

3 Robert D. Blue, the Senator B. C. Whitehill of Marshall County,

 7 General of the State of Iowa be appointed and designated as delegates
 8 to attend and represent the State of Iowa at the Commissioning
 9 ceremonies of the United States Battleship Iowa on the morning of
 10 February 22, 1943 at 11:45 o'clock A. M. at the Navy Yard, New
 11 York, and that each delegate be reimbursed as to his or her actual ex-
 12 penses, and that said amounts be allowed and paid from General
 13 Funds not otherwise appropriated.

1 SEC. 2. This Joint Resolution being deemed of immediate impor-
 2 tance shall be in full force and effect from and after its publication in
 3 Daily Iowegian and Citizen, a newspaper published at Centerville, Iowa
 4 and the Red Oak Express, a newspaper published at Red Oak, Iowa.

CHAPTER 312

POST-WAR REHABILITATION COMMISSION

S. J. R. 6

A JOINT RESOLUTION to provide for the appointment of a post-war rehabilitation commission by the Governor to study the problems of economic and social readjustments following the termination of the war and to report its recommendations and findings to the 51st General Assembly, and to authorize necessary expenditures for the functioning of said commission from the state general fund.

WHEREAS, there will be ten million (10,000,000) or more men and women in the Armed Services and Auxiliaries to return to peacetime employment after the war is over; and

WHEREAS, There will be millions of men and women to be transferred from war industries to peacetime employment; and

WHEREAS, The magnitude of this undertaking is such that it would be unwise to postpone its study until the war is over; and

WHEREAS, It is of the greatest importance that any Post-War plan for the State of Iowa shall be adapted to the economic resources and conditions peculiar to this State, in preference to some ready-made plan coming from Washington; and

WHEREAS, it behooves the States to be prepared to enact state legislation and recommend Federal legislation dealing with serious problems arising from Post-War economy; therefore,

Be It Resolved by the General Assembly of the State of Iowa:

1 SECTION 1. The Governor shall appoint a commission of twenty-
2 five (25) persons, residents of the State of Iowa, known as the
3 Post-War Rehabilitation Commission, which commission shall, as far
4 as may be possible, include a representative of the Iowa Industrial
5 and Defense Commission, agriculture, labor, highway and building
6 construction, transportation, industry, education, social welfare, the
7 newspapers, small businesses, professions and other broad economic
8 and social interests. Included in the said membership will be two
9 (2) members from the present membership of the State Senate and
10 two (2) members from the present membership of the House of
11 Representatives.

1 SEC. 2. The duties of the commission shall be:

2 1. To adopt such rules of procedure in the conducting of its meetings
3 as may be feasible and necessary to carry out the purposes of the
4 commission.

5 2. To elect, by a majority vote, a permanent chairman of the
6 commission at the first meeting of the commission.

7 3. To make a thorough study of the problems which will confront
8 the State of Iowa on the termination of the war as to the re-
9 employment of the men and women discharged from the armed
10 forces of the United States government, the re-employment of men
11 and women now being employed in industries now engaged in war
12 work, or substantially so, the conversion of industries now engaged in
13 war production into peacetime production, the readjustment of
14 farming into peacetime production, the re-establishment of persons
15 with farming training upon farms with consideration of proper
16 financing facilities, social welfare needs following the termination of
17 the war, and other economic matters of vital interest to the State of
18 Iowa.

19 4. To meet, confer or cooperate with other groups, local, state or
20 national, that are studying this subject, to invite and consider
21 suggestions from interested individuals and group, and disseminate
22 and distribute any information from time to time to persons, groups,
23 or the public, as it may deem expedient, for the broad purposes of
24 the creation of the commission.

25 5. To consider and act upon such other matters in connection with
26 Post-war problems, and preparation to meet them, as the Governor
27 may direct. The Governor shall have power to direct the co-operation
28 and co-ordination of any and all other state agencies with this
29 committee in furtherance of the purposes of this resolution.

30 6. To recommend to the 51st General Assembly for legislative
31 enactment any measures deemed to be feasible and expedient to carry
32 out a post-war plan of economic and social readjustment, which
33 recommendations will be filed by the first day of the 51st General
34 Assembly.

35 7. To make a complete report to the 51st General Assembly of all
36 of its doings, meetings, transactions, reports and expenditures, which

37 report will be filed by the first day of the 51st General Assembly, and
 38 to take such steps and put into effect such measures, not prohibited
 39 by law, as may facilitate the purposes of this resolution.

1 SEC. 3. The said commission will meet not oftener than once every
 2 three months, except oftener upon the recommendation of the
 3 Governor, in the City of Des Moines, at a place to be arranged in
 4 advance by the Executive Council.

1 SEC. 4. The Governor shall have the power to fill any vacancies.

1 SEC. 5. All state and local public officers and employees shall
 2 co-operate with this commission by supplying it with such data and
 3 facts which the commission may deem necessary in its deliberation
 4 from time to time.

1 SEC. 6. The members of the commission shall receive no compensa-
 2 tion for their services, except their actual and necessary expenses
 3 to be audited by the comptroller of the State and paid from the general
 4 fund of the State.

1 SEC. 7. The Executive Council shall provide necessary clerical
 2 help and office supplies and provide for publishing reports by such
 3 commission, which expenditures are to be certified by the chairman
 4 and audited by the comptroller of the state and paid from the general
 5 fund of the state.

CHAPTER 313

CONTINUING ACCOUNTING PROCEDURE APPROPRIATION

S. J. R. 9

A JOINT RESOLUTION to provide that the unexpended balance remaining in the fund appropriated to the executive council, by section eighteen (18) of chapter one (1), acts of the Forty-ninth (49th) General Assembly, for the purpose of revising the accounting and accounting procedure of the state including the payment of consultants, shall not revert to the general fund at the expiration of the current biennial fiscal term but shall continue to be available for the purposes enumerated in said act and for additional purposes.

WHEREAS, there has been appropriated to the executive council of the state by section eighteen (18) of chapter one (1), Acts of the Forty-ninth (49th) General Assembly, the sum of three thousand dollars for each year of the biennium beginning July 1, 1941, and ending June 30, 1943, for the purpose of revising the accounting and accounting procedure of the state including the payment of consultants, and

WHEREAS, the executive council has diligently employed said fund for the purposes enumerated in said act, but has not and will not be able to complete its work by June 30, 1943, and,

WHEREAS, there is urgent need to continue the work of revising the accounting system of the state, and,
