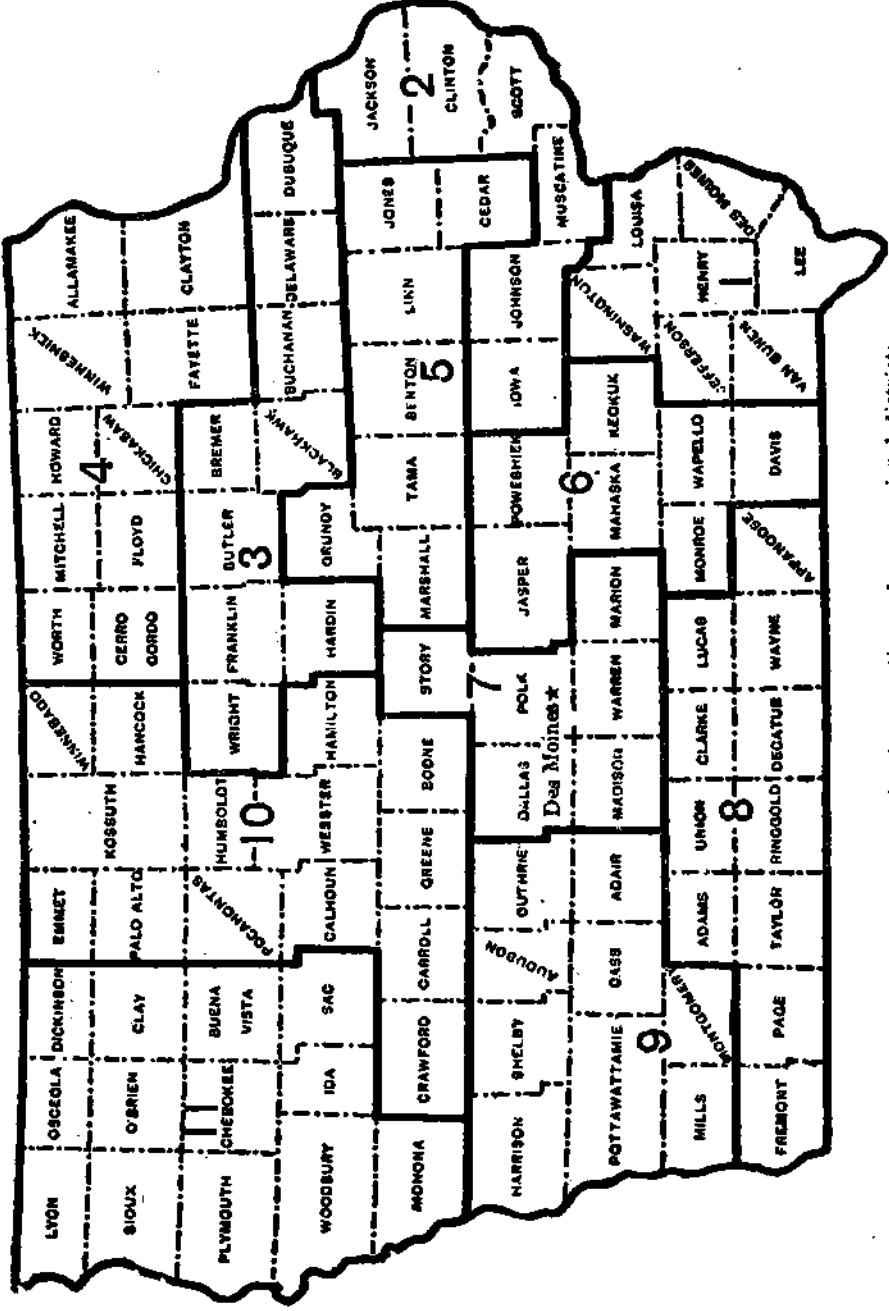
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Map of Iowa showing counties and congressional districts

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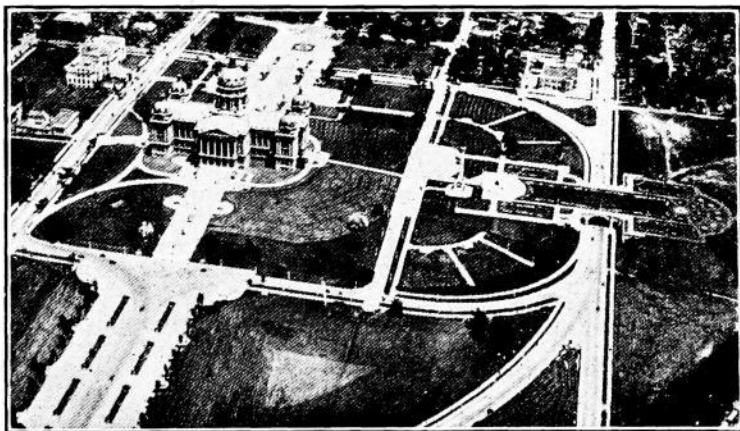

Explanatory—Election Statistics

Election statistics in this book are more in detail than are the official returns to the Secretary of State. The official returns do not include the vote by precincts. The vote by precincts is furnished for this book by the County Auditors direct to the Superintendent of Printing. These precinct returns appear as submitted by the County Auditors, and all compilations of state and county returns in this volume are based thereon. This produces harmony within this volume, except for possible errors, but there may be discrepancies in given instances between the vote shown in this volume on the one hand and the official vote recorded in the office of the Secretary of State on the other, for the reason that the two sets of returns from the same source, namely, those furnished to the Secretary of State (not including the precinct vote) and those furnished to the Superintendent of Printing (the precinct vote) do not always agree. The official vote, of course, stands as such, regardless of such discrepancies, but the figures given in the Official Register, because they include and are based on the precinct vote, which is not returned to the Secretary of State, will not always tally with the official figures.

Such discrepancies have occurred with respect to all editions of the Official Register that have carried the precinct vote.

DECLARATION OF INDEPENDENCE

In Congress, July 4, 1776

THE UNANIMOUS DECLARATION OF THE THIRTEEN UNITED STATES OF AMERICA

(Adopted by the Continental Congress July 2, and authenticated and proclaimed
July 4, 1776)

When in the course of human events it becomes necessary for one people to dissolve the political bands which have connected them with another, and to assume among the powers of the earth the separate and equal station to which the laws of nature and of nature's God entitle them, a decent respect to the opinions of mankind requires that they should declare the causes which impel them to the separation.

We hold these truths to be self-evident: That all men are created equal; that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable rights; that among these are life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness; that to secure these rights, governments are instituted among men, deriving their just powers from the consent of the governed; that, whenever any form of government becomes destructive of these ends, it is the right of the people to alter or abolish it, and to institute new government, laying its foundation on such principles and organizing its powers in such form as to them shall seem most likely to effect their safety and happiness. Prudence, indeed, will dictate that governments long established should not be changed for light and transient causes; and, accordingly, all experience hath shown that mankind are more disposed to suffer, while evils are sufferable, than to right themselves by abolishing the forms to which they are accustomed. But when a long train of abuses and usurpations, pursuing invariably the same object, evinces a desire to reduce them under absolute despotism, it is their right, it is their duty, to throw off such government, and to provide new guards for their future security. Such has been the patient sufferance of these colonies, and such is now the necessity which constrains them to alter their former systems of government. The history of the present king of Great Britain is a history of repeated injuries and usurpations, all having in direct object the establishment of an absolute tyranny over these states. To prove this, let facts be submitted to a candid world:

He has refused his assent to laws the most wholesome and necessary for the public good.

He has forbidden his governors to pass laws of immediate and pressing importance, unless suspended in their operation till his assent should be obtained, and, when so suspended, he has utterly neglected to attend to them.

He has refused to pass other laws for the accommodation of large districts of people, unless those people would relinquish the right of representation in the legislature—a right inestimable to them, and formidable to tyrants only.

He has called together legislative bodies at places unusual, uncomfortable, and distant from the depository of their public records, for the sole purpose of fatiguing them into compliance with his measures.

He has dissolved representative houses repeatedly for opposing, with manly firmness, his invasions on the rights of the people.

He has refused, for a long time after such dissolutions, to cause others to be elected; whereby the legislative powers, incapable of annihilation, have returned to the people at large for their exercise; the state remaining in the meantime exposed to all the dangers of invasion from without, and convulsions within.

He has endeavored to prevent the population of these states; for that purpose obstructing the laws of naturalization of foreigners; refusing to pass others to encourage their migration hither, and raising the conditions of new appropriations of lands.

He has obstructed the administration of justice by refusing his assent to laws for establishing judiciary powers.

He has made judges dependent on his will alone for the tenure of their offices and the amount and payment of their salaries.

He has erected a multitude of new offices, and sent hither swarms of officers to harass our people and eat out their substance.

He has kept among us, in times of peace, standing armies, without the consent of our legislature.

He has affected to render the military independent of, and superior to, the civil power.

He has combined with others to subject us to a jurisdiction foreign to our constitution and unacknowledged by our laws, giving his assent to their acts of pretended legislation—

For quartering large bodies of armed troops among us;

For protecting them, by a mock trial, from punishment for any murders which they should commit on the inhabitants of these states;

For cutting off our trade with all parts of the world;

For imposing taxes on us without our consent;

For depriving us, in many cases, of the benefits of trial by jury;

For transporting us beyond seas, to be tried for pretended offenses;

For abolishing the free system of English laws in a neighboring province; establishing therein an arbitrary government, and enlarging its boundaries, so as to render it at once an example and fit instrument for introducing the same absolute rule into these colonies;

For taking away our charters, abolishing our most valuable laws, and altering fundamentally the forms of our government;

For suspending our own legislature, and declaring themselves invested with power to legislate for us in all cases whatsoever.

He has abdicated government here by declaring us out of his protection and waging war against us.

He has plundered our seas, ravaged our coasts, burnt our towns, and destroyed the lives of our people.

He is, at this time, transporting large armies of foreign mercenaries to complete the works of death, desolation, and tyranny, already begun, with circumstances of cruelty and perfidy scarcely paralleled in the most barbarous ages, and totally unworthy the head of a civilized nation.

He has constrained our fellow citizens, taken captive on the high seas, to bear arms against their country, to become the executioners of their friends and brethren, or to fall themselves by their hands.

He has excited domestic insurrections amongst us, and has endeavored to bring on the inhabitants of our frontiers, the merciless Indian savages whose known rule of warfare is an undistinguished destruction of all ages, sexes, and conditions.

In every stage of these oppressions we have petitioned for redress in the most humble terms; our repeated petitions have been answered only by repeated injury. A prince whose character is thus marked by every act which may define a tyrant is unfit to be the ruler of a free people.

Nor have we been wanting in attention to our British brethren. We have warned them, from time to time, of attempts, by their legislature, to extend an unwarrantable jurisdiction over us. We have reminded them of the circumstances of our emigration and settlement here. We have appealed to their native justice and magnanimity; and we have conjured them, by the ties of our common kindred, to disavow these usurpations, which would inevitably interrupt our connections and correspondence. They, too, have been deaf to the voice of justice and consanguinity. We must, therefore, acquiesce in the necessity which denounces our separation, and hold them, as we hold the rest of mankind, enemies in war, in peace, friends.

We, therefore, the representatives of the United States of America, in general congress assembled, appealing to the Supreme Judge of the world for the rectitude of our intentions, do, in the name and by the authority of the good people of these colonies, solemnly publish and declare, that these united colonies are, and of right ought to be, free and independent states; that they are absolved from all allegiance to the British crown, and that all political connections between them and the state of Great Britain is, and ought to be, totally dissolved; and that, as free and independent states, they have full power to levy war, conclude peace, contract alliances, establish commerce, and do all other acts and things which independent states may of right do. And for the support of this declaration, with a firm reliance on the protection of Divine Providence, we mutually pledge to each other our lives, our fortunes and our sacred honor.

THE CONSTITUTION OF THE UNITED STATES

[Recommended by the convention of the states to congress Sept. 17, 1787, and by it submitted to the states for ratification, which by the concurrence of nine states, was consummated and proclaimed and on March 4, 1789, the government commenced operations under the new constitution.]

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We, the people of the United States, in order to form a more perfect union, establish justice, insure domestic tranquillity, provide for the common defense, promote the general welfare, and secure the blessings of liberty to ourselves and our posterity, do ordain and establish this constitution for the United States of America.

ARTICLE I.

SECTION 1. All legislative powers herein granted shall be vested in a congress of the United States, which shall consist of a senate and house of representatives.

SEC. 2. (1)* The house of representatives shall be composed of members chosen every second year by the people of the several states; and the electors in each state shall have the qualifications requisite for electors of the most numerous branch of the state legislature.

(2) No person shall be a representative who shall not have attained to the age of twenty-five years, and been seven years a citizen of the United States, and who shall not, when elected, be an inhabitant of that state in which he shall be chosen.

(3) [Representatives and direct taxes shall be apportioned among the several states which may be included within this union according to their respective numbers, which shall be determined by adding, to the whole number of free persons, including those bound to service for a term of years, and excluding Indians not taxed, three-fifths of all other persons.]** The actual enumeration shall be made within three years after the first meeting of the congress of the United States, and within every subsequent term of ten years, in such manner as they shall by law direct. The number of representatives shall not exceed one for every thirty thousand, but each state shall have at least one representative, and, until such enumeration shall be made, the state of New Hampshire shall be entitled to choose three, Massachusetts eight, Rhode Island and Providence Plantations one, Connecticut five, New York six, New Jersey four, Pennsylvania eight, Delaware one, Maryland six, Virginia ten, North Carolina five, South Carolina five and Georgia three.

The figures in brackets are inserted for convenience of reference; they are not in the original.

** The foregoing clause included in brackets is amended by Sec. 2 of the 14th amendment.

(4) When vacancies happen in the representation from any state, the executive authority thereof shall issue writs of election to fill such vacancies.

(5) The house of representatives shall choose their speaker and other officers and shall have the sole power of impeachment.

SEC. 3. (1) The senate of the United States shall be composed of two senators from each state, chosen by the legislature thereof for six years; and each senator shall have one vote.

(2) Immediately after they shall be assembled in consequence of the first election, they shall be divided as equally as may be into three classes. The seats of the senators of the first class shall be vacated at the expiration of the second year, of the second class at the expiration of the fourth year, and of the third class at the expiration of the sixth year, so that one-third may be chosen every second year; and if vacancies happen, by resignation or otherwise, during the recess of the legislature of any state the executive thereof may make temporary appointments until the next meeting of the legislature, which shall then fill such vacancies.

(3) No person shall be a senator who shall not have attained to the age of thirty years, and been nine years a citizen of the United States, and who shall not, when elected, be an inhabitant of that state for which he shall be chosen.

(4) The vice-president of the United States shall be president of the senate, but shall have no vote, unless they be equally divided.

(5) The senate shall choose their other officers and also a president pro tempore, in the absence of the vice-president or when he shall exercise the office of president of the United States.

(6) The senate shall have the sole power to try all impeachments. When sitting for that purpose they shall be on oath or affirmation. When the president of the United States is tried, the chief justice shall preside; and no person shall be convicted without the concurrence of two-thirds of the members present.

(7) Judgment in cases of impeachment shall not extend further than to removal from office, and disqualification to hold and enjoy any office of honor, trust or profit under the United States; but the party convicted shall nevertheless be liable and subject to indictment, trial, judgment and punishment, according to law.

SEC. 4. (1) The times, places and manner of holding elections for senators and representatives shall be prescribed in each state by the legislature thereof, but the congress may at any time by law make or alter such regulations, except as to the places of choosing senators.

(2) The congress shall assemble at least once in every year, and such meeting shall be on the first Monday in December, unless they shall by law appoint a different day.

SEC. 5. (1) Each house shall be the judge of the elections, returns and qualifications of its own members, and a majority of each shall constitute a quorum to do business; but a smaller number may adjourn from day to day, and may be authorized to compel the attendance of absent members, in such manner and under such penalties as each house may provide.

(2) Each house may determine the rules of its proceedings, punish its members for disorderly behaviour, and, with the concurrence of two-thirds, expel a member.

(3) Each house shall keep a journal of its proceedings, and from time to time publish the same, excepting such parts as may in their judgment require secrecy; and the yeas and nays of the members of either house on any question shall, at the desire of one-fifth of those present, be entered on the journal.

(4) Neither house, during the session of congress, shall, without the consent of the other, adjourn for more than three days, nor to any other place than that in which the two houses shall be sitting.

SEC. 6. (1) The senators and representatives shall receive a compensation for their services, to be ascertained by law, and paid out of the treasury of the United States. They shall in all cases, except treason, felony and breach of the peace, be privileged from arrest during the attendance at the sessions of their respective houses, and in going to and returning from same; and for any speech or debate in either house they shall not be questioned in any other place.

(2) No senator or representative shall, during the time for which he was elected, be appointed to any civil office under the authority of the United States, which shall have been created, or the emoluments whereof shall have been increased, during such time; and no person holding any office under the United States shall be a member of either house during his continuance in office.

SEC. 7. (1) All bills for raising revenue shall originate in the house of representatives, but the senate may propose or concur with amendments, as on other bills.

(2) Every bill which shall have passed the house of representatives and the senate, shall, before it become a law, be presented to the president of the United States; if he approve he shall sign it, but if not he shall return it, with his objections, to that house in which it shall have originated, who shall enter the objections at large on their journal, and proceed to reconsider it. If after such reconsideration two-thirds of that house shall agree to pass the bill, it shall be sent, together with the objections, to the other house, by which it shall likewise be reconsidered, and, if approved by two-thirds of that house, it shall become a law. But in all such cases the votes of both houses shall be determined by yeas and nays, and the names of the persons voting for and against the bill shall be entered on the journal of each house, respectively. If any bill shall not be returned by the president within ten days (Sundays excepted) after it shall have been presented to him, the same shall be a law, in like manner as if he had signed it unless the congress by their adjournment prevent its return, in which case it shall not be a law.

(3) Every order, resolution or vote to which the concurrence of the senate and house of representatives may be necessary (except on a question of adjournment) shall be presented to the president of the United States, and, before the same shall take effect, shall be approved by him, or, being disapproved by him, shall be repassed by two-thirds of the senate and house of representatives, according to the rules and limitations prescribed in the case of a bill.

SEC. 8. The congress shall have power:—

(1) To lay and collect taxes, duties, imposts and excises, to pay the debts and provide for common defense and general welfare of the United States; but all duties, imposts and excises shall be uniform throughout the United States.

(2) To borrow money on the credit of the United States;

(3) To regulate commerce with foreign nations, and among the several states, and with the Indian tribes;

(4) To establish a uniform rule of naturalization, and uniform laws on the subject of bankruptcies throughout the United States.

(5) To coin money, regulate the value thereof and of foreign coin, and fix the standard of weights and measures;

(6) To provide for the punishment of counterfeiting the securities and current coin of the United States;

(7) To establish post-offices and post-roads;

(8) To promote the progress of science and useful arts, by securing for limited times to authors and inventors the exclusive right to their respective writings and discoveries;

(9) To constitute tribunals inferior to the supreme court;

(10) To define and punish piracies and felonies committed on the high seas, and offenses against the law of nations;

(11) To declare war, grant letters of marque and reprisal, and make rules concerning captures on land and water;

(12) To raise and support armies; but no appropriation of money to that use shall be for a longer term than two years;

(13) To provide and maintain a navy;

(14) To make rules for the government and regulation of the land and naval forces;

(15) To provide for calling forth the militia to execute the laws of the union, suppress insurrections and repel invasions;

(16) To provide for organizing, arming and disciplining the militia, and for governing such part of them as may be employed in the service of the United

States; reserving to the states, respectively, the appointment of the officers and the authority of training the militia according to the discipline prescribed by congress;

(17) To exercise exclusive legislation, in all cases whatsoever, over such district (not exceeding ten miles square) as may, by cession of particular states and the acceptance of congress, become the seat of the government of the United States, and to exercise like authority over all places purchased by the consent of the legislature of the state in which the same shall be for the erection of forts, magazines, arsenals, dock yards and other needful buildings; and—

(18). To make all laws which shall be necessary and proper for carrying into execution the foregoing powers, and all other powers vested by this constitution in the government of the United States, or in any department or officer thereof.

SEC. 9. (1) The migration or importation of such persons as any of the states now existing shall think proper to admit shall not be prohibited by the congress prior to the year one thousand eight hundred and eight, but a tax or duty may be imposed on such importation, not exceeding ten dollars for each person.

(2) The privilege of the writ of habeas corpus shall not be suspended, unless when, in cases of rebellion or invasion, the public safety may require it.

(3) No bill of attainder or ex post facto law shall be passed.

(4) No capitation or other direct tax shall be laid, unless in proportion to the census or enumeration hereinbefore directed to be taken.

(5) No tax or duty shall be laid on articles exported from any state.

(6) No preference shall be given by any regulation of commerce or revenue to the ports of one state over those of another; nor shall vessels bound to or from one state be obliged to enter, clear or pay duties in another.

(7) No money shall be drawn from the treasury but in consequence of appropriations made by law, and a regular statement and account of the receipts and expenditures of all public money shall be published from time to time.

(8) No title of nobility shall be granted by the United States; and no person holding any office of profit or trust under them shall, without the consent of the congress, accept of any present, emolument, office, or title of any kind whatever, from any king, prince or foreign state.

SEC. 10. (1) No state shall enter into any treaty, alliance or confederation; grant letters of marque and reprisal; coin money; emit bills of credit; make anything but gold and silver coin a tender in payment of debts; pass any bill of attainder, ex post facto law, or law impairing the obligation of contracts, or grant any title of nobility.

(2) No state shall, without the consent of the congress, lay any imposts or duties on imports or exports, except what may be absolutely necessary for executing its inspection laws; and the net produce of all duties and imposts, laid by any state on imports or exports, shall be for the use of the treasury of the United States; and all such laws shall be subjected to the revision and control of the congress.

(3) No state shall, without the consent of congress, lay any duty of tonnage, keep troops or ships of war in time of peace, enter into any agreement or compact with another state, or with a foreign power, or engage in war, unless actually invaded, or in such imminent danger as will not admit of delay.

ARTICLE II.

SECTION 1. (1) The executive power shall be vested in a president of the United States of America. He shall hold his office during the term of four years, and, together with the vice-president chosen for the same term, be elected as follows:

(2) Each state shall appoint, in such manner as the legislature thereof may direct, a number of electors, equal to the whole number of senators and representatives to which the state may be entitled in the congress; but no senator or representative, or person holding an office of trust or profit under the United States, shall be appointed an elector.

The electors shall meet in their respective states and vote by ballot for two persons, of whom one at least shall not be an inhabitant of the same state with

themselves. And they shall make a list of all persons voted for, and of the number of votes for each; which list they shall sign and certify, and transmit sealed to the seat of the government of the United States, directed to the president of the senate. The president of the senate shall, in the presence of the senate and house of representatives, open all the certificates, and the votes shall then be counted. The person having the greatest number of votes shall be the president, if such number be a majority of the whole number of electors appointed; and if there be more than one who have such majority, and have an equal number of votes, then the house of representatives shall immediately choose, by ballot one of them for president; and if no person have a majority then from the five highest on the list, the said house shall, in like manner, choose the president. But in choosing the president the votes shall be taken by states, the representation for each state having one vote; a quorum for this purpose shall consist of a member or members from two-thirds of the states, and a majority of all the states shall be necessary to a choice. In every case, after the choice of the president, the person having the greatest number of votes of the electors shall be the vice-president. But if there should remain two or more who have equal votes, the senate shall choose from them, by ballot, the vice-president.

[The foregoing clause has been superseded and annulled by the twelfth amendment, *post.*]

(3) The congress may determine the time of choosing the electors, and the day on which they shall give their votes; which day shall be the same throughout the United States.

(4) No person except a natural born citizen, or a citizen of the United States at the time of the adoption of this constitution, shall be eligible to the office of president; neither shall any person be eligible to that office who shall not have attained to the age of thirty-five years, and been fourteen years a resident within the United States.

(5) In case of the removal of the president from office, or of his death, resignation, or inability to discharge the powers and duties of the said office, the same shall devolve on the vice-president, and the congress may by law provide for the case of removal, death, resignation or inability, both of the president and vice-president, declaring what officer shall then act as president, and such officer shall act accordingly until the disability be removed or a president shall be elected.

(6) The president shall, at stated times, receive for his services a compensation, which shall neither be increased nor diminished during the period for which he shall have been elected, and he shall not receive within that period any other emolument from the United States or any of them.

(7) Before he enter on the execution of his office, he shall take the following oath or affirmation:

"I do solemnly swear (or affirm) that I will faithfully execute the office of president of the United States, and will, to the best of my ability, preserve, protect and defend the constitution of the United States."

SEC. 2. (1) The president shall be commander-in-chief of the army and navy of the United States, and of the militia of the several states when called into the actual service of the United States; he may require the opinion in writing of the principal officer in each of the executive departments upon any subject relating to the duties of their respective offices; and he shall have power to grant reprieves and pardons for offenses against the United States, except in cases of impeachment.

(2) He shall have power, by and with the advice and consent of the senate, to make treaties, provided two-thirds of the senators present concur and he shall nominate, and by and with the advice and consent of the senate shall appoint ambassadors, other public ministers and consuls, judges of the supreme court, and all other officers of the United States, whose appointments are not herein otherwise provided for and which shall be established by law. But the congress may, by law, vest the appointment of such inferior officers as they think proper in the president alone, in the courts of law, or in the heads of departments.

(3) The president shall have power to fill up all vacancies that may happen

during the recess of the senate, by granting commissions which shall expire at the end of their next session.

SEC. 3. He shall from time to time give to the congress information of the state of the Union, and recommend to their consideration such measures as he shall judge necessary and expedient. He may, on extraordinary occasions, convene both houses, or either of them and, in case of disagreement between them with respect to the time of adjournment, he may adjourn them to such time as he shall think proper. He shall receive ambassadors and other public ministers. He shall take care that the laws be faithfully executed, and shall commission all the officers of the United States.

SEC. 4. The president, vice-president, and all civil officers of the United States, shall be removed from office on impeachment for, and conviction of, treason, bribery, or other high crimes and misdemeanors.

ARTICLE III.

SECTION 1. The judicial power of the United States shall be vested in one supreme court, and in such inferior courts as the congress may, from time to time, ordain and establish. The judges, both of the supreme and inferior courts, shall hold their offices during good behavior; and shall, at stated times, receive for their services a compensation which shall not be diminished during their continuance in office.

SEC. 2. (1) The judicial power shall extend to all cases in law and equity arising under this constitution, the laws of the United States, and treaties made, or which shall be made, under their authority; to all cases affecting ambassadors, other public ministers and consuls; to all cases of admiralty and maritime jurisdiction; to controversies to which the United States shall be a party; to controversies between two or more states, between a state and citizens of another state, between citizens of different states, between citizens of the same state claiming lands under grants of different states, and between a state, or the citizens thereof, and foreign states, citizens or subjects.

(2) In all cases affecting ambassadors, other public ministers and consuls, and those in which a state shall be a party, the supreme court shall have original jurisdiction. In all the other cases, before mentioned, the supreme court shall have appellate jurisdiction, both as to law and fact, with such exceptions and under regulations as the congress shall make.

(3) The trial of all crimes, except in cases of impeachment, shall be by jury; and such trial shall be held in the state where the said crimes shall have been committed; but when not committed within any state, the trial shall be at such place or places as the congress may by law have directed.

SEC. 3. (1) Treason against the United States shall consist only in levying war against them, or in adhering to their enemies, giving them aid and comfort. No person shall be convicted of treason unless on the testimony of two witnesses to the same overt act, or on confession in open court.

(2) The congress shall have power to declare the punishment of treason, but no attainder of treason shall work corruption of blood, or forfeiture, except during the life of the person attainted.

ARTICLE IV.

SECTION 1. Full faith and credit shall be given in each state to the public acts, records and judicial proceedings of every other state. And the congress may, by general laws, prescribe the manner in which such acts, records and proceedings shall be proved, and the effect thereof.

SEC. 2. (1) The citizens of each state shall be entitled to all privileges and immunities of citizens in the several states.

(2) A person charged in any state with treason, felony or other crime, who shall flee from justice and be found in another state, shall on demand of the executive authority of the state from which he fled, be delivered up, to be removed to the state having jurisdiction of the crime.

(3) No person held to service or labor in one state, under the laws thereof, escaping into another, shall, in consequence of any law or regulation therein, be discharged from such service or labor, but shall be delivered up on claim of the party to whom such service or labor may be due.

SEC. 3. (1) New states may be admitted by the congress into this Union; but no new state shall be formed or erected within the jurisdiction of any other state, nor any state be formed by the junction of two or more states, or parts of states, without the consent of the legislatures of the states concerned as well as of the congress.

(2) The congress shall have power to dispose of, and make all needful rules and regulations respecting the territory or other property belonging to the United States; and nothing in this constitution shall be so construed as to prejudice any claims of the United States or of any particular state.

SEC. 4. The United States shall guarantee to every state in this Union a republican form of government, and shall protect each of them against invasion; and, on application of legislature, or of the executive (when the legislature cannot be convened), against domestic violence.

ARTICLE V.

The congress, whenever two-thirds of both houses shall deem it necessary, shall propose amendments to this constitution, or, on application of the legislatures of two-thirds of the several states, shall call a convention for proposing amendments, which, in either case, shall be valid to all intents and purposes, as part of this constitution when ratified by the legislatures of three-fourths of the several states, or by conventions in three-fourths thereof, as the one or the other mode of ratification may be proposed by the congress; *provided* that no amendment which may be made prior to the year one thousand eight hundred and eight shall in any manner affect the first and fourth clauses in the ninth section of the first article; and that no state, without its consent, shall be deprived of its equal suffrage in the senate.

ARTICLE VI.

(1) All debts contracted and engagements entered into before the adoption of this constitution shall be as valid against the United States under this constitution as under the confederation.

(2) This constitution, and the laws of the United States which shall be made in pursuance thereof, and all treaties made, or which shall be made, under the authority of the United States, shall be the supreme law of the land; and the judges in every state shall be bound thereby, anything in the constitution or laws of any state to the contrary notwithstanding.

(3) The senators and representatives before mentioned and the members of the several state legislatures, and all executives and judicial officers, both of the United States and of the several states, shall be bound by oath or affirmation to support this constitution; but no religious test shall ever be required as a qualification to any office or public trust under the United States.

ARTICLE VII.

The ratification of the conventions of nine states shall be sufficient for the establishment of this constitution between the states so ratifying the same.

Done in convention, by the unanimous consent of the states present, the seventeenth day of September, in the year of our Lord one thousand seven hundred and eighty-seven, and of the independence of the United States of America the twelfth. In witness whereof, we have hereunto subscribed our names.

AMENDMENTS TO THE CONSTITUTION

(Proposed by congress and ratified by the legislatures of the several states, pursuant to the fifth article of the original constitution. For dates of ratification see foot note.*)

ARTICLE I.

Congress shall make no law respecting an establishment of religion, or prohibiting the free exercise thereof; or abridging the freedom of speech or of the press; or the right of the people peaceably to assemble, and to petition the government for a redress of grievances.

ARTICLE II.

A well regulated militia being necessary to the security of a free state, the right of the people to keep and bear arms shall not be infringed.

ARTICLE III.

No soldier shall, in time of peace, be quartered in any house without the consent of the owner; nor in time of war, but in a manner to be prescribed by law.

ARTICLE IV.

The right of the people to be secure in their persons, houses, papers, and effects, against unreasonable searches and seizures, shall not be violated; and no warrants

* The first ten of these amendments were proposed by congress to the legislatures of the several states September 25, 1789, and were ratified by all of the states except Connecticut, Georgia and Massachusetts, before the end of the year 1791, thereby becoming a part of the organic law, pursuant to the fifth article of the original constitution.

The eleventh amendment was in like manner proposed March 5, 1794, and was in a message of the president to congress, January 8, 1798, declared to have been duly ratified by the legislatures of three-fourths of the states.

The twelfth amendment was in like manner proposed December 12, 1803, in lieu of the original third paragraph of the first section of the second article, and September 25, 1804, was proclaimed by the secretary of state to have been duly ratified.

The thirteenth amendment was proposed February 1, 1865, and was December 18, 1865, by the secretary of state, proclaimed to have been duly ratified.

The fourteenth amendment was proposed June 16, 1866, and was, July 28, 1868, by the secretary of state, proclaimed to have been duly ratified.

The fifteenth amendment was proposed February 27, 1869, and was, March 30, 1870, by the secretary of state, proclaimed to have been duly ratified.

The sixteenth amendment was proposed July 12, 1909, and was, February 25, 1913, by the secretary of state, proclaimed to have been duly ratified.

The seventeenth amendment was proposed May 16, 1912, and was, May 31, 1913, by the secretary of state, proclaimed to have been duly ratified.

The eighteenth amendment was proposed December 17, 1917, and was proclaimed by the acting secretary of state on January 29, 1919, to have been duly ratified.

The nineteenth amendment was proposed June 5, 1919, and was proclaimed by the secretary of state on August 26, 1920, to have been duly ratified.

shall issue, but upon probable cause, supported by oath or affirmation, and particularly describing the place to be searched, and the persons or things to be seized.

ARTICLE V.

No person shall be held to answer for a capital, or otherwise infamous crime, unless on a presentment or indictment of a grand jury, except in cases arising in the land or naval forces, or in the militia, when in actual service, in time of war or public danger; nor shall any person be subject, for the same offense, to be twice put in jeopardy of life or limb; nor shall be compelled, in any criminal case, to be a witness against himself; nor be deprived of life, liberty, or property, without due process of law; nor shall private property be taken for public use without just compensation.

ARTICLE VI.

In all criminal prosecutions, the accused shall enjoy the right to a speedy and public trial, by an impartial jury of the state and district wherein the crime shall have been committed, which district shall have been previously ascertained by law, and to be informed of the nature and cause of the accusation; to be confronted with the witnesses against him; to have compulsory process for obtaining witnesses in his favor; and to have the assistance of counsel for his defense.

ARTICLE VII.

In suits at common law where the value in controversy shall exceed twenty dollars, the right of trial by jury shall be preserved; and no fact, tried by a jury shall be otherwise re-examined in any court of the United States, than according to the rules of the common law.

ARTICLE VIII.

Excessive bail shall not be required, nor excessive fines imposed, nor cruel and unusual punishments inflicted.

ARTICLE IX.

The enumeration in the constitution of certain rights shall not be construed to deny or disparage others retained by the people.

ARTICLE X.

The powers not delegated to the United States by the constitution, nor prohibited by it to the states, are reserved to the state respectively, or to the people.

ARTICLE XI.

The judicial power of the United States shall not be construed to extend to any suit in law or equity, commenced or prosecuted against one of the United States by citizens of another state, or by citizens or subjects of any foreign state.

ARTICLE XII.

SECTION 1. The electors shall meet in their respective states, and vote by ballot for president and vice-president, one of whom, at least, shall not be an inhabitant of the same state with themselves; they shall name in their ballots the person voted for as president, and in distinct ballots the person voted for as vice-president; and they shall make distinct lists of all persons voted for as president, and of all persons voted for as vice-president, and of the number of votes for each, which lists they shall sign and certify, and transmit sealed to the seat of the government of the United States, directed to the president of the senate; the president of the senate shall, in the presence of the senate and house of representatives, open all the certificates, and the votes shall then be counted; the person having the greatest number of votes for president shall be the president, if such number be a majority of the whole number of electors appointed; and if no person have such majority, then from the persons having the highest numbers, not exceeding three, on the list of

those voted for as president, the house of representatives shall choose immediately, by ballot, the president. But in choosing the president, the votes shall be taken by states, the representation from each state having one vote; a quorum for this purpose shall consist of a member or members from two-thirds of the states, and a majority of all the states shall be necessary to a choice. And if the house of representatives shall not choose a president, whenever the right of choice shall devolve upon them, before the fourth day of March next following, then the vice-president shall act as president, as in the case of the death or other constitutional disability of the president.

SEC. 2. The person having the greatest number of votes as vice-president shall be the vice-president, if such number be a majority of the whole number of electors appointed; and if no person have a majority, then from the two highest numbers on the list, the senate shall choose the vice-president; a quorum for that purpose shall consist of two-thirds of the whole number of senators, and a majority of the whole number shall be necessary to a choice.

SEC. 3. But no person constitutionally ineligible to the office of president shall be eligible to that of vice-president of the United States.

ARTICLE XIII.

SECTION 1. Neither slavery nor involuntary servitude, except as a punishment for crime, whereof the party shall have been duly convicted, shall exist within the United States, or any place subject to their jurisdiction.

SEC. 2. Congress shall have power to enforce this article by appropriate legislation.

ARTICLE XIV.

SECTION 1. All persons born or naturalized in the United States, and subject to the jurisdiction thereof, are citizens of the United States, and of the state wherein they reside. No state shall make or enforce any law which shall abridge the privileges or immunities of citizens of the United States, nor shall any state deprive any person of life, liberty or property, without due process of law, nor deny to any person within the jurisdiction the equal protection of the laws.

SEC. 2. Representatives shall be apportioned among the several states according to their respective numbers, counting the whole number of persons in each state, excluding Indians not taxed. But when the right to vote at any election for the choice of electors for president and vice-president of the United States, representatives in congress, the executive and judicial officers of a state, or the members of the legislature thereof, is denied to any of the male inhabitants of such state, being twenty-one years of age, and citizens of the United States, or in any way abridged, except for participation in rebellion or other crime, the basis of representation therein shall be reduced in the proportion which the number of such male citizens shall bear to the whole number of male citizens twenty-one years of age in such state.

SEC. 3. No person shall be a senator or representative in congress, or elector of president and vice-president, or hold any office, civil or military, under the United States or under any state, who, having previously taken an oath, as a member of congress, or as an officer of the United States, or as a member of any state legislature, or as an executive or judicial officer of any state, to support the constitution of the United States, shall have engaged in insurrection or rebellion against the same, or given aid or comfort to the enemies thereof. But congress may, by a vote of two-thirds of each house, remove such disability.

SEC. 4. The validity of the public debt of the United States, authorized by law, including debts incurred for payment of pensions and bounties for services in suppressing insurrection or rebellion, shall not be questioned. But neither the United States nor any state shall assume or pay any debt or obligation incurred in aid of insurrection or rebellion against the United States, or any claim for the loss or emancipation of any slave; but all such debts, obligations and claims shall be held illegal and void.

SEC. 5. The congress shall have power to enforce, by appropriate legislation, the provisions of this article.

ARTICLE XV.

SECTION 1. The right of citizens of the United States to vote shall not be denied or abridged by the United States or by any state on account of race, color, or previous condition of servitude.

SEC. 2. The congress shall have power to enforce this article by appropriate legislation.

ARTICLE XVI.

The congress shall have power to lay and collect taxes on incomes, from whatever source derived, without apportionment among the several states, and without regard to any census or enumeration.

ARTICLE XVII.

SECTION 1. The senate of the United States shall be composed of two senators from each state, elected by the people thereof, for six years; and each senator shall have one vote. The electors in each state shall have the qualifications requisite for electors of the most numerous branch of the state legislatures.

SEC. 2. When vacancies happen in the representation of any state in the senate, the executive authority of such state shall issue writs of election to fill such vacancies: *Provided*, That the legislature of any state may empower the executive thereof to make temporary appointments until the people fill the vacancies by election as the legislature may direct.

SEC. 3. This amendment shall not be so construed as to affect the election or term of any senator chosen before it becomes valid as part of the constitution.

ARTICLE XVIII.

SECTION 1. After one year from the ratification of this article the manufacture, sale, or transportation of intoxicating liquors within, the importation thereof into, or the exportation thereof from the United States and all territory subject to the jurisdiction thereof for beverage purposes is hereby prohibited.

SEC. 2. The congress and the several states shall have concurrent power to enforce this article by appropriate legislation.

SEC. 3. This article shall be inoperative unless it shall have been ratified as an amendment to the constitution by the legislatures of the several states, as provided in the constitution, within seven years from the date of the submission hereof to the states by the congress.

ARTICLE XIX.

SECTION 1. The right of citizens of the United States to vote shall not be denied or abridged by the United States or by any state on account of sex.

SEC. 2. Congress shall have power to enforce this article by appropriate legislation.

 LAW AS TO PRESIDENTIAL SUCCESSION.

The presidential succession is fixed by chapter 4 of the acts of the Forty-ninth congress, first session. In case of the removal, death, resignation or inability of both the president and the vice-president, then the secretary of state shall act as president until the disability of the president or vice-president is removed or a president elected. If there be no secretary of state, then the secretary of the treasury will act; and the remainder of the order of succession is as follows: The secretary of war, attorney-general, postmaster-general, secretary of the navy, and secretary of the interior. The acting president must, upon taking office, convene congress, if not at the time in session, in extraordinary session, giving twenty days' notice. This act applies only to such cabinet officers as shall have been appointed by the advice and consent of the senate, and are eligible under the constitution to the presidency.

THE CONSTITUTION OF IOWA

HISTORICAL REVIEW

Iowa "beautiful land," as the Indians called the region, was first seen by white men when Marquette and Joliet touched the west bank of the Mississippi river near the mouth of the Des Moines in 1673.

Marquette, a Jesuit priest, and Joliet, a fur trader, entered the great Father of Waters by way of the Wisconsin river, June 17, and traveled down stream several days before noticing the first sign of habitation. They had almost reached what is now the southern boundary of the state when near the confluence of the Des Moines and Mississippi rivers they discerned footprints on the west bank of the Mississippi and a path leading through the woods. Following the path they came to an Indian village and met friendly Indians. History thus records the first visit of white men to the country which many years later became the state of Iowa.

In 1803 the famous Louisiana purchase was made of the territory of which Iowa was a part and gave to the territory thus secured its first government. The United States then acquired a region of 875,025 square miles, containing 560,016,000 acres, for the sum of \$15,000,000.

One year later congress passed an act dividing the territory along the thirty-third parallel, the northern part being named the district of Louisiana and the southern part the territory of Orleans. In 1812 Orleans became a state called Louisiana and the region of which Iowa was a part, the Missouri territory.

In 1821 Missouri assumed statehood, leaving the region of which Iowa was a part without any organized form of government, but in 1834 it was joined with the territory of Michigan. The territory of Wisconsin was formed in 1836, including the areas later divided into the states of Wisconsin, Minnesota and Iowa. Iowa was organized as a separate territory July 4, 1838, including the portion of the Wisconsin territory west of the Mississippi and north of the state of Missouri.

The territory of Iowa was the ancient abode of the Sac, Ioway, Dakota and Fox tribes of Indians, and did not have any permanent settlers until 1833. The Indians refused permission to white settlers to come in to mine and farm, and the United States troops protected their rights until 1832. The Black Hawk war resulted in letting white men in, for its conclusion in 1832 brought about the cession of thousands of square miles of the eastern part of Iowa. During the next few years, practically the whole of the Iowa territory was secured from them through treaties.

The frontiersmen rushed in to farm and mine. The population increased very rapidly with the influx of prospectors and homeseekers from all parts of the union. During the ten years from 1836 to 1846 the increase in inhabitants was from 10,531 to 102,388.

Government was established among the early settlers by voluntary associations. They selected their own homes and began improving them, building huts and clearing and breaking the ground. "Claim associations" and "land clubs" were formed for the protection of their claims to the land they worked. These organizations were the only government they had and their proceedings were later recognized by the United States government.

The Act of Congress of 1838, entitled "an act to divide the territory of Wisconsin and to establish the Territorial Government of Iowa" gave the Territory of Iowa its constitution. Until the formation of the State in 1846, this constitution was its fundamental law.

Iowa having separated from Wisconsin in 1838 for the want of sufficient courts for judicial relief, the question of applying for admission into the Union as a state was recommended as early as 1839. The first recommendation brought no result, and in 1840 the question of calling a constitutional convention was voted on by the people. It was defeated by a large majority, as it was again in 1842 by those who most wished to avoid an increase in taxes. In 1844, however, the vote was in favor of a convention. Application for a state government was made. The question of boundaries, a result of the question of slavery, held back its admission as a state until 1846, when on the 28th day of December it was admitted into the union on an equal footing with the thirteen original states. It was the sixteenth state so admitted.

The first constitutional convention was convened at Iowa City, October 7, 1844. The constitution adopted by this convention was twice voted on in 1845 and each time defeated.

At a second constitutional convention at Iowa City, May 4, 1846, a constitution was approved. It was adopted by the people at an election held on the third day of August, 1846, there being 9,492 votes cast "for the constitution," and 9,036 votes cast "against the constitution." This constitution was presented to congress in December, 1846, and on the 28th day of the same month an act was passed for the admission of Iowa into the union.

A third constitutional convention was authorized by the people by a majority of over eighteen thousand, for the purpose of revising and amending the constitution. At the November election, 1856, delegates to the convention were elected; and the convention met at Iowa City in January, 1857. The constitution adopted by this convention was adopted by the people at an election held on the 3d day of August, 1857, there being 40,311 votes cast "for the constitution" and 30,681 votes cast "against the constitution." It took effect by proclamation of the governor September 3, 1857. A copy of this constitution, taken from the original records, is contained herein.

The constitution of Iowa has been amended ten times since its adoption all of which amendments are contained herein.

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PREAMBLE

We, the people of the State of Iowa, grateful to the Supreme Being for the blessings hitherto enjoyed, and feeling our dependence on Him for a continuation of those blessings, do ordain and establish a free independent government by the name of the State of Iowa, the boundaries whereof shall be as follows:
Beginning in the middle of the main channel of the Mississippi river, at a point

due east of the middle of the mouth of the main channel of the Des Moines river, thence up the middle of the main channel of the said Des Moines river, to a point on said river where the northern boundary line of the state of Missouri—as established by the constitution of that state—adopted June 12th, 1820—crosses the said middle of the main channel of the said Des Moines river; thence westwardly along the said northern boundary line of the State of Missouri, as established at the time aforesaid, until an extension of said line intersects the middle of the main channel of the Missouri river then up the middle of the main channel of the said Missouri river to a point opposite the middle of the main channel of the Big Sioux river, according to Nicollett's map; thence up the main channel of the said Big Sioux river, according to said map, until it is intersected by the parallel of forty-three degrees and thirty minutes north latitude; thence east along said parallel of forty-three degrees and thirty minutes until said parallel intersects the middle of the main channel of the Mississippi river, then down the middle of the main channel of said Mississippi river to the place of beginning.

ARTICLE I—BILL OF RIGHTS

SECTION 1. All men are by nature, free and equal, and have certain inalienable rights—among which are those of enjoying and defending life and liberty, acquiring, possessing and protecting property, and pursuing and obtaining safety and happiness.

SEC. 2. All political power is inherent in the people. Government is instituted for the protection, security, and benefit of the people, and they have the right at all times to alter or reform the same, whenever the public good may require it.

SEC. 3. The General Assembly shall make no law respecting an establishment of religion, or prohibiting the free exercise thereof; nor shall any person be compelled to attend any place of worship, pay tithes, taxes, or other rates for building or repairing places of worship, or the maintenance of any minister or ministry.

SEC. 4. No religious test shall be required as a qualification for any office, or public trust, and no person shall be deprived of any of his rights, privileges, or capacities, or disqualified from the performance of any of his public or private duties, or rendered incompetent to give evidence in any court of law, or equity, in consequence of his opinions on the subject of religion; and any party to any judicial proceeding shall have the right to use as a witness, or take the testimony of, any other person not disqualified on account of interest, who may be cognizant of any fact material to the case; and parties to suits may be witnesses, as provided by law.

SEC. 5. Any citizen of this state who may hereafter be engaged, either directly or indirectly, in a duel, either as principal, or accessory before the fact, shall forever be disqualified from holding any office under the constitution and laws of this state.

SEC. 6. All laws of a general nature shall have a uniform operation; the general assembly shall not grant to any citizen, or class of citizens, privileges or immunities, which, upon the same terms shall not equally belong to all citizens.

SEC. 7. Every person may speak, write and publish his sentiments on all subjects, being responsible for the abuse of that right. No law shall be passed to restrain or abridge the liberty of speech, or of the press. In all prosecutions or indictments for libel, the truth may be given in evidence to the jury, and if it appear to the jury that the matter charged as libelous was true, and was published with good motives and for justifiable ends, the party shall be acquitted.

SEC. 8. The right of the people to be secure in their persons, houses, papers and effects, against unreasonable seizures and searches shall not be violated; and no warrant shall issue but on probable cause, supported by oath or affirmation, particularly describing the place to be searched, and the persons and things to be seized.

SEC. 9. The right of trial by jury shall remain inviolate; but the general assembly may authorize trial by a jury of a less number than twelve men in inferior

courts; but no person shall be deprived of life, liberty, or property, without due process of law.

SEC. 10. In all criminal prosecutions, and in cases involving the life or liberty of an individual the accused shall have a right to a speedy and public trial by an impartial jury; to be informed of the accusation against him, to have a copy of the same when demanded; to be confronted with the witnesses against him; to have compulsory process for his witnesses; and, to have the assistance of counsel.

SEC. 11. All offenses less than felony and in which the punishment does not exceed a fine of one hundred dollars, or imprisonment for thirty days, shall be tried summarily before a justice of the peace, or other officer authorized by law, on information under oath, without indictment, or the intervention of a grand jury, saving to the defendant the right of appeal; and no person shall be held to answer for any higher criminal offense, unless on presentment or indictment by a grand jury, except in cases arising in the army or navy, or in the militia, when in actual service, in time of war or public danger.

SEC. 12. No person shall, after acquittal, be tried for the same offense. All persons shall, before conviction, be bailable, by sufficient sureties, except for capital offenses where the proof is evident, or the presumption great.

SEC. 13. The writ of habeas corpus shall not be suspended, or refused when application is made as required by law, unless in case of rebellion, or invasion the public safety may require it.

SEC. 14. The military shall be subordinate to the civil power. No standing army shall be kept up by the state in time of peace; and in time of war, no appropriation for a standing army shall be for a longer time than two years.

SEC. 15. No soldier shall, in time of peace, be quartered in any house without the consent of the owner, nor in time of war except in the manner prescribed by law.

SEC. 16. Treason against the state shall consist only in levying war against it, adhering to its enemies, or giving them aid and comfort. No person shall be convicted of treason, unless on the evidence of two witnesses to the same overt act, or confession in open court.

SEC. 17. Excessive bail shall not be required; excessive fines shall not be imposed, and cruel and unusual punishments shall not be inflicted.

SEC. 18. Private property shall not be taken for public use without just compensation first being made, or secured to be made to the owner thereof, as soon as the damages shall be assessed by a jury, who shall not take into consideration any advantages that may result to said owner on account of the improvement for which it is taken.*

SEC. 19. No persons shall be imprisoned for debt in any civil action, on mesne or final process, unless in case of fraud; and no person shall be imprisoned for a militia fine in time of peace.

SEC. 20. The people have the right freely to assemble together to counsel for the common good; to make known their opinions to their representatives and to petition for redress of grievances.

SEC. 21. No bill of attainder, ex post facto law, or law impairing the obligation of contracts, shall ever be passed.

SEC. 22. Foreigners who are, or may hereafter become residents of this state, shall enjoy the same rights in respect to the possession, enjoyment and descent of property, as native born citizens.

SEC. 23. There shall be no slavery in this state; nor shall there be involuntary servitude, unless for the punishment of crime.

SEC. 24. No lease or grant of agricultural lands, reserving any rent, or service of any kind, shall be valid for a longer period than twenty years.

SEC. 25. This enumeration of rights shall not be construed to impair or deny others, retained by the people.

ARTICLE II—RIGHT OF SUFFRAGE

SECTION 1. Every white** male† citizen of the United States, of the age of twenty-one years, who shall have been a resident of this state six months next preceding the election, and of the county in which he claims his vote sixty days, shall be entitled to vote at all elections which are now or hereafter may be authorized by law.

SEC. 2. Electors shall, in all cases except treason, felony, or breach of the peace, be privileged from arrest on the days of election, during their attendance at such election, going to and returning therefrom.

SEC. 3. No elector shall be obliged to perform military duty on the day of election, except in time of war, or public danger.

SEC. 4. No person in the military, naval, or marine service of the United States shall be considered a resident of this state by being stationed in any garrison, barrack, or military or naval place, or station within this state.

SEC. 5. No idiot, or insane person, or person convicted of any infamous crime, shall be entitled to the privilege of an elector.

SEC. 6. All elections by the people shall be by ballot.†

ARTICLE III—OF THE DISTRIBUTION OF POWERS.

SECTION 1. The powers of the government of Iowa shall be divided into three separate departments—the legislative, the executive, and the judicial; and no person charged with the exercise of powers properly belonging to one of these departments shall exercise any function appertaining to either of the others, except in cases hereinafter expressly directed or permitted.

LEGISLATIVE DEPARTMENT.

SECTION 1. The legislative authority of this state shall be vested in a general assembly, which shall consist of a senate and house of representatives; and the style of every law shall be, "Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the state of Iowa."

SEC. 2. The sessions of the general assembly shall be biennial, and shall commence on the second Monday in January next ensuing the election of its members; unless the governor of the state shall, in the meantime, convene the general assembly by proclamation.

SEC. 3. The members of the house of representatives shall be chosen every second year, by the qualified electors of their respective districts, on the second Tuesday in October, except the years of the presidential election, when the election shall be on the Tuesday next after the first Monday in November; and their term of office shall commence on the first day of January next after their election, and continue two years, and until their successors are elected and qualified.‡

SEC. 4. No person shall be a member of the house of representatives who shall not have attained the age of twenty-one years, be a free white male citizen of the United States, and shall have been an inhabitant of this state one year next preceding his election, and at the time of his election shall have had an actual residence of sixty days in the county or district he may have been chosen to represent.*

SEC. 5. Senators shall be chosen for the term of four years, at the same time and place as representatives; they shall be twenty-five years of age and possess the qualifications of representatives as to residence and citizenship.

SEC. 6. The number of senators shall not be less than one-third, nor more than one-half the representative body; and shall be so classified by lot, that one class, being as nearly one-half as possible, shall be elected every two years. When the number of senators is increased, they shall be annexed by lot to one or the other of the two classes, so as to keep them as nearly equal in numbers as practicable.

SEC. 7. Each house shall choose its own officers, and judge of the qualification, election, and return of its own members. A contested election shall be determined in such manner as shall be directed by law.

SEC. 8. A majority of each house shall constitute a quorum to transact business; but a small number may adjourn from day to day, and may compel the attendance of absent members in such manner and under such penalties as each house may provide.

SEC. 9. Each house shall sit upon its own adjournments, keep a journal of its proceedings, and publish the same; determine its rules of proceedings, punish members for disorderly behaviour, and, with the consent of two-thirds, expel a member, but not a second time for the same offense; and shall have all other powers necessary for a branch of the general assembly of a free and independent state.

SEC. 10. Every member of the general assembly shall have the liberty to dissent from, or protest against any act or resolution which he may think injurious to the public, or an individual, and have the reasons for his dissent entered on the journals; and the yeas and nays of the members of either house, on any question, shall, at the desire of any two members present, be entered on the journals.

SEC. 11. Senators and representatives, in all cases, except treason, felony, or breach of the peace, shall be privileged from arrest during the session of the general assembly, and in going to and returning from the same.

SEC. 12. When vacancies occur in either house, the governor or the person exercising the functions of governor, shall issue writs of election to fill such vacancies.

SEC. 13. The doors of each house shall be open, except on such occasions, as, in the opinion of the house, may require secrecy.

SEC. 14. Neither house shall, without the consent of the other, adjourn for more than three days, nor to any other place than that in which they may be sitting.

SEC. 15. Bills may originate in either house, and may be amended, altered, or rejected by the other; and every bill having passed both houses shall be signed by the speaker and president of their respective houses.

SEC. 16. Every bill which shall have passed the general assembly, shall, before it becomes a law, be presented to the governor. If he approve, he shall sign it; but if not, he shall return it with his objections, to the house in which it originated, which shall enter the same upon their journal, and proceed to reconsider it; if, after such reconsideration, it again pass both houses, by yeas and nays, by a majority of two-thirds of the members of each house, it shall become a law, notwithstanding the governor's objections. If any bill shall not be returned within three days after it shall have been presented to him, Sunday excepted, the same shall be a law in like manner as if he had signed it, unless the general assembly, by adjournment, prevent such return. Any bill submitted to the governor for his approval during the last three days of a session of the general assembly, shall be deposited by him in the office of the secretary of state, within thirty days after the adjournment, with his approval, if approved by him, and with his objections, if he disapproves thereof.

SEC. 17. No bill shall be passed unless by the assent of a majority of all the members elected to each branch of the general assembly, and the question upon the final passage shall be taken immediately upon its last reading, and the yeas and nays entered on the journal.

SEC. 18. An accurate statement of the receipts and expenditures of the public money shall be attached to and published with the laws, at every regular session of the general assembly.

SEC. 19. The house of representatives shall have the sole power of impeachment, and all impeachments shall be tried by the senate. When sitting for that purpose, the senators shall be upon oath or affirmation; and no person shall be convicted without the concurrence of two-thirds of the members present.

SEC. 20. The governor, judges of the supreme and district courts, and other state officers, shall be liable to impeachment for any misdemeanor or malfeasance in office; but judgment in such cases shall extend only to removal from office,

and disqualification to hold any office of honor, trust or profit, under this state; but the party convicted or acquitted shall nevertheless be liable to indictment, trial, and punishment, according to law. All other civil officers shall be tried for misdemeanors and malfeasance in office, in such manner as the general assembly may provide.

SEC. 21. No senator or representative shall, during the time for which he shall have been elected, be appointed to any civil office of profit under this state, which shall have been created, or the emoluments of which shall have been increased during such term, except such offices as may be filled by elections by the people.

SEC. 22. No person holding any lucrative office under the United States, or this state, or any other power, shall be eligible to hold a seat in the general assembly; but offices in the militia, to which there is attached no annual salary, or the office of justice of the peace, or postmaster whose compensation does not exceed one hundred dollars per annum, or notary public, shall not be deemed lucrative.

SEC. 23. No person who may hereafter be a collector or holder of public moneys, shall have a seat in either house of the general assembly, or be eligible to hold any office of trust or profit in this state, until he shall have accounted for and paid into the treasury all sums for which he may be liable.

SEC. 24. No money shall be drawn from the treasury but in consequence of appropriations made by law.

SEC. 25. Each member of the first general assembly under this constitution, shall receive three dollars per diem while in session; and the further sum of three dollars for every twenty miles traveled, in going to and returning from the place where such session is held, by the nearest traveled route; after which they shall receive such compensation as shall be fixed by law; but no general assembly shall have power to increase the compensation of its own members. And when convened in extra session they shall receive the same mileage and per diem compensation, as fixed by law for the regular session, and none other.

SEC. 26. No law of the general assembly, passed at a regular session, of a public nature, shall take effect until the fourth day of July next after the passage thereof. Laws passed at a special session shall take effect ninety days after the adjournment of the general assembly by which they were passed. If the general assembly shall deem any law of immediate importance, they may provide that the same shall take effect by publication in newspapers in the state.

SEC. 27. No divorce shall be granted by the general assembly.

SEC. 28. No lottery shall be authorized by this state; nor shall the sale of lottery tickets be allowed.

SEC. 29. Every act shall embrace but one subject, and matters properly connected therewith; which subject shall be expressed in the title. But if any subject shall be embraced in an act which shall not be expressed in the title, such act shall be void only as to so much thereof as shall not be expressed in the title.

SEC. 30. The general assembly shall not pass local or special laws in the following cases:

For the assessment and collection of taxes for state, county, or road purposes;

For laying out, opening, and working roads or highways;

For changing the names of persons;

For the incorporation of cities and towns;

For vacating roads, town plats, streets, alleys, or public squares;

For locating or changing county seats.

In all cases above enumerated, and in all other cases where a general law can be made applicable, all laws shall be general, and of uniform operation throughout the state; and no law changing the boundary lines of any county shall have effect until, upon being submitted to the people of the counties affected by the change, at a general election, it shall be approved by a majority of the votes in each county, cast for and against it.

SEC. 31. No extra compensation shall be made to any officer, public agent, or contractor, after the service shall have been rendered, or the contract entered into; nor, shall any money be paid on any claim, the subject matter of which

shall not have been provided for by pre-existing laws, and no public money or property shall be appropriated for local, or private purposes, unless such appropriation, compensation, or claim, be allowed by two-thirds of the members elected to each branch of the general assembly.

SEC. 32. Members of the general assembly shall, before they enter upon the duties of their respective offices, take and subscribe the following oath or affirmation: "I do solemnly swear, or affirm (as the case may be), that I will support the constitution of the United States, and the constitution of the state of Iowa, and that I will faithfully discharge the duties of senator (or representative, as the case may be), according to the best of my ability." And members of the general assembly are hereby empowered to administer to each other the said oath or affirmation.

SEC. 33. The general assembly shall, in the years one thousand*eight hundred and fifty-nine, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-three, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-five, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-seven, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-nine, and one thousand eight hundred and seventy-five, and every ten years thereafter, cause an enumeration to be made of all the white inhabitants in the state.*

SEC. 34. The number of senators shall, at the next session following each period of making such enumeration, and the next session following each United States census, be fixed by law, and apportioned among the several counties, according to the number of white inhabitants in each.†

SEC. 35. The senate shall not consist of more than fifty members, nor the house of representatives of more than one hundred; and they shall be apportioned among the several counties and representative districts of the state, according to the number of white inhabitants in each, upon ratios to be fixed by law; but no representative district shall contain more than four organized counties, and each district shall be entitled to at least one representative. Every county and district which shall have a number of inhabitants equal to one-half of the ratio fixed by law, shall be entitled to one representative; and any one county containing in addition to the ratio fixed by law, one-half of that number, or more, shall be entitled to one additional representative. No floating district shall hereafter be formed.‡

SEC. 36. At its first session under this constitution and at every subsequent regular session, the general assembly shall fix the ratio of representation, and also form into representative districts those counties which will not be entitled singly to a representative.§

SEC. 37. When a congressional, senatorial, or representative district shall be composed of two or more counties, it shall not be entirely separated by any county belonging to another district; and no county shall be divided in forming a congressional, senatorial, or representative district.

SEC. 38. In all elections by the general assembly, the members thereof shall vote viva voce and the votes shall be entered on the journal.

ARTICLE IV—EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT

SECTION 1. The supreme executive power of this state shall be vested in a chief magistrate, who shall be styled the governor of the State of Iowa.

SEC. 2. The governor shall be elected by the qualified electors at the time and place of voting for members of the general assembly, and shall hold his office two years from the time of his installation, and until his successor is elected and qualified.

SEC. 3. There shall be a lieutenant governor, who shall hold office two years, and be elected at the same time as the governor. In voting for governor and lieutenant governor, the electors shall designate for whom they vote as governor, and for whom as lieutenant governor. The returns of every election for governor and lieutenant governor, shall be sealed up and transmitted to the seat of

government of the state, directed to the speaker of the house of representatives, who shall open and publish them in the presence of both houses of the general assembly.

SEC. 4. The persons respectively having the highest number of votes for governor and lieutenant governor, shall be declared duly elected; but in case two or more persons shall have an equal and the highest number of votes for either office, the general assembly shall, by joint vote, forthwith proceed to elect one of said persons governor, or lieutenant governor, as the case may be.

SEC. 5. Contested elections for governor, or lieutenant governor, shall be determined by the general assembly in such manner as may be prescribed by law.

SEC. 6. No person shall be eligible to the office of governor, or lieutenant governor, who shall not have been a citizen of the United States, and a resident of the state, two years next preceding the election, and attained the age of thirty years at the time of said election.

SEC. 7. The governor shall be commander-in-chief of the militia, the army, and navy of this state.

SEC. 8. He shall transact all executive business with the officers of government, civil and military, and may require information in writing from the officers of the executive department upon any subject relating to the duties of their respective offices.

SEC. 9. He shall take care that the laws are faithfully executed.

SEC. 10. When any office shall, from any cause, become vacant, and no mode is provided by the constitution and laws for filling such vacancy, the governor shall have power to fill such vacancy, by granting a commission which shall expire at the end of the next session of the general assembly or at the next election by the people.

SEC. 11. He may, on extraordinary occasions, convene the general assembly by proclamation, and shall state to both houses, when assembled, the purpose for which they shall have been convened.

SEC. 12. He shall communicate, by message, to the general assembly, at every regular session, the condition of the state, and recommend such matters as he shall deem expedient.

SEC. 13. In case of disagreement between the two houses with respect to the time of adjournment, the governor shall have power to adjourn the general assembly to such time as he may think proper; but no such adjournment shall be beyond the time fixed for the regular meeting of the next general assembly.

SEC. 14. No person shall, while holding any office under the authority of the United States, or this state, execute the office of governor, or lieutenant governor, except as hereinafter expressly provided.

SEC. 15. The official term of the governor, and lieutenant governor, shall commence on the second Monday of January next after their election, and continue for two years, and until their successors are elected and qualified. The lieutenant governor, while acting as governor, shall receive the same pay as provided for governor; and while presiding in the senate, shall receive as compensation therefor, the same mileage and double the per diem pay provided for a senator, and none other.

SEC. 16. The governor shall have power to grant reprieves, commutations and pardons, after conviction for all offenses except treason and cases of impeachment, subject to such regulations as may be provided by law. Upon conviction for treason, he shall have power to suspend the execution of the sentence until the case shall be reported to the general assembly at its next meeting, when the general assembly shall either grant a pardon, commute the sentence, direct the execution of the sentence, or grant a further reprieve. He shall have power to remit fines and forfeitures, under such regulations as may be prescribed by law and shall report to the general assembly, at its next meeting, each case of reprieve, commutation, or pardon granted, and the reason therefor; and also all persons in whose favor remission of fines and forfeitures shall have been made, and the several amounts remitted.

SEC. 17. In case of the death, impeachment, resignation, removal from office, or other disability of the governor, the powers and duties of the office for the resi-

due term, or until he shall be acquitted, or the disability removed, shall devolve upon the lieutenant governor.

SEC. 18. The lieutenant governor shall be president of the senate, but shall only vote when the senate is equally divided; and in case of his absence, or impeachment, or when he shall exercise the office of governor, the senate shall choose a president pro tempore.

SEC. 19. If the lieutenant governor, while acting as governor, shall be impeached, displaced, resign, or die, or otherwise become incapable of performing the duties of the office, the president pro tempore of the senate shall act as governor until the vacancy is filled, or the disability removed; and if the president of the senate, for any of the above causes, shall be rendered incapable of performing the duties pertaining to the office of governor, the same shall devolve upon the speaker of the house of representatives.

SEC. 20. There shall be a seal of this state, which shall be kept by the governor, and used by him officially and shall be called the great seal of the State of Iowa.

SEC. 21. All grants and commissions shall be in the name and by the authority of the people of the State of Iowa, sealed with the great seal of the state, signed by the governor, and countersigned by the secretary of state.

SEC. 22. A secretary of state, auditor of state, and treasurer of state, shall be elected by the qualified electors, who shall continue in office two years, and until their successors are elected and qualified; and perform such duties as may be required by law.

ARTICLE V—JUDICIAL DEPARTMENT

SECTION 1. The judicial power shall be vested in a supreme court, district courts, and such other courts, inferior to the supreme court, as the general assembly may, from time to time establish.

SEC. 2. The supreme court shall consist of three judges, two of whom shall constitute a quorum to hold court.

SEC. 3. The judges of the supreme court shall be elected by the qualified electors of the state, and shall hold their court at such time and place as the general assembly may prescribe. The judges of the supreme court so elected, shall be classified so that one judge shall go out of office every two years; and the judge holding the shortest term of office under such classification, shall be chief justice of the court, during his term, and so on in rotation. After the expiration of their terms of office, under such classification, the term of each judge of the supreme court shall be six years, and until his successor shall have been elected and qualified. The judges of the supreme court shall be ineligible to any other office in the state, during the term for which they shall have been elected.

SEC. 4. The supreme court shall have appellate jurisdiction only in cases in chancery, and shall constitute a court for the correction of errors at law, under such restrictions as the general assembly may, by law, prescribe; and shall have power to issue all writs and process necessary to secure justice to parties, and exercise a supervisory control over all inferior judicial tribunals throughout the state.

SEC. 5. The district court shall consist of a single judge, who shall be elected by the qualified electors of the district in which he resides. The judge of the district court shall hold his office for the term of four years, and until his successor shall have been elected and qualified; and shall be ineligible to any other office, except that of judge of the supreme court, during the term for which he was elected.

SEC. 6. The district court shall be a court of law and equity, which shall be distinct and separate jurisdictions, and have jurisdiction in civil and criminal matters arising in their respective districts, in such manner as shall be prescribed by law.

SEC. 7. The judges of the supreme and district courts shall be conservators of the peace throughout the state.

SEC. 8. The style of all process shall be, "The State of Iowa," and all prosecutions shall be conducted in the name and by the authority of the same.

SEC. 9. The salary of each judge of the supreme court shall be two thousand dollars per annum; and that of each district judge, one thousand six hundred

dollars per annum, until the year eighteen hundred sixty; after which time, they shall severally receive such compensation as the general assembly may, by law, prescribe; which compensation shall not be increased or diminished during the term for which they shall have been elected.

SEC. 10. The state shall be divided into eleven judicial districts; and after the year eighteen hundred and sixty, the general assembly may reorganize the judicial districts and increase or diminish the number of districts, or the number of judges of the said court, and may increase the number of judges of the supreme court; but such increase or diminution shall not be more than one district or one judge of either court, at any one session; and no reorganization of the districts, or diminution of the number of judges, shall have the effect of removing a judge from office. Such reorganization of the districts or any change in the boundaries thereof, or increase or diminution of the number of judges, shall take place every four years thereafter, if necessary, and at no other time.*

SEC. 11. The judges of the supreme and district courts shall be chosen at the general election; and the term of office of each judge shall commence on the first day of January next after his election.

SEC. 12. The general assembly shall provide, by law, for the election of an attorney general by the people, whose term of office shall be two years, and until his successor shall have been elected and qualified.

SEC. 13. The qualified electors of each judicial district shall, at the time of the election of district judge, elect a district attorney, who shall be a resident of the district for which he is elected, and who shall hold his office for the term of four years, and until his successor shall have been elected and qualified.†

SEC. 14. It shall be the duty of the general assembly to provide for the carrying into effect of this article, and to provide for a general system of practice in all the courts of this state.‡

ARTICLE VI—MILITIA.

SECTION 1. The militia of this state shall be composed of all able-bodied white male citizens, between the ages of eighteen and forty-five years, except such as are or may hereafter be exempt by the laws of the United States, or of this state, and shall be armed, equipped, and trained, as the general assembly may provide by law.§

SEC. 2. No person or persons conscientiously scrupulous of bearing arms shall be compelled to do military duty in time of peace: Provided, that such person or persons shall pay an equivalent for such exemption in the same manner as other citizens.

SEC. 3. All commissioned officers of the militia (staff officers excepted) shall be elected by the persons liable to perform military duty, and shall be commissioned by the governor.

ARTICLE VII—STATE DEBTS.

SECTION 1. The credit of the state shall not, in any manner, be given or loaned to, or in aid of, any individual, association, or corporation; and the state shall never assume, or become responsible for, the debts or liabilities of any individual, association, or corporation, unless incurred in time of war for the benefit of the state.

SEC. 2. The state may contract debts to supply casual deficits or failures in revenues, or to meet expenses not otherwise provided for; but the aggregate amount of such debts, direct and contingent, whether contracted by virtue of one or more acts of the general assembly, or at different periods of time, shall never exceed the sum of two hundred and fifty thousand dollars; and the money arising from the creation of such debts, shall be applied to the purpose for which it was obtained, or to repay the debts so contracted, and to no other purpose whatever.

SEC. 3. All losses to the permanent, school, or university fund of this state, which shall have been occasioned by the defalcation, mismanagement or fraud of

the agents or officers controlling and managing the same, shall be audited by the proper authorities of the state. The amount so audited shall be a permanent funded debt against the state, in favor of the respective fund, sustaining the loss, upon which not less than six per cent annual interest shall be paid. The amount of liability so created shall not be counted as a part of the indebtedness authorized by the second section of this article.*

SEC. 4. In addition to the above limited power to contract debts, the state may contract debts to repel invasion, suppress insurrection, or defend the state in war; but the money arising from the debts so contracted shall be applied to the purpose for which it was raised, or to repay such debts, and to no other purpose whatever.

SEC. 5. Except the debts hereinbefore specified in this article, no debt shall be hereafter contracted by, or on behalf of this state, unless such debt shall be authorized by some law for some single work or object, to be distinctly specified therein; and such law shall impose and provide for the collection of a direct annual tax, sufficient to pay the interest on such debt, as it falls due, and also to pay and discharge the principal of such debt, within twenty years from the time of the contracting thereof; but no such law shall take effect until at a general election it shall have been submitted to the people, and have received a majority of all the votes cast for and against it at such election; and all money raised by authority of such law, shall be applied only to the specific object therein stated, or to the payment of the debt created thereby; and such law shall be published in at least one newspaper in each county, if one is published therein, throughout the state, for three months preceding the election at which it is submitted to the people.

SEC. 6. The legislature may, at any time, after the approval of such law by the people, if no debt shall have been contracted in pursuance thereof, repeal the same; and may, at any time, forbid the contracting of any further debt, or liability, under such law; but the tax imposed by such law, in proportion to the debt or liability, which may have been contracted in pursuance thereof, shall remain in force and be irrevocable, and be annually collected, until the principal and interest are fully paid.

SEC. 7. Every law which imposes, continues, or revives a tax, shall distinctly state the tax, and the object to which it is to be applied; and it shall not be sufficient to refer to any other law to fix such tax or object.

ARTICLE VIII—CORPORATIONS.

SECTION 1. No corporation shall be created by special laws; but the general assembly shall provide, by general laws, for the organization of all corporations hereafter to be created, except as hereinafter provided.

SEC. 2. The property of all corporations for pecuniary profit, shall be subject to taxation the same as that of individuals.

SEC. 3. The state shall not become a stockholder in any corporation, nor shall it assume or pay the debt or liability of any corporation, unless incurred in time of war for the benefit of the state.

SEC. 4. No political or municipal corporation shall become a stockholder in any banking corporation, directly or indirectly.

SEC. 5. No act of the general assembly, authorizing or creating corporations or associations with banking powers, nor amendments thereto shall take effect, or in any manner be in force, until the same shall have been submitted, separately, to the people, at a general or special election, as provided by law, to be held not less than three months after the passage of the act, and shall have been approved by a majority of all the electors voting for and against it at such election.

SEC. 6. Subject to the provisions of the foregoing section, the general assembly may also provide for the establishment of a state bank with branches.

SEC. 7. If a state bank be established, it shall be founded on an actual specie basis, and branches shall be mutually responsible for each other's liabilities upon all notes, bills, and other issues intended for circulation as money.

SEC. 8. If a general banking law shall be enacted, it shall provide for the registry and countersigning, by an officer of state, of all bills, or paper credit designed to circulate as money, and require security to the full amount thereof, to

be deposited with the state treasurer, in United States stocks, or in interest paying stocks of states in good credit and standing, to be rated at ten per cent below their average value in the City of New York, for the thirty days next preceding their deposit; and in case of a depreciation of any portion of said stocks, to the amount of ten per cent on the dollar, the bank or banks owning such stocks shall be required to make up said deficiency by depositing additional stocks; and said law shall also provide for the recording of the names of all stockholders in such corporations, the amount of stock held by each, the time of any transfer, and to whom.

SEC. 9. Every stockholder in a banking corporation or institution shall be individually responsible and liable to its creditors, over and above the amount of stock by him or her held, to an amount equal to his or her respective shares so held for all its liabilities, accruing while he or she remains such stockholder.

SEC. 10. In case of the insolvency of any banking institution, the billholders shall have preference over its other creditors.

SEC. 11. The suspension of specie payments by banking institutions shall never be permitted or sanctioned.

SEC. 12. Subject to the provisions of this article, the general assembly shall have power to amend or repeal all laws for the organization or creation of corporations, or granting of special or exclusive privileges or immunities, by a vote of two-thirds of each branch of the general assembly; and no exclusive privileges, except as in this article provided, shall ever be granted.

ARTICLE IX—EDUCATION AND SCHOOL LANDS

1st. Education.

SECTION 1. The educational interest of the state, including common schools and other educational institutions, shall be under the management of a board of education, which shall consist of the lieutenant governor, who shall be the presiding officer of the board, and have the casting vote in case of a tie, and one member to be elected from each judicial district in the state.

SEC. 2. No person shall be eligible as a member of said board who shall not have attained the age of twenty-five years, and shall have been one year a citizen of the state.

SEC. 3. One member of said board shall be chosen by the qualified electors of each district, and shall hold office for the term of four years, and until his successor is elected and qualified. After the first election under this constitution the board shall be divided, as nearly as practicable, into two equal classes, and the seats of the first class shall be vacated after the expiration of two years; and one-half of the board shall be chosen every two years thereafter.

SEC. 4. The first session of the board of education shall be held at the seat of government, on the first Monday of December, after their election; after which the general assembly may fix the time and place of meeting.

SEC. 5. The session of the board shall be limited to twenty days, and but one session shall be held in any one year, except upon extraordinary occasions, when, upon the recommendation of two-thirds of the board, the governor may order a special session.

SEC. 6. The board of education shall appoint a secretary, who shall be the executive officer of the board, and perform such duties as may be imposed upon him by the board, and the laws of the state. They shall keep a journal of their proceedings, which shall be published and distributed in the same manner as the journals of the general assembly.

SEC. 7. All rules and regulations made by the board shall be published and distributed to the several counties, townships, and school districts, as may be provided for by the board, and when so made, published and distributed, they shall have the force and effect of law.

SEC. 8. The board of education shall have full power and authority to legislate and make all needful rules and regulations in relation to common schools, and other educational institutions, that are instituted, to receive aid from the school or university fund of this state; but all acts, rules and regulations of said board may be altered, amended, or repealed by the general assembly; and when

so altered, amended, or repealed they shall not be re-enacted by the board of education.

SEC. 9. The governor of the state shall be, *ex officio*, a member of said board.

SEC. 10. The board shall have no power to levy taxes, or make appropriations of money. Their contingent expenses shall be provided for by the general assembly.

SEC. 11. The state university shall be established at one place without branches at any other place, and the university fund shall be applied to that institution and no other.

SEC. 12. The board of education shall provide for the education of all the youths of the state, through a system of common schools and such schools shall be organized and kept in each school district at least three months in each year. Any district failing, for two consecutive years, to organize and keep up a school as aforesaid may be deprived of their portion of the school fund.

SEC. 13. The members of the board of education shall each receive the same per diem during the time of their session, and mileage going to and returning therefrom, as members of the general assembly.

SEC. 14. A majority of the board shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business; but no rule, regulation, or law, for the government of common schools or other educational institutions, shall pass without the concurrence of a majority of all the members of the board, which shall be expressed by the yeas and nays on the final passage. The style of all acts of the board shall be, "Be it enacted by the Board of Education of the State of Iowa."

SEC. 15. At any time after the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-three, the general assembly shall have the power to abolish or reorganize said board of education, and provide for the educational interest of the state in any other manner that to them shall seem best and proper.*

2nd. School Funds and School Lands.

SECTION 1. The educational and school funds and lands, shall be under the control and management of the general assembly of this state.

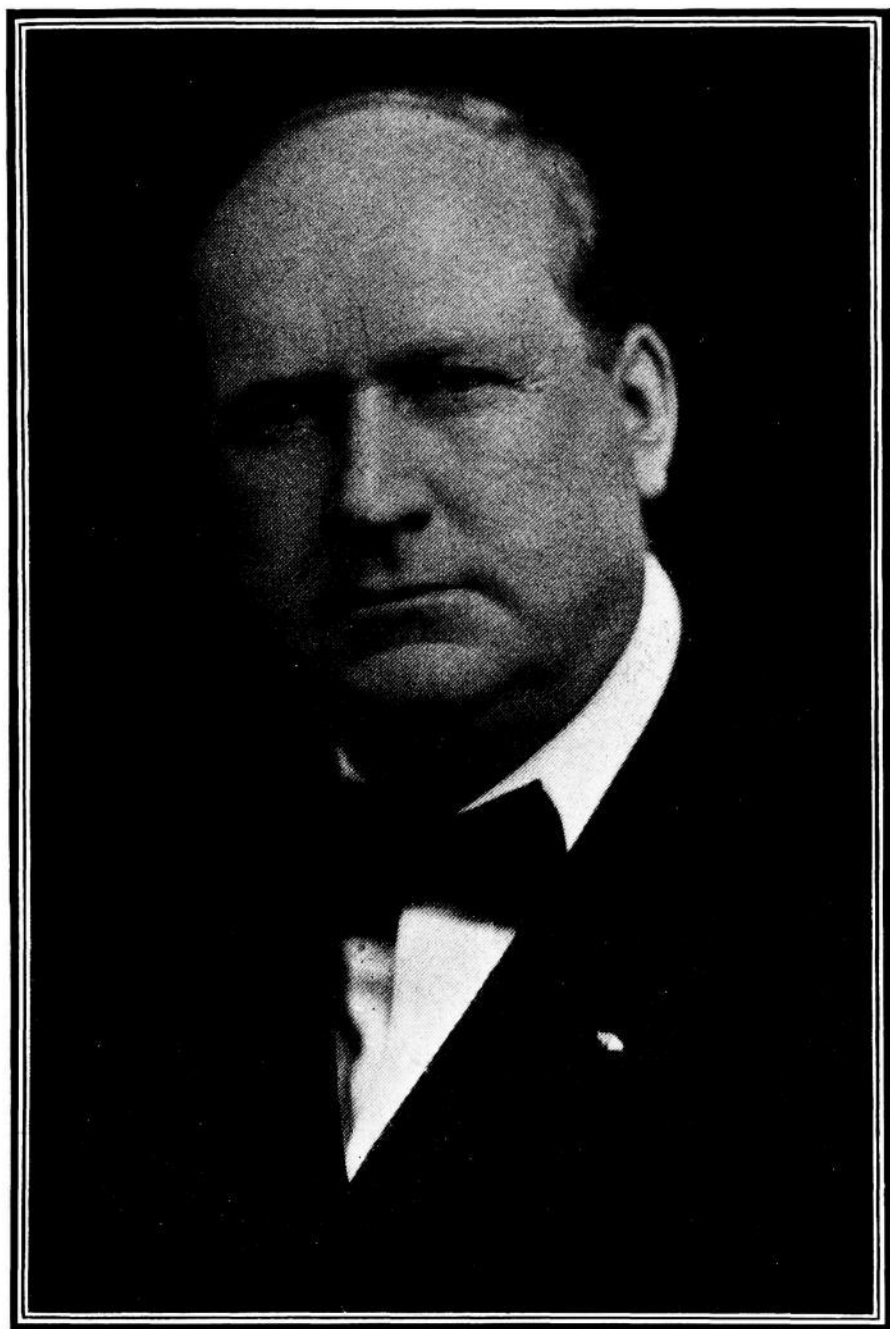
SEC. 2. The university lands, and the proceeds thereof, and all moneys belonging to said fund shall be a permanent fund for the sole use of the state university. The interest arising from the same shall be annually appropriated for the support and benefit of said university.

SEC. 3. The general assembly shall encourage, by all suitable means, the promotion of intellectual, scientific, moral and agricultural improvement. The proceeds of all lands that have been, or hereafter may be, granted by the United States to this state, for the support of schools, which may have been, or shall hereafter be sold, or disposed of, and the five hundred thousand acres of land granted to the new states, under an act of congress, distributing the proceeds of the public lands among the several states of the union, approved in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and forty-one, and all estates of deceased persons who may have died without leaving a will or heir, and also such per cent, as has been or may hereafter be granted by congress, on the sale of lands in this state, shall be, and remain a perpetual fund, the interest of which together with all rents of the unsold lands, and such other means as the general assembly may provide, shall be inviolably appropriated to the support of common schools throughout the state.

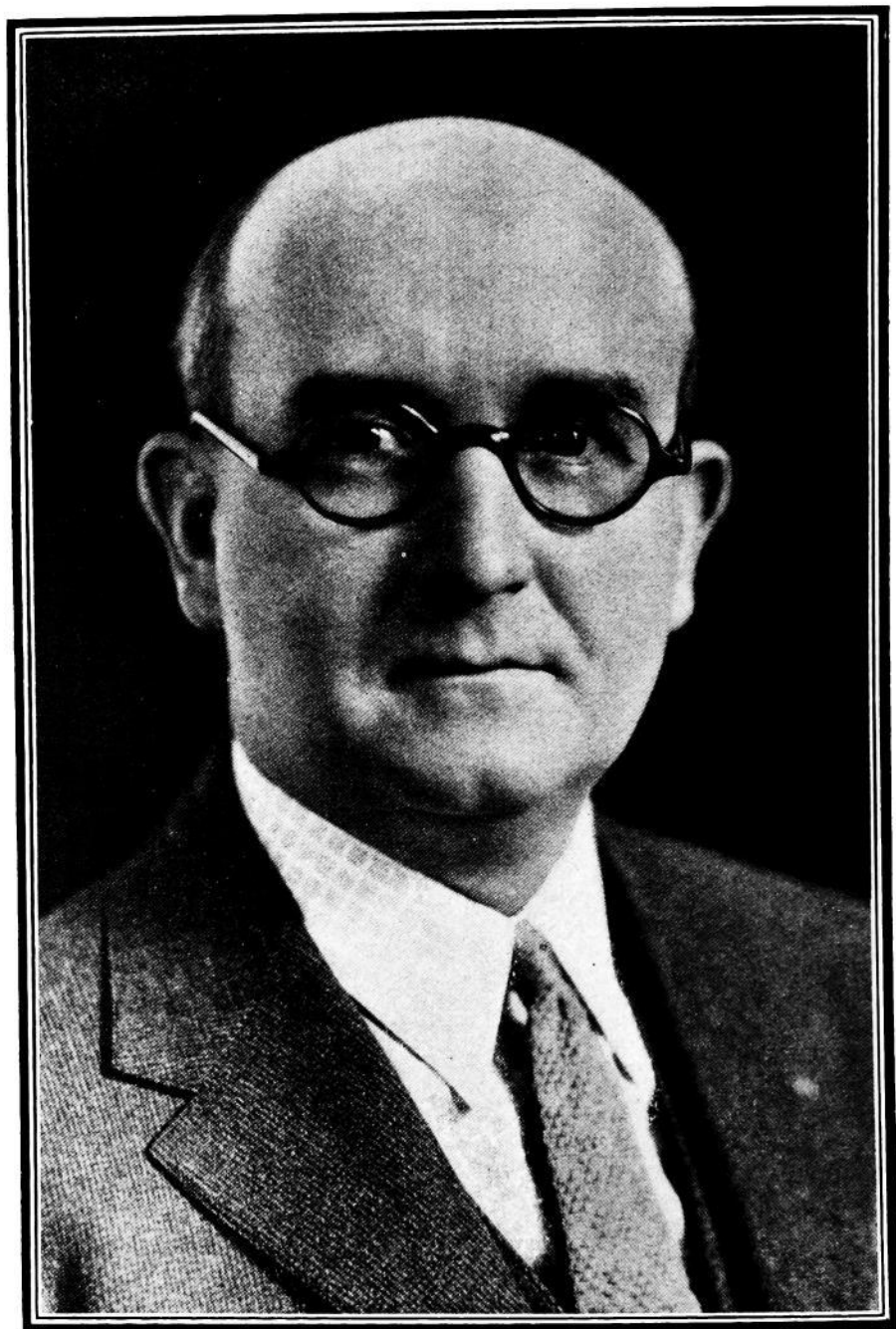
SEC. 4. The money which may have been or shall be paid by persons as an equivalent for exemption from military duty, and the clear proceeds of all fines collected in the several counties for any breach of the penal laws, shall be exclusively applied, in the several counties in which such money is paid, or fine collected, among the several school districts of said counties, in proportion to the number of youths subject to enumeration in such districts, to the support of common schools, or the establishment of libraries, as the board of education shall from time to time provide.

SEC. 5. The general assembly shall take measures for the protection, improvement, or other disposition of such lands as have been, or may hereafter be reserved, or granted by the United States, or any person or persons, to this

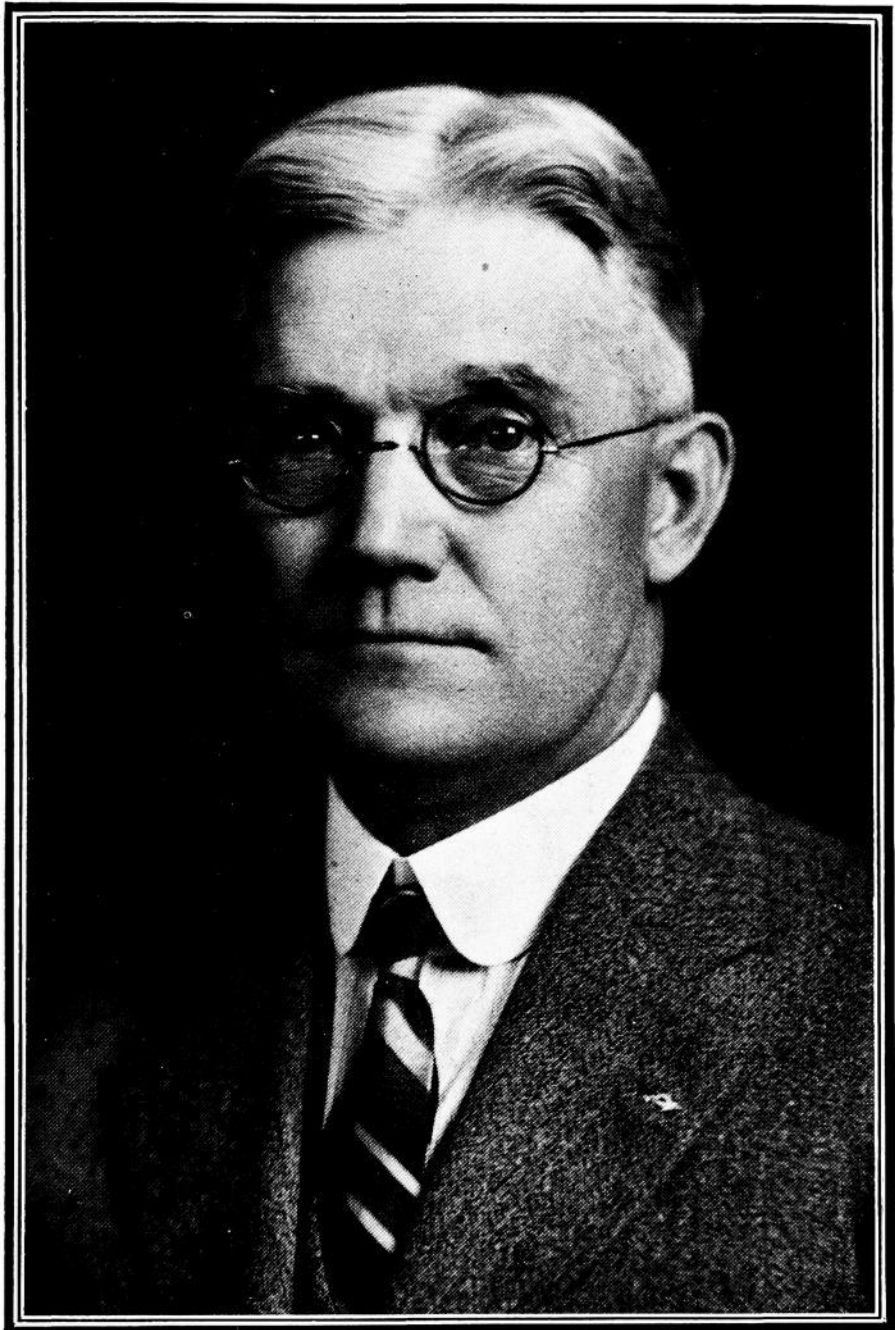

state, for the use of the university, and the funds accruing from the rents or sale of such lands, or from any other source for the purpose aforesaid, shall be, and remain, a permanent fund, the interest of which shall be applied to the support of said university, for the promotion of literature, the arts and sciences, as may be authorized by the terms of such grant. And it shall be the duty of the general assembly as soon as may be, to provide effectual means for the improvement and permanent security of the funds of said university.

SEC. 6. The financial agents of the school funds shall be the same, that by law, receive and control the state and county revenue for other civil purposes, under such regulations as may be provided by law.

SEC. 7. The money subject to the support and maintenance of common schools shall be distributed to the districts in proportion to the number of youths, between the ages of five and twenty-one years, in such manner as may be provided by the general assembly.

ARTICLE X—AMENDMENTS TO THE CONSTITUTION

SECTION 1. Any amendment or amendments to this constitution may be proposed in either house of the general assembly; and if the same shall be agreed to by a majority of the members elected to each of the two houses, such proposed amendment shall be entered on their journals, with the yeas and nays taken thereon, and referred to the legislature to be chosen at the next general election, and shall be published, as provided by law, for three months previous to the time of making such choice; and if, in the general assembly so next chosen as aforesaid such proposed amendment or amendments shall be agreed to, by a majority of all the members elected to each house, then it shall be the duty of the general assembly to submit such proposed amendment or amendments to the people, in such manner, and at such time as the general assembly shall provide; and if the people shall approve and ratify such amendment or amendments, by a majority of the electors qualified to vote for members of the general assembly, voting thereon, such amendment or amendments shall become a part of the constitution of this state.

SEC. 2. If two or more amendments shall be submitted at the same time, they shall be submitted in such manner that the electors shall vote for or against each of such amendments separately.

SEC. 3. At the general election to be held in the year one thousand eight hundred and seventy, and in each tenth year thereafter, and also at such times as the general assembly may, by law, provide, the question, "Shall there be a convention to revise the constitution, and amend the same?" shall be decided by the electors qualified to vote for members of the general assembly; and in case a majority of the electors so qualified, voting at such election, for and against such proposition, shall decide in favor of a convention for such purpose, the general assembly, at its next session, shall provide by law for the election of delegates to such convention.

ARTICLE XI—MISCELLANEOUS

SECTION 1. The jurisdiction of justices of the peace shall extend to all civil cases (except cases in chancery, and cases where the question of title to real estate may arise), where the amount in controversy does not exceed one hundred dollars, and by the consent of parties may be extended to any amount not exceeding three hundred dollars.

SEC. 2. No new county shall be hereafter created containing less than four hundred and thirty-two square miles; nor shall the territory of any organized county be reduced below that area; except the county of Worth, and the counties west of it, along the northern boundary of this state, may be organized without additional territory.

SEC. 3. No county, or other political or municipal corporation shall be allowed to become indebted in any manner, or for any purpose, to an amount in the aggregate, exceeding five per centum on the value of the taxable property within such county or corporation—to be ascertained by the last state and county tax lists, previous to the incurring of such indebtedness.

SEC. 4. The boundaries of the state may be enlarged, with the consent of congress and the general assembly.

SEC. 5. Every person elected or appointed to any office, shall, before entering

upon the duties thereof, take an oath or affirmation to support the constitution of the United States, and of this state, and also an oath of office.

SEC. 6. In all cases of elections to fill vacancies in office occurring before the expiration of a full term, the person so elected shall hold for the residue of the unexpired term; and all persons appointed to fill vacancies in office, shall hold until the next general election, and until their successors are elected and qualified.

SEC. 7. The general assembly shall not locate any of the public lands, which have been, or may be granted by congress to this state, and the location of which may be given to the general assembly, upon lands actually settled, without the consent of the occupant. The extent of the claim of such occupant, so exempted, shall not exceed three hundred twenty acres.

SEC. 8. The seat of government is hereby permanently established, as now fixed by law, at the city of Des Moines, in the county of Polk; and the state university at Iowa City, in the county of Johnson.

ARTICLE XII—SCHEDULE

SECTION 1. This constitution shall be the supreme law of the state, and any law inconsistent therewith, shall be void. The general assembly shall pass all laws necessary to carry this constitution into effect.

SEC. 2. All laws now in force and not inconsistent with this constitution, shall remain in force until they shall expire or be repealed.

SEC. 3. All indictments, prosecutions, suits, pleas, complaints, process, and other proceedings pending in any of the courts, shall be prosecuted to final judgment and execution; and all appeals, writs of error, certiorari, and injunctions, shall be carried on in the several courts, in the same manner as now provided by law; and all offenses, misdemeanors, and crimes that may have been committed before the taking effect of this constitution, shall be subject to indictment, trial and punishment, in the same manner as they have been, had not this constitution been made.

SEC. 4. All fines, penalties, or forfeitures due, or to become due, or accruing to the state, or to any county therein, or to the school fund, shall inure to the state, county, or school fund, in the manner prescribed by law.

SEC. 5. All bonds executed to the state, or to any officer in his official capacity, shall remain in force and inure to the use of those concerned.

SEC. 6. The first election under the constitution shall be held on the second Tuesday in October, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven, at which time the electors of the state shall elect the governor and lieutenant governor. There shall also be elected at such election, the successors of such state senators as were elected at the August election, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-four, and the members of the house of representatives, who shall be elected in accordance with the act of apportionment, enacted at the session of the general assembly which commenced on the first Monday of December one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six.

SEC. 7. The first election for secretary, auditor, and treasurer of state, attorney general, district judges, members of the board of education, district attorneys, members of congress and such state officers as shall be elected at the April election, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven (except the superintendent of public instruction), and such county officers as were elected at the August election, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six, except prosecuting attorneys, shall be held on the second Tuesday of October, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-eight: *Provided*, That the time for which any district judge or other state or county officer elected at the April election in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-eight, shall not extend beyond the time fixed for filling like offices at the October election in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-eight.

SEC. 8. The first election for judges of the supreme court, and such county officers as shall be elected at the August election, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven, shall be held on the second Tuesday of October, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-nine.

SEC. 9. The first regular session of the general assembly shall be held in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-eight, commencing on the second Monday of January of said year.

SEC. 10. Senators elected at the August election, in the year one thousand eight

hundred and fifty-six, shall continue in office until the second Tuesday of October, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-nine at which time their successors shall be elected as may be prescribed by law.

SEC. 11. Every person elected by popular vote, by vote of the general assembly, or who may hold office by executive appointment, which office is continued by this constitution, and every person who shall be so elected or appointed, to any such office, before the taking effect of this constitution (except as in this constitution otherwise provided), shall continue in office until the term for which such person has been or may be elected or appointed shall expire; but no such person shall continue in office after the taking effect of this constitution, for a longer period than the term of such office, in this constitution prescribed.

SEC. 12. The general assembly, at the first session under this constitution, shall district the state into eleven judicial districts, for district court purposes; and shall also provide for the apportionment of the members of the general assembly, in accordance with the provisions of this constitution.

SEC. 13. This constitution shall be submitted to the electors of the state at the August election, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven, in the several election districts in this state. The ballots at such election shall be written or printed as follows: Those in favor of the constitution, "New Constitution—Yes." Those against the constitution, "New Constitution—No." The election shall be conducted in the same manner as the general elections of the state, and the poll-books shall be returned and canvassed as provided in the twenty-fifth chapter of the code, and abstracts shall be forwarded to the secretary of state, which abstracts shall be canvassed in the manner provided for the canvass of state officers. And if it shall appear that a majority of all the votes cast at such election for and against this constitution are in favor of the same, the governor shall immediately issue his proclamation stating that fact, and such constitution shall be the constitution of the state of Iowa, and shall take effect from and after the publication of said proclamation.

SEC. 14. At the same election that this constitution is submitted to the people for its adoption or rejection, a proposition to amend the same by striking out the word "White" from the article on the right of suffrage shall be separately submitted to the electors of this state for adoption or rejection in the manner following—namely: A separate ballot may be given by every person having a right to vote at said election, to be deposited in a separate box; and those given for the adoption of such proposition shall have the words, "Shall the word 'White' be stricken out of the article on the right of suffrage? Yes." And those given against the proposition shall have the words, "Shall the word 'White' be stricken out of the article on the right of suffrage? No." And if at said election the number of ballots cast in favor of said proposition shall be equal to a majority of those cast for and against this constitution, then said word "White" shall be stricken from said article and be no part thereof.

SEC. 15. Until otherwise directed by law, the county of Mills shall be in and a part of the sixth judicial district of this state (Amended. See Amendment of 1904).

Done in convention at Iowa City, this fifth day of March in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven, and of the Independence of the United States of America, the eighty-first.

PROCLAMATION

Whereas an instrument known as the "New Constitution of the State of Iowa" adopted by the constitutional convention of said state on the fifth day of March, A. D. 1857, was submitted to the qualified electors of said state at the annual election held on Monday the third day of August, 1857, for their approval or rejection.

And whereas an official canvass of the votes cast at said election shows that there were forty thousand three hundred and eleven votes cast for the adoption of said constitution and thirty-eight thousand six hundred and eighty-one votes were cast against its adoption, leaving a majority of sixteen hundred and thirty votes in favor of its adoption.

Now therefore I, JAMES W. GRIMES, Governor of said state, by virtue of the authority conferred upon me, hereby declare the said new constitution to be adopted, and declare it to be the supreme law of the state of Iowa.

In testimony whereof I have hereunto set my hand and affixed the great seal of the state of Iowa.

Done at Iowa City this third day of September A. D. 1857 of the Independence of the United States the eighty-second and of the state of Iowa the eleventh.

AMENDMENTS TO THE CONSTITUTION OF IOWA
from 1857 to 1928

AMENDMENTS OF 1868

1.

Strike the word "white" from section 1 of article II.

2.

Strike the word "white" from section 33 of article III.

3.

Strike the word "white" from section 34 of article III.

4.

Strike the word "white" from section 35 of article III.

5.

Strike the word "white" from section 1 of article VI.

NOTE—These amendments were proposed by the general assembly of 1866; re-adopted by the general assembly of 1868; ratified at the election of November 3, 1868, and proclaimed adopted on December 8, 1868.

Sections 34 and 35 have been amended twice. The present amendment was adopted in 1904.

AMENDMENT OF 1880

1.

Strike out the words "free white" from the third line of section four (4) of article three (3) of said constitution, relating to the legislative department.

NOTE—This amendment was proposed by the general assembly of 1878; re-adopted by the general assembly of 1880; ratified at the election of November 2, 1880, and proclaimed adopted on December 3, 1880.

AMENDMENT OF 1882.

Add as section 26, to article I of said constitution, the following: No person shall manufacture for sale, or sell or keep for sale, as a beverage any intoxicating liquors whatever, including ale, wine and beer. The general assembly shall by law prescribe regulations for the enforcement of the prohibition herein contained, and shall thereby provide suitable penalties for the violation of the provisions hereof.

NOTE—This amendment was proposed by the general assembly of 1880; re-adopted by the general assembly of 1882, ratified at a special election held on June 27, 1882, and certified adopted on July 28, 1882. On April 21, 1883, the supreme court in *Kochler and Lang v. Hill*, 60 Iowa 543, held that owing to certain irregularities the amendment was not legally submitted to the electors, and thence did not become a part of the constitution.

AMENDMENT OF 1884.

1.

The general election for state, district, county and township offices, shall be held on the Tuesday next after the first Monday in November.

2.

At any regular session of the general assembly the state may be divided into the necessary judicial districts for district court purposes, or the said districts may be reorganized and the number of the districts and the judges of the said courts increased or diminished; but no reorganization of the districts or diminution of the judges shall have the effect of removing a judge from office.

3.

The grand jury may consist of any number of members, not less than five, nor more than fifteen, as the general assembly may by law provide, or the general assembly may provide for holding persons to answer for any criminal offense without the intervention of a grand jury.

4.

That section 13 of article V of the constitution be stricken therefrom, and the following adopted as such section.

Section 13. The qualified electors of each county shall, at the general election in the year 1886, and every two years thereafter, elect a county attorney, who shall be a resident of the county for which he is elected, and who shall hold his office for two years, and until his successor shall have been elected and qualified.

NOTE—These amendments were proposed by the general assembly of 1882; re-adopted by the general assembly of 1884; ratified at the election of November 4, 1884, and certified adopted on December 10, 1884. Section 1 relating to time of general election was repealed by the amendment of 1916.

AMENDMENTS OF 1904.

1.

Add as section 16, to article XII of the constitution, the following:

SEC. 16. The first general election after the adoption of this amendment shall be held on the Tuesday next after the first Monday in November in the year one thousand nine hundred and six, and general elections shall be held biennially thereafter. In the year one thousand nine hundred and six there shall be elected a governor, lieutenant governor, secretary of state, auditor of state, treasurer of state, attorney general, two judges of the supreme court, the successors of the judges of the district court whose terms of office expire on December 31st, one thousand nine hundred and six, state senators who would otherwise be chosen in the year one thousand nine hundred and five, and members of the house of representatives. The terms of office of the judges of the supreme court which would otherwise expire on December 31st, in odd numbered years, and all other elective state, county and township officers whose terms of office would otherwise expire in January in the year one thousand nine hundred and six, and members of the general assembly whose successors would otherwise be chosen at the general election in the year one thousand nine hundred and five, are hereby extended one year and until their successors are elected and qualified. The terms of offices of senators whose successors would otherwise be chosen in the year one thousand nine hundred and seven are hereby extended one year and until their successors are elected and qualified. The general assembly shall make such changes in the law governing the time of election and term of office of all other elective officers as shall be necessary to make the time of their election and terms of office conform to this amendment, and shall provide which of the judges of the supreme court shall serve as chief justice. The general assembly shall meet in regular session on the second Monday in January, in the year one thousand nine hundred and six, and also on the second Monday in January in the year one thousand nine hundred and seven, and biennially thereafter.

2.

That sections thirty-four (34), thirty-five (35) and thirty-six (36) of article three (3) of the constitution of the state of Iowa, be repealed and the following be adopted in lieu thereof:

SEC. 34. The senate shall be composed of fifty members to be elected from the several senatorial districts, established by law and at the next session of the general

assembly held following the taking of the state and national census, they shall be apportioned among the several counties or districts of the state, according to the population as shown by the last preceding census.

SEC. 35. The house of representatives shall consist of not more than one hundred and eight members. The ratio of representation shall be determined by dividing the whole number of the population of the state as shown by the last preceding state or national census, by the whole number of counties then existing or organized, but each county shall constitute one representative district and be entitled to one representative, but each county having a population in excess of the ratio number, as herein provided of three-fifths or more of such ratio number shall be entitled to one additional representative, but said addition shall extend only to the nine counties having the greatest population.

SEC. 36. The general assembly shall, at the first regular session held following the adoption of this amendment, and at each succeeding regular session held next after the taking of such census, fix the ratio of representation, and apportion the additional representatives, as herein before required.

NOTE—These amendments were proposed by the general assembly of 1902; re-adopted by the general assembly of 1904; ratified at the general election of November 8, 1904, and certified adopted on November 29, 1904. Section 16 is a new section.

AMENDMENT OF 1908.

Add to section 18 of article I of the constitution of the State of Iowa the following: The general assembly, however, may pass laws permitting the owners of lands to construct drains, ditches, and levees for agricultural, sanitary or mining purposes across the lands of others, and provide for the organization of drainage districts, vest the proper authorities with power to construct and maintain levees, drains and ditches and to keep in repair all drains, ditches and levees heretofore constructed under the laws of the state, by special assessments upon the property benefited thereby. The general assembly may provide by law for the condemnation of such real estate as shall be necessary for the construction and maintenance of such drains, ditches and levees, and prescribe the method of making such condemnation.

NOTE—This amendment was proposed by the general assembly of 1906; re-adopted by the general assembly of 1907; ratified at the election of November 3, 1908, and certified adopted on November 23, 1908.

AMENDMENT OF 1916.

Repeal section 7 of article II of the constitution of Iowa and enact in lieu thereof the following, to-wit:

SEC. 7. The general election for state, district, county and township officers in the year 1916 shall be held in the same month and on the same day as that fixed by the laws of the United States for the election of presidential electors, or of president and vice-president of the United States; and thereafter such election shall be held at such time as the general assembly may by law provide.

NOTE—This amendment was proposed by the general assembly of 1913; re-adopted by the general assembly of 1915, and ratified on November 7, 1916.

AMENDMENT OF 1917.

That the following amendment to article one (1) of the constitution of the state of Iowa be and the same is hereby proposed: To add thereto following section twenty-six (26) thereof and as section twenty-seven (27) of article one (1) of said constitution the following, to-wit:

SEC. 27. The manufacture, sale, or keeping for sale, as a beverage, of intoxicating liquors, including ale, wine and beer, shall be forever prohibited within this state. The general assembly shall by law prescribe regulations for the enforcement of the prohibition herein contained, and shall provide suitable penalties for the violation of the provisions hereof.

NOTE—This amendment was proposed by the general assembly of 1915; re-adopted by the general assembly of 1917; defeated at the special election October 15, 1917.

Yes: 214,693; no: 215,625-932.

AMENDMENT PROPOSED 1919

Joint resolution proposing that section 1 of article II of the constitution be repealed, and the following enacted in lieu thereof, to-wit:

SECTION 1. Every citizen of the United States of the age of twenty-one (21)

years, who shall have been a resident of this state six (6) months next preceding the election, and of the county in which he or she claims his or her vote, sixty (60) days, shall be entitled to vote at all elections which are now or hereafter may be authorized by law.

Resolved further, that the foregoing proposed amendment be, and the same is hereby referred to the legislature to be chosen at the next general election for members of the next general assembly, and that the secretary of state cause the same to be published for three (3) months previous to the day of said election as provided by law.

NOTE—This amendment in substantially this form was proposed by the general assembly 1913; re-adopted by the general assembly of 1915; but was not adopted by the people. It was again proposed by the general assembly of 1917, but was not published as provided by Sec. 1 of Art. X of the constitution and Sec. 55 of the code of Iowa, which caused its second defeat. The present amendment was proposed by the general assembly of 1919.

NOTE—The general assembly was convened in special session on July 2, 1919, for the purpose of considering the proposed amendment to the constitution of the United States providing that the right of citizens of the United States to vote shall not be denied or abridged by the United States or by any state on account of sex.

Federal amendment ratified on said date which made further action on the "Amendment Proposed 1919" unnecessary.

CONSTITUTIONAL CONVENTION

At the general election on the second day of November, 1920, in pursuance of the law as found in section 1061 of the code and in article X, section 3 of the constitution of Iowa, there was submitted to the electors the following question:

"Shall there be a convention to revise the constitution and amend the same?"

Yes: 279,652; no: 221,763.

Thirty-ninth general assembly failed to provide for constitutional convention.

AMENDMENT OF 1926

Strike out the word "male" from section four (4) of article three (3) of said constitution, relating to the legislative department.

NOTE—This amendment was proposed by the general assembly of 1923; re-adopted by the general assembly of 1925; ratified at the election held November 2, 1926.

Yes: 239,999; no: 133,929.

AMENDMENT OF 1928

Joint Resolution proposing an amendment to section thirty-four (34) of article three (3) of the constitution of the state of Iowa, as said section now appears on page fifty-three (53), code, 1924, relating to the apportionment of the state into senatorial districts.

Be it resolved by the General Assembly of the State of Iowa:

SECTION 1. Number of senators. That the following amendment to section thirty-four (34) of article three (3) of the constitution of the state of Iowa, as said section now appears on page fifty-three (53), code, 1924, be and the same is hereby proposed:

That the period (.) at the end of said section thirty-four (34) of article three (3) of the constitution of the state of Iowa be stricken and the following inserted:

" , but no county shall be entitled to more than one (1) senator."

SEC. 2. Be it further resolved that the foregoing proposed amendment be and the same is hereby referred to the legislature to be chosen at the next general election for members of the next general assembly, and that the secretary of state cause the same to be published for three (3) months previous to the date of said election as provided by law.

NOTE—This joint resolution was passed by the forty-first general assembly in 1925, then by the forty-second general assembly in 1927 and voted by the people Nov. 6th, 1928.

Yes: 352,027; no: 201,812.

The capitol was dedicated in January, 1884, when the General Assembly first met in the new halls, having formerly met in a small building located where the Soldiers' and Sailors' monument now stands. Not all the offices were occupied for more than two years thereafter. On the main floor is located the Supreme Court rooms and the Judges' Chambers. On this floor is also located the offices of the Governor, Secretary of State, Auditor of State, Treasurer of State, Superintendent of Public Instruction, Insurance Department, Attorney General, Clerk of Supreme Court, Railroad Commission and Secretary of Agriculture. The law department of the state library is on the second floor and is one of the most complete in the country. In the House has been installed an automatic electric voting device which supplants the roll call on votes in the legislature.

The supreme executive power of the state is vested in the governor, whose term of office is two years. He receives an annual salary of \$7,500.

No person is eligible who has not been a citizen of the United States and a resident of this state two years next preceding the election, and attained the age of thirty years at the time of said election.

He is commander-in-chief of the military forces of the state.

He transacts all executive business with the officers of government, civil and military, and may require information in writing from the officers of the executive department upon any subject relating to the duties of their respective offices.

When any office, from any cause, becomes vacant, and no mode is provided by the constitution and laws for filling such vacancy, the governor has power to fill such vacancy, by granting a commission, which expires at the end of the next session of the general assembly, or at the next election by the people.

He may, on extraordinary occasions, convene the general assembly by proclamation and shall state to both houses when assembled, the purpose for which they shall have convened.

He is required to communicate, by message, to the general assembly, at every regular session, the condition of the state, and may make such recommendations to the body as he shall judge expedient.

In case of disagreement between the two houses with respect to the time of adjournment, the governor has power to adjourn the general assembly to such time as he may think proper; but no such adjournment shall be beyond the time fixed for the regular meeting of the next general assembly.

All bills must be submitted to him for approval, and a two-thirds vote of both branches of the legislature is required to pass a bill over his veto.

The governor has power to grant reprieves, commutation and pardons, after conviction, for all offenses except treason and cases of impeachment, subject to such regulations as may be provided by law. Upon conviction for treason, he has power to suspend the execution of the sentence until the case shall be reported to the general assembly at its next meeting. He has power to remit fines and forfeitures, under such regulations as may be prescribed by law; and shall report to the general assembly, at its next meeting, each case of reprieve, commutation or pardon granted, and the reason therefor.

He appoints all principal officers of the state not elected by the people, and certain officers connected with the state government, by and with the consent of the senate.

He signs patents for state lands, and appoints and commissions notaries public and commissioners in other states to take acknowledgment of deeds for this state.

He may demand fugitives from justice from the executives of other states, and may issue warrants, upon the requests of other governors, for fugitives found in this state.

LIEUTENANT-GOVERNOR

Term of incumbent ends January, 1931

ARCH W. McFARLANE, Waterloo. Born in Iowa.

The lieutenant-governor is elected for a term of two years and is required to have the same qualifications, as to age and residence, as the governor. He does not give bond.

In case of the death, impeachment, resignation, removal from office, or other disability of the governor, the powers and duties of that office devolve upon the lieutenant-governor, for the residue of the term, or until the governor shall be acquitted, or the disability removed.

The lieutenant-governor is president of the senate, but can only vote when the senate is equally divided. In case of his death or other disability incapacitating him from discharging the duties of his office, the same devolve upon the president pro tempore of the senate.

He receives the same mileage and expense allowance as a member and double the compensation of a senator. He maintains an office at the capitol building during the meetings of the general assembly.

The secretary of state is the head of the department of state, is elected by the people for a term of two years, receives \$5,000 a year, is ex officio a member of the executive council, member of the trustees of the state library and historical department of Iowa, of the state board of health, of the state printing board and of the state commission licensing employment agencies.

He countersigns all commissions and proclamations issued by the governor.

The enrolled copies of the constitution and laws of the state, the authenticated journals of the general assembly, and many other legislative and state papers are filed in his office. All papers pertaining to the nomination, election and qualification of state and district officers are filed in his office. All papers relative to the incorporation of cities and towns, the annexation or severance of territory, and the con-

solidation or abandonment of municipal corporations are preserved by him as a part of the permanent records.

Articles of incorporation of both domestic and foreign corporations are filed and certificates of authority to transact business within the state are issued by him. Applications for the registration of trade-marks, labels and forms of advertising are made to him and certificates issued thereon.

The records, files, field notes and plats of survey and other papers and documents of the state land office are in his custody.

All corporations for pecuniary profit doing business in Iowa are required to report annually, in July, to the secretary of state and pay an annual fee of \$1.

The registration in the office of the secretary of state and the filing of a \$1,000 bond is required to be made by all charitable organizations soliciting public aid in the state and a permit must first be procured from his department before any such organization or its agents may solicit public donations in Iowa except within the county in which the solicitor resides or in which such association or institution is located or in an adjoining county if location or residence is within six miles of such adjoining county.

Important work in the secretary of state's office relates to the administration of the securities law, passed by the thirty-sixth general assembly, and revised and enlarged in scope by the forty-third general assembly, to prevent fraud in the sale and disposition of stocks, bonds and other securities.

The motor vehicle department is also under the administration of the secretary of state. A complete record of all registrations of motor vehicles is kept in numerical order, and the enforcement of the law is carried out through twelve field men or motor vehicle inspectors.

The forty-third general assembly created the office of real estate commissioner whose duty it is to license and regulate real estate brokers and real estate salesmen, and to enforce penalties for violation of the provisions thereof. The administration of this act is placed in the office of the secretary of state.

The auditor of state keeps the accounts between the state and the United States, or any state, public official or person; makes settlement of accounts with county treasurers and receivers of state revenues; keeps accounts of all revenues, funds and income of the state and of all disbursements; settles accounts with public debtors for debts due the state; settles claims against the state treasury; superintends and enforces payment of moneys payable into the state treasury; superintends the fiscal affairs of the state and furnishes forms for reports to be made by county officials to the state; issues all warrants on the state treasurer of money directed by law to be paid out of the treasury; has custody of all books, securities, bonds, etc., pertaining to the fiscal affairs of the state, where such are not required to be kept in some other office; reports to the governor biennially as to the revenues, funds, income, taxable property, also as to expenditures and estimates expenditures for the biennial period following; makes apportionments of interest on the permanent school fund among the counties and directs the payment of the proceeds of escheat estates to the school fund.

The auditor of state also has charge of the municipal finance department, the county accounting department, as well as having supervision of companies selling bonds on the installment plan, and building and loan associations; he appoints the building and loan examiners, the county examiners, and the examiners of municipal accounts. All reports by any of the companies or associations above named are made to him, all fees, except fees for incorporation, are paid to him, and all deposits required by law of any such companies or associations to be made with the state are deposited in the auditor's office. None of the companies or associations named can transact business in the state until they have received a certificate of authority from the auditor.

In addition to the above he is a member of the executive council of the state, which body constitutes the board of assessment and review and also has general supervision of the state's business, is a member of the state printing board, the geologist board, the bonus board, and ex-officio member of the state board of health. He is also ex-officio secretary of the state board of audit.

This board audits all claims against the state except those for salaries of various officers which are fixed by law and claims on account of the institutions under the control of the board of control and the board of education.

The board is authorized and directed to formulate such rules and regulations as it may deem necessary to enable it to determine: that services charged for were actually performed; the time necessarily devoted to such service and the exact and necessary expenses incurred in the performance thereof.

The auditor of state and the director of the budget are ex-officio members of this board. The third member is designated by the attorney general from among his assistants.

The public revenues of the state are received and disbursed by the treasury department; books are kept in which are recorded the names of all persons from whom money for any purpose is received, the date received, the purpose for which the money was remitted, and the amount thereof. Receipts in duplicate are issued for each item received, and the duplicate is filed with the auditor of state. When remittance of state dues is made by bank draft, check or certificate of deposit, such

draft, check or certificate must be deposited for collection in some bank in the city of Des Moines which has been previously designated as a depository for state funds, and no receipt for any sum remitted by check or draft is issued by the treasurer until the depository receiving deposit notifies the department of the collection thereof.

All county recorders and superintendents of schools are required to remit to the treasurer of state on or before the 15th of each month all state moneys received by them during the preceding calendar month. All county treasurers are required to remit to the treasurer of state on or before the 15th of each month for the per capita costs of patients maintained in the various state institutions and who are residents of their counties, as certified to him by the county auditor, and to report to the treasurer at the same time the collection during the preceding month of taxes belonging to the state. The law provides that when the cash balance of general revenue funds in the state treasury is reduced below \$2,000,000.00 the treasurer of state may draw upon each county treasurer in proportion to the amount in his possession, a sum sufficient in the aggregate to increase said cash balance to an amount not to exceed \$3,000,000.00. The same provision governs the primary road fund except that the minimum is \$100,000.00 and the maximum \$500,000. The soldiers' bonus tax fund, collected by county treasurers, is drawn into the state treasury only at such times and in such amounts as is necessary to pay the interest and bonds as due.

All elective and appointive state officers, boards, commissions, and departments, except the state fair board, the state board of education, and the board of control of state institutions, are required to within ten days succeeding the collection thereof, deposit with the treasurer of state 90% of all fees, commissions and moneys collected or received. The balance actually collected in cash, remaining in the hands of any officer, board or department cannot exceed the sum of \$5,000.00 and no money collected is authorized to be held more than 30 days. Each deposit must be accompanied by an itemized statement of the sources from which the money was collected and showing the funds to be credited.

The treasurer of state, with the consent of the executive council, may designate banks in the state of Iowa as depositories of state funds in amounts not exceeding the limits to be fixed by said council. Each bank so designated shall pay interest on daily balances at the rate of 2½% at such times as may be agreed upon by the banks and the treasurer of state, with the approval of the executive council.

Disbursements from the state treasury are made only upon warrants issued by the auditor of state. A record is kept of each warrant paid, showing date of issue, date of payment, to whom paid and upon what account drawn. During the last biennial period the disbursements amounted to \$86,983,544.14 and the receipts were \$91,387,800.87.

An act of the forty-first general assembly requires the treasurer of state to collect from distributors a license fee of two cents per gallon on all gasoline used in the state for any purpose whatsoever. Provision is made for the refund of the license fee paid when the gasoline is used for certain purposes. One-third of the proceeds is distributed to the primary road fund, one-third to county road fund and one-third to township road fund. The forty-second general assembly authorized an additional license fee of one cent a gallon, effective July 4, 1927; the proceeds to be added to the primary road fund after deductions to cover certain bridge refunds to counties.

The state treasurer is the custodian of the permanent endowment fund of the state agricultural college. This fund amounts to about \$680,000.00 and is loaned at not less than five per cent, secured by first mortgages upon real estate in Iowa. The interest only may be used by the college. This interest is payable to the state treasurer and is by him paid to the treasurer of the college. The accounts of the department are inspected quarterly under the direction of the governor.

The treasurer also handles funds which may be diverted under the public funds deposit guaranty act of the forty-first general assembly for covering losses of public funds deposited in any bank which may be placed in the hands of a receiver for liquidation.

The attorney general is elected for a period of two years.

It is the duty of the attorney general to appear for the state, prosecute or defend all actions and proceedings, civil and criminal, in which the state shall be a party or interested, when requested to do so by the governor, executive council or general assembly or he may so appear on his own motion; and shall prosecute or defend for the state all causes in the supreme court in which the state is a party or interested.

The attorney general is given supervisory power over county attorneys and in a general way looks after the enforcement of the law over the entire state.

He shall also, when requested, give his opinion in writing upon all questions of law submitted to him by the general assembly or any state department.

It is also his duty to prepare drafts for contracts, forms and others writings which may be required for the use of the state, and shall at the close of each biennial period report to the governor the condition of his office, the opinions rendered and the business transacted in the office.

The attorney general is chairman of the state board of law examiners, ex-officio a member of the state printing board, and has charge of the bureau of investigation.

The state board of law examiners was created by an act of the twenty-eighth general assembly which went into effect on the 4th day of July, 1901.

The attorney general is, by virtue of his office, chairman of the board and the other members are appointed by the supreme court.

The members of the board are paid as compensation fifteen dollars per day out of the fund arising from examination fees. The supreme court may appoint temporary examiners to serve for one examination.

Every applicant for admission to the bar must pass an examination by the board as to his legal attainments, and also as to his preliminary educational qualifications, unless he furnishes proof of such qualification by presenting a diploma or certificate that he is a graduate of a college, high school, normal school or academy, or that he has regularly and in good faith pursued and successfully completed four years of the regular course of an accredited high school, or the certificate of the state board of educational examiners that he has successfully passed an examination

by that board, or the certificate of the president of the state university or of any college in this state having an equivalent collegiate or liberal art study, that he has been found on proper certification or examination to be entitled to admission, without condition, as a student of such university or college, for which admission the applicant must have actually and in good faith acquired a general education substantially equivalent to that involved in the completion of a high school course of study of at least four years extent.

If the applicant fails to pass the examination he may not take a second examination within three months after such failure. Examination fee, \$5; certificate fee, \$1. Persons admitted on motion from other states, \$10.

The fortieth general assembly passed an act consolidating into one department, to be known as the state department of agriculture, the following administrative agencies of state and the laws governing same, to wit:

1. The former department of agriculture with all its statutory activities and duties, except such as relate to the state fair.
2. The dairy and food department and all the administrative agencies connected therewith.
3. The animal health commission and veterinary department and all their administrative agencies.
4. The petroleum inspection service and hotel license and inspection, and all matters pertaining thereto.
5. State horticultural society.
6. Iowa corn and small grain growers' association.
7. Iowa beef and cattle producers' association.
8. Iowa state dairy association.
9. The state weather and crop service.
10. Iowa state poultry association.

Also the office of secretary of agriculture was created, whose duties are in addition to any other duty which may be prescribed by law:

1. To encourage, promote, and advance the interests of agriculture, including horticulture, live stock industry, dairying, cheese making, poultry raising, bee keeping, forestry, production of wool, and other kindred and allied industries.
2. To promote and devise methods of conducting said industries with the view of increasing production and facilitating an adequate distribution of the same at the least cost to the producer.
3. To compile statistics and information, in co-operation with the federal government, relative to crop production, farm economics, the production and marketing of beef, pork, mutton, wool, poultry, milk, butter, cheese and all other agricultural products, in so far as such statistical information may be deemed of value to agriculture and its allied interests in the state, which statistics, when published, shall constitute the official agricultural statistics of the state.
4. To co-operate with the Iowa State College of Agriculture and Mechanic Arts in all ways that may be beneficial to the agricultural interests of the state.
5. To include in his compilation and publication, the reports of agricultural, horticultural, live stock associations and other like associations or societies organized for the promotion of the agricultural interests of the state.
6. The forty-second general assembly provided that the state entomologist shall be responsible to and under the authority of the secretary of agriculture in the issuance of all rules and regulations, the establishment of quarantine and other acts. The sum of \$200,000 was provided to fight the corn borer.

The superintendent of public instruction is charged by law with general supervision and control over the rural, graded and high schools, public junior colleges of the state, and over such other state and public schools as are not under the control of the state board of education or the board of control of state institutions. This does not include private, denominational, and parochial schools. The magnitude of this task is evidenced by the fact that during the school year 1927-1928, 9,585 rural schools, 947 graded and high schools, and twenty public junior colleges were in operation.

In connection with these general powers, nineteen specific duties are prescribed for the superintendent of public instruction by Section 3832, Code of Iowa, 1927. These may be roughly reorganized into the following classifications:

1. Promoting interest in education including industrial, commercial, agricultural, manual, vocational, domestic science and continuation work, and recommending such changes and improvements as are deemed necessary
2. Preparing and distributing course of study manuals, including outlines for teaching American citizenship, civics of the state and nation, social problems, economics, health, special days, and plans and specifications for school buildings
3. Appointing time and place for teachers' county institutes and approving the program and faculty
4. Classifying, defining, and inspecting schools
5. Prescribing reports for teachers and school officers, filing and preserving reports, recording business transactions, and making an annual census report to the auditor of state and a biennial report to the governor
6. Preparing and distributing of questions for examination of applicants for teachers' certificates and pupils completing the eighth grade in rural schools
7. Examining and determining appeals taken to him according to law and rendering written opinions upon questions submitted by school officers pertaining to their duties

The administration of these and other official duties is done by the superintendent of public instruction with the assistance of four departments organized under the headings of: legal, with deputy superintendent in charge; inspectional, with five inspectors; certification under the board of educational examiners, of which the superintendent of public instruction is president, ex-officio; and vocational and rehabilitation, under the board for vocational education, of which the superintendent of public instruction is chairman, ex-officio

The board of educational examiners consists of the superintendent of public instruction, who is president and executive officer of the board, the president of the State University of Iowa, the president of the Iowa State Teachers College, the president of the Iowa State College of Agriculture and Mechanic Arts, three persons appointed by the governor, one of whom shall be a woman and one of whom shall be a representative of the privately endowed colleges of the state maintaining teachers' training courses.

The board has charge of the granting of state and uniform county teachers' certificates. It determines what colleges may be accredited under the statute for state teachers' certificates and fixes standards for teacher training courses, what certificates of other states may be accepted under the statute for Iowa teachers' certificates and the graduates of what colleges and normal schools of other states may be given certificate recognition. It also prepares and publishes library lists for the public schools of the state.

Among the duties placed upon the executive council by the laws of Iowa, are the following: to purchase all stores, supplies and furniture for state departments and officers; the execution of contracts for fuel, lights, repairs; the approval of

articles of incorporation and by-laws of building and loan associations, and plan for liquidation of said associations; the custody of supplies for state officers and commissions; the canvass of votes cast for state and district officers; the compilation of a state census once in ten years; the declaration of changes in classification of cities; the determination of the territory outside of Iowa in which Iowa life insurance companies may loan money; the making of annual settlement with all state officers, under section 161-a of the supplement to the code 1913; the assignment of office rooms to state officers in capitol building; the appointment of the board of examiners of mine inspectors; to dispose of state documents which the state librarian, curator of historical department and curator of law department may certify are not required for state uses; to approve claims for the expenses of collection of inheritance taxes and for the repayment of such taxes when wrongfully paid; the approval of plans for buildings at the state educational institutions, under certain conditions; to determine the value at which property may be taken by Iowa corporations and the amount of stock which may be issued on account thereof. The secretary of the executive council is also secretary of the board of conservation and of the board of engineering examiners.

The forty-third general assembly created the state board of assessment and review consisting of three members appointed by the governor. To it was assigned all of the work relating to taxes formerly imposed on the state executive council, as well as many other duties. The board exercises "general supervision over the administration of the assessment and tax laws of the state, over boards of supervisors and all other officers or boards of assessment and levy in the performance of their official duties in all matters relating to assessments and taxation, to the end that all assessments of property and taxes levied thereon be made relatively just and uniform in substantial compliance with law." The board "must confer with, advise and direct boards of supervisors, boards of review and others obligated by law to make levies and assessments as to their duties under the laws." It must "direct proceedings, actions and prosecutions to be instituted for the enforcement of the laws relating to the penalties, liabilities and punishment of public officers and officers or agents of corporations and other persons or corporations for failure or neglect to comply with the provisions of the statutes governing the return, assessment and taxation of property." It must "make or cause to be made complaints against members of boards of review, boards of supervisors or other assessing, reviewing or taxing officers for official misconduct or neglect of duty."

Public officials having to do with taxes must "report information as to the assessment of property and collection of taxes and such other information as may be needful or desirable in the work of the board in such form and upon such blanks as the board may prescribe. The board holds public hearings on taxation matters and must "investigate the work or methods of boards of review, boards of supervisors or other public officers in the assessment, equalization and taxation of all kinds of property."

The board may require "any county board of equalization at any time after its adjournment to reconvene and to make such orders as the state board of assessment and review shall determine are just and necessary." It is given power "to direct and order the county board of equalization to raise or lower the valuation of the property, real or personal, in any township, town, city or taxing district, and generally to make any order or direction to any county board of equalization as to the valuation of any property." It must "carefully examine into all cases where evasion or violation of the law for assessment and taxation of property is alleged, complained of or discovered" and must "ascertain wherein existing laws are defective or are improperly or negligently administered and cause to be instituted such proceedings as

will remedy improper or negligent administration of the laws relating to the assessment or taxation of property."

The board is also required "to make a summary of the tax situation in the state, setting out the amount of moneys raised by both direct and indirect taxation and also to formulate and recommend legislation for the better administration of the fiscal laws so as to secure just and equal taxation."

The section authorizing the transfer of the powers of the state executive council on taxation matters sets out that "all the powers heretofore vested in and all the duties imposed upon the executive council of the state of Iowa as a state board of review or in relation to the valuation of property or property rights for taxation, the levy or assessment of taxes on property or property rights, the determination of tax rates for state purposes and any and all powers pertaining to the taxation of property and property rights of whatsoever kind are hereby transferred to the state board of assessment and review."

TAX COMMITTEE

Members: Senators C. F. Clark of Cedar Rapids, Chas. L. Rigby of Stanwood and George W. Patterson of Burt; Representatives Fred C. Lovrien of Humboldt, Harry M. Greene of Avoca and John F. Kline of Bloomfield.

The forty-third general assembly passed a joint resolution requiring the appointment of a tax committee of three members, three senators to be chosen by the lieutenant governor as presiding officer of the senate and three representatives by the speaker of the house. The duty of this committee as set out in the resolution is to collect information and formulate proposed legislation which will provide state revenue without direct property tax. The members are to work with the state board of assessment and review and in conjunction with this board make a written report and recommendations on this proposed legislation to the next legislature.

CUSTODIAN

The thirty-ninth general assembly adopted an act providing that the executive council shall appoint a custodian of public buildings and grounds, but failed to provide compensation. In this situation the council designated its secretary for the place without additional pay. The forty-first general assembly made provision for an annual salary of \$2,700 beginning July 1, 1925.

The powers and duties of the board of railroad commissioners are: To generally supervise all railroads in the state, both steam and electric, except street railroads; to inquire into any neglect or violation of the laws of the state by any railroad corporation doing business therein; to make examinations and inspections of the physical condition, conduct and management of such railroads and report their condition to said companies; to stop and prevent railroad companies, under certain circumstances, from running or passing their trains over unsafe bridges; to adjudge changes in station houses, rolling stock and rates of fare; to pass on necessity for spur tracks to be constructed and maintained not exceeding three miles in length to an existing industry under terms and conditions approved by the commission as set out by law; to make reasonable rules for the crossing of steam and interurban railways and to require, when necessary, interlocking switches at railroad crossings; to make report on first Monday in December in each year to

the governor of its doings for the preceding year, accompanied with appropriate suggestions and recommendations; to receive, tabulate and report upon the annual reports filed with it by railroad companies; to examine any of the books, papers or documents of any such corporation; to examine under oath employes of such corporation; to issue subpoenas, administer oaths and compel the attendance of witnesses; to make and fix maximum schedules of freight rates for such corporations, such schedules to be deemed reasonable until disproved; to examine into rates in force, upon complaint that the rate charged by a railroad company, or that the maximum rates fixed by the commission are unreasonably high or discriminating, and to fix the rate again, which must not be higher than any rate established by law, such decision of the commission is prima facie evidence that the rate so made is a reasonable maximum rate; to bring suits to enforce its orders; to inquire into the management of the business of such carriers and to obtain from them full and complete information necessary to enable the commissioners to carry out the objects of the law; to hear, investigate and determine all complaints alleging unreasonable rates; unjust discrimination, undue preference, violation of the long and short haul clause, or other infractions of the commission law, and make proper orders thereupon; to establish joint through rates, upon application, over two or more connecting lines; and to have the same authority over express companies as the act confers concerning railroads.

Before a railroad company may appropriate coal, coke or oil received for shipment, it must first secure the written consent of the railroad commission.

Before any railway company may condemn lands for additional depot grounds, or for straightening or relocating track, the permission of the board must be obtained. Interlocking switches may be placed at grade railroad crossings or draw bridges, thus obviating the necessity of stopping trains before passing over such grade crossings or draw bridges, but before the interlocking switch may be used consent of the board must be obtained.

The thirty-fifth general assembly gave to the commission the power to grant to individuals or corporations "engaged in the manufacture, sale, or distribution for sale of electric current for light, power, or heating purposes, the right within the state, except in cities and towns, to erect and maintain poles, wires, towers, fixtures and other necessary construction for the purpose of conducting electricity for lighting, power and heating purposes over, along and across any public land, highways or streams or the lands of any person or persons, and to acquire the necessary interests in real estate therefor." It also provided that transmission lines proceeding under the provisions of the law should be subject to "such reasonable regulations as the commission may from time to time, prescribe."

The board is directed by an act of the thirty-ninth general assembly to "undertake and carry forward such investigation and preparation as shall be necessary to properly represent the interests of the state in connection with the valuation of the property of common carriers now being conducted by the interstate commerce commission."

The thirty-ninth general assembly authorized the railroad commission upon application to them to issue to any warehouseman a license for the conduct of a bonded warehouse under the provisions of chapter 119, laws of the thirty-ninth general assembly, and such rules and regulations as might be made thereunder.

The fortieth general assembly conferred on the commission the power to issue certificates authorizing motor carriers to operate over the public highways of the state, upon a showing that the proposed service would promote "the public convenience" and authorized the board to prescribe rules and regulations for the operation of motor vehicles used by such carriers "for the protection and safety of the public." The forty-first general assembly revised the laws on this subject, but left their administration with the railroad commission.

The forty-third general assembly provided for the supervision or regulation by the commission of persons operating motor trucks principally used for the public transportation of freight for compensation, not operating over regular routes nor between fixed termini. It also provided that the cost of regulating truck operators and motor carriers and the maintenance of the motor carrier department be paid from fees and taxes collected from such carriers.

Under the provisions of senate file 285 of the forty-third general assembly before an airport is acquired by any city or town the plans and specifications must be approved by the board.

COMMERCE COUNSEL

The thirty-fourth general assembly created the office of commerce counsel, to be appointed by the board of railroad commissioners for a term of four years, subject to confirmation by senate. The law provides that the counsel may appoint assistants, subject to the approval of the board of railroad commissioners. The duties of the office briefly are as follows:

The legal advisor of the board of railroad commissioners. To investigate and present matters with reference to interstate rates to the board of railroad commissioners, prosecute the same before said board, or before any court to which same may be taken. To investigate on his own motion, or at the request of the board, all matters involving interstate rates in which the people of Iowa are interested, and present the same to the interstate commerce commission and prosecute same to the final determination. To act as attorney for and represent the board of railroad commissioners in all courts of this state or of the United States, in which the validity of any order of said board is in issue; to institute and prosecute in any of the courts any and all suits necessary to the proper enforcement of any rule or order of said railroad commissioners or make defense therein wherever said rule or order may be called in question.

The commissioner of insurance is the executive head of the insurance department of Iowa and has direction of all insurance business transacted in the state and the execution of laws relating to insurance.

The commissioner is authorized to conduct examinations of insurance organizations transacting business in the state. Domestic companies, associations and societies are required to be so examined at least biennially. The companies are visited and the audits made in their offices.

All deposits required by law to be made with the state by any such company, association or society, are directly in charge of the commissioner and a careful record is kept thereof, showing each item. The amount of approved securities representing capital stock and the legal reserve value of policies of Iowa life companies and associations on deposit in this department on January 1, 1929, was \$316,991,679.00.

All fees due the state from insurance companies and associations are paid to the commissioner of insurance and turned over to the treasurer of state and placed in the general funds.

The commissioner passes upon the articles of incorporation of new insurance organizations. He has entire control over the organization of new insurance companies in the state. No policies may be sold in the state until the policy forms have been approved by him, and all agents appointed by the companies and associations to represent them in the state must be licensed by the insurance department.

The forty-third general assembly provided that in the event of a receivership for an insurance company the commissioner becomes receiver.

The superintendent of banking is the head of the banking department of Iowa and has general control, supervision and direction of all banks and trust companies in-

incorporated under the laws of Iowa and he is charged with the execution of the laws of the state relating to banking, including the public funds deposit guaranty act passed by the forty-first general assembly.

The deputy superintendent and bank examiners are appointed by the superintendent of banking, and their salaries are fixed by him within certain limits prescribed by law. The banking department is self-supporting.

The superintendent of banking is ex-officio a member and chairman of the state banking board created by act of the forty-first general assembly. This board acts in an advisory capacity concerning all matters pertaining to the banking department and the Iowa banking laws. There are four other members, appointive by the governor, with compensation of \$10 a day and expenses while engaged in the state's business.

The work of the department of banking has increased greatly during the last few years on account of the superintendent of banking being the official receiver of all closed state and savings banks and trust companies. The total expense of all receivership trusts averages four and three-tenths per cent on the amount collected. The interest collected on notes and bank balances has been more than the total expense.

The duties of the reporter and editor are:

1. To submit such recommendations as he deems proper to each general assembly for the purpose of amending, revising and codifying such portions of the law as may be conflicting, redundant, or ambiguous, and to lay said recommendations before the presiding officers of each house.

2. To edit and compile the code after each even-numbered session of the general assembly so that the same may be printed.

3. To edit and prepare for publication a series of annotations of the statutes of Iowa containing annotations of all such statutes as have been construed by the supreme court of this state or the federal courts, and cause the same to be printed in separate volumes arranged in the same manner as the titles, chapters and sections of the code.

4. To prepare and cause to be published immediately following the issuance of the code in 1927, and every four years thereafter, a volume which shall by proper annotations show the construction placed by the supreme court of this state and the federal courts on all statutes of this state since the then existing permanent volume of annotations. The edition of 1931 and all subsequent volumes shall constitute a cumulation of the edition of 1927 and shall be so continued until said cumulation shall reach a size sufficient for a permanent volume.

5. To promptly prepare syllabi for all opinions of the supreme court and an index and proper tables for each volume of the reports.

The clerk of the supreme court shall have an office at the seat of government, keep a complete record of the proceedings of the court, file all printed matter and papers in pending cases, issue writs, orders and executions to carry out the directions of the supreme court, announce by mail to one of the attorneys on each side any ruling made or decision rendered, record every opinion rendered as soon as filed, and allow no opinions filed to be removed except by the reporter of the supreme court.

The clerk of the supreme court acts as secretary of the board of law examiners. All applications for admission to the bar are filed and recorded by him and certificates of admission to the bar are issued by the clerk. Each applicant for admission to the bar shall pay to the clerk of the supreme court an examination fee of \$5.00. Foreign attorneys admitted to the bar of this state on motion pay a fee of \$10.00. Out of the fees for the bar examination the clerk pays the board of law examiners their per diem on certificate of the attorney general.

Under a new statute the clerk pays the expense of disbarment proceedings out of the bar examination fees.

Since July 1, 1913, Workmen's Compensation has been provided for workmen injured in industrial pursuits, where such injury arises out of and in the course of the employment. Agricultural, clerical and domestic employment are excluded. Employers may insure with authorized companies for the payment of workmen's compensation, or upon a proper showing may be granted the right to carry their own insurance. All employers of labor are liable under the terms of law in any event. Compensation to injured workmen is upon the general basis of 60 per cent of the average wages or earnings with a maximum payment of \$15 per week. In case of disagreement between employers and employees provision is made for arbitration in which case the commissioner or his deputy is chairman of the arbitration committee. By agreement the two additional arbitrators may be dispensed with. The Commissioner reviews appeals from the arbitration orders and there is provision for appeal to the district court and supreme court. There is a two-year time limitation on claims for injuries. Employees of the state are compensated by the state and all counties and other political divisions of the state, except townships, are under the law. All employers are obligated to make reports of accidents directly to the industrial commissioner and record is kept of all settlements. Where employers of labor reject the provision of the law, as provided by statute, they deprive themselves of

common law defenses in damage cases. Settlements for injured workmen number about 5,000 annually.

The printing board has charge of all matters pertaining to state printing, including printing for institutions and officials outside of Des Moines. Contracts for all work and material are let on competitive bids. Appointive members of the board receive \$10 a day and expenses while engaged in state business.

The superintendent of printing is appointed by the board. He is ex-officio secretary of the board and its executive officer. He is in immediate charge of the work; has the custody and attends to the distribution and sale of codes, session laws, supreme court reports and public documents; supervises the compilation and publication of the session laws, the legislative bill index, and the official register. Also the journals of the house and senate are indexed under his supervision.

The staff of the commander-in-chief consists of an adjutant general, with rank of brigadier general, who is chief of staff, an assistant adjutant general, with rank of lieutenant colonel, and thirteen aides who have the rank of lieutenant colonel,

except that any person so appointed, who has held a higher rank for a period of one year or more in the guard may be appointed with the rank of the highest rank so held by him, or the thirteen aides may be detailed for such service from the active membership of the guard, but if so detailed they hold their rank in the guard and shall perform the duties of aide in addition to their regular duties.

The adjutant general is appointed by the governor. He issues and transmits all orders of the commander-in-chief and keeps a record of all appointments of officers commissioned by the governor, of all the general and special orders and regulations, and of such matters as pertain to the organization of the military force and its duties. He holds office for a period of four years. He has charge of the state arsenal and grounds and all other property of the state kept or used for military purposes. He furnishes at the expense of the state such blanks and forms as are approved by the commander-in-chief. In each year, preceding a regular session of the general assembly, or at any other time the governor may direct, he makes out a detailed report of the transactions of this office, the expenses thereof and such other matters as shall be required by the commander-in-chief for the period since the last preceding report.

All muster rolls, reports, returns, enlistments, discharges and complete records of the national guard are filed and made a matter of record in his office. The records of Iowa soldiers of the Civil, Spanish-American, and World wars are on file in his office and all information desired from such records is furnished by him. Certificates of military service of Iowa soldiers of the late wars or past service in the organized militia and national guard are given by him under the seal of the state. He is the disbursing officer of all state appropriations for the use and support of the national guard and as adjutant general all military property is committed to his custody which he is required to issue for the use of the national guard, keeping an account of the same. He is required to furnish such reports of the national guard of the state as the war department may from time to time require. As chief of staff he is to perform his duties as such officer as directed by the commander-in-chief or required by the laws of Iowa governing the national guard or by orders and regulations.

In addition to the duties above defined, the adjutant general also has the direction of the compilation of the roster for soldiers, sailors and marines in the Mexican border service of 1916-1917, and the World's War, 1917-1918 and 1919, and other historical data in connection with the World's war.

POWERS AND DUTIES OF COMMISSIONER

The commissioner of public health as head of the state department of health exercises general supervision over the public health, promotes public hygiene and sanitation and unless otherwise provided enforces the laws relating to same. He makes investigations and surveys in respect to causes of disease and epidemics and the effect of locality, employment and living conditions upon the public health. Also

inspects sanitary conditions in any locality of the state upon written petition of five or more citizens and may issue directions for improvement of same.

He shall establish, publish and enforce a code of rules governing the installation of plumbing in cities and towns and amend the same when deemed necessary. He must exercise general supervision over the administration of the housing law and give aid to local authorities in enforcement of same. He must establish stations for the distribution of antitoxins and vaccines to physicians, druggists, and other persons at cost; exercise general supervision over the administration and enforcement of the venereal disease law; he has sole jurisdiction over the disposal and transportation of the dead bodies of human beings; he must exercise general supervision over the administration and enforcement of the vital statistics law and must establish and maintain such divisions in the department as are necessary for the proper enforcement of the laws administered by it.

POWERS AND DUTIES OF BOARD OF HEALTH

The board must recommend policies and practices to the department relative to any duty imposed upon it by law, which recommendations shall be given due consideration by the department; it must advise the department relative to causes of disease and epidemics, sanitary conditions, contagious and infectious diseases, venereal diseases, antitoxins and vaccines, housing and vital statistics; to advise or make recommendations to the governor and general assembly relative to public health, hygiene and sanitation.

The forty-second general assembly passed a bill requiring the licensing of barbers, and also one requiring the licensing of cosmetologists. Administration of these measures was placed within the State Department of Health.

The board is authorized to adopt rules of procedure for county health boards and specify their duties under the county health organization law passed by the forty-third general assembly.

The office of director of the budget was created by the fortieth general assembly, extra session, effective May 2, 1924. The director of the budget is appointed by the governor subject to confirmation by the senate.

The law provides for a state budget, for the examination, by the budget director, of the accounts of departments of state, for a review of public contracts and bond issues in certain cases, and for local budgets. The director is authorized to prescribe methods for enforcing and carrying out all of the provisions of the law, and to conduct hearings on all matters within his jurisdiction and render decisions thereon.

The first budget report to be prepared under the law was submitted to the governor and forty-first general assembly in January, 1925.

The budget report sets out in detail the actual expenditures for the preceding two bienniums, the estimated expenditures at the close of the biennium, the departmental askings for the succeeding two years and the budget director's estimates for the same period together with the governor's approval.

There is also submitted a state appropriation bill.

The director is a member of the state board of audit whose duty it is to audit claims for money due from the state.

The law further provides for an appeal board which shall consist of the director and two additional members. The two members to serve with the director are appointed by the governor in the same manner required for the appointment of the director and the term of office is four years. The director is chairman of the board. The board considers and determines appeals from the action of the state board of education, the state board of control and the state fair board, in respect to letting of contracts for buildings or other improvements in which the amount involved is in excess of \$25,000.

The statutes of Iowa provide the sentence of a prisoner convicted of a felony shall be for the maximum term provided for the crime committed thus leaving to the court imposing the sentence no discretion as to the time of confinement. The board of parole is given authority to release on parole outside the prison, all prisoners, except those sentenced for life terms. Rules and regulations are provided which must be observed by the man while on parole, and for the violation of which he may be remanded to prison.

IOWA STATE HIGHWAY COMMISSION

The highway commission was first established in Iowa under chapter 105, acts of the thirtieth general assembly, which directed the Iowa State College as an institution to act as the highway commission for the state. In 1913 the thirty-fifth general assembly reorganized the entire system of road administration and created a highway commission of three members, one of whom should be the dean of engineering at Ames. In 1927 the forty-second general assembly increased the number of members of the commission to five and passed what is known as the state control law giving the commission full control over construction and maintenance of the primary road system and primary road fund. In addition to salary the commissioners receive expenses while on duty.

Under the secondary road bill passed by the forty-third general assembly the commission on request of a local board of supervisors shall advise with the board on the manner of constructing and maintaining secondary roads. Before a board of supervisors can issue anticipatory certificates it must "seek the advice of the state highway commission and issue said certificates to an amount not exceeding fifty per cent of the estimated funds which will accrue to the secondary road construction fund during any stated period of from one to two years."

Under a law passed by the forty-third general assembly all patrolmen and maintenance engineers are designated peace officers and have authority to arrest violators of the authorized rules, regulations and orders of the highway commission and of the law pertaining to the primary highways of the state.

The highway commission is required to file with the county auditor and recorder a map of the right of way on the completion of any primary road paving or grading project.

FUNCTIONS OF STATE FAIR BOARD

The Iowa State Fair as an institution has existed since the first fair was held at Fairfield October 25-26 and 27, 1854, but it remained for the fortieth general assembly in 1923 and the extra session thereof to set out the Iowa State Fair Board as a separate and distinct department.

Previous to 1923 the fair was operated under the state department of agriculture. The fortieth general assembly, however, created a new department of agriculture, consolidating therewith a number of other departments and at the extra session the law was passed creating the state fair board, effective October 28, 1924.

The law provides for a state agricultural convention to be held at the state capitol in Des Moines on the second Wednesday in December of each year. The delegates to this convention are the officers and members of the state fair board; the president, secretary or *accredited* delegate of each of the county and district fairs; the president or accredited representative of the following organizations; each farmers' institute organized according to law and receiving state aid; the State Horticultural Society; the Iowa State Dairy Association; the Iowa Beef Producers' Association and the Iowa Corn and Small Grain Growers' Association. In counties where no fair is held the board of supervisors may appoint a delegate.

The convention elects a president and a vice president for a term of one year, and a director from each congressional district for a term of two years. The directors from the even numbered districts are elected on the even year and those from the odd numbered districts on the odd year. The secretary and treasurer are elected annually by the state fair board. The law fixes the compensation of the president, vice president and directors at ten dollars (\$10) per day and expenses while in attendance at board and committee meetings. The law also fixes

the maximum amount to be paid the treasurer at \$250 and the secretary at \$4,000 annually.

By statute the state fair board is made the custodian of the state fair grounds and the board of managers of the annual state fair. The state makes no regular appropriations for the operating expense of the state fair. The law specifically provides that all operating expense, maintenance, etc., shall be paid out of the receipts of the state fair unless there is a special appropriation providing for same. The law also provides that the state will not be liable for any debts incurred by the board. The state has appropriated since 1902, \$867,000 for buildings, \$83,013 for additional land, \$14,000 for sanitary sewer system, and \$28,280 for paving assessments against the grounds. In the same period \$150,700 has been appropriated for insurance premiums and maintenance of grounds and buildings.

During this same twenty-seven year period there has been expended from the fair receipts, \$894,501 for buildings and other improvements, \$223,808.00 for insurance premiums and maintenance of the grounds and buildings, and the entire operating expense of the fair amounting to \$4,881,681.00.

The inventory taken November 30, 1928, shows the present value of the grounds and buildings to be worth \$1,976,357.57. This inventory takes into consideration the original cost of all permanent buildings and other improvements with the usual annual depreciation. It is safe to say that the replacement value of buildings and other improvements would be more than double the amount carried in the inventory.

The title to the state fair grounds and all property is held in the name of the state of Iowa and all deeds and abstracts are on file in the auditor of state's office.

The general assembly in 1884 provided for the creation of the bureau of labor statistics, the appointment of a commissioner, defining his duties, and his tenure of office. The work as outlined was purely statistical and was designed for the purpose of making inquiry into the conditions surrounding the employment of labor, its connection with the development of industries both mechanical and those arising from the natural resources of the state, the advantages and inducements offered in various localities for the establishment of desirable industries, the extent and productive value of industries already established and information relative to the home life and general welfare of the workers.

The inspection of factories, mercantile establishments, theaters, buildings, etc., embracing employment of over a half million workers, is one of the most important services the bureau renders to the state.

Under jurisdiction of the bureau are laws relating to health and safety in factories, work shops, mercantile establishments, theaters, elevators, etc., the fire escape law, child labor law, inspection of employment bureaus, both public and private, arbitration and conciliation, report of accidents.

Another service of the bureau is that rendered by the state free employment

bureau. Through cooperation of the state and federal governments under direction of the labor commissioner the state-federal employment service actually supplied workers for 60,609 jobs during the biennial period ending June 30, 1928. Of these, 12,495 were farm jobs.

The office of state fire marshal was created by an act of the thirty-fourth general assembly. The principal duties of the fire marshal are to investigate the cause, origin and circumstances of every fire occurring in the state; to determine if any buildings or structures, by reason of want of proper repair or by reason of age and dilapidated conditions, are especially liable to fire and to order their repair or removal; to require teachers in public and private schools to have at least one fire drill a month and instruct the pupils at least four times a year in the causes and dangers of fires; to make an annual report to the governor. For the purpose of enforcing the orders of the fire marshal suitable penalties and fines are provided and he and his deputy are empowered to administer oaths and compel the attendance of witnesses. If the state fire marshal shall be of the opinion that there is evidence sufficient to charge any person with the crime of arson or criminal conduct in connection with any fire he shall cause such person to be arrested. Reports are required to be made to the fire marshal by all chiefs of fire departments of each and every fire, and where there is no established fire department the report is to be made by mayors and by township clerks outside of incorporated cities and towns.

After eleven years' feeble existence as a territorial library, Iowa's state library came into being as such in 1848.

The territorial library in its time had two distinguished librarians, James Clarke, afterward governor of the territory of Iowa, and Theodore S. Parvin, afterward founder of the Masonic library, Cedar Rapids, and author of many valuable contributions to Iowa history.

While the state library's legal existence began with the year 1848—eighty years ago, its existence as a general library began seventy-six years ago, and it owes its enlargement to the foresight and persistence of Governor Hempstead, and the liberal view of a majority of the fourth general assembly.

In 1898, fifty years after the birth of the state library, the present incumbent on entering upon his duties found the number of volumes of record in both departments of the library to be 57,501. Of these 2,500 were included in the traveling library section which in 1900 were turned over to the Iowa library commission, thus reducing the number to 55,001.

Thirty resultful years have elapsed since then.

In 1900, "the miscellaneous portion of the state library" was consolidated with the historical department; but that department was placed under direct supervision of the library board and not made a department of the state library.

The total number of books of record, as per inventory, in the several departments of the state library on June 30, 1926, was

193,994

The total additions to the several departments during the period ending June 30, 1928, was

9,646

These additions make a grand total of books in the state library, June 30, 1928, of

203,640

Figures do not alone attest the growth of a library in usefulness; but they do show the physical growth and strength. As has already been shown in the two departments in existence in 1898, when the present incumbent entered upon his duties as state librarian, there were of record 55,001 volumes. In the four departments in operation in 1928—thirty years later—there were of record 203,640 volumes—an increase of 270 per cent.

The Iowa Library Commission was created by an act of the twenty-eighth general assembly in March, 1900. Two years later the traveling library previously under the state library was transferred to the commission.

The executive officer of the commission is the secretary who also bears the title of director of library extension. The activities of the commission consist (1) of the work of extension and supervision carried on by the secretary assisted by the organizer.

This consists of help given by personal correspondence and visits in the inaugurating of library projects and the arousing of interest in the submission of the question of tax support in communities without public libraries, and of advice and help in the selection of building plans, equipment and furniture, books, etc.

The second activity of the commission is the traveling library, books from which go out (a) in fixed groups of fifty volumes each as general reading by adults and children. These groups become small libraries in the communities to which they go. (b) In selected groups for reading or study in numbers to meet the needs of borrowers. Books are loaned to organizations of all kinds, to schools and to individuals. For the two-year period beginning July 1, 1925, the library commission has an allowance of \$18,500 for maintenance and operation.

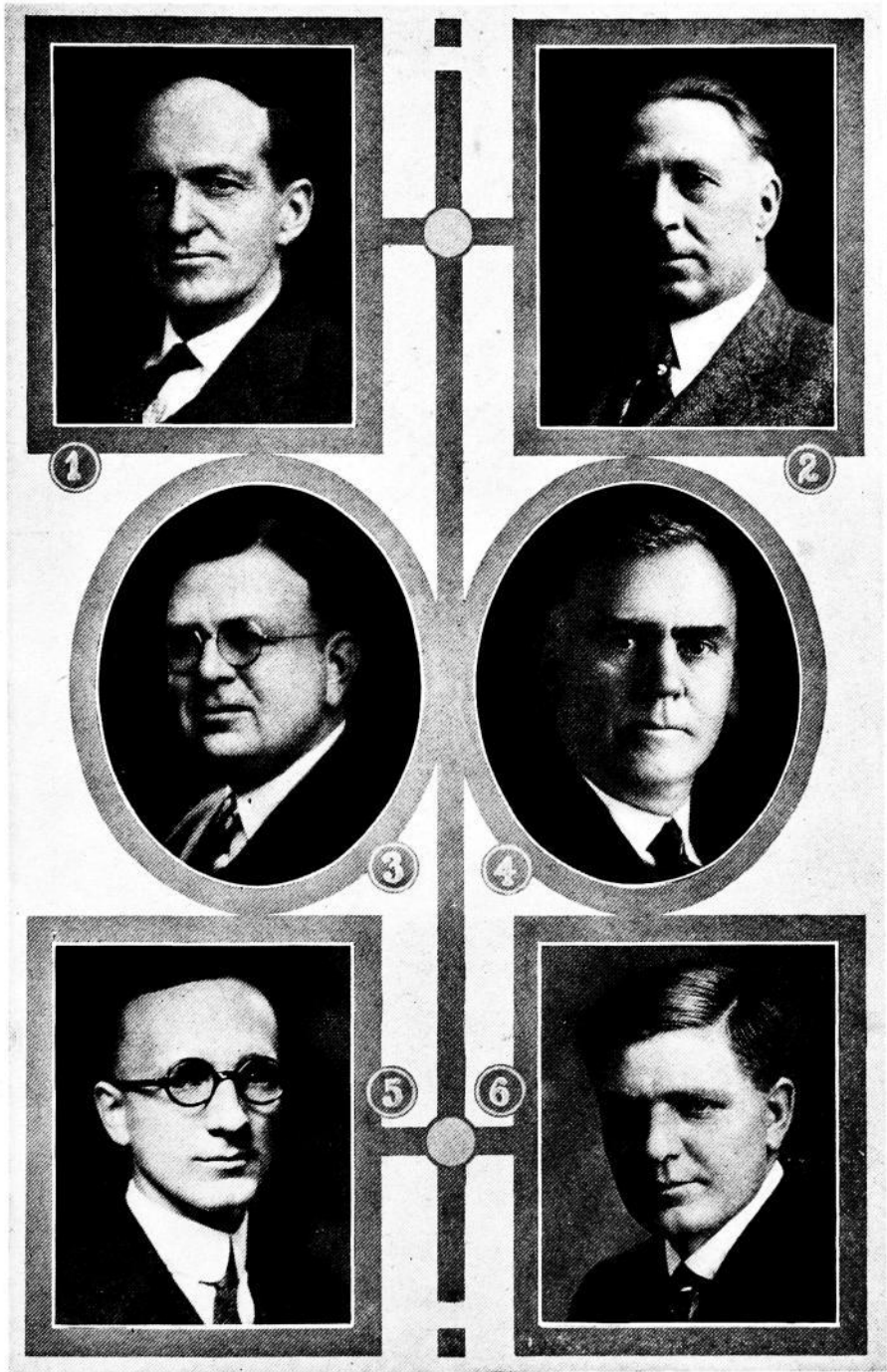

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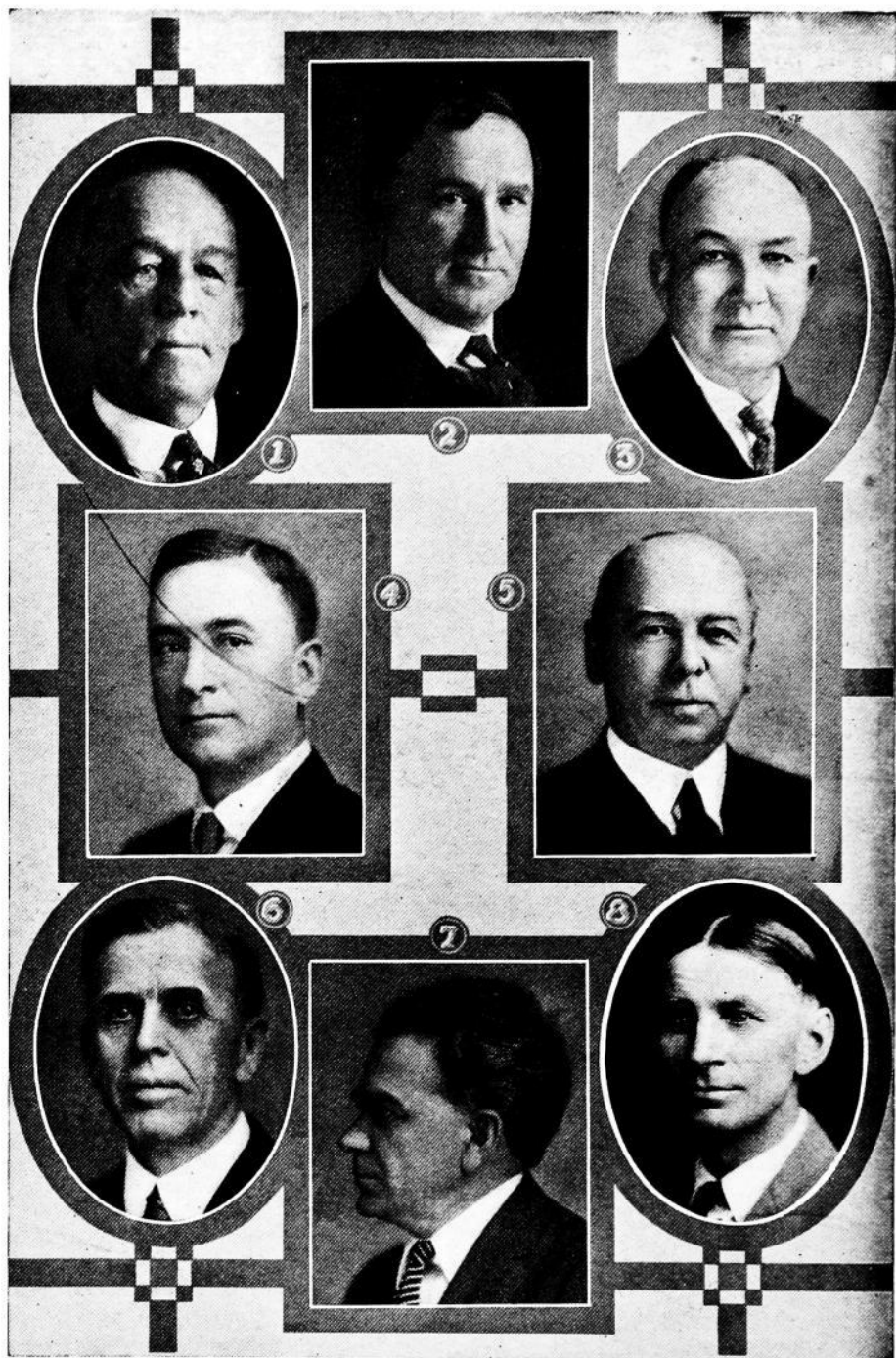

Since January, 1918, the department has engaged in assembling original materials relating to the contribution of Iowa in the world war and the collections include invaluable material.



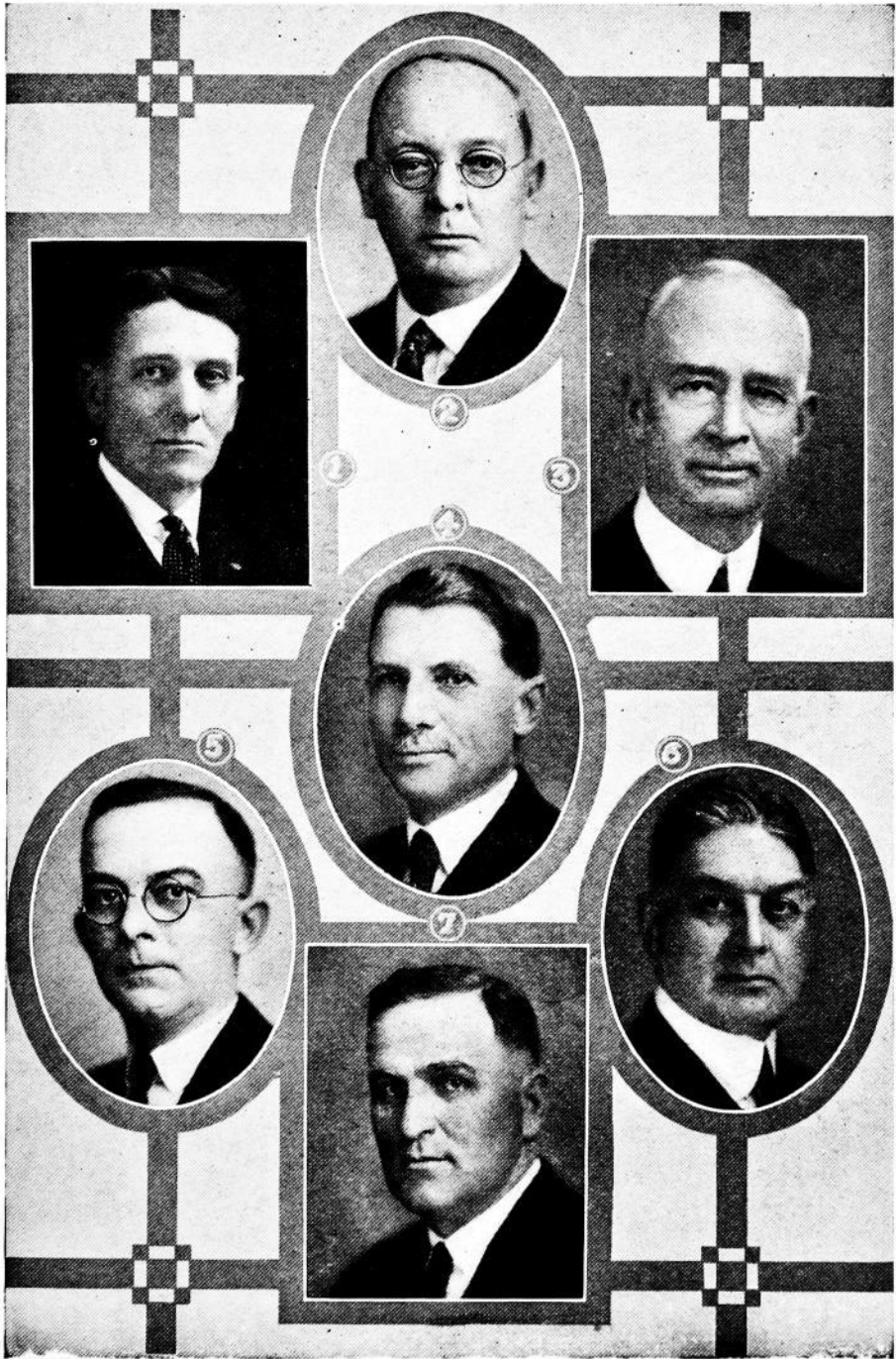

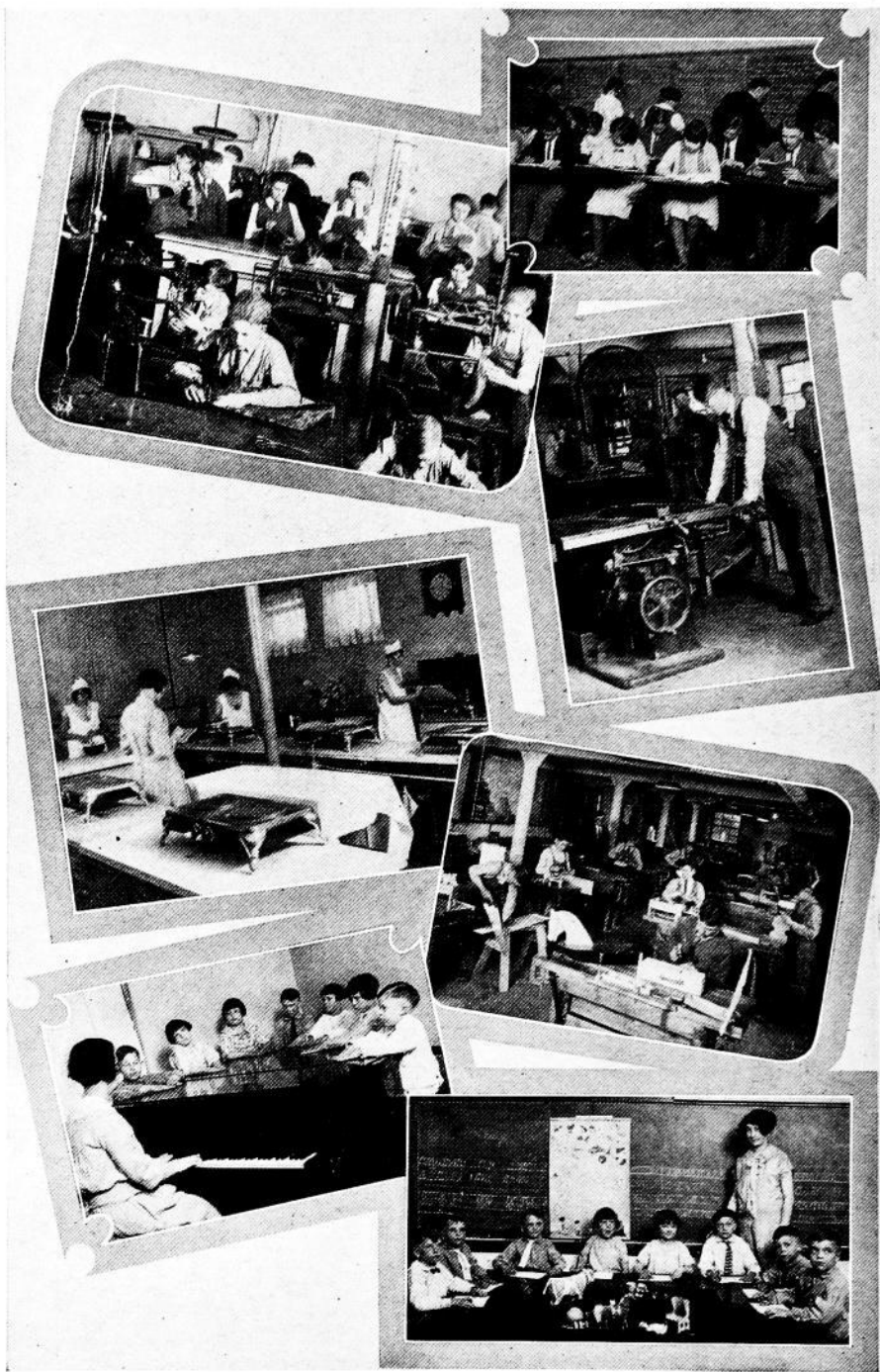

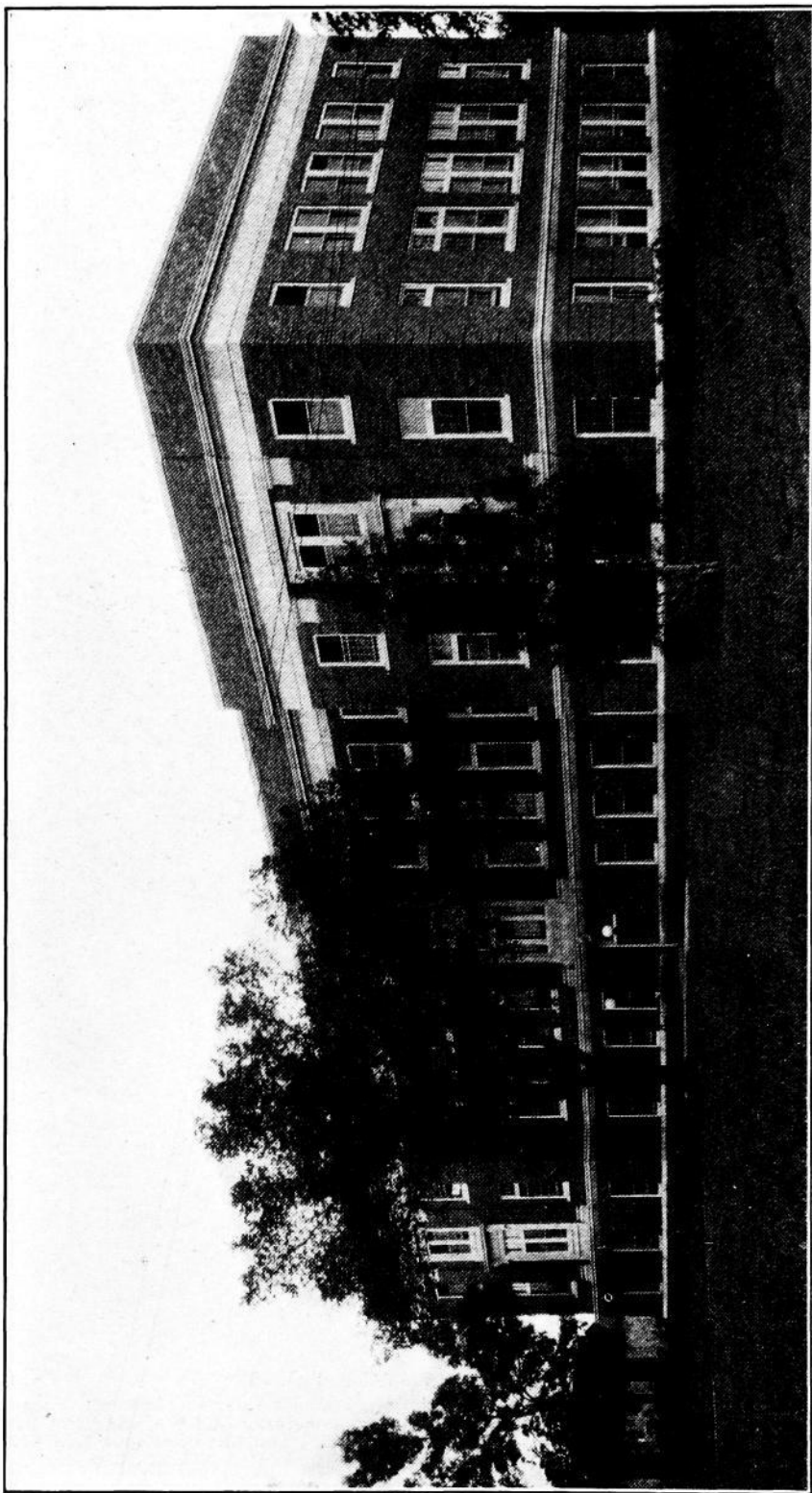
CLASSES IN THE SCHOOL FOR THE DEAF, COUNCIL BLUFFS

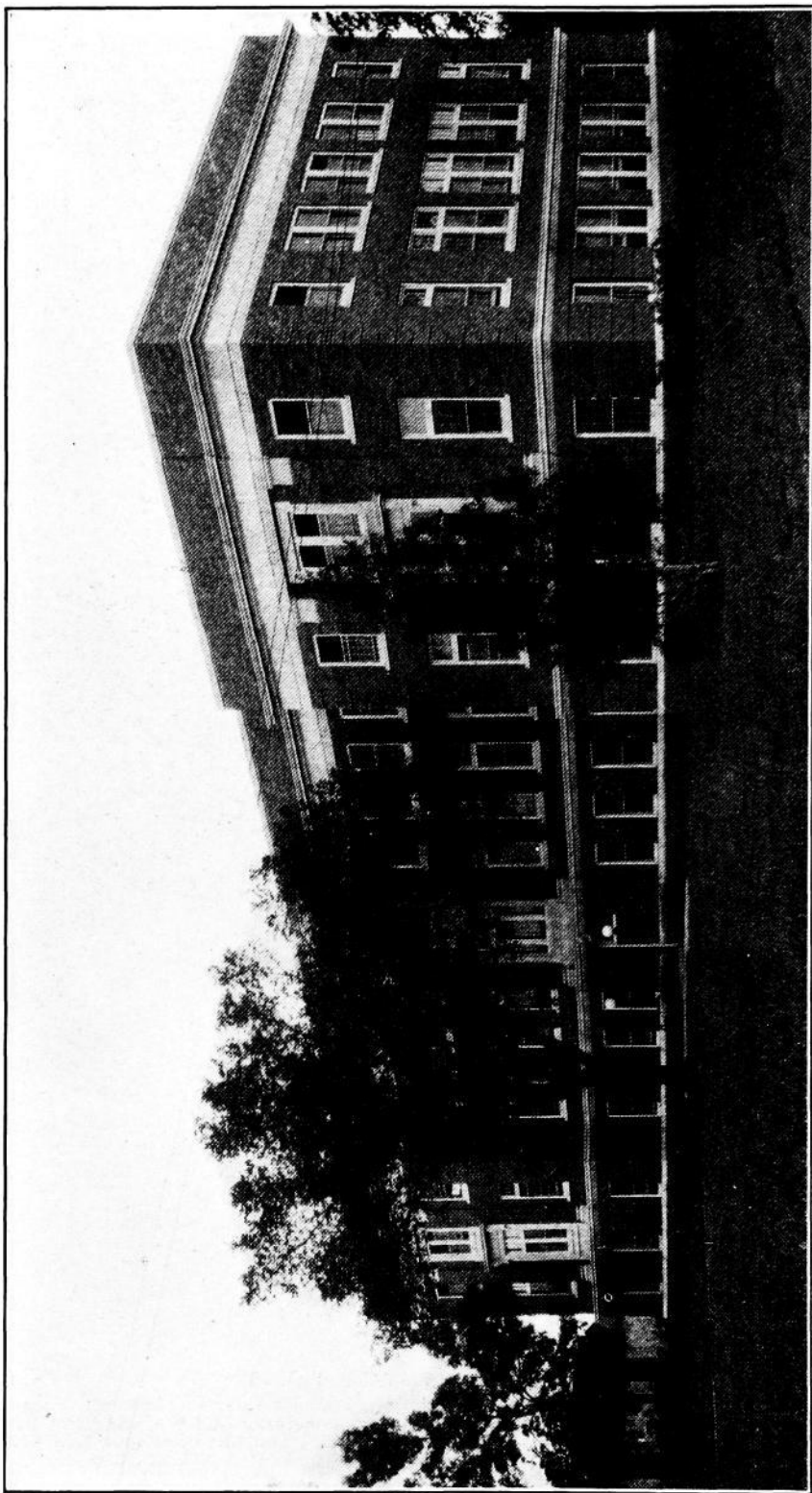

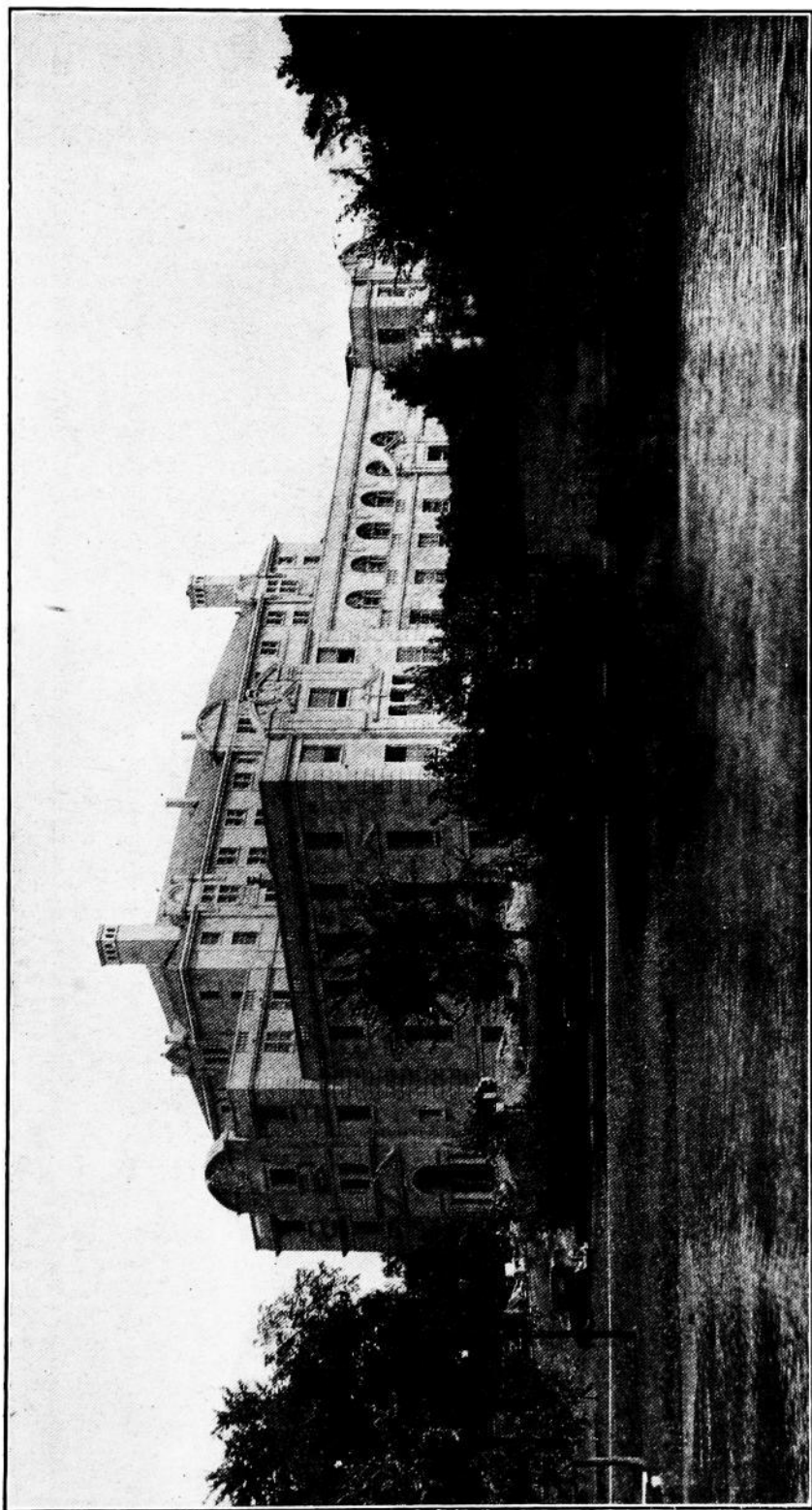

STATE HIGHWAY COMMISSION BUILDING, AMES



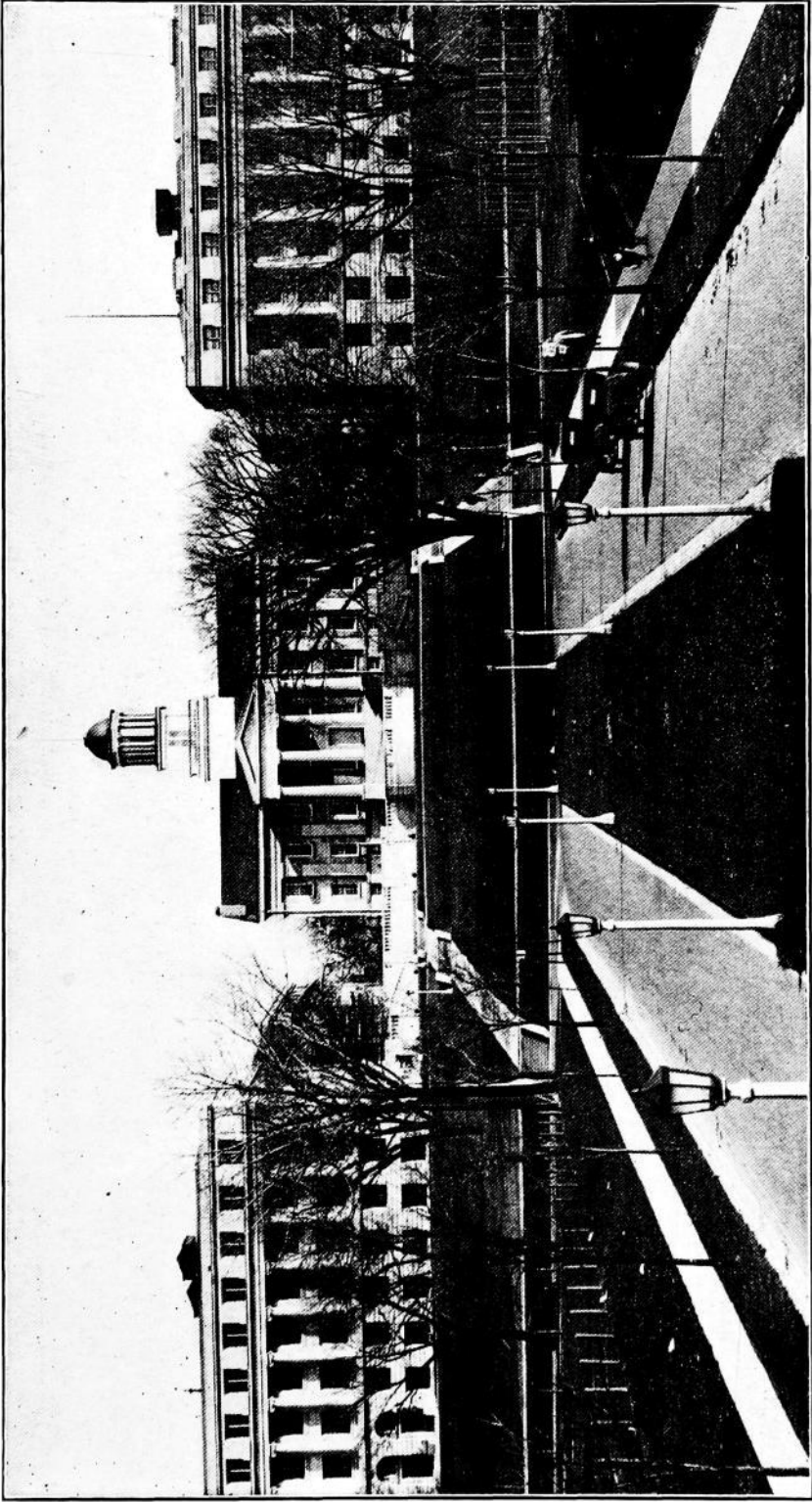

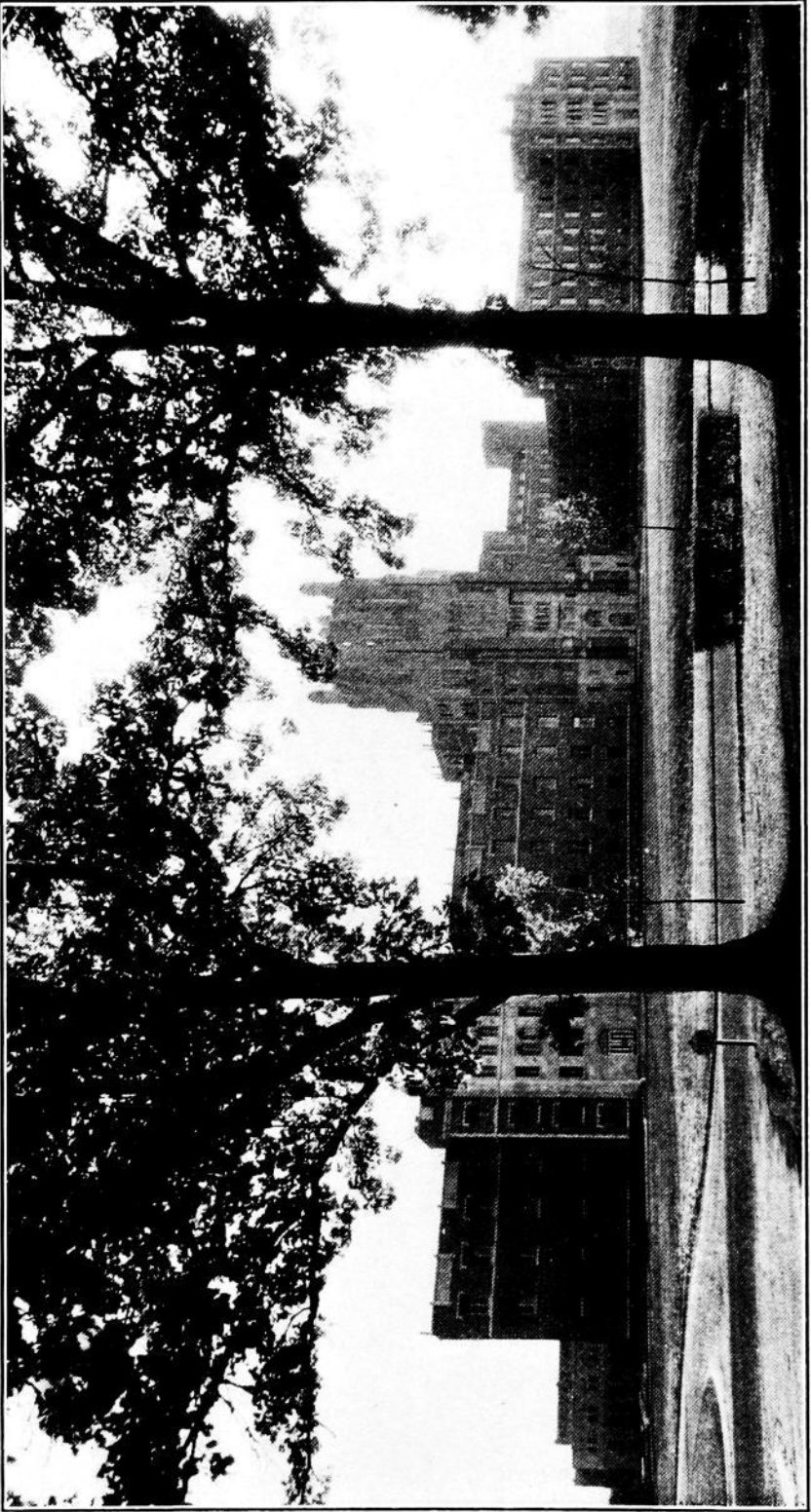

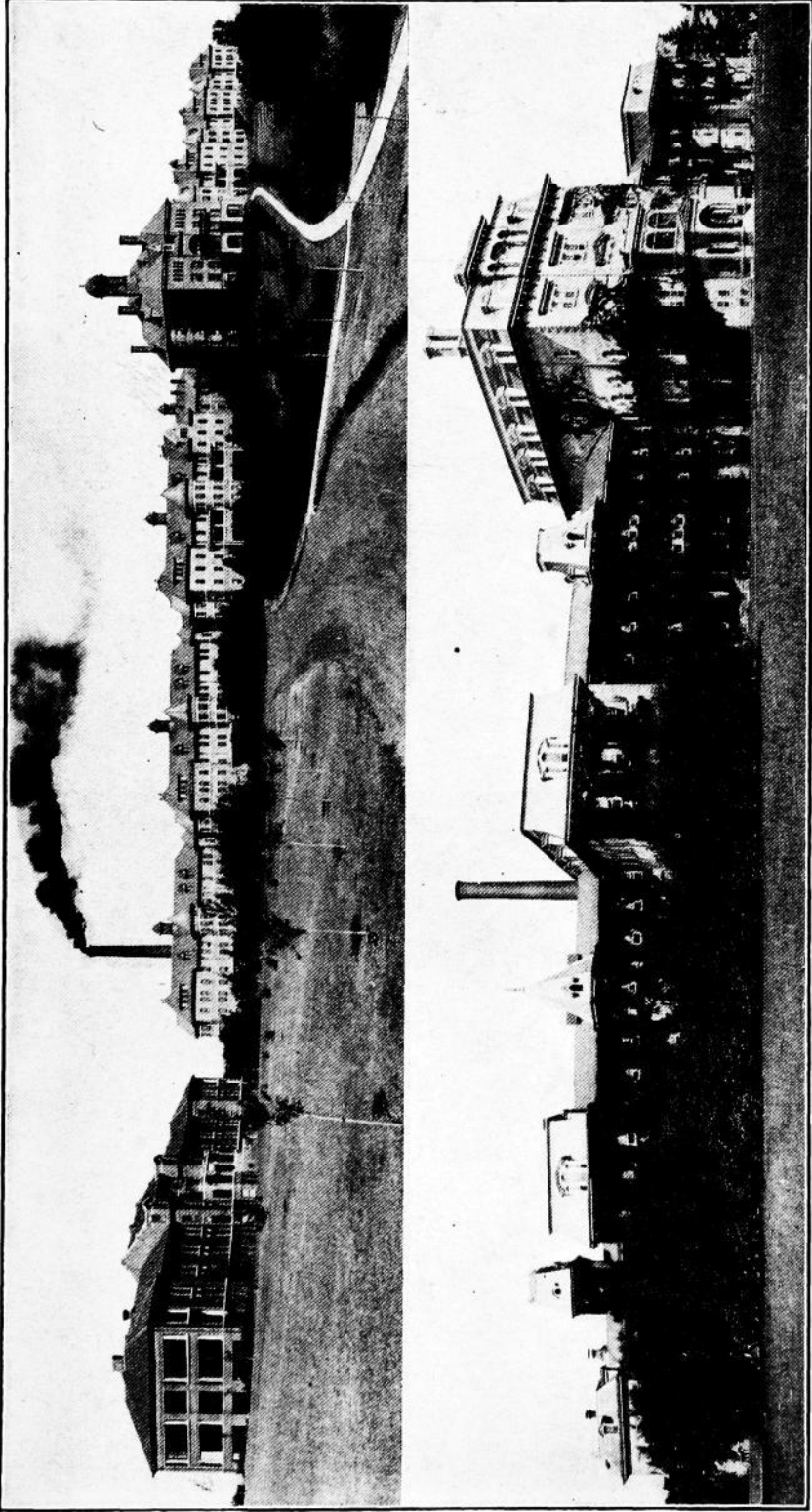

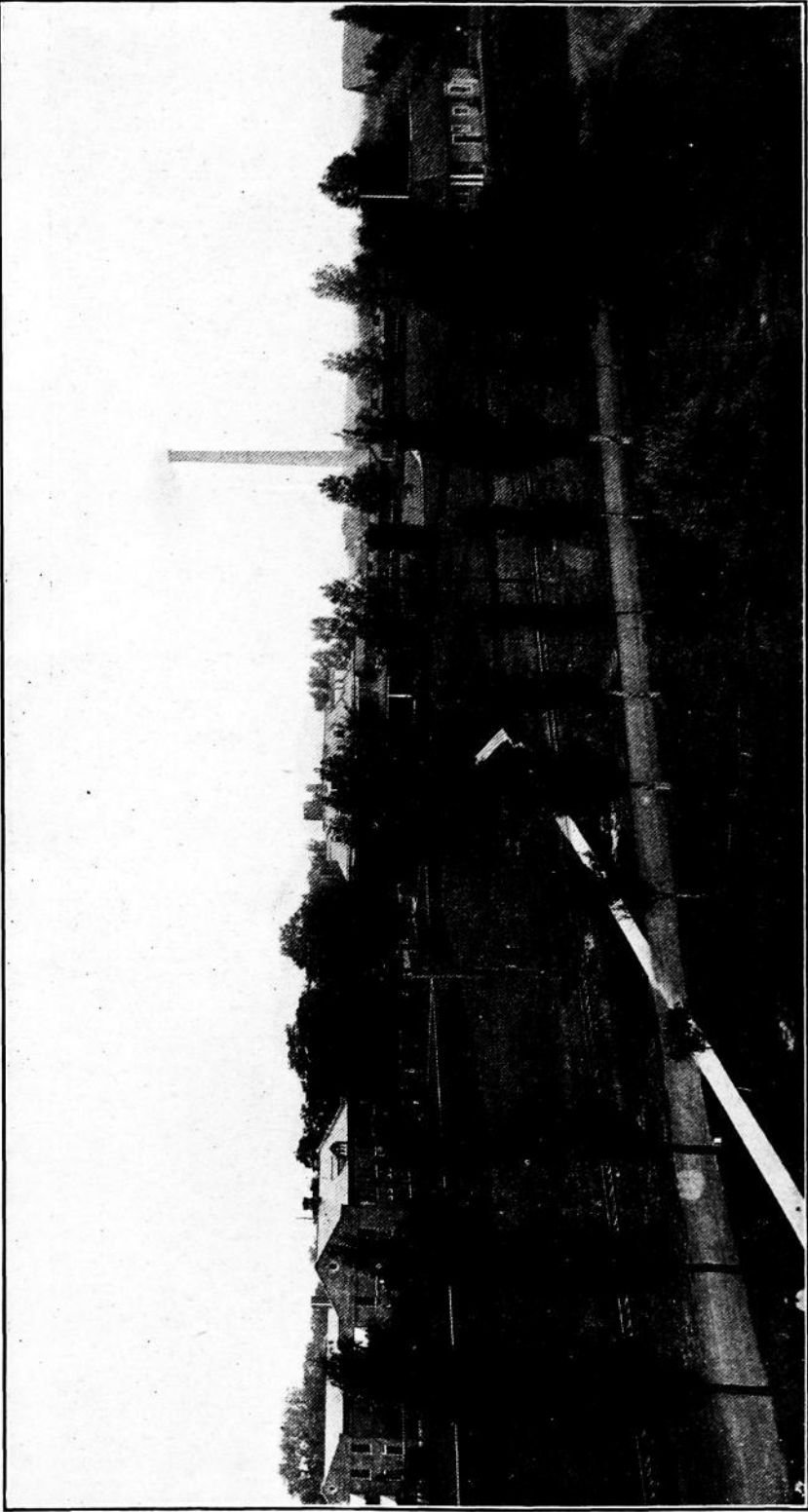
A SECTION OF THE UNIVERSITY CAMPUS AT IOWA CITY, WITH OLD CAPITOL IN THE CENTER



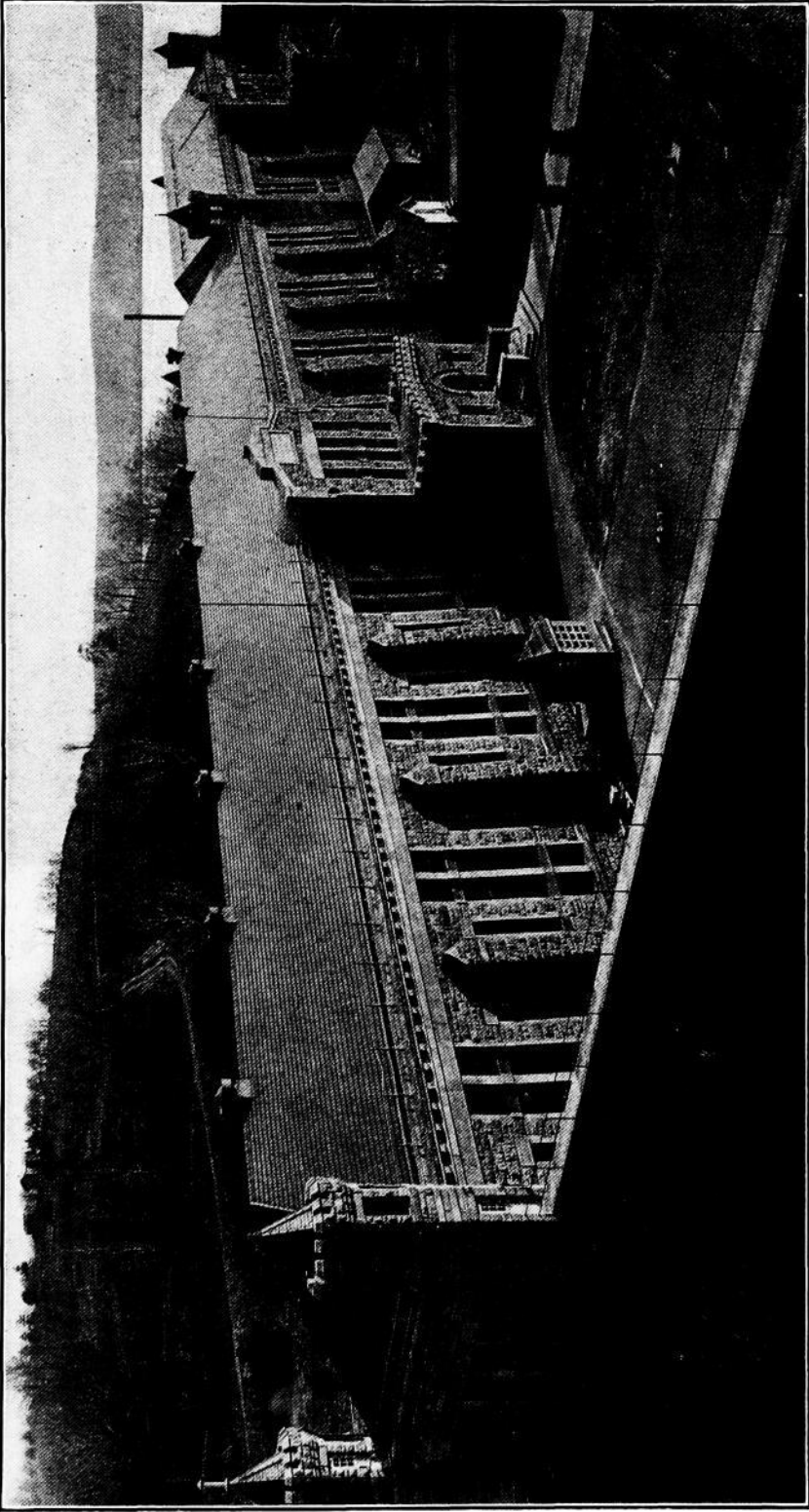

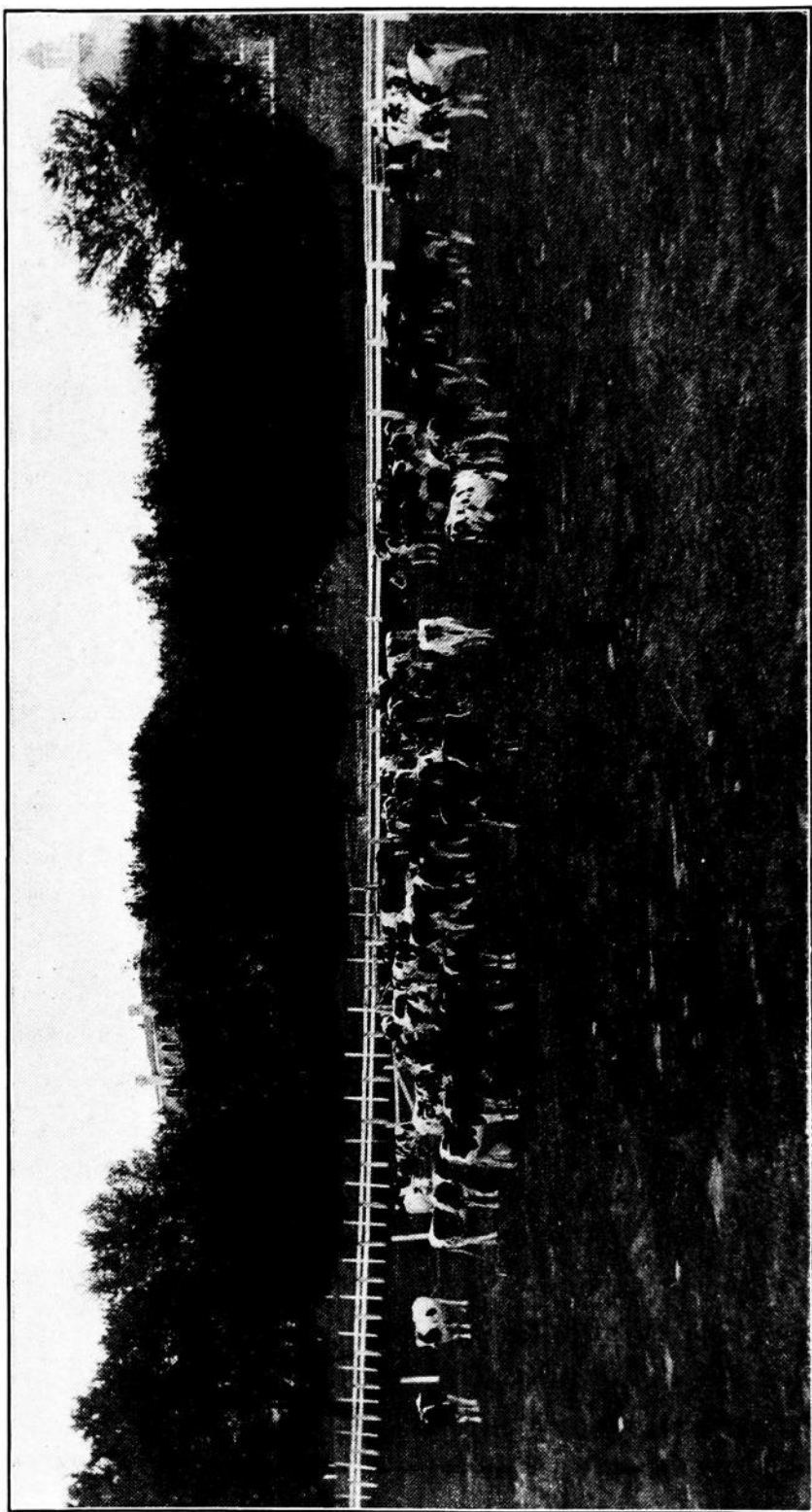
UPPER VIEW—CHEROKEE STATE HOSPITAL. LOWER VIEW—INDEPENDENCE STATE HOSPITAL.

In the library division of the historical department special efforts are made to collect works of state and general western history, biography and genealogy, war histories, works relating to the North American Indians, county histories, maps, Iowa pamphlets, biographies, documents relating to early settlers and settlements and every species of data which can throw light upon local, state, or western history.

The museum includes many remarkable specimens of mammals and birds mounted by the director who is a taxidermist. The mammals include moose, buffalo, elk, deer, wolves, foxes and other animals. There are several large cases of mounted birds such as eagles, pelicans, loons, and wild turkeys. Indian relics and handiwork, weapons used in the nation's wars, historic medals, pottery and many other items are preserved. For lack of space many World war trophies are still stored at Camp Dodge. The museum is open to visitors every day in the year.

NEWSPAPER DIVISION

Special efforts are made to collect Iowa newspapers from the earliest dates to the present time. Three hundred weeklies and thirty dailies are currently received and the department endeavors to acquire all Iowa newspapers. It has ceased the collection of papers from other states, with the exception of the New York Times.

PUBLIC ARCHIVES DIVISION

The public archives material is derived from the state departments, boards, bureau, etc., and dates from 1838 down to a ten-year period prior to the date of removal. These materials are taken from the vaults, garrets and storage places and in most cases they are a chaotic mass covered with dust and dirt. These must all be read, classified, cleansed, repaired, filed and indexed.

The thirty-seventh general assembly created the state board of conservation consisting of four members of which the curator of the state historical department was an ex-officio member. Subsequently the legislature amended the act, providing a board of five members appointed by the governor. The secretary of the executive council is ex-officio secretary of the board.

The state board of conservation makes recommendations for the purchases of park areas and has entire charge of the management of these parks. The executive council either approves or rejects the recommendations. The board also has jurisdiction over the meandered streams and lakes in the state, the construction of dams and the improvement of lakes.

The parks are created for three purposes: first, recreational; second, scientific; third, historical. Donations have been made by public spirited citizens as at Ft. Atkinson, Eldora, Pine Creek, Lacey-Keosauqua, Lepley, Pilot Knob, Ledges, Doliver Memorial, Farmington, Hamburg, Oak Grove, Palisades, King, Wild Cat Den, Ambrose A. Coll, Bixby and other parks.

The state board for vocational education was established by the thirty-seventh general assembly in the act accepting the terms of the federal law on vocational education commonly known as the Smith-Hughes Act.

The membership of the board is ex-officio. The board co-operates with public schools in formation of day classes in agriculture, trade and industries, and home-making. Also in each of these lines part-time and evening classes are conducted by public schools working with the board.

In all cases mentioned above the districts receive reimbursement on teachers' salaries from federal funds alone.

The board also co-operates with the proper authorities at Iowa State College at Ames in preparing teachers of the above subjects.

The thirty-ninth general assembly approved the federal law of June 2, 1920, called the industrial rehabilitation act, for operation in Iowa. By the federal law the state board for vocational education became the board for conducting rehabilitation for all eligible disabled cases excepting those coming directly under the federal government for persons disabled as a result of enlisted service in army and navy.

The office of state mine inspector was created by the eighteenth general assembly in the year 1880. The entire time of the inspectors is taken up with the work of inspecting the mines of the state and seeing that they are worked in conformity with the mining laws of the state as regards safety to the employes therein, proper ventilation, condition of the shafts, escape ways in times of danger, safety catches on cages, condition of the cables for hoisting men and coal, and everything that would tend to guard against accidents to men employed in the mines.

A general office for the inspectors is maintained in the state house and a complete record is kept therein of all inspections, accidents, etc., in record books for that purpose. A monthly report of the general conditions of all mines is made to the mine inspectors and a general report of the conditions of the mines of the state, tonnage, accidents, number of employes, and other information relative to the coal industry, is published every two years. Copies of the state mining laws are also published and circulated. Blue prints of maps of all mines in the state, brought up to date once each year, are on file in the offices of the mine inspectors subject to public inspection. A secretary, elected by the inspectors, has charge of the general correspondence and books in the office, as the duties of the three inspectors keep them almost constantly in the field.

The state board of mine examiners was created by the twenty-second general assembly, and is composed of five members; two coal operators, two miners, and one engineer. Their duties are to examine and issue certificates to those qualified to act as state mine inspectors, hoisting engineers and mine foremen. An examination for state mine inspectors is held the first Monday in March in even-numbered years in the office of the state mine inspectors in the state house. Examinations for hoisting engineers and mine foremen are held at various times during the year in different parts of the state. A fee of two dollars for registration, and an additional fee of two dollars is required of those taking and passing the examination for mine foremen and hoisting engineers. The law requires that each certificate issued by the board shall be recorded in the office of the examining board, and shall show the name, age, residence and years of experience of the person to whom it was issued.

The present geological survey was organized in 1892 and since that time has been engaged in two lines of research. The first of these is the detailed study of the geology of the state by counties. In this work all the natural features of interest and value are studied and described, such as the general character of the surface, its soils, water courses, deposits of valuable minerals and other topics.

The second line of work has been that of special investigation of the minerals of the state. In this work studies have been made of the coal and peat beds, lead and zinc, gypsum, clays and shales, limestone and sandstone, and the surface and underground water resources. The different geological formations are being studied as units.

For several years past the state survey has co-operated with the national survey in the making of topographic maps of the Des Moines valley. These maps show the character of the surface, the drainage, and elevations above sea level, as well as cultural features. They are of especial value in coal prospecting, engineering and drainage prospects.

The Iowa commission for the blind was created by the forty-first general assembly. Under the law the commission "shall consist of the superintendent of the state school for the blind and two other members to be appointed by the governor." The commission must prepare and maintain a complete register of the blind of the state; assist in marketing products of blind workers; ameliorate the condition of the blind by promoting visits to them in their homes for the purpose of instruction; make inquiries concerning causes of blindness to ascertain what portion of such cases are preventable; discourage begging; provide for suitable vocational training whenever the commission shall deem it advisable and necessary and establish workshops for the employment of the blind.

COMMISSION ON UNIFORM STATE LAWS

CHARLES M. DUTCHER, Iowa City; JESSE A. MILLER, Des Moines; and HAZEN I. SAWYER, Keokuk. *Four year terms ending July 1, 1933.*

Authorized by the thirty-ninth general assembly. The three commissioners are named by the governor to serve without compensation but expenses incurred in the work are to be paid by the state. The law makes it the duty of each of said commissioners to attend the meeting of the national conference of commissioners on uniform state laws, or to arrange for the attendance of at least one of their number at such national conference; to promote uniformity in state laws upon all subjects where uniformity may be deemed desirable and practicable.

BOARD OF EXAMINERS FOR SHORTHAND REPORTERS

J. L. PARRISH, Des Moines; R. C. TURNER, Sioux City, and F. C. WALRATH, Des Moines. *Three year terms ending July 1, 1930.*

Authorized by the thirty-eighth general assembly. The examiners are appointed by the chief justice of the supreme court to conduct examinations of those seeking to become certified shorthand reporters. Under the law two of the examiners must be official shorthand reporters and one a practicing attorney of the state. The examiners receive only necessary traveling expenses paid from fees accruing under the law.

BOARD OF ARCHITECTURAL EXAMINERS

Members of board whose terms expire July 1, 1930—Arthur Ebeling, Davenport, and William L. Perkins, Chariton. Members whose terms expire July 1, 1932—J. Chris Jensen, Council Bluffs, Oren R. Thomas, Des Moines, and Harry D. Rawson, Des Moines. Serve without pay.

The forty-second general assembly passed a law requiring a board of architectural examiners and specifying that all persons who wish to practice architecture in Iowa under the title "architect" must secure from the board a certificate. Authority to revoke certificates is granted the board in case those holding same do not meet the requirements of the law.

The board of control of state institutions was created under the provisions of chapter 118, laws of the twenty-seventh general assembly, which, with the amendments thereto, clothes the board with full power to manage, control and govern, subject only to the limitations contained in the act, the following named institutions:

Soldiers' Home at Marshalltown; Soldiers' Orphans' Home at Davenport; Institution for Feeble-Minded Children at Glenwood; State Sanatorium for the Treatment of Tuberculosis at Oakdale; Training School for Boys at Eldora; Training School for Girls at Mitchellville; Mount Pleasant State Hospital at Mount Pleasant; Independence State Hospital at Independence; Clarinda State Hospital at Clarinda; Cherokee State Hospital at Cherokee; Hospital for Female Inebriates at Mount Pleasant; Hospital for Male Inebriates at Independence; State Penitentiary at Fort Madison; Men's Reformatory at Anamosa; Women's Reformatory at Rockwell City; Hospital for Epileptics and School for Feeble-Minded at Woodward; Juvenile Home, Toledo.

The board is required to inspect county and private institutions in which insane persons are kept, associations and societies receiving friendless children and detention homes provided for juvenile offenders.

Prior to July 1, 1898, the foregoing state institutions, except the reformatory and penitentiary, were in charge of separate boards, each of which had its officers and each had a secretary and treasurer.

The board of control was organized on April 6, 1898, and took full control, as

provided by statute, on July 1, 1898, of the institutions subject to its control. At that time the various boards of trustees and commissioners ceased to exist.

The board is required to investigate the management and financial condition of the state institutions under its control, to determine questions as to the sanity of patients in state hospitals, and to determine when persons shall be admitted to them as state charges, and is required to divide the state into hospital districts. It is required to make biennial reports to the governor and legislature showing the cost of operating the institutions for the preceding two years and to visit all institutions twice each year. Some member of the board or its agent is required to visit each hospital for insane once each month. The board is required to meet the superintendents and other heads of institutions in quarterly conferences, to gather statistics, to publish a bulletin, to require official bonds of certain institution officers to make a semiannual invoice of all the stores of the institutions, to fix annually the salaries of officers and employees not fixed by law, and to perform other duties provided by law.

The board of education of nine members is appointed by the governor for six-year terms, subject to approval by the senate. The board chooses from outside its own membership a finance committee of three members. The committee selects its president and secretary, the secretary of the committee also serving as secretary of the board, his compensation being \$4,000 a year. The committee members receive \$3,600 a year. The secretary is in charge of the general offices and has his office at the seat of government.

IOWA SCHOOL FOR THE BLIND—VINTON

The aim and purpose of the Iowa School for the Blind is purely educational. The course of study includes not only the subjects leading up to and required for admission to the colleges and the university of the state, but also subjects that aim to prepare our students for some of the occupations in which it has been demonstrated that the blind are usually successful. After a pupil of this school reaches the high school department, he is given some latitude in the choice of courses of study, and in the making of his choice he always has the guidance and advice of teachers and matrons. However, the courses are so arranged that a student who chooses one course, say, one of the vocational courses of study, has the benefit of subjects in other courses. In fact, both literary and industrial work is required of all students, besides some music.

IOWA SCHOOL FOR THE DEAF—COUNCIL BLUFFS

HISTORICAL

The Iowa School for the deaf was founded in 1885, in answer to the demand that the deaf children of the state be given the same opportunity for an education that was provided for those who could hear. Because such deaf children are fewer and very much scattered, as well as to secure better grading, it was found more economical to get them together and provide board as well as tuition. The school was first located at Iowa City and later moved to Council Bluffs. In 1902 fire completely destroyed the main building which housed the executive quarters and dormitories for pupils. A substantial fireproof structure now stands in its place where sufficient room is provided for 300 pupils. A separate building to accommodate forty-five of the younger pupils is also provided. More than ninety per cent of the pupils are taught by means of the oral method, which employs for the purpose, speech, lip-reading and writing. A well equipped industrial department is maintained for the purpose of teaching trades. Students become skilled workmen and graduates, with remarkably few exceptions, are self-supporting, useful citizens of the state.

SUPREME COURT OF IOWA

ORGANIZATION

The supreme court consists of nine judges, five of whom constitute a quorum for the transaction of business, but one alone may adjourn from day to day, or to a particular day, or until the next term.

The judge whose term first expires is the chief justice, and so on in rotation, except when the terms of two of the justices expire at the same time the senior in age serves first as chief justice.

JURISDICTION

The supreme court has appellate jurisdiction only in cases in chancery and constitutes a court for the correction of errors at law. It has appellate jurisdiction over all judgments and decisions of all courts of record, except as otherwise provided by law.

An appeal may also be taken to the supreme court from :

1. An order made affecting a substantial right in an action, when such order, in effect, determines the action and prevents a judgment from which an appeal might be taken.
2. A final order made in special actions affecting a substantial right therein, or made on a summary application in an action for judgment;
3. An order which grants or refuses, continues or modifies a provisional remedy; grants or refuses, dissolves or refuses to dissolve an injunction or attachment; or grants or refuses a new trial; or sustains or overrules a demurrer;
4. An intermediate order involving the merits or materially affecting the final decision;
5. An order or judgment on habeas corpus.

If any of the above orders or judgments are made or rendered by a judge, the same are reviewable, the same as if made by a court.

The supreme court has power to issue all writs and processes necessary to secure justice to parties, and to enforce its appellate jurisdiction, and it may exercise supervisory control over all inferior judicial tribunals.

It may enforce its mandates upon inferior courts and officers by fine and imprisonment, which imprisonment may continue until mandates are obeyed.

SALARY

The salary of each justice is \$7,500 a year. Each general assembly also appropriates sufficient funds for the payment of stenographers, bailiffs and such other incidental expenses as may be incurred by the court.

THE DISTRICT COURT OF IOWA

There are at the present time sixty-nine judges of the district court of the state of Iowa. The state is divided into twenty-one judicial districts and each district is entitled to from one to six judges, the number being fixed by statute. The judges are elected for terms of four years and receive an annual salary of \$4,000; by act of the forty-third general assembly increased to \$5,000, the increase, under the constitution, not to apply to any sitting judge during the term for which he had been elected. Also district judges receive necessary hotel expenses not to exceed \$3 per day when away from home, and transportation expenses. Each judge appoints a shorthand reporter, who receives \$10 per day for each day's attendance upon said court, and in case the per diem does not equal \$2,400, then the county or counties composing the district make up the deficiency in proportion to the number of days of court held in such county or counties.

The following is in sections 10761 and 10766 of the code governing the jurisdiction of the district court.

The district court shall have general original and exclusive jurisdiction of all actions, proceedings and remedies, both civil and criminal, except in cases where exclusive or concurrent jurisdiction is or may hereafter be conferred upon some other court or tribunal by the constitution and laws of the state, and shall have and exercise all the powers usually possessed and exercised by courts of record. It shall also possess and exercise jurisdiction in all appeals and writs of error taken in civil and criminal actions and special proceedings authorized to be taken from all inferior courts, tribunals, boards or officers, under any provisions of the laws of this state, and shall have a general supervision thereof, in all matters, to prevent and correct abuses, where no other remedy is provided.

The district court of each county shall have original and exclusive jurisdiction to probate the wills of, and to grant administration upon the estates of, all persons who at the time of their death were residents of the county and of nonresidents of the state who die leaving property within the county subject to administration, or whose property is afterwards brought into the county.

To appoint guardians of the persons and property of all persons resident in the county subject to guardianship, or whose property is afterwards brought into the county.

It shall have jurisdiction in all matters in relation to the appointment of executors and trustees, and the management and disposition of the property of and settlement of such estates; *provided*, that where jurisdiction has heretofore been acquired, the same shall be retained until such estate is closed.

The district court shall succeed to and exercise full authority and jurisdiction over the records of the circuit court, and may enforce all judgments, decrees and orders thereof in the same manner and to the same extent as it may exercise like jurisdiction and authority over its own records, and for the purpose of the issuance of process, and of any and all other acts necessary to the due and efficient enforcement of the orders, judgments and decrees of the circuit courts the records thereof shall be deemed records of the district court.

Transcripts and process from the judgments, decrees and records of the circuit court shall be issued by the clerk of the district court and under the seal of his office.

MUNICIPAL COURTS

Any city, whether organized under a special charter, commission form of government or the general law for the incorporation of cities or towns, now or hereafter having a population of five thousand or more, as shown by the last preceding state or United States census, may establish a municipal court. All civil townships in which said city or any part thereof is located shall constitute the municipal court district.

The salary of municipal court judge is \$3,000 in cities with population less than 30,000, \$3,400 with population between 30,000 and less than 75,000, \$3,600 with population 75,000 or over. Compensation of court reporter is fixed by the judge at not to exceed \$8.00 per day. Salary of clerk is \$1,800, \$2,200 and \$2,600 according to population of city as above indicated.

Jurisdiction. Municipal courts have concurrent jurisdiction with the district court in all civil matters, where the amount in controversy does not exceed one thousand dollars, except in probate matters, actions for divorce, alimony, separate maintenance, those directly affecting the title to real estate, and juvenile proceedings unless otherwise authorized.

In all criminal matters the court shall exercise the jurisdiction conferred on justice of the peace courts, mayors' courts, and police courts, except that the mayor's court of any incorporated city or town within such municipal court district other than the city in which said court is established shall have exclusive jurisdiction of prosecutions for violations of city ordinances.

In all matters of which the municipal court has jurisdiction, it has the same powers in reference to injunctions, writs, orders and other proceedings in and out of court as are possessed by the district court and the judges thereof.

SUPERIOR COURTS

The statutes provide that any city containing four thousand inhabitants, may establish a superior court. There are at present six such courts, located as follows: Cedar Rapids, Grinnell, Keokuk, Oelwein, Perry and Shenandoah. The judges are elected for terms of four years and receive an annual salary, which is paid quarterly, the first two quarters being paid from the city treasury and the last two quarters from the county treasury of the county in which court is located. Salary of

judge, \$2,000 per annum in cities up to 25,000 population; \$3,000 in cities of 25,000 up to 40,000, and \$3,750 in cities of 40,000 or more.

The judges appoint a shorthand reporter, whose compensation is fixed by order of the court not exceeding \$8.00 per day for the time actually employed.

The following is a copy of sections 10704 and 10705 of the code, governing the jurisdiction of the superior court:

Said court shall have jurisdiction concurrent with the district court in all civil matters and actions for divorce, alimony, and separate maintenance.

It shall have exclusive original jurisdiction to try and determine all actions, civil and criminal, for the violation of city ordinances and all jurisdiction conferred on police courts as now or as may hereafter be provided by law and concurrent jurisdiction with justices of the peace.

THE LEGISLATIVE DEPARTMENT

The legislative department of the state of Iowa is vested in a general assembly, which consists of a senate and house of representatives.

The senate consists of fifty members. Senators are elected for terms of four years; twenty-one senators being elected at one general election and twenty-nine at the next.

The house of representatives consists at present of one hundred and eight members, who are elected for a term of two years.

Sessions of the general assembly are held biennially in the odd-numbered years, and they commence on the second Monday of January.

The compensation of the members of the forty-third general assembly was \$1,000 for the session. This is in accordance with an act of the thirty-fourth general assembly which went into effect July 4, 1911. They were also allowed five cents a mile from their homes to the capital and return for traveling expenses. Members are permitted to draw such stationery as they need during the session, the cost to the state for the supplies varying from \$1.50 to \$14.00 per member. No allowance is permitted for postage. The forty-third general assembly passed an act allowing each member of the assembly not to exceed \$500 per session to cover expenses while attending the session.

The lieutenant governor is the presiding officer of the senate. His pay is twice that of a member, being \$2,000 for the session of the forty-third general assembly.

The speaker of the house is chosen by the members from among their own membership. His pay is twice that of a member, being \$2,000 for the session.

The lieutenant governor appoints all committees in the senate and the speaker of the house all committees in the house.

In the regular proceedings of the senate motions made by members are not seconded but are put directly by the presiding officer, the formality of a second being waived. In the house all motions are seconded before being placed before the house by the speaker.

Sessions in both branches of the general assembly are opened by prayer. No regular chaplains are employed, but ministers from Des Moines and elsewhere over the state are assigned dates for these services and are allowed \$5 for each opening prayer.

Bills passed are re-written (enrolled) by the enrolling clerk of the branch of the general assembly where the bill originates; they are then signed by the president of the senate and speaker of the house in presence of these respective bodies, in open session; then by the governor, if meeting with his approval, and then are filed with the secretary of state. Following adjournment they are printed under the direction of the superintendent of printing.

BIOGRAPHIES OF STATE OFFICERS

JOHN HAMMILL.—Governor, was born in Linden, Iowa county, Wis., October 14, 1875. Attended the common schools of Wisconsin until 1889, when he moved with his parents near Britt, Hancock county, Iowa. Graduated from Britt high school in 1895. Graduated from the law department of the State University of Iowa in June, 1897. Engaged in the practice of law at Britt, Iowa. He was married to Fannie B. Richards on June 7, 1899. Elected county attorney in 1902, serving two terms. Was elected as a member of the state senate in 1908. Elected lieutenant governor in 1920. Re-elected in 1922. Elected governor in 1924. Re-elected in 1926 and in 1928. A republican in politics.

ARCH W. McFARLANE.—Lieutenant Governor, was born in Waterloo, Iowa, April 14, 1885, educated in the public schools, and was graduated from high school in 1904. Was married April 6, 1908, to Miss Elsie V. Hawkins. He is now engaged in the wholesale fuel business, with headquarters at Waterloo. Is a member of Christ Episcopal church, being a vestryman of that church. Is a member of the various branches of the Masonic order, including El-Kahir shrine, Knights of Pythias, Elks, Loyal Order of Moose, and is a supreme officer of the United Commercial Travelers. Elected a member of the Iowa house of representatives in 1914, re-elected in 1916-18 and 1920. Was speaker pro tem of the thirty-seventh general assembly; speaker of the house of the thirty-eighth, thirty-eighth special and thirty-ninth general assemblies. Elected to the senate in 1926 as a member of the forty-second general assembly. He taught in rural schools two years; served as superintendent of city schools for five years; and was elected county superintendent of Decatur county, Iowa, in 1906; re-elected in 1908 and again in 1910. Moved to Ames, Story county, Iowa, in 1916, and became a traveling salesman for county officials' supplies, until elected auditor of state November 2, 1926. He was married June 22, 1898, to Emma M. RAYMOND E. JOHNSON.—Treasurer of State, was born in Wilton Junction, Muscatine county, Iowa, March 26, 1886. Son of Silas L. and Nellie E. Johnson. Moved to Muscatine in 1894 and graduated from public schools there. Appointed deputy treasurer of Muscatine county January, 1908, and in January, 1910, was appointed county treasurer to fill vacancy. He served as treasurer of Muscatine county for

five terms and resigned February 1, 1920, to accept the position of secretary of the state executive council. Elected treasurer of state in November, 1924. Married May 22, 1907, to Edna I. Ryan of Muscatine, Iowa. Has one son, Charles S., and one daughter, Janet. A republican in politics.

M. G. THORNBURG.—Secretary of Agriculture, was born in Linden, Dallas county, Iowa. Educated in country school in Dallas county and the Des Moines high school; entered Iowa State college in 1900, spending two years. Married Blanche Scholes of Des Moines, 1904. From 1902 to 1908 associated with his father in farming and stock business. Re-entered college in 1908, graduating from the animal husbandry course of Iowa State college in 1910. Member of the animal husbandry faculty of Iowa State college. Enlisted in world war in March, 1918. Commissioned captain remount service in August. ELMA G. ALBERT.—Judge of the Supreme Court, was born June 5, 1866, near Gettysburg, Pennsylvania; came to Iowa in 1870. Graduated from the law department of Drake University in June, 1891, and entered upon the practice of law. County attorney of Greene county, Iowa, for six years commencing January 1, 1900. District judge of the 16th judicial district from January 1, 1915, until elected to supreme bench in November, 1924. By reason of statute served as chief justice in 1929.

LAWRENCE DE GRAFF.—Judge of the Supreme Court, was born at Apple River, Illinois, June, 1871. Educated at Morgan Park academy, Dixon College (A.B.). University of Chicago (Ph.B.), Northern Illinois college of law (LL.M.). Began the practice of law in Chicago, and removed to Des Moines in 1898 as secretary and instructor in the Highland Park college of law, and entered upon the practice in Des Moines with the firm of Miller, Wallingford and De Graff. First assistant attorney general of Iowa under Hon. Chas. W. Mullan, 1904-1907. County attorney, Polk county, Iowa, 1907-1910. District judge, ninth judicial district, 1910-1921. Elected justice of the supreme court 1920; re-elected second term 1926. Married Grace L. Clark August 4, 1901; two children, Lawrence Jr., age 19, and Barbara,

age 13. Author of several legal textbooks. Republican in politics. Resides at 4920 Country Club boulevard, Des Moines, Iowa.

WILLIAM D. EVANS.—Judge of the Supreme Court, was born in Marquette county, Wis., 1852. In 1858 he came with his parents to Williamsburg, Iowa. Here he attended the public schools. In 1873 he entered the state university. While a student at the university he taught school and was an instructor in a number of teachers' institutes during vacation. He graduated from the liberal arts course of the university in 1878 and the following year took the law course from which he graduated in 1879. Following his admittance to the bar in 1879, he located at Hampton. In 1902 he was elected judge of the district court for the eleventh judicial district. During the year 1907-8 he was law lecturer at the state university. Practiced one year in New York state. From 1887 to 1889 engaged in legal editorial work at St. Paul, Minnesota. Came to Emmetsburg, Iowa, in 1889, and has ever since resided there, engaged in the practice of law until appointed to office of justice supreme court October 1, 1925, by Governor Hammill. Elected 1926 to fill balance of term of the late Justice Arthur. Married 1888 to Flora B. Tripp, who died October 6, 1920. Four children, William E. Morling (died October 29, 1926), Mrs. Ruth M. Shover, Max M. and Maynard A. Morling.

TRUMAN S. STEVENS.—Judge of the Supreme Court, was born in Tama county, Iowa, in 1868. Attended the public schools, the Guthrie county high school; graduated from the law department of the state university and in 1892 located at Hamburg, Fremont county, where he still resides. Was appointed judge of the fifteenth judicial district February 1, 1917, and to the supreme court May, 1917. Was elected to said office in 1918 and re-elected in 1922 and 1928. Has held no other public office except that of county attorney of Fremont county for one term. Was married in 1893 to Miss Cora Patterson. They had one daughter born to them, Velma, who died December 14, 1910, at the age of thirteen.

HENRY F. WAGNER.—Judge of the Supreme Court, was born on a farm in Lancaster township, Keokuk county, Iowa, February 11, 1874. Graduated from the law department of the State University of Iowa in 1898. Engaged in the practice of law at Sigourney, Iowa, from 1898 to January 1, 1919. Elected Judge of the district court of the sixth judicial district of Iowa at the general election in 1918. Re-elected in 1922 and in 1926. Appointed justice of the supreme court September 5th, 1927, by Governor John Hammill. Elected in 1928 to fill remainder of term of the late Justice Charles W. Vermilion. Married October 12, 1898, to Lillian Updegraff. Has one daughter, Gladys, wife of J. C. Eichhorn, an attorney located at Oskaloosa, Iowa. Two grandchildren, John and Patricia Eichhorn. Republican in politics.

ULYSSES GRANT WHITNEY.—Reporter of the Supreme Court and code editor, was born July 10, 1864, on a farm near Union, Iowa. Was admitted to the bar in June, 1890. Was county attorney in Woodbury county for ten years. Was a member of the thirty-fourth and thirty-fifth general assemblies from Woodbury county. Was appointed by the judges of the supreme court to his present position in 1914, re-appointed in 1918, 1923 and 1927. Was a member of the Iowa code commission in 1919.

BURGESS WILSON GARRETT.—Clerk of the Supreme Court, was born on a farm in Van Buren county, Iowa, February 24, 1872. When a small child his parents moved to Davis county, and later, to Decatur county. Mr. Garrett was educated in the public schools, Simpson college and St. Joseph university, from which institution he graduated. He educated himself, being dependent upon his own resources from the time he was fourteen years of age. He taught school for a number of years, being principal of the Decatur high school. Has been chairman of the county central committee; member of the senatorial and congressional committees. He was pardon secretary under Governor Cummins. Served in that capacity until July 4, 1907, when he became the first secretary of the board of parole. He re-

signed to become a candidate for the office he now holds. During his first term the office was made appointive; he has been four times appointed by the supreme court and is now serving his fifth term. He has been active in politics, church and benevolent activities. Was temporary chairman of the republican state convention in 1916. Was temporary and permanent chairman of the state judicial convention in 1928. Presided over a great convention of his church in Kansas City in October, 1928. A republican in politics.

A. B. FUNK.—Iowa Industrial Commissioner, administering workmen's compensation service. Born in Adams county, Illinois, January 12, 1854. Came to Hamilton county in 1865. Identified with the Spirit Lake Beacon for thirty-five years. Established the Enterprise at Flandreau, Dakota, in 1878. In 1879 elected first mayor of Flandreau, and, returning to Spirit Lake, was in the same year chosen as its first mayor. Postmaster at Spirit Lake, 1882-5. Delegate to republican national convention in 1884. State senator 1888-1900. For three sessions president pro-tem and chairman of ranking committee. President capitol improvement commission by appointment of Governor Cummins. For six years vice-president of state board of education under two appointments by Governor Carroll. Resigned to accept present position upon resignation of Hon. Warren Garst, January 1, 1916, by appointment of Governor Clarke. Reappointed 1919 by Governor Harding and in 1925 by Governor Hammill.

OSCAR ANDERSON.—Director of the Budget, was born in LaSalle county, Illinois, January 22, 1872. In the same year his parents removed to a farm in Decatur county, Iowa, and he has resided in or near Lamoni ever since. He attended the rural schools and the Lamoni high school, graduated from Highland Park college of Des Moines, and taught school in Lamoni, Iowa, three years. Is president of the State Savings Bank of Lamoni, having been connected with it since its organization July 1, 1898, and also owns and operates a farm by hired help. Was elected state representative in 1924 and served in the forty-first general assembly. Was elected mayor of Lamoni in 1920 and served two years. Has been a member of the Lamoni school board twenty-seven consecutive years. Married Ella Belle Kelley June 28, 1906. They have three children, Oscar Kelley, age 21; Richard Carroll, age 18; and Margaret Belle, age 16. Is a member of the Reorganized Church of Latter Day Saints. Was appointed director of the budget February 19, 1929, to fill the unexpired term of the Hon. E. L. Hogue, deceased, terminating June 30, 1933. A republican in politics.

CHARLES WEBSTER.—Railroad Commissioner, was born on a farm in Waucoma, Iowa, and still resides on the old homestead entered by his father from the government in 1854. Married Dolly G. Potter of Lawler, Iowa. Three children were born to this union, Joe C., Neil A. and Bennet A. Webster. Was appointed first station agent and telegraph operator at Waucoma, formed a partnership with his brother Ace under the firm name of Webster Brothers who have since been extensive raisers and shippers of live stock, grain, and produce, as well as dealers in lumber. President of several retail lumber companies. Has been extensively interested in the building of telephone lines and exchanges. Has promoted and built gas and electric companies in Arizona. Delegate to the national republican convention in 1908. Member of the state council of defense during the war and federal fuel administrator. Was appointed railroad commissioner by Governor Harding November 5, 1917, and has been elected three full terms since that date.

FRED P. WOODRUFF.—Railroad Commissioner, was born at Knoxville, Iowa, September 21, 1876. Captain Woodruff was educated in the Knoxville public schools. In the Spanish-American war he served as first sergeant of Co. D, 51st Iowa infantry, in the Philippines. For meritorious service in action he was commissioned second lieutenant and brevetted a captain by Governor Shaw. On his return home he engaged in the retail clothing and shoe business and continued in that line until the spring of 1927. He is also engaged in the operation of a number of farms. During the world war Captain Woodruff was active in promoting various war work activities, was a member of the Marion county council of defense and war work council, and later was commissioned captain and

assigned to duty in the quartermaster department. He was married September 18, 1901, to Myrtle M. Elliott, and they have one son, Elliott. Was elected for full term in 1920 as railroad commissioner, was appointed by Governor Hammill to fill vacancy caused by the resignation of Hon. Dwight Lewis, July 1, 1927, and elected for short term in 1928. A republican in politics.

B. M. RICHARDSON.—Railroad Commissioner. Residence, Cedar Rapids. Born at Brighton, Iowa, February 19, 1896. Attended Washington county schools and academy at Pleasant Plain. Married September 22, 1917, to Idamae Sieg of Topeka, Kansas. Has one son, Donald. Has served in various capacities in the field of transportation and traffic. Was for eight years connected with the western weighing and inspection bureau. Has been a member of various committees of the national association of Railroad and Utility Commissioners of the United States. Is a fellow of the International Institute of Traffic. Served in the world war. Is a member of the American Legion, a Mason and Knight Templar. A republican in politics. Elected for full term as a member of the railroad commission November 4, 1924. Re-elected November 6, 1928, for the full term.

J. H. HENDERSON.—Commerce Counsel, born in 1848 in Warren county, Iowa, on the present site of the town of Ackworth, and has ever since resided in Warren county. Received his education in the public schools and in college at Indianola. Admitted to practice of law 1870. Secretary of the board of trustees of Simpson college from 1869 until 1919, during which time was and is now a member of the board of trustees of that institution. Delegate to the republican national convention in 1904. Elected as circuit judge to fill vacancy in 1885. Elected district judge of the fifth judicial district in 1886. Re-elected in 1890, and again in 1894. Resigned January 1, 1896. In 1901 formed a partnership with his son and continued the practice of law under the firm name of Henderson & Henderson until his appointment as commerce counsel July 1, 1911. Reappointed July 1, 1915, 1919 and 1923. Term ended July 1, 1927. Reappointed April 1, 1928, to fill vacancy, term ending July 1, 1931. Member of the state board of law examiners four years; member of the Methodist church. Belongs to the Odd Fellows, is a Mason, a Knight Templar and a member of the Consistory. Member of Grant club and Des Moines club.

GEORGE T. BAKER.—Member of State Board of Education, was born July 9, 1857, on a farm in Iowa county, Iowa. He was educated in the district schools of Iowa, Hall's school for boys, at Ellington, Conn., McClain's academy at Iowa City, and the Iowa State University. He remained one year at the state university and then completed four years of special work in civil engineering at Cornell university, Ithaca, class of 1879. During the years from 1879 to 1889 he was engaged in railway location, construction and maintenance work, after which he was chief engineer for the high bridges built across the Mississippi river at Muscatine and Clinton, and consulting engineer of the high bridge at Winona, Minn. From 1893 until January 1910, he was engaged in general construction work on railways, paving, sewerage, water works, and heavy building construction. Served as a member of the general assembly in the twenty-sixth regular and special session, was a member of the house of representatives from Scott county, was elected mayor of the city of Davenport in 1898 serving two years, and was delegate at large to the democratic national convention in 1900. A democrat in politics.

PAULINE LEWELLING DEVITT.—Member of State Board of Education, born April 10, 1877, in the girl's department of the Iowa State Reform school which her father and mother, Lorenzo D. and Angie Cook Lewelling had recently organized near Mt. Pleasant. In 1887, shortly after the death of Mrs. Lewelling, Mr. Lewelling, then president of the board of the state teachers college, moved his family to Kansas of which state he was elected governor in 1892. The daughter, Pauline, was graduated from the Wichita high school and from the state university of Kansas, then taught for four years in the high schools of that state. In 1901 she was united in marriage to James Arthur Devitt of Oskaloosa, Iowa, at that time county attorney for Mahaska county. To this union were born three children who have the distinction of being third generation Hawkeyes. Mrs. Devitt was president of the Iowa Equal Suffrage association in 1919 when a special session of the legislature ratified the federal suf-

frage amendment. During the war she was appointed by Governor Harding a member of the state council of defense and served also as sixth district chairman of the liberty loan committee. In 1920 she was delegate-at-large to the national republican convention. At the time of her appointment to the state board of education in 1921 she was a member of the local school board in Oskaloosa. In 1926-27 she served as vice-president of the state conference of social work and in 1927 was reappointed by Governor Hammill to the state board of education.

SILAS J. GALVIN.—Member of the State Board of Education, was born on a farm near Pleasantville, Marion county, August 7, 1878, the oldest of ten children born to James A. and Margaret Haynes Galvin. When six years of age moved with his parents to Calhoun county, Iowa, and after eleven years the family returned to Marion county. Attended the country schools, the high school at Churdan and Knoxville, completing the Knoxville high school course in 1897. Taught school and later attended the Northern Illinois normal school at Dixon, Illinois, and Highland Park college, Des Moines. Entered the employ of the Iowa Pipe and Tile Company, Des Moines. Married June 7, 1899, to Ethel Craig of Knoxville. Has two children, a daughter Ruth and son Richard. After working for the Iowa Pipe and Tile Company seven years began the operation of a brick and tile plant at Iowa Falls in 1906. In 1910 sold the business and accepted a position with the John Deere Plow Company, Moline, Illinois, resigning January 1, 1915, to become sales manager of the American Brick and Tile Company, Mason City, and since that date has been in this line of business, having been general manager and secretary of the Sheffield Brick and Tile Company since 1923. Residence, Hampton. Member of the Masonic order, Hampton Rotary club and Christian Science church. A democrat.

GEORGE W. GODFREY.—Member of State Board of Education, residence Algona, was born at Luverne, Iowa, in 1883. Graduated from Luverne high school in 1899, from Cornell college academy in 1905, and from Iowa State college in 1909. Received master's degree in agriculture from Iowa State college in 1921. Awarded master farmer medal by Wallaces' Farmer in 1927. Except for one year teaching at Iowa State college, 1919-20, and three winters in agricultural extension work, chief vocation has been farming.

ANNA B. LAWTHER.—Member of State Board of Education, born in Dubuque, Iowa, the daughter of William Lawther and Annie Elizabeth (Bell) Lawther. Her grandparents were among the earliest settlers of the state. Received early education in public schools of Dubuque and prepared for college at Miss Stevens' school, Germantown, Pa. Received her bachelor of arts degree from Bryn Mawr college in 1897. The year following her graduation she became assistant bursar of Bryn Mawr college. From 1904 to 1905 she was the warden of Merion Hall, Bryn Mawr college, and from 1907 to 1912 she was the secretary of Bryn Mawr college. After resigning her position at her alma mater Miss Lawther returned to Dubuque where she became interested in local activities. During the campaign for equal suffrage in the spring of 1916, Miss Lawther was the chairman of the Dubuque County Equal Suffrage league and in the autumn of the same year was elected president of the Iowa Equal Suffrage association and was twice re-elected to that position. She was a member of the state council of defense during the war. When presidential suffrage was granted to the women of Iowa by the thirty-eighth general assembly, Miss Lawther was made the democratic national committeewoman for Iowa. Was sent as a delegate to the democratic national convention at San Francisco in 1920, and to the democratic national convention in New York City in 1924. Miss Lawther was an alumnae director of Bryn Mawr college from 1923 to 1928.

EDWARD P. SCHOENTGEN.—Member of State Board of Education, was born August 16, 1873, in Council Bluffs. Attended local school until twelve years of age. Then attended an academy in Milwaukee, Wis., later entering the manual training school in Washington university, St. Louis. In 1891 he entered the Massachusetts Institute of Technology at Boston, taking the course in architecture, receiving the degree of S. B. in architecture in 1895. Then followed about three years' foreign study, two of which were spent in Paris, France, at the Ecole des Beaux arts as a pupil of Jean Louis Pascal, Member L'Institute, and architect of the national library. The

balance of the time was spent in the French provinces and Italy. Upon returning to this country, he was identified with architectural work in St. Louis and in 1899 opened an office in Council Bluffs, practicing in that city during the next ten years. He then relinquished the practice of his profession and became actively connected with the wholesale grocery firm of Groneweg & Schoentgen Company. He was married in 1901 to Miss Mable Pratt of Des Moines, daughter of M. M. Pratt. In 1902 appointed a member of the capitol commission by Governor A. B. Cummins. He rendered no other public service until appointed to the board of education by Governor Carroll. A democrat in politics.

CHARLES C. SHEAKLEY.—Member of the State Board of Education, was born in Greenville, Pa. March 29, 1869. Graduated from the Greenville high school, came to New Hampton, Iowa, in 1891, and has lived there constantly except for two years that he was editor of the Eldora Ledger at Eldora, Iowa. Mr. Sheakley has been the senior member of the Sheakley and Kennedy department store at New Hampton, Iowa, for the past thirty years, and is at present the president of that corporation. He is also president of the First National Bank of New Hampton. A republican in politics.

HENRY C. SHULL.—Member of State Board of Education, was born January 16, 1892, at Sioux City, Iowa, son of Deloss Carlton and Francis Edith Shull. Was educated in the Sioux City public schools and graduated from the Sioux City Central high school in June, 1910. Collegiate education University of Chicago, 1910 to 1914 (Ph.B. 1914). Legal education Harvard Law School and University of Chicago Law School (J.D.) 1916). Began the practice of law in Sioux City. In August, 1917, enlisted in the service of the navy and was discharged February, 1919, retiring as an ensign, U. S. N. R. F. Returned to Sioux City and entered the law firm of Shull, Stilwill, Shull and Wadden, of which he is now a member. Was married in August, 1921, to Alice Lincoln, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. S. A. Lincoln Alton, Iowa. A member of Monahan Post No. 64 of the American Legion, the Masonic fraternity, and the First Baptist church. A republican. A member of the Iowa State Bar Association and the American Bar Association.

WILLARD C. STUCKSLAGER.—Member of the State Board of Education, born in the town of Lisbon, Linn county, Iowa, October 24, 1869. Graduated from the high school at Lisbon in 1886. Entered Cornell college at Mount Vernon, Iowa, and in 1893 Chicago university. In 1894 engaged in the banking business at Lisbon, Iowa, entering the Stuckslager-Auracher bank, founded by his father in 1874. At present president of the bank and also of the Mount Vernon bank. Is interested in educational matters and has been a member of the board of trustees of Cornell college for the past twenty-two years, fourteen years of which time he has been a member of the executive committee. Elected representative in 1899 and served during the twenty-eighth and twenty-ninth general assemblies. In 1903 he was elected to the senate and served during the thirtieth, thirty-first, thirty-second, thirty-second extra, thirty-third and thirty-fourth general assemblies. A republican in politics.

WILLIAM R. BOYD.—Chairman of the finance committee of the Board of Education, is a native of Iowa, having been born in Lisbon, Linn county, May 19, 1864. His boyhood was spent in Tipton, Iowa, where he attended the public schools. He was graduated from the college of liberal arts of the state university in June, 1889, having earned his way by teaching school and clerking in a store. He was principal of the school at Mechanicsville, Iowa, two years. He was editor of the Tipton Advertiser two years, editor and associate editor of the Cedar Rapids Republican sixteen years. Mr. Boyd served as postmaster of Cedar Rapids from 1899 to 1909, resigning this office to accept his present position. He has long been interested in educational matters, and was for several years a member of the board of trustees of Coe college, and for a time lecturer on political economy in that institution. Mr. Boyd is a director of the American Trust and Savings bank, and president of the Perpetual Savings and Loan association, both located in Cedar Rapids. A republican in politics.

JACKSON W. BOWDISH.—Member of the finance committee of the Iowa State Board of Education, was born in Merwinsville, Litchfield county, Connecticut, on the

border line between New York and Connecticut. His parents and all the other members of the family except himself were natives of New York state. When he was a child his parents moved from Dutchess county, New York, to Linn county, Iowa, and located on a farm in Maine township. He resided on the farm until after he was of age, having completed his education at Cornell college, Mount Vernon, Iowa. He left the farm to enter the banking business, which he pursued the greater part of his life. In 1880 he was engaged in the banking business in Canisteo, New York, where he married Charlotte Allison. On his return to Iowa in 1886, he was elected clerk of the district court of Linn county, after which he followed the grocery business for a short time. In 1892 he assisted in the organization of the Bohemian American State Bank, and the Iowa Savings Bank of Cedar Rapids, Iowa, which, by merger, became the present American Trust and Savings Bank. In politics he is a democrat.

W. H. GEMMILL.—Secretary of the State Board of Education, was born in Ontario, Canada, March 14, 1871. In September of that year his parents moved to Keokuk county, Iowa, and settled on a farm near South English. He attended the rural schools and graduated from the South English high school in 1889. He entered the Iowa State college at Ames and graduated in November, 1894, with the degree of bachelor of science. During these years, he taught several terms in country schools. He has taken about two years of advanced study in education, history and economics in Highland Park college, Drake university and Des Moines college. He was principal of schools at Gibson, Iowa, two and one-half years; county superintendent of Keokuk county four years; superintendent of schools at Dallas Center 1901 to 1911, and superintendent of the Carroll schools 1914 to 1917 and resigned to become secretary of the board of education. He was married in 1895 to Birdie D. Richards. They have four children, Agnes, John, Helen and Iva.

ANTHONY M. McCOLL.—Member of the Board of Control of state institutions, was born in Caledonia, Livingston county, N. Y., May 19, 1858. He moved with his parents to Iowa in 1876. For many years he was engaged in farming and the lumber and grain business at Woodward, Iowa, and for three terms was clerk of the district court of Dallas county. Was elected state senator from the seventeenth district in 1910 and re-elected in 1912. Appointed a member of the board of control by Governor Clarke to succeed Gifford S. Robinson, whose term expired June 20, 1913. Appointed by Governor Harding for a term of six years ending June 30, 1925, and reappointed by Governor Hammill for full term ending June 30, 1931. A republican in politics.

CHESTER M. ROBERTS.—Member of Board of Control, democrat, residence, Independence. Born in Fayette county, Iowa, December 28, 1866. Moved with parents into Buchanan county when one year old. Attended public school at Fairbank, Iowa. Married to Myrtle M. Higbee. Has two married daughters and one son, a law student in the University of Iowa. Has served as deputy clerk of district court, city collector, treasurer of Buchanan county and for many years cashier of Peoples National Bank, Independence. Appointed to board of control May 11, 1928, to fill unexpired term of G. Norman Clark, deceased. Member of Presbyterian church and all Masonic orders.

OLIN H. MICHAEL.—Member of the Board of Control of state institutions, was born in Ansley, Nebraska, May 13, 1889, the son of H. W. and Elinor Michael. Moved to Wapello county with his parents when he was nine months of age where he has since resided. Educated in the Wapello county public schools, the Ottumwa high school and the Ottumwa Commercial college. Married Alice Spry, 1910. Resided on a farm until twenty-three years of age and since that time engaged in the cigar business in Ottumwa. Chairman, Wapello county republican central committee, 1922-1926. Selected as member Iowa republican state central committee from the sixth district in 1928.

HIRAM KINSMAN EVANS.—Member of Board of Parole, son of Capt. Hiram and Sarah Jane (Robison) Evans, was born on section 9, Walnut township, Wayne county, Iowa, March 17, 1863, and has lived in the same county continuously for more than sixty years. Attended the country schools, Seymour Academy, Seymour

high school, and the Allerton high school, graduating from the latter in its first graduating class in 1883, and from the State University of Iowa, class of 1886, with the degree of LL.B. Admitted to practice law before the state and federal courts, 1886. Served as county attorney, 1891-1895; house of representatives, twenty-sixth general assembly of Iowa, 1896-97; board of regents, State University of Iowa, 1897-1904; elected judge of the district court of the third judicial district, 1904, and re-elected five times, serving eighteen and one-half years and until he resigned on his election to the sixty-eighth congress at a special election held June 4, 1923, to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Hon. H. M. Towner on his appointment as governor of Porto Rico. Married to Harriett Belvel, January 1, 1891. Mrs. Evans is also an attorney, having been admitted to practice before the supreme court of Iowa and the United States supreme court. They have two daughters, Portia, married to Judge James D. Cooney of West Union, Iowa, and Genevieve, married to Vincent Starzinger of Des Moines, Iowa. Declined to be a candidate for nomination or election to the sixty-ninth congress. Engaged in the general practice of law at Corydon. Was appointed a member of board of parole by Governor John Hammill for the term commencing July 1, 1927. A republican.

JOHN S. CROOKS.—Member of the Board of Parole. Was born in Boone, Iowa, and has since been a continuous resident of his birth city. Second son of Hon. George W. Crooks, one of the early attorneys of Boone county and a member of the seven-teenth general assembly. Both parents were among the earliest pioneers in this section of Iowa. After finishing school he engaged in the abstract and loan business for fifteen years. Secretary of the Boone chamber of commerce four years. As the democratic party nominee, was elected and served as the mayor of Boone for four years. Now engaged in the real estate and insurance business. Married to Luella M. Parks. Have two children—George W. and Mildred.

GEO. M. SIMPSON.—Member of the Board of Parole, was born at McAlester, Okla., September 25, 1879. Came with his parents to a farm in Fayette county, Iowa, in March 1888. Was educated in the schools at Arlington, and Upper Iowa University at Fayette, Iowa. Was in grain and live stock business at Arlington, Iowa, for a period of ten years and was county recorder of Fayette county, Iowa, fourteen years. Is affiliated with the Masonic orders. Republican in politics. Was appointed by Gov. Hammill to state board of parole for a term of six years ending June 30, 1931. Married Linnie Simpson, and has two daughters, Janet and Jean.

RAY YENTER.—Commissioner of Insurance, was born on a farm near Oxford in Johnson county, Iowa, August 17, 1887. Is a lawyer by profession, having practiced at Iowa City, Iowa. He was representative from Johnson county during the thirty-ninth, fortieth, fortieth extra, and forty-first general assemblies of the state of Iowa. He served as captain of cavalry in the Iowa National Guard prior to and during the Mexican border trouble in 1916 and 1917, and served during the world war as captain field artillery in the United States army. He assumed his duties as commissioner of insurance March 1, 1926.

JOHN WILLIAM STROHM.—State Fire Marshal, was born in Clinton county, Iowa, July 16, 1887. He received his education in the Lyons public schools, and commenced his political career in 1914, when he was elected county recorder. Serving in that office two terms, until 1918, he was elected county auditor, and at the time of his appointment to the office of fire marshal was serving his fifth consecutive term as auditor. Is married. Affiliated with the Independent Order of Odd Fellows, the Ancient Free and Accepted Masons, and of the DeMolay Consistory No. 1, A. A. S. R., and of the Order of the Mystic Shrine.

ROBERT HENDERSON.—Superintendent of Printing and ex-officio secretary of the state printing board, was born at Burlington, Iowa, in 1874, and has lived all his life in Iowa. Is married and has three children, a daughter born in 1907, a son born in 1910, and a daughter born in 1914.

EDGAR RUBEY HARLAN.—Curator, son of Samuel A. and Marinda E. (Rubey) Harlan; born of Kentucky Quaker ancestry at Spartansburg, Ind., February 28, 1869; brought to a farm in Cedar township, Van Buren county, Iowa, in 1873; at-

tended "Morris" district and Keosauqua high school, graduating 1889, and Drake university, completing the law course with degree of LL.B., A.M.; admitted to the bar June, 1896; practiced law at Keosauqua ten years, serving as county attorney 1898-1902; admitted to United States Supreme Court, 1922; appointed by Charles Aldrich assistant curator of the historical department of Iowa, 1907; acting curator after death of Mr. Aldrich, March, 1908, until appointed curator by Governor Carroll, October 1, 1909; elected curator by board of trustees, June, 1913; honorary member Iowa chapter, American Institute of Architects; honorary member National Sculpture society; member American Historical association; a founder and member of board of directors, Mississippi Valley Historical association; member and secretary Iowa Flag commission; member and secretary Allison Memorial commission; member Iowa Board of Conservation, Plant Life commission; member and director Des Moines Fine Arts association; member American Civic association and delegate to Germany, France and England, tour 1913.

L. A. ANDREW.—Superintendent of Banking, was born in Ashland, Wisconsin, November 29, 1876. He has been in the banking business twenty-five years and is president of the Citizens Savings Bank of Ottumwa. He was married June 8, 1904, to Hazel Summerwill at Newton, Iowa. They have one son, born January 23, 1908. Mr. Andrew was president of the Iowa Bankers Association in 1920 and 1921, and served three years on the executive committee of the American Bankers Association. He is now a member of the executive committee of the state bank section of the American Bankers association.

W. C. MERCKENS.—Secretary of the State Executive Council. Born at Lockridge, Jefferson county, Iowa, October 18, 1882. Education—high school and business course. Enlisted in World War as private, December 2, 1917, and discharged June 19, 1919, as lieutenant. Overseas 15 months. Married. Republican in politics.

W. H. BAILEY.—Adjutant General, born in Benton, Wisconsin, July 21, 1880. Moved to Iowa with parents in 1893, attended the public schools in Sheldon, graduating in 1898. Enlisted in Co. E 2d Iowa Inf. June 16, 1902, promoted 1st lieutenant in May 1903, captain August 1906, major October 1909, lieutenant colonel September 1912. Served on the Mexican border as lieutenant colonel of the second Iowa Inf. for nine months. Reported with the second Iowa Inf. at Camp Cody in 1917 later being assigned to command the 109th Am. Tn. Served overseas six months returning to the United States May 3, 1919. Appointed lieutenant colonel 133d inf., Iowa National Guard May 20, 1921, promoted colonel September 5, 1924. Appointed adjutant general with the rank of Brig. general July 7, 1927. Married and has three children, belongs to the Shrine, Consistory, The American Legion, and the Service Club of Des Moines, Iowa. Home, Sheldon, Iowa.

W. W. HAIRE.—Pharmacy Examiner, was born at Fort Dodge, October 27, 1869. Attended public schools. Started as clerk in drug store July 4, 1887. Attended Iowa state university college of pharmacy 1890-91. Member of executive committee of Iowa State Pharmaceutical association, director in Druggists' Mutual Insurance association of Iowa, acting postmaster at Fort Dodge from October, 1918, to May, 1920. Appointed commissioner of pharmacy by Governor Harding April 24, 1920, and reappointed by Governors Kendall and Hammill.

GEORGE JUDISCH.—Pharmacy Examiner, was born near Muscatine, Iowa, in 1869. He attended the public schools of Muscatine and began his apprenticeship in 1884. He has served for more than twenty years as instructor of pharmacy and materia medica in the veterinary division of Iowa State college. Member of the pharmacopoeial convention, 1910 and 1920. Received honorary degree of doctor of pharmacy, Highland Park college of pharmacy, June, 1919. President Iowa Pharmaceutical association, 1921 and 1922. Appointed pharmacy commissioner by Governor Kendall, April 22, 1922. Reappointed by Governor Hammill July, 1925, and again on the 2d of March, 1928.

J. W. SLOCUM.—Pharmacy Examiner, born in Adair county, Iowa, August 23, 1874. Attended high school at Fontanelle. Graduated from a four-year collegiate course and also a business course at Simpson college, Indianola, in June 1898. Resi-

dence, Indianola. Has been in the drug business about thirty years. Served as mayor of Indianola four terms. Appointed April 23, 1923, as pharmacy commissioner by Governor N. E. Kendall to succeed F. E. Farr, resigned. Reappointed by Governor Kendall in April, 1924 and May 23, 1927. Elected secretary of the Iowa Pharmaceutical association in July, 1924.

HENRY ALBERT, M. D.—Commissioner of Health, was born at Walcott (Scott county), Iowa, October 11, 1878. Moved with his parents to Grundy county when three years of age. Graduated from the Reinbeck (Iowa) high school in 1896, and from the University of Iowa with the degree of B.S. in 1900, and the degrees of M.S. and M.D. in 1902. Spent two years in Europe, chiefly in Vienna, studying pathology, bacteriology and public health. Was professor of pathology and bacteriology at the University of Iowa, college of medicine, from 1905 to 1920, and director of the laboratories for the Iowa State Board of Health from their establishment in 1906 to 1922. He was director of the Nevada state hygienic laboratory at Reno, Nevada, four years, or until September 1, 1926, when he was appointed commissioner of health by Governor Hammill. He was married to Edith Whiteis in 1905.

CASSIUS T. LESAN, M. D.—Member of the Iowa State Board of Health was born in Ringgold county, Iowa, April 2, 1874. His parents, American born, were pioneers, having built the first house in Mount Ayr township. Married July 9, 1902, to Miss Sue M. Neely of Mount Ayr, Iowa. Taught in the public schools, served as health officer and coroner, and member of the draft board in the community in which he resides. He served as commanding officer Engineers' Infirmary, Camp Shelby, Hattiesburg, Miss., during the World War. Member of United Presbyterian church and American Legion. He was secretary of Iowa Association of Health officers ten years and president one year during the existence of that association. Republican in politics.

HERBERT WILLIAM PLUMMER, M. D.—Member of the Iowa State Board of Health, was born July 30, 1877, on a farm near Chester, Iowa. He attended public schools, Iowa State Teachers college, Cedar Falls, and Minnesota State Normal, Mankato. Later attended Keokuk Medical college, College of Physicians and Surgeons, Keokuk, Iowa, from which he was graduated in 1905. He began the practice of medicine at Spring Valley, Minn., later moving to Lime Springs where he has practiced for the past twenty-three years. He served about twenty months with the rank of captain during the World War, nine months of which was spent overseas. He was an instructor in sanitary inspection at Fort Riley and Camp Funston. He was married to Anna Postle in 1900 and has two children, George L. and Marguerite. Member of several Masonic bodies. A republican.

WILLIAM A. SEIDLER, M. D.—Member of the Iowa State Board of Health, born at Minburn, Iowa, in 1878. He graduated from the Minburn high school and received his pre-medical education at Drake University. Graduated from the St. Louis College of Physicians and Surgeons in 1902. Is a graduate from post graduate schools in New York and Chicago and has taken post graduate work at the University of Berlin. Is a member of the county and state medical societies, a fellow of the American Medical Association and a member of the Anglo-American Medical Society of Berlin. Is married and has two children, and is a member of the Shrine. Residence, Jamaica.

HERBERT R. SUGG, M. D.—Member of the Iowa State Board of Health, was born July 20, 1874, at Preston, Iowa, of American parentage. For generations back his father and grandfather were physicians. With his parents he moved to Sabula, Iowa, in 1880 and to Clinton in 1892, where he has since resided. Graduated from the Sabula high school in 1892 and the following year from the Clinton high school. Completed his medical education at Rush medical college in 1896 at the age of twenty-one, and for the following year was house surgeon at the Chicago Policlinic Hospital, Chicago. Has been in active practice in Clinton since 1898. Was married in 1901 to Florence Olney of Clinton. They have one son. Is a member of the

staff of Jane Lamb Memorial Hospital and is past president of the staff and of the county medical society. President of the Wapsipinicon club, member of the Clinton Country club, Rotary, De Molay Consistory and other civic organizations. Was instrumental in organizing the Red Cross chapter during the war, and has served continuously on the executive board. From 1907 to 1915 was a surgeon in the Iowa national guard. Elected health officer of Clinton in 1912 and has been re-elected every two years excepting for the period of 1920-1922 while the farmer-labor party was in control. Appointed a member of the Iowa State Board of Health in November, 1924; reappointed by Governor Hammill in 1927. He is a republican.

SMITH WILDMAN BROOKHART.—Progressive Republican, of Washington, Iowa; born in log cabin on a farm in Scotland county, Mo., February 2, 1869; educated in country schools and high school of Iowa, and Southern Iowa Normal; studied law in offices at Bloomfield and Keosauqua, Iowa; admitted to bar of Iowa in supreme court, 1892; farmer, teacher, lawyer, and soldier; married Jennie Hearn, June 22, 1897; six children: Charles E., John R., Smith W., Florence H., Edith A., and Joseph W. Served in Iowa National Guard from 1894 until World War, except about five years; Spanish-American War, second lieutenant, fiftieth regiment, Iowa Volunteer Infantry; Mexican border, major, First Iowa Brigade; World War, major and lieutenant colonel of Infantry; chief instructor in marksmanship in Camp Perry and Camp Benning schools; captain American Palma Rifle Team, 1912, winning world championship; elected four terms as president of the National Rifle association of America; served as county attorney of Washington county, Iowa, three terms; chairman of republican state convention in 1912; elected to United States senate to fill unexpired term of Hon. William S. Kenyon, resigned; elected November 4, 1924, for term of six years, beginning March 4, 1925, having received certificate of election certified by the executive council of the state of Iowa, which showed his election; but notwithstanding, the senate of the United States disregarded the Iowa election laws and seated his democratic opponent on April 12, 1926, after a prolonged contest; he immediately entered the republican primary as opponent of Senator A. B. Cummins and defeated him for the republican nomination on June 7, 1926, by 71,527 votes; re-elected November 2, 1926, for term beginning March 4, 1927, receiving 323,409 votes, democratic candidate receiving 247,869; term expires March 3, 1933.

DANIEL FREDERIC STECK.—Democrat, of Ottumwa, Iowa; born Ottumwa, Iowa, December 16, 1881; LL.B. University of Iowa, 1906; lawyer; World War, July 1, 1917, to May 30, 1919, United States and France; married June 30, 1908, to Lucile Oehler; elected to the senate November 4, 1924, and seated after a contest with Smith W. Brookhart.

WILLIAM F. KOPP.—First district, republican, of Mount Pleasant, was born June 20, 1869, on a farm near Dodgeville, Des Moines county, Iowa; graduated from Iowa Wesleyan college, Mount Pleasant, Iowa, in June, 1892, and from the law department of the State University of Iowa in June, 1894; was married December 4, 1894, to Miss Clara Bird; served as county attorney of Henry county, Iowa, from 1895 to 1899; was postmaster at Mount Pleasant from 1906 to 1914; represented Henry county in the Iowa legislature in the thirty-sixth general assembly; was elected to the sixty-seventh and re-elected to the sixty-eighth, sixty-ninth, seventieth, and seventy-first congresses.

F. DICKINSON LETTS.—Second district, republican, of Davenport, Scott county, Iowa; born in Washington county, Iowa, April 26, 1875, son of David Grove Letts and Hannah Dickinson Letts; graduated from Parsons college, B.S., 1897, and LL.D. conferred in 1927; attended law schools of Columbia University and University of Iowa; graduate of State University of Iowa, LL.B., 1899; admitted to Iowa bar, 1899; located at Davenport, Iowa, in same year; married Josephine Nell Haney,

of Muscatine, July 20, 1916; appointed judge of seventh judicial district of Iowa, March, 1911, and served in capacity of district judge with exception of two years until his resignation on February 28, 1925; elected to the sixty-ninth congress at general election in 1924, receiving 49,117 votes to 32,839 for Ralph U. Thompson, of Muscatine county, Iowa, his Democratic opponent, and 331 votes for Rev. Lester Myers, Iowa county, Iowa, an independent candidate; re-elected to the seventieth congress at the general election in 1926, receiving 29,091 votes, to 19,546 votes for J. P. Gallagher, of Iowa county, the democratic candidate, and 458 votes for Ella Bushnell-Hamlin, of Scott county, the independent candidate; re-elected to seventy-first congress at the general election in 1928, receiving 49,635 votes, to 37,120 votes received by Frank C. Titzell, of Johnson county, the democratic candidate.

THOMAS J. B. ROBINSON.—Third district, republican, of Hampton, was born in Lafayette county, Wis., on August 12, 1868; moved with his parents to Hampton, Iowa, in the spring of 1870, where he has since resided; following his graduation from the Hampton high school he entered business, principally banking and farming; married to Miss Belle Clinton, and they have five children—three girls and two boys; member of Iowa state senate, 1912-1916; elected to the sixty-eighth congress; re-elected to the sixty-ninth, seventieth, and seventy-first congresses by large majorities.

GILBERT N. HAUGEN.—Fourth district, republican, of Northwood, Worth county, was born April 21, 1859, in Rock county, Wis.; since the age of fourteen and prior to his election to congress he was engaged in various enterprises, principally real estate and banking; was treasurer of Worth county, Iowa, six years; was elected to the Iowa legislature, serving in the twenty-fifth and twenty-sixth general assemblies; was elected to the fifty-sixth, fifty-seventh, fifty-eighth, fifty-ninth, sixtieth, sixty-first, sixty-second, sixty-third, sixty-fourth, sixty-fifth, sixty-sixth, sixty-seventh, sixty-eighth, sixty-ninth, and seventieth congresses, and re-elected to the seventy-first congress.

CYRENUS COLE.—Fifth district, republican, of Cedar Rapids; born in Iowa; graduated from Central College, Iowa, 1887; newspaper editor and publisher; *Des Moines Register*, 1888 to 1898; *Cedar Rapids Republican and Times*, 1898 to 1921; author, political and historical; elected to sixty-seventh congress, July 19, 1921, in a special election to fill vacancy, and re-elected to each successive congress since.

C. WILLIAM RAMSEYER.—Sixth district, republican, of Bloomfield, was born on a farm near Collinsville, Butler county, Ohio, March 13, 1875. His parents emigrated from Switzerland in 1874; moved to McLean county, Ill., in 1877, where his father died in 1881; since 1887 Davis county, Iowa, has been his residence; was married to Miss Ruby Phillips June 2, 1915, and they have two children—Jane and Barbara. He is a graduate of the Southern Iowa Normal, Iowa State Teachers' College, and the college of law of the State University of Iowa; taught school six years and practiced law in Bloomfield nine years; was elected county attorney of Davis county in 1910 and re-elected in 1912; was elected to the sixty-fourth, sixty-fifth, sixty-sixth, sixty-seventh, sixty-eighth, sixty-ninth, and seventieth congresses, and re-elected to the seventy-first congress.

CASSIUS C. DOWELL.—Seventh district, republican, of Des Moines, was born in Warren county, Iowa; graduated from Drake University in the liberal arts and law departments; lawyer by profession; represented Polk county in the senate of the state for a number of years; was elected to the sixty-fourth, sixty-fifth, sixty-sixth, sixty-seventh, sixty-eighth, sixty-ninth, and seventieth congresses.

LOYD THURSTON.—Eighth district, republican, of Osceola, born in Clarke county, Iowa, March 27, 1880; served in Spanish-American, Philippine, and World Wars; married; graduate of State University of Iowa, 1902; county attorney Clarke county four years; state senator four years; elected to sixty-ninth, seventieth, and seventy-first congresses.

EARL W. VINCENT.—Ninth district, republican, of Guthrie Center, Iowa, was born at Keota, Iowa, March 27, 1886; graduated from Keota high school in 1904 and from Monmouth College, 1909; M.A. degree, Monmouth College, 1913; grad-

uated from law department of State University of Iowa, 1912; admitted to the practice of law in Iowa in 1912 and shortly after began the practice of law at Guthrie Center, Iowa; county attorney of Guthrie county, Iowa, from 1919 to 1922, inclusive; elected as representative of Guthrie county to the state legislature of Iowa in 1922 and re-elected in 1924; at a special election held June 4, 1928, was elected to the seventieth congress from the ninth district of Iowa to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Hon. William R. Green; received 22,360 votes over W. J. Burke, democrat, who received 8,060 votes; married Madge Lee, June 8, 1916; has one child, Marjorie Lee Vincent, born December 22, 1919.

CHARLES E. SWANSON.—Ninth district, republican, of Council Bluffs, was born on a farm near Galesburg, Illinois, January 3, 1879; came to Ringgold county, Iowa, with his parents in 1890; received his early education in public schools at Clearfield, Iowa; graduated from Knox College in 1902 with A.B. degree; graduated from Northwestern University school of law in 1907 with degree of LL.B.; admitted to bar in 1907 and located in same year at Council Bluffs which has since been his home; was married June 29th, 1910 to Ione Westcott of Hopkinton, Iowa, and they have one son, Charles E., Jr.; was elected county attorney of Pottawattamie county, Iowa, in 1914, and served in that capacity until 1923. On November 6th, 1928, was elected to the seventy-first congress.

L. J. DICKINSON.—Tenth district, republican, of Algona, Iowa, was born in Lucas county, Iowa, October 29, 1873; descendant of Nathaniel Dickinson, of Hadley, who settled in Massachusetts in 1630; graduate Cornell College, Iowa, B.S., 1898, State University of Iowa, LL.B., 1899; admitted Iowa bar 1899; located in Algona, Iowa, 1899; married, August 21, 1901, to Miss Myrtle Call; two children, L. Call and Ruth A.; served as county attorney Kossuth county two terms; committeeman tenth Iowa district on republican state central committee 1914-1918; elected to the sixty-sixth, sixty-seventh, sixty-eighth, sixty-ninth, and seventieth congresses, and re-elected to the seventy-first congress. A lifelong republican.

ED. H. CAMPBELL.—Eleventh district, republican of Battle Creek, Iowa, born on a farm near Battle Creek, March 6, 1882; attended rural school until fourteen years of age, graduated from Battle Creek high school in 1900; from the University of Iowa, law department, in 1916; served as mayor of Battle Creek three terms; member of Iowa house of representatives in thirty-fourth general assembly; member of Iowa state senate from 1921 to 1929 inclusive; elected to congress from eleventh Iowa district in 1928. Married Esta Fein in Los Angeles, Calif., October 25, 1913. Son, Romeo Campbell, born August 31, 1915. Member of law firm of Campbell and Campbell, Battle Creek, being associated with his twin brother, Jed H. Campbell.

C. E. ANDERSON.—Senator from the twenty-seventh district consisting of Webster and Calhoun counties, was born on a farm near Stratford, Iowa, June 24, 1886. His parents, C. G. and Clara Anderson, were among the early settlers of the Stratford community. Received his early education in the rural schools and the Stratford high school. At the age of twenty-seven he was appointed city marshal and street commissioner of Stratford. Has served as constable, president of the school board, republican township committeeman and township trustee. Was married to Anna Ahlstrom, August 26, 1913. They have one child, Frank G. Is a member of the Methodist church and the Modern Woodmen of America. Was elected state representative from Webster county in 1922, re-elected in 1924. Elected state senator in 1928. A republican in politics.

WILLIAM S. BAIRD.—Senator from the nineteenth district, composed of Pottawattamie county, was born in Council Bluffs, June 3, 1863. Parents native of Pennsylvania. Father, Rev. Samuel Baird, Methodist preacher. Mother, Matilda Hanks (Akers) Baird. Married Anne E. Wood, now deceased, of Logan, Iowa, January 9, 1895, daughter of John W. and Eliza A. Wood. Children, John W., William S., Jr. (deceased), Lucy W. (deceased), Robert M., Donald P., and Margaret (deceased). Graduated from high school, Council Bluffs, 1880. Graduated from Cornell college,

Mt. Vernon, Iowa, 1884. Admitted to practice law, 1887. Trustee free public library, Council Bluffs. Member of Masonic order and Knights of Pythias. Elected senator, 1920, re-elected 1924 and 1928. A republican in politics.

FRANK M. BEATTY.—Senator from the twelfth district composed of Keokuk and Poweshiek counties, is a lawyer by profession and is engaged in practicing law at Sigourney, Iowa. He is a graduate of Iowa Wesleyan college and of the Northwestern University law school. A republican in politics.

OLIVER P. BENNETT.—Senator from the thirty-fourth district comprising Crawford, Harrison and Monona counties, was born at Elgin, Illinois, October 10, 1892. His father, James L. Bennett, homesteaded in Buena Vista county, Iowa, removed to Illinois for three years returning to Monona county in 1895. Lived on a farm in Monona county until 1911. Graduated Mapleton high school 1911, liberal arts Amherst College, Amherst, Mass., 1911-1912, attended State University of Iowa, 1912-1913. Graduated college of law, Drake University, 1915. Admitted to the bar of Iowa June, 1915. Veteran World War. Eleventh district adjutant American Legion 1922-1923, eleventh district commander American Legion 1924. County attorney, Monona county, two terms, 1925 to 1929. Engaged in farming and stock raising in Monona county. Married Helen Kirk of Des Moines, daughter of Professor Sherman Kirk of Drake University. Has a daughter, Dorothy, and three sons, James Louis, Kirk and Oliver, Jr. Member Field Artillery Officers Reserve Corps. Phi Alpha Delta legal fraternity, Phi Gamma Delta, Masonic lodge. Has practiced law at Mapleton since 1919. Elected to the senate in 1928. A republican in politics.

C. A. BENSON.—Senator from the thirty-sixth senatorial district, Clayton county, was born on a farm in that county, where he is now engaged in general farming, cattle feeding, and breeding of pure bred Shorthorn cattle, in partnership with father and two brothers under firm name of August Benson and Sons. Received his early education in the country grade school, and took a course in banking at the Capital City Commercial College, Des Moines, Iowa. He graduated in agriculture in 1914 at Iowa State College, Ames, Iowa. Served as deputy clerk of the district court, as secretary and manager of the Elkader Fair Association, as secretary and manager of the Highland Telephone Company, as president of the Clayton County Shorthorn Breeders Association, and as secretary of the Clayton county farm bureau from the time of its organization until he resigned to run for the office of senator, to which office he was elected in 1924. He is a member of the Lutheran church, a Master Mason, and a republican.

A. H. BERGMAN.—Senator from the twenty-ninth district, composed of Jasper county, was born March 12, 1872, on a farm eight miles north of Newton, Iowa, and lived on the farm for twenty years, graduating from the rural school. After leaving the farm he attended Capital City Commercial College at Des Moines, Iowa, and graduated in the year 1890. He then engaged in the implement business in Newton, Iowa, and in 1893 in the manufacturing business—manufacturing what was known as the Parsons band cutter and self-feeder. FRANK BISSELL.—Senator from the seventeenth district, composed of Dallas, Guthrie and Audubon counties, was born January 12, 1878, on a farm in Cass county. As a young man he worked by the month and engaged in farming, until the spring of 1905. In June, 1905, he moved to Dexter, Dallas county, and there engaged in the real estate business until 1920. At the present time he operates a number of farms, and is interested in the Ford garage business. He was elected to the office of senator in 1928; is a member of the Masonic order, and a republican in politics.

AARON VALE BLACKFORD.—Senator from the second district representing Jefferson and Van Buren counties, was born on a farm near Hillsboro, Iowa, December 18, 1871. He is a descendant of Martin Blackford, who came to this country in 1751, and settled in York county, Pennsylvania. His parents, John W. and Nancy Altland Blackford, came to Iowa in 1858, and settled on a farm near Hillsboro. His father was a member of the thirty-fifth general assembly, representing Henry coun-

ty. Senator Blackford secured his early education in the rural schools of Van Buren county, then attended Iowa Wesleyan academy. In 1897 he was graduated from Iowa Wesleyan college at Mt. Pleasant, Iowa, with an A.B. degree. During his college course he was on the college debating team; he was also a member of the Beta Theta Pi fraternity, and was chapter delegate to the national convention during his Junior year. After leaving college, he taught school two years, then entered the hardware, implement and automobile business with his brother in Bonaparte, and he is still engaged in the same business. He is also engaged in farming, and is vice-president of the Bonaparte State Bank. For twenty years he has served on the Bonaparte school board. Member of the Methodist church, a thirty-second degree Mason, a Knight Templar, a member of the Mystic Shrine and the order of the Eastern Star. Republican in politics. Served as representative from Van Buren county in the forty-first and forty-second general assemblies. Elected senator from the second district in 1928. In 1871 the family moved from California to a farm two miles east of Harlan, Shelby county, Iowa, where they lived until 1881, at which time they moved to Harlan. He graduated from the Harlan high school in 1888, and afterward finished one year's work at the Iowa State college at Ames. Following this he assisted his father in the farm machinery business in Harlan, and when of age was made partner in the business. He still holds a substantial interest in the business, which is continued under the name of the Booth Motor Company. Although living in Harlan he operates four hundred acres of land which is well stocked. Has served as township clerk of Harlan township, and city councilman of Harlan, and ten years in the Harlan volunteer fire department, two years of which he was chief. Has been president of the Harlan Commercial club, the Kiwanis club, and the Masonic Temple Association. Has served as presiding officer of all the Masonic bodies up to and including the Commandery. Was director in the Shelby County Farmers Mutual Telephone Company fifteen years. County chairman of three successful war drives. Served in the Iowa senate during the forty-second, forty-second extra and forty-third general assemblies. Married October 31, 1895, to Edith Pickard of Harlan, and they now have one daughter, Estella May, who is attending high school. The family holds membership in the Congregational church. BROOKINS.—Senator from the forty-fourth district, composed of Floyd and Chickasaw counties, was born December 16, 1883, at Ionia, Chickasaw county, Iowa; graduated from the high school at Charles City in 1902; taught in rural and high schools; engaged in farming and stock raising in Chickasaw county; was married to Ruth Dodge of Orchard, Iowa, July 24, 1907; left the farm to accept position in First Savings Bank at Ionia, Iowa; a member of St. Charles Lodge 141 A. F. & A. M.; Almond Chapter 53 R. A. M.; Joppa Commandery 55 K. T.; A. A. O. N. M. S. of Cedar Rapids, Iowa. A republican in politics.

S. A. BRUSH.—Senator from the Tama-Benton senatorial district, was born in Winneshiek county, March 19, 1873. In the fall of 1874 the family moved to a farm a few miles south of Chelsea and in 1877 to a farm in southern Richland township, Tama county. He received his education in the district school and graduated from the Chelsea high school. After graduating from high school he taught six terms of school and later spent a year studying law at the State University at Iowa City. He was married to Catherine Wilkinson, August 8, 1900, and has a family of five children, Mrs. Harold B. Cobet, Cecil W., Merle, Amber and Burnell. The family home was on a farm near Chelsea until 1914 when Senator Brush sold the farm and moved to Chelsea. He has since been engaged in the coal, grain and feed business. Is also operating a farm near Chelsea purchased in 1919. Member of the Masonic fraternity and past master of Zenith Lodge No. 581. Member of the Methodist church, serving the official board of his home church. Has

been a member of the school boards in the districts in which he has lived for twenty-nine years. Mayor of Chelsea from 1914 to 1918 and has since been a member of the town council. Elected state senator in 1926. A republican in politics.

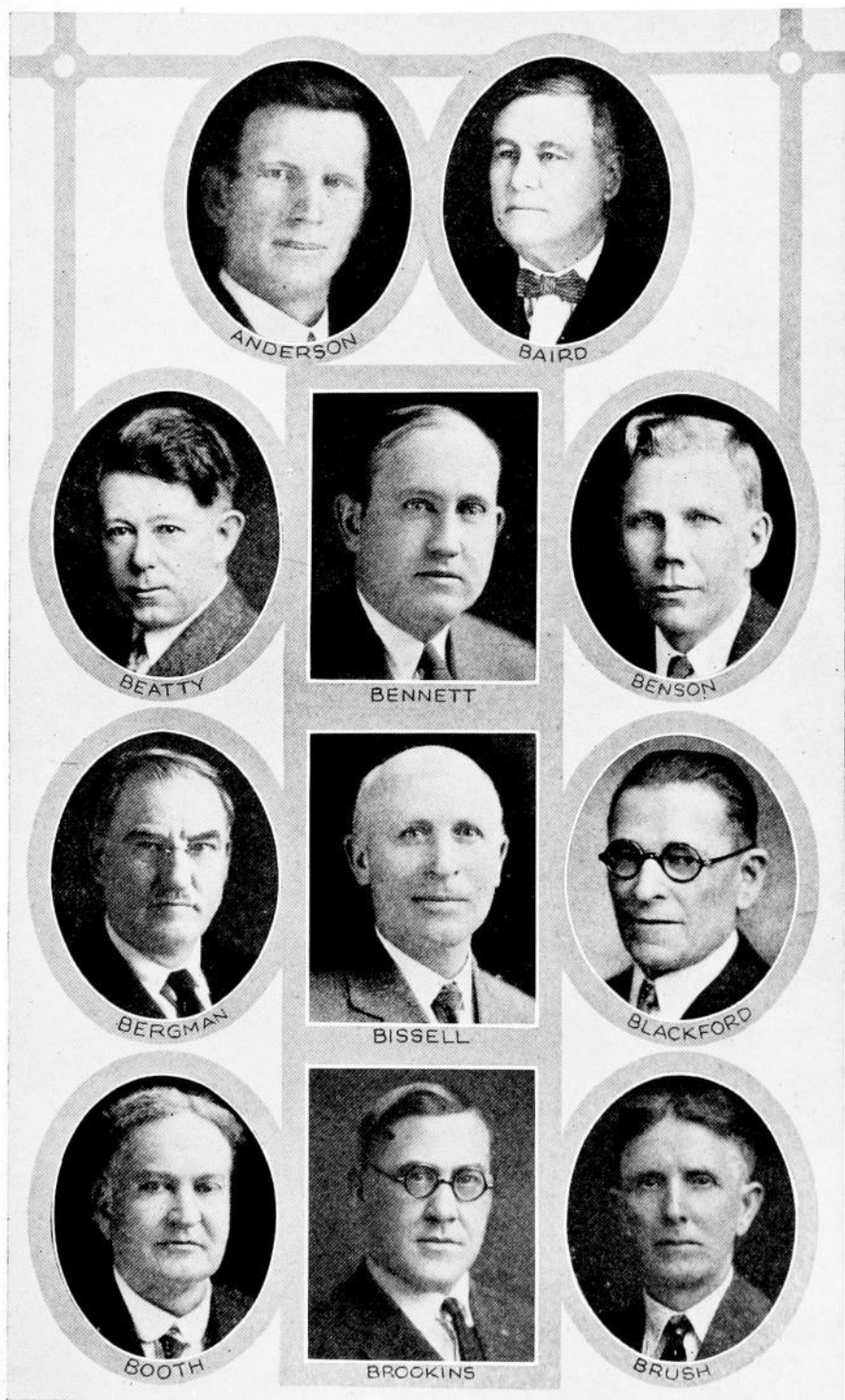

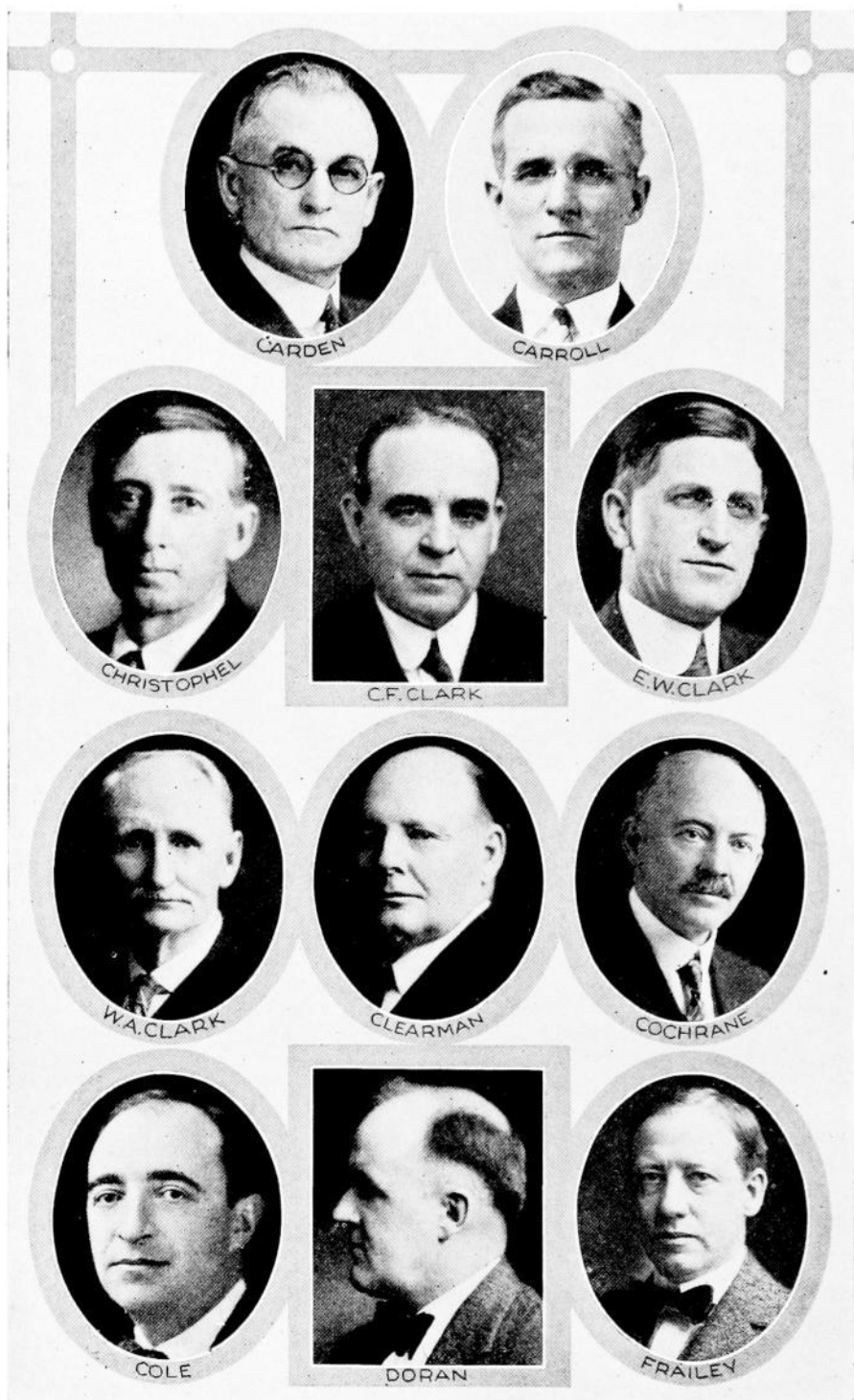

He is a graduate of Coe college, and a member of its board of trustees; a director of the American Trust and Savings Bank, a member of the Congregational church, Sons of the American Revolution, Military Order of the Loyal Legion, Knights Templar, Consistory, Knights of Pythias, American Bar association and member of the executive committee Iowa State Bar association. Was married to Elizabeth Besler, of Cedar Rapids, November 29, 1900. They have one son, Herbert F. Clark. Was elected representative in 1918, 1920 and 1922 and senator in 1928. A republican in politics.

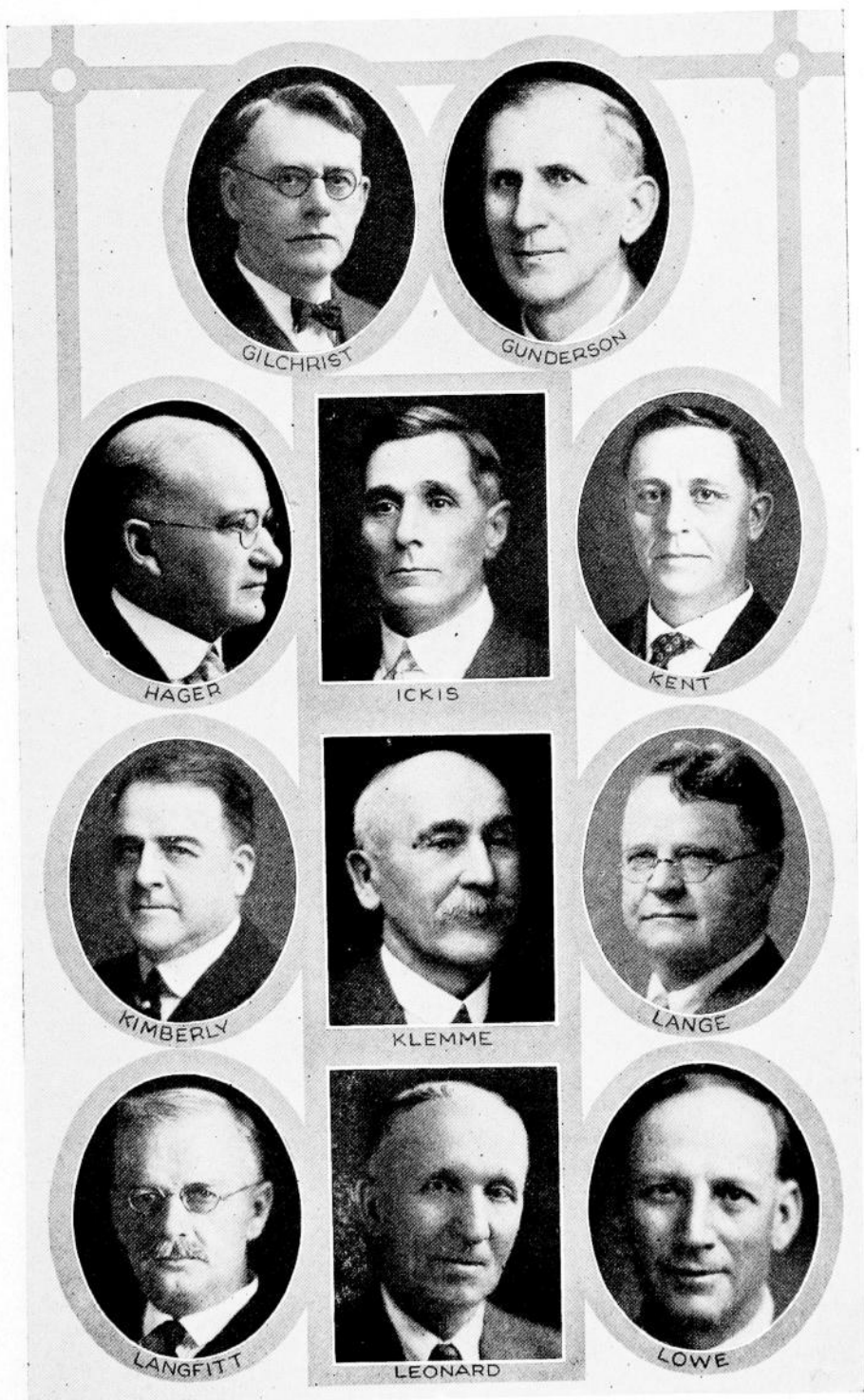

business for some twenty-five years. Served as clerk of the district court of Cerro Gordo county, Iowa, six years. Served as sergeant in Company "A" of the fifty-second Iowa Infantry of Volunteers. Served in the World War for twenty months with the commission of captain, both in this country and France. Is now engaged in the real estate loan business. Was elected to the Iowa senate at the general election, November 6, 1928. No previous legislative experience. Is a republican in politics. Was married April 29, 1903, to Emma H. Hanson of Owatonna, Minnesota.

W. A. CLARK.—Senator from the fifteenth district composed of the counties of Marion and Monroe, was born on a farm near Gallipolis, Gillia county, Ohio, April 22, 1867, where he attended public schools. He came to Marion county, Iowa, in the year 1886. Here he has since resided with the exception of two years spent in Warren county, Iowa. He was married to Edna McQuerry in 1890, now deceased. To this union three children were born, only one living to maturity, Callie E., now Mrs. H. H. Phillips of Pleasantville, Iowa. He spent several years in the mercantile business and in the year 1900 moved to the farm where he resided twenty years. He was deputy county auditor in 1895-96; was treasurer of Marion county from 1921 to 1925 and took the oath of office as state senator January 12, 1925. A republican in politics.

GEORGE M. CLEARMAN.—Senator from the twenty-fifth district comprising Johnson and Iowa counties, was born on a farm in Johnson county, October 5, 1870. Was educated in the public schools. Has been engaged in farming and stock raising in the same locality all his life. Was married in 1892 and has three children, Ray, Harold and Stella. A member of the Episcopal church and a thirty-second degree Mason. A republican in politics.

WILLIAM COCHRANE.—Senator from eighth district, including Mills and Montgomery counties, was born February 10, 1867, in Warren county, Iowa, of Scotch descent. Educated in public schools of Des Moines and Monroe, Iowa, and Monroe high school. When thirteen his father died. Began business career as clerk in a country store, later as proprietor. In 1900 he joined his brother-in-law, the late Thos. D. Murphy, in organizing a company for the manufacture and sale of art calendars at Red Oak. For the first eighteen years he was sales manager. A sales force was built and a market established in all English-speaking countries. For the past eleven years he has been general manager and is now president of the company. During the World War he was a member of the district exemption board for the southern district of Iowa and president of the Montgomery county Red Cross. He has served as alderman and park commissioner of Red Oak. Is now president of National Advertising Specialty association, director of the Employers Mutual Casualty company, vice-president Red Oak Trust and Savings and of the Red Oak National bank, and past president of the Iowa Manufacturer's association. His wife, whose maiden name was Myrtle Murphy, died May 13, 1924. He has three daughters, Mrs. Malcolm D. Lomas, Mrs. J. Lyman Turner and Frances M. Cochrane, all of Red Oak, Iowa.

C. G. COLE.—Senator from Buchanan and Delaware counties, was born on a farm near South Owego, Tioga county, N. Y., October 4, 1890. Attended public school at Greeley and Dr. Holbrook's school at Ossining, N. Y. Graduated from Wesleyan University at Middletown, Conn., June, 1916. Enlisted in the navy and was aboard the U. S. S. *Aurora*. Returned to Greeley where he is actively interested in Delaware county land. A member of the board of directors of Security Savings bank at Greeley, and treasurer of Delaware county farm bureau. A republican in politics.

L. H. DORAN.—Senator from Boone-Story, thirty-first senatorial district, was born at Beaver, Iowa, May 4, 1893. Is one of thirteen children born to Justin R. and Olive F. Doran. Resided on the farm with his parents except for the time spent in school and in the army. His father served as a member of the Iowa house of representatives from Boone county in the thirtieth, thirty-first, thirty-second and thirty-second extra general assemblies, and as a member of the state senate from the thirty-first senatorial district in the thirty-fifth and thirty-sixth general assemblies of Iowa. Graduate of the public school at Beaver, Iowa. Graduate of Drake Uni-

versity Law School in 1920. October 10, 1917, enlisted in Battery C, 339th Field Artillery, and on April 12, 1918, while stationed at Camp Dodge, Iowa, was injured in a motor truck accident which resulted in his being confined to the army hospital until the 4th day of January, 1919. While a patient in the army hospital at Fort Des Moines, Iowa, in 1918, he met DeElda Kinson, of Minneapolis, Minn., a Red Cross nurse, whom he married following his graduation from the university in 1920. He has one daughter and two sons. Since 1920 has been engaged in the practice of law in the city of Boone, Iowa, and is a member of the firm of Baker and Doran. Has never held any other political office. Member of the American Legion, A. F. and A. M., B. P. O. E., A. T. O. fraternity, and the Lions club of Boone. Elected to state senate November 6th, 1928. Republican in politics.

JOSEPH R. FRAILEY.—Senator from the first district, composed of Lee county, was born in Ft. Madison, March 2, 1876. Graduated Ft. Madison high school in 1893; State University of Iowa, liberal arts, 1898; law, 1900. Second lieutenant, Company F, Fiftieth Iowa Infantry, United States Volunteers, during Spanish-American war, and up to the time this regiment was mustered out of service. City solicitor of Ft. Madison from 1905 up to the time he took his seat in the senate, at which time he resigned. Served as a member of the state senate from Lee county in the thirty-sixth, thirty-seventh, thirty-eighth, thirty-ninth, forty-second and forty-third general assemblies. Connected with the legal department of the Atchison, Topeka and Santa Fe Railroad from 1900 to 1905. Practiced law in Ft. Madison since 1905. Is married. Republican in politics. During the political campaigns of 1920, 1924 and 1928, he spoke for the republican national committee in many states. He is trustee of the Cattermole Memorial Library in Ft. Madison, and was one of the trustees of the \$250,000 gift of Alexander Coleman, Esquire, for the purpose of building a road in Lee and Henry counties, Iowa.

FRED C. GILCHRIST.—Senator from the fiftieth district, was born in Pennsylvania in 1868, removed to Iowa 1871, and has lived here since. Educated in common schools and at state teachers' college. Taught school two years and was county superintendent of Pocahontas county 1890-92. Completed law course at state university of Iowa in 1893 and was admitted to the bar. Married Ellen Hurley in 1896 and has three children. Was a member of the house in the twenty-ninth general assembly. Elected to the senate in 1922 and re-elected in 1926. A republican in politics. Residence, Laurens.

O. E. GUNDERSON.—Senator from the forty-first district, composed of Mitchell, Winnebago and Worth counties, was born in Worth county, Iowa, February 25, 1875. He was educated in the rural schools, St. Ansgar Seminary and Institute, and the Northern Illinois Normal School. For several years he was engaged in farming, merchandising and teaching. In 1903 was elected county superintendent of Worth county and served nine years. He moved to Forest City in 1913 and has been interested in farming, banking and insurance. The communities in which he has lived have called upon him to serve as town clerk, councilman, member of the county fair board, of the city commercial club and as president of the board of trustees of the city library. In 1897 he married Gurine Finnesgard of Kenyon, Minnesota, and has two children, Esther and Harvey. Another son, Maurice, accidentally drowned at Cleak Lake, August 4, 1924. Elected senator in 1924. Re-elected, 1928. A republican in politics.

J. H. HAGER.—Senator from Allamakee and Fayette counties, was born in Allamakee county, August 30, 1871. Received his education in the rural schools and at the Breckenridge Preparatory and Business Institute of Decorah, Iowa. Was quartermaster sergeant, company I, 49 Iowa Vol. infantry, during the Spanish-American war. In 1895, he engaged in the farm implement business at Waukon, and in 1908 added the Buick line of cars and has since continued in that business. Was married June 14, 1905, to Grace Falby, formerly of Burlington, Vermont. Member of the Presbyterian church, Shrine consistory and K. P. lodge, a charter member of the Kiwanis club. Served three years as president of the chamber of commerce. Elected representative in 1924 and 1926. Elected state senator in 1928. Republican in politics.

F. D. ICKIS.—Senator from the fifth district, Ringgold, Decatur and Union counties, was born in Afton, Union county, December 12, 1872. He received his education in the country schools, the Creston and Afton high schools and the Afton business college. Has lived on the farm where he now resides for the past fifty-two years. Connected with the farm bureau since its organization. Director of the Farmers Co-operative company and a director of the First National Bank of Creston. A member of the Masonic and Woodman fraternities. A republican in politics.

JOHN W. KENT.—Senator from the fourth district including Lucas and Wayne counties. Born in Cook county, Illinois, March 9, 1867. Moved to Lucas county, Iowa, with his parents in 1869, where he has since resided. Educated in the public schools. A farmer, stock raiser and pure bred Hereford breeder. Owns three hundred and seventy acres of land. Republican in politics. Member of the Masonic fraternity; has been trustee of Jackson township and school treasurer for a number of years; was member of board of supervisors six years. Elected representative in 1924, and re-elected in 1926. Elected senator in 1928.

DAVID W. KIMBERLY.—Senator from Scott county, was born in Deadwood, S. D., August 6, 1878. When he was six years old his parents moved to West Liberty, Muscatine county. He has lived on the farm most of his life. He received his education at the West Liberty, Springdale high school and Bryant-Strattons business college of Chicago. He was married to Elsie King, of Chicago. He is a member of the Mystic Shrine, Knights Templar, Scottish Rites, Mohassan Grotto, Eastern Star, Elks, Eagles, Odd Fellows and Turner society. Was elected representative in 1914 and re-elected in 1916, and to the senate in 1918, 1922 and 1926. A republican in politics.

WILLIAM H. KLEMM.—Senator from the forty-second district, composed of Winneshiak and Howard counties, was born in Franklin county, Ind., February 17, 1849. He came to Iowa with his parents in the spring of 1862 and located on a farm of 200 acres, which his father purchased from the government in 1857 for a dollar and a quarter per acre. He remained there until he was twenty-one years old. He was married to Mary Augusta Bolles in 1870. They have one daughter, Mrs. J. G. Parker, of Fayette, Iowa. He was postmaster during McKinley's term of office, and justice of peace in Lincoln township for thirty-two years. He was a member of the house of representatives during the twenty-fifth, twenty-sixth and twenty-seventh general assemblies and the extra session. Elected senator in 1926. Has been engaged in the lumber and coal business since 1873. A republican in politics.

OTTO F. LANGE.—Senator from the thirty-fifth district, composed of Dubuque county, was born February 16, 1869, in Dubuque, Iowa, and has always lived there. He is the son of Robert W. and Otilie Lange. Robert W. Lange, Senator Lange's father, settled in Dubuque in 1856. Senator Lange became a commercial traveler at the age of eighteen and followed that occupation until 1907, when he became the general agent of the Royal Union Life Insurance Company of Des Moines at Dubuque, which position he still holds. He was married to Lyde Brendel of Galena, Illinois, August 29, 1892. Has three children, Harvey Malcolm, Philo Brendel and Neva Hope Lange. His election as senator is his first venture in politics. He is a republican.

JOHN N. LANGFITT.—Senator from the sixteenth district, composed of Adair and Madison counties, was born in Scott county, Iowa, May 9, 1866. On his father's side he is of Scotch-Irish descent. His mother was of English descent. His early education was received in the rural schools. He also attended Wilton academy and Davenport business college. When twenty-one years of age he went to Adair county. Four years later he married Clara A. Martin, daughter of W. B. and Lucy E. Martin of Greenfield. Mrs. Langfitt died July 14, 1924. There are four surviving children, Harry M. of Chariton, Iowa; Bernice Louise of Des Moines; Clara Mildred and John N., Jr. He lived for several years in western Washington but returned to Adair county in 1898, purchasing the family homestead on which he still resides. In religion, a Presbyterian. He is a blue lodge and thirty-second degree Mason. He was representative from Adair county in the thirty-seventh and thirty-

eighth general assemblies and was elected senator in 1924. Re-elected in 1928. In politics, a republican.

ARTHUR LEONARD.—Senator from Taylor and Adams counties, was born on a farm in Taylor county, Iowa, September 14, 1870. Received his education in the rural schools, and then engaged in farming. His farm adjoins the farm on which he was born. Is a member of the firm of Daniel Leonard & Sons, Iowa pioneers, breeders of Shropshire sheep. Was married to Esther Cowlter February 25, 1893. Two sons and one daughter have been born to them. Was elected representative in 1922 and re-elected in 1924. Elected state senator in 1928. Is a Royal Arch Mason, a member of the Fairview Christian church. Republican in politics.

WESLEY C. LOWE.—Senator from the eleventh district, composed of Clarke and Warren counties, was born May 14, 1875, on a farm in Clarke county, near where the town of Weldon is now located. His parents were early settlers of this locality and settled on the famed Morman Trace road which crosses the southern part of that county. There they broke the virgin prairie and established their home, the farm where Senator Lowe now resides, and where he has always been actively engaged in the occupation of farming and live stock production. He received his education above high school at Humeston Normal College and Drake University, Des Moines, Iowa, completing business courses at both schools. He was married December 25, 1898, to Florence M. Eddy and has a family of three children: Mrs. Lois E. Fairall, Ora Ileen and Uriel Wendell. He has always been active in politics and aside from various township offices, was elected and served as county auditor of Clarke county during the years 1907 to 1911. He is affiliated religiously with the Christian church, fraternally with the K. P. order, and politically with the republican party.

LEW MACDONALD.—Senator from the forty-sixth district, comprising Cherokee, Ida and Plymouth counties. Was born of Scotch parentage on the second day of March, 1884, near Aurora, Illinois. His parents moved to Cherokee county, Iowa, in the fall of 1885 and on to a farm in the spring of 1886. He received his graded school experience in the rural schools, taught in the rural school for one year, graduated from the Iowa State Teachers' College at Cedar Falls, Iowa, in 1907, was superintendent of schools at Hopkinton, Iowa, from 1907 to 1909, attended the law school of the University of Michigan during the school year of 1909-1910, a member of the Northwestern debating team of 1911, graduated from the University of Chicago, Illinois, in 1912 with degrees Ph.D. and J.D.; county superintendent of schools of Cherokee county, Iowa, 1913 to 1917; county attorney, Cherokee county, Iowa, 1917 to 1927, the general practice of law since 1917; a member of the Presbyterian church and affiliated with the following lodges: Masons, Yeomen and Knights of Pythias. Married Olive M. Johnson June 11, 1914. Has two children, Helen Esther and James Lewis. A republican in politics. Residence, Cherokee, Iowa.

WM. E. MCLELAND.—Senator from the twenty-eighth district, was born in Van Buren county, Iowa, April 16, 1867. In 1869 he moved with his parents to Marshall county, Iowa, and has been a resident of that county ever since. He was educated in the public schools and in the Marshalltown high school. Was married to Minnie M. Robinson January 25, 1889. They have four children, two boys and two girls. He was elected and served as county auditor from 1903 to 1907, and again in 1916 to 1919. Served as secretary of the local exemption board during the world war. Has served as president of the consolidated school board in his district and the various township offices in his township. Is secretary of the Iowa Valley Mutual Insurance association, Albion, Iowa. Member of the Marshall county farm bureau. Member of the Christian church. He is a farm owner and is engaged in general farming and breeding of registered Shorthorn cattle. Elected to the state senate in 1924 and again in 1928. A republican in politics.

J. G. MERRITT.—Senator from the forty-eighth district, Sac, Greene and Carroll counties, was born at Findlay, Ohio, September 29, 1870, moving with his parents to Glidden, Carroll county, March 17, 1880, and thence to a near-by farm where he

made his home for forty years. He moved into Glidden eight years ago, but continues to operate the home farm known as Maplehurst Farm. Was married January 19, 1898, to Laura B. Elwood, daughter of Dr. Thomas Elwood, first resident physician of Carroll county. He has been active in business affairs, particularly insurance, as well as farming. Was elected state secretary of the Farmers Co-operative Elevator Mutual Insurance association and is now serving his nineteenth year as secretary of the Farmers Mutual Fire and Lightning Insurance association of Carroll county. A member of the board of directors of the Glidden Farmers Elevator company twenty years which was organized in 1905 and was its president fifteen years. Was twice elected president of the Farmers Grain Dealers association of Iowa, vice-president of the Farmers National Grain Dealers association one year. Has served his local school district both as director and treasurer. Assessor eight years and city councilman two years and since 1919 has been a member of the Carroll county board of education. Was vice-president of the county farm bureau, director of the Red Cross and for six years republican county chairman. Elected state representative in 1924 and state senator in 1926.

T. E. MOEN.—Senator from the forty-ninth district, Lyon, Osceola, O'Brien and Sioux counties, was born in Lyon county October 10, 1870, the first child born in Logan township. He attended the rural schools, Augustana College at Canton, South Dakota, and St. Olaf College at Northfield, Minnesota. Married Rachel Davidson in 1892 and has five children, two sons and three daughters. A member of the Lutheran church. Was engaged in the grain business fifteen years; spent four years in the chamber of commerce at Minneapolis, a member of Skewis-Moen company. Was county supervisor from 1911 to 1919, being chairman of the board four years. Elected representative in 1918, re-elected in 1920 and 1922. Elected senator to fill vacancy for the special session of the forty-second general assembly and re-elected in 1928.

G. W. PATTERSON.—Senator from the forty-seventh district, including Emmet, Palo Alto, Clay, Dickinson and Kossuth counties, was born at Burt, Iowa, September 4, 1887, of Scotch parentage. Graduate of Burt high school. Graduated from Iowa State college, animal husbandry department, 1909. Married December 28, 1914, to Miss Eva M. Stensrud, Lake Mills, Iowa. Has two children, Donald W. Patterson and Virginia Mae Patterson. Business, farming and stock feeding. Elected to house of representatives 1922; re-elected in 1924 and 1926. Elected senator in 1928. A republican.

C. L. RIGBY.—Senator from the twenty-fourth district, composed of Cedar and Jones counties. Was born in Stanwood, Iowa, February 20, 1874. Received his early education in the Stanwood public schools. Attended Cornell college, from which he graduated in 1894. Member of the Sigma Nu fraternity. Immediately after graduation started farming and is still engaged in that occupation. Married Jennie Davis Billings, to which union was born two children, Edward and Isabel. Has been actively engaged in banking for about twenty-five years, and has been president of the Union Trust and Savings bank at Stanwood for the past eighteen years. Is a trustee of Cornell college, and a member of the Masonic and Knights of Pythias lodges. Elected senator in 1924. Republican in politics.

CHARLES THEODORE ROGERS.—Senator from the thirty-eighth district, composed of Grundy and Black Hawk counties, was born in Wheatland, Clinton county, Iowa, December 21, 1863. He is from old American stock, two of his ancestors having come over in the Mayflower in 1620, and one of them, Thomas Rogers, was the eighteenth signer of the Mayflower pact. He moved with his parents from Wheatland to Grundy county in the summer of 1879, where he lived on a farm three and one-half miles south of Grundy Center until the spring of 1893, when he moved into town and has lived there ever since. He attended Coe college, studied law in the office of the Honorable Daniel Kerr of Grundy Center and the Iowa College of Law in Des Moines, was admitted to the bar by the supreme court of Iowa in May, 1897, and has practiced law and been an abstractor of titles thirty-two years. Was chairman of county central committee, member of state central committee (republican) from June, 1926 to 1930. Was first president of the Rotary club of Grundy

Center, and is director in the First National bank. Is a member of the Presbyterian church, Knights of Pythias, Odd Fellows, Masonic Lodges, and El Kahir Temple Shrine, Cedar Rapids. He was married to Gertrude Moffett June 12, 1889, and had two sons, Robert Moffett Rogers, residing in Kansas City, Missouri, and Laurence Ervein Rogers, who was accidentally killed by a live wire in his seventeenth year. Born January 6, 1885, at Shaffton, Iowa; graduate of Iowa State college and University of Wisconsin; married Gladys Melick, 1908, since deceased; married Evelyn Lillie Purcell July, 1921; member of the house in thirty-seventh general assembly; member of the senate in fortieth, fortieth extra, forty-first, forty-second and forty-third sessions. Is engaged in farming and the dairy business, specializing in Holstein cattle; operates grain elevators at Shaffton, Princeton and McCausland. President Citizens Savings bank, Low Moor, Iowa, and director City National bank, Clinton, Iowa. Actively interested in republican politics for the past fourteen years.

FRANK SHANE.—Senator from the thirteenth district; born May 16, 1875, in Mahaska county, Iowa. Graduated from the Letts high school in 1892, attended Iowa Wesleyan college, Mt. Pleasant, and College of Physicians and Surgeons, Keokuk; taught school in Appanoose, Van Buren and Lee counties. Started in the retail drug business at Stockport in 1900; moved to Eldon in 1902, where he owned and operated a drug store until 1912. During his residence in Eldon he served as a member of the school board, as justice of the peace and as mayor, and was elected representative from Wapello county in the thirty-fourth general assembly. He also served as president of the Iowa Pharmaceutical association. Moved to Ottumwa in 1913 and engaged in the insurance business. Is vice-president of the Royal Union Life Insurance company of Des Moines, Iowa. Served as county chairman of the Wapello county republican central committee two terms. Elected state senator in 1922 and re-elected in 1926. Is a member of the Masonic and Knights of Pythias fraternities. Also a member of the Rotary club and Wapello club. Married to Gail Walker of Chariton, Iowa, in 1899. Two children, George W. and Elise. A republican in politics.

F. C. STANLEY.—Senator from the fourteenth district, consisting of Mahaska county, was born November 26, 1881, on a small farm near Ackworth, Warren county, Iowa. Moved to Indianola in 1890. Attended the district school. Graduated from Indianola high school in 1899. Interested in general stock farming three or four years. Graduated from Simpson college in 1907 with a degree of B.S. A partner in the Indianola Herald. Read law at odd times with O. C. Brown of Indianola. Attended the University of Wisconsin, 1909-1910. Head of the department of chemistry, Penn college, from 1910 until the present time. During the year 1916-1917, was engaged in the financial interest of the college. Spent the year 1913-1914 in Europe on leave of absence, specializing in chemistry at the University of Berlin, Berlin, Germany. Traveled extensively through Europe, Egypt, Palestine and Turkey. Was married July 27, 1915, to Ada C. Whitney and has four daughters, Isabel, Kathryn, Margaret and Barbara. Was elected senator in 1924. Re-elected in 1928. Republican in politics.

BERTHEL M. STODDARD.—Senator from the thirty-second district, consisting of Woodbury county, was born at Minonk, Ill., January 21, 1871. Graduated from Illinois college, Jacksonville, Ill., in 1891. Engaged in the grain business at Toluca, Ill., for seven years, moving to Sloan, Iowa, in 1901. He was married in 1897 to Wilhelmina E. Simater. They have a son, Bela M., and a daughter, Jane M. He has been a member of the school board for twenty-seven years, a member of the county board of supervisors, drainage trustee, chairman of the local board for Woodbury county, county chairman for the Y. M. C. A. and Red Cross drives, the United War Service fund, and the third and fourth liberty loan campaigns. With his son he operates a grain elevator at Sloan, Iowa. They are also engaged in farming and stock raising. He was elected in 1918 to fill the unexpired term of Senator C. F. Lytle, resigned. He was re-elected in 1920 for the full term and again in 1924 and 1928. He has always been a republican.

GEORGE W. TABOR.—Senator from the twenty-third district comprising Jackson county, was born near Baldwin, Jackson county, Iowa, December 6, 1862, son of Andrew J. and Nancy L. Tabor. He completed the Baldwin high school course at the age of seventeen. On November 27, 1890, he was united in marriage to Miss Ella Gilmore of Monmouth, Iowa. To this union was born five children: Howard, Clifford, Muriel, Dorothy and Eloise, all of Baldwin. He has always followed the occupation of farming and stock feeding and, with the assistance of his two sons, he operates successfully 1,370 acres of land in Jackson and Jones counties. The farm is well stocked with horses, cattle, hogs and sheep at the present time. He has never asked for or held any kind of office whatever prior to this one as senator. In politics he is a democrat.

RALPH U. THOMPSON.—Senator from the twentieth senatorial district, composed of Muscatine and Louisa counties, was born October 29, 1878, on a farm in Louisa county, Iowa. At the age of ten years, his parents moved to Muscatine, Muscatine county, Iowa. He attended rural school in Louisa county and grade and high school in Muscatine. Was graduated from the college of law at the University of Iowa in 1903. In June of that year he opened a law office, in partnership with his brother, Herbert G. Thompson, in Muscatine, where he is still engaged in practice of law. Was married to Gertrude M. Carter on June 9, 1902. In 1907 acted as assistant city attorney of the city of Muscatine, and as assistant county attorney for two successive terms. In 1917 was elected city attorney of Muscatine, re-elected a second term. Received the nomination on the democratic ticket as a candidate for congress in the second congressional district in 1924. At a special election, held March 18, 1927, he was nominated by petition on the progressive independent ticket and elected state senator to fill the unexpired term of the late Samuel E. Wilson of Louisa county.

CLYDE H. TOPPING.—Senator from ninth district, Des Moines county, was born on a ranch near Utica, Ness county, Kansas, January 8, 1884. His parents were John W. Topping and Ida (nee Johnston) Topping, both of whom were born in Van Buren county, Iowa. In the year 1888 the family returned to Van Buren county and then moved to Burlington, Iowa, in 1896. Attended the public schools in Burlington, then the State University of Iowa, leaving there in 1906 for Regina, Saskatchewan, Canada, where he and his father operated a ranch in connection with a colonization project of theirs. Was married in 1908 to Miss Helen Welsh Young, of Burlington, Iowa, daughter of Dr. and Mrs. H. B. Young. They have three children, Alice Hamilton, Eugenia Young, and Clyde H., Jr. After the disposal of the Canadian ranch he entered the employ of the Canadian Pacific Railway, and was connected with the land sales organization of that railway at Calgary, Alberta, for ten years, leaving the Canadian Pacific Railway in 1921 to again engage in the real estate business with his father at Burlington, Iowa. He was elected to the Iowa senate in 1926, republican member from Des Moines county. He is a member of the Congregational church.

OSCAR ULSTAD.—Senator from Hamilton, Hardin and Wright counties, was born at Leland, Illinois, October 30, 1867. At the age of five years he moved with his parents to Lee county, Illinois, where he resided until twenty years of age. He then moved to Wright county, Iowa, where he has since resided. Received his education in the rural schools of Illinois. Was engaged in the mercantile business at Holmes, Iowa, fifteen years, retiring in 1913. Has lived on a farm adjoining Holmes since that time. Was postmaster at Holmes seventeen years, township trustee four years, township clerk two years and was president of the school board. Is married and has five children. Elected representative in 1916, 1918, 1920, 1922 and 1924. Elected senator in 1926. Speaker pro tempore of the forty-first general assembly. Chairman of the republican central committee of Wright county. A republican in politics.

DENVER L. WILSON.—Senator from the seventh district, was born at Clarington, Ohio, 58 years ago. His parents both died when he was a mere child. When fourteen years old he went to Nebraska and worked on a farm until he was twenty. He then entered school at the old western normal at Shenandoah, Iowa. From then until he was thirty he alternately went to school and taught until he completed

his law course at the state university of Nebraska. He entered the practice of law at Shenandoah in 1901, where he has continued to reside. He was married to Miss Dora Dunbar in 1897. To this union two children have been born, Ruth and Ivan. Was never a candidate for office until his candidacy and election as senator in 1926, although he has always taken an active interest in politics. He is a republican.

GEO. A. WILSON.—Senator from the thirtieth district, Polk county, Iowa. Born on a farm in Adair county. Youngest son of James H. Wilson and Martha G. Wilson. Married Mildred Zehner, December 8, 1922. Graduated from Menlo high school, attended college at Grinnell, graduate of the law school of the State University of Iowa in 1907. Began practicing law immediately in the city of Des Moines. Was elected county attorney for one term. Served as judge of the district court of Polk county, Iowa, for a period of over two years, resigning from this position to again enter the practice of law. Republican in politics.

BIOGRAPHIES OF STATE REPRESENTATIVES

JOHN H. AIKEN.—Representative from Ida county, was born at Iowa City, March 27, 1875. He was taken by his parents, Benjamin Franklin Aiken and Patience (Williams) Aiken, to Ida county in 1876, where he has since resided. In October, 1903, he was married to Henrietta Hass, of Holstein, Iowa. Mr. and Mrs. Aiken have three daughters, Patience Louise, Thelma Norine and Virginia Helen. Mr. Aiken is a republican in politics and was elected representative in 1920. Re-elected in 1922, 1924, 1926 and 1928.

OTTO ALBERT.—Representative from Grundy county, was born in Scott county, Iowa, in 1876. At the age of four years he moved with his parents to Grundy county and received his education in the Reinbeck public schools. He helped his father on the farm until 1899. In 1899 he was married to Clara B. Strohbehn, also of Grundy county, and then engaged in the business of farming for himself. He has six children, Flora, Mable, Harold, Lucille, Irene and Ethel. In 1905 he had a farm sale and moved with his family to Idaho and engaged in the sheep industry on the range. He sold out his sheep business in 1913 and moved back to Grundy county and then bought the farm on which he now lives. He helped organize the Grundy county farm bureau, was president of the organization for one year and he has always been active in its functioning. He was president of the township school board for seven years and was a member of the county board of supervisors for six years. He was elected to the house of representatives in 1928.

BYRON G. ALLEN.—Representative from Pocahontas county, seventy-seventh district, was born at Laurens, Iowa, September 13, 1901. He is the son of ex-Senator Joseph H. Allen, who served the fiftieth senatorial district from the thirty-second to the thirty-seventh general assemblies, and is the nephew of Senator F. C. Gilchrist, who now represents the same district. Educated in the public schools of Pocahontas and graduated from West high school, Des Moines, and Pocahontas high school in 1919. Attended the State University of Iowa for one term and was a student in the agricultural economics department at Iowa State College from 1920 to 1924. Upon leaving college he returned to Pocahontas and engaged in farm management work. After the adjournment of the forty-second general assembly he became the editor and publisher of the Pocahontas Democrat which, under his management, is an independent newspaper. On December 18, 1926, he married Miss Elsa Erickson of Marathon, Iowa, whom he had met in college. They are the parents of one daughter, Virginia, and a son, Joseph Warne. A republican in politics, Mr. Allen was elected to the assembly in 1926 as an independent candidate and in 1928 was re-elected as the nominee of his party.

J. PARK BAIR.—Representative from Buena Vista county, Iowa, was born March 17, 1864, in Perry county, Pennsylvania. When he was one year old he moved with his parents to Gerardston, Berkly county, West Virginia. When six years old, his parents moved to Bedford, Indiana. He received his education in the county schools and southern Indiana Normal school at Mitchell, Indiana. When twenty-one years old he went to Arcola, Illinois, where he was married to Clara Belle Lou-

than. To them were born four children, two girls and two boys. The oldest boy died when seven years old. For sixteen years the family lived on a farm in Arcola, coming to Storm Lake, Iowa, March 1st, 1901, where he purchased a farm of 320 acres and lived on it one year. For the past twenty-seven years he has lived in Storm Lake. For fifteen years he was engaged in buying and shipping live stock. For the past thirteen years he has farmed eighty acres of land, which he owns within and adjoining the city of Storm Lake. He has served as township trustee, school director sixteen years, city councilman of Storm Lake, and member of the Buena Vista county board of supervisors ten years. A member of the Storm Lake chamber of commerce, the Masonic order, A. F. & A. M., and the Royal Arc Chapter, the Eastern Star, K. P. lodge, M. W. A., R. N. A., and a member and ruling elder in the Presbyterian church. Was elected representative from Buena Vista county in 1926 and again in 1928.

CHAS. E. BAKER.—Representative from Jasper county, was born in the county which he represents December 20, 1873. His early education was received in the rural schools and on the farm. At the age of twenty he entered Simpson College. When war was declared with Spain, he enlisted with the 51st Iowa Volunteer Regiment and went to the Philippine Islands. Graduate of the Moulton schools and of Iowa Wesleyan College, completing his college course May 8, 1918. Married Edna Richardson December 22, 1917. Served in the World War. Engaged in farming. Was farm bureau director the years 1926, 1927 and 1928. A republican in politics.

S. A. BARNES.—Representative from Wright county. Born in Kendall county, Illinois, June 22, 1877. Moved to farm near Minor, South Dakota, in 1882. Attended school during the winter months and tilled the soil throughout the summer season. Educated in the public school and high school of Howard, South Dakota. Came to Iowa in 1897. Worked in his father's printing office learning the printer's trade. Employee of the Chicago, Northwestern railway company from 1898 to 1900, resigning this position to accept an appointment in the government service. In 1900 was appointed to government position in Washington, D. C., through the courtesy of Speaker David B. Henderson, holding this position four years. In 1905 elected cashier of the Security Savings Bank at Eagle Grove, Iowa, resigning that position May 18, 1925, and retiring from the banking business. He is a bachelor. Republican in politics. Elected representative of the seventy-fifth district in 1926 and re-elected in 1928.

H. S. BERRY.—Representative from Monroe county, was born on a farm in Wapello county, Iowa, July 22, 1857, moving with his parents to Monroe county in 1865. Received his education in the country schools; taught school four years; served as member of the board of supervisors six years; served as mayor of the city of Albia eight years. Is married and has three children. His occupation is that of a farmer and live stock dealer. Elected representative in 1920, re-elected in 1922, 1924, 1926, and 1928. A republican in politics.

JOHN M. BIXLER.—Representative from Adams county, was born on a farm in that county December 23, 1867, the son of John and Savilla Bixler. His parents were pioneer residents of Adams county, settling there in 1854. Attended the rural schools and later the Western Normal college at Shenandoah, Iowa. Graduated from Highland Park college, now known as the Des Moines University, in 1891. Was elected county superintendent of schools in Adams county in 1892, serving two

terms. Was journal clerk in the house of representatives in the twenty-sixth and twenty-sixth extra sessions. Married Miss Fannie L. Day, March 13, 1892. They have six children, Fern, Marjorie, Mary, Carl, Neal and Blanche. At present engaged in general farming. Member of the Masonic lodge and of a community church. Republican in politics.

R. M. BUCHMILLER.—Representative from Greene county, was born on a farm in Greene county, Iowa, January 12, 1880. Of American parentage. He lived on this farm until twenty-one years of age. Attended rural school. On January 30, 1901, was married to Miss Sadie Downing. Continued farming until the present time. He has two children, Virgil L. and Verna Margaret. Is a member of Christian church, Jefferson, Iowa, and has served on the church board for a number of years. In 1911 was elected a member of school board. In 1920 was chosen president of the shipping association, serving five years. In 1924 elected president of county farm bureau, serving two years. Elected representative in 1927. Re-elected 1929. Republican in politics.

WARREN H. BURTON.—Representative from Wayne county, was born on a farm in Union township, Wayne county, April 11, 1874. His early life was spent on this farm, and his education was received in the rural schools of this community. Was married in June, 1897, to Alice White, and lived on an adjoining farm until 1905 when they moved to New Mexico and took up a homestead. Gave up farming in 1909 and took up railroad location and construction work until 1914 when he was selected county engineer for Wayne county. Was in this office until 1918 when he again took up farming. Was township assessor four years. Elected county auditor in 1924, serving four years until his election in 1928 as representative from Wayne county. Three children have been born to Mr. and Mrs. Burton and they also have two adopted children. He is a Methodist, a Mason and a republican in politics.

C. C. R. BUSH.—Representative from Cherokee county, was born in Sandy Creek, N. Y., September 30, 1882. In 1884 he moved with his parents to a farm near Washta, Cherokee county, Iowa, which farm he now owns and operates. He received his early education in a rural school, graduated from the Washta high school in 1903, taught school and farmed. Graduated from Iowa State college in the department of animal husbandry in 1909; worked for the agricultural extension department from September 1909 until September 1910, also during the winter months of 1910-11 and 1911-12. Has been continuously a member of his local school board or secretary since 1912. Helped organize the Cherokee county farm bureau and was vice-president of that organization for several years. Graduated from the law department of the University of Iowa and admitted to the practice of law in 1904. Married October, 1909, to Myra Lyon of Iowa City. Served as assistant city attorney and assistant county attorney. Member of the Cedar Rapids board of education since 1924, president of the board for the year ending March, 1928. Member of Mt. Hermon lodge, A. F. & A. M., the Iowa consistory at Cedar Rapids, El Kahir Temple of the Mystic Shrine, Cedar Rapids Chamber of Commerce, B. P. O. WILLIAM F. BYERS.—Representative from Fayette county. Born near Lima, Iowa, June 11, 1893, a son of W. F. and Emma S. Byers. At the age of six years he moved to a farm southeast of West Union. Attended rural school. Graduated from West Union high school in 1913. Chose farming as profession. Traveled extensively in Europe, Asia, South Seas, West Indies, and many other tropical countries. Enlisted

in United States army in 1917. Fought with the 13th F. A. before the main fronts of France. Rose to rank of sergeant. Discharged in August, 1919. Member of Fayette county farm bureau and Isaac Walton League. Unmarried. Elected to forty-third general assembly.

W. H. CAMPBELL.—Representative from Decatur county, was born on a farm in that county, March 25, 1861. He lived continuously on the farm until 1925, when he moved to Grand River, but still is in partnership with his son, who is engaged in general farming and breeding purebred Hereford cattle. He received his education in the rural schools; raised three children, one daughter, who graduated from the high school at Grand River, and two sons, who are graduates from the agricultural college at Ames. The older son lost his life in the World War. Has been a life-long republican. Has served in various township offices. Has practiced his profession at Woodbine, since that date. He is interested in farming and the banking business and is president of the First National and the Peoples Savings banks of Woodbine. In June, 1891, he was married to Maude Allen. They have four children, a son and three daughters. He is a Mason and a Knight of Pythias.

RICHARD W. COX.—Representative from Taylor county, was born in Durham county, England, November 12, 1875. Came to Taylor county in 1879 with his parents who located on the present farm now owned and operated by him. Educated in the common schools. He married Lora Pearl West, October 11, 1905. Has three children, Grace N., Edith L., and Aleda I., all at home except when away at school. Has taken an active part in county and community affairs for many years. Was a member of his district school board for more than fifteen years. Was a member of the board of trustees of his township six years. Was a charter member and is now an active member in the farmers union and farm bureau. He is affiliated with the Fair View Christian church. Is a member of the Odd Fellows, and the Modern Woodmen lodges. A republican in politics.

WILL H. CROZIER.—Representative from Mahaska county, was born on a farm, in the county he now represents, December 18, 1870. Received his early education in the rural school and after finishing high school in Oskaloosa, completed a course in Highland Park college, Des Moines, Iowa. Has been engaged in farming and stock raising continuously ever since. Has held a number of offices in his township and served on his local school board twenty-eight years. Was married to Lillie B. Zaring of Fremont, Iowa, in 1898. They have two sons, Ralph W. and Glen A. He is a member of the Presbyterian church and a republican in politics. Elected state representative in 1926, re-elected in 1928.

C. O. DAYTON.—Representative from Washington county, was born in that county December 11, 1871. Received his early education in the rural school located on the farm that he now owns. He was never able to attend school in the summer

time, having to work on the farm to make a living. Thus he succeeded in graduating from the Keota high school in the class of 1891. For four years thereafter he taught school in the winter and farmed in the summer. In the year 1894 he was married to Miss Louella Davis. Two sons were born to this union, Kenneth and Raymond. He is a United Presbyterian by faith. A republican in politics. Was elected to the forty-third general assembly in 1928.

WILLIAM M. DEAN.—Representative from Sac county. Born on farm near Castalia, Iowa, February 5, 1877. Moved with parents to farm near Toledo, Tama county, Iowa, 1890. Located at Lake View, Sac county, Iowa, 1902, engaging in furniture business. Entered the automobile business in 1909, active in that line since. Educated rural schools, Toledo high school and Western college. Married November 29, 1902, to Ellen C. Ramsdell, of Tama, Iowa. Two children, Graham M. Dean, born August 10, 1904, and Margaret Shirley Dean, born October 2, 1915. Mayor of Lake View, Iowa, fourteen years. Served as private, Co. K, 49th Inf., U. S. Vols. in United States and Cuba 1898-99. Commissioned 1st lieutenant, U. S. A. 1918 and served in United States only. Member Masonic order, United Spanish War Veterans and American Legion. Republican in politics.

O. J. DITTO.—Representative from Osceola county, Iowa. Was born at Onawa, Iowa, on January 26, 1894. Parents moved to Sibley, Osceola county, Iowa, in 1895. Attended public school at Sibley, graduating in 1912; attended Cedar Rapids Business College. Enlisted in World's War; discharged in January, 1919. Served one year as deputy county auditor of Osceola county. Married in June, 1921. Owner of Osceola County Abstract Company. Member of Masonic order, Sibley Rotary Club, American Legion, vice-president, Iowa Fair Managers Association and Secretary of the Osceola County Fair.

R. B. ECKLES.—Representative from Butler county, was born on a farm in Marshall county, Iowa, August 6, 1876. He was educated in the rural schools, and graduated from the Iowa State college in 1896. He was married to Ena M. Burnham in 1899. They have three children, Lester, Gordon and Dotha. He taught dairying and animal husbandry for two years at Doyleston, Pennsylvania. Engaged in farming and live stock feeding since 1900 near Aplington, Iowa. Justice of the peace for many years, a member of the Aplington consolidated school board for twelve years, now serving as president of the board. A member of the Presbyterian church. Elected representative in 1924 and re-elected in 1926 and 1928. A republican in politics.

ELMORE A. ELLIOTT.—One of the representatives from Polk county, was born on a farm near Louisville, Kentucky, and spent the early years of his life farming. Worked his way through school, entering Westfield college, Westfield, Ill., at the age of 23 where he spent two years, later entering old Western college at Toledo, Iowa, where he finished his education. Married Lola Shepherd of Des Moines. Elected a member of the city council of Des Moines in 1918, re-elected in 1920, serving both terms as finance commissioner. With state board of health one year. FRANK W. ELLIOTT.—Representative from Scott county, was born on a farm in Sumner county, Kansas, in 1887, educated in the public schools and graduated from high school. He has been a resident of Iowa since 1909, during which year he came to Davenport, taking up the study of chiropractic. Graduated from the Palmer School of Chiropractic and since that time has been connected with this school in an official capacity, as registrar and general manager. Was married in 1910 to Hazel D. Johnson, at Winfield, Kan.; has no children. He is a member of all Masonic bodies and of the B. P. O. E. Elected representative in 1919, 1921, 1922 and again in 1928. A republican in politics.

E. O. ELLSWORTH.—Representative from Hardin county, was born in Iowa Falls in the county he represents and where he is still engaged in the banking and farm loan business. Was actively identified with the construction of the Des Moines, Iowa Falls and Northern Railroad from Iowa Falls to Des Moines, now a part of the Rock Island system. During the World War was assigned to the preliminary military training of all boys called into service from Hardin county. Member of both York and Scottish branches of Masonry. Republican.

GEORGE C. FIGGINS.—Representative from Union county, fourteenth district. Born in Montgomery county, Iowa, October 17, 1868. Boyhood spent in that county, afterwards living for a time in Adams county then moving to Union county in 1886, where he now resides. He attended the public schools of the counties where he resided, graduating from the Afton Normal and Business College in 1892. Taught school a short time in Union county. Was married August 9, 1893, to Gelia M. Fluckey, and soon after purchased a farm in Union county which he owns at the present time. In 1922 he was elected clerk of the district court which office he held two terms. Filled numerous township and county offices until elected to the position of representative. He is a member of the I. O. O. F. and Masonic lodges and the Presbyterian church. A republican.

CHARLES W. FILES.—Representative from Cerro Gordo county, was born in Johnson county, Iowa, November 25, 1871, where he lived on the farm until the year 1910. He then moved to Cerro Gordo county and purchased the farm near Mason City, upon which he has since lived. He received a common school education; attended the Shueyville high school, and took some university work at Iowa City. Has at different times held township offices, such as clerk and trustee; was a member of the Cerro Gordo county board of education, and president of the Cerro Gordo county farm bureau for a number of years. HENRY C. FINNERN.—Representative from Crawford county, was born at Fredesdorf, Holstein, Germany, August 13, 1877. Came to Crawford county in 1891, spending one year working on a farm and then started his career as printer and newspaper publisher. Is at present senior member of the firm of Finnern & Vosgerau, publisher of The Denison Bulletin at Denison. Married May 27, 1903, to Miss Frieda Vosgerau, native of Crawford county. They have four children: Lillian, Ruby, Arnold and Norma. One son died September 4, 1923, on the seventh anniversary of his birth. Member of Zion's Evangelical Lutheran church and has been an official of same for the past twelve years, now holding the office of financial secretary. President of the Denison Opera House Company since its organization in 1913. Was elected representative of the 56th district in 1928 on the democratic ticket.

SYLVESTER FLEMING.—Representative from Adair county, was born on a farm in Harrison township, Adair county, Iowa, October 4, 1873, the son of David and Charlotte Fleming. He was left an orphan at the age of seventeen when his father and mother were taken by death within eighteen days of each other. Educated in the one room rural school and Iowa State College at Ames. Was married April 4, 1899, to Clara I. Moyers, of Boone county, Iowa. Has two children, Ethel M. and Albert S. Has always taken an active part in community welfare and has held various offices of the township. Was appointed township chairman of the World War work, charter member of Adair county farm bureau and elected its first secretary. A farmer by profession, and a breeder of Poland China hogs. Has spent twenty years in corn breeding, being the originator of what is known as Fleming's Yellow Dent. Lives on a farm in the township where born. Joined Congregational church when a young man. Never belonged to any secret organization. Republican in politics, having always taken active part in political affairs. Was elected November 6, 1928, a member of the forty-third general assembly from Adair county.

L. B. FORSLING.—Representative from Woodbury county, was born in Sioux City, March 23, 1890. Attended grade and high school in Sioux City, graduated in law

from Cumberland university; general practice in law in Sioux City since 1915. Police judge of Sioux City, 1918. Married Lillian Nash, February 12, 1914. Elected representative, 1920; re-elected 1922, 1924, 1926 and 1928. Republican in politics.

WM. T. GILMORE.—Representative from Cedar county, was born in Bellefontaine, Ohio. He was graduated from Iowa State College. Taught country school for two terms; afterward engaged in the clothing business for some years. Is president of the Cedar County State Bank. Is a member of the Knights of Pythias, Consistory, Mystic Shrine, State historical society and the farm bureau. Served on the city council for five years and was an alternate to the republican national convention in 1920. Elected representative in 1920, re-elected in 1922 and in 1926. Republican in politics.

H. M. GREENE.—Representative from Pottawattamie county, was born on a farm near Avoca, Iowa, September 6, 1882. He attended rural school and Avoca high school; graduated from the law department of the State University of Iowa in 1906. He was admitted to the bar the same year but returned to farming, at which he is engaged at the present time. He enlisted as a private in L company, 168th infantry, Rainbow division, and was later made a sergeant. He was twice wounded. He is a charter member and first commander of Fred Funston Post, American Legion at Avoca, Iowa. He is a Mason, a Shriner, and in politics a republican. Member of the forty-second, forty-second extra and forty-third general assemblies.

DAVID M. GRISWOLD.—Representative from Madison county, was born in Marion county, Ohio, September 5, 1863. Came to Madison county in 1866 where he has resided since, excepting ten years during which time he has served as secretary of the Hawkeye Telephone company. He attended the public schools and taught in the schools for several years. He has served in all of the different township offices and as clerk of the district court for eight years. Is now engaged in farming. Is a director of the Citizens National Bank of Winterset. Married Lulu E. Piatt of Madison county on March 11, 1891. To this union a son and a daughter have been born. A member of the Knights of Pythias, a republican in politics.

LENUS HAGGLUND.—Representative from Page county, Iowa, was born in Sweden, May 11, 1864. He came to Illinois, Henry county, with his parents, August, 1867. Then moved with his parents in the spring of 1876 to a farm near Essex, Page county, Iowa. Farming has been his life work. Awarded gold medal in 1926 in master farmer contest. Attended rural schools and Western Normal College at Shenandoah, Iowa. Has always taken an active part in church, school, and public affairs. Has served as township trustee, school director, president of the school board, school secretary and treasurer, member of the county board of education, president of the Page county farm bureau and also treasurer of same. Was married to Alice Seabloom, March 19, 1891. To this union five children were born, four sons and one daughter. One son met his death in an accident on the harvest field August 16, 1919, and another son, the youngest, died suddenly June 6, 1927. He is a member of the Presbyterian church. Elected representative in 1926 and 1928. Republican in politics.

In 1922 he left the employ of the Morrell company and came back to Eldon to engage in farming and stock raising with his brother. Served in the thirty-seventh, thirty-eighth, fortieth, forty-first and forty-second general assemblies. A member of the Woodmen of the World. A republican in politics.

HENRY N. HANSON.—Representative from Winnebago county, was born on a farm in Webster county, Iowa, September 3, 1876. He received his education in the rural schools of his county, in Luther Academy at Bode, Humboldt county, Iowa, and at the Humboldt college, Humboldt, Iowa. He engaged in the general merchandise business with his father in 1893 until moving to North Dakota in the fall of 1902, filing on a homestead on which he lived and proved up in 1909. He then returned to Iowa and settled on a farm in Winnebago county. He served as a member of the board of supervisors, resigning to better look after his duties on the farm. Ditto. A life-long republican.

L. W. HATTER.—Representative from Iowa county, was born in Keokuk county, Iowa. Moved with his parents to Millersburg, Iowa, in 1865. Was in the general merchandise and drug business until 1903. Served as county treasurer until January, 1909, and since then has been engaged in farming and in the banking business. A member of A. F. and A. M., number 231, and Iowa consistory number two. A republican.

J. N. HAYES.—Junior representative from Dubuque county. Born in Dubuque, educated in the parochial schools, and Campion College, Prairie Du Chien, Wisconsin. Entered the World War in August, 1917, served in the navy in foreign waters from April, 1918, to April, 1919. Honorably discharged. Engaged in general insurance business up to the present time. Married in 1922 to Florence McVay. They have three children, Robert, James, and Marian. A democrat in politics.

J. M. HEALD.—Representative from Chickasaw county, was born at Bradford, Chickasaw county, Iowa, January 26, 1861. Educated at Bradford academy and State Teachers college. Taught in the public schools of Chickasaw county for several years. Married to Alice R. Green of Winchester, Illinois, in 1886. Has engaged in farming for a large part of his life. Has always been interested in and connected with public affairs. A republican in politics.

E. O. HELGASON.—Representative from Emmet county, was born in Mason City, Iowa, November 7, 1872. At the age of seven he moved with his parents to a farm in Seneca township, Kossuth county. He attended district school, completed a commercial course in a business college and attended Iowa State College at Ames two years. Except for three years in Louisiana, associated with his brothers who were levee contractors along the Mississippi, he has always lived in Iowa. Taught school

two years. Moved to a farm adjoining Armstrong in 1909 and at present resides in Armstrong. Married in 1900 to Mary Jenson and to this union were born five children, Lloyd, Ione, Lorenzo, Marietta and Viola. Among other offices of trust filled by him he has served as road superintendent, township trustee and clerk, secretary of the Seneca township district school board eight years, director of the Armstrong consolidated school district eleven years, president of the board eight years, and republican county committeeman. Elected state representative to fill the vacancy in the forty-second extra session of the Iowa legislature caused by the death of R. B. Crone. Re-elected to the forty-third.

LAFE HILL.—Representative from Floyd county, was born in Ringgold county, Iowa. At the age of fourteen years was thrown on his own resources. He worked on a farm, in a brick yard and on railroad construction, attending school at odd times until about the age of eighteen, when he had saved sufficient money to enable him to enter academic and college work. During that time he read law for two years with C. W. Mullen of Waterloo, afterwards state's attorney general. He then took up teaching at Troy Mills and Walker, in Linn county, and was later superintendent of schools at Seymour and other places in southern Iowa. A farm land owner and a director in the Boone State bank. A member of the various Masonic bodies, including the Shrine and the Consistory. Also a member of the Elks. Elected representative in 1926. Re-elected in 1928. A republican.

CHAS. A. HOLLIS.—Representative from Black Hawk county, born in Black Hawk county in 1867, oldest of a family of six boys and three girls. Father enlisted in the army from Troy, N. Y., and served three years. Was married in 1887 to Miss Carrie Buck of Black Hawk county and immediately went to farming for himself, at all times handling purebred and high-grade stock. Active in all organizations for the betterment of rural conditions. Moved to Cedar Falls in 1906 to educate his children, one boy and one girl. Traveled three years for the Independent Telephone association and promoted the first independent copper toll line between Burlington and Des Moines. Assisted in organizing and was president and manager

of the Black Hawk Oil Company, Cedar Falls. At the present time is in partnership with his son in the business of raising purebred Holsteins. Member of the First Brethren church. Elected representative in 1922, re-elected in 1924, 1926 and 1928. Republican in politics.

H. A. HOLMGREN.—Address, Ruthven, Iowa. Representative from Palo Alto county, was born at Britt, Iowa, Hancock county, in 1896. Later moved to Pocahontas county and then to Palo Alto county where he now resides. Graduate of the Rolfe and Ruthven, Iowa, high schools and Coe College, and in 1923 Iowa State College at Ames. Served three years during and following the World War in the navy doing foreign duty, with the marine corps. Member of the American Legion-Masonic lodge and various other social and civic organizations. Served as a director in the Palo Alto county farm bureau for three years. At present engaged in dairy farming and stock feeding. Elected to the legislature November 6, 1928. Republican in politics.

GEORGE M. HOPKINS.—Representative from Guthrie county, Iowa, was born October 16, 1866, in Bear Grove, Iowa. He was educated in the rural schools and the Guthrie county high school, the Western Normal college at Shenandoah, Iowa, and the Valparaiso Normal school, Valparaiso, Ind. He taught four years in the rural schools of Iowa and Nebraska, served seven years as principal of the Bassett village schools, eight years as county superintendent of Rock county, Nebraska, twelve years as president of the township school board and eleven years on the county board of education. He was married in 1894 to Anna Laura Green of Kirkwood, Nebraska. They have five children, Margie, Mark, Macey, Dorothy and Donald. In religious faith he is Unitarian. He has always taken an active part in politics and in the public welfare work of his community. He was elected representative in 1926 and 1928. A republican.

WILBER F. HUBBARD.—Representative from Pottawattamie county, was born on a farm near Neola, Iowa, March 24, 1885. Educated in the rural schools and the high school of Neola. Has followed the vocation of farming. Was president of the West Pottawattamie county farm bureau, and past master of the Masonic lodge of Neola. He is a member of the Presbyterian church. He was married to Vera Lynn Hamilton in 1909. They have four children, Joseph, Neal, Verna and Wilber Lynn. Was elected state representative in 1924, re-elected in 1926 and 1928. A republican in politics.

RALPH R. HUNT.—Representative from Louisa county, was born in Marshall township, Louisa county, 1879. Educated in the public schools of Wapello, Iowa. Worked at printer's trade four years, taught school nine years and was elected county superintendent of schools, 1906, serving in that capacity six years. He superintended the schools at Oakville, Iowa, one year after returning to his farm, in 1912. There are two children, Reed L. and Helen D. by his first wife, Mary Pearl Parsons, who died in December, 1913. November 22, 1924, he was united in marriage to Sofie Kramer. The past sixteen years he has devoted his entire time to farming. Elected to the legislature in 1926, re-elected in 1928. A republican.

HOMER HUSH.—Representative from Montgomery county, was born in West township, Montgomery county, on the farm which he now owns and operates, July 14, 1889. His parents settled in Montgomery county at an early time and lived for more than thirty years on this same farm. Educated in the schools of Montgomery county and Simpson college. Married Ada M. Fryrear in 1910. They have three boys, Howard, 17, Clarence, 14, and Merle, 8. He is a member of the Methodist church, Masonic lodge, and Eastern Star. Served as president of the Montgomery county farm bureau, and is now serving his first term as representative.

JOHN R. IRWIN.—Representative from Lee county, was born in the county which he represents, in the city of Keokuk, August 24, 1883. He received his early education in the public schools; was graduated from Lawrenceville Preparatory School, Lawrenceville, New Jersey, in 1902, and received the degree of Bachelor of Letters from Princeton University, Princeton, New Jersey, in 1906. He attended for a time the National University Law School, Washington, D. C. In 1907 he entered the

Irwin-Phillips Wholesale Dry Goods Company in Keokuk. This company was established by his grandfather, Stephen Irwin, in 1856. In 1909 he married Miss Florence Johnstone of Keokuk, whose grandfather, Edward Johnstone, served in the Third Constitutional Convention held at Iowa City in 1857, and also in the third and fourth sessions of the Territorial Council, and the second session of the Territorial House of Representatives. They have two sons, Alexander Johnstone Irwin and John Nichol Irwin II. In 1917 he took a summer course at the Iowa University in Military Training and Tactics. Elected representative from the ninety-first district in 1926. Re-elected in 1928. A republican in politics.

BENJ. JAYCOX.—Representative from Delaware county, residence, Manchester, Iowa. He was born in Webster City, Iowa, and spent the early years of his life on a farm in Hamilton county. He received his education in the rural schools of the community and at Cedar Valley Seminary, at Osage, Iowa. He was in the grain, lumber and livestock business in Hamilton county until 1918 when he moved to his present residence in Delaware county. He has since been engaged in farming. He was married in 1894 to Anna S. Christenson (deceased), has four children; Ray I., George C., Emma C., and Ruth A. He is a member of the Congregational church, M. W. A. 7848, and A. F. & A. M. 547. Republican in politics.

J. H. JENSEN. Representative from Kossuth county, was born September 2, 1885, on a farm in Seneca township in the county which he now represents. He received his education in the rural schools of his county and at Luther college at Decorah, Iowa. Occupation is farming and live stock feeding. Was married June 7, 1917, to Inga Jorgenson of Winnebago county. Has one son, Teddy V. Jensen. He is a member of the Norwegian Lutheran church, the Iowa farm bureau federation and the Masonic lodge. A republican in politics.

FRANCIS JOHNSON.—Representative from Dickinson county, was born in Butler county, Iowa, August 6, 1890. His parents are F. H. and Anna Johnson of Terril, Iowa. Has lived at Terril since ten years of age. He was graduated from the Terril and Spirit Lake high schools and the college of law of Iowa State University. Was admitted to the bar in 1912. Married to Sara E. Thompson in 1914. In his home county he has served as president of the farm bureau, township clerk, member of the fortieth, fortieth extra, and forty-first general assemblies. Elected to the legislature in 1922, 1924, 1926 and 1928. He is actively engaged in farming and the breeding of Poland China hogs. Is a member of the Terril Methodist Episcopal church and the Richloyd lodge of A. F. and A. M. Republican in politics.

JOSEPH H. JOHNSON.—Representative from Marion county, was born on a farm in that county July 26, 1878. Attended the district school, graduated from Central college at Pella, Iowa, in 1902, and from the law department of the University of Chicago in 1905. Engaged in the general practice of law at Knoxville. He is presi-

dent of the board of education of the independent school district of Knoxville, a member of the national council of the Y. M. C. A., member of the state committee of the Y. M. C. A., a member of the Masonic lodge. Married Pearl Eastburn July 31, 1907, and has four children. Elected to legislature in 1924, re-elected in 1926 and 1928. Chosen speaker of the house of representatives of the forty-third general assembly. Republican in politics.

RAYMOND JOHNSON.—Representative from Keokuk county, was born in Richland, Keokuk county, Iowa, May 20, 1875. Attended school in Richland, graduated from the Richland high school and entered Cornell college in 1892, studying civil engineering. He then went to Iowa State College at Ames, where he graduated in the veterinary department in 1895. Married Kathryn M. Conner of Savannah, Mo., March 25, 1901. They have two children, Marie C. and Raymond O. He practiced the veterinary profession until August 1, 1899, when he was appointed veterinary inspector for the bureau of animal industry, United States Department of Agriculture. JOHN F. KLINE.—Representative from Davis county, was born in Wapello county, March 15, 1873. IRVING H. KNUDSON.—Representative from Hamilton county, was born April 27, 1896, at Jewell, Iowa. Received his education in the Jewell public schools, the Jewell Lutheran college, and the State University of Iowa. In February, 1919, he enlisted as a private in the World War, and was discharged in April, 1919, as sergeant first class. Upon leaving the service, he took a position with the State Bank at Jewell, and at the same time became a partner with his father, Gilbert Knudson, in the general and live-stock auction business. In the fall of 1921 he was married to Miss Leafy Bergum of Westby, Wisconsin. They have two sons, Irving Howard, born October, 1922, and John Gilbert, born March, 1928. He is a member of the Lutheran church; was president of the Jewell community club for two terms; is also a member of the Hawkeye Post No. 550 of the American Legion. Returning from the forty-first general assembly, he moved to Ellsworth, Iowa, where he took a position as vice-president of the State Bank of Ellsworth. During the same year he was elected president of the Hamilton county bankers association and elected a

director in the State Bank of Jewell, Jewell, Iowa. This same year he joined the Chris Christenson Post No. 598 of the American Legion, Ellsworth, Iowa, and has been a member ever since. He was elected state representative in 1924 and re-elected in 1926 and 1928. A republican in politics.

C. W. LAMB.—Representative from Dallas county, was born in Dallas county June 7, 1868. He received his education in the Panora and Redfield, Iowa, schools. Employed in the harness making trade two years. For many years has been engaged in extensive farming. He has held every township and school office in his community and has given much of his time to the duties of those positions. Was highly instrumental in placing a consolidated school at Redfield, Iowa. Appointed on important committees during the World War. Has always been affiliated with the republican party. A member of the Christian church. Elected representative in 1928.

E. M. LICHTY.—Representative from Black Hawk county, was born in Orange township, Black Hawk county, Iowa, February 2, 1867. When he was six months old his parents moved on the farm where he has lived continuously ever since, and which he now owns. He received his education in the rural schools and business college at Waterloo; married in 1889 to Emma Miller of Somerset county, Pennsylvania. To this union were born seven children, one of whom died in infancy. He has made farming his life work, always raising and feeding a large number of hogs, besides dairying and cattle feeding. After being elected to the fortieth general assembly he resigned as president of the consolidated school board, secretary and treasurer of the telephone company (which office he held for twenty years), township trustee, and chairman of township farm bureau. The three sons and son-in-law are working the several farms consisting of 680 acres on a fifty-fifty basis. In May, 1921, his wife died and in December, 1922, he married Clara Miller of Waterloo, Iowa. Served in the fortieth, fortieth extra, forty-first, forty-second and forty-third general assemblies. A republican in politics.

FRANK B. LOMAS.—Representative from Howard county, born at Cresco, Howard county, Iowa, December 20, 1876. A resident of Howard county all his life. Graduate of Cresco high school class of 1894. Has been actively engaged in the retail hardware business thirty-four years, continuing the business established by his father in 1873. Has been active in the hardware circles of the state for the past twenty years, twice serving as president of the Iowa retail hardware association. Served six years on the city council and two years as president of the Cresco community club. Married in 1901 to Miss Mary Farnsworth of Cresco. Have two children living, Baird and Mynette, one son, Craig, having died in 1926. Member of Congregational church, Masonic order and of the I. O. O. F. Elected state representative from the ninety-second district in 1928. Republican in politics.

FRED C. LOVRIEN.—Representative from Humboldt county, was born on a farm in Humboldt county, July 26, 1875. He graduated from the law department of the State University of Iowa and began his practice of law at Humboldt in June, 1897, in which work he has since continued, being a member of the firm of Lovrien & Lovrien. Interested in farms and is a firm believer in the ultimate success of the corn belt farmers. Married Jennie Bell French November 30, 1901. They have seven children, Esther Bell, Freda, Gladys, Russell, Alice, Carroll Hope and Arthur. They lost one son, Kenneth. Member of the Baptist church. A republican in politics.

MARION R. McCAULLEY.—Representative from Calhoun county, was born in Calhoun county June 4, 1894, son of F. M. and Margaret Barr McCauley. Attended and graduated from the rural schools and city schools of Lake City, Iowa. Attended Waterloo Business College, State University of Iowa, State University of Kentucky, and graduated LL.B. in 1915. In law partnership with Honorable John W. Jacobs, Lake City, Iowa, since graduation. Married in 1915 to Miss Blanche Hinton, Lake City, Iowa. Have one child, Marion R., Jr. Enlisted in regular army, World War; later commissioned as second lieutenant; holds rank of captain of infantry. Member of Masonic orders, including Shrine; Alpha Delta Sigma and Delta Chi national college fraternities. Member of American Legion; member of school board, independent school district, Lake City. Baptist in religion. County attorney of Calhoun county

two terms, city attorney Lake City several years. Elected representative in 1924. Member of forty-first, forty-second, forty-second extra, and forty-third general assemblies. Republican in politics.

D. R. McCREERY.—Representative from Linn county, was born on a farm near Cedar Rapids, February 14, 1881, and has lived in Linn county all his life, where he received his education in the public schools. Was married to Letitia M. Quass in 1906. Has always been actively engaged in farming and stock raising and is now a breeder of purebred Duroc Jersey swine. He was elected state representative in the November election, 1928, as a candidate of the republican party.

AZEL H. McILRATH.—Representative from Poweshiek county, born near Hartwick, Iowa, March 3, 1897, son of J. L. and Lizzie A. McIlrath. Graduated Grinnell high school in 1913, and Iowa State College in 1919. Chose live stock auctioneering as a profession in 1917. Volunteered for army service May 11, 1918. Discharged November 26, 1918. Made trip to France in 1919 in charge of shipment of 750 dairy cattle for French government. Married Gay M. Huston, of Grinnell, January 12, 1920. They have three children, Mildred, Paul and Margaret. Following the deflation he supplemented his sale work with other business activities. Editor of the Brooklyn Chronicle, September, 1923, to January, 1927. Member Congregational church, K. of P. and Masonic lodges, and Officers Reserve Corps, U. S. Army. Elected on republican ticket in 1926, succeeding his father. Re-elected in 1928.

J. E. McINTOSH.—Representative from Muscatine county, was born on a farm in Goshen township, Muscatine county, Atalissa, Iowa, October 15, 1868, where he lived until he reached the age of seventeen, attending the country school and Atalissa school. He graduated from the law department of the State University of Iowa in 1892, and is now practicing law in West Liberty of which town he was mayor for twelve years. Has been president of the Citizens Savings Bank continuously since its beginning in 1908 to the present time. He attends the Presbyterian church, is a thirty-second degree Mason, Odd Fellow, Knight of Pythias and Modern Woodman. Republican in politics.

J. E. McMILLAN.—Representative from Benton county, was born in Benton county, Iowa, November 16, 1860. Educated in common schools. He married Nora I. Pitts, November 2, 1882, and has five children, Leslie, Lawrence, Nancy, Glen and Wilhelmina. Has taken an active part in county and community affairs for many years. Was member of board of directors of Benton county, chairman of the township farm bureau most of the time since organized and served two years as vice-president. Was county chairman of the campaign for the eradication of bovine tuberculosis in Benton county. Has always been a booster for good roads. Made a King road drag when first invented by Mr. King of Missouri and dragged roads near his place for a number of years gratis before road officials thought of paying for road dragging. Served as a member of the legislature in forty-second, forty-second extra and forty-third general assemblies. Has been a member of the Prairie Creek Church of Christ for many years and is at present chairman of the board. A republican in politics.

HOWARD A. MATHEWS.—Representative from Des Moines county, was born on a farm September 27, 1866, attended district school and was graduated from the Danville, Iowa, high school in 1887. He was married to Miss Emma A. Gugeler, October 29, 1896. Four children were born to them, Alvin and Grace being married, the former living in Buffalo, New York, the latter at Danville, Iowa; George and Lorin live at home. Taught school twelve years in the fall and winter, working on a farm during the spring and summer. In 1899 he was elected county superintendent of schools and moved to Burlington. This office he held nine years. He was then elected principal of the Washington school, Burlington. Was unanimously re-elected the following year, but gave up school work and moved to the farm in the spring of 1910, which is now his home. He was elected state representative in 1922, 1924, 1926 and 1928. Elected speaker pro tempore of the forty-second and forty-third general assemblies. He is a member of the First Congregational church at Danville. A republican in politics.

GEO. E. MILLER.—Representative from Shelby county, was born November 6, 1876, in the same county which he represents in the legislature. Attended the district school and completed the high school course at Harlan, Iowa. He taught school five years in earlier life; has held various offices of trust in his township and county, acting as president of school board, assessor and county supervisor for nine years. He was elected representative in 1922, serving during the fortieth, fortieth extra, the forty-first, forty-second, forty-second extra and forty-third general assemblies. Was married in 1903 to Della Ramsey of Portsmouth, Iowa. They have three daughters. Mr. Miller has been engaged in active farming ever since married. Is a member of the Masonic order and is a Shriner. A democrat in politics.

A. H. MOUNCE.—Representative from Van Buren county, was born on a farm in Jewell county, Kansas, October 4, 1872. Was brought by his parents to Iowa in 1874. Received his education in rural schools and the Keosauqua high school. He was married December 23, 1896, at Center Point, Iowa, to Ida May Cross, now deceased. Was again married in 1926 to Ruie Sheets of Keosauqua, Iowa. Has four children: James Rex, Charles Roy, Arthur Merle and Lona Marguerite. Followed farming until January 1, 1913, when he was appointed deputy clerk of the district court of Van Buren county. Served four years and was then elected clerk of the district court and served six years, when he was again appointed deputy clerk and served four years and five months. Has also held the following offices: Township assessor, member of town council, secretary of school board and county chairman of republican central committee. Elected representative in 1928. A republican in politics.

C. H. NELSON.—Representative from Hancock county, was born December 12, 1859, in Denmark. He immigrated to the United States in the year 1871. He lived on a farm near Clear Lake, Iowa, for a period of approximately fifteen years. The following are some of the offices which he has held and still holds: He has been president of the Farmers Mutual Insurance Association over thirty years. He was one of the organizers of the Farmers Elevator of Garner, Iowa, and held office continually in this association twenty-one years. He has been holding office in the Farmers State Grain Dealers Association sixteen years. At present he is vice-president of the Farmers Elevator Insurance Association of Iowa. He was president for three years of the Farmers National Bank of Garner, and has served on the board of supervisors of Hancock county. He was assessor two terms and also president of the educational board of Concord township for the same period of time, and vice-president of the farm bureau of Hancock county. He followed the occupation of farming up to the year 1926, when he retired and moved to Garner.

FRED W. NELSON.—Representative from Story county. His parents came from Denmark in the late sixties and found employment soon after in the silver mining industry in the Carson Valley, state of Nevada. A few years later they moved to Iowa, located on a farm in Grant township, Story county, where the representative was born on April 7, 1886, and where he still resides. He received his early education in the rural schools and later at Highland Park college at Des Moines, Iowa, and Iowa State College. Was married to Edna H. Smith, February 22, 1911. Has four children, Avis Vere, Richard F., Robert L., and Donald L. Served as township clerk eighteen years, as board member of the Story county farm bureau four years, treasurer three years, and president three years. Is a member of the Nevada Lodge No. 99 A. F. and A. M. Was master of that order in 1926. Is also a member of Q. E. S. Served as a member and president of the North Grant consolidated school board. Is board member of local shipping association and farmers elevator company. Member of Nevada, Iowa, Rotary club. Awarded master farmer medal, January 13, 1927. Member of Lutheran church. Elected representative in 1928. Republican in politics.

JOHN EDMUND O'BRIEN.—Representative from Allamakee county, was one of the nine children of Michael Smith O'Brien and Henrietta Alice O'Brien. He was born in Oneida county, New York. Came to Allamakee county, Iowa, with his parents in September, 1870. He drove ox teams and worked on farms until 1884, when he went to northwestern Iowa and South Dakota and herded cattle. In 1891 and 1892

he worked as a carpenter at Sanborn, Rock Rapids and Sioux Falls. He also worked as a carpenter and builder in Birmingham, Alabama, and Jackson, Mississippi. In 1892 and 1893 he helped install exhibits at the exposition in Chicago and in May, 1893, was appointed as one of the Columbian Guards at the World's Columbian Exposition, Chicago. At the close of the exposition went to California. Put up Canadian exhibits at the Midwinter Exposition in Golden Gate Park in the winter of 1893 and 1894. In 1894 he returned to Waukon, Iowa, following the trade of contractor and builder until 1898. He was a member of Company "I", 49th Iowa National Guard for several years. A few days after war with Spain was declared he went to Pensacola, Florida, and enlisted May 5th, 1898, in the regular U. S. Navy for one year as first class petty officer. He was honorably discharged at the close of the war with Spain. Returned to Waukon. Was admitted to the bar in 1899 and in connection with practice of law engaged extensively in real estate business and was interested in stock ranch and farms in North Dakota and Iowa. GEORGE O'DONNELL.—Representative from Carroll county, was born in Stephenson county, Illinois. Came with his parents to Carroll county and lived on a farm five miles northwest of Carroll. Was township trustee of Maple River township six years, superintendent of road and road dragging eight years. Employed with Chicago & Northwestern railroad the last five years. Was elected state representative from the fifty-fifth district of Iowa on the democratic ticket from Carroll county to serve in the forty-third general assembly.

CREIGHTON J. ORR.—Representative from Clayton county. Born in Postville, Iowa, April 26, 1885. Moved with his parents when six years old, to Monona, Clayton county, Iowa, where he has since resided. Received his education in the public schools. Has been engaged in farming and is now in the mercantile business. Has served as township clerk and mayor. Was married June 9, 1909, to Jean McClelland of Monona. They have one son, Thomas M., born September, 1918. Member of I. O. O. F. and Masonic orders including Shrine. In politics he is a republican.

H. C. PATTISON.—Representative from Jefferson county, was born on a farm near Fairfield, Iowa, March 7, 1868. Farmer. Married Eliza Stout March 17, 1896, who died August 13, 1924. Had three children. Earl, deceased, and Paul and Edna still living. Served on the county board of supervisors, was secretary of the school board, township clerk and trustee, and director and treasurer of the Farmers Insurance company. Member of the Presbyterian church and Odd Fellows lodge. Elected representative in 1926. Re-elected in 1928. Republican in politics.

HARRY C. PAULSON.—Representative from Clinton county, was born in Clinton, Iowa, March 23, 1891. When nine years of age, he moved with his parents to a farm on the outskirts of the city. He was educated in the rural and city schools of Clinton county, attended Augustana College, Rock Island, Illinois, also Iowa State College at Ames. While at Ames he won a scholarship in a competitive judging contest. He owns his farm and is engaged in dairy farming. In 1916, he married Rachel Chapman, daughter of the Rev. R. K. Chapman of De Witt, Iowa, and has two sons, Eugene and Stanley. Elected to township office 1914-1916, and director of the farm bureau, 1928. He is a member of the Congregational church and of the Masonic order. Elected representative in 1928. A republican in politics.

CAROLYN CAMPBELL PENDRAY.—Representative from Jackson county, first woman to serve in the Iowa general assembly, was born at Mt. Pleasant, Henry county, Iowa, in 1881. Was educated in the public schools of Mt. Pleasant, graduating from the high school in 1899. Her professional record includes twenty years in educational work including seven years as county superintendent of schools of Henry county, Iowa. Was married to William James Pendray, of Mt. Pleasant and Oskaaloosa, in 1920. An active democratic party worker, having served in the capacities of county chairwoman for Jackson county and member of the state central committee as chairwoman for the second congressional district. Since 1923 her home

has been in Maquoketa, Jackson county, where she is a member of the Congregational church, P. E. O. and D. A. R. societies, and interested in other activities.

JAMES L. RANDALL.—Representative from Lucas county, was born October 14, 1877, of Scotch-Irish parents in Lucas county, Iowa. Received his education in the county schools. Grew to young manhood on a farm, and has always followed agricultural pursuits. He was married October 15, 1899, to Miss Marguerite Noland, formerly of Hardin county, Iowa. They are both members of the United Brethren church at Chariton, Iowa. In the fall of 1910 he purchased a farm of his own moving to this place in the spring of 1911. He was steward of the county farm four years, beginning in 1912. After moving back to the farm he was elected township assessor two terms. Was elected to the county board of supervisors, serving in that office three years, and was elected state representative in the fall of 1928.

Z. S. RATLIFF.—Representative from Henry county, was born November 25, 1862, in the county he now represents in the legislature. He received his education in the rural schools and Whittier college. He was married to Amelia Dorcis Kramling of Kahoka, Missouri, October 7, 1891. Has one son, Paul, who is operating the home farm. He has engaged in farming and banking. Resigned as member of the executive committee of Iowa farm bureau federation when becoming a candidate for the legislature. Is an active member of the Presbyterian church. Elected to the general assembly in 1924, re-elected in 1926 and 1928. A republican in politics.

ED RAWLINGS.—Representative from Monona county, was born in Platteville, Wisconsin in 1871. He came to Monona county, Iowa, in 1875. Received his education in the common schools until he reached the age of seventeen years, was then left to his own resources, both of his parents having passed away. Married Miss Effie Miller in 1896, who died January 8, 1929. They were the parents of four sons. He and his family have resided in Onawa for the past twenty-five years. He has held various offices, among them that of county sheriff for seven years. At the present time he is a member of the Onawa board of education; president of Monona, Harrison, and Crawford county fair circuit; president of Monona county farm bureau and treasurer of Monona County Mutual Fire Insurance Association; secretary and treasurer of the Illinois Central Elevator Company. In politics he is a democrat.

B. F. READ.—Representative from Warren county, was born December 25, 1865, on a farm near New Virginia. Educated in the public schools in New Virginia and spent two winters in Simpson College at Indianola, Iowa. Married in 1894 to Estella Jane Strock. Five children were born to them, Jarona, Olive, John Clark, Boyd Francis, and Leon Strock. They are all living except Boyd Francis who died in the spring of 1924 while attending the Des Moines University. Member of the Methodist church, Masonic lodge, Eastern Star and the I. O. O. F. Republican in politics and a member of the forty-third general assembly.

O. J. REIMERS.—Representative from Lyon county, was born March 16, 1878, in Scott county, Iowa. Came to Lyon county, Iowa, in 1885. Attended the district school and later the Rock Rapids high school. He then entered Northwestern Union college at Le Mars, Iowa, graduating after two years from their commercial course. Has completed a law course with the La Salle Extension University. Taught rural schools three years, and then took up the occupation of farming. Was married in 1905 to Ella Rohde of Inwood, Iowa. Has one daughter, Elva. Was secretary of a township school board fourteen years, secretary and director of the Farmers' Elevator Company of Alford, Iowa, fifteen years, president of the Lyon County Farm Bureau 1919-1923, and treasurer of the bureau in 1924. Was elected representative in 1924 on the democratic ticket and re-elected in 1926 and 1928. Member of the Congregational church, Masonic order, I. O. O. F. and other fraternal organizations.

WALTER B. RENO.—Representative from Polk county, was born in Des Moines, Iowa, March 8, 1899. He attended the Elmwood grade school and West High school, Des Moines, and was graduated from the law department of the University of Iowa at Iowa City, in 1923. He began the practice of law in Des Moines that year soon after graduation. Was married October 15, 1924, and has one child, a son. He is a member of the American Legion, Argonne Post, Des Moines.

WILLIAM S. RICE.—Representative from Clinton county, was born near Eivira, Clinton county, Iowa, March 3, 1865, the son of John F. and Eliza H. Rice. His parents were natives of Indiana county, Pennsylvania, who came to Iowa in 1864. In 1867 the family moved to the farm now owned and occupied by the subject of this sketch where he has since continuously made his home. He was educated in the local schools. Has been engaged in the occupation of farming all his life. He has been honored by being elected to the following offices: Secretary of school board, school director, township clerk, township assessor, county supervisor and state representative. He married Dorathea S. Christiansen of De Witt, Iowa, a native of the same county as himself. He is a member of the Lutheran church and the Masonic order, and is a republican in politics.

R. L. RUTLEDGE.—Representative from Webster county, was born on a farm near Fort Dodge, Iowa, in 1888. Was graduated from Fort Dodge high school in 1908; won a scholarship to Iowa State college in the state judging contest at the Iowa state fair in 1908. Entered Ames in fall of 1908, called home by sickness of father in the spring of 1912, and has operated the farm near Fort Dodge ever since, with the exception of seven months in the aviation service in 1918. Married in 1917 to Mabel Mears of Marshalltown, Iowa. Three girls, Jean, Ann and Alice. Interested in farm bureau work and agricultural activities before and since the war. Member of the international committee on agriculture of Kiwanis International. Elected representative from Webster county November 2, 1926, re-elected November 6, 1928.

JOHN RYDER.—Senior member of the house of representatives from Dubuque county, was born and reared in Dubuque, Iowa. He was educated in the parochial schools. He graduated from the Bayless Business College. For twenty-five years he was the junior member of the Ryder Brothers' wholesale grocery firm. In 1919, he organized the Ryder Realty Company and served as vice-president until January, 1925, when he retired from the firm. For the past fifteen years he has served as state chief ranger of the Catholic Order of Foresters of Iowa. In March, 1925, he was elected member of the board of education of the city of Dubuque and was appointed chairman of the finance committee. He was married in November, 1917, to Miss Anna L. Killeen, who died in May, 1923. He was elected to the general assembly November, 1924, re-elected in 1926 and 1928. A democrat in politics.

J. F. RYLANDER.—Representative from Marshall county, was born in Sweden March 29, 1876. Came to Marshall county, Iowa, in 1893. Was educated in the common and extension schools of the old country and the Friends Academy of Le Grand, Iowa. Married Gertie H. Johnson of Le Grand July 24, 1901, and in the spring of 1902 began operations on a rented farm in the Le Grand community. There are three children in the family, Lois H., Carl E., and Hilda Jeannette. Has always been interested in the farmer's problems and has given considerable assistance to the organization of the farm bureau in Iowa and Minnesota. Was a member of the board of directors of Marshall county farm bureau for a number of years. Was elected president for three terms, but declined the honor for the third term because of lack of time. Is a stockholder in the Central Iowa Fair Association and is now serving the second term as its president. Is an active member of the Friends Church and a republican in politics.

CARL W. H. SASS.—Representative from Woodbury county, was born in Sioux City, Woodbury county, Iowa, April 19, 1888. Attended grade and high school in Sioux City, Iowa. Was graduated from Morningside College in 1915 and from the law college of the University of Chicago in 1919. Spent seventeen months in the military service during the World War, receiving commission as second lieutenant in the field artillery. Has been in the general practice of law in Sioux City, Iowa, since 1919; also justice of the peace from 1921 to 1928. Is a member of the American Legion and Masonic orders. A republican in politics.

LEVI B. SHANNON.—Representative from Cass county, was born in Warren county, Iowa, March 28, 1877, the oldest son of James M. and Agnes Shannon. His father was a soldier in the Civil War, a member of the First Iowa Cavalry, Company D. Mr. Shannon was united in marriage to Maude A. Greenwood November 29, 1903. Two sons were born to this union, Howard J. and Elmo L. Mrs. Shannon

died January 22, 1920. He was later married to Mrs. Stella M. Wilson. Mr. Shannon entered the ministry while still in his teens. He is affiliated with the republican party and was elected to the legislature in 1928.

LEROY SHIELDS.—Representative from Clarke county, was born January 29, 1880, near Hopeville in Clarke county, Iowa, on a farm which he now owns and where he has continuously made his home. His parents came to Iowa in early childhood and knew the hardships of pioneer life. His father, J. H. C. Shields, was a veteran of the Civil War and a leader in all community interests. His mother, Frances Lawrence Shields, to whose pure life and gracious spirit he gladly pays tribute, is still living at the age of eighty-one. The subject of this sketch received his education in the local schools, was a teacher for four years, minister of the Christian church for three years, and held evangelistic meetings in several churches in the state. Recent years have been devoted exclusively to his live stock and farming interests. He is a charter member of the Clarke County Farm Bureau, member of the Masonic order, and the republican party.

LEONARD SIMMER.—Representative from Wapello county, was born in Wapello county, 1890. Graduate of public schools, Agency, Iowa, of Iowa Wesleyan college in 1914, of law school of State University of Iowa in 1920. Engaged in the practice of law in Ottumwa, Iowa, since 1920. President, Wapello Oil Company, Ottumwa, Iowa. Member of the forty-second and forty-third general assemblies. Married in 1915 to Agnes Shank of Agency, Iowa. Has four children.

GEORGE W. SMITH.—Representative from O'Brien county, was born in Richland county, Ohio, January 24, 1868, coming to Benton county, Iowa, in 1884. He was educated in the public schools of Ohio and Tilford Academy at Vinton, Iowa. Moved to Sioux county in 1889 and was married in 1890 to Effie Troutman of Benton county. Four sons were born to them, Clarence E., Orlo H., Jesse E., and Marvin W. Jesse E. died while in S. A. T. C., Morningside college, in 1918. Mr. Smith moved to O'Brien county in 1902, where he engaged in farming and the raising of purebred cattle and hogs. He retired from the farm in 1920 and has since lived in Paulliria, of which town he served as mayor for several years. He is a member of the M. E. church, a thirty-second degree Mason, a member of the Eastern Star and Modern Woodmen of America, and is a republican in politics. Member of the forty-first, forty-second, forty-second extra, and forty-third general assemblies.

FRANK J. SWANSON.—Representative from Plymouth county, was born in Sweden October 19, 1865. Came to America with his parents in 1869 stopping first in Chicago, Illinois, for nine months. Then in 1870 the family went further west, locating on a homestead in Union county, South Dakota. After receiving what education the country schools of that date could give, he spent three years in the University of South Dakota, after which he again returned to his father's farm and helped operate it. He married Betsey Johnson of Union county, South Dakota, in 1890. Bought a farm of his own and continued farming it until 1901. He moved to Plymouth county, Iowa, and was engaged in hardware and furniture business in Akron, Iowa, for several years. Was also general manager for the Farmers' Grain Company, of Akron, Iowa, for three years. At this writing, he operates his farm on a fifty-fifty plan with his tenant. He is a member of the farm bureau and belongs to the Masonic order. He is Lutheran by faith and republican in politics. Elected state representative in 1928.

CHAS. W. TAYLOR.—Representative from Audubon county, was born on a farm south of Victor, Iowa, January 29, 1878. Moved with his parents to Audubon county, October 10, 1881. Received his education in the rural schools of the county, and attended Drake University for a short time. From early manhood has been engaged in general farming, live stock breeding and feeding and is now operating a farm north of Audubon, Iowa. Has been township school treasurer for a number of years, and is a member of the Blue Chapter, and Knight Templar of the Masonic order. Was married to Gertrude Cozine May 27, 1903, to which union three daughters were born. Was elected to represent the thirty-fourth district in the forty-third general assembly in 1928. A democrat in politics.

SAMUEL R. TORGESON.—Representative from Worth county, was born in the county which he represents, May 28, 1892. He received his early education in the rural schools and at Waldorf college. In 1917, he received the Bachelor of Arts degree from St. Olof college. He married Miss Emma Dahl of Worth county. They have a son, Dean Nathan, born May 2, 1926. He is cashier of the Farmers Trust and Savings Bank of Joice, Iowa. Other positions which he holds are chairman of Worth county republican committee; member of county board of education; secretary of Waldorf College association. He is a member of the Lutheran church. He was elected to the legislature in 1926 and re-elected in 1928. He is a republican.

J. B. TRUAX.—Representative from Buchanan county, was born in Indiana in 1859. In 1864 he moved to Iowa with his parents who settled on a farm in the northern part of Buchanan county. He followed the occupation of farmer until 1884. He worked in a general store for a number of years, and in 1892 was elected county recorder for Buchanan county and served in that capacity twenty years. During that time he purchased a set of abstract books and followed that occupation until 1923. He was married at Hazleton, Iowa, November 7, 1880, to Ella O. Lawrence, and to them was born one daughter who is now the wife of A. J. Schuette, proprietor of the book store in Independence. Mr. Truax is a member of Independence Lodge No. 87, A. F. & A. M., and has been its secretary for twenty-eight years. He is also a member of O. E. S. and of the Methodist church. He has always been a republican in politics. He was elected representative of the sixty-seventh district in 1924 and re-elected in 1926 and 1928.

GEORGE J. VAN BUREN.—Representative from Jones county, was born on a farm in Hardin county, Iowa, March 18, 1882, and moved in 1884 to western Kansas with his parents, coming back to Black Hawk county, Iowa, in a prairie schooner in 1889. Graduated from Epworth Seminary in 1901 and Cornell college in 1904. For ten years thereafter he followed the professions of civil engineering in Mexico and teaching—having taught in Illinois and Arkansas high schools, Drury college and the Nebraska State Teachers' college. He has farmed in Jones county the past eleven years. Married to Eda May Cramer June 12, 1907, and has the following named children, John, Helen, Ruth and Paul. He is the past president of Jones county farm bureau, ex-chairman of Jones county republican central committee, a member of the Presbyterian church, Masonic lodge and O. E. S. A republican in politics.

G. E. VAN WERT.—Representative from Franklin county, was born in Grundy county, Iowa, August 13, 1880. He moved to Franklin county in the spring of 1888. He married Miss Mabel Hansell December 25, 1903. They have seven children: Lela, Mildred, J. S., Elsie Mae, Charles, Harriett and Howard. He is a member of the board of education, has served as township assessor, and is a director in the co-operative creamery, Farmers' Elevator Company, Franklin County Protective Association and for four years served as president of the county farm bureau. He is a member of the Church of Christ at Hampton, a republican in politics and a farmer. Elected state representative in 1928.

D. A. VAUGHN.—Representative from Ringgold county, was born on a farm in Fairfield county, Ohio, July 14, 1872. Moved with his parents and sister to Ringgold county, Iowa, in October, 1882. Received his education in the schools of the county and attended the old Shenandoah college for one term. From early manhood he has been engaged in general farming, live stock breeding and feeding. He has held a number of township and other offices of trust, is a member of all of the branches of the I. O. O. F. and Order of the Modern Woodmen. He was married to Susie E. Hutchinson of Benton, Iowa, in January, 1901, to which union eight children were born, seven of whom are living, Perry, Lela, Orlo, Ethel, Bernice, Viona and Merle. He was elected in 1926, re-elected in 1928. A republican in politics.

G. L. VENARD.—Representative from Sioux county, was born in Muscatine county, Iowa, August 7, 1860. His parents came from Indiana in 1856, taking up land in Muscatine county. Received his education in the rural schools. Attended the Wilton academy two years. Has been actively engaged in farming for the past twenty-eight years in Sioux county. Served on the board of education eighteen years, was township clerk fourteen years and assessor four years. Was elected representative in March, 1921, to fill vacancy, re-elected in 1922, 1924, 1926 and 1928.

GEORGE M. VOSSELLER.—Representative from Bremer county, was born on a farm in Lafayette township, Iowa, on February 15, 1874. Has resided on and now owns the farm on which he was born. Received his education in the public schools of Bremer county, and has been actively engaged in farming and stock raising all his life. Has been township clerk six years, director of his school twenty-eight years, president of the farm bureau and at present is director and auditor of the Farmers State Bank of Plainfield. Was married March 4, 1889, to Mamie Larkin, to which union four children were born, Earl, Loey and Edward, who are actively engaged in farming with their father, and Marjorie, who is a teacher in the public schools of Plainfield. Is a member of the Masonic order, and the M. W. A., and the Methodist church. Was elected representative in 1928. A republican in politics.

BREDE WAMSTAD.—Representative from Mitchell county, was born in that county April 17, 1878. Attended the rural schools and later the St. Ansgar seminary and institute. Graduated from the normal course in 1899. Married June 29, 1905, to Catherine Rone of Worth county, Iowa. Has one daughter, Constance. Appointed deputy county auditor of Mitchell county in 1903. Has been actively engaged in farming since the spring of 1906. Served as representative from Mitchell county during the thirty-ninth, fortieth, fortieth extra and forty-second general assemblies. A member of the Evangelical Lutheran church. Re-elected representative in 1928.

OTHA D. WEARIN.—Representative from Mills county, born on a farm near Hastings, Iowa, January 10, 1903. Attended country school, graduated from Tabor college academy in 1920, received B.A. degree from Grinnell college 1924. Associated in operation of Wearin farms and is still continuing in that capacity. Elected treasurer of rural school district. Has served as vice-president, secretary, and president of Mills county farm bureau. Delegate to Iowa state democratic convention 1924, 1926 and 1928. Assistant secretary of Iowa state democratic convention 1928. Traveled abroad in 1927 studying farm production and doing research in International Institute of Agriculture at Rome. Editor of weekly syndicate "An Iowa Farmer in Foreign Fields," 1927. Author, "An Iowa Farmer Abroad." Member, Iowa State Historical Society, Valley Forge Historical Society, and American Peace Foundation. A democrat in politics.

SAMUEL D. WHITING.—Representative from Johnson county, was born at Clermont, Fayette county, Iowa, May 16, 1875. Family moved to Iowa City in August, 1885. Graduated from Iowa City high school in 1892; from University of Iowa, liberal arts, 1896; and from Iowa university law school in 1904. Taught in rural schools of Johnson county and in the Shueyville high school, and served as county superintendent of Johnson county schools from 1897 to 1902. In 1904 was married to Miss Caroline Buresh. Has four children, three boys and one girl. Served on the Iowa City board of education six years. Past Grand of Eureka lodge, No. 44, I. O. O. F.; Past Patriarch of Good Samaritan encampment, No. 5; retired captain of Canton, Iowa City, No. 29; secretary of Will H. Dilg League of Iowa City. Member of First Congregational church of Iowa City. A democrat. Elected representative from Johnson county in 1928.

W. WALTER WILSON.—Representative from Tama county, was born at Franklin, Indiana, in 1869. At the age of six months he moved with his parents to Illinois. When four years of age he moved to Iowa in one of those historic prairie schooners, crossing the Mississippi on a ferry at Burlington, and settling in 1873 on a farm in Black Hawk county. After teaching school five terms he was married to S. Sophie Keeler and took up the business of farming for himself, first in Hamilton county, and later in Tama county. He has three children, Carl, Iris, and Dorothy. He has held the office of secretary of the Buckingham Grain Company since its organization and also the presidency of the Farmers' Lumber Company at Traer since its origin. He was president of the Tama county farm bureau when elected to the office of representative without opposition in November, 1922. He was re-elected in November, 1924, in 1926, and again in 1928. REPUBLICAN NATIONAL CONVENTION

The Republican national convention of 1928 convened June 12th at Kansas City and adjourned June 15th. Senator Simeon D. Fess of Ohio was temporary chairman, Senator George H. Moses of New Hampshire permanent chairman and Senator Reed Smoot of Utah chairman of the resolutions committee. There were 1,089 delegates.

PLATFORM OF THE REPUBLICAN PARTY, 1928

ADOPTED BY THE NATIONAL REPUBLICAN CONVENTION, KANSAS CITY, JUNE 14, 1928

The republican party in national convention assembled presents to the people of the nation this platform of its principles, based on a record of its accomplishments, and asks and awaits a new vote of confidence. We reaffirm our devotion to the constitution of the United States and the principles and institution of the American system of representative government.

THE NATIONAL ADMINISTRATION—We indorse without qualification the record of the Coolidge administration.

The record of the republican party is a record of advancement of the nation. Nominees of republican national conventions have for fifty-two of the seventy-two years since the creation of our party been the chief executives of the United States. Under republican inspiration and largely under republican executive direction the continent has been bound with steel rails, the oceans and great rivers have been joined by canals, waterways have been deepened and widened for ocean commerce, and with all a high American standard of wage and living has been established.

By unwavering adherence to sound principles, through the wisdom of republican policies and the capacity of republican administrations, the foundations have been laid and the greatness and prosperity of the country firmly established.

Never has the soundness of republican policies been more amply demonstrated and the republican genius for administration been better exemplified than during the last five years under the leadership of President Coolidge.

No better guaranty of prosperity and contentment among all our people at home, no more reliable warranty of protection and promotion of American interests abroad can be given than the pledge to maintain and continue the Coolidge policies. This promise we give and will faithfully perform.

Under this administration the country has been lifted from the depths of a great depression to a level of prosperity. Economy has been raised to the dignity of a principle of government. A standard of character in public service has been established under the chief executive which has given to the people of the country a feeling of stability and confidence so all have felt encouraged to proceed on new undertakings in trade and commerce. A foreign policy based on the traditional American position and carried on with vision and steadfastness has extended American influence throughout the world and everywhere promoted and protected American interests.

The mighty contribution to general well-being which can be made by a government controlled by men of character and courage, whose abilities are equal to their responsibilities is self-evident and should not bind us to the consequences which its loss would entail. Under this administration a high level of wages and living has been established and maintained. The door of opportunity has been opened wide to all. It has given to our people greater comfort and leisure, and the mutual profit has been evident in the increasingly harmonious relations between employers and employees, and the steady rise by promotion of the men in the shops to places at the council tables of the industries. It has also been made evident by the increasing enrollments of our youth in the technical schools and colleges, the increase in savings and life-insurance accounts, and by our ability as a people to lend the hand of succor not only to those overcome by disasters in our own country but in foreign lands. With all there has been a steady decrease in the burden of federal taxation, releasing to the people the greatest possible portion of the results of their labor from government exactions.

For the republican party we are justified in claiming a major share of the credit for the position which the United States occupies today as the most favored nation on the globe, but it is well to remember that the confidence and prosperity which we enjoy can be shattered, if not destroyed, if this belief in the honesty and sincerity of our government is in any way affected. A continuation of this great public peace of mind now existing, which makes for our material well-being, is only possible by holding fast to the plans and principles which have marked republican control.

The record of the present administration is a guaranty of what may be expected of the next. Our words have been made deeds. We offer not promises but accomplishments.

We stand for honesty in government, for the appointment of officials whose integrity can not be questioned. We deplore the fact that any official has ever fallen from this high standard and that certain American citizens of both parties have so far forgotten their duty as citizens as to traffic in national interests for private gain. We have prosecuted and shall always prosecute any official who subordinates his public duty to his personal interest.

THE RIGHTS OF THE STATES—We believe in the essential unity of the American people. Sectionalism in any form is destructive of national life. The federal government should zealously protect the national and international rights of its citizens. It should be equally zealous to respect and maintain the rights of the states and territories and to uphold the vigor and balance of our dual system of government. The republican party has always given its energies to supporting the government in this direction when any question has arisen.

There are certain other well-defined federal obligations, such as interstate commerce, the development of rivers and harbors, and the guarding and conservation of national resources. The effort which, however, is being continually made to have the federal government move into the field of state activities has never had, and never will have the support of the republican party. In the majority of the cases state citizens and officers are most pressing in their desire to have the federal gov-

ernment take over the state functions. This is to be deplored for it weakens the sense of initiative and creates a feeling of dependence which is unhealthy and unfortunate for the whole body politic.

There is a real need in the country today to revitalize fundamental principles; there is a real need of restoring the individual and local sense of responsibility and self-reliance; there is a real need for the people once more to grasp the fundamental fact that under our system of government they are expected to solve many problems themselves through their municipal and state governments, and to combat the tendency that is all too common to turn to the federal government as the easiest and least burdensome method of lightening their own responsibilities.

PUBLIC ECONOMY—The citizen and taxpayer has a natural right to be protected from unnecessary and wasteful expenditures. This is a rich but also a growing nation with constantly increasing legitimate demands for public funds. If we are able to spend wisely and meet these requirements, it is first necessary that we save wisely. Spending extravagantly not only deprives men through taxation of the fruits of their labor, but oftentimes means the postponement of vitally important public works. We commend President Coolidge for his establishment of this fundamental principle of sound administration and pledge ourselves to live up to the high standard he has set.

FINANCE AND TAXATION—The record of the United States treasury under Secretary Mellon stands unrivaled and unsurpassed. The finances of the nation have been managed with sound judgment. The financial policies have yielded immediate and substantial results.

In 1921 the credit of our government was at a low ebb. We were burdened with a huge public debt, a load of war taxes, which in variety and weight exceeded anything in our national life, while vast unfunded intergovernmental debts disorganized the economic life of the debtor nations and seriously affected our own by reason of the serious obstacles which they presented to commercial intercourse. This critical situation was evidenced by a serious disturbance in our own life which made for unemployment.

Today all these major financial problems have been solved.

THE PUBLIC DEBT—In seven years the public debt has been reduced by \$6,411,000,000. From March, 1921, to September, 1928, over \$11,000,000,000 of securities, bearing high rates of interest, will have been retired or refunded into securities bearing a low rate of interest, while Liberty bonds, which were selling below par, now command a premium. These operations have resulted in an annual saving in interest charges of not less than \$275,000,000, without which the most recent tax-reduction measure would not have been made possible. The republican party will continue to reduce our national debt as rapidly as possible and in accordance with the provision of existing laws and the present program.

TAX REDUCTION—Wise administrative management under republican control and direction has made possible a reduction of over a billion eight hundred million dollars a year in the tax bill of the American people. Four separate tax reduction measures have been enacted, and millions of those least able to pay have been taken from the tax rolls.

Excessive and uneconomic rates have been radically modified, releasing for industrial and pay-roll expansion and development great sums of money which formerly were paid in taxes to the federal government.

Practically all the war taxes have been eliminated and our tax system has been definitely restored to a peace-time basis.

We pledge our party to a continuation of these sound policies and to such further reduction of the tax burden as the condition of the treasury may from time to time permit.

TARIFF—We reaffirm our belief in the protective tariff as a fundamental and essential principle of the economic life of this nation. While certain provisions of the present law require revision in the light of changes in the world competitive situation since its enactment, the record of the United States since 1922 clearly shows that the fundamental protective principle of the law has been fully justified. It has stimulated the development of our natural resources, provided fuller employment at higher

wages through the promotion of industrial activity, assured thereby the continuance of the farmer's major market, and further raised the standards of living and general comfort and well-being of our people. The great expansion in the wealth of our nation during the past fifty years, and particularly in the past decade, could not have been accomplished without a protective tariff system designed to promote the vital interests of all classes.

Nor have these manifest benefits been restricted to any particular section of the country. They are enjoyed throughout the land either directly or indirectly. Their stimulus has been felt in industries, farming sections, trade circles, and communities in every quarter. However, we realize that there are certain industries which can not now successfully compete with foreign producers because of lower foreign wages and a lower cost of living abroad, and we pledge the next republican congress to an examination and where necessary a revision of these schedules to the end that American labor in these industries may again command the home market, may maintain its standard of living, and may count upon steady employment in its accustomed field.

Adherence to that policy is essential for the continued prosperity of the country. Under it the standard of living of the American people has been raised to the highest levels ever known. Its example has been eagerly followed by the rest of the world whose experts have repeatedly reported with approval the relationship of this policy to our prosperity, with the resultant emulation of that example by other nations.

A protective tariff is as vital to American agriculture as it is to American manufacturing. The republican party believes that the home market, built up under the protective policy, belongs to the American farmer, and it pledges its support of legislation which will give this market to him to the full extent of his ability to supply it. Agriculture derives large benefits not only directly from the protective duties levied on competitive farm products of foreign origin but also, indirectly, from the increase in the purchasing power of American workmen employed in industries similarly protected. These benefits extend also to persons engaged in trade, transportation, and other activities.

The tariff act of 1922 has justified itself in the expansion of our foreign trade during the past five years. Our domestic exports have increased from 3.8 billions of dollars in 1922 to 4.8 billions in 1927. During the same period imports have increased from 3.1 billions to 4.4 billions. Contrary to the prophesies of its critics, the present tariff law has not hampered the natural growth in the exportation of the products of American agriculture, industry, and mining, nor has it restricted the importation of foreign commodities which this country can utilize without jeopardizing its economic structure.

The United States is the largest customer in the world today. If we were not prosperous and able to buy, the rest of the world also would suffer. It is inconceivable that American labor will ever consent to the abolition of protection, which would bring the American standard of living down to the level of that in Europe, or that the American farmer could survive if the enormous consuming power of the people in this country were curtailed and its market at home, if not destroyed, at least seriously impaired.

FOREIGN DEBTS—In accordance with our settled policy and platform pledges, debt settlement agreements have been negotiated with all of our foreign debtors with the exception of Armenia and Russia. That with France remains as yet unratified. Those with Greece and Austria are before the congress for necessary authority. If the French debt settlement be included, the total amount funded is \$11,522,354,000. We have steadfastly opposed and will continue to oppose cancellation of foreign debts.

We have no desire to be oppressive or grasping, but we hold that obligations justly incurred should be honorably discharged. We know of no authority which would permit public officials, acting as trustees, to shift the burden of the war from the shoulders of foreign taxpayers to those of our own people. We believe that the settlements agreed to are fair to both the debtor nation and to the American taxpayer. Our debt commission took into full consideration the economic condition and resources of the debtor nations, and were ever mindful that they must be permitted to preserve and improve their economic position, to bring their budgets into balance, to place their currencies and finances on a sound basis, and to improve the standard of living of their people. Giving full weight to these considerations, we know of no fairer test than ability to pay, justly estimated.

The people can rely on the republican party to adhere to a foreign-debt policy now definitely established and clearly understood both at home and abroad.

SETTLEMENT OF WAR CLAIMS—A satisfactory solution has been found for the question of war claims.

Under the act approved by the president on March 10, 1928, a provision was made for the settlement of war claims of the United States and its citizens against the German, Austrian, and Hungarian governments, and of the claims of the nationals of these governments against the United States, and for the return to its owners of the property seized by the alien property custodian during the war, in accordance with our traditional policy of respect for private property.

FOREIGN POLICIES—We approve the foreign policies of the administration of President Coolidge. We believe they express the will of the American people in working actively to build up cordial international understanding that will make world peace a permanent reality. We indorse the proposal of the secretary of state for a multilateral treaty proposed to the principal powers of the world, and open to the signatures of all nations, to renounce war as an instrument of national policy and declaring in favor of pacific settlement of international disputes, the first step in outlawing war. The idea has stirred the conscience of mankind and gained widespread approval both of governments and of the people, and the conclusion of the treaty will be acclaimed as the greatest single step in history toward the conservation of peace.

In the same endeavor to substitute for war the peaceful settlement of international disputes the administration has concluded arbitration treaties in a form more definite and more inclusive than ever before, and plans to negotiate similar treaties with all countries willing in this manner to define their policy peacefully to settle justifiable disputes. In connection with these, we indorse the resolution of the sixth Pan American Conference, held at Havana, Cuba, in 1928, which called a conference on arbitration and conciliation to meet in Washington during the year, and express our earnest hope that such conference will greatly further the principles of international arbitration. We shall continue to demand the same respect and protection for the persons and property of American citizens in foreign countries that we cheerfully accord in this country to the persons and property of aliens.

The commercial treaties which we have negotiated and those still in the process of negotiation are based on strict justice among nations, equal opportunity for trade and commerce on the most favored-nation principle, and are simplified so as to eliminate the danger of misunderstanding. The object and the aim of the United States is to further the cause of peace, of strict justice between nations, with due regard for the rights of others in all international dealings. Out of justice grows peace. Justice and consideration have been and will continue to be the inspiration of our nation.

The record of the administration toward Mexico has been consistently friendly and with equal consistency have we upheld American rights. This firm and at the same time friendly policy has brought recognition of the inviolability of legally acquired rights. This condition has been reached without threat or without bluster, through a calm support of the recognized principles of international law, with due regard to the rights of a sister sovereign state. The republican party will continue to support American rights in Mexico as elsewhere in the world and at the same time to promote and strengthen friendship and confidence.

There has always been, as there always will be, a firm friendship with Canada. American and Canadian interests are in a large measure identical. Our relationship is one of fine mutual understanding, and the recent exchange of diplomatic officers between the two countries is worthy of commendation.

The United States has an especial interest in the advancement and progress of all the Latin American countries. The policy of the republican party will always be a policy of thorough friendship and co-operation. In the case of Nicaragua, we are engaged in co-operation with the government of that country upon the task of assisting to restore and maintain peace, order, and stability, and in no way to infringe upon her sovereign rights. The marines now in Nicaragua are there to protect American lives and property and to aid in carrying out an agreement whereby we have undertaken to do what we can to restore and maintain order and to

insure a fair and free election. Our policy absolutely repudiates any idea of conquest or exploitation and is actuated solely by an earnest and sincere desire to assist a friendly and neighboring state which has appealed for aid in a great emergency. It is the same policy the United States has pursued in other cases in Central America.

The administration has looked with keen sympathy on the tragic events in China. We have avoided interference in the internal affairs of that unhappy nation merely keeping sufficient naval and military forces in China to protect the lives of the Americans who are there on legitimate business and in still larger numbers for nobly humanitarian reasons. America has not been stampeded into making reprisals but, on the other hand, has consistently taken the position of leadership among the nations in a policy of wise moderation. We shall always be glad to be of assistance to China when our duty is clear.

The republican party maintains the traditional American policy of non-interference in the political affairs of other nations. This government has definitely refused membership in the League of Nations and to assume any obligations under the covenant of the league.

On this we stand.

In accordance, however, with the long-established American practice of giving aid and assistance to other peoples, we have most usefully assisted by co-operation in the humanitarian and technical work undertaken by the league, without involving ourselves in European politics by accepting membership.

The republican party has always given and will continue to give its support to the development of American foreign trade, which makes for domestic prosperity. During this administration extraordinary strides have been made in opening up new markets for American produce and manufacture. Through these foreign contacts a mutually better international understanding has been reached which aids in the maintenance of world peace.

The republican party promises a firm and consistent support of American persons and legitimate American interests in all parts of the world. This support will never contravene the rights of other nations. It will always have in mind and support in every way the progressive development of international law, since it is through the operation of just laws, as well as through the growth of friendly understanding, that world peace will be made permanent. To that end the republican party pledges itself to aid and assist in the perfection of principles of international law and the settlement of international disputes.

CIVIL SERVICE—The merit system in government service originated with and has been developed by the republican party. The great majority of our public-service employees are now secured through and maintained in the government-service rules. Steps have already been taken by the republican congress to make the service more attractive as to wages and retirement privileges, and we commend what has been done as a step in the right direction.

AGRICULTURE—The agricultural problem is national in scope and, as such, is recognized by the republican party, which pledges its strength and energy to the solution of the same. Realizing that many farmers are facing problems more difficult than those which are the portion of many other basic industries, the party is anxious to aid in every way possible. Many of our farmers are still going through readjustment, a relic of the years directly following the great war. All the farmers are being called on to meet new and perplexing conditions created by foreign competition, the complexities of domestic marketing, labor problems, and a steady increase in local and state taxes.

The general depression in a great basic industry inevitably reacts upon the conditions in the country as a whole and can not be ignored. It is a matter of satisfaction that the desire to help in the correction of agricultural wrongs and conditions is not confined to any one section of our country or any particular group.

The republican party and the republican administration, particularly during the last five years, have settled many of the most distressing problems as they have arisen, and the achievements in aid of agriculture are properly a part of this record. The republican congresses have been most responsive in the matter of agricultural appropriations, not only to meet crop emergencies, but for the extension and development of the activities of the department of agriculture.

The protection of the American farmer against foreign farm competition and foreign trade practices has been vigorously carried on by the department of state. The right of the farmers to engage in collective buying and co-operative selling as provided for by the Capper-Volstead Act of 1922 has been promulgated through the department of agriculture and the department of justice, which have given most valuable aid and assistance to the heads of the farm organizations. The treasury department and the proper committees of congress have lightened the tax burden on farming communities, and through the federal farm-loan system there has been made available to the farmers of the nation \$1,850,000,000 for loaning purposes at a low rate of interest, and through the intermediate-credit banks \$655,000,000 of short-term credits have been made available to the farmers. The post office department has systematically and generously extended the rural free delivery routes into even the most sparsely settled communities.

When a shortage of transportation facilities threatened to deprive the farmers of their opportunity to reach waiting markets overseas, the president, appreciative and sensitive of the condition and the possible loss to the communities, ordered the reconditioning of shipping board vessels, thus relieving a great emergency.

Last, but not least, the federal tariff commission has at all times shown a willingness under the provisions of the flexible tariff act to aid the farmers when foreign competition, made possible by low wage scales abroad, threatened to deprive our farmers of their domestic markets. Under this act the president has increased duties on wheat, flour, mill feed, and dairy products. Numerous other farm products are now being investigated by the tariff commission.

We promise every assistance in the reorganization of the marketing system on sounder and more economical lines and, where diversification is needed, government financial assistance during the period of transition.

The republican party pledges itself to the enactment of legislation creating a federal farm board clothed with the necessary powers to promote the establishment of a farm marketing system of farmer owned and controlled stabilization corporations or associations to prevent and control surpluses through orderly distribution.

We favor adequate tariff protection to such of our agricultural products as are affected by foreign competition.

We favor, without putting the government into business, the establishment of a federal system of organization for co-operative and orderly marketing of farm products.

The vigorous efforts of this administration toward broadening our exports market will be continued.

The republican party pledges itself to the development and enactment of measures which will place the agricultural interests of America on a basis of economic equality with other industries to insure its prosperity and success.

MINING—The money value of the mineral products of the country is second only to agriculture. We lead the countries of the world in the production of coal, iron, copper, and silver. The nation suffers as a whole from any disturbance in the securing of any one of these minerals, and particularly when the coal supply is affected. The mining industry has always been self-sustaining, but we believe that the government should make every effort to aid the industry by protection by removing any restrictions which may be hampering its development and by increased technical and economic research investigations which are necessary for its welfare and normal development. The party is anxious, hopeful, and willing to assist in any feasible plan for the stabilization of the coal-mining industry which will work with justice to the miners, consumers, and producers.

HIGHWAYS—Under the federal aid road act, adopted by the republican congress in 1921, and supplemented by generous appropriations each year, road construction has made greater advancement than for many decades previous. Improved highway conditions is a gauge of our rural developments and our commercial activity. We pledge our support to continued appropriations for this work commensurate with our needs and resources.

We favor the construction of roads and trails in our national forests necessary to their protection and utilization. In appropriations therefor the taxes which these lands would pay if taxable should be considered as a controlling factor.

LABOR—The labor record of the republican party stands unchallenged. For fifty-two of the seventy-two years of our national existence republican administrations have prevailed. Today American labor enjoys the highest wage and the highest standard of living throughout the world. Through the saneness and soundness of republican rule the American workman is paid a "real wage" which allows comfort for himself and his dependents, and an opportunity and leisure for advancement. It is not surprising that the foreign workman, whose greatest ambition still is to achieve a "living wage," should look with longing toward America as the goal of his desires.

The ability to pay such wages and maintain such a standard comes from the wisdom of the protective legislation which the republican party has placed upon the national statute books, the tariff which bars cheap foreign-made goods from the American market and provides continuity of employment for our workmen and fair profits for the manufacturers, the restriction of immigration which not only prevents the glutting of our labor market, but allows to our newer immigrants a greater opportunity to secure a footing in their upward struggle.

The party favors freedom in wage contracts, the right of collective bargaining by free and responsible agents of their own choosing, which develops and maintains that purposeful co-operation which gains its chief incentive through voluntary agreement.

We believe that injunctions in labor disputes have in some instances been abused and have given rise to a serious question for legislation.

The republican party pledges itself to continue its efforts to maintain this present standard of living and high wage scale.

TRANSPORTATION—Prompt and effective railroad service at the lowest rates which will provide for its maintenance and allow a reasonable return to the investor so they may be encouraged to advance new capital for acquired developments, has long been recognized by the republican party as a necessity of national existence.

We believe that the present laws under which our railroads are regulated are soundly based on correct principles, the spirit of which must always be preserved. Because, however, of changes in the public demands, trade conditions, and of the character of the competition, which even the greatest railroads are now being called upon to meet, we feel that in the light of this new experience possible modifications or amendments, the need of which is proved, should be considered.

The republican party initiated and set in operation the interstate commerce commission. This body has developed a system of railroad control and regulation which has given to the transportation public an opportunity not only to make suggestions for the improvement of railroad service, but to protest against discriminatory rates or schedules. We commend the work which that body is accomplishing under mandate of law in considering these matters and seeking to distribute equitably the burden of transportation between commodities based on their ability to bear the same.

COMMERCIAL AVIATION—Without governmental grants or subsidies and entirely by private initiative the nation has made extraordinary advances in the field of commercial aviation. Over 20,000 miles of airmail service privately operated are now being flown daily, and the broadening of this service is an almost weekly event. Because of our close relations with our sister republics on the south and our neighbor on the north it is fitting our first efforts should be to establish an air communication with Latin America and Canada.

The achievements of the aviation branches of the army and navy are all to the advantage of commercial aviation, and in the Mississippi flood disaster the work performed by civil and military aviators was of inestimable value.

The development of a system of aircraft registration, inspection, and control is a credit to the republican administration, which, quick to appreciate the importance of this new transportation development, created machinery for its safeguarding.

MERCHANT MARINE—The republican party stands for the American-built, American-owned, and American-operated merchant marine. The enactment of the White-Jones bill is in line with a policy which the party has long advocated.

Under this measure, substantial aid and encouragement are offered for the building in American yards of new and modern ships which will carry the American flag.

The republican party does not believe in government ownership or operation, and stands specifically for the sale of the present government vessels to private owners

when appropriate arrangements can be made. Pending such a sale, and because private owners are not ready as yet to operate on certain of the essential trade routes, the bill enacted allows the maintenance of these necessary lines under government control till such transfer can be made.

WATERWAYS AND FLOOD CONTROL—Cheaper transportation for bulk goods from the midwest agricultural sections to the sea is recognized by the republican party as a vital factor for the relief of agriculture. To that end we favor the continued development in inland and in intracoastal waterways as an essential part of our transportation system.

The republican administration during the last four years initiated the systematic development of the Mississippi system of inland transportation lanes, it proposes to carry on this modernization of transportation to speedy completion. Great improvements have been made during this administration in our harbors, and the party pledges itself to continue these activities for the modernization of our national equipment.

The Mississippi valley flood, in which 700,000 of our fellow citizens were placed in peril of life, and which destroyed hundreds of millions of dollars' worth of property, was met with energetic action by the republican administration.

During this disaster the president mobilized every public and private agency under the direction of Secretary Hoover, of the department of commerce, and Dwight Davis, the secretary of war. Thanks to their joint efforts, a great loss of life was prevented, and everything possible was done to rehabilitate the people in their homes and to relieve suffering and distress.

Congress promptly passed legislation authorizing the expenditure of \$325,000,000 for the construction of flood-control works, which it is believed will prevent the recurrence of such a disaster.

RADIO—We stand for the administration of the radio facilities of the United States under wise and expert government supervision, which will—

First. Secure to every home in the nation, whether city or country, the great educational and inspirational values of broadcast programs, adequate in number and varied in character; and

Second. Assign the radio communication channels—regional, continental, and transoceanic—in the best interest of the American business man, the American farmer, and the American public generally.

VETERANS—Our country is honored whenever it bestows relief on those who have faithfully served its flag. The republican party, appreciative of this solemn obligation and honor, has made its sentiments evident in congress. Our expenditures for the benefit of all our veterans now aggregate \$750,000,000 annually. Increased hospital facilities have been provided, payments in compensation have more than doubled, and in the matter of rehabilitations, pensions, and insurance, generous provision has been made. The administration of laws dealing with the relief of veterans and their dependents has been a difficult task, but every effort has been made to carry service to the veteran and bring about not only a better and generous interpretation of the law, but a sympathetic consideration of the many problems of the veteran. Full and adequate relief for our disabled veterans is our aim, and we commend the action of congress in further liberalizing the laws applicable to veterans' relief.

PUBLIC UTILITIES—Republican congresses and administrations have steadily strengthened the interstate commerce commission. The protection of the public from exactions or burdens in rates for service by reason of monopoly control, and the protection of the smaller organizations from suppression in their own field, has been a fundamental idea in all regulatory enactments. While recognizing that at times federal regulations might be more effective than state regulations in controlling intrastate utilities, the party favors and has sustained state regulations, believing that such responsibility in the end will create a force of state public opinion which will be more effective in preventing discriminations and injustices.

CONSERVATION AND RECLAMATION—We believe in the practical application of the conservation principle by the wise development of our natural resources. The measure of development is our national requirement, and avoidance of waste so that future generations may share in this natural wealth. The republican policy is to prevent monopolies in the control and utilization of natural resources. Under the general leasing law, enacted by a republican congress, the ownership of the mineral estate

remains in the government, but development occurs through private capital and energy. Important for the operation of this law is the classification and appraisal of public lands according to their mineral content and value. Over 500,000,000 acres of public land have been thus classified.

To prevent wasteful exploitation of our oil products, President Coolidge appointed an oil conservation board, which is now conducting an inquiry into all phases of petroleum production in the effort to devise a national policy for the conservation and proper utilization of our oil resources.

The republican party has been forehanded in assuring the development of water power in accordance with public interest. A policy of permanent public retention of the power sites on public land and power privileges in domestic and international navigable streams and one-third of the potential water-power resources in the United States on public domain has been assured by the federal water powers act, passed by a republican congress. Federal reclamation of arid lands is a republican policy, adopted under President Roosevelt, carried forward by succeeding republican presidents, and put upon a still higher plane of efficiency and production by President Coolidge. It has increased the wealth of the nation and made the west more prosperous.

An intensive study of the methods and practices of reclamation has been going on for the past four years under the direction of the department of the interior in an endeavor to create broader human opportunities and their financial and economic success. The money value of the crops raised on reclamation projects is showing a steady and gratifying increase, as well as the number of farms and people who have settled on the lands.

The continuation of a surplus of agricultural products in the selling markets of the world has influenced the departments to a revaluation of plans and projects. It has adopted a ten-year program for the completion of older projects and will hold other suggestions in abeyance until the surveys now under way as to the entire scope of the work are completed.

LAW ENFORCEMENT—We reaffirm the American constitutional doctrine as announced by George Washington in his farewell address, to-wit:

"The constitution, which at any time exists until changed by the explicit and authentic act by the whole people, is sacredly obligatory upon all."

We also reaffirm the attitude of the American people toward the federal constitution as declared by Abraham Lincoln:

"We are by both duty and inclination bound to stick by that constitution in all its letters and spirit from beginning to end. I am for the honest enforcement of the constitution. Our safety, our liberty, depends upon preserving the constitution of the United States, as our forefathers made it inviolate."

The people, through the method provided by the constitution, have written the eighteenth amendment into the constitution. The republican party pledges itself and its nominees to the observance and vigorous enforcement of this provision of the constitution.

FEDERAL EMPLOYEES—The government today is made up of thousands of conscientious, earnest, self-sacrificing men and women, whose single thought is service to the nation.

We pledge ourselves to maintain and, if possible, to improve the quality of this great company of federal employees.

CAMPAIGN EXPENDITURES—Economy, honesty, and decency in the conduct of political campaigns are a necessity if representative government is to be preserved to the people and political parties are to hold the respect of the citizens at large.

The campaign of 1924 complied with all these requirements. It was a campaign the expenses of which were carefully budgeted in advance, and which at the close presented a surplus and not a deficit.

There will not be any relaxing of resolute endeavor to keep our elections clean, honest, and free from taint of any kind. The improper use of money in governmental and political affairs is a great national evil. One of the most effective remedies for this abuse is publicity in all matters touching campaign contributions and expenditures. The republican party, beginning not later than August 1, 1928, and every thirty days thereafter—the last publication being not later than five days before the election—will file with the committees of the house and senate a com-

plete account of all contributions, the names of the contributors, the amounts expended, and for what purposes, and will at all times hold its records and books touching such matters open for inspection.

The party further pledges that it will not create, or permit to be created, any deficit which shall exist at the close of the campaign.

IMMIGRATION—The republican party believes that in the interest of both native and foreign born wage earners it is necessary to restrict immigration. Unrestricted immigration would result in widespread unemployment and in the breakdown of the American standard of living. Where, however, the law works undue hardship by depriving the immigrant of the comfort and society of those bound by close family ties, such modification should be adopted as will afford relief.

We commend congress for correcting defects for humanitarian reasons and for providing an effective system of examining prospective immigrants in their home countries.

The priceless heritage of American citizenship is our greatest gift to our friends of foreign birth. Only those who will be loyal to our institutions, who are here in conformity with our laws, and who are in sympathy with our national traditions, ideals, and principles should be naturalized.

NAVY—We pledge ourselves to round out and maintain the navy in all types of combatant ships to the full ratio provided for the United States by the Washington treaty for the limitation of naval armament and any amendment thereto.

HAWAII—ALASKA—We favor a continuance for the Territory of Hawaii of federal assistance in harbor improvements, the appropriation of its share of federal funds, and the systematic extension of the settlement of public lands by the Hawaiian race.

We indorse the policy of the present administration with reference to Alaska and favor a continuance of the constructive development of the territory.

WOMEN AND PUBLIC SERVICE—Four years ago at the republican national convention in Cleveland women members of the national committee were welcomed into full association and responsibility in party management. During the four years which have passed they have carried with their men associates an equal share of all responsibilities, and their contribution to the success of the 1924 campaign is well recognized.

The republican party, which from the first has sought to bring this development about, accepts whole-heartedly equality on the part of the women, and in the public service it can present a record of appointments of women in the legal, diplomatic, judicial, treasury, and other governmental departments. We earnestly urge on the women that they participate even more generally than now in party management and activity.

NATIONAL DEFENSE—We believe that in time of war the nation should draft for its defense not only its citizens but also every resource which may contribute to success. The country demands that should the United States ever again be called upon to defend itself by arms, the president be empowered to draft such material resources and such services as may be required, and to stabilize the prices of services and essential commodities, whether utilized in actual warfare or private activity.

OUR INDIAN CITIZENS—National citizenship was conferred upon all native-born Indians in the United States by the general Indian enfranchisement act of 1924. We favor the creation of a commission to be appointed by the president, including one or more Indian citizens, to investigate and report to congress upon the existing system of the administration of Indian affairs and to report any inconsistencies that may be found to exist between that system and the rights of the Indian citizens of the United States. We also favor the repeal of any law and the termination of any administrative practice which may be inconsistent with Indian citizenship, to the end that the federal guardianship existing over the persons and properties of Indian tribal communities may not work a prejudice to the personal and property rights of Indian citizens of the United States. The treaty and property rights of the Indians of the United States must be guaranteed to them.

THE NEGRO—We renew our recommendation that the congress enact at the earliest possible date a federal antilynching law so that the full influence of the federal government may be wielded to exterminate this hideous crime.

REPUBLICAN STATE PLATFORM

(Adopted at Republican State Convention Held in Des Moines, Iowa, July 18, 1928)

WE, the republicans of Iowa in convention assembled do hereby renew our faith in the principles of the republican party, and reaffirm our support of those principles and of the candidates nominated on the republican ticket.

We heartily endorse the republican platform adopted by the republican national convention at Kansas City, Missouri, and pledge our support to the Honorable Herbert Hoover, candidate for president of the United States, and the Honorable Charles Curtis, our nominee for vice-president. In the selection of Herbert Hoover we have as our standard bearer one of the great men of this generation. His splendid administrative genius, unassailable honesty, power of organization and leadership, mark him as one of the world's great citizens. Our candidate is an Iowa product, with a heritage of the best ideas and ideals that predominate in this state. Our candidate for vice-president is a product of the prairies of our neighboring state of Kansas; their interests while nationwide and worldwide are as well our interests, and ours are theirs. With this heritage, with their ideals, we commend them to the people of this state, with full assurance that under their leadership, the problems confronting us will be solved as under prior republican administrations constructive legislation has been enacted, and sometimes slowly and always surely, the best solution of our nation's difficulties has been reached.

We take justifiable pride in the achievement of the republican party in reducing the tax burdens in both state and nation, calling especial attention to the reduction of our national debt bequeathed to the republican administration by the democratic ad-

ministration that preceded it, and to the fact that under careful and wise management by the republican state administration and general assembly the state taxes have been substantially reduced here in Iowa.

We express our confidence in Governor John Hammill, and our appreciation of his services to the state of Iowa, and heartily endorse his candidacy for re-election.

The conduct of the other departments of the state administration deserve and receive the commendation of the people of Iowa, and we hereby pledge our support to the entire republican state ticket.

We condemn corruption and dishonesty in office wherever found and commend the energetic efforts that have been and are being made to prosecute and punish those responsible for such offenses, and we express our determination to resist all efforts upon the part of the notoriously corrupt Tammany organization of the city of New York to fasten itself upon our nation.

HIGHWAYS—The people of Iowa want and must have good roads. The primary road system should be completed at the earliest practicable date. The road user should pay for these roads, and without the levying of any property tax.

Our secondary roads should also be improved so as to supplement the primary road system in providing necessary lines of travel between market points and in providing adequate means of all-weather farm-to-market transportation. To that end, and without an increase in taxes, we recommend the adoption of a comprehensive secondary road program.

CONSERVATION—The conservation of the natural resources of our state, the preservation and improvement of its streams, lakes and public parks for the benefit of our own and succeeding generations, is a matter of the greatest concern, and we commend the wise policy adopted by our legislature in providing for the perpetuation and preservation of our public waters and other places of scientific, historical and recreational interest to our people, and we recommend that this policy be continued and that future legislatures provide adequate means and facilities for carrying on more fully and completely the work of conservation.

PROHIBITION—We heartily endorse the resolution on federal prohibition adopted by the republican national convention at Kansas City. We condemn the candidate of the democratic party for his attitude on nullification of federal prohibition in his own state and for his interest in modification of our present laws as shown by his first public statement after his nomination. We pledge the republican party of Iowa and its nominees to the observance and enforcement of the prohibition laws of this state and to their assistance in the enforcement of our federal laws.

LABOR—We reaffirm the traditional friendship of the republican party for labor, and urge such legislation as will continue to conserve the American standard of wages and the American standard of living for those who toil.

We urge the passage of such legislation as will define the issuance of injunctions in labor disputes. We stand committed to the principles of the right of labor to organize and collective bargaining. We favor a continuance of our present restrictive immigration policy.

We suggest that some method of the stabilization of the coal industry be found.

We favor any and all sane legislative enactments as will insure adequate compensation at all times for those who help produce the wealth of the nation.

WATERWAYS—Whereas, the question of transportation rates is vital to the state of Iowa, as we are further from world markets than any agricultural section of the world, and

Whereas, transportation rates affect the price of everything we buy and everything we sell,

Now, therefore, we earnestly urge that the United States government make rapid and adequate appropriations for the completion of a great continuous system of navigable inland waterways, including the Missouri, Mississippi and Illinois rivers and the St. Lawrence waterway.

We recognize that the masterly arguments of Herbert Hoover have convinced every reasonable person of the fundamental soundness and value of this policy.

We believe that the improvement of these rivers will add to the sale of the products of agriculture, stimulate industry and manufacturing in the middle west, and be of great and inestimable value to the people of the entire United States.

We commend the work that has already been done and urge that appropriations be made which will complete these waterways within a period of seven years.

AGRICULTURE—Firmly believing that the farm problem is the most serious problem confronting this country today, and that it is especially serious in the state of Iowa,

Therefore, be it resolved, that we commend the work of our republican senators and representatives in congress for their patriotic and courageous stand and labor in behalf of agriculture during the last several years, and

Be it further resolved, that we affirm our faith in the ability and disposition of the republican party to solve this great problem.

We have supreme confidence in the word, integrity and ability of Herbert Hoover in solving this great problem. Herbert Hoover wired the republican convention at Kansas City that "We must and will find a solution of the agricultural problem." Herbert Hoover has solved every serious problem that he has been asked to solve, and we have supreme faith in his word given to the Kansas City convention that the problem will and must be solved.

In attaining these ends the republicans of Iowa hereby declare:

(a) That water transportation and other transportation facilities be so improved and extended as to reduce transportation costs on agricultural products.

(b) That tariffs be imposed which will absolutely exclude foreign competition with the products of agriculture. Australian hides, Canadian wheat and South American corn, with similar commodities should have no market in the United States.

(c) That a federal farm board be created with adequate power and financial resources to assist in handling farm surpluses to the end that the American farmer can receive his cost of production with a reasonable profit on an equality with other American industries. In proposing such a legislative program it is the belief of the convention that some method should be found to make the same financially self-sustaining by the use of an equalization fee or some other method equally effective.

DEMOCRATIC CONVENTION AND PLATFORM

The democratic national convention of 1928 convened June 26th at Houston, Texas, and adjourned June 29th. Claude G. Bowers of New York City was temporary chairman, Joseph T. Robinson of Little Rock, Ark., permanent chairman, and Key Pittman of Tonopah, Nev., chairman of the resolutions committee.

DEMOCRATIC NATIONAL PLATFORM OF 1928

We, the democratic party in convention assembled, pause to pay our tribute of love and respect to the memory of him who in his life and in his official actions voiced the hopes and aspirations of all good men and women of every race and clime, the former president of the United States, Woodrow Wilson. His spirit moves on and his example and deeds will exalt those who come after us as they have inspired us.

We are grateful that we were privileged to work with him and again pay tribute to his high ideals and accomplishments.

We reaffirm our devotion to the principles of democratic government formulated by Jefferson and enforced by a long and illustrious line of democratic presidents.

We hold that government must function not to centralize our wealth but to preserve equal opportunity so that all may share in our priceless resources; and not confine prosperity to a favored few. We, therefore, pledge the democratic party to encourage business, small and great alike; to conserve human happiness and liberty; to break the shackles of monopoly and free business of the nation; to respond to popular will.

The function of a national platform is to declare general principles and party policies. We do not, therefore, assume to bind our party respecting local issues or details of legislation.

We, therefore, declare the policy of the democratic party with regard to the following dominant national issues:

THE RIGHTS OF STATES—We demand that the constitutional rights and powers of the states shall be preserved in their full vigor and virtue. These constitute a bulwark against centralization and the destructive tendencies of the republican party.

We oppose bureaucracy and the multiplication of offices and office holders.

We demand a revival of the spirit of local self-government without which free institutions cannot be preserved.

REPUBLICAN CORRUPTION—Unblushingly the republican party offers as its record agriculture prostrate, industry depressed, American shipping destroyed, workmen without employment, everywhere disgust and suspicion, and corruption unpunished and unafraid.

Never in the entire history of the country has there occurred in any given period of time or, indeed, in all time put together, such a spectacle of sordid corruption and unabashed rascality as that which has characterized the administration of federal affairs under eight blighting years of republican rule.

Not the revels of reconstruction, nor all the compounded frauds succeeding that evil era have approached in sheer audacity the shocking thieveries and startling depravities of officials high and low in the public service at Washington.

From cabinet ministers, with their treasonable crimes, to the cheap vendors of official patronage; from the purchasers of seats in the United States senate to the vulgar grafters upon alien trust funds, and upon the hospital resources of the disabled veterans of the world war; from the givers and receivers of stolen funds for republican campaign purposes to the public men who sat by silently consenting and never revealing a fact nor uttering a word in condemnation, the whole official organization under republican rule has become saturated with dishonesty defiant of public opinion and actuated only by a partisan desire to perpetuate its control of the government.

As in the time of Samuel J. Tilden, from whom the presidency was stolen, the watchword of the day should be: "Turn the rascals out."

This is the appeal of the democratic party to the people of the country. To this fixed purpose should be devoted every effort and applied every resource of the party; to this end every minor difference on nonessential issues should be put aside, and a determined and united fight made to rescue the government from those who have betrayed their trust by disgracing it.

ECONOMY, REORGANIZATION—The democratic party stands for efficiency and economy in the administration of public affairs, and we pledge:

- (a) Businesslike reorganization of all the departments of the government.
- (b) Elimination of duplication, waste and overlapping.
- (c) Substitution of modern businesslike methods for existing obsolete and antiquated conditions.

No economy resulted from the republican party rule. The savings they claim take no account of the elimination of expenditures following the end of the world war, the large sums realized from the sale of war materials, nor its failure to supply sufficient funds for the efficient conduct of many important governmental activities.

FINANCE AND TAXATION—(a) The federal reserve system created and inaugurated under democratic auspices is the greatest legislative contribution to constructive business ever adopted. The administration of the system for the advantage of stock market speculators must cease. It must be administered for the benefit of farmers, wage earners, merchants, manufacturers and others engaged in constructive business.

(b) The taxing function of governments, free of despotism, has for centuries been regarded as the power above all others which requires vigilant scrutiny to the end that it be not exercised for purposes of favor or oppression.

Three times since the world war the democrats in congress have favored a reduction of the tax burdens of the people in face of stubborn opposition from a republican administration; and each time these reductions have largely been made for the relief of those least able to endure the exactions of a republican fiscal policy.

The tax bill of the session recently ended was delayed by republican tactics and juggled by partisan considerations so as to make impossible a full measure of relief to the greater body of tax payers. The moderate reductions afforded were grudgingly conceded and the whole proceeding in congress, dictated as far as possible from the white house and the treasury, denoted the proverbial desire of the republican party always to discriminate against the masses in favor of privileged classes.

The democratic party avows its belief in the fiscal policy inaugurated by the last democratic administration, which has provided a sinking fund sufficient to extinguish the nation's indebtedness within a reasonable period of time, without harassing the present and next succeeding generations with tax burdens, which, if not unendurable, do in fact check initiative in enterprise and progress in business. Taxes levied beyond the actual requirements of the legally established sinking fund are but an added burden upon the American people, and the surplus thus accumulated in the federal treasury is an incentive to the increasingly extravagant expenditures which have characterized republican administrations. We, therefore, favor a further reduction of the internal taxes of the people.

TARIFF—The democratic tariff legislation will be based on the following policies:

(a) The maintenance of legitimate business and a high standard of wages for American labor.

(b) Increasing the purchasing power of wages and income by the reduction of those monopolistic and extortionate tariff rates bestowed in payment of political debts.

(c) Abolition of log rolling and restoration of the Wilson conception of a fact-finding tariff commission, quasi-judicial and free from the executive domination, which has destroyed the usefulness of the present commission.

(d) Duties that will permit effective competition, insure against monopoly and at the same time produce a fair revenue for the support of government. Actual difference between the cost of production at home and abroad, with adequate safeguard for the wage of the American laborer, must be the extreme measure of every tariff rate.

(e) Safeguarding the public against monopoly created by special tariff favors.

(f) Equitable distribution of the benefits and burdens of the tariff among all.

Wage earner, farmer, stockman, producer and legitimate business in general have everything to gain from a democratic tariff based on justice to all.

CIVIL SERVICE—Grover Cleveland made the extension of the merit system a tenet of our political faith. We shall preserve and maintain the civil service.

AGRICULTURE—Deception upon the farmer and stock raiser has been practiced by the republican party through false and delusive promises for more than fifty years. Specially favored industries have been artificially aided by republican legislation. Comparatively little has been done for agriculture and stock raising upon which national prosperity rests. Unsympathetic inaction with regard to this problem must cease. Virulent hostility of the republican administration to the advocates of farm relief and denial of the right of farm organizations to lead in the development of farm policy must yield to democratic sympathy and friendliness.

Four years ago the republican party, forced to acknowledge the critical situation, pledged itself to take all steps necessary to bring back a balanced condition between agriculture and other industries and labor. Today it faces the country not only with that pledge unredeemed, but broken by the acts of a republican president who is primarily responsible for the failure to offer a constructive program to restore equality to agriculture.

While he had no constructive and adequate program to offer in its stead, he has twice vetoed farm relief legislation and has sought to justify his disapproval of agricultural legislation partly on grounds wholly inconsistent with his acts making industrial monopolies the beneficiaries of government favor; and in indorsing the agricultural policy of the present administration, the republican party in its recent convention served notice upon the farmer that the so-called protective system is not meant for him; that while it offers protection to the privileged few, it promises continued world prices to the producers of the chief cash crops of agriculture.

We condemn the policy of the republican party which promises relief to agriculture only through a reduction of American farm production to the needs of the domestic market. Such a program means the continued deflation of agriculture, the forcing of additional millions from the farms, and the perpetuation of agricultural distress for years to come, with continued bad effects on business and labor throughout the United States.

The democratic party recognizes that the problems of production differ as between agriculture and industry. Industrial production is largely under human control, while agricultural production, because of lack of co-ordination among the 6,500,000 individual farm units, and because of the influence of weather, pests and other causes, is largely beyond human control. The result is that a large crop frequently is produced on a small acreage and a small crop on a large acreage; and measured in money value it frequently happens that a large crop brings less than a small crop.

Producers of crops whose total volume exceeds the needs of the domestic market must continue at a disadvantage until the government shall intervene as seriously and as effectively in behalf of the farmer as it has intervened in behalf of labor and industry. There is a need of supplemental legislation for the control and orderly

handling of agricultural surpluses, in order that the price of the surplus may not determine the price of the whole crop. Labor has benefited by collective bargaining and some industries by tariff. Agriculture must be as effectively aided.

The democratic party in its 1924 platform pledged its support to such legislation. It now reaffirms that stand and pledges the united efforts of the legislative and executive branches of government, as far as may be controlled by the party, to the immediate enactment of such legislation, and to such other steps as are necessary to establish and maintain the purchasing power of farm products and the complete economic equality of agriculture.

The democratic party has always stood against special privilege and for common equality under the law. It is a fundamental principle of the party that such tariffs as are levied must not discriminate against any industry, class or section. Therefore, we pledge that in its tariff policy the democratic party will insist upon equality of treatment between agriculture and other industries.

Farm relief must rest on the basis of an economic equality of agriculture with other industries. To give this equality a remedy must be found which will include among other things:

(a) Credit aid by loans to co-operatives on at least as favorable a basis as the government aid to the merchant marine.

(b) Creation of a federal farm board to assist the farmer and stock-raiser in the marketing of their products as the federal reserve board has done for the banker and business man. When our archaic banking and currency system was revised after its record of disaster and panic under republican administrations, it was a democratic congress in the administration of a democratic president that accomplished its stabilization through the federal reserve act, creating the federal reserve board, with powers adequate to its purpose. Now, in the hour of agriculture's need, the democratic party pledges the establishment of a new agricultural policy fitted to present conditions, under the direction of a farm board vested with all the powers necessary to accomplish for agriculture what the federal reserve board has been able to accomplish for finance, in full recognition of the fact that the banks of the country, through voluntary co-operation, were never able to stabilize the financial system of the country until government powers were invoked to help them.

(c) Reduction through proper government agencies of the spread between what the farmer and stock raiser gets and the ultimate consumer pays with consequent benefits to both.

(d) Consideration of the condition of agriculture in the formulation of government financial and tax measures.

We pledge the party to foster and develop co-operative marketing associations through appropriate government aid.

We recognize that experience has demonstrated that members of such associations alone cannot successfully assume the full responsibility for a program that benefits all producers alike. We pledge the party to an earnest endeavor to solve this problem of the distribution of the cost of dealing with crop surpluses over the marketed units of the crop whose producers are benefited by such assistance. The solution of this problem would avoid government subsidy to which the democratic party has always been opposed. The solution of this problem will be a prime and immediate concern of a democratic administration.

We direct attention to the fact that it was a democratic congress in the administration of a democratic president which established the federal loan system and laid the foundation for the entire rural credits structure, which has aided agriculture to sustain in part the shock of the policies of two republican administrations; and we promise thorough-going administration of our rural credits laws, so that the farmers in all sections may secure the maximum benefits intended under these acts.

MINING—Mining is one of the basic industries of this country. We produce more coal, iron and copper than any other country. The value of our mineral production is second only to agriculture. Mining has suffered like agriculture and from similar causes. It is the duty of our government to foster this industry and to remove the restrictions that destroy its prosperity.

FOREIGN POLICY—The republican administration has no foreign policy, it has drifted without plan. This great nation cannot afford to play a minor role in world politics. It must have a sound and positive foreign policy, not a negative one.

We declare for a constructive foreign policy based on these principles :

- (a) Outlawry of war and an abhorrence of militarism, conquest and imperialism.
- (b) Freedom from entangling political alliances with foreign nations.
- (c) Protection of American lives and rights.
- (d) Noninterference with the elections or other internal political affairs of any foreign nation. This principle of noninterference extends to Mexico, Nicaragua and all other Latin-American nations. Interference in the purely internal affairs of Latin-American countries must cease.
- (e) Rescue of our country from its present impaired world standing and restoration to its former position as a leader in the movement for international arbitration, conciliation, conference and limitation of armament by international agreement.
- (f) International agreements for reduction of all armaments and the end of competitive war preparations and in the meantime, the maintenance of an army and navy adequate for national defense.
- (g) Full, free and open co-operation with all other nations, for the promotion of peace and justice through the world.
- (h) In our foreign relations this country should stand as a unit, and, to be successful, foreign policies must have the approval and the support of the American people.
- (i) Abolition of the practice of the president of entering into and carrying out agreements with a foreign government, either de facto or de jure, for the protection of such government against revolution or foreign attack, or for the supervision of its internal affairs, when such agreements have not been advised and consented to by the senate as provided in the constitution of the United States, and we condemn the administration for carrying out such an unratified agreement that requires us to use our armed forces in Nicaragua.

(j) Recognition that the Monroe Doctrine is a cardinal principle of this government promulgated for the protection of ourselves and our Latin-American neighbors. We shall seek their friendly co-operation in the maintenance of this doctrine.

(k) We condemn the republican administration for lack of statesmanship and efficiency in negotiating the 1921 treaty for the limitation of armaments, which limited only the construction of battleships and ships of over 10,000 tons. Merely a gesture towards peace, it accomplished no limitation of armament, because it simply substituted one weapon of destruction for another. While it resulted in the destruction of our battleships, and the blueprints of battleships of other nations, it placed no limitation upon construction of aircraft, submarines, cruisers, warships under 10,000 tons, poisonous gases, or other weapons of destruction. No agreement was ratified with regard to submarines and poisonous gases. The attempt of the president to remedy the failure of 1921 by the Geneva conference of 1928 was characterized by the same lack of statesmanship and efficiency and resulted in entire failure.

In consequence the race between nations in the building of unlimited weapons of destruction still goes on and the peoples of the world are still threatened with war and burdened with taxation for additional armament.

WATERWAYS, FLOOD CONTROL—The federal government and state governments respectively, now have absolute and exclusive sovereignty and control over enormous water powers, which constitute one of the greatest assets of the nation. This sovereign title and control must be preserved respectively in the state and federal governments, to the end that the people may be protected against exploitation of this great resource and that water powers may be expeditiously developed under such regulations as will insure to the people reasonable rates and equitable distribution.

We favor and will promote deep waterways from the great lakes to the gulf and to the Atlantic ocean.

We favor the fostering and building up of water transportation through improvement of inland waterways and removal of discrimination against water transportation.

Flood control and the lowering of flood levels are essential to the safety of life and property, the productivity of our lands, the navigability of our streams, the reclaiming of our wet and overflowed lands. We favor expeditious construction of flood relief works on the Mississippi and Colorado rivers and such reclamation and irrigation projects upon the Colorado river as may be found feasible.

We favor appropriation for prompt co-ordinated surveys by the United States to determine the possibilities of general navigation improvements and water power

development on navigable streams and their tributaries and to secure reliable information as to the most economical navigation improvement, in combination with the most efficient and complete development of water power.

We favor the strict enforcement of the federal water power act, a democratic act, and insist that the public interest in water power sites, ignored by two republican administrations, be protected.

FLOOD CONTROL—Being deeply impressed by the terrible disasters from floods in the Mississippi valley during 1927, we heartily indorse the flood control act of last May, which recognizes that the flood waters of the Mississippi river and its tributaries constitute a national problem of the gravest character and makes provision for their speedy and effective control. This measure is a continuation and expansion of the policy established by a democratic congress in 1917 in the act of that year for controlling floods on the Mississippi and Sacramento rivers. It is a great piece of constructive legislation, and we pledge our party to its vigorous and early enforcement.

CONSERVATION, RECLAMATION—We shall conserve the natural resources of our country for the benefit of the people and to protect them against waste and monopolization. Our disappearing resources of timber call for a national policy of reforestation. The federal government should improve and develop its public lands so that they may go into private ownership and become subjected to taxation for the support of the states wherein they exist. The democratic administration will actively, efficiently and economically carry on reclamation projects and make equitable adjustments with the homestead entrymen for the mistakes the government has made, and extend all practical aid to refinance reclamation and drainage projects.

TRANSPORTATION—Efficient and economical transportation is essential to the prosperity of every industry. Cost of transportation controls the income of every human being and materially affects the cost of living. We must, therefore, promote every form of transportation to a state of highest efficiency.

Recognizing the prime importance of air transportation we shall encourage its development by every possible means. Improved roads are of vital importance not only to commerce and industry, but also to agriculture and rural life. The federal government should construct and maintain at its own expense roads upon its public lands. We affirm our approval of the federal roads law, enacted by a democratic administration.

Common carriers, whether by land, water or rail, must be protected in an equal opportunity to compete so that governmental regulations against exorbitant rates and inefficiency will be aided by competition.

LABOR—(a) We favor the principle of collective bargaining and the democratic principle that organized labor should choose its own representatives without coercion or interference.

(b) Labor is not a commodity. Human rights must be safeguarded. Labor should be exempt from the operation of anti-trust laws.

(c) We recognize that legislative and other investigations have shown the existence of grave abuse in the issuance of injunctions in labor disputes. No injunctions should be granted in labor disputes except upon proof of threatened irreparable injury and after notice and hearing, and the injunction should be confined to those acts which do directly threaten irreparable injury. The expressed purpose of representatives of capital, labor and the bar to devise a plan for the elimination of the present evils with respect to injunctions must be supported and legislation designed to accomplish these ends formulated and passed.

(d) We favor legislation providing that products of convict labor shipped from one state to another shall be subject to laws of the latter state as though they had been produced therein.

UNEMPLOYMENT—Unemployment is present, widespread and increasing. Unemployment is almost as destructive to the happiness, comfort and wellbeing of human beings as war. We expend vast sums of money to protect our people against the evils of war but no government program is anticipated to prevent the awful suffering and economic losses of unemployment. It threatens the wellbeing of millions of our people and endangers the prosperity of the nation. We favor the adoption by the government, after a study of this subject, of a scientific plan whereby, during pe-

riods of unemployment, appropriations shall be made available for the construction of necessary public works and the lessening, as far as consistent with public interests, of government construction work when labor is generally and satisfactorily employed in private enterprise.

Study should also be made of modern methods of industry and a constructive solution found to absorb and utilize the surplus human labor by the increasing use of machinery.

ACCIDENT COMPENSATION—We favor legislation making fair and liberal compensation to government employes who are injured in accident or by occupational disease and to the dependents of such workers as may die as a result thereof.

FEDERAL EMPLOYEES—Federal employes should receive a living wage based upon American standards of decent living. Present wages are in many instances far below that standard. We favor a fair and liberal retirement law for government employes in the classified service.

VETERANS—Through democratic votes, and in spite of two republican presidents' opposition, the congress has maintained America's traditional policy to generously care for the veterans of the world war. In extending them free hospitalization, a statutory award for tuberculosis, a program of progressive hospital construction, and provisions for compensation for the disabled, the widows and orphans, America has surpassed the record of any nation in the history of the world.

We pledge the veterans that none of the benefits heretofore accorded by the Wilson administration and the votes of democratic members of congress shall be withdrawn; that these will be added to more in accordance with veterans' and their dependents' actual needs. Generous appropriations, honest management, the removal of vexatious administration delays, and sympathetic assistance of the veterans of all wars is what the democratic party demands and promises.

WOMEN AND CHILDREN—We declare for equality of women with men in all political and government matters.

Children are the chief asset of the nation. Therefore, their protection through infancy and childhood against exploitation is an important national duty.

The democratic party has always opposed the exploitation of women in industry and has stood for such conditions of work as will preserve their health and safety.

We favor an equal wage for equal service; and likewise favor adequate appropriation for the women's and children's bureau.

IMMIGRATION—Laws which limit immigration must be preserved in full force and effect, but the provisions contained in these laws that separate husbands from wives and parents from infant children are inhuman and not essential to the purpose or the efficacy of such law.

RADIO—Government supervision must secure to all the people the advantage of radio communication and likewise guarantee the right of free speech. Official control in contravention of this guarantee should not be tolerated. Governmental control must prevent monopolistic use of radio communication and guarantee equitable distribution and enjoyment thereof.

COAL—Bituminous coal is not only the common base of manufacture, but is a vital agency in our interstate transportation. The demoralization of this industry, its labor conflicts and distress, its waste of a national resource and disordered public service, demand constructive legislation that will allow capital and labor a fair share of prosperity with adequate protection to the consuming public.

ELECTION REFORM—We favor legislation to prevent defeated members of both houses of the congress from participating in the sessions of the congress by fixing the date for convening the congress immediately after the biennial national election.

LAW ENFORCEMENT—The republican party, for eight years in complete control of the government at Washington, presents the remarkable spectacle of feeling compelled in its national platform to promise obedience to a provision of the federal constitution which it has flagrantly disregarded and to apologize to the country for its failure to enforce laws enacted by the congress of the United States. Speaking for the national democracy, this convention pledges the party and its nominees to an honest effort to enforce the eighteenth amendment and all other provisions of the federal constitution and all laws enacted pursuant thereto.

CAMPAIGN EXPENDITURES—We condemn the improper and excessive use of money in elections as a danger threatening the very existence of democratic institutions. Republican expenditures in senatorial primaries and elections have been so exorbitant as to constitute a national scandal. We favor publicity in all matters affecting campaign contributions and expenditures.

We shall, beginning not later than August 1, 1928, and every thirty days thereafter, the last publication and filing being not later than five days before the election, publish in the press and file with the appropriate committees of the house and senate a complete account of all contributions, the names of the contributors, the amounts expended and the purposes for which expenditures are made and will at all times hold open for public inspection the books and records relating to such matters. In the event that any financial obligations are contracted and not paid, our national committee will similarly report and publish at least five days before the election, all details respecting such obligations.

We agree to keep and maintain a permanent record of all campaign contributions and expenditures and to insist that contributions by the citizens of one state to the campaign committees of other states shall have immediate publicity.

MERCHANT MARINE—We reaffirm our support of an efficient, dependable American merchant marine for the carriage of the greater portion of our commerce and for the national defense.

The democratic party has consistently and vigorously supported the shipping services maintained by the regional United States shipping board in the interest of all ports and all sections of our country, and has successfully opposed the discontinuance of any of these lines. We favor the transfer of these lines gradually to the local private American companies when such companies can show their ability to take over and permanently maintain the lines.

Lines that cannot now be transferred to private enterprise should continue to be operated as at present and should be kept in an efficient state by remodeling of some vessels and replacement of others.

We are unalterably opposed to a monopoly in American shipping and are opposed to the operation of any of our service in a manner that would retard the development of any ports or sections of our country.

We oppose such sacrifices and favoritism as exhibited in the past in the matter of alleged sales, and insist that the primary purpose of the legislation upon this subject be the establishment and maintenance of an adequate American merchant marine.

ARMENIA—We favor the most earnest efforts on the part of the United States to secure that fulfillment of the promises and engagements made during and following the world war by the United States and the allied powers to Armenia and her people.

EDUCATION—We believe with Jefferson and other founders of the republic that ignorance is the enemy of freedom and that each state, being responsible for the intellectual and moral qualifications of its citizens and for the expenditure of the moneys collected by taxation for the support of its schools, shall use its sovereign right in all matters pertaining to education.

The federal government should offer to the states such counsel, advice, results of research and aid as may be made available through the federal agencies for the general improvement of our schools in view of our national needs.

MONOPOLIES AND ANTI-TRUST LAWS—During the last seven years, under republican rule, the anti-trust laws have been thwarted, ignored and violated so that the country is rapidly becoming controlled by trusts and sinister monopolies formed for the purpose of wringing from the necessities of life an unrighteous profit.

These combinations are often formed and conducted in violation of law, encouraged, aided and abetted in their activities by republican administration and are driving all small trades people and small industrialists out of business. Competition is one of the most sacred, cherished and economic rights of the American people.

We demand the strict enforcement of the anti-trust laws and the enactment of other laws, if necessary, to control this great menace to trade and commerce, and thus to preserve the right of the small merchant and manufacturer to earn a legitimate profit from his business.

Dishonest business should be treated without influence at the national capitol. Honest business, no matter its size, need have no fears of a democratic administration. The democratic party will ever oppose illegitimate and dishonest business. It will foster, promote and encourage all legitimate business enterprises.

CANAL ZONE—We favor the employment of American citizens in the operation and maintenance of the Panama canal in all positions above the grade of messenger and favor as liberal wages and conditions of employment as prevailed under previous democratic administrations.

ALASKA-HAWAII—We favor the development of Alaska and Hawaii in the traditional American way through self-government. We favor the appointment of only bona fide residents to office in the territories. We favor the extension and improvement of the mail, air mail, telegraph and radio, agricultural experimenting, highway construction and other necessary federal activities in the territories.

PHILIPPINES—The Filipino people have succeeded in maintaining a stable government and have thus fulfilled the only condition laid down by the congress as a prerequisite to the granting of independence. We declare that it is now our duty to keep our promise to these people by granting them immediately the independence which they so honorably covet.

PORTO RICO—We favor granting to Porto Rico such territorial form of government as would meet the present economic conditions of the island, and provide for the aspirations of her people, with the view to ultimate statehood accorded to all territories of the United States since the beginning of our government, and we believe any officials appointed to administer the government of such territories should be qualified by previous bona fide residence therein.

PUBLIC HEALTH—The democratic party recognizes that not only the productive wealth of the nation but its contentment and happiness depend upon the health of its citizens. It, therefore, pledges itself to enlarge the existing bureau of public health and to do all things possible to stamp out communicable and contagious diseases, and to ascertain preventive means and remedies for these diseases, such as cancer, infantile paralysis and others which heretofore have largely defied the skill of physicians. We pledge our party to spare no means to lift the apprehension of diseases from the minds of our people, and to appropriate all moneys necessary thereto to carry out this pledge.

DEMOCRATIC STATE PLATFORM

(Adopted at State Convention Held in Des Moines, Iowa, July 27, 1928)

We reaffirm our allegiance to the great principles of democracy as they have been enunciated and administered by the illustrious and immortal leaders of democracy—Thomas Jefferson, Andrew Jackson, Grover Cleveland and Woodrow Wilson. We avow adherence and devotion to those principles that will safeguard the people of this nation against the usurpation of their rights by legislative power, and the destruction of representative government.

We commit our party to the immortal principle that governments are maintained for the welfare of all its people and not for special privilege to any favored class, and we pledge the power and influence of democracy to these principles.

CALL PLATFORM FRANK—We endorse the platform adopted by the national convention at Houston. We believe it is a clear and unequivocal expression of the attitude of the democratic party on all vital and national problems. We are confident that its frank and fearless declaration of principles and policies will win the indorsement of the electorate that favor the banishment of hypocrisy from politics and the establishment of honest and courageous statesmanship in national affairs.

We further indorse the national convention's choice of candidates for the high office of president and vice-president. The selection of Alfred E. Smith as candidate for the office as president presents for the serious consideration of the electorate of the nation an executive of recognized ability. His record as governor of the state of New York is an unbroken record of unflinching devotion for the cause of all classes of its people. It is a record of honest, courageous, constructive and successful leadership. His position upon all matters indicates he has been actuated by the motive of fairness and equality to all of the people and at all times.

FAITH IN SMITH—We have implicit faith and confidence in his sterling integrity and rugged honesty, and we are confident that his promises and pledges will be fulfilled and his public trust held inviolate.

Joseph T. Robinson, the party candidate for vice-president, is a statesman of sterling character and recognized capacity. His record of service as former governor of his state and as senator of the United States, is marked by unswerving adherence to American ideals and the preservation of the inalienable rights of its citizens. He is a leader who understands the problems of the whole people and possesses a wise judgment and discretion in national affairs. We heartily indorse the candidacies of this courageous and peerless statesman and commend him to the electorate of the nation.

We deplore the inefficiency which has marked the administration of the executive affairs of this state, we have always been zealous to have Iowa maintain its high place among the states of the nation, but we have sacrificed our position because of the insincerity and vacillating attitude of our chief executive upon important issues which has reflected itself in a form of unstable and unreliable administration of the affairs of the state.

INDORSE HOUSEL—We are anxious that the affairs of the people be administered honestly and efficiently. We charge our public servants with the responsibility of giving to the people of this state a business administration characterized by the motives that prevail in the administration of individual enterprise and with a manifest determination to administer their public trust by the same rule which governs the administration of all private trust.

The democratic candidates for state offices are all citizens of excellent business attainments, and well qualified for the offices sought. We indorse every candidate and specially emphasize the fitness of our candidate for governor, W. Housel. They may all be trusted with the affairs of state and we ask for them your support.

AGRICULTURE—We are mindful of the urgent necessity for farm relief. We are mindful of the appeals which have been made to our national government for helpful legislation. We are mindful of the persistent denials these demands have met and the reasons given for such denial. We submit to the farmers of Iowa and the nation that the attitude of the democratic party indicates a sincere and genuine purpose to secure for agriculture its just demands. The declaration of the national platform upon the question of farm relief is broad and comprehensive; it embodies the best thought of recognized leaders of farm relief who are familiar with every angle of agricultural distress. Recognized farm leaders have expressed their fullest approval of the democratic national farm relief plank, and we the democrats of Iowa, whole-heartedly indorse this measure and pledge the democracy of Iowa to use its influence in every legitimate manner and form, and to labor insisently and consistently for legislation which in the judgment of experienced agricultural leadership, will secure the desired results.

We denounce the persistently hostile attitude of the Coolidge administration towards this great question of farm relief, and we warn the farmers of Iowa and all others who are interested in the economic welfare of our great agricultural state, that, in the event of the election of Mr. Hoover to the presidency of the United States, the republican press, republican leadership and an incoming republican administration will construe his success at the polls as an affirmation and approval of the record of the Coolidge administration on the grave question of farm relief and will construe the same as a mandate to such incoming administration to ignore the demands of agriculture for economic equality with other industries.

LABOR—We most heartily indorse the pledges of the democratic national platform and the announced attitude of our several candidates for national and state offices on the question of labor, and pledge to labor the unswerving support of all state officers. We deplore the indiscriminate and tyrannical use of the injunction in labor disputes and pledge to labor our most earnest co-operation to remedy immediately the present unjust use thereof to the degradation of labor and the ultimate ruination of the home and free government.

PROHIBITION—Fully cognizant of the chaotic condition with the attendant growing disregard for law and order produced through the partial and inefficient enforcement and administration of the present prohibitory laws we hereby indorse the expressed sentiments of our candidate for president, Alfred E. Smith.

STATE ADMINISTRATION—We demand that the various departments of our state government be administered for the benefit of all the people, and we condemn the practice of converting these instrumentalities of government into bureaus for partisan purposes. We believe that these departments have been used by the present state administration to promote the interests of republican candidates for state offices through the raising of campaign funds in violation of the criminal statutes of our state, and we demand a full and honest legislative investigation of these departments and the punishment of those guilty of such violation.

ROADS—The democratic party of the state of Iowa is committed to a forward-looking, progressive and economical policy in the construction and improvement of the highways of the state. We believe that the issuance of a \$100,000,000 bond issue for road improvement purposes is not a political question. We deplore the fact that during the past primary campaign the republican candidate for governor attempted to make this a political question solely for the purpose of promoting his own political fortune.

This question is purely an economic one and it should be acted upon by the electorate of the state without any political bias or partisan motives. We pledge our candidate to carry into effect by proper means the expressed mandate of the people on this question, faithfully, impartially and economically.

CONSERVATION—We believe in the conservation of the natural resources of the state, and the preservation to posterity of its streams, lakes and public places. We are committed to a policy of providing by proper legislation for the perpetuation and

preservation of public waters for public purposes. We recommend that legislation be enacted to provide for carrying on full and adequate means for the conservation of these resources, and that attention be given to the reforestation of the wooded areas of the state.

MOTION PICTURES—We recognize the moving pictures as an educational institution and we affirm our adherence to the party tradition of free speech, free press and the right of assembly with free interchange of thought, but with Will Hays at the high trust reposed in him, his use of stolen money to further the interests of the republican party, his undenied perjury before the senate investigating committee, therefore, be it resolved that we deem his retention a direct challenge to the moral sentiment of the country and that an organization to supervise the industry should be established and maintained as long as he remains at its head.

The platform of the Workers (Communist) party of 1928 in part declared for unemployment insurance, a five-day, forty-hour week, miner's relief, immediate independence for all American colonies and semi-colonies, recognition of the Soviet government by the United States government, abrogation of government by injunction, independent political action of the working class, federal law for social insurance in case of sickness, accident, old age and unemployment for all wage-earners, abolition of all indirect taxes, a five-year moratorium on farm mortgage debts, abolition of the whole system of race discrimination, abolition of all restrictions on immigration, equal pay for equal work by male and female workers, compulsory abolition by law of child labor under the age of sixteen, municipal fixing of low rents for workers, repeal of the Volstead act and the eighteenth amendment and utilization of "propaganda against alcoholism as one of the most malignant social diseases under capitalism."

PRIMARY ELECTION

The term "Primary Election" is construed under the law to apply to an election by the members of various political parties for the purpose of placing in nomination candidates for public office, for selecting delegates to conventions, and for the selection of party committeemen. The law provides that the primary election shall consist of an election by all political parties and shall be held at the various voting places of the several precincts on the first Monday in June, in each even numbered year, for the nomination of candidates for such offices as are to be filled at the general election in November next ensuing (except candidates for judge of the supreme court and district court, which shall be by a judicial convention), and for senator in the congress of the United States, in the years in which senators are to be elected.

The board of supervisors of each county (acting as a county board of canvassers) meets on the second Tuesday following the primary election in June and canvasses the votes cast at the several precincts and makes an abstract thereof. A separate abstract of the canvass duly certified is then forwarded to the secretary of state for the following offices:

United States senator.

All state officers.

Representatives in congress.

Senators and representatives in the general assembly.

On the second Monday after the June primary election, the executive council meets as a state canvassing board, and opens and canvasses the abstract returns received from each county in the state. Said board makes abstracts of its canvasses, showing the number of ballots cast for each person voted for, and the person having the highest number of votes in the state or district (provided he receives 35 per cent of all the votes cast by the party for such office), is duly and legally nominated and is entitled to have his name printed on the official ballot for the general election.

PRESIDENTIAL ELECTIONS FROM 1789 TO 1928

AGGREGATE POPULAR VOTE AND ELECTORAL VOTE FOR CANDIDATES FOR PRESIDENT AND VICE-PRESIDENT AT EACH ELECTION

The record of any popular vote for electors prior to 1824 is so meager and imperfect that a compilation would be useless. In most of the states, for more than a quarter century following the establishment of the government, the state legislatures "appointed" the presidential electors, and the people, therefore, voted only indirectly for them, their choice being expressed by their votes for members of the legislature. In this tabulation only the aggregate electoral votes for candidates for president and vice-president in the first nine quadrennial elections appear.

*The candidates starred were elected. (a) The first republican party is claimed by the present democratic party as its progenitor. (b) No candidate having a majority of the electoral vote, the house of representatives elected Adams. (c) Candidates of the anti-masonry party. (d) There being no choice, the senate elected Johnson. (e) Eleven southern states, being within the belligerent territory, did not vote. (f) Three southern states disfranchised. (g) Horace Greeley died after election, and democratic electors scattered their votes. (h) There being a dispute over the electoral vote of Florida, Louisiana, Oregon and South Carolina, they were referred by congress to an electoral commission composed of eight Republicans and seven Democrats, which, by a strict party vote, awarded 185 electoral votes to Hayes and 184 to Tilden. ELECTORAL VOTES

1789. Previous to 1804 each elector voted for two candidates for president. The one who received the largest number of votes was declared president, and the one who received the next largest number of votes was declared vice-president. The electoral votes for the first president of the United States were: George Washington, 69; John Adams, of Massachusetts, 34; John Jay, of New York, 9; R. H. Harrison, of Maryland, 6; John Rutledge, of South Carolina, 6; John Hancock, of Massachusetts, 4; George Clinton, of New York, 3; Samuel Huntington, of Connecticut, 2; John Milton, of Georgia, 2; James Armstrong, of Georgia; Benjamin Lincoln, of Massachusetts, and Edward Telfair, of Georgia, 1 vote each. Vacancies (votes not cast), 4. George Washington was chosen president and John Adams vice-president.

1792. George Washington, Federalist, received 132 votes; John Adams, Federalist, 77; George Clinton, of New York, Republican (a) 50; Thomas Jefferson, of Virginia, Republican, 4; Aaron Burr, of New York, Republican, 1 vote each. Vacancies, 3. George Washington was chosen president and John Adams vice-president.

1796. John Adams, Federalist, 71; Thomas Jefferson, Republican, 68; Thomas Pinckney, of South Carolina, Federalist, 59; Aaron Burr, of New York, Republican, 30; Samuel Adams, of Massachusetts, Republican, 15; Oliver Ellsworth, of Connecticut, Independent, 11; George Clinton, of New York, Republican, 7; John Jay, of New York, Federalist, 5; James Iredell, of North Carolina, Federalist, 3; George Washington, of Virginia, John Henry, of Maryland, and S. Johnson, of North Carolina, all Federalists, 2 votes each; Charles Cotesworth Pinckney, of South Carolina, Federalist, 1 vote. John Adams was chosen president and Thomas Jefferson vice-president.

1800. Thomas Jefferson, Republican, 73; Aaron Burr, Republican, 73; John Adams, Federalist, 65; Charles C. Pinckney, Federalist, 64; John Jay, Federalist,

1 vote. There being a tie vote for Jefferson and Burr, the choice devolved upon the house of representatives. Jefferson received the votes of ten states, which being the largest vote cast for a candidate, elected him president. Burr received the votes of four states, which being the next largest vote, elected him vice-president. There were 2 blank votes.

1804. The constitution of the United States having been amended, the electors at this election voted for a president and a vice-president, instead of for two candidates for President. The result was as follows: For president, Thomas Jefferson, Republican, 162; Charles C. Pinckney, Federalist, 14. For vice-president, George Clinton, Republican, 162; Rufus King, of New York, Federalist, 14. Jefferson was chosen president and Clinton vice-president.

1808. For president, James Madison, of Virginia, Republican, 122; Charles C. Pinckney, of South Carolina, Federalist, 47; George Clinton, of New York, Republican, 6. For vice-president, George Clinton, Republican, 113; Rufus King, of New York, Federalist, 47; John Langdon, of New Hampshire, 9; James Madison, 3; James Monroe, 3. Vacancy, 1. Madison was chosen president and Clinton vice-president.

1812. For president, James Madison, Republican, 128; De Witt Clinton, of New York, Federalist, 89. For vice-president, Elbridge Gerry, of Massachusetts, 131; Jared Ingersoll, of Pennsylvania, Federalist, 86. Vacancy, 1. Madison was chosen president and Gerry vice-president.

1816. For president, James Monroe, of Virginia, Republican, 183; Rufus King, of New York, Federalist, 34. For vice-president, Daniel D. Tompkins, of New York, Republican, 183; John Eager Howard, of Maryland, Federalist, 22; James Ross, of Pennsylvania, 5; John Marshall, of Virginia, 4; Robert G. Harper, of Maryland, 3. Vacancies, 4. Monroe was chosen president and Tompkins vice-president.

1820. For president, James Monroe, of Virginia, Republican, 231; John Q. Adams, of Massachusetts, Republican, 1. For vice-president, Daniel D. Tompkins, Republican, 218; Richard Stockton, of New Jersey, 8; Daniel Rodney, of Delaware, 4; Robert G. Harper, of Maryland, and Richard Rush, of Pennsylvania, 1 vote each. Vacancies, 3. James Monroe was chosen president and Daniel D. Tompkins vice-president.

CENTRAL COLLEGE—PELLA

Established in 1853, and for sixty-three years under the administrative control of the Baptist Church, Central College was transferred to the Reformed Church in America in 1916. It aims to be thoroughly Christian in all its departments, but is in no sense sectarian. The student enrollment has representatives of ten different church denominations, coming from eleven different states. A four-year collegiate course of liberal arts is offered leading to the A.B. degree. The academy department was discontinued in June 1928. The college maintains twenty departments, including bible, biology, chemistry, education, English, German, history, Latin, mathematics, piano, voice, pipe-organ, philosophy, physical education, physics, psychology, French, Spanish, social science, and speech arts.

The primary aim of Central College is to prepare young people for Christian leadership in the various walks of life. By a thorough course in the liberal arts it seeks to help the student to acquire for himself a Christian world-wide view by which his whole life will be dominated. A teaching staff of nineteen professors and instructors seek to train the minds and hearts of the young people entrusted to their care. It has \$339,000 invested in buildings and equipment; about \$200,000 endowment; and a library of 12,000 volumes.
