire into the expediency of providing by law for the examination as to the qualifications of persons offering themselves as school teachers, that no teacher shall receive any part of the public school fund who shall not have successfully passed such examination."

Though he had almost none of the advantages of a formal education, there is no indication anywhere that he ever said or inferred that "what is good enough for me is good enough for my children." No—he pointed toward higher goals for all our people via better education.

If he were invited to speak at a teacher's convention, I think I might hear him say to our teachers: Teaching is creative work with its basic materials the minds of boys and girls, the hearts and the ambitions of youngsters who want and need proper guidance. Teaching has only one motive—service to mankind. Not all will be equal in talents but even the slowest can gain if you crusade for service. Teaching is enduring

work. Yes, he would agree with Henry Adams who left these words: "A teacher affects eternity—he can never tell where his influence stops."

There is much concern in many areas of our life and especially among the great leaders in educational institutions of our country, and among other leaders of our time, that there is too much appeal to the passions and baser instincts of people rather than to sober reason. Whether or not it is true, you may best be the judge. Reading the history of those times there can be no denial that there was strong appeal to the passions of the people then, and most people now know that those appeals to the lower instincts were a major factor in causing the Civil War; but, nowhere in Lincoln's writings or pronouncements are there appeals that rouse these basic instincts of the people. He spoke of this, too, on February 22, 1842, at the celebration of the birth date of another great American, George Washington. Among other significant statements in that speech, he had this to say, and I see it as a central point of this talk:

"HAPPY DAY—when all appetites controlled, all poison subdued, all matters subjected—Mind, all conquering—mind shall live and move the monarch of the world, Glorious consummation! Hail, Fall of Fury; Reign of Reason—All Hail."

Yes, he believed, practiced, and taught that sound, sober reasoning should be man's sole arbiter and that right and wrong are not measured by volume or size of print, but by moral principle.

Many students of history are inclined to class Lincoln solely as an American, giving him no international significance. He was an American, of course, in the finest sense of the word, but the very fact that our form of government, still comparatively new in the world, being then only eighty years old, was watched closely by the other nations. Some saw this noble experiment in America as a failure. Many others hoped it would fail—still others connived for its failure. Lincoln knew this. Probably more than any other man he appreciated that this, his government, was on trial. He knew, too, that he was on trial, that the eyes of the world were upon him. Without question he sensed an obligation to posterity. This naturally, then, brought him to a study of foreign affairs—a book could be written on this subject, too. Very briefly, now, let me cite some profound statements of his in this area of government. He gave his first inaugural address, with practically no experience as an administrator, but it must have been after much thought that he had this to say:

"You will not be surprised to learn that, in the peculiar exigencies of the times, our intercourse with foreign nations has been attended with profound solicitude, chiefly turning upon our own domestic affairs." Now listen for a minute. See how modern this seems, which is a continuation of this same speech—"A disloyal portion of the American people have, during the whole year, been engaged in an attempt to divide and destroy the Union." That's being said today, isn't it? He continues, "A nation which endures factious domestic division is exposed to disrespect abroad;"—ny, oh my, how true, isn't it? And then he says "... and one party, if not both, is sure, sooner or later, to invoke foreign

intervention." Take a look at the world and see where this applies. Now he says, and this should apply to us and make us think in our time. "... Nations thus tempted are not always able to resist the counsels of seeming expediency and ungenerous ambition, although measures adopted under such influences seldom fail to be unfortunate and injurious to those adopting them." The study of history shows he had real foreign problems to wrestle with and at the end of the first year he made this observation. My, how true it is. Here he was referring to the South—"... They can scarcely have failed to perceive that the effort for disunion produces the existing difficulty, and that one strong nation promises more durable peace and a more extensive, valuable and reliable commerce than can the same nation broken into hostile fragments." Then he ventured a hope for the Union when he said, "I venture to hope it will appear that we have practiced prudence and liberality toward foreign powers, averting causes of irritation..."—and now listen, listen—"... and with firmness maintaining our own rights and honor." Much more could be said on foreign policy. Time does not permit further discussion. but these I submit are some things for us to think about.

Now, let me talk for a few moments on the characteristics that made him and his greatness appreciated. Many books have been written about these characteristics—almost 3,000 of them, of which I have read but a few. Each is interesting in treating some special facet of his life. Plays have been written, poems published, but none, I believe, portrays him quite as effectively as Edwin Markham does in his poem, "Lincoln, The Man."

May I share it with you.

LINCOLN THE MAN

When the Norn Mother saw the Whirlwind Hour
 Greatening and darkening as it hurried on,
 She left the Heaven of Heroes and came down
 To make a man to meet the mortal need.
 She took the tried clay of the common road—
 Clay warm yet with the genial heat of Earth,
 Dashed through it all a strain of prophecy;
 Tempered the heap with thrill of human tears;
 Then mixed a laughter with the serious stuff.
 Into the shape she breathed a flame to light
 That tender, tragic, ever-changing face.
 Here was a man to hold against the world,
 A man to match the mountains and the sea.

The color of the ground was in him, the red earth;
 The smell and smack of elemental things:
 The rectitude and patience of the cliff;
 The good-will of the rain that loves all leaves;
 The friendly welcome of the wayside well;
 The courage of the bird that dares the sea;
 The gladness of the wind that shakes the corn;

The pity of the snow that hides all scars;
 The secrecy of streams that make their way
 Beneath the mountain to the rifted rock;
 The tolerance and equity of light
 That gives as freely to the shrinking flower
 As to the great oak flaring to the wind—
 To the grave's low hill as to the Matterhorn
 That shoulders out the sky.

Sprung from the West, he drank the veloreous youth
 of a new world,
 The strength of virgin forests braced his mind,
 The hush of spacious prairies stilled his soul.
 Up from log cabin to the Capitol,
 One fire was on his spirit, one resolve—
 To send the keen ax to the root of wrong,
 Clearing a free way for the feet of God.
 And evermore he burned to do his deed
 With the fine stroke and gesture of a king:
 He built the rail-pile as he built the State,
 Pouring his splendid strength through every blow,
 The conscience of him testing every stroke,
 To make his deed the measure of a man.

So came the Captain with the mighty heart;
 And when the judgment thunders split the house,
 Wrenching the rafters from their ancient rest,
 He held the ridgepole up, and spiked again
 The rafters of the Home. He held his place—
 Held the long purpose like a growing tree—
 Held on through blame and faltered not at praise.
 And when he fell in whirlwind, he went down
 As when a lordly cedar, green with boughs,
 Goes down with a great shout upon the hills,
 And leaves a lonesome place against the sky.

—Edwin Markham.

Only an atmosphere of freedom and opportunity can produce a man about whom an author could write such beautiful literature.

Just this night before last when I was again visiting the Ford's Theatre, scene of Lincoln's assassination, these words of Markham were called to my attention: "Lincoln is a greater possession to us than all our battle-ships and a greater safety to us than all our arms." 'Tis true I believe,

Now, in closing, may I review briefly a little-known experience of two Congressmen who served together in 1849—106 years ago. (This account was put into the Congressional Record by George Dondero, Ranking Member of the Public Works Committee and a great Lincoln student.) One of these men was destined to become the President of the United States and one became the Vice President of the Confederacy. You will recall reading in Civil War history of the attempts made by people to put

a stop to the war through negotiations. One such attempt was suggested for February 3, 1865. Lincoln did not agree to go until he found out that Alexander Hamilton Stephens, his personal friend of 16 years past and Vice President of the Confederacy and fellow Congressman, would be one of the commissioners to meet him at the conference. The conference failed, because Lincoln, very justly, would settle for nothing less than a reunion of all states. After the conference, Lincoln, rising above the heated passions of the time, recalled his early friendship with Stephens and asked him if there was some personal favor he could do for him. Stephens replied that he had a nephew who was a prisoner on Johnsons Island in Lake Erie, but his family had heard nothing from him. Could Lincoln find out something about him and get word to him that his people at home were well? The record does not leave us any comment from Lincoln; but it does show us that two days later Lieutenant John Stephens was sent for. He was brought to the President, who was very busy at the time, and who suggested that Lieutenant John spend some time with some friends he knew he had in Washington and return on February 10. On that day, Lincoln gave him a pass to go home and in a note asked that his friend Alexander Hamilton Stephens select and send in exchange an officer of equal rank imprisoned at Richmond whose physical condition required release. Then just before Lieutenant John left, Lincoln pulled a photograph of himself from a shelf, autographed it and said to him, "Suppose you take this along with you. I don't expect there are many of them down South." In May, of '65, young Stephens delivered Lincoln's letter to his uncle. The war was over. Lincoln was in his grave. Alexander Stephens, the Vice President of the Confederacy, had been arrested and taken as a political prisoner to Fort Warren in Boston. Now one of the most touching incidents in all our history is the scene in the cell at Fort Warren on the morning of June 1, 1865. Alexander Stephens is awaiting his fate. This prisoner who opposed secession and loved his Nation made an entry in his diary that morning. "It is the day set apart by President Andrew Johnson decreed as a fast day in memory of Abraham Lincoln. Rose early. As it is fast day and mourning in memory of Mr. Lincoln, I requested Mr. Geary, the Corporal, to bring me from the sutler's nothing but a cup of coffee and rolls." We can almost hear the spirit of Lincoln whispering "This hath he done in remembrance of me".

We, too, I hope have done this in remembrance of him.

Let us then rededicate ourselves to the unfinished and unending task that remains before us, so that this our government of, by and for the people shall not perish. Since we live in an Atomic age which sorely needs the Gospel of love that Lincoln lived so well, let us then remember his admonition and be sure that our attitude is one of "malice toward none and charity for all."

Carl Sandburg has said and I believe, "This is a time for remembering greatness."

UNITED STATES SENATOR HICKENLOOPER

President Elthon, in accordance with Senate Resolution 5 unanimously adopted, announced the arrival in the chamber of the Honorable Bourke B. Hickenlooper, our senior United States Senator, and asked Senators Byers and Dykhouse to escort Senator Hickenlooper to the rostrum.

President Elthon presented Senator Hickenlooper and emphasized the valuable years of service rendered to the state and to the nation by the Senator.

Remarks of Senator Hickenlooper in part:

Thank you, Governor Elthon.

FRIENDS OF THE SENATE AND OF THE STATE OF IOWA: It is always heartwarming to come back to these familiar halls and it is stimulating indeed.

Senator Hickenlooper stated that the United States is a federated country and that we shall remain that way so long as the state retains a fundamental basis of sovereignty; also that we had nothing to fear as far as the disintegration of our system of government was concerned.

Senator Hickenlooper, a member of the Senate atomic energy, foreign relations and agricultural committees, stated that he discounted the statement of Russian Foreign Minister V. M. Molotov last week that Soviet progress in atomic weapons has been so great as to make the United States appear "backward." He was "encouraged" about the prospects of peace although "there is no secure peace in the world today." "When the President submitted a resolution asking the Congress to join him in a declaration of policy, the resolution passed by an overwhelming vote, 409 to 3 in the House and 85 to 5 in the Senate. Communists have very seldom crossed the line when the United States and other free countries have taken a stand and the aggressors know our stand is firm. I have also noted a 'softening' of Chinese Communist policy since this country made its firm stand for the defense of Formosa and the Pescadores islands. The overwhelming Washington view seems to be that the situation now augurs more for peace, and I am more optimistic today than I was a month ago."

The people of Iowa have been good to me and I deeply appreciate it.

Again, let me thank you for the honor of coming back to these familiar halls.

to the duties of the office and who shall be appointed by the Governor subject to the approval thereof by vote of two-thirds of the elected members of the Senate in executive session and shall serve for a term of four years from the 1st day of July of year of appointment and until their successors are appointed and qualified, provided that of the members first appointed the Governor shall designate one of such members to serve a term of two years. The terms of the members of such Commission at the time of the enactment of this law who were elected in the year 1954 shall expire on the 30th day of June, 1957, notwithstanding any provision of law fixing the terms of such members different from the terms described herein, and provided further that the term of the Commerce Commissioner elected in 1952 be and hereby is extended to such 30th day of June, 1957. Each member of the commission shall receive a salary of \$5,300 per year payable in the same manner as the salary of other state officers. Vacancies in the office of the Commission shall be filled by the Governor in the same manner as the original appointments are made the person so appointed to hold his office for the remainder of the term of the officer whom he succeeds.

HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION 11

Whereas, numerous tragedies have been occurring upon the roads and highways of the State of Iowa, including the loss of our late beloved Governor, William S. Beardsley; and

Whereas, it is generally recognized that most of these tragedies could have been avoided through the use of sound judgment, skill, and courtesy; and

Whereas, it is also generally recognized that driver-training courses are designed to improve judgment, develop skill, and encourage the practice of courtesy; and

Whereas, it is believed that the provisioning for driver-training courses in our high schools should be left to the good discretion of local boards of education;

Now, Therefore, Be It Resolved by the House of Representatives, the Senate Concurring, that the Fifty-sixth General Assembly does hereby encourage all high schools in the State of Iowa to provide or to cooperate in providing an appropriate driver-training program for all of their students; and

Be It Further Resolved that this concurrent resolution be referred to the State Board of Public Instruction for appropriate release to the high schools of the State of Iowa.

PRESIDENT: Your committee on tax revision, to which was referred Senate File 18, a bill for an act to amend section four hundred twenty-seven point six (427.6), Code 1954, relating to the filing of claim for military service tax exemption, begs leave to report it has had the same under consideration and recommends the same be amended as follows; and when so amended the bill do pass:

1. Amend Senate File 18 by striking all after the enacting clause and by substituting in lieu thereof the following:

"Section 1. Section four hundred twenty-seven point five (427.5), Code 1954, is hereby amended by striking the word 'county' in line twenty-one (21) and the word 'auditor' in line twenty-two (22) of said

section and inserting in lieu thereof the words 'city or county assessor, as the case may be'. Further amend said section by inserting after the period in line thirty-six (36) thereof the following: 'The assessor shall tabulate and deliver or file said claims with the county auditor, having his recommendations for allowance or disallowance endorsed thereon. In case the owner of the property is in active service in any of the armed forces of the United States or of this state, including the nurses' corps of the state or of the United States, said claim may be executed and delivered or filed by the owner's spouse, parent, child, brother, or sister, or by any person who may represent him under power of attorney.'

Sec. 2. Section four hundred twenty-seven point six (427.6), Code 1954, is hereby amended by inserting a period after the word 'filed' in line five (5) of the first paragraph thereof and by striking the balance of said paragraph. Further amend said section by inserting the word 'only' immediately after the word 'exemption' in line four (4)."

2. Amend the title to Senate File 18 by striking all after the word "Act" and substitute in lieu thereof the following: "relating to the filing of claim for military service tax exemption."

House File 218, a bill for an act to create and establish a state tort claims act; defining terms and conferring upon each state agency in behalf of the state the power to consider, ascertain, adjust, determine and settle claims against the state; providing for the maximum amount of the claim; permitting the state to be sued; conferring jurisdiction in the district court to hear, determine and render judgment; and generally providing for the practice and procedure to establish liability of the state.

Read first and second times, and passed on file.

House File 243, a bill for an act to legalize certain errors and omissions of the county auditor of Lee County, Iowa, to validate and legalize a levy against all property in the City of Fort Madison, Iowa, and to authorize transfer of the funds collected to the general fund of the City of Fort Madison, Iowa.

Read first and second times, and passed on file.

House Joint Resolution 1, a joint resolution proposing an amendment to section one (1), article two (II), of the Constitution of the State of Iowa, relating to the qualification of electors and the age at which qualified citizens shall be entitled to exercise the right of suffrage.

Read first and second times, and passed on file.

House Joint Resolution 2, a joint resolution proposing to repeal sections six (6), thirty-four (34), thirty-five (35) and thirty-six (36), of article three (III), legislative department, of the Constitution of the State of Iowa, and to adopt substitutes for sections six (6), thirty-four (34) and thirty-five (35) thereof, relating to representation in the Senate and House of Representatives and to the classification of Senators.

Read first and second times, and passed on file.

On motion of Senator Dewel, the Senate resolved itself into executive session.

THIRD READING OF BILLS

On motion of Senator Lynes, Senate File 198, a bill for an act relating to the establishment of county agricultural extension districts and to the organization of county agricultural extension councils, to cooperate with the Iowa State College of Agriculture and Mechanics Arts and the United States Department of Agriculture, in conducting educational programs in agriculture, home economics and 4-H club work in the several counties and authorizing the levy of an annual tax therefor and providing for the appointment and supervision of county extension personnel, validating certain acts of county farm bureaus, amending sections one hundred seventy-six point three (176.3) and one hundred seventy-six point seven (176.7), Code 1954, and repealing sections one hundred seventy-six point eight (176.8), one hundred seventy-six point nine (176.9), one hundred seventy-six point ten (176.10), one hundred seventy-six point eleven (176.11), one hundred seventy-six point twelve (176.12), one hundred seventy-six point fifteen (176.15) and one hundred seventy-six point sixteen (176.16), Code 1954, was taken up and considered.

Senator Anderson asked and received unanimous consent to withdraw the following amendment:

Amend Senate File 198 by striking all of section 5 and inserting in lieu thereof the following:

Sec. 5. County agricultural extension council. There shall be elected in each extension district an "extension council" consisting of three members elected at large and one elected resident member from each of the townships. Each township resident member of the extension council shall be a voter residing on a farm and actively engaged in a farming operation or the owner of a farm in this state of not less than ten acres and a resident of the township where elected. Members of the council shall be chosen annually at an election to be held in each township during the period of November 1 to December 31, at a time and places to be determined and fixed by the extension council.

Senator Johnson offered the following amendments filed by Senators Johnson and Anderson:

Amend Senate File 198 as follows:

1. Amend section 5 by adding as a separate paragraph at the end thereof the following: "The members of the extension council elected as above set forth shall, at the first meeting of said council following their election in the year 1955, and during the month of January each year thereafter, elect one member at large to serve on said extension council. The member at large shall qualify for election as above provided, by being a resident qualified voter in the extension district in which he is elected to serve."

2. Amend section 8 by striking the period (.) after the word "years" in line 17 and by substituting in lieu thereof a comma (,), and by adding the words "and the member elected at large, as hereinbefore provided, shall serve for a one-year term."

3. Amend section 8, line 19, by striking the period (.) after the word "term" and adding the words "and no member elected to serve at large shall be eligible for election for more than one successive one-year term."

Senator McFarlane offered the following amendment to the amendment and moved its adoption:

Amend the amendment:

1. By striking the words "one member" in line 7 and inserting in lieu thereof "three members".

2. By inserting after the word "voter" in line 9 the following: "in a city or town".

The amendment to the amendment was adopted.

On motion of Senator Johnson, division 1 of the amendment as amended was adopted.

Senator McFarlane offered the following amendment to the amendment and moved its adoption:

Amend divisions 2 and 3 as follows:

1. By striking the word "member" in line 13 and inserting in lieu thereof the word "members".

2. By striking the word "one" in line 14 and inserting in lieu thereof the word "two".

3. By striking the word "one" in line 19 and inserting in lieu thereof the word "two".

The amendment to the amendment was adopted.

On motion of Senator Johnson, divisions 2 and 3 as amended were adopted.

Senator Anderson offered the following amendment and moved its adoption:

Amend Senate File 198 as follows:

1. Amend section 5, line 9, by adding the letter "s" to the word "voter".

2. Amend subsection (p) of section 10 by adding the following after the word "treasurer" in line one hundred seventeen (117) thereof, "provided however that the unencumbered funds in the county agricultural extension education fund in excess of one-half ($\frac{1}{2}$) the amount expended from said fund in the previous year shall be paid over to the county treasurer who shall transfer such funds to the general fund of the county."

The motion prevailed and the amendment was adopted.

Senator Rigler offered the following amendment:

Amend Senate File 198, section 10, subsection (o) by striking the period (.) in line 113 and substituting a semi-colon (;) therefor, and inserting immediately following the said semi-colon the following: provided however, it shall be unlawful for the county agricultural extension council to lease any office space which is occupied or used by any other farm organization or farm cooperative, and provided further, that it shall not be unlawful for the county agricultural extension council to lease space in a building owned and/or occupied by a farm organization or farm cooperative."

Senator Nolan offered the following amendment to the amendment and moved its adoption:

Amend the amendment by striking all of said amendment after the word "shall" in line 8 and inserting in lieu thereof the following: "be lawful for the county agricultural extension council to lease space for a period to January 1, 1958, in a building occupied by a farm organization or farm cooperative."

The amendment to the amendment was adopted.

On motion of Senator Rigler, the amendment as amended was adopted.

Senator Schroeder offered the following amendment, filed by Senators Schroeder and Shaff, and moved its adoption:

Amend section 12 of Senate File 198 by striking the words "fifteen thousand dollars" from line 14 and inserting in lieu thereof, "twenty thousand dollars".

Division was called for.

The amendment was adopted.

Senator Lynes moved that the bill be read a third time, now which motion prevailed, and the bill was read a third time.

"'Food products' do not include spirituous, malt or vinous liquors, soft drinks, sodas, or beverages such as are ordinarily dispensed at bars and soda fountains or in connection therewith, medicines, tonics, and preparations in liquid, powdered, granular, tablet, capsule, lozenge, and pill form sold as dietary supplements or adjuncts.

"'Food products' also do not include meals served on or off the premises of the retailer or drinks or foods furnished, prepared, or served for consumption at tables, chairs, or counters or from trays, glasses, dishes, or other tableware provided by the retailer.

"'Food products' include milk shakes, malted milks, and any other beverages composed at least in part of milk or a milk product and requiring the use of milk or a milk product in their preparation, which are purchased for consumption off the premises of the retailer."

Further amend Senate File 237, section 5, by striking the words "the following tangible" in line 4, and by striking lines 5 to 14, inclusive, and inserting in lieu thereof the following: "prescription drugs and food products for human consumption. 'Food products' include cereals and cereal products, milk and milk products, oleomargarine, meat and meat products, fish and fish products, eggs and egg products, vegetables and vegetable products, fruit and fruit products, spices and salt, sugar and sugar products other than candy and confectionery, coffee and coffee substitutes, tea, cocoa and cocoa products other than candy and confectionery.

"'Food products' do not include spirituous, malt or vinous liquors, soft drinks, sodas, or beverages such as are ordinarily dispensed at bars and soda fountains or in connection therewith, medicines, tonics, and preparations in liquid, powdered, granular, tablet, capsule, lozenge, and pill form sold as dietary supplements or adjuncts.

"Section 1. Section one hundred twenty-four point two (124.2), Code 1954, is hereby amended by striking from lines two (2) and three (3) of subsection seven (7) the words 'tax commission' and inserting in lieu thereof the words 'permit board'.

"Sec. 2. Section one hundred twenty-four point three (124.3), Code 1954, is hereby amended by inserting following the words 'to revoke' in line seven (7) of the second paragraph the words 'or deny'.

"Section one hundred twenty-four point three (124.3), Code 1954, is hereby further amended by striking from line seventeen (17) of the second paragraph thereof, the word 'in' and inserting in lieu thereof the words 'on the issuance or'.

"Sec. 3. Section one hundred twenty-four point five (124.5), Code 1954, is hereby amended by inserting following the word 'issue' in line five (5) of the third paragraph thereof the words 'or deny'.

"Section one hundred twenty-four point five (124.5), Code 1954, is further amended by inserting following the word 'which' in line eight (8) of the third paragraph thereof the words 'if issued'.

"Section one hundred twenty-four point five (124.5), Code 1954, is further amended by inserting before the word 'of' in the last line of the third paragraph the words 'or denial'.

"Section one hundred twenty-four point five (124.5), Code 1954, is further amended by adding to the third paragraph the following: 'However, the state permit board shall issue said permit unless, in its sole discretion, it finds that said applicant is not of good moral character'.

"Sec. 4. Section one hundred twenty-four point nine (124.9), Code 1954, is hereby amended by striking from the last three lines thereof the words 'chairs filed and hearing had thereon as provided in this chapter' and inserting in lieu thereof the words 'a conviction for violation of any of the provisions of this chapter'.

"Sec. 5. Section one hundred twenty-four point ten (124.10), Code 1954, is hereby amended by striking from lines six (6) and seven (7) of subsection three (3) the words 'upon the faithful observance of this chapter' and inserting in lieu thereof the words 'in the same manner as is provided for bonds in section one hundred twenty-four point nine (124.9), Code 1954'.

"Sec. 6. No person shall sell beer, for consumption off of the premises of the class 'B' or class 'C' permittee making the sale, which is cool at the time of sale as a result of cooling by any means of refrigeration or artificial cooling methods."

The following committee amendment was considered:

Amend the amendment as follows:

1. By striking all of section 1 and inserting in lieu thereof the following: "Section one hundred twenty-four point two (124.2), Code 1954, is hereby amended by adding to subsection seven (7) the following: 'A state permit shall mean an authorization issued by the state beer permit board.'"

2. By striking the following in line 31: “, in its sole discretion.”

3. By adding the following new section:

“Section one hundred twenty-four point twenty-four (124.24), Code 1954, is hereby amended by striking from line twenty-eight (28) the word ‘twenty-five’ and inserting in lieu thereof the word ‘fifty’.”

On motion of Senator Vest, the committee amendment to the amendment was adopted.

Senator Grimstead asked and received unanimous consent to withdraw the amendments filed by him to Senate File 55 and found on pages 112, 119, 163 and 164 of the Senate Journal.

Senator Elijah offered the following amendment, filed by Senators Elijah and Bellman, and moved its adoption:

Whereas, it is believed that the provisioning for driver-training courses in our high schools should be left to the good discretion of local boards of education;

Now, Therefore, Be It Resolved by the House of Representatives, the Senate Concurring, that the Fifty-sixth General Assembly does hereby encourage all high schools in the State of Iowa to provide or to cooperate in providing an appropriate driver-training program for all of their students; and

Be It Further Resolved that this concurrent resolution be referred to the State Board of Public Instruction for appropriate release to the high schools of the State of Iowa.

A concurrent resolution to arrange for the proper observance of the centennial of the Constitution of Iowa in 1957.

Now, Therefore, Be It Resolved by the Senate, the House Concurring: That a special legislative committee be appointed, which committee shall consist of five members of the Senate, to be appointed by the Lieutenant Governor and five members of the House to be appointed by the Speaker of the House.

Be It Further Resolved: That it shall be the duty of the committee to arrange for the proper observance of the centennial of the Constitution

of Iowa while the Fifty-seventh General Assembly is in session, and provide for the publication of such proceedings by the State Historical Society of Iowa.

Senator Schroeder asked and received unanimous consent to take up for consideration Senate File 189, a bill for an act to amend chapter twenty-six (26), Code 1954, relating to census.

On motion of Senator Grimstead, the report of committee recommending passage was taken up, considered, and the report of the committee adopted.

Senator Wormley offered the following amendment and moved its adoption:

Amend Senate File 189 by striking from lines 3 and 4 of section 1 the following: "townships of over one thousand (1,000) population," and inserting in lieu thereof the following: "by townships,".

The amendment was adopted.

Senator Schroeder moved that the bill be read a third time now, which motion prevailed, and the bill was read a third time.

HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION 15

Whereas, the cost of state printing has more than doubled in the last ten years; and

Whereas, for the current biennium this cost has amounted to upwards of \$2,000,000; and

Whereas, much state printing is being done under contracts by various departments without first ascertaining if it can be done in the central printing department by the state; and

Whereas, many departments are printing reports oftener than needed;

Now, Therefore, Be It Resolved by the House, the Senate Concurring, that every state department, board, commission and other agency, the divisions thereof and institutions thereunder are called upon to reduce by twenty-five per cent their demands for printing, that are not required by law, during the ensuing biennium.

HOUSE MESSAGE CONSIDERED

House File 389, a bill for an act relating to salaries of the deputy superintendent of banking and bank examiners.

Read first and second times, and passed on file.

On motion of Senator Dewel, the Senate recessed until 1:30 p.m.

AFTERNOON SESSION

The Senate reconvened, President Elthon presiding.

COMMITTEE FROM THE HOUSE

A committee from the House appeared and announced that the House was ready to receive the Senate in joint convention, in accordance with Senate Concurrent Resolution 14 duly adopted.

The Senate proceeded to the House under the direction of the Sergeant-at-Arms.

JOINT CONVENTION

In accordance with concurrent resolution duly adopted, the joint convention was called to order, President Elthon presiding.

President Elthon announced a quorum present and the joint convention duly organized.

Senator Bellman of Warren moved that a committee of six be appointed to notify the Pioneer Lawmakers that the joint convention was ready to receive them.

President Elthon appointed, on the part of the House, Representatives Dillon of Louisa, Naden of Hamilton and Freed of Webster

President Elthon appointed, on the part of the Senate, Senator Bellman of Warren, Senator Byers of Linn and Senator Walker of Hamilton.

The committee waited upon the Pioneer Lawmakers and escorted them to the well of the House.

President Elthon extended his personal welcome to the Pioneer Lawmakers.

President Elthon presented to the joint convention Senator D. C. Nolan of Johnson who welcomed the Pioneer Lawmakers on behalf of the Senate and offered the following remarks:

MR. PRESIDENT, HONORED GUESTS, MEMBERS OF THE PIONEER LAWMAKERS OF IOWA, FELLOW MEMBERS OF THE FIFTY-SIXTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY, LADIES AND GENTLEMEN:

It is a high honor to be asked to take a small part in this biennial joint convention in honor of the members of the Pioneer Lawmakers of Iowa who are assembled here today.

Seventy years have passed since Senator Norman Boardman of Clinton first suggested that Iowa lawmakers of years past, following the custom of the living members of past Vermont Legislatures, meet in reunion.

As a result of Senator Boardman's suggestion, some 24 former members of the Iowa General Assemblies sent out a call to a meeting, by published notice and letter, of past members of the Iowa Legislature, which meeting was to be held in Des Moines on February 24, 1886.

Such well known men in the annals of Iowa history as Josiah B. Grinnell, Benjamin F. Gue, George G. Wright, Robert S. Finkbine, C. F.

Clarkson, Hoyt Sherman and Charles Aldrich joined in the call. Eighty-seven responded and were present, when the reunion opened at 10:30 a.m. in the old Foster Opera House in downtown Des Moines, on the day assigned.

Following the discussion for a formal permanent organization and a perpetuation of the reunion, the meeting was adjourned with the former Senators going to the Senate and the Representatives to the House, on the hill. Thus was the beginning of your revered association, the Pioneer Lawmakers of Iowa, and your affections for our state and those who served with you in our state are like the rivers of her borders, "flow on to an inseparable union."

The speeches which were made and the reminiscences that were shared at that first historic meeting of your organization were recorded and published for succeeding generations to read and study. These sacred pages of Iowa history reveal the hopes and dreams as well as the doubts and fears of those early lawmakers. Despite the hardships and sufferings of our founding fathers, optimism prevailed in their deliberations. The same basic problems faced them then that faced you in in your days as they do us today—they needed money for schools and roads. Our three state colleges were then long established, as well as most of the institutions under the present-day Board of Control. This Capitol Building had been completed and dedicated and these legislative halls occupied in 1884.

Like our forebears who settled Iowa in the 1840's, when Iowa became a member—state—of the greatest union of free men in the history of mankind, these Pioneer lawmakers were not willing to follow the beaten path, to do what somebody else had done because somebody else had done it, or to think the same thoughts of somebody else. No, they were true pioneers, self-reliant, confident and courageous.

Symbolic of these men, you are their rightful successors. Through your courage, your integrity and intense devotion, you have carried nobly forward the torch of vision and intelligent leadership. It took men richly endowed with the attributes of "faith, hope and charity" to mold and preserve for us a great state as we know Iowa today.

It has truly been said that a country which has no pride in its past, loses all inspiration for its future. The mandates which govern us are not the laws in our statute books, but a higher and better bond—a civilization composed of the consciousness and heart and mind of the people of a former time. It is to you our gratitude is due.

May we of the Fifty-sixth General Assembly ever strive in our deliberations and our work to emulate your spirit and purpose for our beloved state, so that it may be said of us as it can be said of you:

"The architect with pride may view
The edifice his brain has willed;
A grander temple honors you—
The commonwealth you helped to build."

President Elthon presented to the joint convention Representative Clark H. McNeal of Wright County who welcomed the Pio-

near Lawmakers on behalf of the House and offered the following remarks:

LIEUTENANT GOVERNOR ELTHON, MR. SPEAKER, DISTINGUISHED GUESTS,
AND MEMBERS OF THE FIFTY-SIXTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY:

I wish it were possible for me today to set down the proper words to welcome you on this occasion. Normally, I am not at loss for words, but today I find it difficult to bring proper words to the tip of my tongue to honor you today.

Therefore, I have chosen to select from the sage of the writers of the past, the proper phrases befitting this occasion. Thus, I feel on this occasion we should benefit not only those we honor but that we also should take a lesson ourselves, I quote these passages.

The immortal Shakespeare said:

"Their Crowns are in their hearts not on their heads
Not deck'd with diamonds and Indian stones; nor to be seen
Their Crowns are called content
Theirs are Crowns that seldom Kings enjoy."

Surely these men possess such Crowns. They must be crowned with content, for surely they have performed their tasks well.

Oliver Wendell Holmes once stated: "The greatest thing in the world is not so much where we stand, as in what direction we are moving." It is important to take a stand, and these Pioneer Lawmakers did. But more important they gave motion and direction to this great State of Iowa. It is that motion and direction for which we are grateful today. It is our aim that we the present lawmakers will continue to give purpose and direction in all things coming before us.

Thomas Carlyle said: "If there is a harvest ahead, even a distant one, it is poor thrift to be stingy of your seed corn."

Surely these men were not stingy with their seed. They were the hardy stock. We hope that they are satisfied with us who are the harvest of their years, and that we in turn may plant for the harvest ahead. An old proverb states:

"There is nothing noble in being superior to some other man.

The true nobility is in being superior to your previous self."

Without a question, these men became superior only in elevating themselves to higher standards than they possessed the day before.

In a recitation of famous authors it would be amiss for me to cease on this occasion without this quotation from Mark Twain, when he said: "I am an old man and have known many troubles, but most of them never happened."

I presume these noble statesmen here today assembled believed as we believe that the problems then facing them were the most difficult and unmanageable of any problems facing any generation, yet today they would undoubtedly be the first to admit that the problems they presumed to be unconquerable troubles, in the main, never really happened. We need not fear these problems and difficulties, if we face them in a true spirit of democracy and possessed with knowledge.

So today we hallow the memory of those departed from your midst. We honor those of you who visit us here today. We appreciate working

with Pioneer Lawmakers such as the Honorable Gus Kuester, the Honorable Dewey Goode, Senator Byers, Senator McFarlane, and others. We welcome you, the Pioneer Lawmakers of Iowa, each and every one. May God bless you all.

President Elthon presented to the joint convention Senator Arch W. McFarlane of Black Hawk who addressed the joint convention as follows:

MR. PRESIDENT, MR. SPEAKER, MEMBERS OF THE JOINT CONVENTION AND FRIENDS:

Before I enter upon my prepared speech, I am very pleased to have the honor of performing a very pleasant duty. At our Pioneer Lawmakers meeting this morning, C. C. Clifton of the Des Moines Register who has been covering the legislature for almost forty years was unanimously elected as an honorary member of the Pioneer Lawmakers Association. The thought among those gathered was that Mr. Clifton has been very instrumental in assisting in the passage of good legislation and helping to defeat poor legislation. His service to the State of Iowa is equal in many instances to many of the lawmakers, and it is my privilege and pleasure today at this joint convention to inform Mr. Clifton that he was unanimously elected as an honorary member of our association.

It is with a great deal of pleasure that I say to you that I appreciate the kind words that have been given by those that were chosen to give the addresses of welcome, both by the members of the Senate and House and to our presiding officer. I further wish to express my very great appreciation for the privilege of appearing before this joint convention and the members of the Pioneer Lawmakers Association and invited guests.

Forty years ago I first entered this Assembly as a young man in the Thirty-sixth General Assembly. There were many outstanding men, members of both the House and the Senate, of which I should just like to enumerate only a few. In the Senate there were Wallace H. Arney, Joseph H. Allen, Nicholas Balkema, Justin R. Doran, John T. Clarkson, Leslie E. Francis, Joseph R. Frailey, Fred P. Hagemann, Clem F. Kimball, Guy M. Gillette, Frederick Larrabee, Addison M. Parker, Robert Quigley, Eli C. Perkins and Chester W. Whitmore and in the House were William I. Atkinson, Joseph H. Anderson, Justin Barry, Henry Brady, Lee W. Elwood, William N. Gilbert, Ross C. Gray, Thomas F. Griffin, Allan J. Kane, David W. Kimberly, William F. Kopp, Peter J. Klinker, David Mackey, Rube McFerren and Milton B. Pitt, and many others. Then in the next session came others of like importance and excellent ability. In the Senate were W. T. Evans, Perry Holdoegel, W. G. Haskell, Byron Newberry, Ed M. Smith, A. V. Proudfoot and A. L. Rule and across the hall in the House were John H. Darrah, S. W. Klaus, Ira W. Jones, John N. Slosson, J. O. Shaff, C. B. Santee, Stanley R. Smith, W. A. Mooty and, last but not least, James B. Weaver. These were all outstanding men.

I am calling these names to your attention because they are so familiar

and they were untiring workers and gave the people their best so that we who follow them should profit by their labors. These members had many complications in those days and it seemed to those of that time that they were almost insurmountable, yet, they went at their labors in the same manner and with the same enthusiasm that the members of the legislature do today. It was only through their hard work and human understanding that they were able to accomplish the great things that were accomplished following out the foundation which was laid by the generation before that and leaving a more solid foundation for those that were to follow:

It happens that I have the privilege of serving today as a member of the General Assembly in companionship with four members of the House who are sons of pioneer legislators who served with me a good generation ago and that I also have the privilege of associating in the Senate with the son and a nephew of former colleagues of mine of many years ago. I make these comments because I wish to emphasize that the Iowa General Assembly is a continuing body; that it has its traditions of service which are being carried on from generation to generation by men of the same type and of the same breeding and lineage of the law-makers of the past.

We have established in Iowa a state and local system of government which, in the very nature of things, has its faults, but which I would not exchange for that of any state of the Union.

Iowa has good government, and the laws we have passed help keep it so. Iowa has good schools, established under the laws we have passed, and our successors will make them better schools.

We have set up a judiciary under which the protection of our laws is guaranteed to all, and whose integrity has never been questioned. We have established protection for our poor, our widows and our orphans. We have safe working conditions for the employees in our industries; we have shown due regard for our problems of sanitation and public health.

I myself have seen our road systems pass from paths into highways, here again we have laid the foundation for things to come.

I do not need to tell you that I am very grateful for this privilege but my duty here today is to introduce the speaker of the afternoon and I do not need to tell you that I appreciate this honor.

I do not need to mention him by name for he is known to all of you. He is probably the most distinguished public figure which Iowa has produced during the last generation of its history. His span of life is a long one, his memory is carried back to the days when northern Iowa was a relatively sparsely settled community, when the covered wagon was still a familiar sight and when the plowshares turned up buffalo horns when they broke the virgin soil.

He served his county ably as county attorney and then took his place in the halls of Congress, first as a representative and then, for two terms, as United States Senator. He was a pioneer in our national program for the recognition of agriculture. He probably has done more than any man living or dead to impress upon the national consciousness the importance of agriculture in our public economy.

It was he, more than any other man, that brought about recognition of the fact that without a prosperous agriculture, the nation cannot develop any very true prosperity. He gained recognition as an outstanding statesman and his abilities were recognized by substantial support in two Republican national conventions for the office of the presidency of the United States.

After his service in Congress he returned to his native state to immediately receive recognition as one of the outstanding attorneys of his day, a distinction which he still holds as an active practitioner in the City of Des Moines.

I refer, of course, to the Honorable Lester J. Dickinson, whom I proudly introduce to you.

Senator Arch W. McFarlane presented to the joint convention the Honorable L. J. Dickinson, former Congressman and United States Senator from Iowa, who addressed the joint convention as follows:

MR. CHAIRMAN, MEMBERS OF THE SENATE, AND OF THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES, MEMBERS OF THE PIONEER LAW SOCIETY, AND GUESTS:

I am not sure that I belong in this Association for the reason that I never served in the legislature of Iowa. I never served in the House or the Senate of Iowa, but I have had a lot of fun teasing the boys as to what they ought to do and I want to say to you that the legislative program is a program in which you will be called everything except a worthy servant.

If you are in politics, cultivate a thick hide; if you don't, you will feel that somebody is taking a pot shot at you that you don't deserve, but after you have been through it for time after time, you will find people like you even if they say things you don't like to have them say. In politics you will find a lot of people who are associated with our higher groups will say "he is a politician". Be a politician. If we don't develop more politics and politicians in the United States, we will have a serious situation here because too many people are paying too little attention to what their duties are as American citizens.

I am glad to see a group of worthwhile people carrying on the duties of the legislature in Iowa. I don't care whether you have annual or semi-annual sessions. I often stated in Congress that I thought we would be better off if we didn't pass too many bills. I want to say this, that the thing the American people want to do is to get more interested in politics and less interested in some other things. I hate to hear a fellow say: "I don't want to put a school man in my school district." Well, I say to him, "Did you vote?" "No," he says, "I didn't have time." What chance, I ask you, is there of things going right if we neglect our duty to do the thing we ought to do. Why complain if you don't like what is done?

I have talked to many legislatures and legislative bodies, but I have never talked to the Iowa legislature before. My days on this earth are numbered. Arch McFarlane talked about most of the boys I knew and knew well for many years, and I will say to you frankly, and I be-

lieve that Arch will bear me out on this, it is easier to make a living in private life than it is in politics. Lots easier. There are a lot of people who think that legislative service is just a big vacation. I tell you any man who comes down here and spends his time, or any woman, will lose more than he or she could possibly draw out of the state treasury of Iowa as compensation for their services. I know.

Most important is to have men here who are good men. I am glad to see the younger fellows here. Somebody has got to move in in the place of the old fellows who are getting lame and tired and losing their heart. We, you and I, believe in development. Red Barber on the General Electric program that you listen to says that 'progress is our most important product'. A lot of us folks are old enough to sit around and listen to that philosophy. I like to think that progress is the most important thing in the State of Iowa, and I like to think, too, that we have made plenty of progress. I think the men in this room have helped that progress with your vitality and enterprise.

I remember once visiting with an old friend in Texas. They had had five drouth years in Texas. I said to him, what in the world can you do in Texas, if we had had five drouth years in Iowa, I don't know what we could do. And he said to me: You can't do much to Texas that a few good oil wells won't cure!

Here in Iowa we don't have oil wells, but we do have farming. Why they limited the acreage you could plant to corn, so what did they do? They planted the rows of corn closer together. They used more fertilizer to the acre. They grew more bushels to the acre. Now where they used to grow 30 bushels to the acre they are not satisfied with less than 70 bushels to the acre, so they have just as much corn to the acre. In other words, Texas furnishes us gasoline and we furnish the corn to feed the steers. A fair exchange—corn to feed the Texas steers and gasoline for us in Iowa. That is the thing that Iowa is doing all the while. I can remember the time when we used to have these prophets of gloom who said that people will be starving, we can't grow enough crops, there isn't going to be food enough to feed them all. They never thought in those days that the Iowa farmer would narrow his rows of corn and use more fertilizer. I guess before we are through we will make 100 bushels to the acre a standard crop, and we are going in the right direction.

Legislation is a peculiar thing. There is always somebody that wants something. I read not long ago something about having a legislature of lobbyists in Des Moines. Now I believe in lobbyists because a lobbyist has got his story learned and will tell it to you and you can believe it or not or get the other side, and that way you get the information you need to get, to make an intelligent decision. The way the thing is publicized you would think a lobbyist is a cruel creature when as a matter of fact he is one of the best friends the legislator can have. Now I have been up against real lobbyists.

The next thing, it isn't good to have too much legislation. We have an old system of checks and balances. We should have two houses on this account. I don't want to see them pass any law for unicameral legislation like they have in Nebraska. It's narrowed down to a single house

in Nebraska where the fellows carry on year after year and they get in certain channels and get fixed in certain lines. I am a believer in two houses. They are not too large in Iowa. Why? Because over here is one section of Iowa that has some one thing it wants. Over here is another section of Iowa that has something it wants. When you get together, you have a substantial program that is shown by the record of your legislature. It has shown that it is for the best interests of Iowa that you have this interplay of wants. Perhaps you say I don't know whether or not we should have a toll road. Oh yes, you say, they are nice in Pennsylvania, but I don't know if it would be profitable in Iowa. But if I was in the legislature I would spend a little midnight oil studying whether it would be for the best interests of Iowa or not. A lot of you people here can remember the old mud road fight. It was a sizzler. A lot of you can remember the days of the expansion of the capitol grounds, when that issue almost defeated Governor Clarke. It was that discussion which emphasized it and made it one of the real problems of Iowa, and it was decided in the right way, and it was a good way. A lot of you legislators here are too young to remember those things. I can see some of you though that can remember as far back as I can. Our legislatures have always done a good job.

On our taxes now. Sure we are approaching a system where a lot of people will retire when they get to be sixty-five years old. I won't have to work if I don't want to. I am not so sure we ought to quit at sixty-five. I am older than that now, and I still like to work. If you don't believe it, I open the office every morning a little after eight before the younger fellows get there. Of course I get up in the morning, that helps some. Then I go home right after 3:30 or 4 o'clock, and let them work! Divides things up the way they ought to be divided up.

I don't know what we ought to do with reference to our schools. I wouldn't try to suggest anything to this body, but I do believe that Iowa with the least illiteracy of any state in the union has been doing a good thing so far as our schools are concerned. I think we will continue to do so. There is one thing I do dislike about our school system. We educate good men who immediately move some place else and take a bigger job at a bigger salary than we can furnish to them in this state. But nevertheless all of these things help make Iowa, the manhood and womanhood of Iowa, the wonderful thing that it is. The thing that I think is the most important, is that whatever Iowa does, let's see that it is for the progress of Iowa that we take these steps. Let's make it forward not backward. I don't recall that Iowa has ever had to repeal many laws, in other words, most of our legislation has stood the test of time, and has weathered the storm, so there is one of the things that is assurance that what you do is for the best interests of Iowa. Of course, there are those fellows who will dispute this!

I don't know how far you ought to raise taxes. With everybody asking for more out of the government and saying that the government ought to do more for them, then somebody has to raise more money, but it means the people like it. Why I can recall when the federal government only owed about four billion dollars, now it owes 227 billion! They were just as careless with their change as I was! In other words, we cannot

keep on going, expecting that the government is going to furnish us the things we need, when we ought to be able to put our own initiative in it and work it out for ourselves. Any time you have an additional dependent resting on the dole, you have one more problem for the taxpayers of your state.

I have no particular ideas that I want to suggest to you. I have often wondered how things work as they do. I have seen eighteen year old boys that never thought they would be as dumb as they thought their fathers were. When they got older, they found these things got deeper and deeper, and they had to find a way to solve them. Let's make ourselves independent of government resources if we can, and work out our problems under this private enterprise system we are all so proud of in this country.

You will find wherever you go, whatever you do, there are noble leaders. There are souls that are good and true, and if you give to the world the best that you have, the best will come back to you. For life is just the king and the slave, it is just what you are and do, and if you give to the world the best that you have, the best will come back to you.

It is a real pleasure to appear before this body. Arch McFarlane gave me twenty minutes. I said I would only take twelve minutes. Actually I will only take ten minutes.

I remember men making long speeches, and the fellow that followed them made a short speech and was appreciated more. I am glad to meet this wonderful group. I believe in politics. I believe in the young men and the young women being in politics. Say that is a compliment to me!

I will do the best I can to keep this government carrying on with the two party system. One more suggestion along that line. I always hate to hear a hardheaded business man say I am going to vote for the man. I don't care about the party. In other words he is putting his individual judgment against all the best thought in his party, and he thinks he knows more about how to run the government than a political party that is working on the job every day.

I don't believe anyone ever changed my Republicanism. I never thought I should be on an independent basis. I thought it should be in in the party, in the organization. I have dealt with the Democrats a lot. I had a lot of friends among the Democrats. They often wanted to trade favors with me and I wanted to also. We worked together. You think you can get along with the other fellow, but you know what counts? It's when they call the roll and you have ten more votes than the other side!

I just wanted to make a few friendly suggestions which come from an old fellow plodding along, practicing law, enjoying my life practicing law with the young fellows, but I enjoyed public service too. I believe in public life, in public service if you are qualified for it, and I believe you can do a real service. Don't shrink from assuming responsibility as a public servant, but help carry on the problems of your state and the problems of your nation.

Good luck and goodbye!

The minutes of the joint convention were read and approved.

Senator Byers of Linn moved that the joint convention be now dissolved.

Motion prevailed.

The Senate returned to the Senate chamber and resumed regular session.

PRESENTATION OF VISITOR

Senator Bellman asked and received unanimous consent to present to the Senate the Honorable Henry J. Grunewald, Blainstown, Benton County, a former member of the Senate, who was present in the Senate chamber.

EXPLANATION OF VOTE ON SENATE FILE 417

Pursuant to Article III, section 10, of the Constitution of the State of Iowa, I wish to state that my vote on Senate File 417 (a bill to impose an additional tax by way of sales on beer and cigarettes) was "NO" for the reason that no taxes in any form or of any kind should be raised until the Senate has definite and final information on what economies in state government have been effected and, therefore, what state appropriations are necessary.

REPORTS OF COMMITTEE

Senator Watson of O'Brien submitted the following report:

MR. quirements and standards greater than said minimum standards of the building code, may retain said requirements and standards. A copy of any such ordinance shall be filed with the Iowa building code council sixty days before the same becomes effective."

HOUSE AMENDMENTS TO SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION 7

point seventeen (223.17), a patient in these hospitals or the persons legally bound for the support of said patients or the persons against whom a lien is imposed under the provisions of this chapter may file a petition with the clerk of the district court of the county of the legal settlement of said patient, alleging that said patient is unable to support himself and that the persons legally bound for his support or against whom a lien is imposed are financially unable to support said patient and that the lien would impose undue hardship upon said patient and said persons.

'Upon the filing of the petition the court or judge shall order said matter set for hearing and shall prescribe a notice to be given to said county and to the State of Iowa at least ten (10) days before the date of said hearing.

'Upon final hearing the court shall either

1. dismiss said petition or
2. grant the relief demanded in said petition and enter an order and decree finding that said patient and said persons legally liable for his support and against whom said lien is imposed are not financially able to support said patient and decreeing that their property will not be subject to said lien, or
3. enter an order and decree determining the amount that should be contributed to the support of said patient by said person or the amount that should be paid by said patient and the amount that should be imposed as a lien thereafter on the property of said patient and said persons.

'At any time within one year after the entry of the order and decree of court either the patient or those liable for his support or those against whom the lien was imposed or the county may petition the court for a rehearing upon the question of the support of said patient upon an allegation made that the circumstances have materially changed affecting the support of said patient, since the date of the last order and decree. Thereupon the court shall set said matter for rehearing in accordance with the procedure set forth above, as pertains to the original hearing.

'Upon request made by the petitioner or petitioners, said hearing or said rehearing shall be conducted before the court or judge as a private or closed hearing.'

Senator Elwood asked and received unanimous consent to withdraw the following amendment:

Amend Senate File 113 by striking all of section 2 thereof, and renumbering the remaining section.

Any distributor, retail dealer, or person failing to keep posted the placard required by this section, or who sells any motor vehicle fuel with octane rating lower than that posted on the pump or container from which it was delivered shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction shall be punished by a fine of not to exceed one hundred dollars or imprisonment in the county jail not to exceed thirty days."

I cannot tell you my exact age, for no one knows just when I was born. First, I was an attitude in the minds, a gleam in the eyes, a hope in the hearts of men, who sought a new way of life, free from the oppression of a tyrannical ruler, by "divine right." These men were my fathers.

These men brought me when I was still but an idea with them to found a new land. The land was called America. It is my land—the land of Democracy. It was here that my life began. America and I grew up together.

My fathers loved me. They developed me, nursed me, and even fought a war, that I might live and continue to grow. The torment and anguish which my fathers endured for me, left its permanent mark on my history. Guns roared, armies battled, and fires raged through my land, taking an immense toll of blood and human life. But I live, experiencing myself and bringing to my people a richer and fuller life! For, from out of the blood which my fathers shed for me, emerged the greatest document ever conceived in the mind of man—the Constitution, which gave substance to the ringing declaration . . . "that all men are created equal, and that they are endowed by their Creator with certain inalienable rights, that among these are life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness."

My horizons widened. Countless people, imbued with the ideals of freedom, braved the wilderness, fought the Indians, endured hardships and death, and all for the sake of me—Democracy.

However, there continued to be threats to my security. My history has been blackened by a succession of wars. From the struggle for the emancipation of slaves and the preservation of my union, to the "blood-bath" of World War I. I emerged triumphant from all these trials, but my people failed to acknowledge the opportunity that fate had laid in their hands. They looked to idealistic remedies to guarantee peace to man forever.

The result was the rise of Hitlerism, and ultimately, World War II. Now it is Communism, and the cold war.

But I have learned through bitter experience. I have grown from my infancy, to take my rightful place as leader of a troubled world. I have seen and assumed my duties. May I remind you of a few of my accomplishments?—the Marshall plan, food trains, the Point 4 program, the Berlin air lift, and military aid to Greece.

I have grown—until now I am adult. But I shall never become aged as long as my people continue to value the principles for which I stand. As the minds of men gave birth to a great idea, so has this idea given birth to certain of my principles.

Election of public officials by all the people is one of these principles. Others are our public school system, the four freedoms, representative taxation, racial equality—countless proofs of my greatness. This has been my past. But what about my future?

It has been said that my greatest enemy is indifference on the part of my people. We have seen that neglect of their duties and obligations led my people into the second World War. Citizens of America, don't let this happen again!

Speak, act, and think Democracy. Live it. Breathe it. Support it. Defend it and believe in it! But above all, do not take it for granted. Don't become careless to the point that you lose your most precious heritage. A great American patriot once said that I am the last, best hope of the earth. But who am I? What kind of a power am I that I am the hope of the world?

I am Democracy. I am the power of the people.

Senator Wormley asked and received unanimous consent to withdraw the amendment to Senate File 398, filed by him, and found on page 776 of the Senate Journal.

Senator Johnson offered the following amendment, filed by Senators Lynes, Johnson and Dailey:

Amend Senate File 398 by striking all after the enacting clause and inserting in lieu thereof the following:

"Section 1. Amend section one hundred ninety-two point ten (192.10), 1954 Code of Iowa, subsection three (3), by striking all of lines nineteen (19) through thirty-four (34) inclusive and inserting in lieu thereof the following:

"The secretary of agriculture shall, on or before July 4, 1956, make needed regulations to promulgate production, processing and distribution standards for grade "A" pasteurized, pasteurized (grade not declared) and grade "A" raw milk which shall conform to United States Public Health Service Recommended Milk Ordinance and Code, 1953 Edition. Nothing contained in this chapter shall invalidate ordinances or regulations of any municipal corporation providing inspections or imposing requirements higher than the minimum requirements provided in this chapter, provided, however, that no such municipal ordinance or regulation shall impose standards in conflict with those imposed

by said United States Public Health Service Recommended Milk Ordinance and Code, 1953 Edition.

Nothing in this section shall be construed to mean compulsory grading of milk: such grades shall apply only to pasteurized and raw milk on which the grade is declared on the label. The state department of health, after July 4, 1956, shall annually survey and certify all milk labeled grade "A" pasteurized, and grade "A" raw, and, in the event a survey shows that the requirements for the production, processing and distribution of such grades are not being complied with, the fact thereof shall be certified by the state department of health to the secretary of agriculture, who shall withdraw the grade declared on the label.

Sec. 2. Amend section three hundred sixty-eight point twenty-five (368.25), 1954 Code of Iowa, by striking the words 'state law' from line thirteen (13) and inserting in lieu thereof, 'United States Public Health Service Recommended Milk Ordinance and Code, 1953 Edition'."

On motion of Senator Lynes, the amendment was adopted.

Senator Dailey offered the following amendment and moved its adoption:

Amend the title to Senate File 398, by striking all after the word "Act" and inserting in lieu thereof the following: "relating to the authority of the secretary of agriculture to promulgate regulations affecting milk for human consumption; relating to the authorities of cities and towns to provide for inspection of milk and milk products sold for human consumption; relating to the grading of milk and providing that the state department of health survey and certify milk; and providing for the withdrawal of graded milk by the secretary of agriculture."

Now, Therefore, Be It Resolved by the Senate, the House Concurring: That the General Assembly of the State of Iowa approves and recommends to the Eighty-fourth Congress of the United States of America the adoption of an appropriate amendment to the United States Constitution in principal as now set forth in Senate Joint Resolution 1, Senate of the United States of America, entitled "The Bricker Amendment".

Be It Further Resolved: That the Secretary of the Senate be hereby directed to transmit certified copies of this concurrent resolution to the president of the United States, to the presiding officers of the Congress of the United States and to each Senator and Representative from Iowa in the Congress of the United States.

President pro tempore Watson of Pottawattamie took the chair at 2:10 p.m.

Senator Rigler moved that Senate Concurrent Resolution 8 be laid on the table.

He shall devote the necessary time to the duties of his office and his salary shall not exceed seventy-five hundred dollars (\$7,500) per year.

Sec. 2. Vacancies in the office of director of legislative research shall be filled in the same manner as original appointment and shall be for the unexpired balance of the term.

Sec. 3. The director shall employ necessary assistants at such salaries as shall be approved by the budget and financial control committee.

Sec. 4. The legislative research bureau shall be at the seat of government and office space, supplies and equipment shall be furnished by the executive council and all salaries and expenses are to be paid by the budget and financial control committee from the contingent fund provided for the budget and financial control committee.

Sec. 5. The legislative research bureau shall cooperate with all members of the legislature and all committees approved by the legislature, and its specific duties shall be as follows:

1. It shall serve as a research agency for any legislative committee.

2. It shall make research studies and limited preliminary reports of factual material on such state governmental problems as may be deemed advisable by any member of the General Assembly during legislative sessions and in the interim between sessions. All such research studies shall be confined to state governmental problems.

3. It shall serve as a bill drafting agency available to all members of the General Assembly and during legislative sessions shall cooperate with any other bill drafting service provided by said session.

4. All factual material and research findings requested shall be made available to the members of the legislature without recommendation. It shall be unlawful for the legislative research bureau to make recommendations.

Sec. 6. This act being deemed of immediate importance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage and publication in The Daily Reporter, a newspaper published at Sioux City, Iowa, and in The Diagonal Reporter, a newspaper published at Diagonal, Iowa."

Senator Watson of Pottawattamie offered the following amendment to the amendment and moved its adoption:

Amend line 3, division 2, of section 5 of the amendment by striking the words "deemed advisable by any member" and inserting in lieu thereof the words "petitioned by five (5) or more members".

HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION 20

Whereas, the United States Supreme Court in an opinion written in the case of Kern-Limerick, Inc. v. Scurlock, 347 U. S. 110, has held that a contractor with a federal agency can be constituted a federal purchasing agent in the absence of a federal act prohibiting this, and thereby the contractor's purchases and use of tangible personal property are immunized from state taxation; and

Whereas, under the rule established by this opinion practically any activity engaged in by a private contractor on behalf of a federal agency can be immunized from any state taxation by appropriate contract phraseology, resulting in serious interference with state and local powers of taxation contrary to the established policy of Congress and the expressed will of the executive branch of the federal government; and

Whereas, no additional rights of taxation are sought on behalf of the states, only the restoration and the preservation of these rights which existed prior to the pronouncement of the rule here complained of; and

Whereas, if there is to be any withdrawal from the sovereign states of the Union of any portion of their power to tax government contractors

there should be an equal withdrawal from the federal government of its power to tax state employees and contractors, to the end that the power to tax shall remain in balance;

Now, Therefore, Be It Resolved by the House of the Fifty-sixth General Assembly of the State of Iowa, the Senate Concurring, that the General Assembly respectfully memorializes the Congress of the United States to enact as speedily as possible legislation which will secure and make certain to the states of the Union the power and right to levy and collect any nondiscriminatory privilege tax upon any privilege exercised under the protection and authority of the law of any state of the Union, except such taxes the direct incidence of which would be upon the United States.

SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION 26

"Whereas, the Committee on Federal Aid to Agriculture, a subcommittee of the President's Commission on Intergovernmental Relations, has reportedly recommended to the Commission the transfer of the function of soil-conservation technical assistance to the various states; and

"Whereas, the National Association of Soil Conservation districts in the United States, and the Iowa Association of Soil Conservation Districts, representing 100 soil-conservation districts in this state, along with other individuals, groups, and organizations who are vitally interested in the program, are opposed to the reported recommendation; and

"Whereas, if the reported recommendation is approved it would place an inordinately heavy financial burden upon the State of Iowa, since the contemplated state appropriation each biennium could amount to a sum in excess of \$1 million if assistance to local soil-conservation districts is to be maintained at current levels; and

"Whereas, such program would greatly retard, if not eventually destroy, the national program of soil and water conservation now being carried on, and since the problem is national in scope, it should be dealt with accordingly;

Now, Therefore, Be It Resolved by the Senate of the State of Iowa (the House of Representatives Concurring therein), that the President of the United States and the President's Commission on Intergovernmental Relations are hereby respectfully memorialized and urged not to approve the reported recommendations of the Committee on Federal Aid to Agriculture, relative to gradual transfer of soil-conservation technical assistance functions from the national authority to the various states;

"Be It Further Resolved, that copies of this resolution be forwarded forthwith to the President of the United States, to the Chairman of the President's Commission on Intergovernmental Relations, and to the Senators and Representatives of the State of Iowa in the Nation's Capital."

140 Sec. 11. No license shall be issued to any club whose
141 manager holds office except by appointment by the board of
142 directors of the club, nor if such manager receives any
143 compensation other than a fixed salary in no way contingent upon
144 the receipts or profits of the club. The license of any club

145 which violates the provisions of this section shall be revoked.

146 Sec. 12. No license shall be issued to any club which does
147 not keep accurate and complete books and records of all receipts
148 and disbursements, and in the event a license issued to any
149 club which hereafter fails or neglects to keep such books and
150 records, such license shall be revoked.

151 Sec. 13. No license shall be issued to any club which has
152 not been in existence for a period of five (5) years.

153 Sec. 14. The fee for a license issued by any city or town
154 or board of supervisors under this Act shall be one thousand five
155 hundred dollars (\$1,500.00) per annum, which fee shall be payable
156 five hundred dollars (\$500.00) to the commission, which shall credit
157 the same to the "liquor control act fund", and one thousand
158 dollars (\$1,000.00) to the general fund of the city, town or county
159 issuing the license.

160 Sec. 15. If four (4) or more counties have voted to issue
161 licenses under the provisions of this Act, the commission may
162 issue to any dining-car company, sleeping-car company, railroad
163 company or railway company a license which shall authorize the
164 holder thereof to keep for sale and sell on any dining car,
165 sleeping-car, buffet car or observation car on any train
166 operated by such applicant from a point outside the state
167 of Iowa into or across the state, or from a point in the
168 state of Iowa to a point outside the state, wine and spirits
169 at retail for consumption in such cars. The application for
170 such license shall be in such form and contain such information
171 as may be required by the commission. Each such license shall
172 be good throughout the state as a state license. Only one (1)
173 such license shall be required for all cars operated in this
174 state by such applicant, but a duplicate of such license shall

209 Sec. 18. In the event, after issuance of a liquor license, it
210 is found that the application therefor contained any false
211 statement, such license shall be revoked.

212 Sec. 19. Upon filing of the application, the issuing
213 authority shall fix a date for hearing thereon, which shall not be
214 earlier than fifteen (15) days from the filing of such application,
215 and shall give at least ten (10) days public notice of the time
216 and place of such hearing by publication in a newspaper in the city
217 or town. If no newspaper is published in said city or town, then
218 in some newspaper of general circulation published in the county
219 in which the city or town is located.

220 Sec. 20. The application shall be filed with issuing
221 authority accompanied by a bond in the penal sum of five thousand
222 dollars (\$5,000.00) providing for a forfeiture thereof in the
223 event of a revocation of the license resulting from a violation of
224 any of the liquor or gambling laws of the State of Iowa, the
225 provisions of this Act, or any rule or regulation issued

289 or spirits from the licensed premises where purchased before
290 drinking the same. The licensee shall conduct the business in a
291 quiet, orderly manner. No minor, intoxicated or interdicted
292 person shall knowingly be permitted to purchase, consume or
293 remove any wine or spirits on or from the licensee's premises.

294 5. No licensee shall carry on the business of selling wine

295 or spirits unless his license is prominently displayed in the
296 place of business.

297 6. No license shall be assigned or transferred.

298 7. Premises, other than the dining-room of a hotel, shall
299 afford a clear and unobstructed view into the interior of the
300 place where the wines and spirits are sold.

301 8. Wines and spirits purchased from the commission for re-sale
302 shall contain not less than eleven (11) per cent of alcohol by volume.

303 Sec. 28. The issuing authority shall make an investigation
304 of any alleged violation for the purpose of revoking any license
305 if there is reasonable evidence that the holder thereof shall
306 have violated any of the provisions of this Act or of any
307 applicable ordinance, rule or regulation.

308 Sec. 29. It shall be the duty of all peace officers to
309 investigate any alleged violations of the provisions of this Act.

310 Sec. 30. Any citizen of a city or town or county having
311 information of any violation by the holder of a license in such
312 city, town or county may, and any peace officer having such
313 information shall, file a complaint with the appropriate issuing
314 authority. A copy of such complaint shall be filed with the
315 county attorney who shall thereupon cause an investigation to be
316 made and report his findings thereof to the appropriate issuing
317 authority.

318 Sec. 31. The mere revocation of a license by the commission
319 shall not be a bar to any criminal prosecution, nor shall such
320 proceedings affect the right of a city or town or board of
321 supervisors to proceed against the bond of a licensee for
322 nonpayment of any taxes or license fees owed under the provisions
323 of this Act.

324 Sec. 32. In the event that the result of a special election
325 as hereinabove provided is favorable to the issuing of licenses
326 for retail sales of spirits and liquor, no other special election
327 on the proposition may be held for a period of four (4) years.
328 Such special election may be called if a petition shall
329 be signed by the electors of the county in such number as shall
330 equal twenty-five per cent (25%) of the votes cast in such county

344 this Act or who makes a false statement concerning a material

345 fact in submitting an application for a license or for a renewal
 346 of a license, or gives false testimony at any hearing concerning
 347 the revocation of a license shall be punishable by a fine of not
 348 less than three hundred dollars (\$300.00) and not more than
 349 one thousand dollars (\$1,000.00), or by imprisonment in the county
 350 jail for not less than three (3) months nor more than one (1)
 351 year, or by both such fine and imprisonment.

Senator Lucas raised a point of order on the amendment for the reason that it is neither germane nor proper inasmuch that it introduces an entirely new subject, one that has already been defeated in the House and would needlessly take up the time of the Senate in these late days of the session, and that the revenue produced is only incidental to the subject matter.

The Chair requested that the Senate stand at ease until the fall of the gavel for the purpose of studying the ruling on the point of order raised by Senator Lucas.

The Senate reconvened, President Elthon presiding.

President Elthon stated that he was in doubt and ruled, in accordance with Rule 21, on page 78 of Robert's Rules of Order Revised, to submit the question to the Assembly.

The Chair further stated that, if the amendment was declared germane, therefore, in accordance with Rule 33, page 144 of Robert's Rules of Order Revised, which declares that an amendment may be in conflict with the spirit of the original bill and still be in order if it is germane, the question then is "Is the amendment germane to the main bill?"

On motion of Senator Dewel, the Senate recessed until 1:45 p.m.

Senator Walter called up the following resolution and moved its adoption :

HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION 20

Whereas, the United States Supreme Court in an opinion written in the case of Kern-Limerick, Inc. v. Scurlock, 347 U. S. 110, has held that a contractor with a federal agency can be constituted a federal purchasing agent in the absence of a federal act prohibiting this, and thereby the contractor's purchases and use of tangible personal property are immunized from state taxation; and

Whereas, under the rule established by this opinion practically any activity engaged in by a private contractor on behalf of a federal agency can be immunized from any state taxation by appropriate contract phraseology, resulting in serious interference with state and local powers of taxation contrary to the established policy of Congress and the expressed will of the executive branch of the federal government; and

Whereas, no additional rights of taxation are sought on behalf of the states, only the restoration and the preservation of these rights which

existed prior to the pronouncement of the rule here complained of; and

Whereas, if there is to be any withdrawal from the sovereign states of the Union of any portion of their power to tax government contractors there should be an equal withdrawal from the federal government of its power to tax state employees and contractors, to the end that the power to tax shall remain in balance;

Now, Therefore, Be It Resolved by the House of the Fifty-sixth General Assembly of the State of Iowa, the Senate Concurring, that the General Assembly respectfully memorializes the Congress of the United States to enact as speedily as possible legislation which will secure and make certain to the states of the Union the power and right to levy and collect any nondiscriminatory privilege tax upon any privilege exercised under the protection and authority of the law of any state of the Union, except such taxes the direct incidence of which would be upon the United States.

The motion prevailed and the resolution was adopted.

Senator Watson of Pottawattamie called up the following resolution and moved its adoption:

SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION 27

By Watson of Pottawattamie, McFarlane and Byers

Whereas, Senator Herman M. Knudson of Cerro Gordo County will have completed twenty years of distinguished service in the Iowa legislature at the termination of his present term, and for this long period of years has contributed valuable services to the State of Iowa;

Now, Therefore, Be It Resolved by the Senate, the House Concurring: That Senator Knudson be presented with the chair which he occupied during the Fifty-sixth General Assembly, and that the custodian of the state house be instructed to crate the chair for shipment to the home residence of the Senator.

Be It Further Resolved: That a copper plate with the proper inscription thereon showing that the chair was presented by the Fifty-sixth General Assembly be properly attached to said chair.

EXPLANATION OF VOTE

Article III, section 10, of the Iowa Constitution, states "that every member of the General Assembly shall have the liberty to dissent from or protest against any act or resolution which he may think injurious to the public . . . and have the reasons for his dissent entered on the Journal."

We, the undersigned, voted "Aye" on the motion to withdraw Senate File 425 from the sifting committee but under protest against the tactics which were used to withdraw this bill contrary to the established rules of the Senate. The reason given by a proponent of the motion to withdraw was to "save the Republican promise and platform plank on school reorganization." We consider this to be a poor way to treat school reorganization. The bill should be considered on its merits and not as a political football.

'(a) The net proceeds of one cent (1c) per gallon of the license fees collected under the provisions of this chapter shall, for the biennium beginning July 1, 1955, and ending June 30, 1957, be credited by the treasurer of state to the primary road fund, to be used for construction of such primary roads as are presently surfaced with gravel or crushed

rock only, on the basis of need as determined by the state highway commission.

'(b) The net proceeds of one cent (1c) per gallon of the license fees collected under the provisions of this chapter shall, for the biennium beginning July 1, 1955, and ending June 30, 1957, be credited by the treasurer of state to the primary road fund for the purpose of widening and modernization of highways and bridges.'

Sec. 3. Section three hundred twenty-four point two (324.2), Code 1954, is further amended by striking from line five (5) the word 'six' and inserting in lieu thereof the word 'seven'.

Sec. 4. This act, being deemed of immediate importance, shall be in full force and effect July 1, 1955, after its passage and publication in the Stuart Herald, a newspaper published at Stuart, Iowa, and in the Guthrie County Vedette, a newspaper published at Panora, Iowa."

Senator Prentis offered the following amendment to the amendment and moved its adoption:

Amend the amendment as follows: "After the word 'state' in line 23, strike the balance of subsection (b) in section 2 and insert in lieu thereof the following: 'to the road use tax fund, section 312.2, Code 1954.'"

On motion of Senator Prentis, House File 146, a bill for an act to amend sections three hundred twenty-four point two (324.2) and three hundred twenty-four point sixty-three (324.63), Code 1954, relating to the license fees imposed on motor fuel and fuel oil, was taken up for consideration.

Senator Nolan called up the amendment to House File 146, filed by him and found on pages 837 to 840, inclusive, of the Senate Journal.

Senator Lynes raised a point of order on the amendment for the reason that the amendment was improper and not germane to the main bill.

Senator Dewel moved the previous question on the point of order, which motion prevailed.

President Elthon ruled that the point of order raised by Senator Lynes was well taken for the following reasons:

The amendment offered by Senator Nolan is not germane and is not proper for the reason that House File 146 is a bill confined to raising the gasoline tax one cent, and to the division thereof. It also provides that the one cent tax that is presently in force will remain in force, which will make the increase two cents. The original bill provides for this tax and the division of the money received from the tax. The title of the bill is restricted to motor vehicle license fees. It is true that the amendment would amend the title, but the Chair cannot assume that the title is already amended. The title is very restrictive as is the bill, and is confined, in the opinion of the Chair, to the raising of the license fees, and the amendment provides for obligating the State of Iowa for three hundred million dollars. It also provides for issuing of bonds and retirement thereof. House File 146 deals in a legislative matter. The amendment deals with a matter which under our constitution is reserved only for the people of the State of Iowa to decide. The constitution provides that the legislature in no case can obligate the people of the State of Iowa by more than two hundred fifty thousand dollars. The amendment provides for obligating the road use tax fund to the extent of three hundred million dollars, and that the matter be submitted to the people. The Chair is of the opinion that the issuing of bonds is a very different question than the raising of gasoline tax. It is so different that the constitution prohibits the legislature from authorizing bonds or indebtedness in the amount of over two hundred fifty thousand dollars. The Chair sustains the point of order raised by Senator Lynes.

Senator McManus asked and received unanimous consent to withdraw the amendment to Senate File 146, filed by him, and found on page 762 of the Senate Journal.

Senator Prentis moved that the bill be read a third time now, which motion prevailed, and the bill was read a third time.

HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION 21

By Kuester, Paul and Loss

Be It Resolved by the House, the Senate Concurring: That the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House assume full responsibility in determining the policies incident to the details of closing the

session of the Fifty-sixth General Assembly, and the reconvening of any special or subsequent regular session.

Be It Further Resolved: That the Secretary of the Senate and the Chief Clerk of the House make an inventory of all equipment and supplies on hand at the close of the session, and file the same with the Secretary of the Executive Council.

Be It Further Resolved: That the Executive Council, in accordance with section 19.25, Code 1954, provide all the supplies required for the convening of the next regular, any special and during the session of the General Assembly, upon requisition signed by the Secretary of the Senate for the Senate, and the Chief Clerk of the House for the House.

Be It Further Resolved: That the aforementioned officers are hereby authorized to reserve for the exclusive use of the General Assembly, during the interim, such rooms now occupied and used by said General Assembly as may be necessary for any official use and for the purpose of storing supplies and equipment as they may deem proper and advisable and notify the Executive Council of their conclusions in said matter, and the Executive Council shall in no wise make other assignments of the rooms which are so reserved.

Be It Further Resolved: That the Secretary of the Senate and the Chief Clerk of the House shall make a complete survey of all the typewriters on hand for the purpose of determining the advisability of replacing some of this equipment. The machines it may be determined to replace should immediately be made available to the Secretary of the Executive Council for distribution to various departments or institutions of the state at amounts based on appraisals to be fixed by the representatives of the manufacturers of said machines. Such departments or institutions shall be charged with the appraised value for any machines so distributed and the legislative fund credited therewith. All other equipment is to be stored in rooms reserved by the legislative officials above designated and an accurate inventory made of the same and filed with the Secretary of the Executive Council by the Secretary of the Senate and Chief Clerk of the House, and the Executive Council shall thereafter have exclusive custody of the same and make it available for the succeeding General Assembly.

Be It Further Resolved: That any officers or employees of the Fifty-sixth General Assembly who shall be engaged for work in connection with the closing up of the work of the Fifty-sixth General Assembly and the reconvening of any subsequent regular or special session, shall be compensated for such services at the same rate as was fixed for the regular session of the Fifty-sixth General Assembly.

EXPLANATION OF VOTE

We, the undersigned, refused to vote "aye" or "nay" on all Appropriation bills to pay claims considered by the Senate on Thursday, April 21, 1955, for the following reasons:

In our opinion, in passing upon the merits of claims against the State of Iowa the Legislature is exercising a Judicial function for which its members are not procedurally equipped to render substantial justice. We object to the system long in use by which the Legislature attempts to determine the existence of a moral obligation to pay claimants. To us, the procedure followed in determining the merits of claims is an unwarranted mixing of the Legislative and Judicial departments of government without proper safeguards to protect either the claimants or the public purse.

Our refusal to vote on these Appropriation bills shall in no way be

construed as criticism of any members of the claims committees of the Fifty-sixth General Assembly. We believe that the committee members have performed their duties sincerely and conscientiously. Our objections are directed solely to the system.

HOUSE AMENDMENTS TO SENATE FILE 198

1. Amend section 5 by striking from lines 5, 6, 7, and 8 the following "residing on a farm and being actively engaged in a farming operation or who is the owner of a farm in the State of Iowa of not less than ten acres and a resident qualified voter in a township of an extension district", and inserting in lieu thereof the words "of the township".

2. Amend section 5 by striking lines 13 to 20, inclusive.

3. Amend section 8, line 17, by striking the comma (,) after the word "years" and inserting in lieu thereof a period (.) and by striking from lines seventeen (17) and eighteen (18) the following: "and the members elected at large, as hereinbefore provided, shall serve for a two-year term".

4. Further amend section 8, line 21, by inserting a period (.) after the word "term" and by striking from lines 21 and 22 the following: "and no member elected to serve at large shall be eligible for election for more than one successive two-year term."

5. Insert after the word "budget" in section 10, subsection (i), line 70, the following: "for the fiscal year beginning January 1 and ending December 31".

6. Amend section 10, subsection (o), line 118, by striking the semi-colon after the word "program" and inserting in lieu thereof a period, and by striking the remainder of said subsection.

7. Add the following new subsection to section ten (10) thereof:

"(q) To file with the county auditor and to publish in two newspapers of general circulation in the district before February 1 full and detailed reports under oath of all receipts and expenditures of such county agricultural extension education fund showing from whom received, to whom paid and for what purpose for the last fiscal year."

8. Amend section twelve (12) by striking the word "any" in line twelve (12) and inserting in lieu thereof the word "an".

9. Further amend section twelve (12), line fourteen (14), by striking the comma after the word "dollars" and inserting the following: "in districts having a population of sixty thousand or more, seventeen thousand five hundred dollars in districts having a population of sixteen thousand or more but less than sixty thousand, and fifteen thousand dollars in districts having a population of less than sixteen thousand,".

10. Further amend section twelve (12) by inserting after the word "any" in line fifteen (15) the word "such".

11. Amend by adding thereto a new section as follows:

"Sec. 18. Anything in this act to the contrary notwithstanding, the appropriations made by the county boards of supervisors to the farm aid associations (county farm bureaus) of this state for the fiscal year 1955, which said appropriations have not been paid over to the county farm bureaus of this state before August 1, 1955, shall be paid over to the county agricultural extension districts to be used by said districts for the purposes stated in this act."

12. Further amend by renumbering the remaining sections.

Be It Resolved by the House, the Senate Concurring: That the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House assume full responsibility in determining the policies incident to the details of closing the session of the Fifty-sixth General Assembly, and the reconvening of any special or subsequent regular session.

Be It Further Resolved: That the Secretary of the Senate and the Chief Clerk of the House make an inventory of all equipment and supplies on hand at the close of the session, and file the same with the Secretary of the Executive Council.

Be It Further Resolved: That the Executive Council, in accordance with section 19.25, Code 1954, provide all the supplies required for the convening of the next regular, any special and during the session of the General Assembly, upon requisition signed by the Secretary of the Senate for the Senate, and the Chief Clerk of the House for the House.

Be It Further Resolved: That the aforementioned officers are hereby authorized to reserve for the exclusive use of the General Assembly, during the interim, such rooms now occupied and used by said General Assembly as may be necessary for any official use and for the purpose of storing supplies and equipment as they may deem proper and advisable and notify the Executive Council of their conclusions in said matter, and the Executive Council shall in no wise make other assignments of the rooms which are so reserved.

Be It Further Resolved: That the Secretary of the Senate and the Chief Clerk of the House shall make a complete survey of all the typewriters on hand for the purpose of determining the advisability of re-

placing some of this equipment. The machines it may be determined to replace should immediately be made available to the Secretary of the Executive Council for distribution to various departments or institutions of the state at amounts based on appraisals to be fixed by the representatives of the manufacturers of said machines. Such departments or institutions shall be charged with the appraised value for any machines so distributed to and the legislative fund credited therewith. All other equipment is to be stored in rooms reserved by the legislative officials above designated and an accurate inventory made of the same and filed with the Secretary of the Executive Council by the Secretary of the Senate and Chief Clerk of the House, and the Executive Council shall thereafter have exclusive custody of the same and make it available for the succeeding General Assembly.

Be It Further Resolved: That any officers or employees of the Fifty-sixth General Assembly who shall be engaged for work in connection with the closing up of the work of the Fifty-sixth General Assembly and the reconvening of any subsequent regular or special session, shall be compensated for such services at the same rate as was fixed for the regular session of the Fifty-sixth General Assembly.

PRESS AND RADIO AWARD TO SENATOR VEST

The press bench of the Senate, through the circumstances which surround the profession, gives its biggest headlines to those who lead the biggest battles, but the press bench give its recognition this year to one who is still more necessary in the process of legislation, the worker. It recognizes that the shoulders bent over the books, the hour of study, the concern over both the language and the meaning of legislation are elements which will endure in the statutes after the sounds of battle have died away.

And so the Senate press bench this year recognizes a man whose voice is quiet but persistent. He has been a Senate member for three sessions. On only four days of three long sessions has he been recorded as absent. Although his name has been on important bills it has been on more important amendments. In one session his amendments exceeded in number the bills which he introduced, recorded testimony of his study of the mechanics and the logic of legislation.

His views have not always been popular or vote-making. With the recollection of the results of totalitarianism which he saw from the bench of a military court, he has opposed what he thought might lead in a similar direction here. As the chairman of an important Senate committee he has worked long hours on small bills but their total in this session is large. In the words of a Senate committee clerk "he is awfully conscientious." In the words of a statehouse elevator operator "he's the last man gone at night." In the words of the Senate roll call he is Senator Alan Vest of Sac City, one of those who wear across the shoulders the mark of the harness in which he has pulled far more than his weight.

REPORT OF THE CONFERENCE COMMITTEE
ON HOUSE FILE 522

TO THE PRESIDENT OF THE SENATE AND THE SPEAKER OF THE HOUSE:

We, the undersigned members of the conference committee appointed to consider the difference between the Senate and the House on House File 522, an act amending chapter four hundred twenty-two (422), Code 1954, providing for the reduction of credits (except for dependents) which may be deducted from Iowa individual income taxes and restricting installment payment privilege to tax of over fifty dollars, and amending chapter four hundred twenty-three (423), Code 1954, providing funds for the general fund of the State of Iowa, beg leave to report and make the following recommendations:

It is the recommendation of the conference committee that it will be necessary to increase revenue sufficient to meet anticipated budget needs. In order to effect that result, it is necessary to provide legislation creating an emergency tax revenue which will produce the necessary revenue for a well balanced budget, and to meet the necessary expenditures during the next biennium ending June 30, 1957.

It is the recommendation of the committee that this emergency revenue raising legislation shall exist until June 30, 1957 and that the tax study committee provided for by the Fifty-sixth General Assembly shall evaluate the entire tax structure in the State of Iowa including all real and personal property assessments, exemptions, credits and deductions, methods of raising revenue from other sources of taxation including consideration of the entire field of sales, uses, services, corporation, income and real and personal property taxation and that such committee shall come forth with a proposal for a well balanced program of taxation to meet the needs of the State of Iowa and to provide for the stability of such revenues in the future.

It is the opinion of the members of the conference committee that good government requires revenue measures which will produce funds sufficient to meet appropriations, and our report was arrived at after full consideration of the reserve funds which the State of Iowa has on hand.

In line with the foregoing we make the following recommendations:

That House File 522 be made to read as follows:

A Bill For

An Act to provide temporary amendments to chapters four hundred twenty-two (422) and four hundred twenty-three (423), Code 1954, relating to income, sales and use taxes providing funds for the general fund of the state for the biennium beginning July 1, 1955, and ending June 30, 1957.

Be It Enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Iowa:

Section 1. Section four hundred twenty-two point twelve (422.12), Code 1954, is hereby amended as follows:

Subsection one (1) is amended by striking the word "fifteen" and inserting in lieu thereof the word "twelve".

Subsection two (2) is amended by striking from line two (2) the word "thirty" and inserting in lieu thereof the word "twenty-four".

Subsection three (3), as amended by House File 225 of the Fifty-sixth General Assembly, is amended by striking the words "seven dollars fifty cents" and inserting in lieu thereof the words "twelve dollars (\$12.00)".

Sec. 2. Section four hundred twenty-two point thirteen (422.13), Code 1954, is hereby amended as follows:

Subsection one (1) is amended by striking the words "fifteen hundred" from line three (3) and inserting in lieu thereof the words "one thousand one hundred twenty-five"; also by striking from line six (6) the words "two thousand three hundred fifty" and inserting in lieu thereof the words "one thousand seven hundred fifty".

Subsection two (2) is amended by striking from line two (2) the words "two thousand" and inserting in lieu thereof the words "one thousand seven hundred fifty".

Subsection four (4) is amended by striking the words "three thousand" in line two (2) and inserting in lieu thereof the words "twenty-five hundred".

Further amend by striking the word "net" in lines one (1) and five (5) of subsection one (1), and in line two (2) of subsection two (2) and insert in lieu thereof the word "taxable".

Sec. 3. Section four hundred twenty-two point five (422.5), Code 1954, is amended as follows:

Amend subsection one (1), line two (2), by striking the word "three-fourths" and inserting in lieu thereof the word "eight-tenths".

Amend subsection two (2), lines two (2) and three (3), by striking the words "one and one-half" and inserting in lieu thereof the words "one and six-tenths".

Amend subsection three (3), lines two (2) and three (3), by striking the words "two and one-fourth" and inserting in lieu thereof the words "two and four-tenths".

Amend subsection four (4), line two (2), by striking the word "three" and inserting in lieu thereof the words "three and two-tenths".

Amend subsection five (5) by striking the words "three and three-fourths" where they appear in lines two (2) and three (3) and also in lines four (4) and five (5) and inserting in lieu thereof in each place the word "four".

Sec. 4. Section four hundred twenty-two point thirty-three (422.33), Code 1954, is amended by striking from line six (6) the word "two" and inserting in lieu thereof the word "three".

Sec. 5. Section four hundred twenty-two point twenty-four (422.24), Code 1954, is amended by striking the word "ten" in line eight (8) and inserting in lieu thereof the word "fifty".

Sec. 6. The provisions of this act shall be effective as to all returns based upon income for the calendar years of 1955 and 1956, and as to all income from fiscal years beginning during the calendar years of 1955 and 1956.

Sec. 7. Section four hundred twenty-two point forty-three (422.43), Code 1954, is hereby amended by adding thereto the following:

"There is hereby imposed, for the period beginning on the first day of July, 1955, and closing on and including June thirtieth, 1957, an additional tax of one-half ($\frac{1}{2}$) per cent upon the gross receipts from all sales of tangible personal property and all other transactions subject to sales tax under the provisions of this section. All revenues arising from this provision shall become part of the state general fund, unless otherwise specifically provided."

Sec. 8. Section four hundred twenty-two point sixty-two (422.62), Code 1954, is hereby amended by adding thereto the following provision:

"The provisions of this section shall apply to all receipts collected from the additional one-half ($\frac{1}{2}$) per cent sales tax provided by this act."

Sec. 9. Section four hundred twenty-three point two (423.2), Code 1954, is hereby amended by adding to such section the following:

"An excise tax is hereby imposed upon the use in this state of tangible personal property purchased between the dates of July first, 1955, to June thirtieth, 1957, inclusive, except motor vehicles, trailers and motor vehicle accessories or equipment, at the rate of one-half ($\frac{1}{2}$) per cent of the purchase price of such property, this tax to be in addition to the two (2) per cent tax already imposed by section four hundred twenty-three point two (423.2), Code 1954. Said tax is hereby imposed upon every person using such property within this state until such tax has been paid through the retailer, or to the commission, as hereinafter provided."

Sec. 10. Section four hundred twenty-three point twenty-four (423.24), Code 1954, is hereby amended by adding thereto the following:

"All revenues arising from the one-half ($\frac{1}{2}$) per cent additional use tax imposed by this act shall be credited to the general fund of the State of Iowa."

Sec. 11. All of the provisions of chapter four hundred twenty-two (422), Code 1954, relating to the collection of sales tax and the administration of the sales tax law shall apply to the collection of the additional tax imposed by this act and all of the provisions of chapter four hundred twenty-three (423), Code 1954, relating to the collection of use tax and the administration of the use tax law shall apply to the collection of the additional tax imposed by this act, and the provisions of chapter four hundred twenty-two (422), Code 1954, relating to the imposition, collection and administration of the sales tax law and all of the provisions of chapter four hundred twenty-three (423), Code 1954, relating to the imposition, collection and administration of the use tax law shall be considered an integral part of this act. The state tax commission shall provide proper forms for the reporting and collection of the taxes imposed by this act; shall have the power to make rules and regulations in connection with the administration thereof, as is now provided in the case of sales and use tax administration, and shall be authorized to employ such additional assistance as may be required for its administration.

Sec. 12. The provisions of this act shall constitute a temporary emergency tax to make possible meeting budgetary needs for the biennium beginning July 1, 1955, and ending June 30, 1957.

Sec. 13. This act being deemed of immediate importance shall be in full force and effect from and after publication in the *West Des Moines Express*, a newspaper published at West Des Moines, Iowa, and the *Ogden Reporter*, a newspaper published at Ogden, Iowa.

SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION 15

By O'Malley

Whereas, the Constitution of the State of Iowa says: "All men are by nature free and equal, and have certain inalienable rights—among which are those of enjoying and defending life and liberty, acquiring, possessing and protecting property, and pursuing and obtaining safety and happiness", and

Whereas, surveys taken in the State of Iowa indicate that racial or religious discrimination in employment does exist;

Now, Therefore, Be It Resolved by the Senate, the House Concurring: That it shall be the policy of the State of Iowa that no person within its boundaries shall be deprived of the right to work at his chosen occupation for any employer, public or private, because of race, creed, color, national origin or ancestry.

Be It Further Resolved: That the Governor is requested to appoint a commission, which shall serve without compensation, to study the extent of such discrimination in Iowa and recommend remedies therefor, for the consideration of the next General Assembly.

The motion prevailed and the resolution was adopted.

HOUSE AMENDMENTS TO SENATE FILE 96

Amend Senate File 96 as follows:

1. Amend section 7 by adding thereto the following: "Provided, however, that any improvements built hereon and leased or rented shall be subject to the same property tax as other property in the same taxing district."

2. Amend section 8, line 41, by inserting after the semi-colon (;) the following: "provided, however, that the Iowa Toll Road Authority created under this act shall not acquire property rights, rights-of-way, franchises, easements, and interests in real estate by grant, purchase, gift, condemnation, or otherwise, and shall not issue any toll road revenue bonds until an adjoining state has created a similar toll road authority, has made plans and has negotiated the sale of revenue bonds to construct a toll road, which shall extend to the boundary of Iowa;"

3. Add the following new section after section 12 and renumber the remaining sections:

"Sec. 13. Whenever the toll road project divides a tract of land, the Authority shall provide a suitable livestock and machinery pass or passes to the end that said tract may continue to be operated as a unit. However, if the construction of such pass or passes is not practicable because of excessive construction costs due to unusual conditions or because only a small portion of a tract is separated from the rest of a tract by the project, then and in that event the authority may purchase all or part of the tract in question."

4. Amend section 17, subsection 1, line 20, by inserting after the word "proceedings" the words "on behalf of the Authority".

5. Amend section 27, by striking the period (.) after the word "state" in line 7, and adding thereto the following: "provided, however, that nothing herein shall be construed as exempting said bonds in the hands of the purchasers thereof from any applicable taxes imposed by the State of Iowa."

6. Amend section 39 by striking said section and inserting in lieu thereof the following:

"Sec. 39. The Iowa State Highway Commission is hereby authorized to provide the sum of seventy-five thousand dollars (\$75,000.00) or so much thereof as may be necessary to carry out the proposals of this act and for compensation and expenses audited according to law. None of said funds may be expended for promotion. Upon the sale of toll revenue bonds for any project, or projects, any money expended from this sum shall be reimbursed to the Iowa State Highway Commission from the proceeds of such bonds without interest."

THIRD READING OF BILLS

On motion of Senator Dykhouse, House File 520, a bill for an act to reorganize certain government functions by assigning to the motor vehicle department of the department of public safety the exclusive administration of certain laws relating to motor vehicles, was taken up and considered.

Senator Dykhouse offered the following amendment and moved its adoption:

Amend House File 520 by striking sections 1 to 5, inclusive, and section 7 and by renumbering the remaining sections.

The amendment was adopted.

Senator Dykhouse asked and received unanimous consent to withdraw the following amendment:

Amend House File 520 by adding a new section as follows:

"Sec. . Section three hundred twenty-one point four hundred seventy-seven (321.477), Code 1954, is amended by inserting a period after the word "laws" in line seven (7) and by striking the remainder of said section."

Senator Dykhouse offered the following amendment and moved its adoption:

Amend House File 520 by adding the following new section:

"Sec. Amend section three hundred twenty-one point four hundred seventy-seven (321.477), Code 1954, by striking all of said section after the word 'officer' in line five (5) and inserting in lieu thereof the following: ', to enforce all the provisions of this chapter.'"

The amendment was adopted.

Senator Prentis asked and received unanimous consent to withdraw the amendment to House File 520, filed by him and found on page 850 of the Senate Journal.

Senator Nolan offered the following amendment, filed by Senators Nolan, Putney and Johnson:

Amend House File 520 by striking the quotation marks (") at the end of line 10 of section 4 and add the following: "All persons employed by the State Highway Commission under the provisions of section three hundred twenty-one point four hundred seventy-seven (321.477), Code 1954, at the time this act becomes effective shall be employed by the department, providing they are qualified at such time to carry out the provisions of this act."

2. Further amend House File 520 by striking all of sections 8 to 30, inclusive.

HOUSE AMENDMENTS TO SENATE FILE 198

1. Amend section 5 by striking from lines 5, 6, 7, and 8 the following "residing on a farm and being actively engaged in a farming operation or who is the owner of a farm in the State of Iowa of not less than ten acres and a resident qualified voter in a township of an extension district", and inserting in lieu thereof the words "of the township".

2. Amend section 5 by striking lines 13 to 20, inclusive.

3. Amend section 8, line 17, by striking the comma (,) after the word "years" and inserting in lieu thereof a period (.) and by striking from lines seventeen (17) and eighteen (18) the following: "and the members elected at large, as hereinbefore provided, shall serve for a two-year term".

4. Further amend section 8, line 21, by inserting a period (.) after the word "term" and by striking from lines 21 and 22 the following: "and no member elected to serve at large shall be eligible for election for more than one successive two-year term."

5. Insert after the word "budget" in section 10, subsection (i), line 70, the following: "for the fiscal year beginning January 1 and ending December 31".

6. Amend section 10, subsection (o), line 113, by striking the semicolon after the word "program" and inserting in lieu thereof a period, and by striking the remainder of said subsection.

7. Add the following new subsection to section ten (10) thereof:

"(q) To file with the county auditor and to publish in two newspapers of general circulation in the district before February 1 full and detailed reports under oath of all receipts and expenditures of such county agricultural extension education fund showing from whom received, to whom paid and for what purpose for the last fiscal year."

8. Amend section twelve (12) by striking the word "any" in line twelve (12) and inserting in lieu thereof the word "an".

9. Further amend section twelve (12), line fourteen (14), by striking

the comma after the word "dollars" and inserting the following: "in districts having a population of sixty thousand or more, seventeen thousand five hundred dollars in districts having a population of sixteen thousand or more but less than sixty thousand, and fifteen thousand dollars in districts having a population of less than sixteen thousand."

10. Further amend section twelve (12) by inserting after the word "any" in line fifteen (15) the word "such".

11. Amend by adding thereto a new section as follows:

"Sec. 18. Anything in this act to the contrary notwithstanding, the appropriations made by the county boards of supervisors to the farm aid associations (county farm bureaus) of this state for the fiscal year 1955, which said appropriations have not been paid over to the county farm bureaus of this state before August 1, 1955, shall be paid over to the county agricultural extension districts to be used by said districts for the purposes stated in this act."

12. Further amend by renumbering the remaining sections.

Senator Rigler offered the following amendment and moved its adoption:

Whereas, it is necessary to the orderly conduct of its business that the Senate adopt some means of giving priority to necessary legislation and effecting adjournment within the reasonable limitations of time, and

Whereas, the traditional use of the sifting committee to accomplish this purpose has not been entirely satisfactory, since it sometimes results in the undemocratic process of permitting a small minority to prevent the consideration of legislation which is of widespread interest,

Now, Therefore, Be It Resolved, by the Iowa Senate, that the President of the Senate appoint a committee of five of its members to make investigation of the possible methods of giving direction to the work of the Senate which might avoid the objections to the present system, including examination of procedures now in use in other states, and to make report to the rules committee of the Senate in the Fifty-seventh General Assembly of Iowa.

Senator Scott asked and received unanimous consent that the following report be printed in the Senate Journal:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON
CAPITOL IMPROVEMENT

Honorable Leo Elthon,
President of the Senate.
Honorable Arthur Hanson,

Honorable Members of the House.

We, the undersigned members of the Fifty-sixth General Assembly, beg leave to report, respecting the duties performed by us, as the committee on Capitol Improvement which committee was established by the Fifty-fifth General Assembly pursuant to House Concurrent Resolution number 27 as follows:

"Whereas, it is becoming increasingly evident that some major repairs and rehabilitation are going to be necessary to preserve the exterior of the state capitol, and also that there is evidence that necessary repairs and improvements might well be made within the building itself;

Now, Therefore, Be It Resolved by the House, the Senate Concurring, that there is hereby created a capitol improvement commission, consisting of three members from the Senate to be appointed by the President of the Senate, and three members of the House to be appointed by the Speaker of the House, for the purpose of making a survey of the physical condition of the state capitol and making a report of such recommendations to the Fifty-sixth General Assembly for such improvements as said commission might deem proper and necessary.

Be It Further Resolved, that members of such commission shall perform its duties without any compensation."

The following members of the Fifty-fifth General Assembly were appointed by the respective presiding officers to serve as members of this special committee:

Senator George L. Scott
Senator Henry Washburn
Senator Thomas J. Dailey
Representative Guy G. Butler
Representative Russell A. Patrick
Representative G. M. Ludwig

The committee held its first formal meeting in Des Moines on June 5, 1953, at 10:30 a.m. Permanent officers were thereupon selected as follows: Senator George L. Scott, Chairman, Representative Guy G. Butler, Secretary.

The purposes and objectives of the committee were reviewed and summarized and the committee adjourned to conduct a personal inspection of the Capitol Building, accompanied by Fred Willis, custodian, A. C. Gustafson, Chief Clerk of the House, and other state personnel, all of whom were present by invitation of the committee. Following this inspection, Chairman Scott appointed the committee members to confer with selected members of the Engineering Departments of Iowa State College, and the State University of Iowa, respecting the provision of professional assistance without charge to the state, to the committee.

Professor Leonard Wolfe, of the Department of Architectural Engineering, Iowa State College, was subsequently invited to assist the committee.

The committee met for its second session on September 1, 1953, in Des Moines at 11:00 a.m. at the Capitol Building, with Professor Leonard Wolfe present. The committee further invited Mr. Ralph Arnold, architect of the Board of Control, and Mr. Thomas Rowat, president of the Rowat Cut Stone Company of Des Moines, Iowa, to confer with the committee. Present also upon the invitation of the committee were Mr. Fred Willis, custodian, and Mr. Theodore E. Wood, of the Western Waterproofing Company of Des Moines, Iowa. It was determined that subject to the approval of the Executive Council, a demonstration repair of the bases of two columns on the north balcony, would be carried out at the earliest possible date, to allow for weather and moisture reaction upon such repair. Senator Washburn and Representative Patrick conferred with the Executive Council on September 3, 1953, representing the committee and it was suggested to proceed with the demonstration repair project and employ the Western Waterproofing Company to conduct the experimental repairs.

On September 16, 1953, arrangements were made through Mr. Willis, for members of the committee to proceed to Little Rock, Arkansas, and to Jefferson City, Missouri, to inspect the respective state capitol buildings, upon which structures Western Waterproofing had made major repairs in restoration. Representative Butler, Representative Patrick, Mr. Willis and Mr. Wolfe left Des Moines on September 28 for Little Rock, and returned on September 30. The report of this inspection is attached to the original of this report accompanied by a copy of the plans and specifications of the repair project. In summary, it may be said that the Arkansas repair project was much more extensive than would be contemplated for the Iowa capitol building, and the committee members making the trip concluded that the better way to proceed was to authorize the demonstration repair of the two selected columns, and the results of such repair might be examined by the Fifty-sixth General Assembly. In connection with this conclusion, the committee members had before them a special report by L. E. Donaldson, Director of the Indiana Limestone Institute; a copy of this special report is attached hereto for the information of the Assembly.

The committee proceeded to secure the repair of the two columns on the northwest corner of the north balcony; and invite the inspection of this work by the members of the Assembly. This repair work included the following action: Western Waterproofing Company undertook the repair under the direction of Mr. Wood. All deteriorated stone on the column bases was chipped off from the base of each column, copper dowels were inserted, and the bases were reformed with a material called "flexotex". This material has a granite aggregate, using a special binding agent, and it is claimed that it has four times the strength of Portland cement. The cement was tried first, but the cement was not flexible enough to form the bases.

In summary, based upon its research, investigations, discussions, and

findings, your special committee reports the following conclusions, and makes the recommendations set out hereafter:

Conclusions:

a. There are no structural weaknesses in the Iowa State Capitol Building, internal or external. This structure is sound. Evidence of this soundness is demonstrated by the absence of any cracking of the interior plaster, or settling of the exterior walls. Expert structural engineers have examined the structure thoroughly and upon their findings this conclusion is based.

b. External stone disintegration is confined to molded members of the stone, such as the bases of columns and pilasters, and principally on the ornamental decorations of the building, such as leafing and rosettes; there is no appreciable disintegration of the wall-bearing zone of the structure.

Recommendations:

a. That the Budget and Financial Control Committee shall be instructed to proceed, with the cooperation and assistance of the Executive Council, with demonstration repairs to the various areas of the building at a minimum of expense, where particular types of ornamentation have deteriorated; that based upon the costs of making such demonstration repairs, more complete plans, specifications and estimates be prepared by the said Budget Committee to be included in their report to the Fifty-seventh General Assembly for possible action; that the costs incident to such repairs be paid by the Executive Council from funds allocated to the Capitol Maintenance account.

b. That no "sand-blasting" of the building be permitted at any time. Despite the pleas of uninformed persons to "clean up" the exterior stone work, such "sand-blasting" operation is likely to do serious damage to the structure, and produce an undesired effect both in appearance and color. Also it might produce a porous condition which would absorb more moisture and might cause damage because of extremes in weather changes.

c. That the best professional assistance available, from the State University of Iowa, and Iowa State College, be called in for continued consultation with the Budget Committee, and the Executive Council, in formulating plans and reports for action by the Fifty-seventh General Assembly.

The state capitol building has weathered the past eighty years with the qualities of its builders—firmness, unyielding strength and stability. A few self-styled critics have smirked at its general architectural lines and appearances but, to generations of Iowans, this fine building is an expression of the values of Iowa ways of living—firm and enduring. Your committee trusts that it has made some small contribution to the continued usefulness of our capitol building.

In closing, the committee states that it asks for no reimbursements for money spent by its members for travel, meals or lodging; we ask for no per diem compensation; we seek no appropriation; we do not request that the committee be extended or its work prolonged. We ask only that our report be accepted and that we be discharged.

Our compensation consists in the realization that we now know our

capitol building better, and our affections for its dome, and companion towers, its columns and its walls, have grown in this service.

The Honorable G. M. Ludwig, of Johnson County, formerly a member of the General Assembly, does herewith concur in this report.

Dear Mr. Wolf:

Further replying to your letter of October 27 dealing with my brief inspection a few weeks ago of the outer walls of the above captioned structure:

Usually inspection of masonry walls, especially in older structures, owes its inception to wall leakage and/or interior damage incident thereto.

I was advised by your custodian that no difficulty of this nature had been experienced. Some difficulty had developed in connection with a few of the window frames, but the origin of the difficulty was not the result of any masonry failure.

On the north portico of the structure, I was asked to observe certain weather disintegration that had taken place in the stone work. I find this disintegration is largely confined to moulded members of the stone, such as column and pilaster bases and the free ornamental leafings of certain of the caps. This disintegration in most all instances is beyond the wall bearing zone of the structure. Hence, other than appearance, there can be no ill effects from this source.

To build up these disintegrated members at some future date would perhaps be advisable. The expense incurred should not be great. The cement aggregate used should as closely match the stone as possible. Likewise, some form of rod or wire reinforcing should be used in instances where heavy application is necessary.

The outer walls generally appear to be in good shape. More close inspection might reveal some repointing and other work which would be necessary. However, the item would be minor when considered in the light of the structure as a whole.

I was asked to offer an opinion as to the advisability of having this structure cleaned, it being stated that had been or was being considered. We are not opposed to the cleaning of the buildings, in fact, many times we recommend that it be done. However, on this structure, it is

my judgment any attempt to clean the stone work would be ill advised, and further, would result in disappointment.

Stone on this building, during its some 80 years, has weathered beautifully. It is a rugged structure that has served its purpose well, both in appearance and otherwise and, if reasonably maintained, should continue to do so almost indefinitely.

In my brief inspection, I was accompanied by your custodian and Mr. Thomas Rowat of the Rowat Cut Stone Company of Des Moines, Iowa, whom you perhaps know and with whom you might further discuss the subject matter, particularly as to the views expressed herein.

Should we, in your opinion, be able to give you further assistance, please feel free to call upon us.

58 the city clerk on completion of the publication.

59 Sec. 7. The clerk of the principal city shall cause to
60 be prepared and printed the ballots for such election on which
61 shall be plainly stated the proposition to be voted upon, placed
62 in interrogatory form with the words "yes" and "no" so arranged
63 as to enable the voter to clearly indicate his vote for or
64 against such proposition, which ballots shall be delivered to
65 the judges of election by the time the polls are open.

66 Sec. 8. The judges and clerks shall count the ballots
67 cast as soon as the polls close and certify and file the re-
68 turns, with all the ballots cast, in the office of the clerk
69 of the principal city.

70 Sec. 9. On the filing of the returns the council or joint
71 councils shall convene and canvass the same and certify the
72 result to the county board of supervisors. If a majority of
73 the votes cast are in favor of such taxes, the board shall, at
74 the time of levying the ordinary taxes next following, levy

HOUSE AMENDMENTS CONSIDERED

Senator Van Eaton called up for consideration Senate File 96, a bill for an act providing for the construction, maintenance, repair and operation of toll road projects; creating the Iowa Toll Road Authority and defining its powers and duties; granting it power to acquire necessary real and personal property and to exercise the power of eminent domain; providing for changes and reconstruction in the lines and location of highways, railroads and public facilities, the procedure and payment for cost or damage; providing for financing the construction of such projects by the issuance of rev-

enue bonds of the Authority, payable solely from the revenues and funds provided for such payment; providing that no liability or debt of the state shall be incurred in the exercise of any such powers; providing for the collection of tolls and other revenues to pay such bonds and the interest thereon and the cost of maintenance, repair and operation of such projects; exempting from taxes and assessments such toll road projects and such bonds and the interest thereon, making such bonds eligible for certain investments; prescribing the power and duties of the Authority in connection with the foregoing and the rights and remedies of the holders of bonds issued under the provisions of this Act; authorizing the issuance of revenue refunding bonds; authorizing municipalities and state agencies to convey property to the Authority; providing for the operation and supervision of the projects after the retirement of such bonds, and for making an appropriation for preliminary expenses, amended by the House, and moved that the Senate concur in the following amendments:

HOUSE AMENDMENTS TO SENATE FILE 96

Amend Senate File 96 as follows:

1. Amend section 7 by adding thereto the following: "Provided, however, that any improvements built hereon and leased or rented shall be subject to the same property tax as other property in the same taxing district."

2. Amend section 8, line 41, by inserting after the semi-colon (;) the following: "provided, however, that the Iowa Toll Road Authority created under this act shall not acquire property rights, rights-of-way, franchises, easements, and interests in real estate by grant, purchase, gift, condemnation, or otherwise, and shall not issue any toll road revenue bonds until an adjoining state has created a similar toll road authority, has made plans and has negotiated the sale of revenue bonds to construct a toll road, which shall extend to the boundary of Iowa;"

3. Add the following new section after section 12 and renumber the remaining sections:

"Sec. 13. Whenever the toll road project divides a tract of land, the Authority shall provide a suitable livestock and machinery pass or passes to the end that said tract may continue to be operated as a unit. However, if the construction of such pass or passes is not practicable because of excessive construction costs due to unusual conditions or because only a small portion of a tract is separated from the rest of a tract by the project, then and in that event the authority may purchase all or part of the tract in question."

4. Amend section 17, subsection 1, line 20, by inserting after the word "proceedings" the words "on behalf of the Authority".

5. Amend section 27, by striking the period (.) after the word "state" in line 7, and adding thereto the following: "provided, however, that

nothing herein shall be construed as exempting said bonds in the hands of the purchasers thereof from any applicable taxes imposed by the State of Iowa."

6. Amend section 39 by striking said section and inserting in lieu thereof the following:

"Sec. 39. The Iowa State Highway Commission is hereby authorized to provide the sum of seventy-five thousand dollars (\$75,000.00) or so much thereof as may be necessary to carry out the proposals of this act and for compensation and expenses audited according to law. None of said funds may be expended for promotion. Upon the sale of toll revenue bonds for any project, or projects, any money expended from this sum shall be reimbursed to the Iowa State Highway Commission from the proceeds of such bonds without interest."

THIRD READING OF BILLS

Senator Molison asked and received unanimous consent to take up for consideration Senate File 425, a bill for an act to amend chapter two hundred seventy-five (275), Code 1954, relating to the reorganization of school districts.

The following committee amendment was considered:

Amend Senate File 425 by striking all of section 10 and substituting in lieu thereof the following:

"Sec. 10. Section two hundred seventy-five point twenty (275.20), Code 1954, is hereby repealed and the following enacted in lieu thereof:

"When it is proposed to include in such school district a school corporation or district maintaining a twelve-grade school, or a school district or corporation containing an incorporated town with a population of two hundred or more inhabitants, and other school districts and sub-districts, the voting as pertains to said new school district shall be as follows:

"1. Each school district or corporation maintaining a twelve-grade school shall vote separately as one unit.

"2. Each school district or corporation containing an incorporated town with a population of two hundred or more inhabitants shall vote separately as one unit.

"3. All other school districts, sub-districts, or corporations shall vote as one unit, provided, however, that the county superintendent may for the purpose of convenience only provide separate polling places within the confines of said unit.

"4. If, however, the proposed plan contemplates the inclusion of only a portion or portions of either a school district, sub-district or school corporation, the said school district, sub-district or school corporation shall conduct a preliminary election in which the entire school district, sub-district or school corporation shall be entitled to vote upon the proposition, provided that where there is a sub-district or sub-districts affected, which sub-districts are a part of a school district, there shall be a separate vote in each of said sub-districts so affected and sub-districts of said district not so affected shall not vote upon said proposal. Said preliminary election shall be called by the county superintendent in the same manner and in accordance with the provisions and procedures set forth in this chapter. Said election shall be called subsequent to the filing of the petition provided for in section two hundred seventy-five point twelve (275.12), Code 1954, and prior to the final hearing upon said petition. If said proposal does not carry by a majority vote of said entire district, sub-district or school corporation, none of said district, sub-district or school corporation shall be included in the proposed new district. If said proposition does carry by a majority vote of said entire district, sub-district or school corporation, as the case may be, the proposed portion or portions of said district, sub-district or school corporation shall be included in said proposed new district and shall vote in the election to establish the new district in the manner set forth in this chapter and as a part of the unit provided for in subparagraph three (3) above.

"Said proposition shall be deemed to have carried when it receives a majority of the votes cast in each and all of the applicable units as provided in sub-paragraphs one (1), two (2) and three (3) above."

On motion of Senator Molison, the committee amendment was adopted.

"Whereas, such program would greatly retard, if not eventually destroy, the national program of soil and water conservation now being carried on, and since the problem is national in scope, it should be dealt with accordingly;

"Now, Therefore, Be It Resolved by the Senate of the State of Iowa (the House of Representatives Concurring therein), that the President of the United States and the President's Commission on Intergovernmental Relations are hereby respectfully memorialized and urged not to approve the reported recommendations of the Committee on Federal Aid to Agriculture, relative to gradual transfer of soil-conservation tech-

nical assistance functions from the national authority to the various states;

"Be It Further Resolved, that copies of this resolution be forwarded forthwith to the President of the United States, to the Chairman of the President's Commission on Intergovernmental Relations, and to the Senators and Representatives of the State of Iowa in the Nation's Capital."

SPECIAL ANNOUNCEMENT

Senator Knudson arose on a point of personal privilege and eulogized the late Governor Merriam, a native son of Iowa, who recently passed away in the State of California.

Senator Stuart of Lucas asked and received unanimous consent that the remarks of Senator Knudson be printed in the Senate Journal and that the Secretary of the Senate be instructed to forward copies of the Journal to the members of the family of the deceased.

SENATOR KNUDSON: I rise on a point of personal privilege to pay homage to a former Iowan, Frank F. Merriam.

Frank F. Merriam was born December 22, 1865, in a two room log cabin on a forty acre farm near Hopkinton, Delaware County, the eldest of a family of eleven children. He attended Lenox College, putting himself through by odd jobs and was graduated in 1888. He taught school in Iowa and Nebraska and was later an Iowa publisher. He was a member of the Iowa House of Representatives in 1896. He was a member of the committee which investigated the Board of Control with an idea of instituting the Board in Iowa.

Only the states of New York and Wisconsin had Boards of Control at that time, and the Iowa Board of Control was later formed.

Mr. Merriam was elected Auditor of State, Supervisor of Banking and State Insurance Commissioner which offices were combined at that time. In the year of 1903 he moved to the State of California where he was elected to the House of Representatives in 1916 and served five

sessions. In 1928 he was elected to the State Senate, and in 1930 was elected Lieutenant Governor of California. In 1934 he served out the unexpired term of the Governor who passed away and he was later elected Governor in his own right. Mr. Merriam passed away April 25, 1955, at his home in California.

Out of my acquaintance with and in contemplation of the life of Frank Merriam, I wish to quote the following:

"He has achieved success

He has lived well, laughed often and loved much

He has gained the respect of intelligent men and the love of little children

He has left the world better than he found it.

Whether by an improved poppy, a perfect poem or a rescued soul,

Whose life was an inspiration,

Whose memory is a benediction."

In my humble judgment, this typifies Frank F. Merriam.

Such notice shall state as nearly as practicable the extent of the contract or of the proposed improvement. Pursuant to said notice and at such time and place as is fixed therein, the governing body shall consider the form of contract, the said plans and specifications, and offers and propositions submitted therewith, together with any objection thereto by any interested party, and at such hearing or any adjournment thereof, shall have the power to adopt such offer or offers, propositions or bids, and enter into such contracts as they shall deem to be to the best interest of the municipality."

4. By striking from line 4 of section 6, the word and figure "five (5)" and insert in lieu thereof the word and figure "three (3)".

5. By striking the following from lines 6, 7, 8 and 9 of section 6: "and not more than three (3) of said trustees in any municipal corporation divided into wards shall be residents of the same ward".

Whereas the citizens of Burlington and Des Moines County do propose to celebrate the centennial anniversary of that momentous occasion on May 31 of this year and

Whereas many cities and towns along the main line of the Burlington Railroad have made plans to join in this celebration along with the Burlington Railroad.

RECONSIDERATION OF SENATE FILE 29

"Section 1. There is hereby created a legislative research bureau under a full-time director of legislative research. Said director shall be appointed by a legislative committee composed of three (3) senators, two (2) from the majority party and one (1) from the minority party, appointed by the president of the senate and three (3) members of the house of representatives, two (2) from the majority party and one (1) from the minority party, appointed by the Speaker of the House and approval of said appointment shall be subject to confirmation by two-thirds of the members of the senate in executive session. His term of office shall be for four (4) years ending June 30 of the fourth year following his appointment. He shall devote his entire time to the duties of his office and his salary shall be not to exceed seventy-five hundred dollars (\$7,500.00) per year.

"Sec. 2. Vacancies in the office of director of legislative research shall be filled in the same manner as original appointment and shall be for the unexpired balance of the term.

"Sec. 3. The director shall employ necessary assistants at such salaries as shall be approved by the legislative committee named in section one (1) hereof.

"Sec. 4. The office of the legislative research bureau shall be at the seat of government and office space, supplies and equipment shall be furnished by the executive council and all salaries and expenses are to be paid by the budget and financial committee from the contingent fund provided for the budget and financial control committee.

"Sec. 5. The legislative research bureau shall co-operate with all members of the legislature and all committees approved by the legislature, and its specific duties shall be as follows:

"1. It shall serve as a research agency for any legislative committee.

"2. It shall make research studies and limited preliminary reports of factual material on such state governmental problems as may be deemed advisable by any member of the General Assembly during legislative session and in the interim between sessions. The free distribution of such reports shall be limited to two hundred fifty (250) copies to be distributed to members of the legislature and to state departments upon request. All such research studies shall be confined to state governmental problems.

"3. It shall serve as a bill drafting agency available to all members of the General Assembly and during legislative sessions shall co-operate with any extra bill drafting service provided in said sessions.

"4. All factual material and research findings requested shall be made available to the members of the legislature without any recommendations from the legislative research bureau.

"5. Each officer, board, commission, department and agency of the state government or any of its political subdivisions, or any state educational institutions or any political subdivisions of state educational institutions shall furnish such information to the research bureau as it may request.

"Sec. 6. This Act being deemed of immediate importance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage and publication in the Daily Reporter, a newspaper published at Sioux City, Iowa, and in the Diagonal Reporter, a newspaper published at Diagonal, Iowa."

SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION 33

By Committee on Board of Parole

A Concurrent Resolution to urge a study of the parole system in Iowa:

Whereas, without reflection on any individual on the state parole board, the General Assembly feels that the parole system in Iowa is reactionary and lagging behind modern concepts of rehabilitation of criminals, and

Whereas, the national average in the percentage of prisoners restored to a useful place in society in 1953 was 54.8 per cent, while the Iowa percentage was 36.2 per cent for the same year or 18.6 per cent below the national average, and

Whereas, Professor Walter A. Lunden of the Department of Sociology at Ames, Iowa, has stated that "the entire parole system in Iowa needs serious reorganization," and

Whereas, aside from the humanitarian aspect of better rehabilitation of prisoners, the economic factor needs consideration since it costs five hundred to seven hundred dollars each year to keep a prisoner at the penitentiary, and

Whereas, the General Assembly feels that consideration should be given to legislation providing for a full-time board of parole since the present board was able to give only 27 days in 1954 to interviewing prisoners at Fort Madison and since lifers have heretofore been under the exclusive jurisdiction of the Governor no consideration has been given to them by the board—some have never been interviewed, and

Whereas, a full-time board would cost very little more than is now expended on the present part-time board, and

Be It Further Resolved: That in the interim, the parole board strive to place the State of Iowa in a more favorable position in respect to the rehabilitation of prisoners as compared to the national record.

MR. PRESIDENT: According to the House Concurrent Resolution in which two members of the Senate were named to attend the Atomic Test in Nevada, we do, hereby, make our report:

We arrived in Las Vegas the morning of April 23, 1955, retested, and attended the briefing on that day as well as other briefings in regard to the "test." Considerable installations by Civil Defense have been made, as well as by the Army. United States Army effort to demonstrate the ability of soldiers—in the Infantry, Artillery and now Armor—to live and fight with atomic weapons.

In this particular demonstration, the Army proposed to show for the first time how Armor, with proper deployment and regard for safety, can use the destructive force of an atomic blast to effect casualties, damage and shock on an enemy force; effect a break in the enemy's main line of resistance, and exploit such a "hole" for a breakthrough operation similar to the one led by the late General George S. Patton, Jr., following an aerial bombardment at St. Lo in World War II.

Tankmen, manning 55 medium-gunned, M-48 tanks, named in honor of General Patton, will be in their vehicles only 3,100 yards from "ground zero" when the atomic blast is detonated. Following the explosion, they will crank up their motors and move forward in a realistic combat attack, taking advantage of the elements of surprise and shock to roll back the broken lines of a theoretical enemy.

Four hundred yards behind the tanks, crouched in trenches 3,500 yards from the "shot tower," Infantry soldiers will wait for the signal to move up. Still another 400 yards back, 3,900 yards from the actual blast, armored Infantry troops, depending on the protection of their armored Infantry vehicles, will also be poised for immediate advance.

This operation of men and machines represents the first "atomic breakthrough" in military history. It will serve to add new versatility to the Army's growing atomic combat capabilities.

The Task Force, 800 soldiers assembled at Camp Irwin, is made up of elements of the 723rd Tank Battalion and smaller support units of armored Artillery, Infantry and Engineers. The entire task force, 278 tanks and trucks, moved to the demonstration site from Camp Irwin via a three-day, 170 mile, cross-country march across the Mojave Desert and through Death Valley; the longest tactical move of its kind on record.

Prior to their arrival here, soldiers of the task force displayed a lively interest in atomic weapons during a series of pre-maneuver lec-

tures on what they must do to survive in close proximity to the atom's flash, blast and radiation. They were pleased particularly that they had been chosen to be the first tankmen to participate in such a demonstration. True to the spirit of their branch, Armor, they showed great respect—but no fear—for the new weapon.

The Air Force was participating in the atomic testing business; first, because it accumulates information on the effects of atomic weapons which is essential in designing quality aircraft, weapons and associated equipment. Second, because atomic testing serves as a proving ground for its tactics and for the training of its atomic aircrews. And third, because the entire atomic testing program requires Air Force support in such fields as air transport and supply, collection of atomic cloud samples, dropping test devices from aircraft and tracking of the atomic cloud. Each of these aircraft must arrive in the test area at a specific time, and aircraft involved in the pre-shot phase of the operation must be at a specific point in space at H-Hour.

Most spectacular of the ARDC missions is the atomic cloud sampling project. Specially equipped F-84 jet fighters and a B-57 jet bomber will penetrate the atomic cloud shortly after detonation. They open filter traps in their wing tanks, collect cloud specimens, close the filters and race back to the base. There the samples removed by a special ARDC ground unit, placed in lead boxes and flown by ARDC courier aircraft to AEC laboratories for radio chemical analysis. The crews flying these high speed jet fighters belong to AFSWC's 4926th Sampling Squadron, the only unit of its kind in the Air Force.

ELECTRIC EQUIPMENT

Delicate electronic and other communications equipment, including a complete 250-watt AM radio station actually operating on a Conelrad emergency civil defense frequency, will undergo a severe vulnerability test in "Operation Cue."

To determine the general effects of nuclear explosions on civilian communications equipment, and the most common types of damage to be expected, an extensive variety of electrical instruments, mobile and fixed radio communications equipment, radio receivers and special equipment of several kinds has been installed or placed in typical residences or commercial buildings on the main test line. The equipment, which also includes a typical suburban telephone switchboard, has been placed in positions which approximate, as closely as possible, those in which it would be found in most commercial buildings.

Susceptibility of radio transmitting and receiving antennas to blast damage from the nuclear detonation also is expected to be shown by several kinds of radio antennas which have been installed near the buildings on the test line. The largest and most noticeable antennas in the firing area will be two-guyed, base-insulated antennas and two self-supporting communication towers provided by Stainless, Inc.

OPEN SHOT TO TEST FURNISHED HOMES

The following types of residences will be tested in Operation Cue:
1. Single story, frame rambler without basement.

This residence is typical of basementless, one story frame construc-

tion built on a concrete slab, except that the bathroom is constructed with reinforced concrete walls and ceiling so that it may serve as the family shelter.

2. Two-story, center hall, masonry house with basement.

This dwelling consists of walls built up of one outer layer of brick with four-inch cinder block backing, typical of much construction throughout the nation.

3. Single-story, reinforced, masonry basementless house.

This house, one of two types sponsored by participating industries, is made of eight-inch masonry block, steel reinforced. The design meets California earthquake requirements and is FHA approved. The house is built on a concrete slab, and in addition has a precast concrete slab roof.

4. Single-story, precast, concrete slab, basementless residence.

This house is of precast concrete wall panels erected on a concrete pier type footing with concrete floor slab poured after erection of wall panels. The roof is also precast concrete slab. The house conforms to California earthquake construction requirements and is FHA approved.

5. Redesigned, two-story, frame house with basement.

The effects of a nuclear explosion on the two residences exposed during Operation Doorstep in 1953 were carefully analyzed following the shot. The analysis indicated the main points of failure or weakness. Consideration was then given to whether a house of this type could be materially strengthened within a reasonable increase in cost to provide a significantly higher degree of blast resistance. Analysis of the redesign indicated that the house may be expected to fail at an overpressure of five pounds per square inch, but should suffer less damage at an overpressure of two p.s.i. The house nearest the tower was moved back to 4 pounds per square inch overpressure, while the house farthest from the tower was moved in to two and a half p.s.i. overpressure.

In Operation Cue, two of each residence type will be exposed. The objectives of the test are to determine ways of strengthening each type, to provide civil defense officials with target analysis information from which they may more accurately calculate the amount of damage which may be expected, in case of atomic attack over their cities, and to determine how persons living in houses of the types tested may best be protected from nuclear effects.

Most houses along the main test line are fully furnished. As in operation Doorstep, mannequins supplied as a public service by the L. A. Darling Company of Bronson, Michigan, serve as proxies for people who live in houses like these.

The furniture has been provided by the National Association of Furniture Manufacturers in cooperation with the Home Furnishings Industry Committee.

Designated as Civil Effects Test Project 35.2, the communications equipment tests are sponsored by the Federal Civil Defense Administration and the Radio-Electronics-Television Manufacturers Association and its member companies. The tests are expected to provide indications of the kind of post-disaster repair problems with which civil de-

fense and communications personnel may have to cope and some of the circumstances under which equipment will be destroyed beyond repair.

The relative vulnerability of electric devices used in homes, and identical power transmission facilities which were placed in moderately severe and lightly damaged positions will also be provided.

OPERATION CUE AS PROVIDED BY FEDERAL CIVIL DEFENSE ADMINISTRATION EFFECTS OF NUCLEAR WEAPONS

A great deal of information has been released over the past several years on the effects of atomic explosions, yet many of these effects are still poorly understood by the general public. For that reason, the principal effects of a nuclear explosion are reviewed, with a brief discussion of factors of particular importance to civil defense.

This entire section is based on information available in published sources. There is a widespread but erroneous view that most information on the effects of nuclear explosions is classified, and hence is not available to the general public. Information that exists only in classified form generally is information which deals with refinements of weapons effects. A considerable amount of gross information on any major effect is available in a number of publications.

The best reference in this field is still the basic handbook, "The Effects of Atomic Weapons." Despite the fact that this useful work was first published in 1950, queries daily to the Federal Civil Defense Administration indicate that it has not been widely studied or understood. A thoughtful reading will be of value to any person with civil defense responsibility. It is available from the Superintendent of Documents, Government Printing Office, Washington, D. C., at cost of \$1.25.

Because of uncertainties that would exist in any attack with nuclear weapons, too precise a refinement of civil defense plans is undesirable. Such refinement produces a kind of spurious accuracy which can be extremely misleading.

The uncertainties inherent in an attack situation are these:

(a) The power of an atomic weapon an enemy might use against any particular city. It can be assumed that an enemy is capable of producing nuclear devices of almost any desired power from a few thousand tons of TNT equivalent (kilotons) to many millions of tons (megatons). However, it is worldwide military practice to standardize on a comparatively few types of weapons. What standards an enemy chooses for nuclear devices must necessarily be a matter of conjecture. This means that city civil defense must have plans capable of meeting the situations caused by single thermonuclear weapons large enough to take out the entire city, and combinations of smaller weapons whose combined yields would produce the same effect; or single weapons or combination of weapons which might produce great damage without necessarily producing citywide devastation.

(b) By analysis of population and industrial concentrations within any target area, we are able to assume what we believe to be a logical aiming point for enemy attack. However, we do not know how complete the enemy's information may be or whether his attack assumptions are the same as ours.

(c) We do not know for what altitude an enemy might set his fuses.

Variation of the altitude of a burst of a given power can modify considerably the effects-distance relationships.

(d) It cannot be assumed that enemy bombing would be entirely accurate.

(e) It should also be recognized that much civil defense planning is based on an assumption which is known to be inexact. This is the assumption of symmetrical behavior of a nuclear burst—that propagation of blast and other effects is equal in all directions—as demonstrated by the concentric circles commonly used in target analysis. The concept of symmetry and the use of the resulting concentric circles for target analysis is most useful and, in fact, is the most practical basis available for planning. However, propagation of nuclear effects, particularly blast, would almost never be symmetrical over a target because of variations in the terrain, including the presence of built-up areas, and, to some extent, the behavior of the weapon itself. It would be almost impossible to accurately analyze the effects of terrain and built-up areas on blast propagation even if ground zero were known precisely. Hence, while civil defense is limited to the assumption of symmetry for lack of more precise data, it should be kept in mind that this assumption creates an initial margin of error in all planning.

These factors necessarily restrict civil defense planning to gross effects. For that reason, in considering the effects of a nuclear weapon, it is more practical to deal in round numbers than in precise numbers refined to several decimal places.

PHENOMENA OF A NUCLEAR EXPLOSION

The almost instantaneous release of energy by fission or fusion of atoms in a nuclear explosion is accompanied by the production of extremely high temperatures. The energy emitted covers a wide range of wave lengths from infrared through the visible to ultra-violet, and beyond. Much of this radiation is absorbed by the air immediately surrounding the burst, with the result that the air becomes heated to incandescence.

The burst begins to appear after a few millionths of a second (microseconds) as a ball of fire. The energy continues to radiate and, as the temperature of the air through which it passes is raised, the ball of fire increases in size. After about one ten-thousandth of a second (0.1 millisecond), the temperature is about 300,000 degrees C. At a distance of 10,000 yards the luminosity would be approximately 100 times that of the sun as seen from earth in the case of a 20-kiloton burst.

As the ball of fire grows, a shock-wave develops in the air. Soon the shock wave breaks away, and after the lapse of 10 seconds the shock wave has traveled about 12,000 feet. By this time the ball of fire has floated upward about 1,500 feet.

Nuclear radiation is emitted starting at the instant of detonation and continuing for an appreciable time. For civil defense purposes, however, it may be considered that danger from this cause is essentially over within 90 seconds, with the greatest amount of radiation being emitted within the first few seconds. This radiation consists of highly penetrating neutrons and gamma rays, and less damaging beta and alpha particles which are absorbed quickly by the air.

In a dawn shot, such as the one planned for Operation Cue, one interesting initial effect will undoubtedly be seen. Soon after the detonation a violet-colored glow may be observed. It is believed that the intense gamma radiation causes ionization of the nitrogen and oxygen of the air. During a complex series of events, the excited nitrogen and oxygen molecules return to their normal state by emitting energy in the form of visible radiation. The radiation falls to a large extent in the violet region of the spectrum. This constitutes the violet glow.

As the ball of fire rises and loses its luminosity, a doughnut-shaped cloud emerges. Occasionally some of the violet glow continues through this phase, and there is in addition noticeable color ranging from brown to peachlike tints. While some of this brownish color may be caused by dirt sucked up with the rising thermal column, the tints also occur in airbursts and are apparently due to nitrogen dioxide, a brown gas formed by the combination of nitrogen and oxygen at high temperatures. This information takes place at temperatures between approximately 1,700 degrees and 4,700 degrees C.

Because of its high temperature and low density, the ball of fire rises at a rate that very often surprises people whose previous experience with detonations has been limited to motion pictures taken at slow motion speeds. As the ball of fire rises, it is cooled. At first the cooling is mainly due to loss of energy as thermal radiation, but as time progresses the temperature is lowered as result of expansion of the fireball gas, and by mixing of the gases with the surrounding cooler air. As cooling takes place, constituents of the rising ball of gases condense, forming water droplets and a metallic smoke made up of solid particles of varying sizes. In addition, if a device is detonated low enough for the fireball to touch the ground, a considerable amount of dirt and other material is vaporized and sucked up. Small solid particles of these materials separate out as cooling takes place.

At first, particles are carried upward by the rising fireball, but after a time they begin to fall. An ascending and expanding column of smoke forms. It consists of water droplets, radioactive oxides of the fission products, and more or less debris. This column is the "stem" of the mushroom.

One interesting phenomenon is the formation of an icecap. This cap appears at the top of the "mushroom" and sometimes appears to flow down over the sides. The cap is composed of myriad small ice crystals caused when gases above the mushroom expand and are cooled, causing water vapor in the air to be converted to ice.

BLAST EFFECTS

An explosion generally depends upon the production of very hot gases in a restricted space with a consequent production of high pressure. A nuclear explosion is no exception. The very hot gases produced start to move outward toward the atmosphere where the pressure is lower. The great expansion which occurs then pushes away the surrounding atmosphere. This action initiates a pressure wave. The front of the wave compresses and heats the atmosphere through which it moves. Since the wave disturbance moves faster through air which is heated and compressed, the after portion of the wave tends to catch up with

the front. As a consequence the wave front gets steeper and steeper, and within a very short period it becomes abrupt and may be considered as a moving wall of highly compressed air. This shock front on the pressure wave initiates a series of events that causes most of the damage to structures.

As the pressure wave propagates outward it tends to slow down, eventually slowing to the speed of sound in the surrounding atmosphere. This slowing is due to loss of energy. The same loss also lowers the effective pressure of the shock front. Behind the shock front the pressure drops until it becomes negative and a suction phase develops. This negative or suction phase follows the positive or overpressure phase.

Duration of the shock wave increases with distance from the first. For example, in a 20-kiloton burst, the positive phase of the shock wave lasts only about one-half second at 2,000 feet, but lasts for a full second at about 7,800 feet.

Some test objects in Operation Cue will be seen at a distance where they are expected to receive five pounds per square inch overpressure from this particular explosion. An explosion of a different size would produce five p.s.i. at a different distance and the duration of the shock wave would be different; a larger burst would produce a longer five p.s.i. pulse; a smaller burst one of shorter duration.

When the shock front reaches the rear edges of a structure it spills in behind the structure and completely envelops it in the high pressure air mass. At this point, the blast wind becomes the predominant factor in tending to push the structure over or collapse it. This force is called the drag loading and can be roughly compared to the loading upon an object in the airstream of a wind tunnel. Since the positive phase of the blast wave increases in duration with an increase in burst size, it can be seen that in the case of a megaton burst there would be a considerably longer drag from a shock wave with a peak overpressure of five p.s.i. than would be the case in a 20-kiloton or "nominal" burst. This drag loading may greatly increase the damage to structures which have only partially failed as a result of the shock loading.

In view of the variations of pressure, distance, and duration of effect with variations in bomb power, it seems more practical from the civil defense viewpoint to use damage-versus-distance criteria than to discuss damage in terms of specific overpressures. The A, B, and C damage zones described in civil defense publications are damage-versus-distance zones.

The question is often raised whether the negative (suction) phase of an explosion causes damage. The answer is that it does. The arrival of the negative phase results in the lowering of the pressure on the outside of a structure below the entrapped normal atmospheric pressure inside the structure. The structure will therefore be stressed outwardly and a comparatively flimsy structure, already weakened by the positive phase loading may even explode. The effect on people fortunately, is not analogous. There is little evidence that this negative phase would produce any significant number of casualties.

There has been some tendency to compare the dynamic loading from an atomic burst with wind loadings on structures. The effect is different,

since wind is applied more gradually. It is true that wind gusts of hurricane force can load a structure rapidly, but even this loading is extremely slow when compared to the speed of loading resulting from a rapidly moving shock front.

It should be explained that this description of the behavior of a shock wave is oversimplified. There are other considerations that contribute to damage. For example, shock-wave behavior, as described in this brief section, applies only in an infinite homogeneous atmosphere. Reflection characteristics, which may double or treble the load on the face of a structure, are not taken into account.

In "The Effects of Atomic Weapons" the yield of the so-called nominal bomb, equivalent to 20,000 tons of TNT, is taken as a model and extensive data are given for it. Scaling laws to allow prediction of the effects of bombs of other sizes are included. While some of the quantitative statements in the original volume are being corrected in the next revision, they are not of great significance from the civil defense point of view. Hence, for civil defense planning, these scaling laws may be applied for bursts of any size, including weapons in the megaton range. The basic equation for blast scaling is as follows:

$$\frac{r}{r_0} \equiv \left\{ \frac{W}{W_0} \right\}^{1/3}$$

Here r_0 and W_0 represent the radial distance from and the energy of the reference explosion. Use of this equation is illustrated by a specific example.

During Operation Doorstep in the spring of 1953, it was announced that the device to be exploded was equivalent to 15 kilotons of TNT. It was also announced that the house at the far range, 7,500 feet from the explosion, was expected to receive an overpressure equivalent to two pounds per square inch. For the example, assume that a city Civil Defense Director wishes to know the areas in which houses would be expected to receive approximately similar damage in his city from a burst of eight times the power—say one of 120 kilotons' equivalent. The reference burst in this case is the one that took place in Operation Doorstep. Therefore, the radial distance of the house, 7,500 feet, is substituted for the figure r_0 . The figure for 15 kiloton equivalent is substituted for the figure W_0 . Since we wish to scale these data to a 120-kiloton burst, the figure of 120 is substituted for W . Solution of the equation is as follows:

$$\frac{r}{7,500} = \frac{3 \sqrt[3]{120}}{\sqrt[3]{15}}$$

$$r = 7,500 \times \sqrt[3]{8} = 7,500 \times 2 = 15,000 \text{ ft.}$$

(twice the distance for an eight-fold increase in bomb yield).

The time of travel of the shock wave is not generally understood by many people. The concept of "duck and cover," which would still be of great value in case of attack without warning, is based on the comparatively large time interval between the burst and arrival of the shock wave at a given point. Even relatively close to the burst, in the area where the shock wave is traveling faster than the speed of sound, it takes a few seconds for the shock wave to travel a mile.

RADIOLOGICAL SAFETY AND NEVADA TESTS, LAS VEGAS

The detonation of a nuclear device inherently must be accompanied by the release of large quantities of energy that appear in the form of blast waves, and radiations, both thermal and nuclear. Since there are no known ways of obtaining certain information without actually testing the nuclear devices, the problem then becomes one of reducing to a minimum any possible hazard to the public that may result from these three principal effects.

As a first step in meeting safety criteria, the Atomic Energy Commission detonates only the small nuclear devices at a site in Nevada that was selected after extensive studies were made of suitable areas in the United States. This site is closed to the public for reasons of general safety as well as security. Aerial and surface surveys are made prior to each shot to ensure that no one has wandered into the site where the effects of the nuclear detonation might be hazardous.

The time of detonation is publicly announced before each shot. In addition if there seems to be a possibility that the blast may be greater than usual in a particular community the people are advised to open the windows to help equalize the air pressure. No one off the test site has been injured by the blast either directly or indirectly. In fact, the detonation of over forty atomic explosions at the Nevada Test Site has caused property damage amounting to only \$48,000 of allowed claims.

The thermal radiation, at distances away from the test site, is insignificant except for the flash of light. The public is advised not to look directly at the fireball except through very dark glasses and is cautioned never to use binoculars. To assist the passing motorists, roadblocks are established shortly before a detonation to inform them of the expected flash of light. Likewise a circle about 65 miles is established around the Nevada Test Site, in which aircraft travel is restricted from 30 minutes before the planned time of detonation until 30 minutes afterward. To date there have been no known cases of serious eye damage to the general public off the test site or to civilians on-site. Four members of the Armed Services—all of them participants in the test operations—did receive eye injuries on site during the 1952 and 1953 test series in Nevada. The Department of Defense advised the Atomic Energy Commission that three of the military personnel received only minor eye injuries which completely healed, and the fourth suffered serious eye injury through his own negligence in disregarding safety instructions.

Of the three possible effects of a nuclear detonation the one that has received the greatest attention has been radioactive fallout. It would not be appropriate here for an extensive or technical description of this phenomenon, but there are a few basic facts that should be made clear.

At the time of a nuclear detonation, radioactive isotopes are produced and swept into the air. If the detonation is high above the ground the radioactive particles formed will be small and will descend only very

slowly to the earth's surface. In the meantime they are greatly diluted by being spread over large areas, even around the world, and at the same time they will lose a great proportion of their activity by decay. For example, the level of radioactivity at one hour is about 135 times *less* than at one minute. If the detonation is near the surface of the earth so that the fireball touches the ground, great amounts of the larger sized particles are swept into the air and will descend more rapidly to the earth in areas near the site of detonation. They too will lose their activity with equal rapidity as do the smaller particles and eventually the amount of radiation they emit will be indistinguishable from the normal background radiation.

It is important that we realize that the phenomenon of radiation did not first appear with the advent of the atomic bomb. Probably since man existed he has been bombarded with radiation from naturally occurring substances on the earth and from cosmic rays coming from space. The biological effects of radiation from fallout are no different than those from natural background sources. We are not confronted with some new and strange phenomenon, but rather we are dealing only with additional amounts of the same general kinds of radiation. What needs to be evaluated is how much *more* radiation has been added due to fallout and what does this mean in layman's terms of biological effects.

We must use some unit to measure the amount of radiation and we call it a roentgen. The definition of a roentgen is rather technical and does not indicate directly the biological effects of radiation, so that probably it would be more advantageous to express the amount of radiation in terms of the number of roentgens that one may receive from commonly known sources. For example a normal chest x-ray will deliver about 0.1 roentgen, and in the course of one's normal lifetime about 10 roentgens will be received from natural background and causes.

Through the extensive use of x-rays in the past as well as more recent data gleaned from greatly diversified experiments with atomic energy and radioisotopes, we have come a long way in our understanding of the biological effects of radiation. Certainly not all of the answers are known today, but we are in a position to make some fairly reliable estimates for some of these effects. They will be considered under two categories: first, the effects on the individual himself and, second, the inheritance of the result of any radiation damage to the germ cell. These are known as somatic and genetic effects.

SOMATIC EFFECTS

About twenty-five roentgens are required to produce any detectable biological damage. This injury is in the form of some minor blood changes that are neither serious nor permanent. At about 100 roentgens, temporary radiation sickness might be expected in a small percentage of the individuals and with 250 to 300 roentgens delivered in a short time there probably would be some deaths. If the time of delivery of any given radiation dose is extended, then appreciably greater amounts would be required to produce the same effects. This is due to the simple fact of body repair of some of the damage.

How do these quantities compare with the actual radiation doses received by the people in the United States resulting from fallout? Since

we are concerned with each and every individual it would not be fair to quote averages when evaluating these somatic effects. The highest known estimated radiation dose from fallout from all nuclear tests to any locality in the United States where anyone was living (about fifteen people) has been about eight roentgens—and I hasten to add that this amount was delivered over many days and weeks. Because of the effect of this long time delivery, the radiation dose was probably at least ten times *less* than the amount required to produce even minor and transitory blood changes and so far below the amount necessary to produce temporary radiation sickness that it is difficult to estimate. The highest radiation dose to any community to date for the current series is one and one-half roentgens. There was another location where the accumulated total dose was estimated to be about three roentgens. There are or were some transient railroad workers living there. It is not known how long they will work or live at this location, but at the most they will accumulate only about three roentgens. This is within the operational guide of three and nine-tenths roentgens.

It is not unusual for the amount of fallout, even at some distance from the test site, to be sufficient to register on such sensitive instruments as a Geiger counter. There have been occasions during the current series when this has occurred, for example, at Denver, Chicago and Niagara Falls, and in some instances have been the cause of concern on the part of those individuals reporting their findings to the press. These misgivings might be understandable unless the readings are properly interpreted. What is of concern here is not the transient rise in radiation levels, but rather the total radiation exposure that one might receive. For example, it has been reported this spring that a counter temporarily registered *forty* times above the normal background level, yet the total additional radiation dose was only a few *thousandths* of a roentgen—an insignificant amount in terms of the health.

The question may be raised as to the possible hazards from inhalation or ingestion of the radioactive materials. A vast amount of data has been collected and analyzed dealing with air and water concentrations of fallout material and the preponderance of evidence supports the conclusions that the internal hazard is secondary to the external radiation doses. For example, the highest concentration of fallout found in the air anywhere outside the test site was such that the radiation dose delivered to the lungs would have been less than the dose that one receives in a month by breathing normal air containing naturally occurring radioactive substances. The highest concentration in water, found in an irrigation ditch, was sixty times *less* than the maximum permissible concentration (a value which itself contains a large safety factor), even if the water had been stored up and made the sole source of supply for a lifetime.

Genetic Effects

The evaluation of the genetic effects is made quite difficult due to the uncertainties in our fundamental knowledge in this field. There is not unanimity of opinion among recognized geneticists, but certain facts have become widely accepted. Again, it would be inappropriate here to attempt to discourse on genetics or even attempt a listing of the generally accepted facts. However, it is essential that we indicate a few.

1. Radiation can cause changes in the germ cells. These are called mutations and they are usually deleterious to the offspring.

2. Radiation is only one cause for mutations (and probably not the major one), nor would radiations from fallout produce any types of mutations not already known and occurring naturally.

3. The number of mutations undoubtedly depends upon the total amount of radiation received without regard to the length of time of delivery.

Again, we are not dealing with some new and strange phenomenon when we evaluate the effects of the radiations from fallout, but rather we ask ourselves how much more radiation has fallout contributed to that normally received every day from natural causes. Because of the very nature, or laws, of inheritance the appraisal of genetic effects lies not with the individual, but with large populations. What then has been the average exposure to the people of the United States from fallout?

Through the intensive efforts of the Atomic Energy Commission, a country-wide monitoring program of fallout provides an estimate to this question. The average exposure to the people of the United States to date from all tests, American, British and Russian, has been about one-tenth of a roentgen (incidentally, this is about the equivalent of the dose delivered to the chest from an x-ray). In other words, this is about 100 times *less* than the amount of radiation that people receive over a lifetime from natural causes. Since radiation accounts for only a part of the natural rate of mutations, this means that the added contribution to the mutation rate from all fallout to date has been considerably less than one per cent.

It is sometimes argued that doubling the natural mutation rate would produce a larger enough number of new mutations to be detectable in a population. Estimates of the total radiation dose necessary to double the natural mutation rate ranges from thirty to eighty roentgens. These values are 300 to 800 times larger than the total dose from all fallout to date.

But what if we continue our testing program every year? Once more we may compare the radiation doses from these anticipated fallouts to those received from natural causes. If we take the series of tests that produced the highest amount of fallout in the United States and assume that these would be repeated every year during the lifetime of an individual, the total dose received on an average by the people in the United States would be about one-tenth that from natural background causes. Again, since there are natural factors, other than radiation, that cause mutations, the possible increase in the rate of mutations from this amount of yearly fallout would be too small to be detected.

There are other aspects that might be discussed such as the radioactive strontium and iodine found in the fallout material, but analysis of the findings to date clearly indicates that the radioisotopes have not concentrated in hazardous amounts anywhere. What is further reassuring is to know that our extensive monitoring programs keep a day-by-day tabulation of fallout so that there can be no significant trend without our knowing it well in advance of any possible levels of concern.

This system of fore-warning is equally true for the more immediate fallout around the test site. More than 100 personnel from the Test

Organization devote their full time during testing periods to the task of directly protecting the public. Right now, there are in operation around the Nevada Test Site twelve fixed monitoring stations, six mobile teams, other radiac instruments, plus twenty-nine telemetering stations. These telemetering stations are quite unique in that one may place a telephone call in the normal manner to any one of the twenty-nine communities and receive back signals that are translated into radiation readings in a matter of seconds.

Thus, all of the detonations at the Nevada Test Site to date have caused eye injury to four participating military personnel, three temporarily and one serious, and a radiation exposure of thirty-nine roentgens to one guard who has shown no detectable injury. There have been no injuries to personnel off-site.

The only recognized radiation injury was in 1952 and 1953 when fallout occurred on some horses and cattle grazing between ten and twenty miles from the site of detonation. Claims amounting to \$5,900 were paid for these animals. As was indicated earlier, there were allowed claims, due to blast damage, of \$48,000. This makes a total of \$53,900 paid for damages and injury for forty-three nuclear detonations. This is about \$1,300 a shot—an insignificant sum compared to the value of the testing program to the United States.

We all recognize the absolute essentiality to our stockpile of nuclear weapons in the defense of our country. These do not come directly from the drawing board; they come by way of a series of long, hard steps of development, with the field testing as a critical link in the chain. We could not have reached our position today in nuclear weapons *nor can we maintain our advantage* without a continuing effort of development and testing. The potential risks involved in detonating thousands of tons of TNT equivalent are real; it would be foolhardy to pretend otherwise. The problem then becomes one of reducing to a minimum those potential risks. The facts given above attest to the success of conducting nuclear tests in Nevada without significant hazards to the public.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE TO NOTIFY THE HOUSE

Senator O'Malley reported that the committee appointed to notify the House that the Senate was ready to adjourn sine die had performed its duty and the committee was discharged.

President Elthon took the chair.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE TO NOTIFY THE GOVERNOR

Senator Lucas reported that the committee appointed to notify the Governor that the Senate was ready to adjourn sine die had performed its duty and that the Governor had sent the following message:

As the Fifty-sixth General Assembly draws to a close, I would like to take this opportunity to thank the individual Senators and Representatives who have worked so diligently and faithfully these past months. Your legislature has met the problems of Iowa honestly and courageously and has presented a sound, constructive, and forward-looking program which will mean a greater Iowa for all of us.

The legislature has put an end to deficit spending and has provided the revenues necessary to give us better schools, improved state institutions and an accelerated road program. Increased expenditures for our public schools and for our state institutions of higher learning will prove to be an excellent investment for the entire state and will enable Iowa to maintain its place as a leader in the all important field of education. Likewise the monies to be spent in our state institutions will enable us to accelerate our program for the care and treatment of the mentally ill, our crippled children and the handicapped. All of us, of course, are willing to help our more unfortunate fellow citizens, for this is an American tradition of brotherhood, but we should also remember that our accelerated program in this field will restore thousands of our men and women to useful and productive lives and thus benefit the entire state. The legislature has also passed an enabling act which will permit us to receive additional federal funds for medical and hospital care.

Your legislature has recognized the need for an accelerated road and highway program for the state and the additional monies to be collected will be wisely and conscientiously spent by your state highway commis-

sion in order that we may improve as fast as possible our vast network of primary highways. We are pledged to widen our eighteen foot pavements and our narrow bridges throughout the state.

This session of the legislature has also established a toll road authority and now we stand ready to negotiate with any sister state as regards a toll road across Iowa. Any toll road to be built will be self-liquidating and will be financed by the actual users of the road, not by the general taxpayers of Iowa.

Your legislature has been vitally concerned with the need for study and examination in various fields of state government. For that reason it has established several committees or agencies which will begin work shortly and whose reports and recommendations should prove to be of great value to Iowa. We have established first of all a tax study committee whose job it will be to examine and evaluate the entire tax structure of Iowa and whose further task it will be to make recommendations to the legislature in order that we may be certain that we have in Iowa a tax system fair and equitable for all.

The legislature has also brought into being a legislative research council and it is my expectation that this agency will provide us with information and research that will bring us increased economy and efficiency in all phases of state administration. We have also created the post of judicial statistician as a means of obtaining information concerning the work loads in our various courts. The data received through this agency will strengthen our judicial system and at the same time result in tax savings for the state.

The problems of water rights, irrigation and drainage affect all Iowa and a special study committee has been established to cope with these particular matters.

As Iowa continues to grow industrially we find ourselves with an ever-increasing labor population and the legislature has recognized this fact through the passage of several bills which should be of great benefit to our people. Our workmen's compensation payments have been increased from \$28.00 per week to \$32.00 per week and the unemployment compensation payments have likewise been increased from \$26.00 to \$30.00 per week. The legislature has also extended the benefits of unemployment compensation to some sixty-five thousand new workers.

All of us, of course, are aware of the importance of conservation in this rich agricultural state and our legislature has improved and expanded the state soil conservation and water shed program. It has also wisely passed legislation which will give state tax credit for expenditures made by farmers in soil conservation.

Iowans are grateful to those young citizens of our state who served their country in Korea and the legislature has passed several measures pertaining to Korean veterans. Two of these measures provide Korean veterans with benefits relating to tax exemption and civil service status while the third puts the question of a bonus for Korean veterans squarely before the people of Iowa who will have an opportunity now to vote on this important issue.

It is important that we continue in Iowa to have well qualified and able county officials and judges of our various courts and the legislature

has wisely voted to increase the pay for county officials and for district and supreme court judges. These compensation increases are wise investments in good government.

The legislature has dealt at length with matters of taxation and has passed several measures which will aid us in tax collection and tax administration. A simplified state income tax form has been adopted and the soldiers exemption file by our veterans will now be filed annually so as to stop abuse by non-veterans. Another bill which should be of great value strengthens the twenty gallon gasoline limitation law now in effect.

We have also for the first time provided for full payment of agricultural land tax credit as a means of equalizing property taxes used for education. I am happy to report also that the legislature has provided for the expansion of the Iowa Development Commission and that this agency will therefore be better equipped than ever before to continue and expand its work in promoting the development and growth of our state.

The legislature has recognized the need for an examination of the problems of our minority groups and has recommended that the Governor appoint a study committee to investigate the situation of minorities and job discrimination. I am most happy to cooperate with the legislature in establishing such a committee.

Your legislature has had the ability to act quickly on matters of great urgency and has therefore passed the necessary legislation so as to make certain that no child in Iowa will ever be deprived of the anti-polio Salk vaccine.

The legislature has taken cognizance of the problems of highway safety and has, therefore, by means of a resolution urged communities to give added attention to driver education. Also passed is a bill which will strengthen the enforcement of our driving laws by providing for mandatory suspension of a driver's license upon two reckless driving convictions.

Iowa is in one sense in competition with each of her sister states. We compete with them for new citizens, new business and new industry. In this competition there is no such thing as standing still. We either forge ahead or lag behind. I am confident that the legislative program adopted by the Fifty-sixth General Assembly will enable our great state to continue its program and advance and to maintain its position as a leader in state government.

MEMORIALS

NICHOLAS BALKEMA

MR. PRESIDENT: Your committee, appointed to prepare a suitable memorial commemorating the life, character and public service of the late Honorable Nicholas Balkema, begs leave to submit the following report:

Nicholas Balkema was born at Gibbsville, Sheboygan County, Wisconsin, on April 7, 1865, and died at Sioux Center, Iowa, on January 29, 1954, at the age of 88 years.

Mr. Balkema attended district school at Gibbsville, Wisconsin, and graduated from Sheboygan Falls High School. He removed to Newkirk, Iowa, in 1884. On December 9, 1886, he was united in marriage to Clara Van Rooyen of Newkirk, and to this union were born four daughters and three sons.

After coming to Iowa, Mr. Balkema taught school for a time, then entered the mercantile business at Newkirk and conducted the postoffice in connection therewith. In 1894, he removed to Sioux Center, where he conducted a similar business for many years, also owning a clothing store at Paullina. He became interested in the local bank at Sioux Center and served as its vice president. He also served on the city council and, for ten years, was president of the school board.

Mr. Balkema was elected to, and served in the Senate for six sessions, from 1909 to 1921, as Senator from the forty-ninth Iowa district, composed of the Counties of Sioux, Lyon, O'Brien, and Osceola. He was a Republican and a member of the Central Dutch Reformed Church, of which he was a charter elder.

After being occupied for 54 years by local business affairs and official interests, Mr. Balkema retired in 1941.

Survivors are Mrs. Balkema, Mrs. Fred DenBeste, Mrs. P. B. Mouw, and Clayton Balkema, all of Sioux Center; Dr. Walter Balkema of Sheldon, Iowa; Raymond Balkema of Burlington; and Mrs. Eardly Scheutz of Lincoln, Nebraska. One daughter, Mrs. Wm. B. Van Roekel, and two grandchildren, Alice DenBeste and Dorothy Ellen Balkema, have preceded him in death.

Therefore, Be It Resolved by the Senate of the Fifty-sixth General Assembly of the State of Iowa: That in the passing of the Honorable Nicholas Balkema, the state has lost an able and honored citizen and the Senate tenders, by this resolution, its sincere sympathy to the surviving members of his family, and

WILLIAM S. BEARDSLEY

MR. PRESIDENT: Your committee, appointed to prepare a suitable resolution commemorating the life, character and public service of the late Honorable William S. Beardsley, Governor of Iowa, begs leave to submit the following:

William S. Beardsley was born at Beacon, Iowa, located in Mahaska County, on May 18, 1901, the son of William and Carrie Shane Beardsley. He was fatally injured in an automobile accident at Des Moines, Iowa, on November 21, 1954, at the age of 53 years.

He was educated in the public schools at Birmingham, Iowa, in Van Buren County, and graduated from the Birmingham High School and the Bowen Institute of Pharmacy and Chemistry then located in Brunswick, Missouri.

He was united in marriage with Charlotte E. Manning of Birmingham. To them were born three sons and two daughters. One son, William, died in infancy.

Almost penniless when he came to New Virginia in 1922, he borrowed the money to buy a drug store. He paid for the store and then being a firm believer in the farm land of our beautiful state, purchased 900 acres of farm land near New Virginia. He moved to this farm in 1940 and continued to be actively engaged in its operation until his death.

He was elected Senator from Clarke and Warren Counties, serving in the Forty-fifth, Forty-fifth Extra, Forty-sixth, Forty-sixth Extra, Forty-seventh and Forty-eighth General Assemblies. At that time he thought he was out of politics, but when Harold Felton died from a heart attack at the beginning of the Fifty-second legislative session, a special election was called and Bill was elected to the House of Representatives from Warren County. He was elected Governor in 1948, re-elected in 1950 and re-elected in 1952, being the third man in 107 years of statehood to succeed himself to a third term. He was elected by the largest vote ever given a candidate for office of Governor in Iowa. Well loved by all those in New Virginia, he carried his home township in the 1948 race for Governor by 335 to 16.

He was a member of the Methodist Church, several Masonic bodies, I.O.O.F., and the American Academy of Political Science.

Mr. Beardsley had championed the cause of highway safety perhaps more than any other Governor and it was ironical that he should lose his life in a highway accident.

Mr. Beardsley is the only Governor of Iowa to pass away while in office. Services were held in the office at the State House where he had spent so many years, after which the body was taken to New Virginia, Iowa, for the funeral and burial.

Bill, as he was affectionately known to all, willingly devoted his time and effort not only to the affairs of the State of Iowa but to his own county and community as well. He was loved by all who knew him and some of his happiest hours were spent behind the counter in his drug store serving malted milks and soft drinks to his fellow townsmen.

He is survived by his wife, Charlotte; two sons, Blaine and Dan, both of New Virginia; two daughters, Mary (Mrs. Henry F. Schieg), Appleton, Wisconsin and Charlotte (Mrs. Doyle E. Stickel), New Virginia; a sister, Mrs. Morris Fisher, La Jolla, California, and four grandchildren.

Therefore, Be It Resolved by the Senate of the Fifty-sixth General Assembly: That in the passing of the Honorable William S. Beardsley, the people of the entire State of Iowa have sustained a great loss and the Senate expresses its appreciation of his character and public service and tenders, by this resolution, its sincere and heartfelt sympathy to his beloved family in their great sorrow and loss.

James M. Bell, 77, born March 28, 1876, one of Burlington's best known political figures since the turn of the century, died on Monday, August 3, 1953, in Burlington, Iowa.

He was a former mayor of Burlington, former State Senator, and Democratic candidate for Congress. He was often mentioned, too, for other posts, and late in 1950 was a candidate for the appointive post of Internal Revenue Collector for Iowa.

Mr. Bell, for years prominent in the councils of the Democratic party in Burlington, was also active in district and state political circles. He was recognized as a hard campaigner who pulled no punches; who was soft spoken, always courteous, ever pleasant.

"He was of the old school," a long time associate commented. "He was always in the thick of the fight. He remembered his friends, kept a watchful eye on his opponents."

While in the insurance business in Burlington for years, he was best known for political activity.

Twice he just missed being his party's choice for Congressman from the first district. Each time he led other candidates in the field, each time he fell short of the required 35 per cent of the total vote and each time he was counted out at his party's district convention.

He was a State Senator from 1934 to 1938, and then jumped to the Democratic nomination for Congress. In 1936 he led a field of four other candidates, but the nomination was thrown into the convention at Davenport and he lost out. In 1938 he again failed to get the required margin though he led the ticket and was counted out at the district convention at Iowa City.

Mr. Bell first held a public office when he was elected county auditor in 1901.

From 1912 to 1916 he was county Democratic chairman and served as Burlington mayor from 1916 to 1920. In more recent years he again sought the office of mayor, but without success.

Mr. Bell was born in New Boston, Illinois, but came to Burlington as a boy and spent most of his life here. He was the son of H. O. and Vashti Willits Bell.

As a youngster, when the family lived in Chicago, he was a cash boy for Marshall Field I, famed store owner, and following Field's longtime practice, shook hands each morning with his boss.

For 16 years, Mr. Bell traveled out of New York as a broker for the Borden Milk Company. In Burlington he operated in the stock and bond business on Third Street with a direct wire to Chicago. For many years he had been in the insurance brokerage business in Burlington.

He was of the Methodist faith, a member of the Eagles and an honorary member of the Elks. He at one time served in old Company H of the Iowa National Guard.

In 1925 he married Mrs. Julia Leake Steinbrecher. She survives as do two married daughters by a previous marriage, Mary and Betty, of Los Angeles, California; a stepson, Richard E. Steinbrecher of Chicago, Illinois, and three grandchildren.

Affectionately known as "Jim" Bell to his many friends and political associates throughout the State of Iowa, the Senator was active in a long span of Iowa history. His thorough and conscientious interest in civic affairs, and including service to his city as mayor, to his county as State Senator, and to his state as a public-spirited man of public affairs, never wavered or flagged. In victory or in defeat, in time of prosperity or in a period of depression, he never lost sight of the democratic ideal—that a representative form of government must call upon its best citizens and they must heed that call in order that representative democracy can survive. Always kindly in his manner, and interested in the problems that confronted the lowliest citizen or the most influential, never too busy in his own life to take the time out to review the passing scene with his friends and associates, "Jim" Bell, over the years of his life, set in motion a long series of recollections and reveries in the heart and affections of his fellow citizens. His was a ready and friendly humor; and his comment never forsook the limits of kindness and forbearance of the faults of others. Faithful in his civic duties, loyal in his soundness of the political principles he represented, "Jim" Bell passes

from the scene of his triumphs, a beloved figure whose memory shall not soon be forsaken.

In 1913 he purchased the two elevators and business in Chelsea. He was always interested in civic and political affairs, and was a life long Republican. He served on both rural and town school boards several terms. He served as Mayor of Chelsea from 1914 to 1918 and 1932 to 1936. He was elected State Senator for the Tama-Benton district on the Republican ticket and served one term from 1927 to 1931. He helped organize the Chelsea Savings Bank in 1936 serving continuously as its president from the time it was organized until his death.

Mr. Brush was always a man of great courage and one of the stories told of him concerns the dark days following his financial crash of 1929. He lost heavily at that time. After he had lost much of his property he went out to look over one of his farms which it appeared he would also lose. Asked what he was going to do, his reply was classic in showing his courage. He replied: "Well, I suppose some people would get a rope when they were hit as hard as we have been, but I reckon I'll just hang on. If I made it once, I guess I can do it again." "S. A.," as he was familiarly known, did hang on, and redeemed much of his losses.

Mr. Quirk joined the Methodist Church in early manhood and was active in the church and community affairs. He was the first president of the Sac County Farm Bureau and took an active part in politics. He was elected to the State Legislature in 1922, serving in the House of Representatives for three terms and then was elected to the Senate. While in the Senate he was appointed to fill a vacancy in the State Highway Commission where he served for two years.

Mr. Quirk was a member of the Sioux City Consistory and the Pioneer Lawmakers of Iowa, and a fifty year member of both the Masonic Lodge and the Order of the Eastern Star.

SENATOR W. N. SKOURUP

Wilbur Nielsen Skourup, 61, former Des Moines County State Senator, died of a heart attack at his White Acres farm near Spring Grove on Wednesday, at 3:45 p.m., February 10, 1954.

He had suffered from a heart condition for about three years. During 1950 he had been hospitalized for about a month but had continued active since. He had become ill at a recent Rotary Club meeting and was

assisted home. Tuesday he had overseen work on his farm. He owned both the farm and White Acres service station at Spring Grove.

Mr. Skourup was a representative of the Standard Oil Company when the family moved to Burlington from Davenport in 1938. After living in the city for two years, the family moved to the Spring Grove farm.

From 1947 to 1951 he was Republican State Senator from Des Moines County. During the 1951 state legislature, he represented the American Automobile Association in Des Moines. In 1949 and 1950 he was sales manager for the automobile association, with his territory covering about half of the state.

In connection with his auto association work, he was active in the promotion of highway safety and highway patrol work.

Mr. Skourup was a member of the original committee which brought the potentials of Geode State Park to the attention of the state legislature and then pressed for the funds for its development.

An overseas veteran of World War I, he was a member of the Acacia fraternity, Rotary and Executive clubs, Chamber of Commerce, Junior Chamber of Commerce, American Legion, 40 & 8, and the V.F.W.

He was born in Morrison, Iowa, March 15, 1892, the son of J. H. and Anna Nielsen Skourup. On July 9, 1918, he married Rembert Harshbarger in Manhattan, Kansas.

Surviving are the widow; two sons, Wilbur N. Skourup, Jr., and John J. Skourup, both of Burlington; two grandchildren; three sisters, Anna Skourup and Mrs. Marie Wilson, both of Kansas City, Missouri, and Mrs. Agnes Wilmoth of Colony, Kansas. Several nieces also survive.

Quick to see the reason for an act; quick to respond to injustice or unfairness as he saw it; quick to recognize the call to duty, Senator Skourup did not spare his energies or his interests in the pursuit of principle. He came to the state senate in 1947, and served in those busy years following World War II. He had rounded out a successful career in business; his financial interests were varied; he was a leading citizen of his county when he was selected to represent his district in the General Assembly. He had a keen and alert mind, and was one to perceive the long range effects of his actions in legislative matters. Legislation concerning motor vehicles and highway problems were among his primary interests; much of the commendable legislation concerning these topics is now upon the statute books as the result of his untiring activity and intelligent and thoughtful approach to those subjects. His opinions were firm and were defended with vigor; his friendships were strong and lasting, transcending partisan lines in his defense of what was right. His attention and his efforts were always set to the achievement of ends worthy of high and impelling motives. His inherent kindness and gentleness of spirit never failed to temper a situation or a matter otherwise difficult. He enjoyed the exercise of civic responsibility; he did not turn away from a fair and even contest so long as he believed that he was fighting for the principle of right. The Senator was vigorously loyal to

our institutions and sought to support and strengthen them in every way.

His friends respected him for his outspoken courage; he served his party and his state to the full measure of his ability. At his death, we are reminded of the words of the poet:

"No man is an island, entire of itself, every man is a piece of the continent, a part of the main; if a clod be washed away by the sea, Europe is the less, as well as if a promontory were, as well as if a manor of thy friends or of thine own were; any man's death diminishes me, because I am involved in mankind, and therefore never send to know for whom the bell tolls; it tolls for thee."

Senator Skourup made substantial contribution to the improvement of his county and his state; the State of Iowa is a better place to live and to worship by reason of his devotion to it.

ED M. SMITH

MR. PRESIDENT: Your committee, appointed to prepare a suitable memorial commemorating the life and public service of the late Honorable Edward McMurray Smith, begs leave to submit the following report:

Edward McMurray Smith, editor of the Winterset Madisonian for 54 years, former Secretary of State, and State Senator, died at the Madison County Memorial Hospital in Winterset, October 26, 1953, after a short illness, at the age of 82 years.

A son of John M. and Jane Courtney Smith, he was born in Jackson County, Iowa, October 31, 1870. At the age of 16 years the family moved to Madison County, and he lived on the farm until he grew to manhood. He attended the rural schools, and took his higher education at Dexter Normal School in Dexter, Iowa, and Drake University, Des Moines, Iowa, after which he taught school. In 1898 he became County Superintendent of Schools, and at the close of his term, he purchased the Winterset Madisonian, and remained as its editor and publisher until his death.

He was married to Evalyn Crossley of Patterson, Iowa, June 1, 1898, and they established their home in Winterset, where they resided until

their deaths. They were the parents of four daughters; his wife and one daughter, Dorothy, preceded him in death. He was the last survivor of a family of four brothers.

Mr. Smith was active in Republican politics, and returned to the field of public service in 1916, when he was elected to the State Senate from the Adair-Madison County district, and served in the Thirty-seventh, Thirty-eighth, Thirty-ninth, Fortieth and Fortieth Extra General Assemblies. In 1928 he was appointed by Governor John Hammill to fill the vacancy in the office of Secretary of State, caused by the death of Walter C. Ramsay, and was elected for one term, serving until December, 1930.

His public service also had included a term as postmaster of Winterset, from 1904 to 1908. He was active in the Iowa State Press Association for many years, and was one of the early presidents, in 1923. In 1933 he received the Iowa Press Association's award as Iowa Master Editor, the second year in which that citation was made.

Mr. Smith took a deep interest in the affairs of his community. He was a member and officer of the First Presbyterian Church, a charter member of the Winterset Rotary club, a charter member of the Farm Bureau organization, a member of the Des Moines club, Pioneer Lawmakers Association, Prairie Club and Sigma Delta Chi, professional journalistic fraternity. He was a member of the local school board for several terms, and a fifty year member of the Local Knights of Pythias, and Masonic Lodges. He was a 32nd Degree Mason and a Shriner. The Madison County Memorial Hospital is a monument to his memory, as he organized and launched the project for the building of the hospital, which he helped dedicate in June, 1950.

Survivors include three daughters, Mrs. Marion Moore, who with her husband, J. C. Moore, had been partners and co-publishers in the newspaper business since 1937, Mrs. P. K. Graening of Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, and Mrs. W. L. Fry of Berkeley, California. He also left five grandchildren and two great grandchildren.

GEORGE A. WILSON

MR. PRESIDENT: Your committee, appointed to prepare suitable resolutions commemorating the life, character and public service of the late Honorable George A. Wilson, begs leave to submit the following:

George A. Wilson was born on a farm near Menlo, Adair County, Iowa, on April 1, 1884, and died September 8, 1953. The youngest son of James H. and Martha G. Wilson, he attended rural school and was graduated from the Menlo high school. Later he attended Grinnell college and was graduated from the law school of the State University of Iowa in 1907.

On December 8, 1921, he was married to Miss Mildred Zehner, who survives him. To this union were born one daughter, Mary, and three sons, James, George, Jr., and John, all of whom survive. All three sons served in World War II.

George A. Wilson served as an Assistant Secretary of the Senate in 1904. After graduation from the law school at the University of Iowa, he began practicing law and became Secretary of the Senate in 1911. His active political career began with his election as County Attorney in Polk County in 1914.

After serving as judge of the district court, which position he resigned to again undertake the practice of law, he was elected to the Iowa State Senate in 1926 and re-elected in 1930 and 1934. In 1938 he was elected Governor of the State of Iowa and was re-elected in 1940. Then in 1942 he was elected as a United States Senator from Iowa.

The political career of George A. Wilson extended over a period of nearly half a century. During the four years he served as Governor he was best known for his honesty and for insisting upon economy and wise expenditure of public funds. A public safety department was established during this time along with many other fine accomplishments.

While serving in the United States Senate, George Wilson served on important committees which included Agriculture, Armed Forces, and Small Business.

George Wilson, who had great faith in Des Moines and Iowa, was interested in the improvement of conditions in rural areas of Iowa, especially the schools and farm-to-market roads. His was an interest in the betterment of rural life generally. Throughout his life his rural ties were never forgotten.

He was one of Iowa's few native sons to serve his state in all three branches of government—the executive, legislative and judicial. As a lawyer, he was known as an outstanding trial attorney in the state. As Chief Executive, he was well known for his honesty and was untiring in his efforts to better the general well-being of the State of Iowa. With his exceptional background of experience, his knowledge of legislative procedure was unexcelled. His was a life of service for the people of this state.
