CHAPTER 273.

ILLEGAL COMBINATIONS OF THE MANUFACTURERS OF CEMENT.

H. F. 323.

AN ACT to appropriate the sum of five thousand (\$5,000) dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary for use by the attorney general in paying the expense of an investigation as to the existence of an illegal combination of the manufacturers of cement used in highway bridge and culvert construction, and for other uses, as set forth in concurrent resolution passed by the thirty-seventh general assembly.

Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Iowa:

- Investigation—appropriation. That there is hereby SECTION 1. appropriated the sum of five thousand (\$5,000) dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, from funds in the state treasury not otherwise appropriated, for use by the attorney general in paying the expense of an investigation by him as to the existence of an illegal combination of the manufacturers of cement used in highway bridge and culvert construction, and for other uses, as outlined in concurrent resolution passed by the thirty-seventh general assembly.
- SEC. 2. Expenditure. That the funds herein appropriated are placed at the disposal of the attorney general for use in said investigation, as may be deemed best by him, vouchers for all expenditures in connection therewith to be filed with the executive council.

CHAPTER 274.

DANIEL MCNABB.

H. F. 127.

AN ACT to indemnify Daniel McNabb for personal injuries sustained by him while employed by the state in making a survey of Eagle Lake in Hancock County, Iowa.

Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Iowa:

- SECTION 1. Appropriation. That there is hereby appropriated out of any moneys in the state treasury not otherwise appropriated,
- the sum of five hundred dollars, for the payment in full for damages sustained by Daniel McNabb arising from injuries sustained by him
- while engaged in working for the state as a surveyor on Eagle Lake,

Hancock county, Iowa.
