The Senate met in regular session at 9:02 a.m., President Sinclair presiding.

Prayer was offered by the Honorable Jeff Reichman, member of the Senate from Lee County.

HOUSE MESSAGES RECEIVED AND CONSIDERED

BILLS SIGNED BY THE GOVERNOR

A communication was received announcing that on April 19, 2024, the Governor approved and transmitted to the Secretary of State the following bills:

<u>Senate File 2054</u> – Eliminating requirements providing for the payment of an outstanding tax liability by dissolved business entities as a condition to reinstatement.

<u>Senate File 2171</u> – Permitting leaders of the general assembly to file amicus curiae briefs in appellate proceedings.

<u>Senate File 2261</u> – Relating to operating-while-intoxicated offenses, including temporary restricted licenses and ignition interlock devices, providing penalties, making penalties applicable, and including effective date and applicability provisions.

<u>Senate File 2275</u> – Requiring notice to the general assembly in appellate actions regarding the constitutionality of a statute and including effective date and applicability provisions.

Senate File 2291 - Relating to real estate brokers and brokerage agreements.

<u>Senate File 2362</u> – Relating to residential and motor vehicle service contracts and licenses.

<u>Senate File 2414</u> – Relating to underground storage tanks, including repealing the Iowa comprehensive petroleum underground storage tank fund and eliminating the Iowa comprehensive petroleum underground storage tank fund board, making appropriations, and including effective date and transition provisions.

<u>Senate File 2431</u> – Relating to the periods of time to bring civil actions for injuries that result from sex offenses against minors for the purpose of filing claims against the bankruptcy estate of a congressionally chartered organization, and including effective date and retroactive applicability provisions.

REMARKS BY THE PRESIDENT OF THE SENATE

President Sinclair provided the following remarks:

Colleagues, the 2024 Regular Session of the 90th General Assembly has been dynamic. We began just days after the horrendous events in Perry, shifting to address the complexities of our special education system, then tackling the problems associated with President Biden's inflation and open border, and continued implementing measures promoting smaller more efficient government.

We've learned a lot from the tragedy in Perry. First, Iowa is not insulated from acts of terror in our schools. However, we also learned that Iowa schools have taken great measures to prevent and prepare for these situations. I am proud of the fact that we took action to provide greater supports to schools to prevent acts of violence. With the passage of House File 2652 and House File 2586, we gave schools additional tools to address school security and more flexibility with the use of their funding to keep our children safe.

Much of the 2024 session was again focused on education reform. When I became the Senate Education Chair in 2017, I addressed the topic of Area Education Agency reform with the AEA chief administrators. They took little action to enact meaningful reform, and our special education students continued to fall further behind their peers. After seven more years of business as usual, Governor Reynolds prioritized this reform initiative. House File 2612 brings greater transparency and restores local school district control over AEA funding. Our local schools now have the ability to assess the services being provided by the AEAs and the power to make changes to get better outcomes for our students.

As Iowa families have dealt with the failures of the Biden Administration, Iowa Senate Republicans have done our part to address these issues. Senate File 2340 empowers Iowa law enforcement officers to deport people who are here illegally. If President Biden refuses to enforce our immigration laws, we will. Besides the open southern border, Iowans continue to be threatened by the actions of communist China in the absence of federal action. One of the most dangerous of these threats has been the purchase of Iowa farmland. Senate File 2204 gives Iowa some of the strongest laws in the country regarding foreign land ownership. Senate Republicans have been and will continue to defend our state against these foreign adversaries.

The federal government continues to grow and spend our tax dollars at an alarming pace, fueling President Biden's inflation. Iowa Senate Republicans have remained committed to smaller, more efficient government. This commitment remains clear with the passage of Senate File 2442. This bill accelerates Iowa's income tax cuts to implement a 3.8% flat tax beginning in January 2025, the 6th lowest rate in the country. To protect Iowans from future tax hikes, Senate Joint Resolution 2004 and House Joint Resolution 2006 were both passed, taking the first steps to implement taxpayer protections in the state constitution. These constitutional amendments, respectively, require a flat tax for state income tax and a two-thirds majority of the legislature to enact income tax increases. Allowing Iowans to keep more of their hard-earned dollars helps reduce the effects of President Biden's inflation, and guarantees smaller, more efficient state government.

The 2024 session has been another conservative success story for Iowa. Senate Republicans have pledged to work towards making Iowa the best place to live, work, and raise a family. This session shows we have continued our efforts, and we will keep doing so in a responsible and sustainable manner.

REMARKS BY THE MINORITY LEADER

Senator Jochum provided the following remarks:

Thank you, Madam President.

As we wrap up our work and move to conclude the 2024 legislative session and Iowa's 90th General Assembly, I first want to take a moment to say thank you to the devoted civil servants whose hard work makes this chamber function.

To the clerks, pages, caucus staff, the tireless professional staff of the LSA, the Secretary of the Senate's office, doorkeepers, members of the press, the lobby, our interns, and all of our fellow Iowans who have followed our work these last four months – thank you. Your hard work, commitment, diligence, and expertise is truly appreciated.

Four months ago, we convened here from all corners of our state with a common goal: to make life better for the people of Iowa. Senate Democrats entered this session offering a Better Deal for Iowans.

We pledged to stand up for the core values of Opportunity, Freedom, and Accountability. And over the course of this session, we worked to ensure those values came through in every bill we filed, every amendment we offered, and every point we made on the floor of this chamber.

At every turn, we asked ourselves:

- Does this create more opportunity for Iowans?
- Does it ensure freedom for Iowans?
- Does it provide more accountability for Iowans?

Unfortunately, too often this year, in too many bills offered and advanced by the Republican majority, the answer to those questions was a resounding NO.

Republicans in this chamber, across the rotunda, and in the big office downstairs all too often refused to work in good faith across the aisle to benefit Iowans. Instead, they chose to fight divisive culture wars, hand over more power to the governor, and push narrow legislation benefiting special interests at the expense of the majority of Iowans.

Senate Democrats, by contrast, focused on what truly matters: Iowa's families, children, and workers. We did the best we could to live those values of opportunity, freedom, and accountability.

We offered a package of legislation to protect Iowans' basic freedom and access to necessary healthcare. We introduced legislation bringing desperately needed accountability reforms to our long-term care system to ensure the safety and dignity of Iowa seniors. We proposed state aid for our public schools that would begin to address years of underinvestment. They all went nowhere.

When Republican lawmakers refused to consider these measures, they didn't just ignore this chamber's Democratic minority – they ignored the will of Iowans.

Senate Democrats also listened to the thousands of Iowans who resisted the governor's heavy-handed attack on Iowa's Area Education Agencies — and worked at every turn to preserve a system that helps Iowa families and delivers for Iowa children.

When Republican lawmakers forced that legislation into law, they showed they cared more about pleasing the governor than representing their constituents.

When the final gavel falls on this General Assembly, Iowans will look back on it with disappointment — disappointment over the misplaced priorities, the missed opportunities, and the time wasted on measures that fail to move our state forward.

And by now, after seven years of culture wars and special interests, I think Iowans are pretty tired of being disappointed. They expect more from the representatives they elect. They're ready for leaders who will represent their values. They're ready for a better deal

Senate Democrats are offering a better deal, and we look forward to sharing it with Iowans in every corner of our state.

REMARKS BY THE MAJORITY LEADER

Senator Whitver provided the following remarks:

Madame President,

The headline of this session is simple: Iowa's income tax rate will be the 6^{th} lowest in the country and starting pay for Iowa teachers will be the 5^{th} highest in the country.

At the beginning of session, I talked about making sure Iowans kept more of what they earn. Easing the tax burden for working Iowans is, has been, and always will be my biggest priority. I'm proud of our work to ease that burden this year. Beginning January 1, 2025, Iowa families will save an average of \$800 on their state income taxes. Total money remaining in the hands of working families is \$1.3 billion. These savings will continue year after year, permanently ensuring Iowans keep more of what they earn. A flat, simple rate provides incentives to work hard and build a life in the greatest state in the country. Constitutional amendments to require a flat tax and a supermajority to raise taxes give Iowans the confidence to know state government will stay within its means, and taxes will remain low, fair, and structured to promote growth.

The most critical issue on the minds of Iowans and Americans is the crisis at the southern border. Day after day the Biden Administration has ignored its duty to defend the border and provide for the security of our country. This Legislature responded by passing a bold new law, <u>SF 2340</u>, to empower Iowa law enforcement to deport people in our state illegally. The federal government refuses to do its job, so Iowa will get to work and do what we can to defend our country and keep the people in this state safe. This year we also enhanced pension benefits for many law enforcement officers to recognize and reward them for their lifetime of work to keep our families safe.

Perhaps the issue that attracted the most attention this session was the education reform proposal to improve outcomes for Iowa special education students. Iowa's performance has been below expectations, and it was time for reform. This year's education reform package changes the delivery of special education funding, raises teacher pay, and increases funding flexibility over \$68 million to help Iowa schools best meet the needs of their students.

One other dominant issue in this country is the continual rise in prices. Inflation has been eating away at the ability of Iowa families to afford the necessities of life. Unrestrained spending at the federal level has created an inflation monster that has not been tamed. In Iowa, again, we're doing things the opposite way. We banned local government from implementing the types of programs driving inflation and a workforce crisis. We also helped Iowans fight inflation with our continued drive to reduce their tax burden. The extra \$800 the average family will have next year will be useful when it's time to buy clothes, food, or save for the next big expense.

We also passed vital policies to protect our greatest natural resource from being owned by foreign entities like communist China. Iowa had some of the strongest laws in the country to protect our land, but enhancing our vigilance to protect the state's greatest resource meets the demands of our time and the expectations of Iowans.

Another consistent goal of Senate Republicans over the years has been reducing the size of state government and making it more efficient. Last year a major government reorganization bill passed and it included a review of the state's board and commissions. This year the legislature acted on that review, eliminating dozens of outdated boards and commissions, consolidating others, and streamlining the process for Iowans interacting with their government. This body also led on ensuring state rules were being reviewed and ensuring those regulations put Iowans first, not government.

Big and bold ideas have always been our focus, and our caucus has never shied away from difficult or complex issues. This year was no different. This session was another tremendous success for Senate Republicans as we kept our promises to Iowans and focused on big reforms, bold changes, and major tax relief. I know we all look forward to a break from this session and to return in 2025 ready to continue making Iowa the best place to live in the world.
