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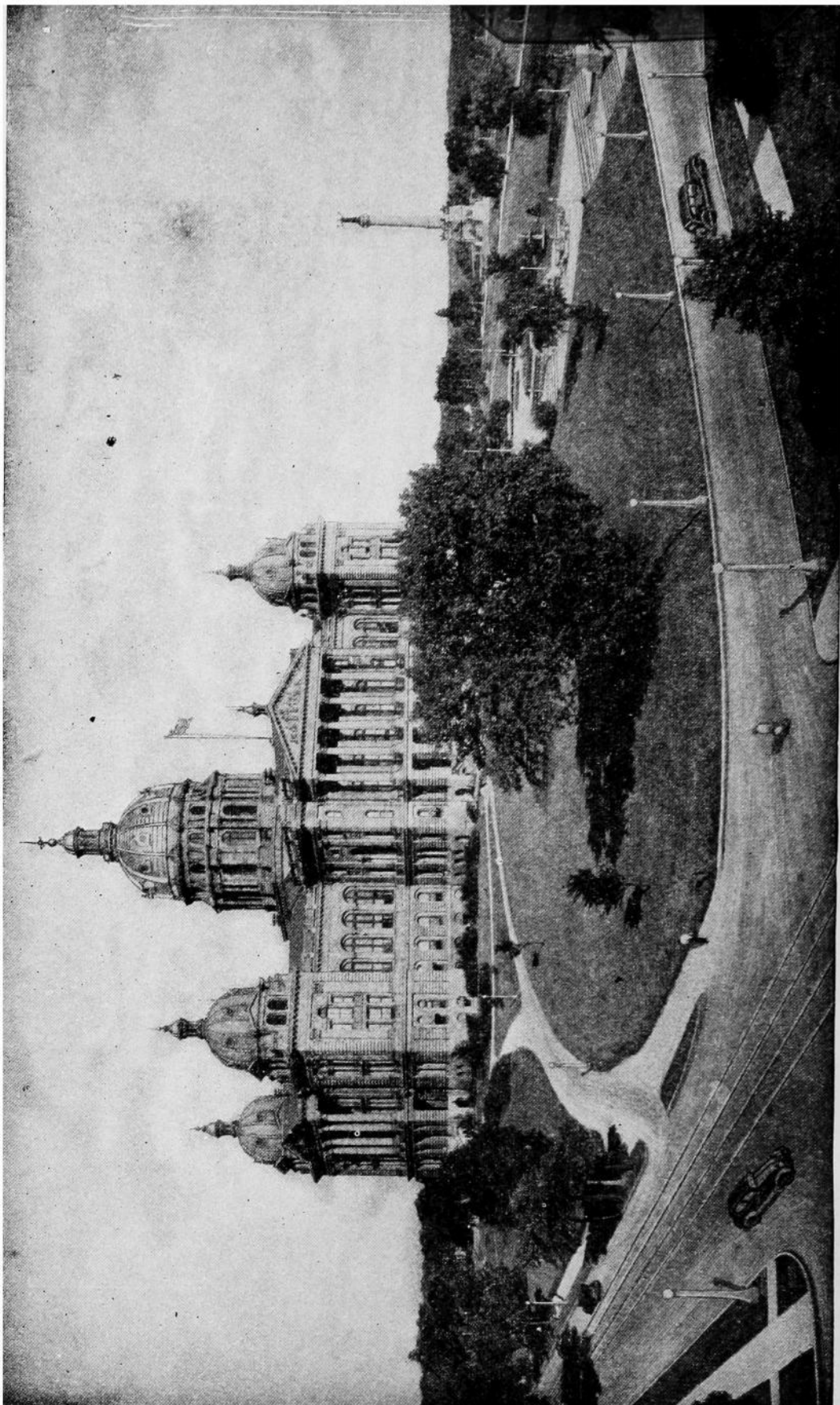

# Iowa State Capitol

*Des Moines made state capital January 11, 1855*

**T**HE Iowa state capitol is located on a hill commanding the city of Des Moines, in the center of a park of 93 acres, and its imposing proportions and pleasing design are the admiration of all discerning visitors. It is the home of the General Assemblies, the Governor and other state officials, the state supreme court, many departments, and is at all times a busy workshop for Iowa activities.

The capitol follows the best nineteenth century architectural designs for public buildings and it is ornamented in a simple but attractive manner. The base course of the structure is of Iowa stone, then a waterable course cut from Iowa granite boulders, and the superstructure of Missouri stone. The commanding exterior feature is the dome, 65 feet in diameter, surmounted by a finial 275 feet above the basement, and covered with gold, and said to be one of the largest golden domes in the world.

The interior discloses a wide corridor 360 feet long with cross-corridor 240 feet long; massive granite columns supporting the dome; columns in the legislative halls of scagliola; tile and terrazi floors; woodwork entirely of native Iowa woods with artistic hand carving; finishing with fine domestic and imported marble, some of which can no longer be obtained; legislative halls on second floor with substantial walnut desks and furniture, and spacious committee and office rooms adjacent.

The grand stairway from first to second floors has granite steps and marble balustrades. Originally the basement was intended only for storage space, but it became necessary to use it for offices and the circular opening in the first floor was cut to give light below.

The interior of the capitol was originally decorated in the ornate and pictorial style of the period. Portraits of eminent Iowans graced the ceilings of the legislative halls, the walls were frescoed in rich designs, and the carpets in solid colors. The best specimen of the early decoration remaining is the ceiling in the private office of secretary of state, done by a Danish artist. The supreme court chamber was made gorgeous by wall and ceiling decorations consisting of large allegorical paintings designed in America and executed in Berlin, and these are now in the main office of the state historical building. Nearly all of the present decoration of the building is more recent, having been done after the renovation due to the fire of 1904, and this includes the mosaics and the allegorical picture at the head of the grand stairway.

It was after the fire that the great paintings in the supreme court chamber were removed and placed in care of the state historical department, and additions were made to the bench or seat of the court, the hand carved decoration of which is a splendid example of last century craft.

#### The Interior Decorations

The central art decoration of the Capitol is the allegorical painting "Westward" high in the east corridor. The subject is a typical emigrant group, a large covered wagon in the center, drawn by four oxen, the driver and family marching by the side, a stately young matron on the driver's seat, another walking at the head of the family, a woman picking flowers from the parched earth not far from the skull of a buffalo, and at the rear the green fields and lush pastures that are being left behind. The whole is entirely allegorical and hovering over the team as guiding spirits is a group of angels. This was the work of Edwin H. Blashfield and it is 26 feet long.

The other notable decorative features of the capitol are as follows:

The mosaics that occupy the space above the large painting in the east end of hall. These are among the largest in America. They represent Defense, the Charities, the Executive, the Legislative, Judiciary and Education. They were designed by Frederick Dielman and executed in stone in Venice.

The eight lunettes in the rotunda, occupying half-round niches, are by Kenyon Cox and represent Hunting, Herding, Agriculture, Commerce, the Forge, Education, Science, Art.

Above these are statuary placed when the capitol was first constructed.

The immense enlargement of a photograph in the south part of the corridor on the main floor represents the Iowa soldiers on return from the World war.

The flags shown in cases in the main hall are those carried by Iowa regiments in the Civil war.

#### Location of State Capitol

When Iowa became a state December 28, 1846, the problem of locating the state capitol at once became important, and in the legislative sessions of 1851 and 1853 efforts were made to designate a central location for the same. In 1855, January 15, Governor Grimes signed the bill to locate the capitol "within two miles of the Raccoon fork of the Des Moines river." The following year a commission designated the precise location of the building on ground given the state by a syndicate of business men headed by Wilson Alexander Scott. They also gave the state two other small tracts, one known as "Governor's square" intended to be for a home for the governors, but never so used. They also built and leased to the state a temporary building to be used until a permanent

one could be erected, this being near where the soldiers and sailors monument now stands.

On October 19, 1857, the Governor issued a proclamation declaring that the state's capitol was in the city of Des Moines; and during the winter following the state's records and equipment were brought from Iowa City to Des Moines in severe weather. Not until nearly Christmas time did the last of the state's belongings reach the capitol, this being the safe of the state treasurer drawn on two bob-sleds by ten yoke of oxen, through snow and sleet. It was ten years later that the railroads reached Des Moines.

There was room in this little old temporary capitol for all state offices, the legislature and the supreme court, and it was used in whole or in part for about thirty years.

#### Building of the Capitol

The Thirteenth General Assembly in an act approved by Governor Merrill April 13, 1870, made first appropriation for a permanent state capitol. This appropriation was for \$150,000. The act created a commission of nine members authorized to start the work after adopting a plan for a structure that should not cost to exceed a million and a half dollars, with preference for material found in the state. The foundation was commenced with a poor quality of stone, so that after its first winter, its unsuitability was seen and it was nearly all taken out by the second capitol commission.

The Fourteenth General Assembly reorganized the commission and appointed four persons to commence over and proceeded with the construction, which second commission was organized April 17, 1872. The commission appointed one of its members to be superintendent of construction and the members gave their personal attention to the work until completed.

The first capitol commission was selected by political favor and was too large to be efficient. The second commission included an accountant, an engineer and a builder. The selection of the plan for the building was difficult, but by a combination of plans submitted and worked over by the architect of the capitol at Washington and later handled in detail by a French architect who had had experience with large buildings, the design was acceptable. There was much stormy effort to reduce the cost by cheapening the building but the commission succeeded in getting appropriations from session to session to finish it. There was much jealousy of Des Moines and almost every effort to get money for the capitol was hailed as a nefarious scheme of Des Moines to wrest money from the state. By resolution of the legislature Robert Finkbine, one of the commissioners, was made superintendent of construction and all the work was done by day labor under selected foremen.

The state capitol was not really completed when the legislature repealed the law and gave the executive council a small sum to temporarily finish some of the rooms. The actual construction work had gone on for fourteen years. The commission made strenuous efforts to get larger appropriations and finish the work sooner and at less cost.

The governor appointed an auditor to check over all the books and accounts and bills for errors, and his report showed the net errors amounted to \$3.77 on the more than two and a half million dollars of expenditures.

A special commission was named in 1900 to recommend as to completion of the capitol and modernization, and upon its report the third capitol commission was created to do the work. This commission finished the work in 1907.

At the corner stone laying in 1871, Governor Merrill delivered the chief address, and on the formal inauguration of the capitol for use January 17, 1884, John A. Kasson delivered a notable address reviewing Iowa history. The supreme court chambers were dedicated in June, 1886, on which occasion Samuel F. Miller of the United States supreme court delivered the dedicatory address.

The original architects were Cochrane & Piquenard, of Springfield, Ill., and both died before the work was completed. Bell & Hackney who had worked with them, succeeded to the supervision, but Bell resigned to become chief architect of the treasury department at Washington, and W. F. Hackney directed the completion. The last work on the capitol was under direction of A. B. Funk, E. P. Schoentgen and Chas. A. Cumming.

#### Material for the Building

The effort of the first capitol commission to use Iowa stone for the basement proved disastrous, though Iowa stone was later used for the foundation. The first stone put in proved to be porous and it broke up the first winter. The second commission found better stone. The corner stone that had been laid in 1871, containing a box with much historical material, had the names on its face of the first commissioners and the architects. These were cut off and the simple "1873" placed on the face as it is now when the stone was re-laid.

The coarse stone for the basement story is from a quarry on the Iowa river. The granite course above was made from boulders picked up in Iowa where they were left by glaciers. The buff colored sandstone of the main structure came from Carroll county, Missouri, and the bluish stone from St. Genevieve, Missouri.

The original floors were all of the encaustic tile, which is no longer made; the columns in the legislative halls are of scagliola or artificial stone; the columns in the rotunda are of either granite from Minnesota or Missouri stone. The wainscoating is in the main from Tennessee marble, as also the antique fireplaces, but there is some imported marble used, especially the black Belgian. The finish in the executive office is in cherry wood and in some others catalpa and butternut are used. The opening in the main floor of the rotunda was made by the third capitol commission to give light to the basement floor which had been originally planned only for storage.

The interior of the north wing was badly burned by a fire of unknown origin January 4, 1904; the ceiling of the hall of the house fell down, the desks were burned and much damage done by water; and the house was temporarily covered with canvas during the session that commenced a few days later.

## The Iowa State Capitol Park

**T**HERE is no state capitol with as large or fine a state park surrounding it as that of Iowa. Originally the grounds included only about nine acres. Some other ground was purchased but not until 1915 was the state induced to provide a proper setting for its state working equipment. Under the administration of Governor Clarke, and urged by the late Edgar R. Harlan, provision was made for enlargement by purchase of all sorts of buildings and clearing the unsightly fences and barns from the tract. This gave the state more than 93 acres of ground, at a cost of about three million dollars. The park was then landscaped and the legislature fixed by law the location and character of all buildings and improvements later to be made. A tunnel a quarter mile long was built so the heating plant could be located at the foot of Thirteenth street, far from the state house.

The third commission took down the engineer's office on Grand avenue and built the stone warehouse for holding the state books and documents, back of which is the present heating plant and the general warehouse. The one residence not taken down was retained and is now the office of the state board of health on Des Moines street. A former apartment house on Des Moines street houses two state bureaus, and the old schoolhouse on Pennsylvania avenue has other state offices. The old east high school on Court avenue was also purchased and remodeled for state office purposes, to be used temporarily.

The State Historical department is located in a large building northeast of the capitol, on adjacent ground, and this was built in 1899-1900. It is elsewhere described.

The most conspicuous feature of the capitol park is the great monument to the soldiers and sailors of the Civil war which stands almost where the temporary state capitol was located for many years. This was built from a general design prepared by Harriet A. Ketcham, an Iowa sculptor, of Mt. Pleasant, and was finished in 1886. It is crowned by a statue representing "Victory", and there are figures representing different branches of the army and navy, and relief portraits of eminent or typical Iowa soldiers. There are also war scenes in relief.

Near this is the monument to the late Senator Wm. B. Allison, erected by the beneficence of General Grenville M. Dodge. It is an allegorical group surrounded by a fountain and represents the achievements of peace.

Christopher Columbus is remembered by a small but fine memorial not far away, erected by the Iowa citizens of Italian descent.

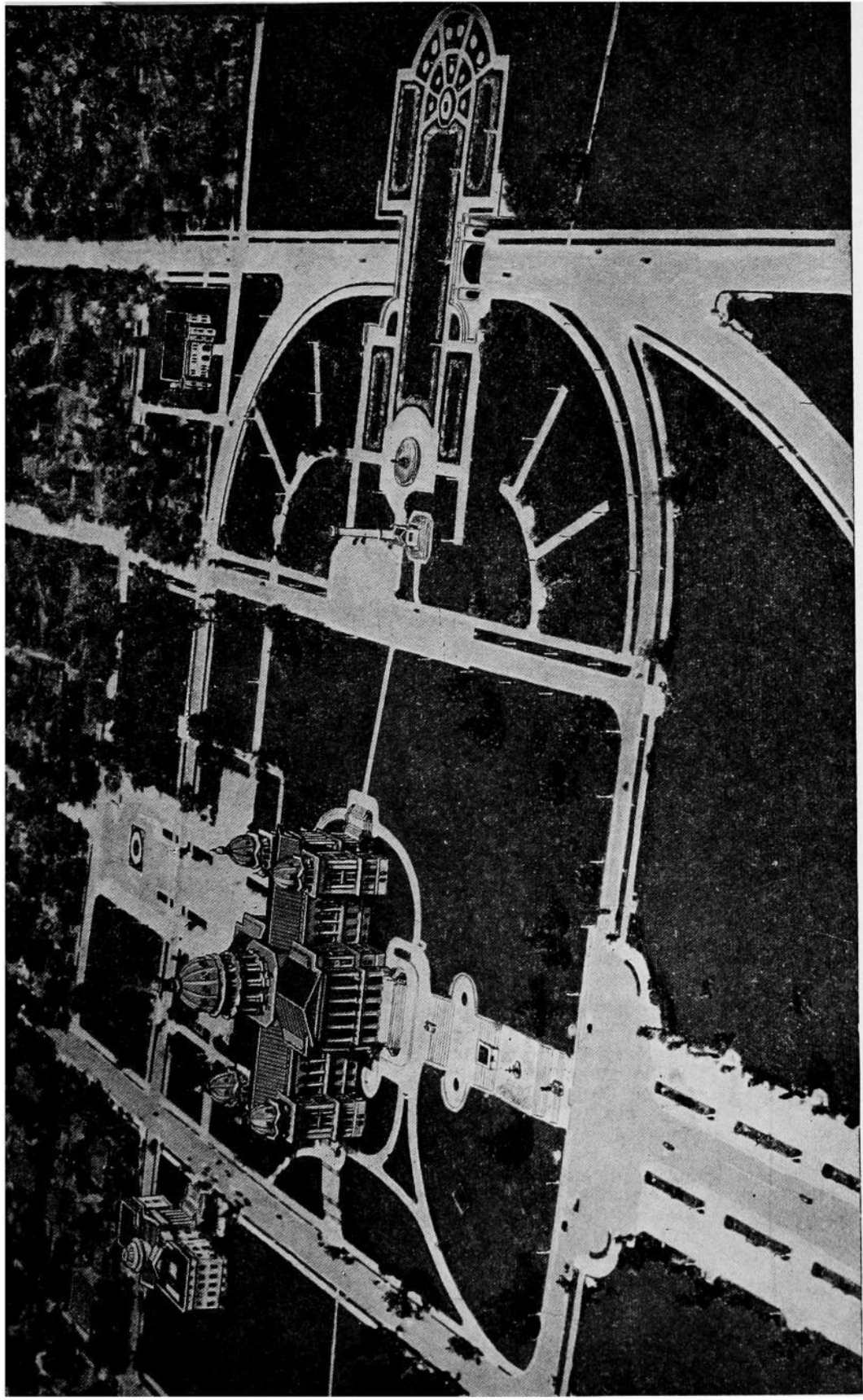
The tomb of Willson Alexander Scott is located on the hill overlooking the railroad tracks, in commemoration of his work in giving the ground for the capitol and his pioneering activities.

At the west entrance to the capitol steps there is a fine bronze figure representing the pioneer looking to the west.

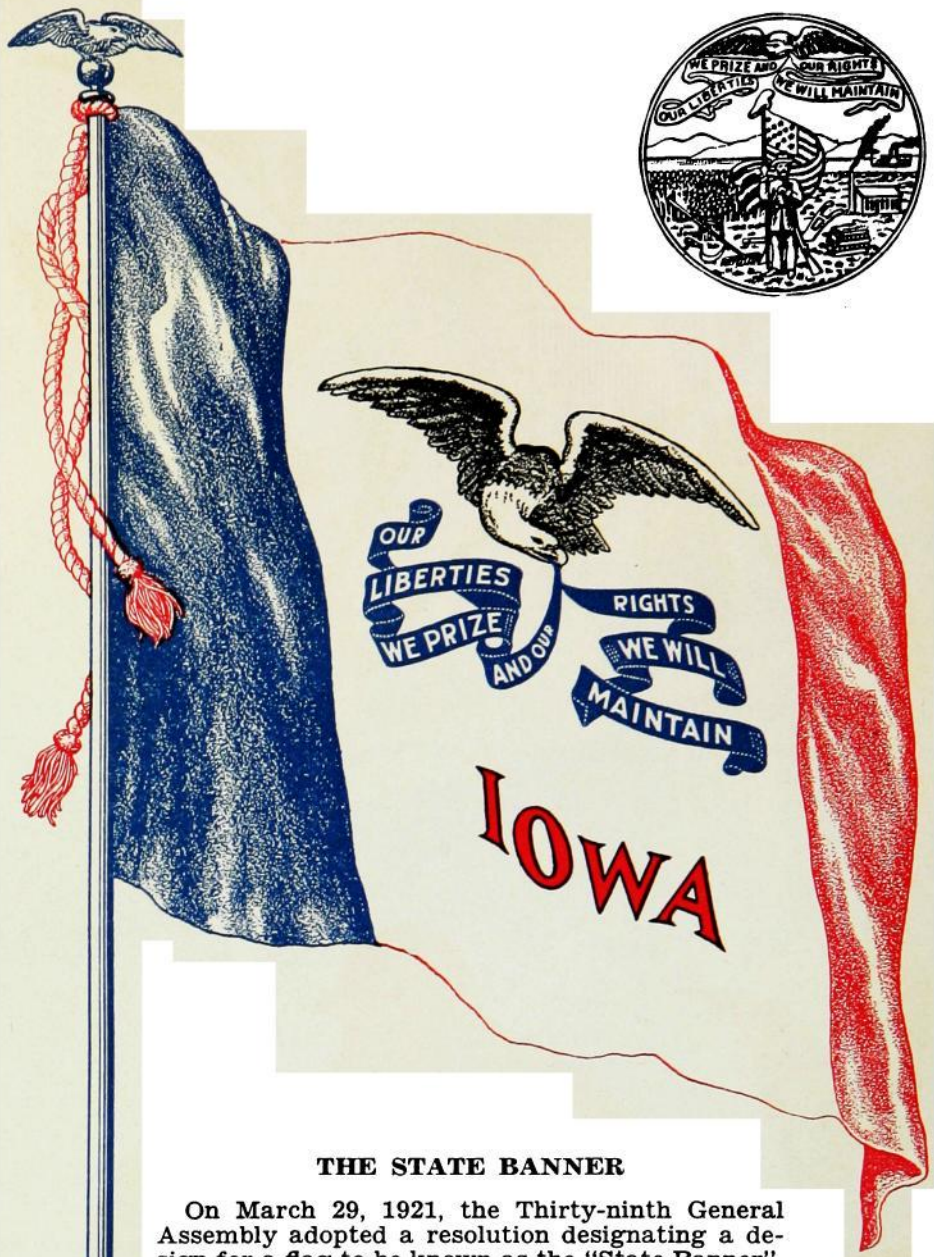
There are some Civil war cannons and a mortar of Civil war days and near the historical building is a bronze cannon taken in the Spanish war.

A granite block east of the capitol is dedicated to the men of the Spanish-American and other wars.

Extensive flower gardens are maintained on the ground south of the Allison monument.

### THE STATE BANNER

On March 29, 1921, the Thirty-ninth General Assembly adopted a resolution designating a design for a flag to be known as the "State Banner".

The banner was designed by the "Iowa Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution", and consists of three vertical stripes of blue, white and red, with the blue stripes nearest the staff and the white stripe in the center depicting a spreading eagle bearing in its beak blue streamers on which is inscribed in white letters the state motto, "Our liberties we prize and our rights we will maintain". The word "Iowa" in red letters is just below the streamers.

The Wild Rose was officially designated as the flower of the state by the Twenty-sixth General Assembly in extraordinary session. The resolution was adopted May 7, 1897.



**THE EASTERN GOLD FINCH, THE STATE BIRD OF IOWA**

The Forty-fifth General Assembly, by a concurrent resolution adopted March 22, 1933, designated the Eastern Goldfinch, (*Spinus tristis tristis*), as the official Iowa bird. The Goldfinch is generally designated as a wild canary.

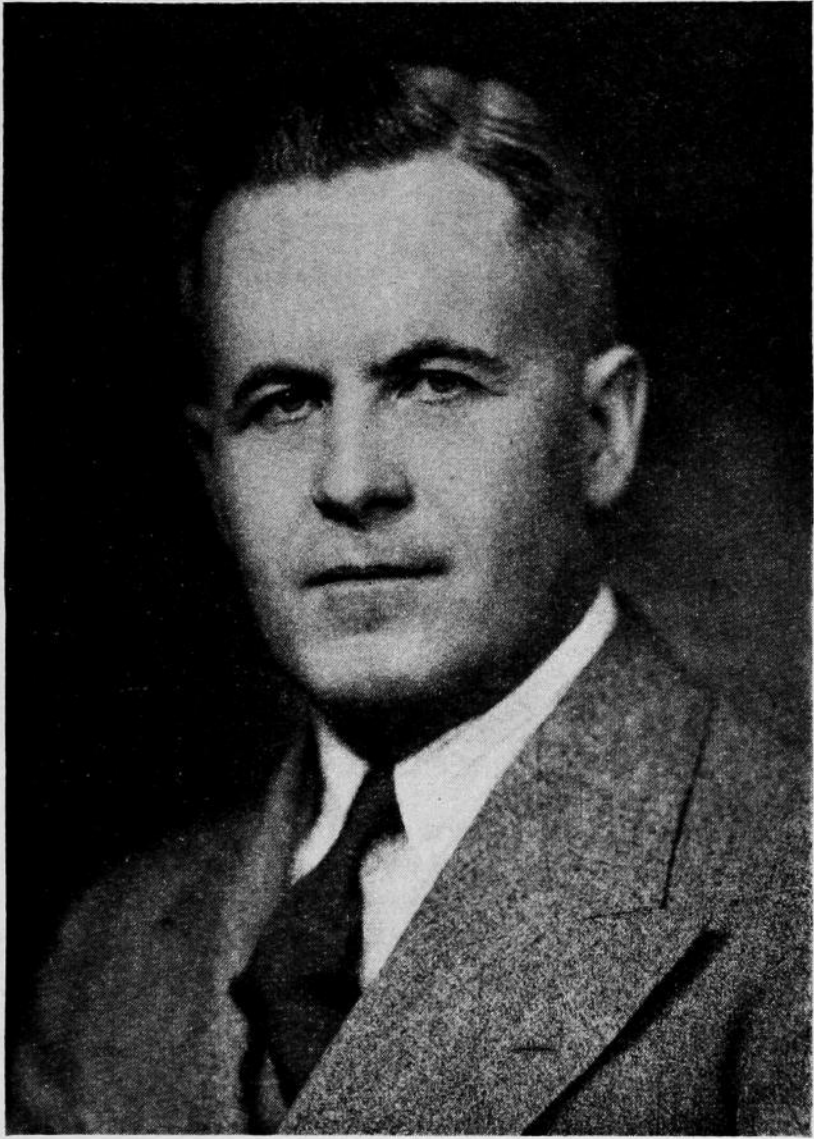
## **BOURKE B. HICKENLOOPER**

**Cedar Rapids**

**Republican**

Born in Blockton, Iowa, July 21, 1896, son of Nathan O. and Margaret A. Hickenlooper, both of whom were born in Taylor county. Graduate of Iowa State College department of industrial science and of the Iowa law school of the University of Iowa. Entered the practice of law in Cedar Rapids, Iowa, in 1922. Served twenty-one months in the army during the World War, a portion of which was spent overseas with the 339th Field Artillery. Married in 1927 to Verna E. Bensch, and has two children, Jane Carroll and David B. Member of the Consistory and Shrine, B. P. O. E., Odd Fellows, Moose, American Legion, and Veterans of Foreign Wars. ### ROBERT D. BLUE

**Eagle Grove**

*Republican*

Born at Eagle Grove, Iowa, September 24, 1898, son of Donald and Myrtle E. Blue. Attended Eagle Grove high school, C.C.C. College at Des Moines, Iowa State College, and was graduated from the College of Law at Drake University in 1922. Has been engaged in the practice of law with the firm of Hobbet, Blue and Blue since that time. In addition to his law practice, he is actively engaged in operating a 150-acre corn-hog farm, located near Eagle Grove. County attorney of Wright county October, 1924, until January, 1931. Past city attorney. Delegate to the Republican National Convention in 1932. Married Cathlene Beale of Tama; two children, Barbara, 15, and Donald, 13. World war veteran, member of Masonic Lodge, Methodist church, American Legion, Sigma Alpha Epsilon and Phi Alpha Delta. Elected to legislature in 1934, 1936, 1938, and 1940. Republican floor leader in the 47th and 48th General Assemblies, Speaker of the House in the 49th General Assembly, and Lieutenant Governor in the 50th General Assembly.

### **GUY M. GILLETTE**

**Cherokee**

*Democrat*

Born in Cherokee, Iowa, February 3, 1879, and attended public schools; graduated from the Drake University College of Law; served as prosecuting attorney of Cherokee county, 1907-09; member of state senate, 1912-16; served as sergeant in the Spanish-American war and as captain of infantry in France during World war; after return from France was engaged in farming; married and has one son; elected to the 73d Congress in 1932 from the Ninth Iowa District; re-elected to the 74th Congress, and served until his resignation on November 3, 1936, having been elected to the United States Senate to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Louis Murphy; was re-elected United States Senator for the full term November 8, 1938.

### **GEORGE A. WILSON**

**Des Moines**

*Republican*

Born April 1, 1884, on a farm near Menlo, Adair county, Iowa, the youngest son of James H. and Martha G. Wilson. He attended rural schools and was graduated from the Menlo high school. He later attended Grinnell College and was graduated from the law school of the State University of Iowa in 1907. His political career began with election as county attorney in Polk county. Subsequently he has served as judge in the district court for two years, which position he resigned to again undertake the practice of law. He was elected to the state senate from Polk county in 1926, and was subsequently re-elected in 1930 and 1934. Elected governor 1938; re-elected 1940. Elected U. S. Senator in 1942. He was married to Miss Mildred Zehner, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. James Zehner, December 8, 1921. He is the father of three sons, James, George, Jr., and John, and one daughter, Mary.

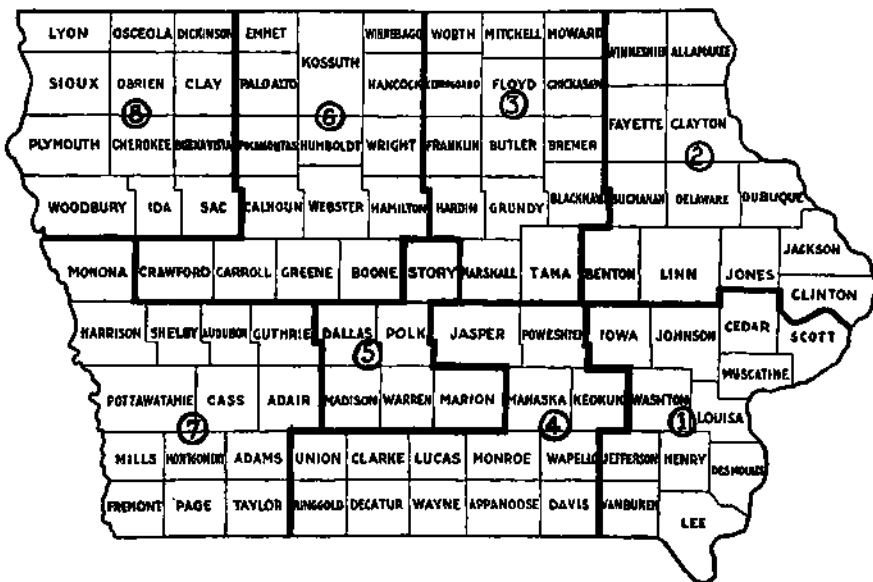
# Iowa Congressional Districts

By act of the Forty-ninth General Assembly, which convened January 13, 1941, the state of Iowa was redistricted both congressionally and senatorially.

## Congressional Districts

Senate File 540, "to redistrict the state into eight congressional districts" shall be effective as to the nomination and election of representatives in Congress for this state in 1942 and succeeding years. It does not affect the law concerning the filling of vacancies, should any occur in the Seventy-seventh Congress, nor does it affect the terms of office of officials now holding certificates of election from the various congressional districts of Iowa.

Congressional districts include the following counties:



First District—Lee, Van Buren, Des Moines, Henry, Jefferson, Washington, Louisa, Muscatine, Scott, Cedar, Johnson and Iowa.

Second District—Winneshiek, Allamakee, Fayette, Clayton, Buchanan, Delaware, Dubuque, Jackson, Clinton, Jones, Linn and Benton.

Third District—Worth, Mitchell, Howard, Cerro Gordo, Floyd, Chickasaw, Franklin, Butler, Bremer, Hardin, Grundy, Black Hawk, Marshall and Tama.

Fourth District—Jasper, Poweshiek, Mahaska, Keokuk, Union, Clarke, Lucas, Monroe, Wapello, Ringgold, Decatur, Wayne, Appanoose and Davis.

Fifth District—Story, Dallas, Polk, Madison, Warren and Marion.

Sixth District—Emmet, Kossuth, Palo Alto, Winnebago, Hancock, Wright, Humboldt, Pocahontas, Calhoun, Webster, Hamilton, Crawford, Carroll, Greene and Boone.

Seventh District—Monona, Harrison, Shelby, Audubon, Guthrie, Pottawattamie, Cass, Adair, Mills, Adams, Montgomery, Fremont, Page and Taylor.

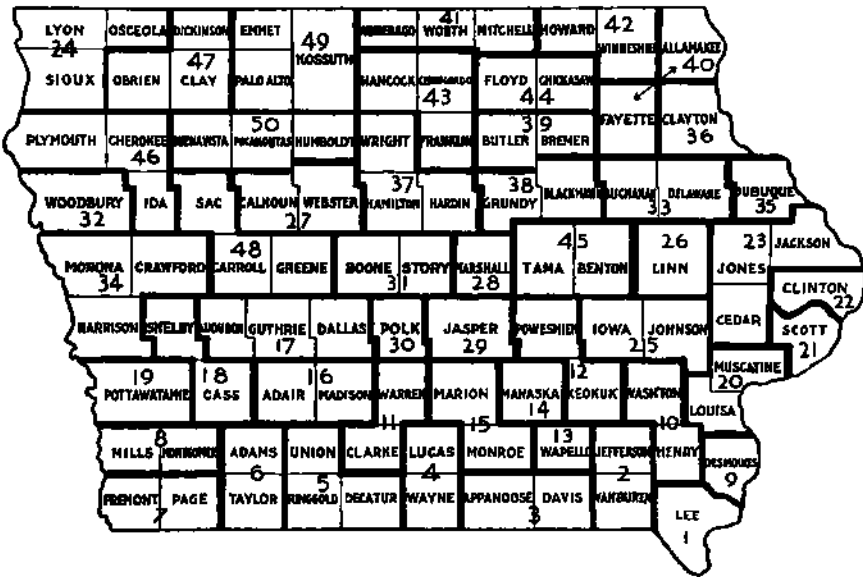
Eighth District—Lyon, Osceola, Dickinson, Sioux, O'Brien, Clay, Plymouth, Cherokee, Buena Vista, Woodbury, Ida and Sac.



# Senatorial Districts

Senate File 539, "relating to revision of certain senatorial districts", shall be effective as to the nomination and election of senators in the General Assembly of Iowa in 1944 and succeeding years, but shall not affect the terms of office of Senators now holding certificates of election from the present senatorial districts of Iowa, and in the event any vacancy shall occur in any Senatorial seat prior to the second Monday in January, 1945, it shall be filled on the basis of the Senatorial districts now existing.

Thomas Ellsworth Martin, Republican, of Iowa City, Iowa; born in Melrose, Monroe county, Iowa, January 18, 1893; attended country school in Monroe county and grade and high schools in Russell, Iowa; attended and graduated Albia high school, State University of Iowa, 1916; juris doctor degree, Law College, State University of Iowa, 1927; Order of Coif; awarded university fellowship by Columbia University; LL.M. degree, Columbia University, 1928; accountant and lawyer; admitted to Iowa bar, 1927; member Johnson county, Iowa State and American Bar Associations; city solicitor of Iowa City, 1933-35; mayor of Iowa City, 1935-37; Republican nominee for railroad commissioner of Iowa in 1932 and 1934; permanent chairman, Iowa state presidential convention, February 28, 1936; graduate, First Officers' Training Camp, Leon Springs, Texas, 1917; commissioned United States Regular Army; served with Thirty-fifth Infantry throughout the war; retired November 10, 1919; assistant professor military science and tactics, University of Iowa, 1921-23; sales analyst, Goodyear Tire and Rubber Co., 1916-17 and 1920-21; married Dorris Jeannette Brownlee of Waterloo, Iowa, June 5, 1920; children, Richard Coupland and Dorris Brownlee, 2d (Mrs. Raymond Reiser); elected to the Seventy-sixth, Seventy-seventh and Seventy-eighth Congresses.

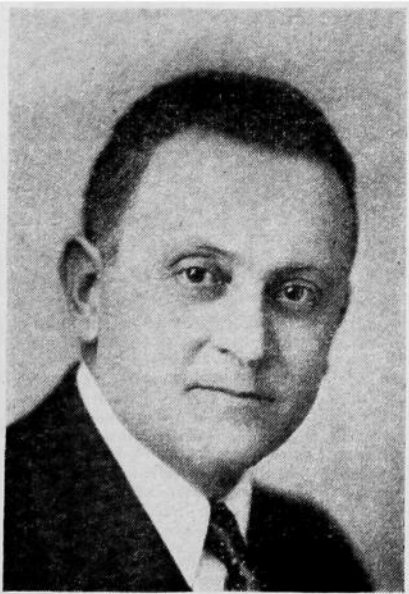


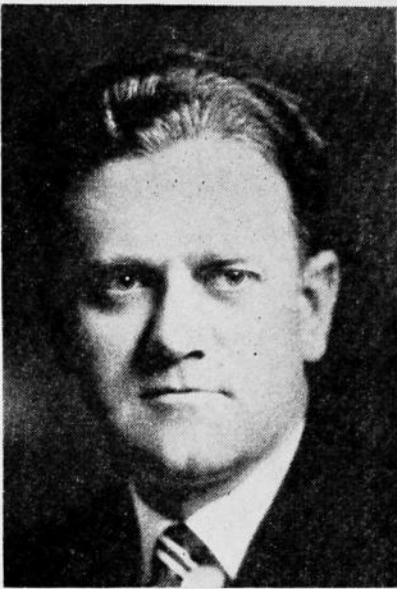
**TALLE, Henry O.**

Became professor of economics, Luther College, Decorah, 1921; served until 1938. Treasurer of college 1932-1938. Served in U. S. navy during World war, commissioned ensign. Elected to the 76th Congress from the Fourth District in 1938; re-elected to the 77th Congress in 1940. Elected to the 78th Congress from the Second District.





**GWYNNE, John W.**

*Republican*

**Third District Congressman—Waterloo**

Born in Iowa county, Iowa, October 20, 1889; received degree of B.A. in 1912 and LL.B. in 1914, from the State University of Iowa; judge of the municipal court of Waterloo, Iowa, for six years; served in the World war with the 88th Division; married and has two children, Mary and John, Jr.; elected to the 74th, 75th, 76th, 77th and 78th Congresses.

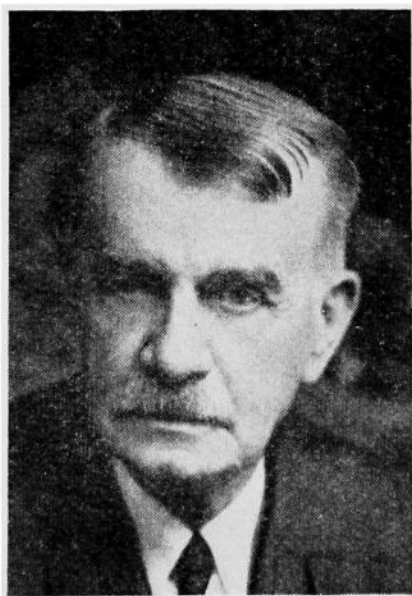


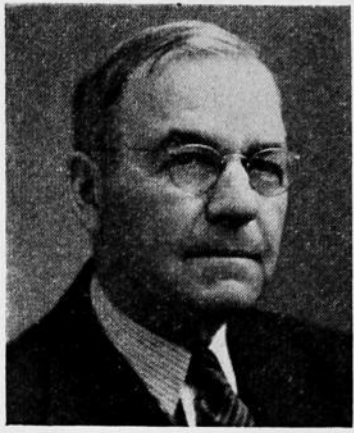
**HALE, Oscar, Wapello** *Republican*

*Democrat*

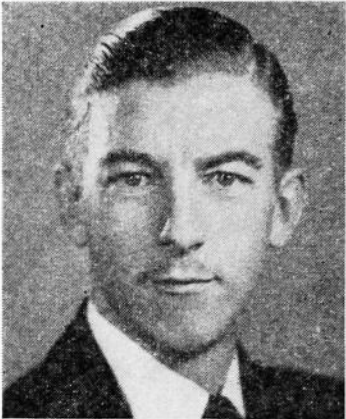

## GOVERNOR

The supreme executive power of the state is vested in the governor, whose term of office is two years.

No person is eligible who has not been a citizen of the United States and a resident of this state two years next preceding the election, and attained the age of thirty years at the time of said election.

He is commander-in-chief of the military forces of the state.

He transacts all executive business with the officers of government, civil and military.

When any office, from any cause, becomes vacant, and no mode is provided by the constitution and laws for filling such vacancy, the governor has power to fill such vacancy.

He may convene the general assembly in extraordinary session.

He is required to communicate, by message, to the general assembly, at every regular session, the condition of the state, and may make such recommendations to the body as he shall judge expedient.

In case of disagreement between the two houses with respect to the time of adjournment, the governor has power to adjourn the general assembly to such time as he may think proper; but no such adjournment shall be beyond the time fixed for the regular meeting of the next general assembly.

All bills, including appropriations, must be submitted to him for approval, and a two-thirds vote of both branches of the legislature is required to pass a bill over his veto.

The governor has power to grant reprieves, commutations and pardons, after conviction, for all offenses except treason and cases of impeachment. Upon conviction for treason, he has power to suspend the execution of the sentence until the case shall be reported to the general assembly. He has power to remit fines and forfeitures, and shall report to the general assembly, at its next meeting each case of reprieve, commutation or pardon granted, and the reason therefor.

He appoints all principal officers of the state not elected by the people, and certain officers connected with the state government, by and with the consent of the senate.

He signs patents for state lands, and appoints and commissions notaries public and commissioners in other states to take acknowledgments of deeds for this state.

He may demand fugitives from justice from the executives of other states, and may issue warrants, upon the requests of other governors, for fugitives found in this state.

The Lieutenant Governor is elected for a term of two years and is required to have the same qualifications, as to age and residence, as the Governor.

In case of the death, impeachment, resignation, removal from office, or other disability of the Governor, the powers and duties of that office devolve upon the Lieutenant Governor, as Acting Governor.

The Lieutenant Governor is president of the senate, but can only vote when the senate is equally divided. In case of his death or other disability incapacitating him from discharging the duties of his office, the same devolve upon the president pro tempore of the senate.

He receives the same mileage and expense allowance as a member and double the compensation of a senator. He maintains an office at the capitol building only during the meetings of the general assembly.

The office of Secretary of State is established by the Constitution of Iowa. The four departments of the office are the Land Office, the Real Estate Department, the Division of Corporations and Trade Marks, and the general or custodial office.

Through his general office the Secretary of State serves as custodian of original and official documents of the state, including the constitution, the official copies of the statutes of Iowa, authenticated journals of the General Assembly, and election records. The bonds of various elective and appointive officials are filed in this department.

The State Land Office maintains the records of the annexation or severance of territory of the state and of incorporated cities and towns. Records of original patents issued by the state are also kept in the State Land Office.

The Real Estate Department, of which the Secretary of State is commissioner, is administered under the direct supervision of a secretary. Licensure of real estate brokers and salesmen is administered by the Real Estate Office.

Under the law of Iowa, charters of corporations for pecuniary profit and cooperative associations are granted by the Secretary of State. Foreign corporations doing business in Iowa are required to obtain permits from that officer. Protective registration of trade marks, labels and forms of advertising is provided by the state department. These statutes are administered by the division of corporations and trademarks.

The Secretary of State is an ex-officio member of the State Executive Council, the State Board of Health, the State Printing Board and the State Permit Board.

The Auditor of State is a constitutional official and at least once each year, makes full settlement between the state and all state officers and departments and all persons receiving or expending state funds, and makes a complete audit of the books, records and accounts of every department of state. These departments include the office of the governor, the executive council, state comptroller, secretary of state, state treasurer, attorney general, supreme court, superintendent of printing, adjutant general, state board of control and all institutions under its control, department of health, board of education and all institutions under its control, department of public instruction, department of agriculture, highway commission, liquor commission, state fair board, state tax commission (including sales, income, and chain-store tax divisions),

board of railroad commissioners, banking department, fish and game department, state relief associations, and all other departments, boards and commissions.

The Auditor of State also has charge of the municipal finance department, the county accounting department, the fiscal affairs of all political subdivisions including schools and school districts and building and loan associations. He appoints the county examiners, the municipal and school examiners, and the examiners of building and loan associations, examining their reports, conferring and discussing with said examiners the affairs of the counties, cities, etc., as disclosed by the reports, advising, suggesting and recommending such changes in policy as he deems expedient. All reports by building and loan associations and all fees, except fees for incorporation, are paid to him. No building and loan association can transact business in the state without a certificate of authority from the Auditor of State.

All offices of the 99 counties are examined annually, as well as all cities and townships or municipal corporations with a population of 2,000 or more and school districts with a population of 5,000 or more, but in cities, towns and school districts the audits are optional with the governing bodies and are made upon request.

For the purpose of examining, auditing and checking, the various departments of the state may be classified roughly into three groups, viz.: all those departments, boards and commissions located in or adjacent to the state house; the state highway commission and the institutions under control of the board of control and the board of education; counties, cities, towns and schools.

The Auditor of State submits annual and biennial reports to the governor, as well as individual audit reports. The annual reports are on municipal finances, and the biennial reports on the operations of the auditor's office, and on the state and county, and building and loan affairs, are as narrative and statistical as the auditor deems necessary, and the individual audit reports contain schedules, exhibits, comparative figures, etc.

*Ex officio*, the Auditor of State is a member of the executive council, printing board, geological board, bonus board, and department of health.

### TREASURER OF STATE

The Treasurer of State is a constitutional official. The public revenues of the state are received and disbursed by the treasury department. A record is maintained to show the sources of all income, the funds to which such incomes apply, the dates received, and the amounts received. Disbursements are made only upon warrants issued as certified by the state comptroller. A record is kept of each warrant paid, as well as the date of issuance, date of payment, to whom paid and against which fund such warrant is drawn.

When remittance of state revenue is made by bank draft, check or money order, such items are deposited for collection in a bank or banks in the state which have previously been duly designated and approved as depositories for state funds.

The Treasurer of State, with the consent and approval of the executive council, may designate banks in the state of Iowa as depositories of state funds in amounts not exceeding the limits fixed by said council.

The Treasurer of State also handles funds diverted under the public fund deposit guarantee acts of the Forty-first General Assembly, reimbursing losses of public funds which may be sustained on deposits in banks placed in receivership for liquidation.

The Treasurer of State is *ex officio* treasurer of the Employment Security Commission.

The Treasurer of State shall maintain in the state treasury a cash balance sufficient to pay the anticipated expenditures by the Highway Commission for the ensuing month. When necessary to restore the cash balance in the state treasury, he shall draw against the motor vehicle funds collected by the treasurers of each county of the state in proportion to the amounts in their possession respectively, a sum sufficient in the aggregate to restore said cash balance. Such drafts shall be honored by the treasurer of each county upon presentation.

Acts of the Forty-fifth General Assembly, Extraordinary Session, require the Treasurer of State to collect from distributors a license fee of three cents per gallon on all gasoline used in the state of Iowa, except federal and state owned cars and equipment. Provision was made for the refund of the license fee paid when the gasoline was not used on the public highways. Five-ninths of the proceeds is distributed to the primary road fund, and four-ninths to the secondary road funds of the several counties of the state.

All accounts of the treasury department are audited daily by the Auditor of State and examined quarterly under the direction of the Governor.

The Attorney General is a constitutional official and he is elected for a period of two years.

It is the duty of the Attorney General to appear for the state, prosecute or defend all actions and proceedings, civil and criminal, in which the state shall be a party or interested, when requested to do so by the governor, executive council or general assembly, or he may so appear on his own motion; and shall prosecute or defend for the state all causes in the supreme court in which the state is a party or interested.

The Attorney General is given supervisory power over county attorneys.

He shall also, when requested, give his opinion in writing upon all questions of law submitted to him by the General Assembly or any state department.

It is also the duty of the Attorney General to prepare drafts for contracts, forms and other writings which may be required for the use of

the state, and shall at the close of each biennial period report to the Governor the condition of his office, the opinions rendered and the business transacted in the office.

The Attorney General is *ex officio* a member of the state printing board.

The Iowa Department of Agriculture was created by the Fortieth General Assembly in 1923 for the express purpose of promoting and advancing the interests of agriculture. In creating an agricultural department, the legislature abolished a number of existing bureaus and commissions, consolidated their work by placing it under the direction of one administrative officer who was made an elective state official.

At the present time, the Department of Agriculture is responsible for the administration of forty-seven laws and employs a field force of thirty-three inspectors and eleven district veterinarians.

The Iowa Department of Agriculture is a most important branch of our state government. Its functions and services vitally affect the health and welfare of every person in the state. Public health is protected by the enforcement of sanitary laws relating to the production, manufacture, processing and sale of food products. Business interests and consumers alike are protected through the elimination of unfair competition by the impartial enforcement of laws relating to the adulteration and mislabeling of foods, paints, petroleum products, insecticides, feeds, fertilizers and seeds. Agriculture is benefited by live stock disease control, farm storage of grain, the promotion of farm shows and exhibits, control of noxious weeds and insect pests, and the enforcement of labeling and standardization laws relating to agricultural feeds, seeds and fertilizers. In addition, the department, in cooperation with the federal government, is responsible for service reports concerning weather, markets and crops, and live stock production estimates.

In 1878, the seventeenth General Assembly created a board of railroad commissioners consisting of three members to be appointed by the governor and confirmed by the executive council. In 1888, the twenty-second General Assembly passed a law making the commissioners elective. In 1937, the forty-seventh General Assembly, by house file 133, changed the name from "board of railroad commissioners" to "Iowa state commerce commission."

The powers and duties of the Iowa state commerce commission are: To generally supervise all railroads in the state, both steam and electric, except street railroads; to inquire into any neglect or violation of the laws of the state by any railroad corporation doing business therein; to make examinations and inspections of the physical condition, conduct and management of such railroads and report their condition to said companies; to stop and prevent railroad companies, under certain circumstances, from running or passing their trains over unsafe bridges; to adjudge changes in station houses, rolling stock and rates of fare; to pass on necessity for spur tracks to be constructed and maintained not exceeding three miles in length to an existing industry under terms and conditions approved by the commission as set out by law; to make reasonable rules for the crossing of steam and interurban railways and to require, when necessary, interlocking switches at railroad crossings; to make report on first Monday in December in each year to the Governor of its doings for the preceding year, accompanied with appropriate suggestions and recommendations; to receive, tabulate and report upon the annual reports filed with it by railroad companies; to examine any of the books, papers or documents of any such corporation; to examine under oath employees of such corporation; to issue subpoenas, administer oaths and compel the attendance of witnesses; to make and fix maximum schedules of freight rates for such corporations, such schedules to be deemed reasonable until disproved; to examine into rates in force, upon complaint that the rate charged by a railroad company, or that the maximum rates fixed by the commission are unreasonably high or discriminating, and to fix the rate again, which must not be higher than

any rate established by law, such decision of the commission is prima facie evidence that the rate so made is a reasonable minimum rate; to bring suits to enforce its orders; to inquire into the management of the business of such carriers and to obtain from them full and complete information necessary to enable the commissioners to carry out the objects of the law; to hear, investigate and determine all complaints alleging unreasonable rates, unjust discrimination, undue preference, violation of the long and short haul clause, or other infractions of the commission law, and make proper orders thereupon; to establish joint through rates, upon application, over two or more connecting lines; and to have the same authority over express companies as the act confers concerning railroads.

Before a railroad company may appropriate coal, coke, or oil received for shipment, it must first secure the written consent of the commerce commission.

Before any railway company may condemn lands for additional depot grounds, or for straightening or relocating track, the permission of the commission must be obtained. Interlocking switches may be placed at grade railroad crossings or draw bridges, thus obviating the necessity of stopping trains before passing over such grade crossings or draw bridges, but before the interlocking switch may be used consent of the commission must be obtained.

The thirty-fifth General Assembly gave to the commission the power to grant to individuals or corporations "engaged in the manufacture, sale, or distribution for sale of electric current for light, power, or heating purposes, the right within the state, except in cities and towns, to erect and maintain poles, wires, towers, fixtures and other necessary construction for the purpose of conducting electricity for lighting, power and heating purposes, over, along and across any public land, highways or streams or the lands of any person or persons, and to acquire the necessary interests in real estate therefor." It also provided that transmission lines proceeding under the provisions of the law should be subject to "such reasonable regulations as the commission may from time to time prescribe."

The commission is directed by an act of the thirty-ninth General Assembly to "undertake and carry forward such investigation and preparation as shall be necessary to properly represent the interests of the state in connection with the valuation of the property of common carriers now being conducted by the interstate commerce commission."

An act of the forty-sixth General Assembly amended by the forty-eighth General Assembly provides that operators of grain elevators must be licensed in order to receive grain for storage. It also makes provisions for using warehouse receipts issued by the warehouseman on his own products and on products for others as collateral for financing loans. The act also provides for storage of other agricultural products and products principally consumed on farms, in warehouses of types different to that of grain elevators which covers such products as wool, canned goods, sugar, seeds, commercial feeds, etc.

The fortieth General Assembly conferred on the commission the power to issue certificates authorizing motor carriers to operate over the public highways of the state, upon a showing that the proposed service would promote "the public convenience" and authorized the board to prescribe rules and regulations for the operation of motor vehicles used by such carriers "for the protection and safety of the public." The forty-first General Assembly revised the laws on this subject, but left their administration with the railroad commission.

The forty-third General Assembly provided for the supervision or regulation by the commission of persons operating motor trucks principally used for the public transportation of freight for compensation, not operating over regular routes nor between fixed termini.

Under the act of the forty-third General Assembly before an airport is acquired by any city or town plans and specifications must be approved by the board.

The forty-fourth General Assembly provided that pipe lines shall be subject to regulation by the board under a permit issued by the board.

The Thirty-fourth General Assembly created the office of commerce counsel, to be appointed by the Iowa state commerce commission for a term of four years, subject to confirmation by the senate. The law provides that the counsel may appoint assistants, subject to the approval of the commissioners.

The duties of the office briefly are as follows: legal advisor of the Iowa State Commerce Commission; investigate and present matters with reference to intrastate rates, and prosecute same before the Iowa State Commerce Commission or before any court to which same may be taken; investigate on his own motion, or at request of the State Commerce Commission, all matters involving interstate rates in which the people of Iowa are interested or affected, and present same to the Interstate Commerce Commission and prosecute to final determination; act as attorney and counsel for and represent the Iowa State Commerce Commission in all courts of this State or the United States, in which the validity of any order of the State Commerce Commission is in issue; to institute and prosecute in any of the courts any and all suits necessary for proper enforcement of any rule or order of the said Iowa State Commerce Commission or make defense therein wherever said rule or order may be questioned or involved.

The Adjutant General issues and transmits all orders of the commander-in-chief and keeps a record of all appointments of officers commissioned by the Governor, of all general and special orders and regulations, and of such matters as pertain to the organization of the military forces and the duties thereof. He has charge of the state arsenal and grounds and all other property of the state kept or used for military purposes. He furnishes at the expense of the state such blanks and forms as are approved by the commander-in-chief. In each year, preceding a regular session of the General Assembly, or at any other time the Governor may direct, he makes out a detailed report of the transactions of his office, the expenses thereof and such other matters as shall be required by the commander-in chief for the period since the last preceding report.

All muster rolls, reports, returns, enlistments, discharges and complete records of the national guard and state guard are filed and made

a matter of record in his office. The records of Iowa Soldiers of the Civil, Spanish-American, and World wars are on file in his office and all information desired from such records is furnished by him. Certificates of military service of Iowa soldiers of the late wars or past service in the organized militia and national guard and state guard are given by him under the seal of his office. He is disbursing officer of all state appropriations for the use and support of the national guard and as Adjutant General all military property is committed to his custody which he is required to issue for the use of the national guard and state guard, keeping an account of the same. He is required to furnish such reports of the national guard and state guard of the state as the war department may from time to time require.

The Conservation Commission makes recommendations for the acquirement of state parks and preserves, forests and other state conservation areas, and is charged with the duty of administering same. The

Commission is charged with the duty of protecting, propagating, increasing and preserving the fish, game, fur-bearing animals and protecting the birds of the state and the enforcement of laws relating thereto. The administration and enforcement of laws relating to boats and navigation in the state-owned inland waters of the state is a duty of the Commission. The Commission has jurisdiction over the state-owned meandered lakes and streams of the state and the construction of dams and other improvements relating to such waters.

In 1942 the Conservation Commission had jurisdiction over 86 state parks, recreation reserves, lake reserves, forest reserves, historic monuments, parkways, and wayside parks, 35,032.08 acres; one state forest nursery, 99.65 acres; 65 meandered lakes, 41,826 acres; 11 meandered streams, approximately 800 miles; 18 artificial lakes, 1,670 acres; 91 wildlife refugees, 49,408.96 acres; 86 public shooting grounds, 60,227.11 acres; one game bird hatchery, 184.32 acres; 42 fish producing units, containing 123 fish ponds; and two fish rescue stations.

The State Car Dispatcher buys and sells all the cars and trucks for use of the state of Iowa. A revolving fund of \$25,000 was set up by the Forty-ninth General Assembly from which is paid gasoline, oil, tires, repairs and all other general expenses incurred in the operation of state owned motor vehicles. He keeps a cost per mile, sets out the depreciation and administrative expense to be charged to each motor vehicle monthly.

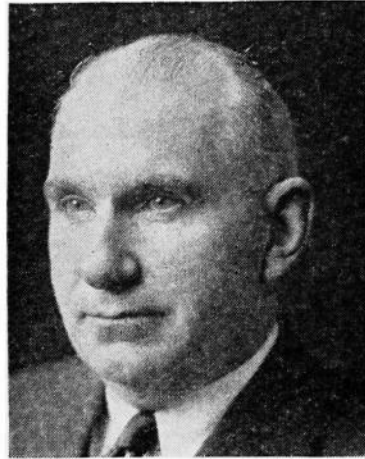

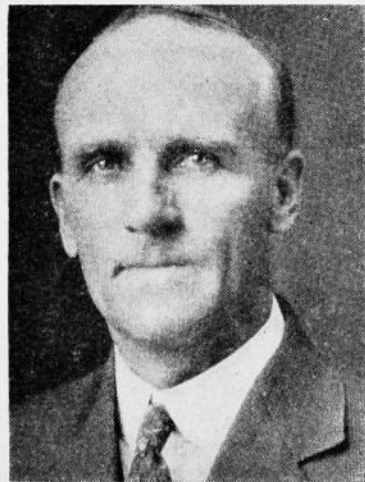

The board of control of state institutions was created under the provisions of chapter 118, laws of the Twenty-seventh General Assembly, which, with the amendments thereto, clothes the board with full power to manage, control and govern, subject only to the limitations contained in the act, the institutions under its management.

The board of control was organized on April 6, 1898, and took full control, as provided by statute, on July 1, 1898, of the institutions subject to its control.

The board is required to inspect county and private institutions in which insane persons are kept.

The board is required to investigate the management and financial condition of the state institutions under its control, to determine questions as to the sanity of patients in state hospitals, and to determine when persons shall be admitted to them as state charges, and is required to divide the state into hospital districts. It is required to make biennial reports to the Governor and legislature showing the cost of operating the institutions for the preceding two years and to visit all institutions twice each year. Some member of the board or its agent is required to visit each hospital for insane once each month. The board is required to meet the superintendents and other heads of institutions in quarterly conferences, to gather statistics, to require officials' bonds of certain institution officers, to make a semiannual invoice of all the stores of the institutions, to fix annually the salaries of officers and employees not fixed by law, and to perform other duties provided by law. Following is a list of the fifteen state institutions under the supervision of the board of control and the executive officer of each:

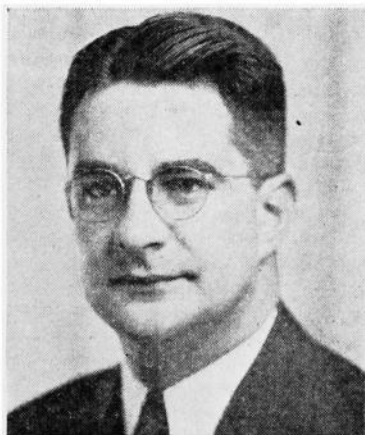

The Iowa state board of education was created by chapter 170, acts of the Thirty-third General Assembly, as the governing body for the State University, the Iowa State College of Agriculture and Mechanic Arts and the Iowa State Teachers College. The law went into effect July 1,

1909. Two years later chapter 141, enacted by the Thirty-fourth General Assembly, placed the school for the blind under the control of the board. Chapter 160, acts of the Thirty-seventh General Assembly, 1917, transferred the control and management of the school for the deaf to the board.

The board of education of nine members is appointed by the Governor for six-year terms, subject to approval by the senate. The board chooses from outside its own membership a finance committee of three members. The committee selects its chairman and secretary, the secretary of the committee also serving as secretary of the board, and he is in charge of the general offices and has his office at the seat of government.

#### IOWA SCHOOL FOR THE BLIND—VINTON

Leslie M. Hays, Superintendent

The aim and purpose of the Iowa School for the Blind is purely educational. The course of study includes not only the subjects leading up to and required for admission to the colleges and the universities of the state, but also subjects that aim to prepare the students for some of the occupations in which it has been demonstrated that the blind are usually successful. After a pupil of this school reaches the high school department, he is given some latitude in the choice of courses of study. Both literary and industrial work is required of all students, besides some music.

#### IOWA SCHOOL FOR THE DEAF—COUNCIL BLUFFS

Lloyd E. Berg, Superintendent

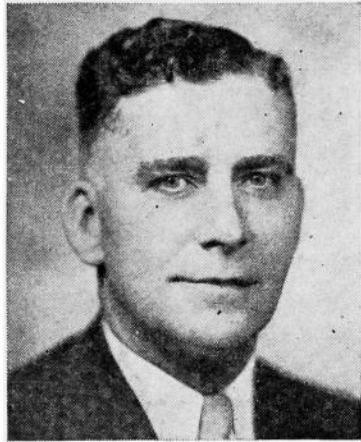
The Iowa School for the Deaf was founded in 1855, and was first located at Iowa City and then moved to Council Bluffs in 1870. In 1902, fire completely destroyed the main building, which housed the executive quarters and dormitories for pupils. A substantial fire-proof structure now stands in its place, where sufficient room is provided for 325 pupils. There is a separate building to accommodate seventy-five of the youngest pupils. The school affords an education for children of the state, too deaf to make proper progress in the hearing schools. The entrance age is five years and students are required to remain in school until nineteen years of age unless excused for good cause. The work embraces thirteen years with training largely through writing, speech, lip-reading and through the use of hearing aids where possible. The course of study provides a strong elementary education together with a substantial vocational training. The philosophy of the school is to bring the child with impaired hearing as near the normal as possible. Pupils of the school become skilled workmen and graduates, with remarkably few exceptions, are self-supporting, useful citizens of the state.

This Commission is charged with the responsibility of administering the Iowa Employment Security Law, for the payment of weekly unemployment compensation benefits to eligible workers who become unemployed. The Commission is the duly constituted authority in this state for the purpose of carrying out the provisions of the Wagner-Peyser Act. The objectives of this program are to, (1) encourage and assist industry in providing more stable and uniform employment; (2) to provide benefit payments to workers who have become unemployed through no fault of their own; and (3) to maintain a free public employment service. Claims for benefits are received and benefit payments are made through all of the 25 regular offices of the employment service and an itinerant service which extends into every county of the state. With the active entry of the United States into the war, at the request of the President, the employment service was, January 1, 1942, loaned to the Federal government for the duration, and is now serving as an active operating arm of the war manpower commission.

In general, only employers of eight or more are covered by the provisions of this law, but employers of less than eight persons may become subject to the act upon application to the Commission. Employers who are liable under the act are required to file quarterly reports in accordance with regulations of the Commission and to pay contributions as provided under the Employment Security Law. Under experience rating provisions the contribution rate varies in accordance with the employment experience of the individual employing unit. If the employment record of the employer is favorable his contribution rate will be lower than the standard rate; if, however, the employment experience of the employer is unfavorable his contribution rate will be higher.

Workers who are employed by employers covered by the act, build up wage credits, and upon becoming unemployed, if found eligible, are paid weekly benefits of approximately one-half their former full-time weekly wage, not to exceed \$15 per week, for a period not to exceed 15 weeks. If found to be partially unemployed, and eligible, a worker is paid partial benefits in accordance with provisions for partial unemployment.

The state board of engineering examiners was created by the Thirty-eighth General Assembly in 1919. No person can practice professional

engineering or land surveying without first being registered with this board. The board meets from time to time and conducts examinations of applicants for registration.

The law provides that the membership of the board shall consist of five members who shall be appointed by the Governor. Each member of the board shall be a professional engineer at least thirty-five years of age, and shall have been a resident of this state for at least three years immediately preceding his appointment and shall have had at least ten years' active practice preceding his appointment and during such time shall have charge of engineering work as principal or assistant for at least two years, and shall be a member in good standing of a recognized state or national engineering society. No two members of said board shall be from the same branch of the profession of engineering.

It is the duty of the Geological Survey to gather and supply information on surface and underground water supplies of the state, coal, gypsum, sand and gravel, ceramic clays and shales, limestone, and raw materials for making cement and rock wool. The possibilities of renewing production of iron and lead and zinc, especially for war purposes, are now being investigated. Special studies are in progress of the oil and gas possibilities, particularly in southwestern Iowa, and the geological parts of the oil and gas law enacted by the Forty-eighth General Assembly are being administered. The search for new products and for new uses of materials already under production goes on continuously. Collection and dissemination of data on streams and lakes and on water wells, water levels, etc., is accomplished in cooperation with the Water Resources Branch of the United States Geological Survey. At present there is an urgent demand for greatly increased water supplies for munitions plants, aviation bases, alcohol plants, hemp mills, and other war industries. Information, advice and direct assistance in the development of these large supplies are freely given to the limit of funds and personnel.

As a part of the result of its work, the Survey has published 37 volumes of annual reports and accompanying papers. These publications include special reports and maps covering the geology and mineral resources of all but 7 of the 99 Iowa counties, and also special reports on mineral products of all sorts. Volume 38 now in press will be published in the summer of 1943. There are also three technical papers on Iowa coal and Water Supply Bulletin No. 1 beginning a new series on the state's water supplies.

### *Communicable and Preventable Diseases*

Preventable diseases are by their very nature of vital concern to the community and the state. Reports of various infectious diseases are received daily from physicians and health officers throughout the state. These reports are surveyed and tabulated so as to make possible a study by weeks and months of the current prevalence of disease as compared with the preceding year and period of years. Field investigations are made upon request of local health officers or other officials, to determine the nature and extent of outbreaks and to assist with control measures. The department through articles, reports, literature, talks, correspondence and graphic presentations, aims to inform the public about disease prevention.

Emphasis in the pneumonia control program is on lowering the number of deaths from this cause, through accurate laboratory diagnosis and modern treatment. Diagnostic serum is supplied without charge to hospital typing stations; sulfa drugs and serum are furnished for treatment of underprivileged patients.

The division of tuberculosis is directed by a physician with special training and experience, aided by nurses who have specialized in the study of tuberculosis. Staff members cooperate with attending physicians and health officers in the reporting of cases, in the conduct of special surveys and in measures to prevent the spread of tuberculosis.

Every effort is put forth in cooperation with physicians, to obtain complete reports of venereal disease cases. This work is carried out under the direction of physicians and nurses with special training and experience. Control measures include provision for the care of indigent patients with particular reference to follow-up work and investigation of sources of infection.

The department's serum-plasma center prepares and distributes convalescent serum for prevention and control of diseases such as measles, scarlet fever and whooping cough. The serum-plasma center cooperates with the medical emergency service of the office of civilian defense and with many hospitals in Iowa, in the distribution of pooled plasma and serum for emergency civilian and war needs.

### *Maternal and Child Health*

The activities of the division are designed to make known to those concerned, the health needs of mothers and children and how they should and can be met. These activities are directed in the fields of medicine, dentistry, and nutrition by personnel specially trained in those fields. For the war period a special service has been added to provide prenatal care at home and delivery care at the University Hospital for the wives of service men under the rank of commissioned officer who otherwise are unable to obtain it.

### *Public Health Nursing*

The department maintains a division of public health nursing and provides a whole-time supervisory service for public health nurses and

an advisory service for boards employing nurses and for associations or committees interested in public health nursing.

The public health nurse:

1. Helps to secure early medical diagnosis and treatment for the sick.
2. Renders or secures nursing care of the sick, teaches through demonstration and supervises care given by relatives and attendants.
3. Assists the family to carry out medical, sanitary and social procedures for the prevention of disease and the promotion of health.
4. Helps to secure adjustment of social conditions which affect health.
5. Provides information regarding sound public health nursing practices to the community and cooperates actively with community agencies in the improvement of health conditions.

#### *Public Health Engineering and Industrial Hygiene*

Preventing spread of disease through environmental sources—that is the goal of public health engineering and industrial hygiene. Duties may be enumerated as fact-finding, advisory, educational and law enforcement, with emphasis on the first three. Engineering activities have to do with public water supplies; public sewerage, sewage and waste disposal; stream pollution; swimming pools; industrial establishments; various public health nuisances; plumbing; housing, and numerous other natural and artificial facilities requiring sanitary safeguarding.

#### *Vital Statistics*

The division is charged with the collection, recording and filing reports of births, deaths, marriages and divorces. Statistical studies and analysis of these records are made and the results of these studies are released for the information of the public. The division supervises the work of the local registrars of vital statistics and cooperates closely with the bureaus of census, department of commerce, Washington, D. C.

The division issues certified copies of any of the records it has on file, for a fee of fifty cents.

If you were born in Iowa and your birth record is not on file, you can place it on file by completing a delayed birth certificate, which you may file with the county clerk in the county where you were born, or send it direct to this office.

#### *Law Enforcement*

The work of the division of law enforcement is under the direct supervision of an attorney, who is required to make investigations of violations of Title VIII, Code, 1939, securing all available evidence and reporting to the commissioner of public health. Upon request of the state department of health, the attorney general is required to institute, in the name of the state of Iowa, proper proceedings against any person charged by the department of health with violating any of the provisions contained in Title VIII, entitled "The Practice of Certain Professions Affecting the Public Health."

#### *Public Health Education*

In the prevention and control of disease, public health education supplements the tools, skills and learning of the medical, dental, engineering, and nursing professions.

Public health education uses motion pictures, news releases, recordings, speakers, posters, exhibits, pamphlets and other media to tell the health story.

*Division of Local Health Services*

The correlation and extension of the activities of the various divisions of the state department, making their services obtainable to the entire population of the state, through the various district and county health services.

The advisory board of the Iowa Pharmaceutical Association annually recommends to the Governor a list of six persons for appointment (code of Iowa, 1935, section 2457), who have the qualifications prescribed for examiners of the profession, and the Governor in making the appointment to the board may select one of the persons so named. Confirmation by the senate is not required.

It is the duty of the Pharmacy Examiners to enforce the laws governing the Uniform Narcotic Act which controls the use of morphine, cocaine, marijuana, and other narcotic drugs of both illegal and legal distribution.

It is the duty of the board to enforce the laws governing the sale and distribution of drugs, medicines, and poisons in the state, as well as hold examination for the licensing of pharmacists. The examination fee is \$10.00. A record is kept of all pharmacists licensed and a fee of \$2.00 is required each year for the renewal of certificates. Itinerant vendors of medicines are licensed by the department and the license fee is \$50.00 per year.





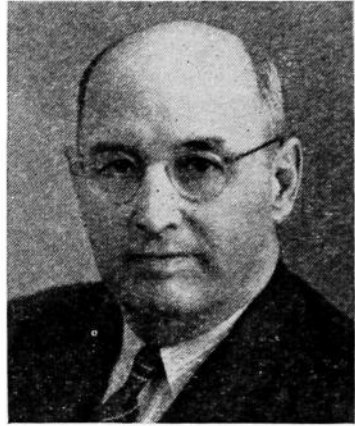

**Chairman, State Highway Commission**

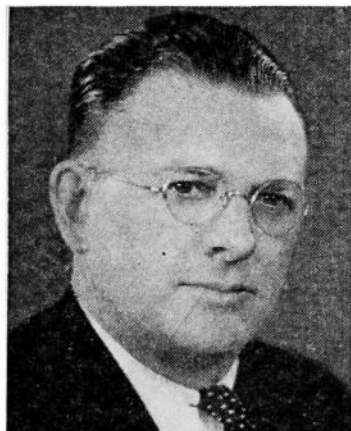

The first law creating a state highway commission in Iowa was adopted by the General Assembly in 1904. That law simply stated that the Iowa State College should act as a state highway commission. Acting under said law, the state board of education appointed Dean Anson Marston of the engineering division, and Dean Chas. F. Curtiss of the agricultural department, of Iowa State College, as the directors of the commission. Thomas H. MacDonald, now chief of the U. S. bureau of public roads, was appointed by the directors as secretary and engineer for the commission. The duties of the commission at that time were to make investigations and studies of highway conditions and to advise with local authorities with respect to highway improvements.

This organization continued until 1913, when the Thirty-fifth General Assembly passed an act creating a state highway commission of three members and separated said commission from the Iowa State College.

In 1927 the General Assembly passed an act which now appears as chapter 238 of the Code of 1939, creating a state highway commission of five members, all to be appointed by the Governor, not more than three of whom could be from the same political party.

The law of 1927 placed the primary road system under the direct control and supervision of the state highway commission. Thomas H. MacDonald, who became secretary and engineer of the highway commission in 1904, was designated as chief engineer of the highway commission in 1913 and continued in that capacity until 1919, when he resigned and F. R. White, present chief engineer of the state highway commission, was appointed to that position.

The highway commission's duties are three-fold:

- First: Construction and maintenance of primary roads.
- Second: General supervision of secondary roads.
- Third: Engineering assistance to other departments.

The commission has entire charge of and responsibility for all construction and maintenance work on the primary road system. It prepares the necessary surveys, plans and specifications for primary road improvements, lets the necessary contracts and supervises the construction work. It has charge, for the state of Iowa, of the expenditure of all federal aid road funds allotted to this state.

All maintenance work on the primary road is under the supervision of the commission.

The secondary roads (county and township roads) are under the supervision of the county boards of supervisors in their respective counties. However, the law places on the highway commission certain duties and responsibilities in connection with such secondary road work. Changes in or modifications of the county trunk road system must be approved by the commission. Secondary road construction programs proposed by the county boards must receive the commission's approval. Plans prepared by the county engineers for secondary road improvements, must be submitted to the state highway commission for approval. Contracts awarded by the boards of supervisors for secondary road work involving a cost of \$2,000 or more per mile, or more than \$5,000 in the aggregate, or

more than \$2,000 for any one bridge or culvert, must be approved by the state highway commission, before becoming effective. In case two adjacent counties are unable to agree on any county line or road or bridge construction or maintenance matter, either board may appeal to the highway commission to determine said controversy.

The commission, on request, renders engineering assistance to various other state departments. This includes the making of surveys and preparation of plans and general supervision of construction and maintenance of public highways upon or adjacent to lands belonging to the state at the various educational, charitable, and penal institutions and at the state parks, engineering assistance to the executive council on street improvements upon and adjacent to the capitol grounds, assistance to the national guard on projects in connection with the national guard camp, and various other technical matters which may come before such other state departments.

For the last thirty-five years has followed the growing and shipping of Muscatine Islands products. Received education in Muscatine county schools and attended business and normal college. **GREENLEY, Charles H.**  
**Secretary, Workmen's Compensation**  
**Service**

Born December 8, 1884, of pioneer parents, Fred and Augusta Greenley, on a farm in Atchison county, Missouri. Early education obtained in a one-room country school. Later attended high school at Mount Pleasant, Iowa, and college at Tarkio, Missouri. Active in farm organization work during ten-year residence in Colorado, to which state he moved for the health of his family in 1919. Continued activity in farm cooperative work after return to Iowa in 1929. Appointed to present position in 1937.



In 1913, the thirty-fifth general assembly provided for "employers liability and workmen's compensation" and authorized the appointment of an industrial commissioner.

Iowa was among the first of the states to provide workmen's compensation for industrial injuries. (Note—accidental injury is not essential for liability under the Iowa compensation law.) All employers, with a few exceptions, must provide insurance, or assume responsibility for compensation benefits, based upon 60 per cent of the average weekly wage, and a limited liability for medical expense. The minimum is \$6.00 per week and the maximum \$15.00 per week. Provision is made for arbitration and review, and appeals may go to the courts. State and other public employees are included. Reports are made of injuries to the industrial commissioner which approximate about 100 per day, and settlements must have his approval. Arbitration decisions now number about 200 per year, together with the filing of about 75 review decisions.

The office of Commissioner of Insurance, as the executive head of the insurance department of Iowa, was created by chapter 146 of the laws of the Thirty-fifth General Assembly (1913) and the first commissioner took office July 1, 1914. Previous to that time, the supervision of insurance had been under the direction of the auditor of state.

The commissioner of insurance has general control, supervision and direction over all insurance business transacted in the state, and is

charged with the responsibility of enforcing all the laws of the state relating to insurance.

Under the law, all securities in which the reserves of Iowa life insurance companies are invested are required to be deposited with the commissioner and complete records are kept showing each item on deposit at all times. The amount of approved securities representing these and other incidental deposits in the hands of the commissioner on June 1, 1941, amounted to \$594,663,263.34.

The commissioner supervises all transactions relating to the organization, reorganization, liquidation and dissolution of domestic insurance corporations. He supervises the sale in the state of all stock or other evidences of interest either by domestic or foreign insurance companies. He is the statutory receiver in the event of liquidation of any Iowa insurance company.

All foreign companies, as well as all local companies, must, before engaging in the insurance business in this state, obtain a certificate of authority from the commissioner of insurance. These certificates expire annually on April 1st, and action is taken on their renewals after analysis of complete financial statements filed covering the condition of the company as of the previous year end. All insurance agents must likewise obtain individual licenses to solicit business. In 1940, there were 788 insurance companies authorized in the state, and approximately 65,000 individual agents' licenses were issued.

The commissioner conducts examination of all domestic insurance organizations at least every two years. He also may make an examination of any foreign insurance company authorized or seeking to be authorized to do business within the state. All policy forms used by any company within the state are required to be approved by the department.

The commissioner is a member of the National Association of Insurance Commissioners composed of the insurance supervising officials of each of the various states and meets with and cooperates with this organization in the many matters that arise involving the common interests of the separate states in insurance matters.

#### *Securities Department*

The state securities laws, designed to protect the Iowa investing public through regulation of securities dealers and qualification of securities offered for sale, are administered by the commissioner of insurance through the superintendent of securities.

The commissioner also has jurisdiction over the sale of stock on the installment plan and sale of memberships or certificates of membership entitling the holder thereof to purchase merchandise, materials or services on a discount or cost-plus basis.

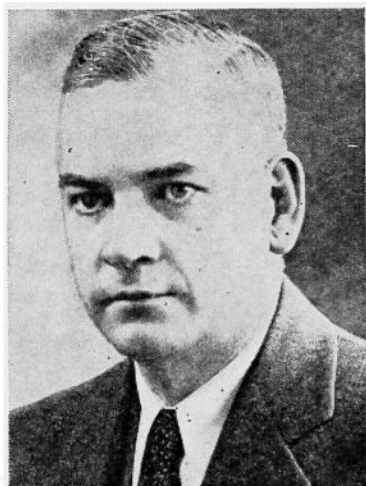


**LANE, DICK R., Davenport** *Republican*

The Iowa Liquor Control Commission was created under the provisions of H. F. 292 as passed by the Forty-fifth General Assembly in extraordinary session and signed by the Governor, March 6, 1934.

The commission has sole power to buy, import and have in its possession for sale and sell liquors; to establish, maintain and discontinue state liquor stores and special distributors in such cities and towns as deemed advisable; to rent, lease and equip any building or any land necessary to carry out the provisions of the act; to appoint necessary employees; to determine the nature, form and capacity of packages kept or sold under the act and to prescribe the labels and seals to be placed on same; to license, inspect and control the manufacture of alcoholic liquors in Iowa; and to make rules and regulations necessary for carrying out the provisions of the act.

The statutes of Iowa provide the sentence of a prisoner convicted of a felony shall be for the maximum term provided for the crime committed, thus leaving to the court imposing the sentence no discretion as to the time of confinement. The board of parole is given authority to release on parole either within or without the state of Iowa, all prisoners, except those sentenced for life terms. Parole rules are provided which must be observed by the man while on parole, and for the violation of which he may be remanded to prison.

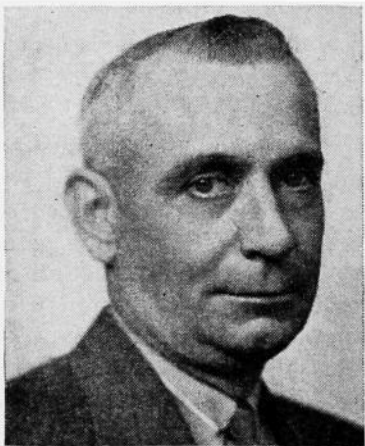
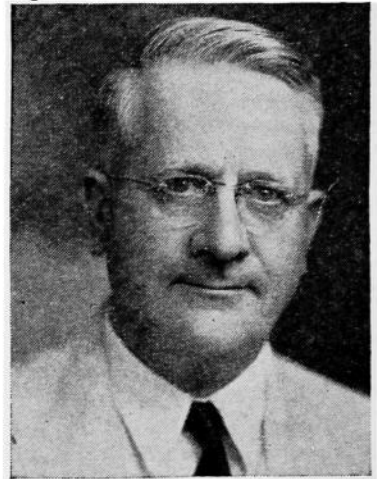

The office of Labor Commissioner was created by the Twentieth General Assembly in 1884.

Under the provisions of law, the commissioner is also a member of the board for vocational education and rehabilitation, and the employment agency commission. The commissioner is executive secretary of the employment agency commission.

The bureau is responsible for the enforcement of laws relating to health and safety, child labor, passenger and freight elevators, installation and inspection of steam boilers, generators and superheaters, private employment agencies, arbitration and conciliation, and industrial accidents for reinspection and statistical purposes.

Three factory inspectors devote full time to inspection and reinspection of factories, mills, work shops, theatres, buildings, public buildings, passenger and freight elevators, private employment agencies and general employment conditions. The law requires that one of the inspectors shall be a woman who shall give special attention to places employing women and children.

The official publication of the bureau "Iowa Employment Survey" is issued the first of each month based upon conditions as of the fifteenth of the preceding month and compared with the previous month. Statistical information is furnished by the employer on a specially prepared questionnaire which is compiled showing employment and payroll trends, building conditions, and activities in the Iowa state employment service.

The bureau issues, with the consent of the executive council, special bulletins relating to child labor, labor organizations, employment service, and manufacturing directory, etc., which is in addition to the biennial report required by law.

The state's libraries at the seat of government are under control of a board of trustees, the trustees also controlling the historical department and building. The general state library which was established at the time the territory was formed has been consolidated with the state traveling library to make its vast collection of reference works more available to the public. This and the state medical library are in the historical building and the law library is in the capitol.

#### STATE TRAVELING LIBRARY

The State Traveling Library is the name given by the Forty-eighth General Assembly to the library composed of the former State Library, the Library Commission and the Economics and Sociology Division of the Law Library. The combined library has for its functions:

1. To aid in establishing libraries and to assist in library development by helping in book selections, by visiting libraries, and conferring and working with library trustees and librarians.
2. To give library service to the state of Iowa by lending books and giving reference assistance to:
  - (a) Communities without public libraries
  - (b) Small libraries
  - (c) Public libraries
  - (d) Schools
  - (e) Organizations
  - (f) Individuals
  - (g) Blind patrons

There were 335,509 books circulated in 1941-1942. Most of them were to be circulated again in the communities to which they were sent.

3. To collect and publish statistics of library work in the state, furnishing blanks for records and making reports to the Governor as required by law.
4. To publish the *Iowa Library Quarterly* and to distribute lists of recommended books, leaflets and other information.
5. To serve as a clearing house for information of the Iowa Library Association.

There are 273,086 books in the State Traveling Library.

#### STATE LAW LIBRARY

(Second Floor, Capitol Building)

The Iowa State Law Library, with its collection of upwards of 125,000 volumes, is one of the largest and most complete law libraries in the United States.

In addition to legal reference facilities provided for the Iowa Supreme Court judges, attorney-general, and other state officials, as well as for attorneys and the general public, the law library also includes a Legislative Reference Bureau, which assists members of the Iowa General Assembly with research materials and bill drafting.

#### IOWA STATE MEDICAL LIBRARY

(Second Floor, Historical Building)

The Iowa State Medical Library was established as a department of the State Library in July, 1919, and became a separate library in the reorganization of the state libraries by the Forty-eighth General Assembly in 1939.

The library serves primarily medical doctors but is open to any resident of the state.

The library contains 25,507 accessioned volumes and receives 270 medical and scientific periodicals annually, having over 100,000 unbound periodicals. The main work of the Medical Library is its mailing service, whereby proper material is selected and placed in the mail the same day doctors request literature by mail, phone or telegram.

The library also has a small museum of old medical instruments and collects items of medical historical interest.

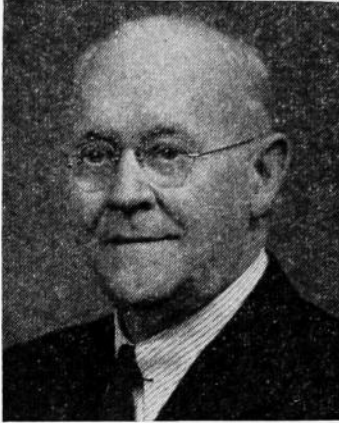

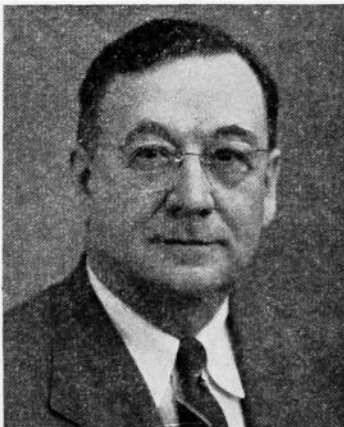

The State Printing Board has charge of all matters pertaining to state printing, including printing for institutions and officials outside of Des Moines. Contracts for all work and material are let on competitive bids. The laws of the state are very explicit in directing the manner of advertising for and securing bids on all items.

The superintendent of printing is appointed by the board. He is ex officio secretary of the board and its executive officer. The law directs that the manuscript of every report or document, book, booklet, bulletin or anything to be printed shall be transmitted to the superintendent of printing as soon as it is ready for printing, and he shall edit, revise, condense and arrange the same for printing. He has the custody of and attends to the distribution and sale of code, session laws, supreme court reports and public documents; supervises the compilation and publication of the session laws, the legislative bill index, and the official register. Also the journals of the house and senate are indexed under his supervision.

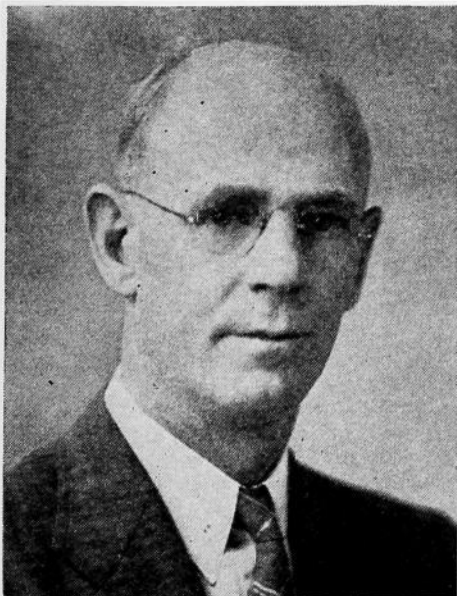
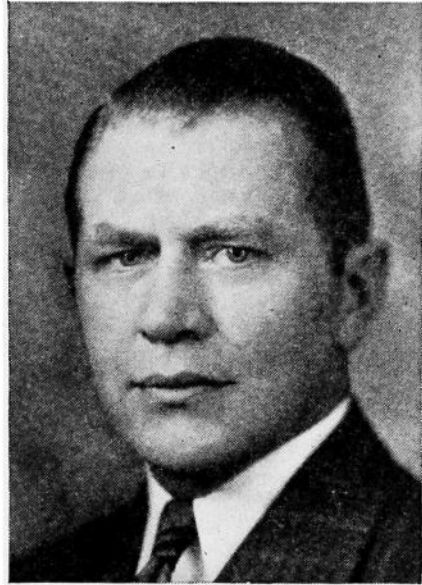

**FISCHER, Karl W., Vinton** *Republican*  
Commissioner of Public Safety

Born in Eagle Grove, Iowa, August 8, 1896. Attended grade school in Eldora and graduated from Vinton high school. Married Doris Miller, Vinton, Iowa; has four children, Karl Jr., Bennet, Margaret Ann and Judith Kay. During the World war served for two and one-half years in the air service; in France with the Twenty-fifth Aero Squadron and in the Army of Occupation with the Twenty-fourth Aero Squadron. Following the World war attended the University of Iowa and engaged for several years in flying activities. Served ten years as clerk of the district court of Benton county. Was the Republican nominee for Auditor of State in 1932. Admitted to the bar in 1937. A member of the Masonic Lodge, Lions Club, Methodist church and Phi Gamma Delta social fraternity. Appointed Commissioner of the newly created Department of Public Safety April 21, 1939.



**LAIRD, R. B., Sidney** *Republican*  
Deputy, Acting Commissioner

Born in Sidney, Iowa, December 14, 1892, son of Clifford and Lulu Laird. Educated in Sidney grade and high school (1911). Attended University of Nebraska. Affiliated with Delta Tau Delta fraternity. Served in U. S. Navy for duration of World war. Later engaged with his father in farming and extensive cattle feeding operations. Was Sidney postmaster, 1928-1934. Has been manager of life insurance agency since that time. Member of Presbyterian church of Sidney, and its board of trustees. A charter member and past commander of the Sidney American Legion Post. Has been announcer of the Legion managed rodeo since its beginning in 1923, and member of rodeo board. Married to Kathleen Hill of Bussey; father of two children; Russell, 14, and Geraldine, 16. Served as Chairman Iowa State Highway Commission July 1, 1939, to June 30, 1943. Appointed Deputy Commissioner of the Iowa Department of Public Safety July 1, 1943.

The Iowa Department of Public Safety was created by the Forty-eighth General Assembly in 1939 by consolidating several bureaus and divisions under one executive head designated as Commissioner of Public Safety. One of the obvious purposes of the legislature in the creation of this department was to facilitate the cooperation and coordination of the law enforcement agencies of counties, cities and towns.

The work of the department may best be explained by setting forth the activities of the several divisions as follows:

#### DIVISION OF CRIMINAL INVESTIGATION

R. W. NEBERGALL, Nevada, Chief

The Division of Criminal Investigation, of the State Department of Public Safety, is an important agency in solving and preventing crime in the state of Iowa. With an efficient corps of officers known as special agents, assistance is given promptly and freely to all peace officers in Iowa and major crimes which might otherwise have gone unsolved have been traced to the minutest detail and offenders committed for long terms.

A part of the division is the well-kept identification section, with its 200,000 fingerprints, by means of which the life story of anyone who has committed any crime not only in Iowa but throughout all adjoining states, and in many other parts of the country, can be readily told. By checking prints taken at the scene of a fresh crime with prints on file in the State House at Des Moines the identification of many hundreds of criminals is quickly established and their capture effected.

Chief R. W. Nebergall, in charge of the Division of Criminal Investigation, has a staff of special agents under him, who give efficient service to all law enforcement officers in the state. Their assignments cover cases involving murder, rape, robbery, extortion, bank robbery, arson and so on.

The technical laboratory is another important feature of the Division of Criminal Investigation and Criminal Identification. Here not only the latent fingerprint left by the criminal at the crime scene is identified—questioned handwriting or typewriting analyzed and identified—murder bullets identified with the gun through which they were fired—moulage death masks made—obliterated serial numbers restored for identification—and countless other technical problems solved all in the routine day's work.

The Division of Criminal Investigation and Criminal Identification is a specialized division which cooperates with and supplements the work of local officers over the entire state.

The division keeps photographs of criminals; histories of criminals' apprehensions, time and length of previous incarcerations and information regarding his methods of operation; all making apprehension and identification easier.

#### DIVISION OF FIRE PROTECTION AND INVESTIGATION

JOHN W. STROHM, Clinton, Fire Marshal

The principal duties of the State Fire Marshal are to cause immediate investigation to be made of the cause, origin and circumstances of every fire occurring within the state, when so requested by any official with proper authority; to determine if any buildings or structures, by reason of want of proper repair or by reason of age and dilapidated conditions are especially liable to fire and to order their repair or removal; to require teachers in public and private schools to have at least one fire drill a month and instruct the pupils at least four times a year in the causes and dangers of fires; and to inspect fire escapes. For the purpose of enforcing the orders of the fire marshal suitable penalties and fines are provided and he and his deputy are empowered to administer oaths and compel the attendance of witnesses. If the state fire marshal shall be of

the opinion that there is evidence sufficient to charge any person with the crime of arson or criminal conduct in connection with any fire, he shall cause such person to be arrested. Reports are required to be made to the fire marshal by all chiefs of fire departments of each and every fire, and where there is no established fire department the report is to be made by mayors and by township clerks outside of incorporated cities and towns.

#### DIVISION OF HIGHWAY PATROL

C. A. KNEE, Adel, Chief

The Iowa Highway Safety Patrol was created by the Forty-sixth General Assembly with a personnel of fifty-three men which was expanded by the Forty-seventh General Assembly to one hundred twenty-eight men.

The original duties of the Iowa Highway Safety Patrol were to enforce all provisions of the motor vehicle laws relating to the regulation of motor vehicles and laws of the road, with power to arrest without warrant any person or persons committing or attempting to commit within their presence or view a breach of peace or other violation of the law. The Forty-eighth General Assembly broadened the scope of their powers by providing that they shall have and exercise all the powers of any peace officer of the state. There are, however, certain restrictions on the exercise of their general powers, which restrictions, as well as duties, will be enumerated in full in Chapter 67.1 of the Code of Iowa, 1939.

Members of the Highway Safety Patrol give examination to applicants for operators' and chauffeurs' licenses, conduct hearings in connection with suspension and revocation of operators' and chauffeurs' licenses, and investigate serious accidents occurring upon the highways of the state, in addition to their duties as law enforcement officers.

#### DIVISION OF MOTOR VEHICLE REGISTRATION

DALE SHAW, Des Moines, Superintendent

The Motor Vehicle Registration Division of the Department of Public Safety has jurisdiction over the licensing of motor vehicles, the licensing of automobile dealers, of itinerant merchants, and official vehicles.

Under this department is included the division for the tabulation of accidents showing statistically pertinent facts relative to all accidents occurring upon the highways of the state.

#### DIVISION OF OPERATORS AND CHAUFFEURS' LICENSE

CLARENCE A. SHIRER, Allison, Superintendent

The primary functions of this division of the Department of Public Safety are: (1) the issuance of operators' licenses to those qualifying under the law, either through examinations conducted by the highway patrol, or through regular renewal; (2) the enforcement of statutory provisions governing suspension, revocation, and denial, of operators' licenses, enacted for the removal from the highways of those persons who are physically or mentally incompetent to operate a motor vehicle with safety, and those persons whose driving actions seem to indicate a disregard of the value of their operating privileges; (3) the maintenance of an accumulative permanent record on each driver showing all violations, restrictions, accidents, or suspensions or revocations against his driving record.

#### DIVISION OF POLICE RADIO COMMUNICATION

GERALD R. SUTTON, Atlantic, Superintendent

The division of Radio Communication of the Iowa Department of Public Safety is charged with the operation of the State Police Radio System consisting of police radio stations at Des Moines, Cedar Falls, Storm Lake, Atlantic and Fairfield. The services of the police radio

system are available to all officers of the state and special routine orders for the special agents of the Division of Criminal Investigation and members of the Division of Highway Patrol are referred to the Radio Communication Division for immediate dispatch.

During the year 1942 there were approximately 8,000 criminal items and cancellations dispatched by the radio system and approximately 10,000 orders dispatched to the State Highway Patrolmen and officers of other divisions of the Department of Public Safety.

#### DIVISION OF SAFETY EDUCATION

PAUL F. HILL, Cedar Falls, Director. (On military leave of absence, effective May 15, 1943.)

BERT L. WOODCOCK, Eldora, Acting Director, appointed May 15, 1943.

The newest facility of the Department of Public Safety is the Division of Safety Education, created by the Forty-eighth General Assembly for the purpose of promoting highway safety education. This division co-operates with the national, state, and county safety councils in various safety activities and renders other valuable service in promotion of safety upon our highways.

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#### DEPARTMENT OF SOCIAL WELFARE

The Board of Social Welfare was created by act of the Forty-seventh General Assembly in 1937. The Forty-eighth General Assembly amended the original law by enacting legislation relating to membership, salary, terms of office and removal from office of its members. The Board, bipartisan in membership, is vested with authority to administer old age assistance, aid to the blind, child welfare, aid to dependent children and emergency relief.

The Board of Social Welfare has authority to administer state and federal funds appropriated by the federal social security law and the Iowa legislature for old age assistance, aid to the blind, child welfare services, aid to dependent children and emergency relief.

Under the terms of the law, county social welfare boards, also bipartisan, are appointed by the county boards of supervisors. The county welfare boards receive applications for assistance from needy aged and blind in the various counties and make recommendations for assistance to the state board. Further enactment of the Forty-eighth General Assembly provided for the administration of funds made available to the counties for emergency relief, and relating to relief labor and the powers and duties of the boards of supervisors in connection therewith. The county boards also cooperate with the state board in giving service to neglected and dependent children.

The Board of Social Welfare is required to cooperate with the federal government according to the provisions of the federal social security law, to make reports to the federal Social Security Board on administration of assistance, and to the federal Children's Bureau of the U. S. Department of Labor on its services to children.

The division of child welfare will carry on services to children in the state of Iowa except those performed by the institutions under the jurisdiction of the Board of Control.

**PALMER, King R., West Union**      *Republican*  
**Vice Chairman State Board of Social Welfare**

Born at West Union, Iowa, August 18, 1893, son of H. R. and Isa Chesley Palmer. Education included high school, Hawkeye, Iowa, and Upper Iowa University. Graduate of latter school in 1913, B.A. degree. Prominent in athletics and debate. Served at Weiser, Idaho, as social science instructor and athletic coach. In December, 1917, enlisted in the air service, United States Army, and later received a commission as second lieutenant. Following the war, he re-entered the teaching profession and served as superintendent of schools in Iowa until 1928 when he entered the life insurance business at West Union. A member of the board of education at West Union and board of trustees of Upper Iowa University. Has held local and state offices in the American Legion. Married to Adeline Graham of West Union, July 25, 1919, and has two sons. Member of the Masonic Lodge and of the West Union Rotary Club. Served as chairman of the Board of Social Welfare from April 11, 1939, to July 1, 1941.

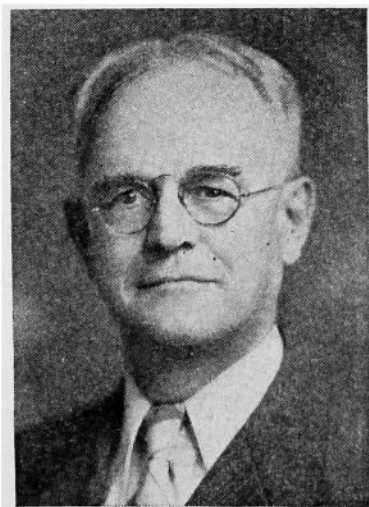


**HUNCKE, Mrs. Mary E., Des Moines**      *Republican*

Was married to Anna Duncan of Mount Ayr, Iowa, and has three children, John A., an attorney in Mount Ayr; Mrs. B. A. Fuller, Jr., of Centerville; and Mrs. J. Y. Dalbey of Diagonal. A member of the United Presbyterian church.



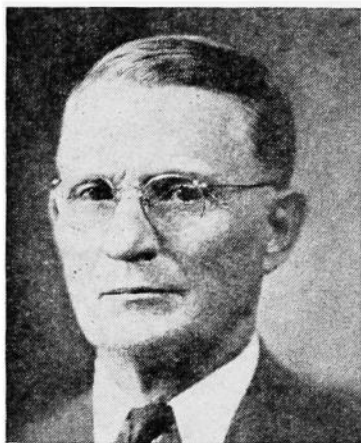

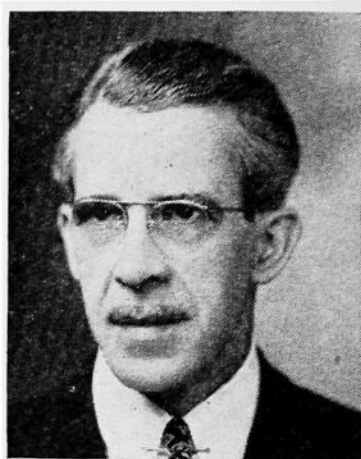

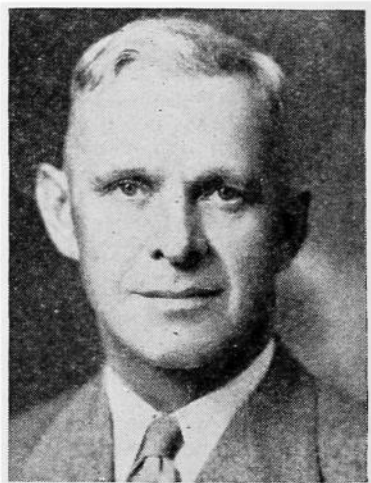

**MURROW, David L., Corydon** *Democrat*  
Member, State Tax Commission

Born May 9, 1871, in Poweshiek county, Iowa. When a small boy he moved with his parents to Wayne county, Iowa, on a farm. Attended Drake University law school from which he graduated and was admitted to the bar in 1901. Practiced law continuously in Corydon, Iowa, until his appointment to this Commission by Governor Herring for the term ending July 1, 1937. Was reappointed by Governor Kraschel for the term ending July 1, 1943, and reappointed by Governor Hickenlooper for the term ending July 1, 1949.



The State Tax Commission was created for the purpose of establishing a more equitable assessment of property and efficient administration of the tax laws of the state. When first created by act of the Forty-third General Assembly in 1929, it was known as the State Board of Assessment and Review. The name was changed in 1939 by the Forty-eighth General Assembly.

It was given very broad general powers. Its duties as fixed by law not only include the supervision of the assessment of all property in the state through the local assessors and boards of review but also the study and investigation of all matters pertaining to the improvement of the state's revenue system, and formulation and recommendation of such legislation it deems necessary to secure just and equal assessment.

Besides these general powers all former powers and duties of the state Executive Council as a board of review, as to valuations, levies, assessments, and determination of tax rate for state purposes are now vested in the state tax commission. The 48th General Assembly added other duties. At the present time, the commission lists and assesses privately owned water works, gas companies, pipelines, electric light and power companies, transmission lines, street railways, telegraph and telephone lines, railroads, sleeping and dining cars, freight and equipment cars, express companies, and administers the following taxes: Income, sales, use, chain store, cigarette, beer, and inheritance.

The board was organized on July 15, of 1929, and has been functioning since that time.

Under the law this commission exercises general supervision of the tax laws, of boards of supervisors and other officers and boards in matters pertaining to assessment and taxation; it has power to prescribe and promulgate books and forms; to confer with, advise and direct those obligated by law to make levies and assessments as to their duties under the law; to require information from taxing districts as to assessment of property and collection of taxes; to hold public hearings with safeguards as to evidence there produced; to cause depositions to be taken within or without the state; to investigate the work and methods of local boards of review, boards of supervisors and other officers in tax matters; to require boards of review to make such orders as this commission determines are just and necessary; to direct and order any board to raise or lower the valuation of property, real or personal; to direct the county boards of equalization to raise or lower the valuation of any class or classes of property; to examine into alleged evasion or violation of the law for assessment and taxation; to ascertain wherein existing laws are defective or are improperly or negligently administered, and cause remedial proceedings to be instituted in such cases; to make a summary of the tax situation in the state; to formulate and recommend legislation for the better administration of the fiscal laws so as to secure just and equal taxation; to recommend such additions and changes in the present system of taxation that in its judgment is for the best interest of the state and will eliminate the necessity of any millage levy for state purposes; to transmit biennially to the Governor and to each member and member-elect of the legislature, thirty days before the meeting of the legislature, the report of the Commission, covering the subject of assessment and taxation, the result of the investigation of the Commission, its recommendations for improvement in the system of taxation in the state, together with such measures as may be formulated for the consideration of the legislature; to publish the revenue laws of the state and distribute them as prescribed; to procure information pertaining to the discovery of property subject to taxation; to call upon any state department for technical advice and data which may be of value in connection with the work of assessment and taxation; to certify to the auditor of state on January first of each year the aggregate of each state tax for each county for said years; all former powers and duties of the state executive council as a board of review, as



to valuations, levies and assessments, and determination of tax rates for state purposes are now vested in the State Tax Commission, as are the former principal powers and duties of the auditor of state with relation to the assessment and collection of taxes.

#### State Permit Board

An act of the 46th General Assembly, as amended by the 48th, provides for the issuance of permits for the manufacture, sale, and taxation of certain nonintoxicating liquor, with the provision that such fees and taxes be collected by the state tax commission. All license fees and taxes collected under this act, except class "B" and "C" permit fees, shall accrue to the state sinking fund for public deposits. Fees from class "B" and "C" permits are placed in a special fund to be used by the State Permit Board for the purpose of enforcing the obligations made upon them. The State Permit Board is constituted of the chairman of the State Tax Commission, who is also chairman of the board, the Secretary of State and the Auditor of State. The board shall review the action of any governing body in any case where a hearing has been had relative to the cancellation or revocation of a permit issued under the provisions of this act.

The operation of Iowa coal and gypsum mines is hedged around by exacting laws designed for the safe operation of the mines, the safety of the workers in mines, and other incidentals.

Laws provide for safeguards against fire, for adequate ventilation, for escape ways and other safety features.

The work of the inspectors consists of examination of mines and mine working conditions. Safety devices for workers, ventilation measures, escape ways, maps of mines and all regulations concerning operations of mines come in for their check.

#### BOARD OF EXAMINERS FOR MINE INSPECTORS, MINE FOREMEN AND HOISTING ENGINEERS

The board of examiners must consist of two miners, two mine operators and one mining engineer. These examiners are required to have had at least five years of actual experience in their respective professions.

The examiners conduct examinations of candidates for mine inspectors, hoisting engineers and mine foremen.

The Iowa Board of Nurse Examiners was made a department separate from the department of health by S. F. 50, passed by the Forty-sixth General Assembly and became effective upon publication.

The board gives the examinations required of every graduate nurse before she is entitled to practice her profession. Examinations are held in Des Moines. The examination fee is \$10.00; the reciprocity fee, \$20.00 and annual renewal of license, \$1.00. Through its executive secretary the board keeps all records pertaining to the licensing of nurses in the state, receives all applications for licensure, collects all fees and issues all licenses. The board formulates the curriculum and standards for schools of nursing, and through its director of nursing education the accredited schools are supervised. It is the duty of the board to enforce the laws governing the practice of nursing in the state.

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**COMMISSION ON UNIFORM STATE LAWS**

## MERIT SYSTEM COUNCIL

(Office in Insurance Exchange Building, Fifth street and Grand avenue)

Appointed by the Governor. Term of three years.

The "Regulations for the Merit System," as adopted by the above agencies, provide, in part:

"A Merit System Council shall be appointed by the Governor . . . The Council shall be composed of three members, who shall be public-spirited persons of recognized standing and of known interest in the improvement of public administration and in the impartial selection of efficient government personnel. No member of the Council shall have held political office or have been an officer in a political organization during the year preceding his appointment, nor shall he hold such office during his term. No member of the Council shall have been an employee of the agencies within one year prior to his appointment.

"Members of the Council shall serve for a term of three years or until successors have been appointed by the Governor . . . In appointing a successor to a member of the Council, the Governor shall make his selection from a panel of three names presented to him through joint action of the [participating agencies]. A member appointed to fill a vacancy occurring prior to the expiration of a term shall be appointed for the remainder of such term. Members of the Council may be reappointed at the expiration of their term of office.

"Members of the Council shall receive no salary, but may be compensated for expenses incurred, including traveling expense."

"It shall be the duty of the Council within the scope of these Regulations:

- (a) to establish general policies for the administration of merit examinations and the hearing of personnel appeals as provided in Article XIV [of the Regulations];
- (b) to hear such appeals or to establish impartial bodies to hear such appeals on its behalf;
- (c) to appoint a Merit System Supervisor with the approval of the [participating agencies], to advise with him in formulating procedures for the conduct of merit examinations, and to inspect and review his activities for the purpose of assuring conformity with these Regulations and the policies of the Council;
- d) to review the classification and compensation plans and to advise with the state agencies on their adoption and subsequent revisions;
- (e) to make recommendations to the agencies relative to their internal personnel practices to assure conformity with these Regulations;
- (f) to approve a budget for submittal to the state agencies covering all costs of merit-system activities as covered by these Regulations;
- (g) to promote public understanding of the purposes, policies, and practices of the merit system. As a means thereto, the Council shall examine into and make a written report to the Governor and to the state agencies at least annually on the operation of the merit system, including the conduct of examinations, the establishment of registers, certifications from registers, promotions, salary advancements, dismissals, demotions, transfers and separations, and the maintenance of the classification and com-

pensation plans. Such reports shall be filed with the Governor and the state agencies and shall be open to public inspection;"

Under direction of the Council, the Merit System Supervisor, L. W. Mahone, has conducted examinations for all present employees of the Employment Security Commission, State Department and County Boards of Social Welfare, and for all, except professional, employees of the State Department of Health and State Services for Crippled Children. (The war has caused a nation-wide shortage of such professional personnel.) As vacancies occur, they are filled from certifications of qualified persons submitted by the Merit System Supervisor. There are about 1,500 persons in the employ of the participating agencies.

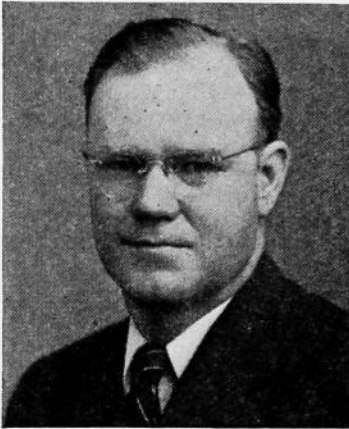

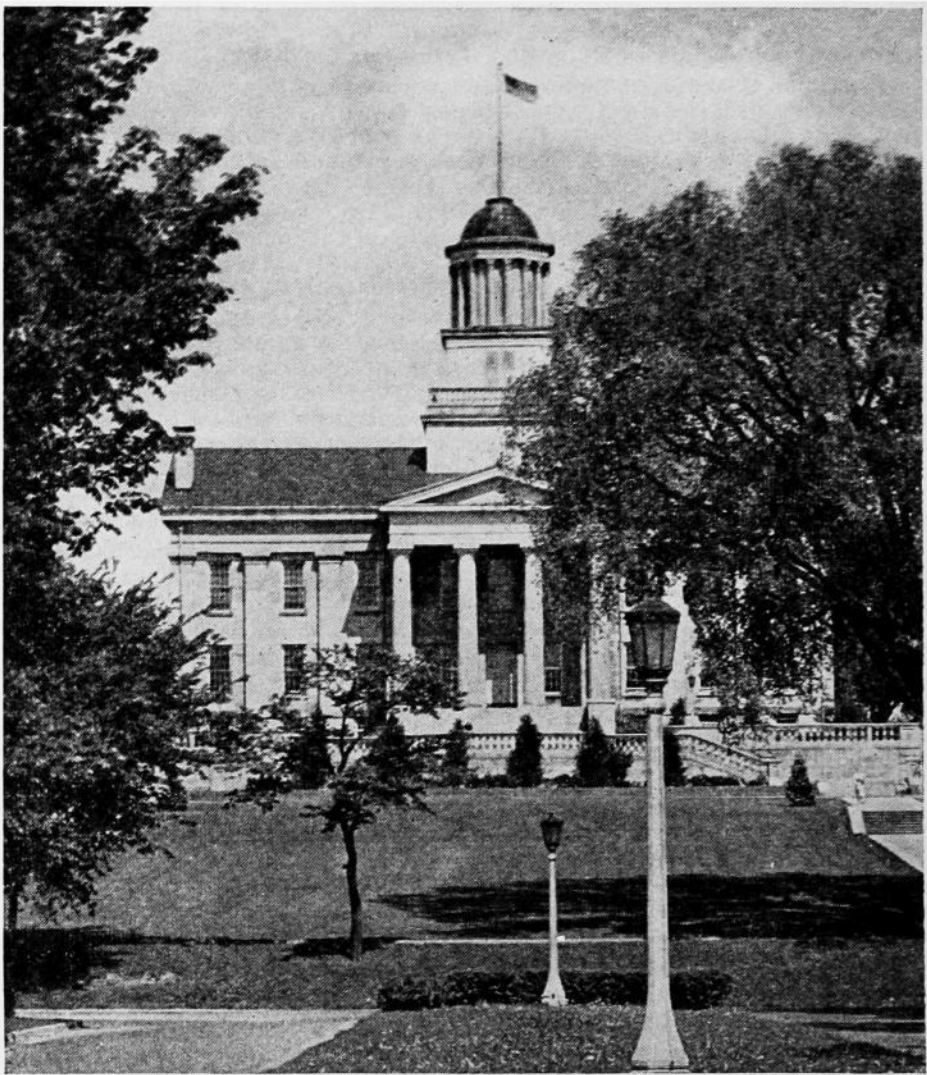

## The Government of Iowa\*

**T**HE government of the state of Iowa is based upon a constitution adopted by the people and upon statute laws enacted from time to time by the general assembly. Iowa has had two state constitutions, the first approved in 1846, the second one in 1857. The present constitution has been amended a number of times.

**The Electorate**—All men and women who have lived in Iowa for six months and in the county in which they claim a residence for sixty days are entitled to vote if they are citizens of the United States and are twenty-one years of age or over. Persons convicted of infamous crimes and those declared idiotic or insane are, however, disfranchised. The right of women to vote in Iowa is based upon the nineteenth amendment to the United States constitution.

**Election Days**—The regular elections for national, state, district, and county officers are held on the Tuesday following the first Monday of November of the even-numbered years. Candidates, with a few exceptions, are nominated at the primary election held on the first Monday in June preceding the general election. Provision is also made for nominations by petition or convention. Political parties must use the primary for nominating candidates, but in case no candidate receives the necessary thirty-five per cent at the primary, a convention may nominate.

### The Legislative Department

**General Assembly**—The legislative authority of the state of Iowa is vested by the constitution in a general assembly which consists of a senate and a house of representatives. The terms of both senators and representatives begin on the first day of January following their election. Regular sessions are held biennially, commencing on the second Monday of January of the odd-numbered years. Special sessions of the general assembly may be called by the proclamation of the governor.

**House of Representatives**—The house of representatives consists of one hundred and eight members, elected for two years. Each of the ninety-nine counties is entitled to one representative and each of the nine counties having the largest population elects one additional representative. Any person who has resided in the state for one year and has the qualifications of a voter is eligible for election as a representative. Women were admitted to the general assembly by an amendment to the state constitution adopted in 1926. The house of representatives elects a speaker and other officers.

**Senate**—The senate consists of fifty members, elected by districts for a term of four years. A senatorial district contains from one to five counties, according to population, and elects one senator. According to the constitution approximately one-half the senators are to be elected at each alternate biennial election, but due to changes in the districts, the terms of twenty-one senators now expire at the end of each alternate legislative biennium and those of twenty-nine in the intervening years. Senators must be twenty-five years of age and have the other qualifications required of representatives.

### The Executive Department

**Elective Officers**—The constitution of Iowa makes provision for a governor, lieutenant governor, secretary of state, auditor of state, and treasurer of state, who are elected for terms of two years at the regular biennial elections in the even-numbered years. In addition, the general

assembly has made provision for a secretary of agriculture, elected for two years, and a board of commerce commissioners of three members and a superintendent of public instruction, chosen for four years.

**Governor**—The supreme executive power of the state is vested in the governor. It is his duty to see that the laws are enforced, to supervise the official business of the state, to make recommendations to the general assembly, and to appoint various officers and boards. He has the power to call special sessions of the legislature and to veto acts passed by the general assembly, but a majority of two-thirds of each house may pass a bill over his veto. To qualify as governor, a person must have been a citizen of the United States and a resident of the state for at least two years and must be thirty years of age or over at the date of election.

**Lieutenant Governor**—The lieutenant governor succeeds the governor in case of his death, resignation, or disability. His chief function is to act as president of the senate.

**Appointive Officers**—In addition to the executive officers mentioned, all of whom are elected, there are a number of appointive officers, including the comptroller, the superintendent of banking, the insurance commissioner, the labor commissioner, the adjutant general, the commissioner of public health and the industrial commissioner, all appointed by the governor, usually with the approval of the senate. The governor also appoints, with the approval of the senate, the members of a number of administrative boards, including the state board of education, the board of control of state institutions, the state tax commission, the board of parole, the state board of conservation, the liquor control commission, the state highway commission, and the unemployment compensation commission.

**Executive Council**—The executive council is an ex officio board made up of the governor, secretary of state, auditor, treasurer, and secretary of agriculture.

**State Printing Board**—The state printing board has three ex officio members—the secretary of state, auditor, and attorney general—and two members appointed by the governor. This board appoints the superintendent of printing.

#### The Judicial Department

The judicial department of the state of Iowa is vested by the constitution in a supreme court, district courts, and such other inferior courts as the general assembly shall provide.

**Supreme Court**—The supreme court at present consists of nine justices, elected for terms of six years, approximately one-third being elected at each regular biennial election. The senior in time of service is chief justice for six months until each judge has served in that capacity. The supreme court appoints a reporter of the supreme court who is also the code editor, and a clerk. Both appointments are for four years.

**Attorney General**—The constitution also provides for an attorney general who is elected at the regular biennial election for a term of two years. He represents the state in legal matters, gives advice to state officers, and has, in addition, some administrative functions.

**Judicial Districts**—The State of Iowa is divided by law into twenty-one judicial districts, composed of from one to nine counties. Each district elects from two to six judges, there being at present sixty-nine district judges in the state. One of the district judges presides over

the district court sessions in each county. A county attorney and a clerk of the court are elected by the voters in each county.

**Inferior Courts**—The general assembly has provided also for other inferior courts. Each township is authorized to elect two justices of the peace who hear cases involving minor offenses and hold preliminary hearings on more serious charges. Municipal courts, superior courts, police courts, and mayors' courts are authorized in cities and towns under various restrictions. Municipal courts are optional in cities having a population of five thousand or more and superior courts in cities with four thousand or over. Both municipal and superior court judges are elected for four year terms.

**Municipal Courts**—If a city of the first class has neither a municipal nor a superior court, the council shall appoint a police judge in commission governed and city manager cities and may provide for the election of a police judge in such cities under the general law. In all municipalities having none of these special courts, the mayor acts as the police judge.

**Jury Trials**—Jury trials are the rule for trials of serious cases, but under certain conditions may be waived or denied. Petit juries consist of twelve persons who must be "electors," except in some courts of restricted jurisdiction where the number of jurors may be six persons.

#### Local Government in Iowa

**County Officials**—The state of Iowa is divided into ninety-nine counties, the boundaries of which may not be changed unless the change is approved by the voters of each county concerned. A board of supervisors consisting of three, five or seven members is the chief administrative agency in the county. They appoint a county engineer. In addition, an auditor, who is the clerk of the board of supervisors, a sheriff, county attorney, recorder, treasurer, coroner, and clerk of the district court are elected biennially by the voters. A county superintendent of schools is chosen every three years by a convention composed of representatives of the school districts.

**Local Functions**—The Iowa county is a quasi-political corporation which collects municipal, school, county, and state taxes, enforces state laws, has charge of poor relief and certain other welfare activities, and shares with the state highway commission the management of the roads and bridges in the county. Townships, which in earlier days were effective units of local government within the counties, have lost almost all their functions, except for the assessment of property for taxation by the township assessor, and the election of justices of the peace in which many townships default.

**City Government**—The laws of Iowa also authorize the incorporation of cities and towns. These municipalities derive their authority from the general assembly and have only the powers specifically granted to them. Four cities and towns are governed by special charters granted before the adoption of the present constitution which forbids such acts of incorporation. Seven cities have the commission form of government; three have adopted the city manager plan by popular election; and a few others have a city manager by ordinance. Members of the commission are elected by the voters. The city manager in cities adopting that plan by a popular vote is appointed by a commission.

**Municipal Classes**—All other municipalities are under the general law. They are classified according to population into cities of the first class, having over 15,000 population; cities of the second class, having from 2,000 to 15,000 population; and towns having less than 2,000 population. All these municipalities have the mayor-council form of govern-



ment, both the mayor and the members of the council being elected by the voters for two-year terms. A treasurer, assessor, and park commissioners, and in some cities a police, superior, or municipal court judge, are also elected.

**City Councils**—The council is the law-making body in municipal government and it is also the chief administrative agency. The mayor presides over the council, although he is not a member, and has the power to veto acts of the council subject to a two-thirds majority vote over his veto. He supervises municipal activities and in cities and towns which do not have a municipal, superior, or police court, he serves as police judge. He also appoints certain officers, including the marshal or chief of police, the city health officer, and members of the police and fire board. The city solicitor and clerk, and in some cases the engineer and members of the zoning board of adjustment are chosen by the council.

### Taxation

**Tax Sources**—Taxation is probably the most important governmental power. The present tax system in Iowa is based largely on property, sales, income, and corporation taxes, although there are taxes on inheritance, poll taxes, and sales or license taxes on gasoline, cigarettes, beer, and chain stores.

**Tax Levies**—Property is assessed by township assessors elected by the people, subject to revision by local boards of review and by the state tax commission. The various mill levies for state, county, school, and municipal purposes are computed by the county auditor on the assessed valuation and the tax money is paid to the county treasurer who distributes it to the proper fund. Levies for county, school, and municipal purposes are, in most cases, limited by state law.

**Filing Nomination Papers**

**State and National**—For United States senator, representatives in congress, and all elective state offices, to be filed in the office of the secretary of state not more than sixty nor less than forty days prior to the date set for holding the primary election. (C. '39, §537.)

**County**—For all elective county offices, to be filed in the office of the county auditor at least thirty days prior to the date fixed for holding the primary election. (C. '39, §537.)

**Township or Precinct**—For elective offices of a subdivision of a county to be filed with county auditor thirty days prior to the primary. (C. '39, §547.)

**Cities**—For elective offices in cities of over 15,000 population, except cities under a nonpartisan form of government, to be filed with the city clerk at least thirty days before primary election. (C. '39, §§639, 640.)

**Cities and Towns**—For elective offices in cities and towns under 15,000 population, nomination is made by an organization in a convention or caucus and the certificate of nomination to be filed with the clerk not more than forty nor less than fifteen days before the election. (C. '39, §§655.01, 655.14.)

**Cities Under Commission or Manager Plan**—For all elective offices to be filed with the city clerk at least ten days before the primary or election. (C. '39, §§6495 and 6634.)

**School**—For all elective offices in each independent city, town or consolidated district, shall be filed with the secretary of the school board not more than thirty nor less than ten days before the election. (C. '39, §4216.04.)

**Primary Election Dates**

**Municipal**—The primary election the last Monday in February of the year in which general municipal elections are held. (C. '39, §641.)

**Cities Under Commission Plan**—The primary election shall be held the second Tuesday preceding the general municipal election. (C. '39, §6493.)

**General**—The primary election shall be held the first Monday in June in each even-numbered year. (C. '39, §533.)

**Election Dates**

**Cities and Towns**—Regular city and town elections shall be held biennially on the last Monday in March. (C. '39, §5627.)

**School**—The regular school election shall be held annually on the second Monday in March; except in cities of over 125,000 population, where the election will be held biennially on the second Monday in March of odd-numbered years. (C. '39, §4216.01.)

**General**—The general election for state, district, county and township offices shall be held on the first Tuesday next after the first Monday in November of each even-numbered year. (C. '39, §504.)

#### Political Convention Dates

**County**—Each political party shall hold its county convention on the fourth Saturday following each primary election. (C. '39, §616.)

**State**—Each political party shall hold a state convention not earlier than the first nor later than the fifth Wednesday following the county convention. (C. '39, §634.)

**Judicial**—Each political party shall hold a state judicial convention not less than one nor more than two weeks after their regular state convention. (C. '39, §656.)

**District**—Each political party shall hold a district judicial convention in districts where judges are to be elected not earlier than the first nor later than the fifth Thursday following the county convention. (C. '39, §663.)

**Presidential or Special**—Precinct caucuses, county conventions and state conventions of each political party are held in the years presidents are elected and usually during the months of March and April on call of the state chairmen of the political parties.

#### Assessments

**Call by Auditor**—The county auditor of each county shall before the third day of January annually issue a call to all the assessors to meet within ten days to receive such information as the auditor has to give and to receive their supplies. (Sections 7113, 7114, Code of 1939.)

**Beginning**—Each assessor shall enter upon the discharge of the duties of his office immediately after the second Monday of January each year. (Section 7106.)

**Completion**—The assessment shall be completed by the 1st day of April. (Section 7121.) The rolls shall be laid before the local board of review on or before the first Monday of April in each year for correction. In cities of 10,000 or over the rolls shall be laid before the local board of review on or before the first Monday of May each year.

#### Boards of Review

**Townships**—The township trustees shall constitute the local board of review for the township and shall meet on the first Monday of April and sit from day to day until its duties are completed, which shall be not later than the first day of May.

In townships having a population of 20,000 or more, and situated entirely within the limits of a city under special charter, the city council of said city shall be the board of review, except that the township trustees of said township may, in the event the city council does not act as such board of review, be the board of review, the same as township trustees would be in townships in which the township lines are not coterminous with city limits. The board of review may begin the performance of its duties after the first day of March each year.

**Cities and Towns**—The city and town council (except as otherwise noted) shall constitute the board of review for each such city or town and shall meet on the first Monday of April and sit from day to day until its duties are completed, which shall be not later than the first day of May. In cities with a population of 10,000 or more, such board shall meet on the first Monday of May and shall complete its duties not later than the first day of June. (Note provisions for townships within special charter cities in paragraph next above.)

**Raises or Additions**—In case the assessment of any person, partnership, corporation, or association is raised or new property is added by the board, then the clerk shall give immediate notice thereof by mail to each

person, partnership, corporation or association and at the conclusion of the action of the board, the clerk shall post an alphabetical list of those whose assessments have been raised or added in a conspicuous place and the board shall hold an adjourned meeting with at least five days intervening after the posting of said notices before final action is taken on the proposed changes. (Section 7131.)

**Complaints**—Any person aggrieved by the action of the assessor may make an oral or written complaint to the township, city, or town board of review.

**Appeals**—Any party may appeal from the action of the township, city or town board of review to the district court. (Section 7133.)

#### Budgets Prepared and Submitted

**Preparation**—All taxing districts except townships must at least twenty days prior to August 15 each year prepare a budget of anticipated expenditures and estimated amount to be raised by taxation by funds. Rural schools post budget estimate ten days before dates of hearing. Other taxing districts subject to the budget law publish their budgets in a newspaper. (C. '39, §375.)

**Certification**—After hearing and decision of local board, budgets are certified to the county auditor not later than August 15. (C. '39, §383.)

**Submitted to State Comptroller**—As soon as taxes are certified by each local board and have been computed by the county auditor he shall forward a copy of each budget, together with a summary of all budgets, to the state comptroller. (C. '39, §384.)

**County Budget**—On or before December 31 each year, each county is required to appropriate in detail anticipated expenditures for every office or department for each and every purpose for which expenditures are authorized or demanded. The budget in detail must be completed and adopted by January 31 of the year to which it applies. This procedure is appropriating in detail the budget certified in August by funds. (C. '39, §§5260.01, 5260.02.)

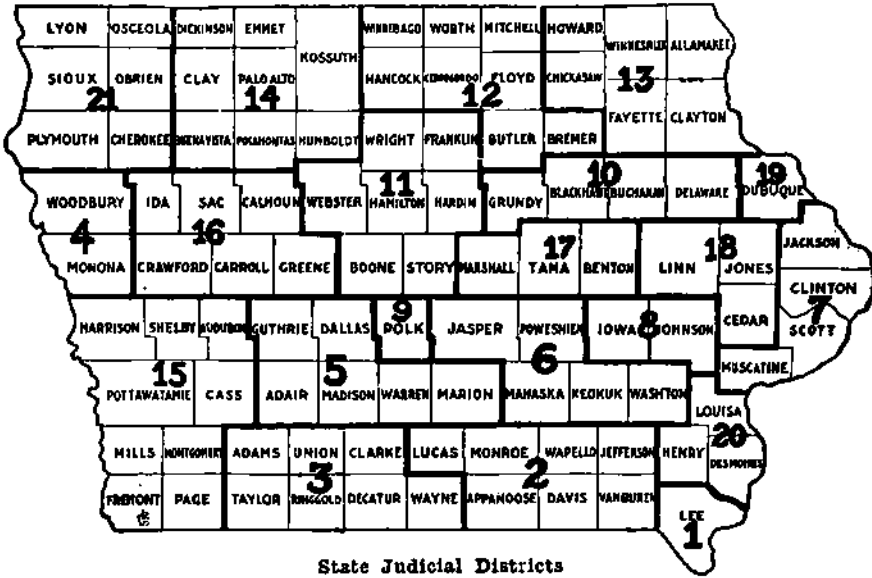
**City and Town Budgets**—Cities and towns may adopt and levy a consolidated tax when certifying their budget in August, and prior to the beginning of their next fiscal year may apportion said consolidated tax in detail to the funds embraced therein in a ratio suitable to their requirements. The consolidated plan is optional with cities and towns.

**State**—On or before September first, next prior to each biennial legislative session, all departments and establishments of the government shall transmit to the state comptroller estimates of their expenditure requirements for each fiscal year of ensuing biennium \* \* \*. (C. '39, §84.16.)

The comptroller shall prepare and file in his office, on or before the first day of December of each even-numbered year, a state budget report \* \* \*. (C. '39, §84.06, ¶17.)

Not later than February 1 of the year of each biennial legislative session, the Governor shall transmit to the legislature a document to be known as a budget, setting forth his financial program for each of the fiscal years of the ensuing biennium \* \* \*. (C. '39, §84.14.)

## SUPERIOR COURTS

The Iowa statutes provide that any city of 4,000 population, or over, may establish a superior court. There are at present four such courts, located as follows: Cedar Rapids, Iowa Falls, Keokuk and Oelwein. The judges are elected for terms of four years and receive an annual salary, which is paid quarterly, the first two quarters being paid from the city treasury and the last two quarters from the county treasury of the county in which court is located. Salary of judge, \$2,000 per annum in cities up to 25,000 population; \$3,000 in cities of 25,000 up to 40,000, and \$3,750 in cities of 40,000 or more.

The judges appoint a shorthand reporter, whose compensation is fixed by order of the court not exceeding \$8.00 per day for the time actually employed.

## MUNICIPAL COURTS

Any city, whether organized under a special charter, commission form of government or the general law for the incorporation of cities or towns, now or hereafter having a population of 5,000 or more, as shown by the last preceding state or United States census, may establish a municipal court. All civil townships in which said city or any part thereof is located shall constitute the municipal court district and its jurisdiction is coextensive with the territorial limits of the county in which the court is located.

The salary of municipal court judges is \$3,000 in cities with population less than 30,000; \$3,400 with population of from 30,000 to 75,000; \$3,600 with populations 75,000 or over. Compensation of court reporter is fixed by the judge at not to exceed \$8.00 per day. Salary of clerk is \$1,800, \$2,200 or \$2,600, according to population of the city as above indicated.

## Aid to the Blind

The Iowa Aid-to-the-blind Act was passed by the Forty-seventh General Assembly and became effective July 4, 1937. During the fiscal year ending June 30, 1942, total assistance and benefits were paid to the amount of \$476,330.01, divided as follows:

Monthly assistance .....	\$468,840.62
Funeral claims .....	3,540.13
Eye treatment .....	3,949.26

During the year, 1,746 blind persons received assistance from the state, in this branch of the work of the Department of Social Welfare. A total of 198 were added during the year, while 98 persons died and 89 cases were closed for other reasons. The average payment to active cases on July 1, 1941, was \$24.09. A year later it had increased to \$27.47 while by December, 1942, it had advanced to \$27.93.

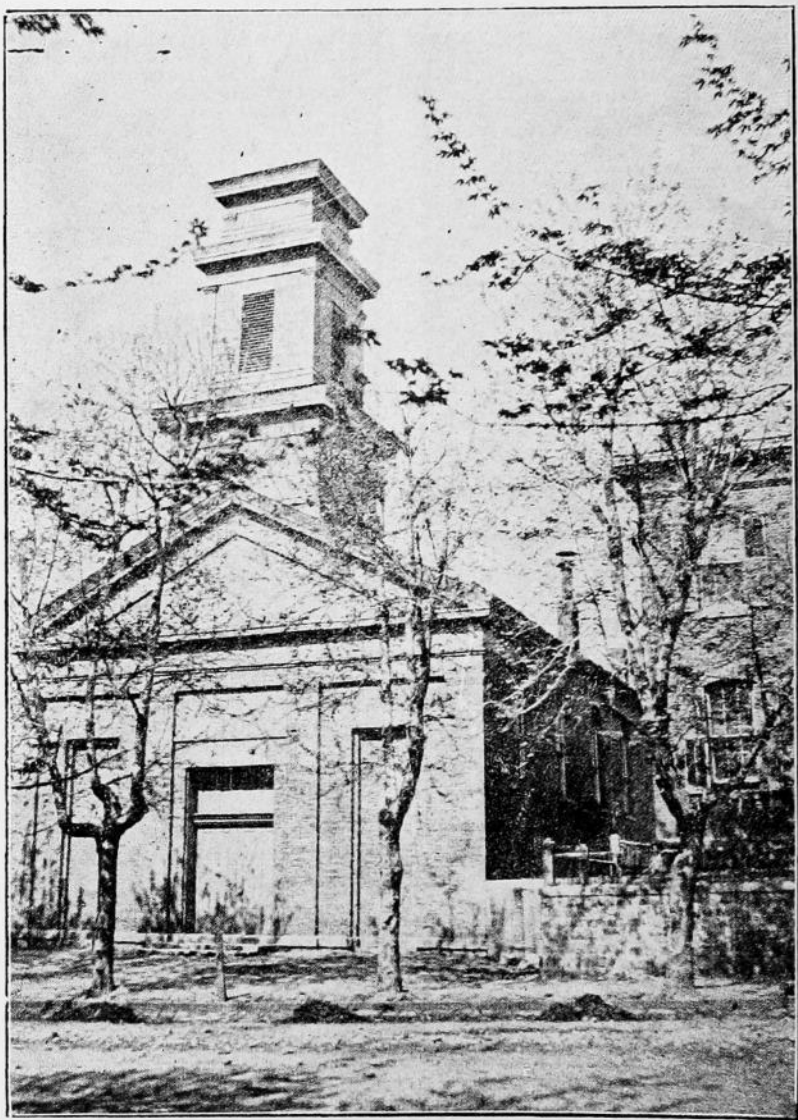

## State University of Iowa

**O**NE year after Iowa Territory became a state, the Old Capitol and its grounds were given to the State University, which had been established February 25, 1847, by an act of the First General Assembly. Iowa City dreamed of being the permanent seat of state government. Founded as the capital of Iowa Territory, January 21, 1839, it had been surveyed and laid out, and made big plans for an historic future. Congress agreed to donate the land for the new territorial capital and three commissioners were appointed to select the most suitable 640 acres for the promising metropolis.

Log cabins and a few frame houses clustered about the site chosen for the capitol, when the cornerstone was dedicated on July 4, 1840. State constitutional conventions followed, providing that Iowa City "shall be the seat of state government until removed by law."

The law did remove it, to Des Moines, in 1857. There was no further need of the Old Capitol or the surrounding grounds. They were given to the young State University, established ten years before.

### Seventy-five Students First Year

The University did not open until 1855, when 75 students assembled, in answer to an advertisement, for a short term of study under three professors. When the seat of government was moved away there were 124 students. Enrollment in recent years has exceeded 10,000.

At first devoted entirely to Liberal Arts courses, federal grants of land and state appropriations enabled the institution to grow year by year.

The College of Law was added in 1868. In succession came the College of Medicine, in 1870; College of Homeopathic Medicine in 1876, but abandoned in 1919; Dentistry in 1882; Pharmacy in 1885; the Graduate College in 1900; College of Fine Arts in 1911 (united with the College of Liberal Arts in 1915); College of Education in 1913 and College of Commerce in 1915. In 1913 the Extension Division was organized. In 1917 the Iowa Child Welfare Research Station, and in 1924 the Division of Physical Education. The Schools of Journalism, Religion and Fine Arts are parts of the College of Liberal Arts. The School of Nursing is a part of the College of Medicine.

### The University Hospital Treats Many

Today the University campus covers 425 acres of ground and includes more than 50 buildings. Most prominent and beloved of all is the Old Capitol, now used as the Administration building. Doric columns adorning the portico entrance and Corinthian columns supporting the dome make the building so appealing from an architectural standpoint that visitors are awed by its beauty and dignity.

It is one of the most beautiful examples of architecture in the United States, the Administration Building. Thousands of visitors annually pass through it and admire its simple dignity and beauty.

The University Hospital, opened in 1928, is of early English Gothic architecture. A score of ambulances bring patients here from all over the state.

The College of Liberal Arts is the oldest college of the University and embraces the School of Letters, School of Fine Arts, School of Journalism and School of Religion. The University Symphony orchestra has enjoyed a large membership, while the University Chamber orchestra supplements it and serves as a laboratory unit for courses in instrumental music. The School of Journalism gives practical instruction in writing and editing.

The School of Religion provides courses "that will help students gain a wholesome view of religion and increase their interest and efficiency in religious activities." The College of Education helps to prepare teachers for elementary and secondary schools and for colleges and universities.

The College of Law was established at Des Moines in 1865 and moved to Iowa City three years later. It is now the oldest law school west of the Mississippi river. The Law Library now contains more than 75,000 volumes.

All the colleges making up Iowa State University are maintained on a high plane, making it possible for a student to secure a practical education in almost any profession and branch of fine and useful arts.

Enrollment in the Reserve Officers' Training Corps unit is prescribed for all male students in the College of Liberal Arts, Engineering and Pharmacy, during the freshman and sophomore years. Exemption is granted only in cases of physical disability on recommendation of the University Student Health Department. Military science and tactics is an elective course the junior and senior years.

The presidents of the University have been: Amos Dean, 1855-1859; Silas Totten, 1859-1862; Oliver M. Spencer, 1862-1867; Nathan R. Leonard (acting president), 1867-1868; James Black, 1868-1870; Nathan R. Leonard (acting president), 1870-1871; George Thacher, 1871-1877; Christian W. Slagle (president pro tempore), 1877-1878; Josiah L. Pickard, 1878-1887; Charles A. Schaeffer, 1887-1898; Amos N. Currier (acting president, 1898-1899; George E. MacLean, 1899-1911; John G. Bowman, 1911-1914; Thomas H. Macbride, 1914-1916; Walter A. Jessup, 1916-1934; Eugene A. Gilmore, 1934-1940, and Virgil M. Hancher 1940-.

Since the United States entered World War II, the University not only has maintained a full curriculum in all departments for civilian students, but has contributed to the military training programs of the Army and Navy through the services of its physical facilities and instructional staff.

In August, 1943, the following military units were in training on the University campus:

Approximately 2,100 cadets of the United States Navy Bureau of Navigation Pre-Flight Training School were quartered in the Quadrangle and Hillcrest dormitories, with the use of Fieldhouse facilities and surrounding recreational fields.

One hundred thirty students in the War Training Service of the United States Navy program were receiving classroom instruction in the College of Engineering.

Under the United States Army Airforce "C" Program in Meteorology 200 men were quartered in the Commons dormitory and were receiving instruction in special courses in the College of Liberal Arts. Under the Army Airforce "B" Program in Meteorology, 230 men were attending special classes in the College of Liberal Arts and were quartered in University buildings.

The instructional staff in the College of Liberal Arts also was assisting in the training of 500 military students of the United States Army Specialized Training Program in its basic phase. Under an expansion of the Army Specialized Training Program, 125 men were receiving special instruction in psychology, and 250 in specialized language training. Under the same expanded program, advanced engineering was being taught to 250 students.

An accelerated program for civilian students has been adopted since the beginning of the war. A student now may accomplish a full semester's work in the summer session, thus enabling him to complete four years of academic work in two and one-half years.

## Iowa State College

ONE of the great institutions which has contributed much to the practical application of science to everyday living is the Iowa State College of Agriculture and Mechanic Arts at Ames.

Established on March 22, 1858, by the Seventh General Assembly of Iowa, the College was designated as a land-grant institution by the Morrill Land-Grant College act of July 2, 1862. It was opened to students on October 21, 1868, and the first class graduated in 1872. The College has grown steadily since those early days, and in 1943, the College domains included 2,943 acres upon which were situated 40 major and 200 minor buildings consisting of classroom and laboratory buildings, residence halls, service buildings, residences and farm buildings. All of this has a total value cost of \$16,000,000.

Of the funds required to support the College, about one-half comes by appropriation from the Iowa legislature, out of tax monies; one-fifth by Federal appropriation, and one-seventh from student fees.

Iowa State College conducts undergraduate and graduate work in five major fields; agriculture, engineering, home economics, science and veterinary medicine.

### Curricula of Several Divisions

The Division of Agriculture offers courses in agricultural economics and rural sociology, agricultural engineering, agronomy, animal, dairy and poultry husbandry, dairy industry, genetics, horticulture and forestry, landscape architecture, technical journalism and vocational education.

The Division of Engineering offers courses in agricultural, architectural, ceramic, chemical and mining, civil, electrical, general and mechanical engineering, and theoretical and applied mechanics.

The Division of Home Economics offers courses in applied art, child development, foods and nutrition, dietetics, experimental cookery, home economics education, home management, household equipment, institution management, textiles and clothing, and home economics and journalism.

The Division of Science offers courses in the biological, physical and social sciences with particular emphasis upon the application of these sciences to industry and commerce and to the problems of present-day civilization, and to provide thorough instruction in the basic sciences.

The Division of Veterinary Medicine offers courses in anatomy, hygiene, medicine, obstetrics, pathology, physiology and pharmacology, and surgery.

Since before the start of the second World War the entire program of instruction at the College has been governed by a system of what may be termed educational priorities. First goal of the College has been to provide training directly concerned with the war. It has been operating since June, 1941, on a full 12-month basis—college the year around. Courses and curricula have been modified to provide greater emphasis on those aspects of the work of the students which bear directly on the problems they will encounter in civilian war production and in the armed forces.

Through the engineering instructional staff the college has trained about 6,000 non-college student civilians both on and off the campus for war industry. The Navy began in June, 1942, to use the facilities and staff of the College to give technical instruction to 1,500 sailors at a time. Navy men were being trained at the rate of nearly 6,000 a year as electricians, Diesel mechanics, cooks and bakers, and aviation pilots. An aircraft manufacturing concern had in training 100 young women engineering "cadettes"—one of six such training programs in the United States. The College has been approved by both the Army and the Navy for specialized training of soldiers and sailors.

Latest available figures show a total annual regular enrollment of undergraduate, non-collegiate, and graduate students in residence of 7,890, divided as follows: agriculture, 1,716; engineering, 2,429; home economics, 2,223; science, 1,263; veterinary medicine, 259.

Attendance at short courses on the campus was distributed as follows: agriculture, 8,676; engineering, 1,496; home economics, 2,214; total, 12,386. Because of war time travel restrictions the annual Farm and Home Week was not held at the College in its usual form in 1943. Instead, Farm and Home Week was taken to the farm people of the state by an entire week of special programs on the College broadcasting station, WOI, in one of the first agricultural short courses to be conducted wholly by radio anywhere in the United States.

Research vital to nearly every phase of agricultural and industrial activity in the state is conducted through two experiment stations and two research institutes.

The Agricultural Experiment Station had, at the time of its last annual report, a total of 340 active research projects. Most important of the recently-completed research projects concern the development of disease resistant varieties of oats, the program of breeding new varieties of hybrid corn, results obtained at the regional swine research farm, the annual beef cattle feeding tests, the annual corn yield test for testing hybrid corn varieties, and the study of corn production and storage.

The principal research projects upon which the Engineering Experiment Station is now engaged are: Causes of highway culvert failures, economics of automobile and truck operation, industrial utilization of farm wastes and by-products, permeability of masonry walls, load-supporting power of soils in road subgrades and under piers and foundations, and conditions affecting the wear of brushes on electric motors and generators.

The Industrial Science Research Institute works to provide fundamental scientific facts and principles which underlie the development and solution of agricultural and industrial problems in the state. Current projects are in the fields of physiology of bacteria, food bacteriology, physical chemistry, organic chemistry, and parasitology.



The Veterinary Research Institute investigates animal diseases with a view to working out methods by which they can be controlled or eradicated. Principal current projects include studies of mastitis in dairy cattle, control and eradication of swine erysipelas, and recognition and control of range paralysis and enterities in poultry, and of nutritional disorders in swine.

Extension work directed by the College is organized under the Extension Service in Agriculture and Home Economics and the Engineering Extension Service.

Agricultural and home economics extension activities in Iowa had their real beginning in 1906 at which time the work was officially organized as one of the three major functions of Iowa State College. Through cooperation with the United States Department of Agriculture and organized groups of farmers qualified under the Iowa Farm Aid Association Act, representatives of the College are now employed in every Iowa county, reaching thousands of people daily with pertinent information on all phases of agriculture and home economics. At the present time the Extension Service has been definitely geared to the war effort. Number 1 job is to assist every farm family in the production and preservation of food and fiber—more specifically meat, milk and eggs.

The engineering extension staff conducts instruction designed to aid Iowa industry in training foremen and other workers to know more about their jobs and to supply them with technical information. The service also has recently provided instruction for public building custodians, municipal firemen and telephone operators. During the two-year period, 1941-1943, a total of more than 5,000 persons were enrolled in special industry war training courses conducted by the Engineering Extension Service.

Three units of the Reserve Officers Training Corps are located at the College—Engineers, Field Artillery and Signal Corps. The primary object of this military instruction is to qualify students who complete a sequence of both basic and advanced courses for appointment as reserve officers in the Army. The basic courses which are given to freshmen and sophomores are required by the College as prerequisites to graduation.

## Iowa State Teachers College

**S**ITUATED a-top a beautifully wooded hill at the southern limits of the city of Cedar Falls and artistically landscaped with flowering shrubs and trees, the 26 principal buildings of the Iowa State Teachers College house a four-year teacher training center known the world over for the excellence of its graduates as classroom teachers. Unique among colleges of its kind for the number of buildings and beauty of its 207-acre campus, this headquarters for teacher training in Iowa is generally recognized among educators of the nation as a leader among scores of colleges in its field.

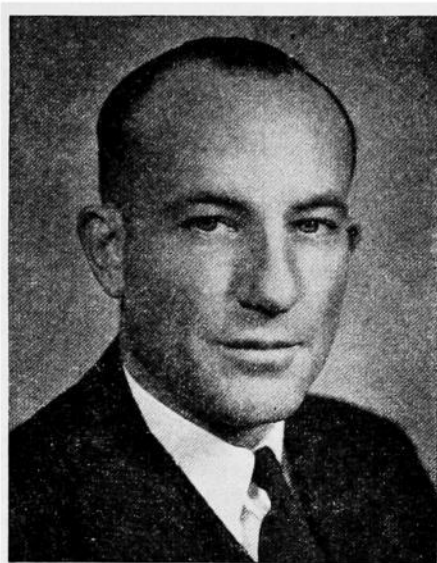
From a humble beginning on September 6, 1876, when four instructors and 27 students under the first president, James Gilchrist, celebrated the opening of the first classes in a single building, the Iowa State Teachers College has grown to become an institution with some 3,500 individuals enrolled during a given year, 18,000 living graduates, and over 100,000 former students.

The first president of the college, which was then known as the Iowa State Normal School, directed classes in a building formerly known as the Soldiers Orphans Home, a structure built to house orphans of Civil War veterans, but at that time abandoned. President Gilchrist, then known as principal, was succeeded in 1886 by Dr. Homer H. Seerley. Dr. Seerley retired in 1928 to be succeeded in turn by Dr. O. R. Latham, who served until his death in 1940. In that year, Dr. Malcolm Price was elected to the position which he now holds.

### Preparation for All Types of Teaching

Today, Teachers College offers preparation for all types of teaching positions in the public schools of the state, including special courses for teachers of rural schools, kindergarten-primary, and intermediate and upper grades, as well as high school subjects. Instruction leading to diplomas or degrees and to certificates for the various types of teaching and administrative positions in the public schools is provided for students in one-year, two-year, and four-year courses. Specialized courses of instruction include art and industrial arts, commercial education, education, English, dramatics, and speech, home economics, languages, mathematics, physical education for both men and women, science, and social science.

Dormitory facilities for students in residence at the college are recognized as excellent even among the larger colleges and universities of its class in the country. These include the Bartlett and the Anna B. Lawther Halls for women and The Homer H. Seerley and The George T. Baker Halls for men. Classes are held chiefly in the Auditorium building, Central Hall, the Administration Building, Gilchrist Hall, and the Vocational Building. Extensive library facilities are provided by a beautiful three-story structure housing over 140,000 books, periodicals, and pamphlets. Located directly on the campus, and providing for



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teachers in training what a university hospital provides for young medical students in the way of opportunities for practical experience and observation, is a complete Campus Grade and High School for practice teaching. In this Campus School, with an enrollment of over 400 young pupils, as well as in near-by town, city, and rural schools, the teachers-to-be have opportunity for actual classroom practice in teaching as well as for observation of best procedures.

The college provides an athletic plant of 70 acres, including large gymnasiums for both men and women as well as numerous playing fields and practice courts for athletic activities. Also available to students is the college golf course. This land was donated to the college.

The Iowa State Teachers College operates on a quarterly basis, with regular sessions in the summer, fall, winter, and spring. As a result of the quarterly plan of instruction, students may shorten their years of college study for diplomas and degrees considerably by attending college the year around.

## Iowa Schools for Deaf and Blind

**U**NDER the administration of the State Board of Education, the School for the Blind is maintained at Vinton and the School for the Deaf at Council Bluffs.

### Iowa School for the Blind

The Iowa School for the Blind was opened at Vinton on April 5, 1853, with one pupil. The second entered the following day. By the end of the year nineteen students were enrolled. The attendance at the last report was 175, ranging in age from five to twenty-one.

The Iowa School for the Blind is an educational institution which offers complete educational opportunity to visually handicapped boys and girls from the Kindergarten through the High School. In many respects the sessions follow the same line of those found in the schools for the sighted. In addition to the academic subjects special emphasis is placed on music, industrial arts, and physical education. After satisfactorily completing the four year high school course, students are equipped to enter college, and those who do so attain records that compare favorably with those of sighted students.

The school is governed by the State Board of Education and is supported by appropriations of the State Legislature. There is no charge for tuition, maintenance, or school supplies. The school is in session for a nine month period. The student body includes not only people without sight but those with partial sight.

The present superintendent is Leslie M. Hays.

### Iowa School for the Deaf

The Iowa School for the Deaf was established in 1855, the second such institution west of the Mississippi river. In 1839 Edmund Booth came to Iowa from Connecticut and settled at Anamosa. In 1846 he was a clerk in the Territorial Legislature, of which his brother was a member. The two induced the legislature to appropriate money to send several deaf children to the state school in Illinois. In 1853 a private school was established in Iowa City. In January, 1855, the Iowa State Legislature passed a bill creating the Iowa State Institution for the Deaf and Dumb. From this grew the present school at Council Bluffs; the name being changed to Iowa School for the Deaf in 1888.

In character the school is just what its name implies. It cares for the mental, physical and moral welfare of boys and girls between the ages of seven and nineteen.

The School for the Deaf represents a capital investment for the State of \$1,000,000 and occupies 210 acres, with eight fine buildings and beautiful grounds and an efficient staff of teachers.

The school at Council Bluffs offers facilities for developing the aptitude of boys and girls in some of the occupations most suited to them which may be taught under school conditions. Among the vocations taught are baking, shoe repairing, book binding, printing, cabinet making and upholstering. Instruction in rhythm is also given, and a well-rounded course in almost everything which will make life more pleasant for those bereft of their hearing.

The present superintendent is Lloyd E. Berg.

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## Colleges and Universities

**I**N ADDITION to its three state institutions of higher learning Iowa has a large number of colleges and universities of which it is justly proud and which are material factors in making this state stand first in literacy and intelligence. There are few places in Iowa more than 40 or 50 miles distant from some institution of higher learning well fitted by curriculum and faculty to teach those things which lead to the higher and better life and provide the education that makes for culture and higher citizenship.

Among the Colleges of Iowa which are fully accredited and offer four-year courses are the following:

### **Iowa Wesleyan, Mount Pleasant**

Iowa Wesleyan College, at Mt. Pleasant, is the oldest college in Iowa, having a continuous history from the time it was founded as Mt. Pleasant Collegiate Institute in 1844. The College has always been under the control of the Methodist Episcopal church. The name was changed to Iowa Wesleyan University in 1849 and to Iowa Wesleyan College in 1911.

### **Grinnell College, Grinnell**

Grinnell College, at Grinnell, is the second oldest in the state. It was founded in 1846 by the "Iowa Band" (a group of young ministers who came to Iowa as missionaries in 1843) as Iowa College, at Davenport, and was opened to students in 1848. Grinnell College was founded in Grinnell in 1855 and four years later Iowa College of Davenport was merged with it. It is privately endowed, non-sectarian and co-educational and has produced a large number of notable alumni, including Dr. Albert Shaw, for many years editor of the American Review of Reviews; Harry Hopkins, former Secretary of Commerce in President Franklin D. Roosevelt's cabinet; Gary Cooper, noted actor; and James Norman Hall and Ruth Suckow, noted authors.

### **Coe College, Cedar Rapids**

Coe College, at Cedar Rapids, had its beginning in 1851, when the Rev. Winston Jones opened a school in his home for 16 young people of Cedar Rapids. In 1866 it became Parsons Seminary and the first building, now a part of Old Main, was built. Since February 2, 1881, the present name of Coe has been used. In 1919 Leander Clark College was absorbed.

### **Cornell College, Mount Vernon**

Cornell College, at Mount Vernon, was opened November 14, 1853, as the Iowa Conference Male and Female Seminary, but was renamed in 1855. The annual Shakespearean school play produced in March and the annual Music Day Festival, first held in 1899, are outstanding events.

The Chicago Symphony Orchestra has presented an annual concert at the Music Festival for 40 years.

#### Central College, Pella

Central College, at Pella, was opened in 1853, a Baptist church institution. Dominie Scholte donated a large plot of ground when the first building, Old Central, was erected. In the Civil War the entire male student body, 122, enlisted in the Union Army. About 20 years ago the control passed to the Dutch Reformed Church of America.

#### Simpson College, Indianola

Simpson College, at Indianola, was established in 1860, operated by the Methodist Episcopal Church. First known as Indianola Seminary, it was renamed the Indianola Male and Female Seminary in 1861. Six years later the name became Simpson Centenary College, honoring Bishop Matthew Simpson. Since 1884 the name has been Simpson College. There are ten buildings on a 20-acre campus.

#### Luther College, Decorah

Luther College, at Decorah, founded in 1861, prepares students for the Lutheran ministry. It maintains the Norwegian-American Historical Museum, opened in 1933. "The people of Norwegian birth and descent in the United States have seriously undertaken the task of creating here an historical museum containing collections clearly illustrating their conditions of life and culture from the time their ancestors first set foot on American soil." The Decorah College for Women was organized in 1932.

#### Parsons College, Fairfield

Parsons College, at Fairfield, was founded in 1875, under the Endowment Fund provided in the will of Lewis C. Parsons (1793-1855). It is controlled by the Presbyterian Church. The first class was graduated in 1880.

#### William Penn College, Oskaloosa

William Penn College, at Oskaloosa, operated under the auspices of the Society of Friends, was opened in September, 1873. Following the destruction of the first building by fire in 1916, several new buildings were erected on a 30-acre campus near the original site. Herbert Hoover has been one of the Commencement Day orators.

#### Buena Vista College, Storm Lake

Buena Vista College is located at Storm Lake. The Fort Dodge Presbytery founded the school in 1884 at Fort Dodge, but later accepted Storm Lake's offer of eight acres of land and \$25,000 for buildings, dedicating the new school July 8, 1891.

#### Western Union College, Le Mars

Western Union College, at Le Mars, was founded in 1890 and is under the control of the Evangelical Church. Seven buildings are grouped on a 15-acre campus.

#### Morningside College, Sioux City

Morningside College, at Sioux City, was founded by the Methodist Episcopal Church, by merging the University of the Northwest of Sioux City and the Charles City College in 1894. It has five modern buildings on a 23-acre campus.

#### John Fletcher College, Oskaloosa

John Fletcher College, at Oskaloosa, was organized in 1905, as the Central Holiness University, later changing its name in honor of John Fletcher, a friend of John Wesley.

**Loras College, Dubuque**

Loras College, a Catholic Church institution, at Dubuque, developed from St. Raphael's Seminary founded in 1838. The school is under the immediate supervision of the Archbishop of the Dubuque diocese. Eight buildings on a 50-acre campus house the college, which boasts of one of the largest private libraries in the state, over 70,000 volumes. It was formerly called Columbia College.

**St. Ambrose College, Davenport**

St. Ambrose College at Davenport is another Catholic institution which is deservedly popular. It occupies four buildings on a 15-acre campus. It was founded in 1882, under the auspices of the Roman Catholic Bishop of Davenport.

**University of Dubuque, Dubuque**

The University of Dubuque was founded in 1852 and conducts a Presbyterian Theological Seminary in addition to its College of Liberal Arts. The school, organized by the Reverend Adrian Van Vliet to train ministers to follow the German immigrants coming into the Mississippi Valley, was first known as the German Theological School of the Northwest, but in 1870 it became affiliated with the Presbyterian Church. Women were first admitted to class in 1912.

**Upper Iowa University, Fayette**

Upper Iowa University, at Fayette, was organized in 1857 as Fayette Seminary, with an endowment of \$50,000. It was formerly sponsored by the Methodist Episcopal Church. In addition to the College of Liberal Arts there are Schools of Music and Business. The 14-acre campus lies in the center of the town. The museum is particularly praiseworthy, containing many fine prehistoric specimens.

**Drake University, Des Moines**

Drake University, at Des Moines, was established in 1881, named after Governor Francis Marion Drake of Centerville. The school is under the auspices of the Disciples of Christ Church. It embraces Colleges of Education, Fine Arts, Commerce and Finance, Bible, Liberal Arts, Law and Pharmacy. A radio course was added a few years ago. The campus covers several city blocks, the latest buildings being a fine new Dormitory for Women and a Memorial Library, established and endowed by Gardner Cowles, publisher of the Des Moines Register and Tribune. The University Law library contains some 17,000 volumes, while the general library has 71,000.

Adjoining the campus are the great Stadium and Field House, scene of many state and national athletic events. George J. Carpenter was the first Chancellor, as the President was then known. The late deceased president, Daniel W. Morehouse, was an astronomer of international note.

**Briar Cliff College, Sioux City**

Briar Cliff College, a four year college for women, is conducted by the Sisters of St. Francis of the Holy Family of Dubuque, Iowa. The college began its first scholastic year September 18, 1930.

**Clarke College, Dubuque**

Clarke College grew from an academy for women founded in 1843 by Sisters of Charity of the Blessed Virgin Mary. A college department was opened in 1901.

**Marycrest College, Davenport**

Marycrest College is a corporate unit of St. Ambrose College, formerly known as the Woman's Division. Founded in 1939, it is conducted by the Sisters of the Humility of Mary.

### Wartburg College, Waverly

Wartburg College is a four year co-educational liberal arts college controlled and supported by the American Lutheran Church. It is a merger of the Wartburg College, which was formerly located at Clinton, Iowa, and of St. Paul-Luther College, St. Paul, Minnesota. The merger and re-location took place in 1935.

## Iowa Cares for Children and Veterans

**T**HE State Board of Control has jurisdiction over 15 state institutions, of which six are for the mentally unfit and three are for criminal offenders. The remaining six are divided as follows: two training schools, designed as correctional institutions; one for boys, at Eldora; one for girls, at Mitchellville; two orphanages, at Toledo and Davenport; the Soldiers' Home at Marshalltown, and the State Sanatorium for Tuberculosis at Oakdale.

### Training School for Boys, Eldora

The Training School for Boys, at Eldora, was opened March 31, 1868. The state has an investment there of \$1,015,040.36. This school is for incorrigible and delinquent boys, sent there upon court order. The school has 872 acres upon which are learned, by practical work, the various phases of farming and gardening. In addition there are twelve industrial shops, tailor, blacksmith, automobile, shoe, printing, sewing room, bakery, machine shop, plumbing, carpenter, mason and painting.

Competent schools are presided over by efficient teachers. Athletics, debates, home talent plays, a fine band, moving pictures, a good library and other opportunities to improve mind and body find their result in better boys.

The present superintendent is O. S. Von Krog.

### Training School for Girls, Mitchellville

The Training School for Girls was established in 1868, to be located on property in Lucas county, leased from a Society of Friends, or Quakers. The first admission was April, 1873. In 1880 the present Training School, at Mitchellville, was located, taking over the Lucas county plant. The state has a capital investment there of \$226,668.52.

The normal capacity at the Mitchellville school is 200. Girls between the ages of ten and eighteen are admitted, on commitment from district, juvenile and municipal courts or on transfer from other institutions by the Board of Control.

Under competent instruction and supervision, girls are taken through the twelfth grade of regular public school work, and are taught all necessary branches of home economics.

The school grounds have an area of 175 acres. Farming and gardening are carried on, with good results.

The present superintendent is Mrs. John L. Carter.

### Juvenile Home, Toledo

The state maintains a Juvenile Home, or orphanage, at Toledo, with a capital investment of \$456,090.14. Dependent, destitute, homeless and neglected children are admitted and given care until they are 21 years of age, most of them being placed in good private homes, under the supervision of women state agents.

The buildings are substantial and kept in a home manner as far as possible. The grounds consist of 320 acres, one-half of which is rented by the state. Generally the children are happy and contented and make good progress in their school work.

The present Superintendent is R. B. Clift.

#### Iowa Soldiers' Orphans' Home, Davenport

The second state orphanage is known as the Iowa Soldier's Orphans' Home and is located at Davenport. The capital investment of the state is \$917,137.49 and the annual per capita maintenance cost is \$320.28.

The first child was admitted on July 4, 1864. Dependent, neglected and abandoned children are admitted upon court order or personal application of parent or guardian, approved by Court or Board of Supervisors.

The children are given scholastic and industrial advantages; with moving pictures, all manner of games and sports, picnics and the like, to make life more pleasant. The acreage of the institutions is 619, of which a little more than one-half is rented.

The present Superintendent is Harvey E. Daines, on leave of absence in the United State Army. Mrs. H. O. Hyatt is acting Superintendent.

#### Iowa Soldiers' Home, Marshalltown

The Board of Control also manages the Iowa Soldiers' Home at Marshalltown, founded in 1887, having a capital investment of \$717,013.87. With a normal capacity of 700, the population on June 30, 1942 was 566.

The veterans and their wives located there, at one report, were divided as follows:

Civil War veterans, 4; Indian war veterans, 3; Spanish-American War veterans, 36; World War veterans, 320; peacetime veterans, 5; regular army veterans, 19; women, 175.

Life is lived pleasantly by the soldiers, with plenty of amusements, moving pictures, billiards and pool, cards, horseshoe pitching and all manner of games and light sports. The nearby river permits fishing and boating and families are kept together by the presence of the veterans' wives. The men and women take frequent furloughs, to visit relatives and friends, or just to be free on the open road again. Upon their return they seem more than ever satisfied.

The present Commandant is Leslie E. Switzer.

## Iowa Cares for Its Mentally Ill

ON February 27, 1861, the first patient was received at the state hospital at Mount Pleasant, generally said to be the first institution of its kind west of the Mississippi river.

For the past 29 years Iowa has had four institutions to care for its mentally afflicted, those at Independence, Clarinda and Cherokee having been added. These are now known as State Hospitals for Insane.

#### Four Hospitals for Mental Cases

Iowa has a total capital investment in these four institutions of \$9,263,047.24. On June 30, 1942, the State Board of Control, which has the management of these institutions, reported a total population of 6,499, ministered to by more than 900 officers and employes. Land aggregating 4,815 acres, enough to make thirty good quarter-section farms, is used by the four hospitals.

In the order of their establishment Independence comes second; the first patient having been admitted there on May 1, 1873; Clarinda is third, December 13, 1888; Cherokee, fourth, August 18, 1902. The amount of land runs in the same order. Mount Pleasant, first, with 1,410 acres; Independence second, with 1,349 acres; Clarinda third, with 1,055 acres; Cherokee fourth, with 999 acres.



The population of the four State Hospitals, as of June 30, 1942, was reported by the State Board of Control as follows:

#### Two Homes for Feeble-Minded

The reports of these four State Hospitals do not begin to tell the entire story of what Iowa is doing for its mentally deficient and unfit. The State Board of Control has jurisdiction over two other institutions belonging to this same general classification: The Glenwood State School at Glenwood, which received its first patient on September 1, 1876; and the Hospital for Epileptics and School for Feeble-minded, at Woodward, which received its first patient on September 3, 1917.

The state has a capital investment of \$4,683,092.04 in these two institutions, which on June 30, 1942, had a combined population of 3,420, with 461 officers and employes to take care of them. The grounds of the two hospitals aggregate 2,330 acres.

Each of these six institutions is open to general visitors within certain prescribed hours each day, and to parents at any time. To the limit of funds available they are well kept, sanitary and attractive, the buildings at each place being surrounded by large grounds, nicely landscaped and properly tended. While the atmosphere at all is depressing, entertainment is arranged for as many as can mentally enjoy it.

The present Superintendents are as follows: Mount Pleasant, Dr. L. P. Ristine, on leave of absence to United States Army; Dr. Adolph Soucek is acting Superintendent; Independence, Dr. R. A. Stewart; Clarinda, Dr. Norman D. Render; Cherokee, Dr. Charles F. Obermann; Glenwood, Dr. T. B. Lacey; Woodward, Dr. E. M. Meyers.

Business managers have been appointed for the following institutions: Cherokee, J. E. Wirth; Independence, C. L. Rigby; Woodward, A. R. Miles; Mount Pleasant, R. E. Hanna; Oakdale, Harry W. Reeve.

## Iowa Tuberculosis Sanatorium

**T**HE State Sanatorium for Tuberculosis was established in 1908, at Oakdale, six miles from Iowa City, and 21 miles from Cedar Rapids. The number of patients on June 30, 1942, was 404. The total number of officers and employes is 204, or one for each two patients. The care and treatment are splendid and the beneficial results are already manifest.

Patients are admitted on certification by attending physicians. The average cost per patient ranges from \$52 to \$55 a month and is charged to the counties where they live. Those who can do so are asked to reimburse the counties.

The Sanatorium has the facilities and services of the Hospital of the State University at its easy disposal, which is of inestimable value.

Investigation disclosed that there are more women patients than men, the last biennial report showing 285 men to 331 women admitted. The largest classification by age are those between 20 and 40 years. Of 616 admitted during two years, geographical location was as follows: 129 resident in country; 232 resident in villages and towns under 8,000; 74 resident in cities between 8,000 and 25,000; 181 residents of cities over 25,000.

Of 616 admitted in two years the record of progress showed the following: disease arrested, 178; apparently arrested, 49; improved, 124; unimproved, 31; dead, 110; clinically non-tuberculosis, 124.

Dr. Wm. M. Spear is the present superintendent. The business manager is Harry W. Reeve.

## Iowa's Penal Institutions

**T**HE prison at Fort Madison is more than 100 years old. It was established in 1839, the year after Iowa became a territory, and seven years before it became a state.

The state penitentiary of today has 28 buildings, a farm of 1,031 acres, with 118 head of dairy cattle, 1,324 hogs, 2,919 head of poultry, 15 acres of orchards, 80 acres of gardens and an annual farm production of 20,000 bushels of small grains; and chair and furniture, brush and broom, spinning, textile and shoe factories and industries.

The State of Iowa has a capital investment here of \$2,973,073.35. With a normal capacity of 1,166, the warden reported on June 30, 1942, a prison population of 1,313; or 13 per cent of excess population. To guard and care for all these men requires the services of 172 officers and employes.

### Satisfactory Parole System

Under the able guidance of the Board of Control and recent wardens, the Fort Madison penitentiary has achieved high rank among the nation's penal institutions. Outbreaks have been few and escapes infrequent. A parole system enables the men of highest intelligence and best records to work on the prison farms, away from the enclosure, and even to go to the state's various other institutions under the Board of Control (state hospitals and schools) to work and live on an honor system which has produced good results.

The inmates as far as is possible are kept at work, according to their terms of sentence, many being fitted for industries at which they can support themselves after release. Each prisoner is interviewed, upon admittance, by the chaplain and the warden, in an effort to see what work they should be put to and what can best be done to reclaim them.

### Recreation and Amusements Provided

The inmates have recreation and amusement opportunities. Head-phone radios are installed in the cells and good programs are furnished from a central control. A good library is well patronized; athletics and moving pictures make life more bearable. Baseball, kittenball, tennis, boxing, wrestling, horseshoe pitching, football and basketball give ample opportunity to most of the men to keep in good physical trim and to get their minds off their plight.

On June 30, 1942, 19,750 prisoners had been confined since the prison was first opened.

Under the law all condemned prisoners are executed at Fort Madison. The present warden is Col. P. A. Lainson.

### Men's Reformatory at Anamosa

The Men's Reformatory is located at Anamosa, where the first prisoner was admitted on May 13, 1873. The state has a capital investment here of \$2,098,271.19, and a population on June 30, 1942, of 941, about normal capacity. Originally intended for first and youthful offenders, and the criminally insane, within recent years prisoners have been transferred from Fort Madison as overcrowded conditions there demanded.

In the 69 years it has been in existence, 17,990 prisoners have been received at Anamosa, up to June 30, 1942.

Grain and livestock farming are carried on here on a large scale. A large modern canning plant is operated here as an industry. Most of the vegetables for the other state institutions are canned here. Other industries include the manufacture of soap, clothing, automobile number plates, road signs and cheese.

The prisoners are kept at hard work, according to the sentences imposed upon them, but they have ample recreation and amusement facilities, including various sports and games, radio programs and moving pictures. Part of the Reformatory yard, or enclosure, is flooded during the winter, permitting ice skating. The average age of the prisoners received during the past biennial period was 23 years, six months and 29 days.

The cost of prisoner maintenance at Anamosa is slightly higher than at Fort Madison, being \$291.60 a year, compared with \$267.36 at Fort Madison.

The warden of the Men's Reformatory is Foss Davis.

#### Women's Reformatory at Rockwell City

Women over 18 years old, convicted of offenses which carry a term of more than 30 days, are sent to the Women's Reformatory at Rockwell City. The first prisoner was received on May 2, 1918. The population, at the latest report, was 72, with a normal capacity of 78.

The state has a capital investment here of \$397,794.41. The reformatory has an area of 220 acres.

The fact that many short-term offenders are sent to Rockwell City, instead of being kept in county jails, makes the per capita cost of maintenance large, being \$537.12 a year. The women are given an opportunity to attend school and have various entertainments and amusements, including movies, dances, lectures and recitals, home talent plays and picnics.

The superintendent is Miss E. Pauline Johnston.

## Old Age Assistance

**T**HE Iowa old age assistance program is primarily concerned with the task of granting direct financial relief to elderly persons who are in need. It completed its eighth year of operation in the last fiscal year.

The Iowa old age assistance plan continues to be closely related to the actual needs of the aged. The amount of assistance an elderly person receives depends only upon his income or lack of income and his particular needs, rather than any other factor. The Iowa law provides for no special consideration to persons who have been considered good citizens and provides no penalties for those who have been considered poor citizens. Similarly the Iowa law provides only a plan for relieving the distress and want among the aged and does not provide for a flat cash reward for having reached the age of 65 years.

## Iowa Coal Production

**T**HE Iowa coal industry ranks only second to agriculture in importance in the state. Early records of coal production in the state are given by the United States Census as 400 tons in 1840. It is reported that the early mine operations were in Jefferson county and the Fairfield coal was hauled by wagon to blacksmiths in Mississippi river towns twenty years before railroads reached Iowa. A host of small mines were opened in the late 1840's and in the years following in practically every county underlain with coal. At the present time there are twenty-two coal producing counties in the state. Beginning with the mine inspectors report of 3,500,000 in 1880 there was a steady increase each year, until 1917, when over 9,000,000 tons were produced. That was the peak year. Since then there has been a steady decrease. In the year 1939 the lowest point was reached. Only 3,010,905 tons were produced.

The peak year in number of men employed in and around the mines was 1910. There were 297 mines in operation and 18,005 men were given employment. The year 1942 showed 346 mines in operation and number of men employed 5,567, a decrease of 12,438.

In order of production in 1941. Marion county was first; Appanoose, second; Polk, third; Dallas, fourth; and Mahaska, fifth. In 1942, Marion county was first; Appanoose, second; Mahaska, third; Dallas, fourth; and Polk, fifth.

#### Local Consumption Heaviest

Iowa coal is not consumed largely outside of the state. In fact it is estimated that Iowa mines supply but about one-fourth of the state's total consumption. The largest single avenue of loss in consumption of the Iowa product is the sales to the railroads, which has materially decreased. The facts are that less than 25 years ago the railroads consumed 58 per cent of the annual production. This has decreased each year until the year 1942 when sales to the railroads were less than 10 per cent or 311,371 tons. Most of Iowa's institutions use Iowa coal, almost exclusively. Iowa coal has suffered not only from competition from foreign coal but from natural gas, oil, and to a lesser extent water power.

## Iowa Highway Safety Patrol

**A**S Iowa citizens are all aware, the main objective of the Iowa Highway Safety Patrol is to cut down the number of highway traffic accidents occurring each year, but, in addition to this, they perform other varied duties and services. The duties and functions of the Patrol can perhaps best be explained by showing what their activity was for the year 1942.

The report of C. A. Knee, Chief of the Iowa Highway Safety Patrol, for 1942 shows that the Patrol issued 13,529 summonses. These summonses were issued for driving without a driver's license, going through a stop-sign, reckless driving, speeding in a restricted zone, operating a motor vehicle while intoxicated, passing in a prohibited area, and other reasons. 11,338 resulted in convictions and the total amount of fines paid was \$165,503.19. This money went into the school funds in the counties in which the violations occurred.

To keep equipment in efficient working order for safe use on the highways, 18,369 tickets were issued as notifications of illegal or faulty equipment. Faulty brakes, faulty head-lights or tail-lights, having no rear-view mirror, steering apparatus not adjusted, or vision obstructed—were some of the conditions for which these tickets were issued. (The motorist is required to get this condition corrected as soon as possible and within 48 hours send a garage statement into the district Patrol Office verifying that the correction has been made. If this is not taken care of, the motorist is summoned to appear in court.)

For motorists who were a little out of line and the violations were not of a serious enough nature to warrant summons tickets, memorandum of traffic violation tickets were issued. The number of these issued last year was 4,914.

Fifteen members of the Patrol are assigned to examine applicants for operators' and chauffeurs' licenses. Last year 47,529 passed the examinations for an operator's license; 16,283 the examination for a chauffeur's license; the examiners also renewed 50,386, 1942 chauffeurs' licenses.

Other interesting and important activities of the Patrol include 27 hit and run drivers apprehended, 58 missing persons located, 115 run-away children located, 195 wanted persons apprehended, and stolen property recovered valued at \$74,148.

The Patrol was on active duty at any special event where there was a greatly increased flow of traffic such as athletic contests, fairs, and celebrations. They escorted troop convoys, and lines of army equipment moving on the highways. The Patrol cooperated with federal, state, county and community agencies, assisted in delivering sugar and gas rationing books, the Interstate Commerce Commission in the inspection of trucks, on several occasions the Iowa Bureau of Criminal investigation, the county sheriffs in locating stolen cars, and helping with black-outs and local scrap-iron drives. They also assisted police in handling traffic in local communities when the congestion was out of the ordinary.

The Patrol gave 269 talks over the radio, presented 507 movies to an estimated total audience of 60,000 in the interest of safety education. Property saved through the use of the fire extinguisher 58 times was valued at \$29,050. Sixty-six first aid classes were taught by patrolmen to assist in the war effort.

On January 1, 1943, a total of 58 members of the Patrol had entered the service of the United States. A few replacements have been made, but on the above date the total force consisted of only 79 men, compared to 128 which is the number the Patrol consists of when at full force.

# Iowa Police and Radio System

## First State Appropriation

**D**URING 1932 and 1933 this station was used by the Bureau of Investigation for the broadcasting of emergency protective items. A money request was made of the Forty-fifth Iowa General Assembly and \$15,000 was appropriated for the extension of the system. Two broadcasting stations were located in northern Iowa, in Waterloo and Storm Lake. This gave Iowa three stations, from which, at that time, three crime bulletins were issued each day.

The Forty-sixth Iowa General Assembly appropriated \$20,000 to expand the system to include southern Iowa. Fairfield and Atlantic were selected. By the fall of 1935 all five of the state police radio stations were broadcasting continuously on a daytime basis.

In 1936 the contract between the Iowa Bankers Association and the Attorney General of Iowa expired. The Forty-sixth Iowa General Assembly came to the rescue with \$10,000 with which to erect and equip a state-owned and operated station.

## State Radio System Launched in 1937

Through the cooperation of the Iowa State Fair Board, a small brick-and-tile building on the fairgrounds was transformed into a radio station and the state radio system was launched in March, 1937. Later, the station at Waterloo was transferred to Cedar Falls.

During the spring of 1938 the State Bureau of Investigation recognized the need of a mobile broadcasting unit which would operate in conjunction with the existing radio stations. A complete portable police radio station and its equipment have been permanently installed in a panel truck. This movable plant can transmit and receive messages.

One of the most important duties of the police radio system is the maintaining of an accurate card index system of all material broadcast. All items which are dispatched by the radio system are cross filed, enabling the operators of any of the stations to immediately supply information which may be requested by any police officer of the state.

## Plan Interstate in Scope

The five stations of the Iowa Police Radio System, besides being in constant radio communication with each other, maintain continuous contact with municipal police radio stations. Information which is released by the peace officers of Iowa can be immediately transmitted to any other state which maintains a police radio communications system. Criminals who cross the state lines for security now find alert officers, who have been advised of their activities by the police radio, awaiting them.

The radio police system was a part of the Bureau of Investigation, under the Attorney General, until the Department of Public Safety was established in 1939.

## Iowa State Fair

**T**HE Iowa State Fair has always been noted for the size and quality of its livestock exhibits. These have come from all over the United States and Canada.

Between 1902 and 1940, inclusive, the Iowa State Fair exhibited 189,496 head of horses, cattle, swine and sheep; to make no mention of around 6,000 head of poultry, rabbits and pigeons shown annually in recent years.

### Profited 34 Years, Lost 5 Years

For the 39 years between 1902 and 1940, inclusive, the State Fair showed a gross profit 34 years and a loss five years; a net profit for the 39 years of \$1,101,887.

The largest attendance was in 1929, the Diamond Jubilee year, when the figure was 435,385. Running a close second was 1938, when the

centenary of Iowa's creation as a separate territory was fittingly observed by the fair with an attendance of 430,907.

Iowa responded to the request of the federal government in 1942, abandoned its annual fair and turned over a part of the grounds and buildings for use of the army. The suspension is temporary. The fair will be resumed after the war is ended.

## Iowa in World War I

**T**HE total number of men registered in Iowa for service, and possible service, during World War I, was 523,478, more than one-fourth the entire population of men, women and children. This grand total was divided as follows:

The total number of officers, men and women from Iowa in World War service is placed at 114,213, divided as follows:

In the army, 96,726 enlisted men, 4,975 officers, 611 nurses.

In the marines, 1,044 enlisted men, 30 officers.

In the navy, 10,211 enlisted men, 515 officers, 40 nurses, 42 yeomen. Cadets at West Point, 20.

These Iowa soldiers came from every walk of life. The Adjutant General reported to the Governor that of the men drafted in Iowa, 51.7 per cent were farmers and farm laborers.

Had the war continued, Iowa would have, by December 15, 1918, completed classification and physical examination of the second series of September registrants, men between 37 and 45, and would have had about 60,000 men ready for entrainment to the various camps.

For a period of twenty-five months between April, 1917, through April, 1919, the war cost the United States more than \$1,000,000 an hour, or \$21,850,000,000. During the first three months, war expenditures were at the rate of \$2,000,000 a day. During the next year they averaged more than \$22,000,000 a day. For the final ten months of the period the daily total reached \$44,000,000. The total war costs of all nations were about \$186,000,000,000, of which the United States and the Allies spent two-thirds, and the enemy one-third.

When the Armistice was signed on November 11, 1918, Iowa had about 35,000 more men classified as physically examined and ready to entrain for mobilization camps. Iowa was one of the four states which was ready to promptly fill calls for trained men; the other states being Utah, Nevada and Wisconsin.

#### The Nation and the War

The number of enlisted men in the United States army on November 11, 1918, was 4,000,000; the number of officers 200,000. Of American soldiers in France there were 2,084,000 and of these there were 1,390,000 in active service.

The total number of men in the Allied armies was 42,188,810. Opposed to them were 22,850,000; making a grand total, in all armies, of 65,038,810 under arms.

During the war the Allies lost 3,100,200 men in battle deaths; the Central Powers lost 4,350,000; a grand total of 7,450,200 human lives sacrificed to war.

The number of wounded Allied army troops was 12,831,004; that of the Central Powers was 8,388,448; a grand total of maimed and crippled of 21,210,425; ten times the population of the state of Iowa.

## The American Legion in Iowa

THE American Legion was born in Paris, March 15, 1919. The Legion was launched formally at St. Louis, May 8, 1919, by World War veterans from nearly every state in the Union, who had been selected by temporary secretaries named at the request of Theodore Roosevelt, Jr., who acted under instructions from the Paris caucus.

The first Iowa state convention was held in Des Moines, September 4, 1919. The first national convention of delegates from the newly organized state departments was held in Minneapolis on Armistice Day, 1919.

The American Legion Auxiliary of mothers, wives, sisters and daughters of Legionnaires was organized in 1921. The Iowa Department was launched at Sioux City.

La Societe des 40 Hommes et 8 Chevaux, a national fraternal order of Legionnaires, was organized in 1921.

Hanford MacNider established the Iowa Legionaire with Frank Miles, a wartime sailor and former city editor of the Des Moines *Capital*, as editor on March 4, 1921.

## The Disabled American Veterans in Iowa

**T**HE Disabled American Veterans, commonly known as the D. A. V., was organized nationally in 1920 by groups of disabled veterans then undergoing vocational training courses, and chartered by Congress in 1932, to render service to, for, and by disabled veterans. The D. A. V. has, ever since its inception, been the spokesman for the disabled war veterans of America, in Congress and before its various committees, as well as before the Veterans' Administration and its local regional offices and facilities.

During 1920 and 1921 the first three chapters of the Iowa Department were organized in the vocational training centers at Des Moines, Iowa City, and Ames. The Department of Iowa D. A. ## Grand Army of the Republic

**T**HE Grand Army of the Republic is a patriotic and fraternal organization of the survivors of the military and naval forces of the Civil War who served between April 12, 1861, and April 9, 1865.

Iowa was one of the first states of the Union to attempt organization of the Grand Army of the Republic, receiving as a Department its first charter on July 12, 1866.

Of Grand Army Posts in Iowa more than 520 were chartered. Membership stood at its peak in 1890, when 20,324 veterans belonged to 435 posts. The membership in 1943 stands at thirty-seven.

Iowa now has 28 members of the Grand Army of the Republic, three of whom have passed the century mark. They are John C. Bonwell, of Gray, Iowa, who reached the 100 mark in November 1942; Mark H. Morse, of Wyoming, Iowa, and Charles H. Lingenfelter, of Dakota City, both of whom are over 101 years old.

Six veterans of the Civil War served as Governors of Iowa: Colonel William M. Stone of Knoxville, 1864-1868; Colonel Samuel Merrill of McGregor, 1868-1872; Colonel Cyrus C. Carpenter of Fort Dodge, 1872-1875; Captain Joshua G. Newbold, of Mount Pleasant, 1877-1878; Captain Buren R. Sherman of Vinton, 1882-1886; Lieutenant Colonel Francis M. Drake of Centerville and Des Moines, 1896-1898.

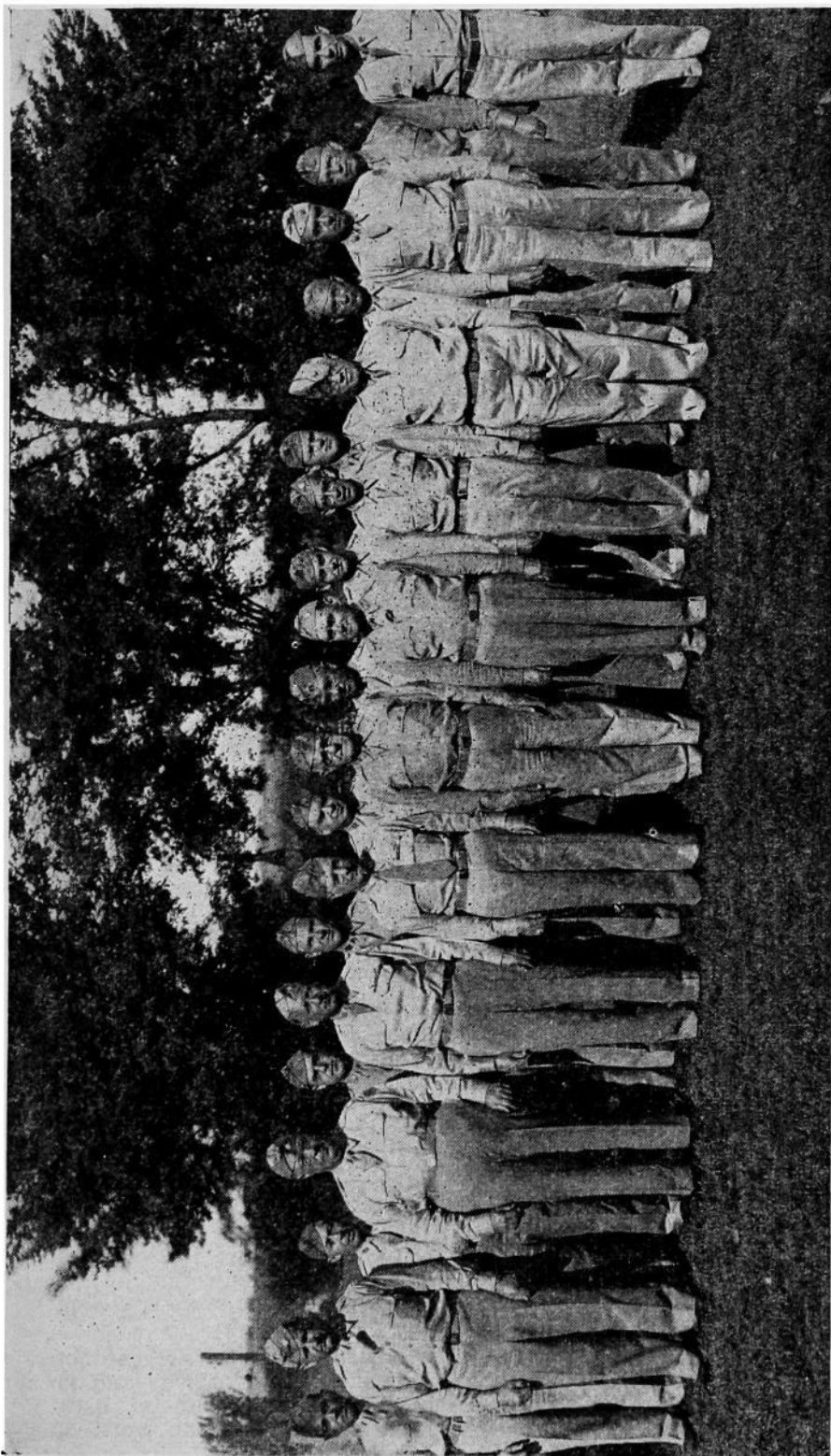

## The State Historical Department

THE Iowa State Historical Department was established on the urgency of a group of men who fifty years ago sensed the need for an institution at the seat of government for the collection and preservation of Iowa historical material and keeping it available for its legal, historic and cultural value. It had as its foundation the fruits of one man's autograph collecting hobby, was built around the passion for history keeping by many who had participated in history making, and has been developed into an institution of incalculable worth through years of patient sacrifice by a few who gave their lives that future generations might know the story of Iowa and of Iowa people.

The Historical Building houses a vast collection of material of almost infinite variety and value beyond computation. It was recently reorganized under the name of the State Department of History and Archives, and its scope enlarged by strengthening the law as to disposition and care of the state's long neglected public records and securing additional facilities for the preservation of the archives. The curator is appointed by the Board of Trustees of the department consisting of the governor, chief justice and superintendent of public instruction.

The famous Aldrich collection of autographs and related material given the department by Charles Aldrich, founder and first curator, consists of thousands of items, many very rare—letters, signatures, manuscripts, photographs, mementoes of nineteenth century statesmen, presidents, authors, men and women of action, both of America and of Europe. It is an exhibit unrivaled anywhere in the midland region.

Archives of the state, public and private records, early census records invaluable in establishing citizenship and family status, official transactions of the office of governor, and all the various officials and departments; records of registrations, appointments, commissions and legal proceedings; corporation records, school reports, licenses and inspections; a vast volume of material that embraces almost the entire public history of the state is in constant use by courts, officials and history students. The department has secured for use in the important work of preserving state archives, a building only a block from the state historical building, as a working and storage place for the archives division, already well filled, where the valuable state records can be kept free from the hazard of contact with other work and danger from the elements. War and its results have tremendously emphasized the importance of personal and public records in establishing citizenship, vital statistics, and legal matters.

The manuscript division is devoted to collection of all possible material relating to Iowa history and events, written or published, and to publication from time to time in the *Annals of Iowa*, the department's historical quarterly, of the most representative of these collections. This includes not only official records but personal and private papers, rare pamphlets and newspapers, portraits and scenes, manuscripts of distinguished authors and valuable diaries and historic letters.

The historical and genealogical library is unsurpassed and is consulted personally or by mail by Iowa people, and those from distant states, for family histories and to establish facts for legal and other use, and especially to meet the demands of patriotic organizations and the military service. This also includes a complete collection of the works of Iowa authors and publications about Iowa. The state traveling and medical libraries also have place in the building.

War information is a part of the archives, and the Iowa record of the personnel and operations of Iowa people in the civil war and in the World war and others, with portraits, biographies, roster lists, posters, weapons, uniforms, etc., is especially fine; and the work of

gathering similar material for the state as to the present World war is well under way and continuing.

The educational and cultural influence of the department extends to the whole state and beyond. Classes of students come from everywhere for the study of science or history with source materials available. Prior to the war the count showed upwards of 20,000 visitors annually; and military activities and the intellectual spur of the war have increased the number of visitors and added immensely to the drain upon the professional staff of the department for information and assistance. At times more than a hundred workers on various federal projects were engaged in research. Group mountings of natural history in prepared cases go out regularly to schools. There is great interest in the study specimens of native birds especially prepared for school demonstration. The department has many calls for a splendid collection of color and black and white slides and films, still and moving, showing Iowa wild life at all seasons, pioneer and primitive domestic and industrial life, all of which is supplemented by lectures by staff experts.

The natural history museum and the museum of archeology and geology, includes a magnificent display of mounted animals and birds; prehistoric relics such as bones of mastodons, stone axes and utensils, Indian arts and crafts, fossils and specimens of geologic formations; a mine of information for the students who are eager to have these items explained by competent guides.

The portrait gallery of the makers of Iowa, governors, congressmen, editors, ministers, and judges, many valuable oil paintings and some by the greatest of American portrait painters, is a collection declared by competent persons to be second to none in the United States.

The pioneer exhibits includes utensils and implements used by the first settlers in Iowa, looms, spinning wheels, stage coaches, heavy wagons, primitive plows and harvesting equipment, melodeons and spinets, candlesticks, historic tableware and interesting tools.

The newspaper division, with files of leading Iowa publications, beginning with territorial days and brought to date, is invaluable in research work.

Legislative records, reprints of early session laws, and group portraits of members of the General Assembly for many years are shown.

The soldiers' and sailors' monument, and other memorials on the state house grounds, with the war flags and mementoes are all under the care of the Historical Department. The great collection of the records of Gen. G. M. Dodge is located between the Emerson Hough room and the Davenport room, all filled with rare material of historic character. There is a navy model of the Battleship Iowa II, and a model of the Mayflower. Map and chart collections are large. A start has been made in microfilming records. The display of arms and military equipment attracts much attention. There is constant cooperation by the department with almost every office and agency of the state and the search for facts and information goes on incessantly.

Wartime has immensely emphasized the value of every division of the department—archives, museums, library, historical research, newspapers, and especially personal and military records. But the military demands have also depleted the professional force. The results accomplished despite the added burdens upon both the professional staff and custodial force are much appreciated by the public.

The Historical building is open for visitors, free to all, every day of the year, and dates for schools and other groups can be arranged in advance. The facilities of the department are at the command of the public at all times without cost.

## Iowa's Official Songs

**T**HERE have been many aspirants to the honor of writing the state song for Iowa, but only three or four of these songs have received noteworthy official or popular recognition. First in point of time and official recognition is The Song of Iowa, the words of which were written by S. H. M. Byers:

You ask what land I love the best,  
Iowa, 'tis Iowa.  
The fairest state of all the west,  
Iowa, O Iowa!  
From yonder Mississippi's stream  
To where Missouri's waters gleam  
O fair it is as poet's dream,  
Iowa, O Iowa.

See yonder fields of tasseled corn.  
Iowa, in Iowa.  
Where plenty fills her golden horn,  
Iowa, in Iowa.  
See how her wondrous prairies shine  
To yonder sunset's purpling line,  
O happy land, O land of mine,  
Iowa, O Iowa!

And she has maids whose laughing eyes,  
Iowa, O Iowa!  
To him who loves were paradise,  
Iowa, O Iowa!  
Oh, happiest fate that e'er was known,  
Such eyes to shine for one alone,

While Major Byers thus had the honor of writing Iowa's official song, the best known and most popular song of the state is the famous "Iowa Corn Song." This famous song was written by George Hamilton, secretary of the Des Moines Chamber of Commerce:

Our love is stronger ev'ry day,  
Yo-ho; yo-ho; yo-ho.  
So come along and joint the throng,  
Sev'ral hundred thousand strong,  
As you come, just sing this song:  
Yo-ho; yo-ho; yo-ho.

### State Regulation Initiated

The new constitution of 1857 authorized the incorporation of banks and provided for a state banking system. The national banks were created in 1863. "Between the 1880's and 1933, banks extended their operations to farm financing and the control of banking passed from individuals to state-regulated banks."

## Road System

**T**WENTY-THREE years have elapsed since Iowa first assumed definite responsibility for a system of state roads, built directly by the state and financed by state and federal funds. The legislature of 1917 took action looking toward the establishment of an inter-county system of roads and making provision for meeting the requirements of the first federal aid act passed by Congress in 1916, but owing to the world war situation very little was done prior to 1919.

The 1941 legislature limited state fund primary road expenditures, including bond and interest payments, construction and maintenance, to 17 million dollars a year. The rest of the fund's income goes to farm-market road construction. The sum of \$4,311,216.27 was transferred during the fiscal year ending June 30, 1942.

The Iowa State Highway Commission to June 30, 1942, had awarded contracts aggregating \$7,050,452.28 for farm-to-market road projects located in 99 counties. These contracts include the following:

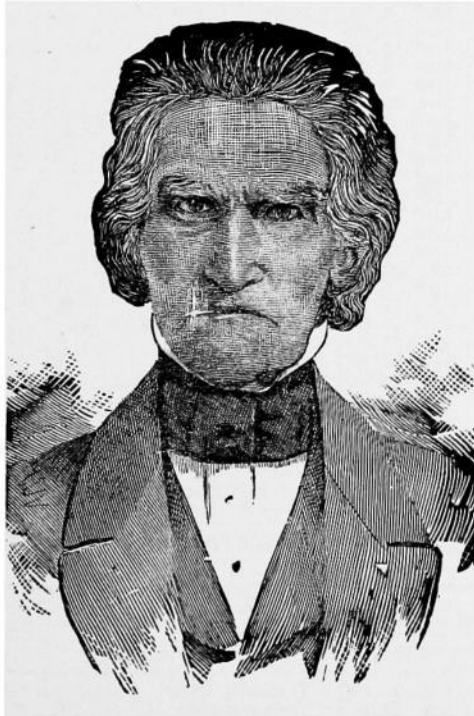

**F**IFTEEN notable Iowa men have served in the Cabinets of thirteen Presidents of the United States; four as Secretary of Agriculture; three as Secretary of the Interior; three as Secretary of War; two as Secretary of Commerce; one as Secretary of the Navy; one as Secretary of the Treasury; and one as Postmaster General. One of the list held the distinction of serving 16 years, under three Presidents, which is the nation's record for this kind of public service.

The list of Iowa's Cabinet members, arranged chronologically, with brief biographies, is as follows:

### James M. Harlan

James M. Harlan, of Mt. Pleasant, served as Secretary of the Interior in the cabinet of President Andrew Johnson in 1865 and 1866. A graduate of Asbury (now dePauw) University in Indiana, he was elected President of Iowa Wesleyan University, at Mt. Pleasant, in 1853; served as United States Senator from Iowa from 1855 to 1865 and returned to the Senate, from the Cabinet, serving a term from 1866 to 1872. He was a close associate of Abraham Lincoln and his daughter Mary married Robert T. Lincoln, son of the martyred President. Secretary Harlan died in Mt. Pleasant in 1899.

### William W. Belknap

William W. Belknap, Secretary of War in the two administrations of President Ulysses S. Grant, was born in New York, but made his home in Keokuk for a number of years. In 1861, he entered the Union army as major of the 15th Iowa Volunteers and was engaged at Shiloh, Corinth and Vicksburg, but became most prominent in Sherman's Atlanta campaign. He was promoted to Brigadier General in 1864 and Major General in 1865. He was collector of internal revenue in Iowa from 1865 to 1869, but on October 29th of that year was appointed Secretary of War by President Grant, to succeed General William Tecumseh Sherman. General Belknap served from that date until March 7, 1876, having been reappointed when Grant took office the second time. He died in 1890.

### George W. McCrary

George W. McCrary served as Secretary of War in the Cabinet of President Rutherford B. Hayes. He was born in Indiana, removing with his family to the Wisconsin Territory, of which Iowa was a part, when a year old. He studied law in Keokuk and was admitted to the bar in 1856. He was elected to the State Legislature in 1857 and from 1861 to 1865 served in the State Senate, where he was chairman of the committees on military affairs and the judiciary. He was a member of Congress from 1869 to 1877. He was Secretary of War under President Hayes from 1877 to 1879, when he was appointed Justice of the United States Circuit court. Later on, he was general counsel for the Santa Fe railroad until his death in 1890.

### Samuel J. Kirkwood

Samuel J. Kirkwood, Iowa Civil War governor, was Secretary of the Interior under President James A. Garfield. He was born in Maryland, moved to Ohio, and in 1855 established himself in milling and farming in Iowa. The next year he was a member of the Iowa State Senate and from 1860 to 1864 was Governor of Iowa. During the Civil War he levied 48 regiments of volunteers and equipped them at \$500,000 less than the usual cost. He was United States Senator from Iowa from 1865 to 1867 (completing the unexpired term of James Harlan, resigned) was again elected Governor of Iowa in 1875 and from 1877 to 1881 was a member of the State Senate. He was appointed Secretary of the Interior by President Garfield and served from March 4, 1881, to April 6, 1882, when he resigned. He died at Iowa City, September 1, 1894.

### Frank Hatton

Frank Hatton, of Burlington, co-publisher with Robert J. Burdette of the *Hawk-Eye*, was Assistant Postmaster General from 1881 to 1884 and Postmaster General in the Cabinet of President Chester A. Arthur from October 14, 1884, to March 4, 1885; the youngest Cabinet member since Alexander Hamilton, being 38 years old when appointed. He died in 1894.

### James Wilson

James Wilson, of Tama and Ames, served as Secretary of Agriculture for sixteen years, in the Cabinets of Presidents McKinley, Roosevelt and Taft. He was born in Scotland, coming with his parents to the United States in 1851 and settling in Iowa in 1855. He was educated at Iowa State College, engaged in farming, and in 1861 was elected to the Iowa legislature where he served for three terms, acting as Speaker of the House the last term. He was a member of Congress from 1873 to 1877; State Railway commissioner in Iowa from 1877 to 1883, and from 1883 to 1885 was again a member of Congress. He was a regent of Iowa State University from 1870 to 1874, and from 1890 to 1897 was Director of the Agricultural Experiment Station and Professor of Agriculture at Iowa State College at Ames. He was appointed Secretary of Agriculture by President McKinley in 1897, was reappointed by him when he took office the second time, was retained by President Theodore Roosevelt and reappointed by President Taft, remaining in office until Woodrow Wilson came in on March 4, 1913. During his regime the Department of Agriculture developed rapidly; forest reserves were made, experiment stations were established and farm demonstration work was undertaken on a national scale. He died in 1920.

### Leslie M. Shaw

Leslie M. Shaw, of Denison, served as Secretary of the Treasury in the two administrations of President Theodore Roosevelt. He was a native of Vermont; was graduated from Cornell College, at Mount Vernon, Iowa, and from the Iowa College of Law. He established a law practice in Denison, became president of one bank there and another in Manila and took an active part in civic and political affairs. His effective work on the republican side in the free silver campaign in 1896, when William J. Bryan was running for President against William McKinley, speaking an average of five hours a day some weeks and as high as seven hours for several consecutive days, led to his nomination and election the following year as Governor of Iowa. He was re-elected two years later, doubling his plurality and multiplying his majority by four. He declined a third nomination. In 1898 he was president of the International Monetary Conference at Indianapolis. At the end of his second term as Governor of Iowa he became Secretary of the Treasury in Theodore Roosevelt's Cabinet and held that position a little over five years. He resigned in 1907 and was engaged in banking in New York City and Philadelphia until 1913, when he retired. He died in 1932.

### Edwin T. Meredith

Edwin T. Meredith, Secretary of Agriculture in the Cabinet of President Woodrow Wilson, was born in Avoca, Iowa, in 1876. He was educated at Highland Park College, in Des Moines, and published the *Farmers' Tribune* from 1896 to 1902. He started *Successful Farming*, a monthly agricultural paper, on a national basis, in 1902, and later on added *Better Homes and Gardens*, another national publication. He became a director of the Chicago Federal Reserve bank and busied himself in finance and politics, in addition to his publishing work. He was a candidate for Governor of Iowa and United States Senator from Iowa, on the democratic ticket, but was unsuccessful. President Wilson appointed him Secretary of Agriculture, in which post he served from January, 1920, to March 4, 1921. Secretary Meredith died in 1928.

### Henry C. Wallace

Henry Cantwell Wallace, Secretary of Agriculture in the Cabinets of Presidents Harding and Coolidge, was born in 1866, son of Henry Wallace, whom President Theodore Roosevelt appointed a member of his Country Life Commission and who was one of the most famous agricultural editors and educators in the United States for many years. Henry C. Wallace was graduated from Iowa State College at Ames, following which he became a tenant on one of his father's farms, on the same terms as the last tenant, who had failed. He succeeded. Specializing in dairy farming, he returned to Ames, after five years of farm work, and completed two years of college work in one. He was appointed an assistant professor in the dairy department. Then, securing a small farm paper, in conjunction with Dean Charles F. Curtiss, he embarked upon the profession of agricultural journalism. Five years after the unexpected death of his father, "Uncle Henry," as he sat in a front pew of a church in Des Moines, Henry Cantwell Wallace was appointed Secretary of Agriculture by President Harding. Upon the death of the latter, Secretary Wallace was reappointed by President Coolidge. He died in 1924.

### Herbert C. Hoover

Herbert Clark Hoover served as Secretary of Commerce in the cabinet of Presidents Harding and Coolidge, 1921 to 1929. He was born at West Branch, Iowa, August 10, 1874. Becoming an orphan at an early age he was brought up in the Pacific West, attending Leland Stanford University. He engaged in mining in various parts of the world, with marked success. During the World War he was chairman of the American Relief Commission in London and later was chairman of the Commission for Relief in Belgium. He served as United States Food Administrator 1917-1919. After his cabinet services he was elected President of the United States in 1928, the first man born west of the Mississippi river to attain this high position. He was defeated for re-election in 1932.

### Curtis Dwight Wilbur

Curtis Dwight Wilbur, born at Boonesboro, Iowa, on May 10, 1867, served as Secretary of the Navy in the Cabinet of President Coolidge. Most of his public career found him a resident of the state of California, but he never lost opportunity to pay tribute to the state of his birth. He served as an Associate Justice of the Supreme Court of California; was appointed Secretary of the Navy, by President Coolidge, in 1924, and served until 1929; following which he became judge of the United States Circuit Court of Appeals.

### Ray Lyman Wilbur

Ray Lyman Wilbur, born at Boonesboro, Iowa, on April 13, 1875 (a brother of Curtis D. Wilbur, Secretary of the Navy in the Cabinet of President Coolidge) was Secretary of the Interior in the Cabinet of President Hoover. Little of his mature life was spent in Iowa, but he is claimed by this state, by reason of his nativity. He was President of Leland Stanford University in California, securing a leave of absence in order to accept the cabinet portfolio tendered him by President Hoover on March 4, 1929. He was connected with the United States Food Administration and in various ways rendered splendid public service.

### James William Good

James William Good, born near Cedar Rapids in 1866, became Secretary of War in the Cabinet of President Herbert Hoover. He was elected to Congress in 1909 and served until 1921. He was chairman of the appropriations committee during the World War, voted for the increase of soldier's pay but against the soldier's bonus. He was Secretary of War from the day of President Hoover's inauguration, March 4, 1929, to the day of his death, November 18, 1929.

### Henry Agard Wallace

Henry Agard Wallace, son of Secretary Henry Cantwell Wallace, and grandson of Henry Wallace, editor for many years of *Wallaces' Farmer*, served as Secretary of Agriculture in the first two terms of President Franklin D. Roosevelt. He was born in Adair county in 1888 and educated at Iowa State College at Ames. He served as editor of *Wallaces' Farmer* for many years and later as the editor of the combined *Wallaces' Farmer* and *Iowa Homestead*. He was Secretary of the Corn Belt Meat Producers Association for a number of years. When President Roosevelt assumed office on March 4, 1933, he took Henry A. Wallace into his Cabinet and continued him there on his second term. He was elected vice president in 1940.

### Harry L. Hopkins

Harry L. Hopkins, who became Secretary of Commerce under President Franklin D. Roosevelt, in February, 1939, was born in Sioux City in 1890. He was graduated from Grinnell College and began his career in the service of the poor and needy as supervisor of the Association for Improving the Condition of the Poor; later was executive secretary of the Board of Child Welfare from 1918 to 1922; division manager of the American Red Cross at New Orleans from 1922 to 1924; director of the New York Tuberculosis and Health Association and executive director of the New York State Temporary Relief Administration. President Roosevelt appointed him federal administrator of emergency relief in 1933. Two years later he placed him in charge of the Works Progress Administration, where he continued until he became Secretary of Commerce in the President's Cabinet, resigning in 1940.

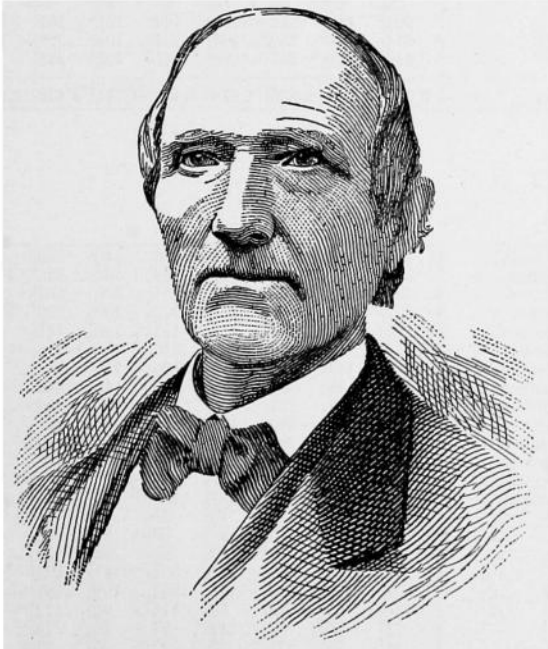

## THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF IOWA

### INTRODUCTION

Iowa was organized as a separate Territory by an act of Congress approved on June 12, 1838, but it was not until 1844 that steps were taken to secure admission into the Union. A constitutional convention met at Iowa City in October, 1844. The Constitution drafted by this convention was twice submitted to the voters of the Territory of Iowa and twice rejected by them, largely because of dissatisfaction with the boundaries of the proposed State.

A second constitutional convention met at Iowa City in May, 1846. The Constitution drafted by this convention was ratified by a majority of 456 votes at an election held on August 3, 1846, and Iowa was admitted as a State on December 28, 1846.

The Constitution of 1846, however, contained a number of provisions which were found to be unsatisfactory in practice. One of these was the prohibition of banking institutions. As a result of this dissatisfaction, the legislature in 1855 provided for an election on the question of calling a convention to revise or amend the Constitution of 1846. The vote was 32,890 for a convention and 14,162 against a convention. Delegates were elected on November 4, 1856, and the convention met at Iowa City on January 19, 1857.

The delegates drafted a new constitution which was submitted to the people at an election held on August 3, 1857, and ratified by a vote of 40,311 to 38,681. This Constitution went into effect by proclamation of the governor on September 3, 1857.

The Constitution of 1857 has, since that time, remained the fundamental law of the State of Iowa; but it has been amended a number of times.

### THE CONSTITUTION

WE, THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF IOWA, grateful to the Supreme Being for the blessings hitherto enjoyed, and feeling our dependence on Him for a continuation of those blessings, do ordain and establish a free and independent government, by the name of the STATE OF IOWA, the boundaries whereof shall be as follows:

Beginning in the middle of the main channel of the Mississippi River, at a point due East of the middle of the mouth of the main channel of the Des Moines River, thence up the middle of the main channel of the said Des Moines River, to a point on said river where the Northern boundary line of the State of Missouri—as established by the constitution of that State—adopted June 12th, 1820—crosses the said middle of the main channel of the said Des Moines River; thence Westwardly along the said Northern boundary line of the State of Missouri, as established at the time aforesaid, until an extension of said line intersects the middle of the main channel of the Missouri River; thence up the middle of the main channel of the said Missouri River to a point opposite the middle of the main channel of the Big Sioux River, according to Nicollett's Map; thence up the main channel of the said Big Sioux River, according to the said map, until it is intersected by the parallel of forty-three degrees and thirty minutes North latitude; thence East along said parallel of forty three degrees and thirty minutes until said parallel intersects the middle of the main channel of the Mississippi River; thence down the middle of the main channel of said Mississippi River to the place of beginning.

### ARTICLE I.

#### BILL OF RIGHTS.

**SECTION 1.** All men are, by nature, free and equal, and have certain inalienable rights—among which are those of enjoying and defending life and liberty, acquiring, possessing and protecting property, and pursuing and obtaining safety and happiness.

**SEC. 2.** All political power is inherent in the people. Government is instituted for the protection, security, and benefit of the people, and they have the right, at all times, to alter or reform the same, whenever the public good may require it.

**SEC. 3.** The General Assembly shall make no law respecting an establishment of religion, or prohibiting the free exercise thereof; nor shall any person be compelled to attend any place of worship, pay tithes, taxes, or other rates for building or repairing places of worship or the maintenance of any minister, or ministry.

SEC. 4. No religious test shall be required as a qualification for any office, or public trust, and no person shall be deprived of any of his rights, privileges, or capacities, or disqualified from the performance of any of his public or private duties, or rendered incompetent to give evidence in any court of law or equity, in consequence of his opinions on the subject of religion; and any party to any judicial proceeding shall have the right to use as a witness, or take the testimony of, any other person not disqualified on account of interest, who may be cognizant of any fact material to the case; and parties to suits may be witnesses, as provided by law.

SEC. 5. Any citizen of this State who may hereafter be engaged, either directly, or indirectly, in a duel, either as principal, or accessory before the fact, shall forever be disqualified from holding any office under the Constitution and laws of this State.

SEC. 6. All laws of a general nature shall have a uniform operation; the General Assembly shall not grant to any citizen, or class of citizens, privileges or immunities, which, upon the same terms shall not equally belong to all citizens.

SEC. 7. Every person may speak, write, and publish his sentiments on all subjects, being responsible for the abuse of that right. No law shall be passed to restrain or abridge the liberty of speech, or of the press. In all prosecutions or indictments for libel, the truth may be given in evidence to the jury, and if it appears to the jury that the matter charged as libellous was true, and was published with good motives and for justifiable ends, the party shall be acquitted.

SEC. 8. The right of the people to be secure in their persons, houses, papers and effects, against unreasonable seizures and searches shall not be violated; and no warrant shall issue but on probable cause, supported by oath or affirmation, particularly describing the place to be searched, and the persons and things to be seized.

SEC. 9. The right of trial by jury shall remain inviolate; but the General Assembly may authorize trial by a jury of a less number than twelve men in inferior courts; but no person shall be deprived of life, liberty, or property, without due process of law.

SEC. 10. In all criminal prosecutions, and in cases involving the life, or liberty of an individual the accused shall have a right to a speedy and public trial by an impartial jury; to be informed of the accusation against him, to have a copy of the same when demanded; to be confronted with the witnesses against him; to have compulsory process for his witnesses; and, to have the assistance of counsel.

SEC. 11. All offences less than felony and in which the punishment does not exceed a fine of one hundred dollars, or imprisonment for thirty days, shall be tried summarily before a Justice of the Peace, or other officer authorized by law, on information under oath, without indictment, or the intervention of a grand jury, saving to the defendant the right of appeal; and no person shall be held to answer for any higher criminal offence, unless on presentation or indictment by a grand jury,<sup>2</sup> except in cases arising in the army, or navy, or in the militia, when in actual service, in time of war or public danger.

SEC. 12. No person shall after acquittal, be tried for the same offence. All persons shall, before conviction, be bailable, by sufficient sureties, except for capital offences where the proof is evident, or the presumption great.

SEC. 13. The writ of habeas corpus shall not be suspended, or refused when application is made as required by law, unless in case of rebellion, or invasion the public safety may require it.

SEC. 14. The military shall be subordinate to the civil power. No standing army shall be kept up by the State in time of peace; and in time of war, no appropriation for a standing army shall be for a longer time than two years.

SEC. 15. No soldier shall, in time of peace, be quartered in any house without the consent of the owner, nor in time of war except in the manner prescribed by law.

SEC. 16. Treason against the State shall consist only in levying war against it, adhering to its enemies, or giving them aid and comfort. No person shall be convicted of treason, unless on the evidence of two witnesses to the same overt act, or confession in open Court.

SEC. 17. Excessive bail shall not be required; excessive fines shall not be imposed, and cruel and unusual punishment shall not be inflicted.

SEC. 18. Private property shall not be taken for public use without just compensation first being made, or secured to be made to the owner thereof, as soon as the damages shall be assessed by a jury, who shall not take into consideration any advantages that may result to said owner on account of the improvement for which it is taken.

[The general assembly, however, may pass laws permitting the owners of lands to construct drains, ditches, and levees for agricultural, sanitary or mining purposes across the lands of others, and provide for the organization of drainage districts, vest the proper authorities with power to construct and maintain levees, drains and ditches and to keep in repair all drains, ditches, and levees heretofore constructed under the laws of the state, by special assessments upon the property benefited thereby. The General Assembly may provide by law for the condemnation of such real estate as shall be necessary for the construction and

maintenance of such drains, ditches and levees, and prescribe the method of making such condemnation.]<sup>3</sup>

SEC. 19. No person shall be imprisoned for debt in any civil action, on mesne or final process, unless in case of fraud; and no person shall be imprisoned for a militia fine in time of peace.

SEC. 20. The people have the right freely to assemble together to counsel for the common good; to make known their opinions to their representatives and to petition for a redress of grievances.

SEC. 21. No bill of attainder, ex post facto law, or law impairing the obligation of contracts, shall ever be passed.

SEC. 22. Foreigners who are, or may hereafter become residents of this State, shall enjoy the same rights in respect to the possession, enjoyment and descent of property, as native born citizens.

SEC. 23. There shall be no slavery in this State; nor shall there be involuntary servitude, unless for the punishment of crime.

SEC. 24. No lease or grant of agricultural lands, reserving any rent, or service of any kind, shall be valid for a longer period than twenty years.

SEC. 25. This enumeration of rights shall not be construed to impair or deny others, retained by the people.

[SECTION 26. No person shall manufacture for sale, or sell, or keep for sale, as a beverage any intoxicating liquors whatever, including ale, wine and beer. The general assembly shall by law prescribe regulations for the enforcement of the prohibition herein contained, and shall thereby provide suitable penalties for the violation of the provisions hereof.]<sup>4</sup>

## ARTICLE II.

### RIGHT OF SUFFRAGE.

SECTION 1. Every white<sup>5</sup> male<sup>6</sup> citizen of the United States, of the age of twenty one years, who shall have been a resident of this State six months next preceding the election, and of the County in which he claims his vote sixty days, shall be entitled to vote at all elections which are now or hereafter may be authorized by law.

SEC. 2. Electors shall, in all cases except treason, felony, or breach of the peace, be privileged from arrest on the days of election, during their attendance at such election, going to and returning therefrom.

SEC. 3. No elector shall be obliged to perform military duty on the day of election, except in time of war, or public danger.

SEC. 4. No person in the military, naval, or marine service of the United States shall be considered a resident of this State by being stationed in any garrison, barrack, or military or naval place, or station within this State.

SEC. 5. No idiot, or insane person, or person convicted of any infamous crime, shall be entitled to the privilege of an elector.

SEC. 6. All elections by the people shall be by ballot.

[The general election for state, district county and township officers shall be held on the Tuesday next after the first Monday in November.]<sup>7</sup>

[SEC. 7. The general election for state, district, county and township officers in the year 1916 shall be held in the same month and on the same day as that fixed by the laws of the United States for the election of presidential electors, or of president and vice-president of the United States; and thereafter such election shall be held at such time as the general assembly may by law provide.]<sup>8</sup>

## ARTICLE III.

### OF THE DISTRIBUTION OF POWERS.

SECTION 1. The powers of the government of Iowa shall be divided into three separate departments—the Legislative, the Executive, and the Judicial; and no person charged with the exercise of powers properly belonging to one of these departments shall exercise any function appertaining to either of the others, except in cases hereinafter expressly directed or permitted.

## LEGISLATIVE DEPARTMENT.

SECTION 1. The Legislative authority of this State shall be vested in a General Assembly, which shall consist of a Senate and House of Representatives; and the style of every law shall be, "Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Iowa."

SEC. 2. The sessions of the General Assembly shall be biennial, and shall commence on the second Monday in January next ensuing the election of its members; unless the Governor of the State shall, in the meantime, convene the General Assembly by proclamation.

SEC. 3. The members of the House of Representatives shall be chosen every second year, by the qualified electors of their respective districts, on the second Tuesday in October, except the years of the Presidential election, when the election shall be on the Tuesday next after the first Monday in November,<sup>9</sup> and their term of office shall commence on the first day of January next after their election, and continue two years, and until their successors are elected and qualified.

SEC. 4. No person shall be a member of the House of Representatives who shall not have attained the age of twenty-one years, be a free white<sup>10</sup> male<sup>11</sup> citizen of the United States, and shall have been an inhabitant of this State one year next preceding his election, and at the time of his election shall have had an actual residence of sixty days in the County, or District he may have been chosen to represent.

SEC. 5. Senators shall be chosen for the term of four years, at the same time and place as Representatives; they shall be twenty-five years of age, and possess the qualifications of Representatives as to residence and citizenship.

SEC. 6. The number of Senators shall not be less than one third, nor more than one half the representative body; and shall be so classified by lot, that one class, being as nearly one half as possible, shall be elected every two years. When the number of Senators is increased, they shall be annexed by lot to one or the other of the two classes, so as to keep them as nearly equal in numbers as practicable.

SEC. 7. Each house shall choose its own officers, and judge of the qualification, election, and return of its own members. A contested election shall be determined in such manner as shall be directed by law.

SEC. 8. A majority of each house shall constitute a quorum to transact business; but a smaller number may adjourn from day to day, and may compel the attendance of absent members in such manner and under such penalties as each house may provide.

SEC. 9. Each house shall sit upon its own adjournments, keep a journal of its proceedings, and publish the same; determine its rules and proceedings, punish members for disorderly behavior, and, with the consent of two thirds, expel a member, but not a second time for the same offense; and shall have all other powers necessary for a branch of the General Assembly of a free and independent State.

SEC. 10. Every member of the General Assembly shall have the liberty to dissent from, or protest against any act or resolution which he may think injurious to the public, or an individual, and have the reasons for his dissent entered on the journals; and the yeas and nays of the members of either house, on any question, shall, at the desire of any two members present, be entered on the journals.

SEC. 11. Senators and Representatives, in all cases, except treason, felony, or breach of the peace, shall be privileged from arrest during the session of the General Assembly, and in going to and returning from the same.

SEC. 12. When vacancies occur in either house, the Governor, or the person exercising the functions of Governor, shall issue writs of election to fill such vacancies.

SEC. 13. The doors of each house shall be open, except on such occasions, as, in the opinion of the house, may require secrecy.

SEC. 14. Neither house shall, without the consent of the other, adjourn for more than three days, nor to any other place than that in which they may be sitting.

SEC. 15. Bills may originate in either house, and may be amended, altered, or rejected by the other; and every bill having passed both houses, shall be signed by the Speaker and President of their respective houses.

SEC. 16. Every bill which shall have passed the General Assembly, shall before it becomes a law, be presented to the Governor. If he approve, he shall sign it; but, if not, he shall return it with his objections, to the house in which it originated, which shall enter the same upon their journal, and proceed to re-consider it; if, after such re-consideration, it again pass both houses, by yeas

and nays, by a majority of two thirds of the members of each house, it shall become a law, notwithstanding the Governor's objections. If any bill shall not be returned within three days after it shall have been presented to him, Sunday excepted, the same shall be a law in like manner as if he had signed it, unless the General Assembly, by adjournment, prevent such return. Any bill submitted to the Governor for his approval during the last three days of a session of the General Assembly, shall be deposited by him in the office of the Secretary of State, within thirty days after the adjournment, with his approval, if approved by him, and with his objections, if he disapproves thereof.

SEC. 17. No bill shall be passed unless by the assent of a majority of all the members elected to each branch of the General Assembly, and the question upon the final passage shall be taken immediately upon its last reading, and the yeas and nays entered on the journal.

SEC. 18. An accurate statement of the receipts and expenditures of the public money shall be attached to and published with the laws, at every regular session of the General Assembly.

SEC. 19. The House of Representatives shall have the sole power of impeachment, and all impeachments shall be tried by the Senate. When sitting for that purpose, the senators shall be upon oath or affirmation; and no person shall be convicted without the concurrence of two thirds of the members present.

SEC. 20. The Governor, Judges of the Supreme and District Courts, and other State officers, shall be liable to impeachment for any misdemeanor or malfeasance in office; but judgment in such cases shall extend only to removal from office, and disqualification to hold any office of honor, trust, or profit, under this State; but the party convicted or acquitted shall nevertheless be liable to indictment, trial, and punishment, according to law. All other civil officers shall be tried for misdemeanors and malfeasance in office, in such manner as the General Assembly may provide.

SEC. 21. No senator or representative shall, during the time for which he shall have been elected, be appointed to any civil office of profit under this State, which shall have been created, or the emoluments of which shall have been increased during such term, except such offices as may be filled by elections by the people.

SEC. 22. No person holding any lucrative office under the United States, or this State, or any other power, shall be eligible to hold a seat in the General Assembly; but offices in the militia, to which there is attached no annual salary, or the office of justice of the peace, or postmaster whose compensation does not exceed one hundred dollars per annum, or notary public, shall not be deemed lucrative.

SEC. 23. No person who may hereafter be a collector or holder of public monies, shall have a seat in either House of the General Assembly, or be eligible to hold any office of trust or profit in this State, until he shall have accounted for and paid into the treasury all sums for which he may be liable.

SEC. 24. No money shall be drawn from the treasury but in consequence of appropriations made by law.

SEC. 25. Each member of the first General Assembly under this Constitution, shall receive three dollars per diem while in session; and the further sum of three dollars for every twenty miles traveled, in going to and returning from the place where such session is held, by the nearest traveled route; after which they shall receive such compensation as shall be fixed by law; but no General Assembly shall have power to increase the compensation of its own members. And when convened in extra session they shall receive the same mileage and per diem compensation, as fixed by law for the regular session, and none other.

SEC. 26. No law of the General Assembly, passed at a regular session, of a public nature, shall take effect until the fourth day of July next after the passage thereof. Laws passed at a special session, shall take effect ninety days after the adjournment of the General Assembly by which they were passed. If the General Assembly shall deem any law of immediate importance, they may provide that the same shall take effect by publication in newspapers in the State.

SEC. 27. No divorce shall be granted by the General Assembly.

SEC. 28. No lottery shall be authorized by this State; nor shall the sale of lottery tickets be allowed.

SEC. 29. Every act shall embrace but one subject, and matters properly connected therewith; which subject shall be expressed in the title. But if any subject shall be embraced in an act which shall not be expressed in the title, such act shall be void only as to so much thereof as shall not be expressed in the title.

SEC. 30. The General Assembly shall not pass local or special laws in the following cases:

- For the assessment and collection of taxes for State, County, or road purposes;
- For laying out, opening, and working roads or highways;
- For changing the names of persons;
- For the incorporation of cities and towns;
- For vacating roads, town plats, streets, alleys, or public squares;
- For locating or changing county seats.

In all the cases above enumerated, and in all other cases where a general law can be made applicable, all laws shall be general, and of uniform operation throughout the State; and no law changing the boundary lines of any county shall have effect until upon being submitted to the people of the counties affected

by the change, at a general election, it shall be approved by a majority of the votes in each county, cast for and against it.

SEC. 31. No extra compensation shall be made to any officer, public agent, or contractor, after the service shall have been rendered, or the contract entered into; nor, shall any money be paid on any claim, the subject matter of which shall not have been provided for by pre-existing laws, and no public money or property shall be appropriated for local, or private purposes, unless such appropriation, compensation, or claim, be allowed by two-thirds of the members elected to each branch of the General Assembly.

SEC. 32. Members of the General Assembly shall, before they enter upon the duties of their respective offices, take and subscribe the following oath or affirmation: "I do solemnly swear, or affirm, (as the case may be) that I will support the Constitution of the United States, and the Constitution of the State of Iowa, and that I will faithfully discharge the duties of Senator, (or Representative, as the case may be), according to the best of my ability." And members of the General Assembly are hereby empowered to administer to each other the said oath or affirmation.

SEC. 33. *The General Assembly shall, in the years One thousand eight hundred and fifty nine, One thousand eight hundred and sixty three, One thousand eight hundred and sixty five, One thousand eight hundred and sixty seven, One thousand eight hundred and sixty nine, and One thousand eight hundred and seventy five, and every ten years thereafter, cause an enumeration to be made of all the white<sup>12</sup> inhabitants of the State.<sup>13</sup>*

SEC. 34. *The number of senators shall, at the next session following each period of making such enumeration, and the next session following each United States census, be fixed by law, and apportioned among the several counties, according to the number of white<sup>14</sup> inhabitants in each.*

SEC. 35. *The Senate shall not consist of more than fifty members, nor the House of Representatives of more than one hundred; and they shall be apportioned among the several counties and representative districts of the State, according to the number of white<sup>15</sup> inhabitants in each, upon ratios to be fixed by law; but no representative district shall contain more than four organized counties, and each district shall be entitled to at least one representative. Every county and district which shall have a number of inhabitants equal to one-half of the ratio fixed by law, shall be entitled to one representative; and any one county containing in addition to the ratio fixed by law, one half of that number, or more, shall be entitled to one additional representative. No floating district shall hereafter be formed.*

SEC. 36. *At its first session under this Constitution, and at every subsequent regular session, the General Assembly shall fix the ratio of representation, and also form into representative districts those counties which will not be entitled singly to a representative.<sup>16</sup>*

[SECTION 34. The senate shall be composed of fifty members to be elected from the several senatorial districts, established by law and at the next session of the general assembly held following the taking of the state and national census, they shall be apportioned among the several counties or districts of the state, according to population as shown by the last preceding census (, but no county shall be entitled to more than one (1) senator).<sup>17</sup>

[SEC. 35. The house of representatives shall consist of not more than one hundred and eight members. The ratio of representation shall be determined by dividing the whole number of the population of the state as shown by the last preceding state or national census, by the whole number of counties then existing or organized, but each county shall constitute one representative district and be entitled to one representative, but each county having a population in excess of the ratio number, as herein provided of three fifths or more of such ratio number shall be entitled to one additional representative, but said addition shall extend only to the nine counties having the greatest population.

[SEC. 36. The general assembly shall, at the first regular session held following the adoption of this amendment, and at each succeeding regular session held next after the taking of such census, fix the ratio of representation, and apportion the additional representatives, as hereinbefore required.]<sup>18</sup>

SEC. 37. When a congressional, senatorial, or representative district shall be composed of two or more counties, it shall not be entirely separated by any county

belonging to another district; and no county shall be divided in forming a congressional, senatorial, or representative district.

SEC. 38. In all elections by the General Assembly, the members thereof shall vote viva voce and the votes shall be entered on the journal.

#### ARTICLE IV.

##### EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT.

SECTION 1. The Supreme Executive power of this State shall be vested in a Chief Magistrate, who shall be styled the Governor of the State of Iowa.

SEC. 2. The Governor shall be elected by the qualified electors at the time and place of voting for members of the General Assembly, and shall hold his office two years from the time of his installation, and until his successor is elected and qualified.

SEC. 3. There shall be a Lieutenant Governor, who shall hold his office two years, and be elected at the same time as the Governor. In voting for Governor and Lieutenant Governor, the electors shall designate for whom they vote as Governor, and for whom as Lieutenant Governor. The returns of every election for Governor, and Lieutenant Governor, shall be sealed up and transmitted to the seat of government of the State, directed to the Speaker of the House of Representatives, who shall open and publish them in the presence of both Houses of the General Assembly.

SEC. 4. The persons respectively having the highest number of votes for Governor and Lieutenant Governor, shall be declared duly elected; but in case two or more persons shall have an equal and the highest number of votes for either office, the General Assembly shall, by joint vote, forthwith proceed to elect one of said persons Governor, or Lieutenant Governor, as the case may be.

SEC. 5. Contested elections for Governor, or Lieutenant Governor, shall be determined by the General Assembly in such manner as may be prescribed by law.

SEC. 6. No person shall be eligible to the office of Governor, or Lieutenant Governor, who shall not have been a citizen of the United States, and a resident of the State, two years next preceding the election, and attained the age of thirty years at the time of said election.

SEC. 7. The Governor shall be commander in chief of the militia, the army, and navy of this State.

SEC. 8. He shall transact all executive business with the officers of government, civil and military, and may require information in writing from the officers

SEC. 9. He shall take care that the laws are faithfully executed.

SEC. 10. When any office shall, from any cause, become vacant, and no mode is provided by the Constitution and laws for filling such vacancy, the Governor shall have power to fill such vacancy, by granting a commission, which shall expire at the end of the next session of the General Assembly, or at the next election by the people.

SEC. 11. He may, on extraordinary occasions, convene the General Assembly by proclamation, and shall state to both Houses, when assembled, the purpose for which they have been convened.

SEC. 12. He shall communicate, by message, to the General Assembly, at every regular session, the condition of the State, and recommend such matters as he shall deem expedient.

SEC. 13. In case of disagreement between the two Houses with respect to the time of adjournment, the Governor shall have power to adjourn the General Assembly to such time as he may think proper; but no such adjournment shall be beyond the time fixed for the regular meeting of the next General Assembly.

SEC. 14. No person shall, while holding any office under the authority of the United States, or this State, execute the office of Governor, or Lieutenant Governor, except as hereinafter expressly provided.

SEC. 15. The official term of the Governor, and Lieutenant Governor, shall commence on the second Monday of January next after their election, and continue for two years, and until their successors are elected and qualified. The Lieutenant Governor, while acting as Governor, shall receive the same pay as provided for Governor; and while presiding in the Senate, shall receive as compensation therefor, the same mileage and double the per diem pay provided for a Senator, and none other.

SEC. 16. The Governor shall have power to grant reprieves, commutations and pardons, after conviction, for all offenses except treason and cases of impeachment, subject to such regulations as may be provided by law. Upon conviction for treason, he shall have power to suspend the execution of the sentence until the case shall be reported to the General Assembly at its next meeting, when the General Assembly shall either grant a pardon, commute the sentence, direct the execution of the sentence, or grant a further reprieve. He shall have power to remit fines and forfeitures, under such regulations as may be prescribed by law; and shall report to the General Assembly, at its next meeting, each case of reprieve, commutation, or pardon granted, and the reasons therefor; and also all persons in whose favor remission of fines and forfeitures shall have been made, and the several amounts remitted.

SEC. 17. In case of the death, impeachment, resignation, removal from office, or other disability of the Governor, the powers and duties of the office for the residue of the term, or until he shall be acquitted, or the disability removed, shall devolve upon the Lieutenant Governor.

SEC. 18. The Lieutenant Governor shall be President of the Senate, but shall only vote when the Senate is equally divided; and in case of his absence, or impeachment, or when he shall exercise the office of Governor, the Senate shall choose a President pro tempore.

SEC. 19. If the Lieutenant Governor, while acting as Governor, shall be impeached, displaced, resign, or die, or otherwise become incapable of performing the duties of the office, the President pro tempore of the senate shall act as Governor until the vacancy is filled, or the disability removed; and if the President of the Senate, for any of the above causes, shall be rendered incapable of performing the duties pertaining to the office of Governor, the same shall devolve upon the Speaker of the House of Representatives.

SEC. 20. There shall be a seal of this State, which shall be kept by the Governor, and used by him officially, and shall be called the Great Seal of the State of Iowa.

SEC. 21. All grants and commissions shall be in the name and by the authority of the people of the State of Iowa, sealed with the Great Seal of the State, signed by the Governor, and countersigned by the Secretary of State.

SEC. 22. A Secretary of State, Auditor of State and Treasurer of State, shall be elected by the qualified electors, who shall continue in office two years, and until their successors are elected and qualified; and perform such duties as may be required by law.

## ARTICLE V.

### JUDICIAL DEPARTMENT.

SECTION 1. The Judicial power shall be vested in a Supreme Court, District Courts, and such other Courts, inferior to the Supreme Court, as the General Assembly may, from time to time, establish.

SEC. 2. The Supreme Court shall consist of three Judges, two of whom shall constitute a quorum to hold Court.

SEC. 3. The Judges of the Supreme Court shall be elected by the qualified electors of the State, and shall hold their court at such time and place as the General Assembly may prescribe. The Judges of the Supreme Court so elected, shall be classified so that one Judge shall go out of office every two years; and the Judge holding the shortest term of office under such classification, shall be Chief Justice of the Court, during his term, and so on in rotation. After the expiration of their terms of office, under such classification, the term of each Judge of the Supreme Court shall be six years, and until his successor shall have been elected and qualified. The Judges of the Supreme Court shall be ineligible to any other office in the State, during the term for which they have been elected.

SEC. 4. The Supreme Court shall have appellate jurisdiction only in cases in chancery, and shall constitute a Court for the correction of errors at law, under such restrictions as the General Assembly may, by law, prescribe; and shall have power to issue all writs and process necessary to secure justice to parties, and exercise a supervisory control over all inferior Judicial tribunals throughout the State.

SEC. 5. The District Court shall consist of a single Judge, who shall be elected by the qualified electors of the District in which he resides. The Judge of the District Court shall hold his office for the term of four years, and until his successor shall have been elected and qualified; and shall be ineligible to any other office, except that of Judge of the Supreme Court, during the term for which he was elected.

SEC. 6. The District Court shall be a court of law and equity, which shall be distinct and separate jurisdictions, and have jurisdiction in civil and criminal matters arising in their respective districts, in such manner as shall be prescribed by law.

SEC. 7. The Judges of the Supreme and District Courts shall be conservators of the peace throughout the State.

SEC. 8. The style of all process shall be, "The State of Iowa", and all prosecutions shall be conducted in the name and by the authority of the same.

SEC. 9. The salary of each Judge of the Supreme Court shall be two thousand dollars per annum; and that of each District Judge, one thousand six hundred dollars per annum, until the year Eighteen hundred and Sixty; after which time they shall severally receive such compensation as the General Assembly may, by law, prescribe; which compensation shall not be increased or diminished during the term for which they shall have been elected.

SEC. 10. *The State shall be divided into eleven Judicial Districts; and after the year Eighteen hundred and sixty, the General Assembly may re-organize the Judicial Districts and increase or diminish the number of Districts, or the number of Judges of the said Court, and may increase the number of Judges of the Supreme Court; but such increase or diminution shall not be more than one District, or one Judge of either Court, at any one session; and no re-organization of the districts, or diminution of the number of Judges, shall have the effect of*

removing a Judge from office. *Such re-organization of the districts, or any change in the boundaries thereof, or increase or diminution of the number of Judges, shall take place every four years thereafter, if necessary, and at no other time.*<sup>19</sup>

[At any regular session of the general assembly, the state may be divided into the necessary judicial districts for district court purposes, or the said districts may be reorganized and the number of the districts and the judges of said courts increased or diminished; but no reorganization of the districts or diminution of the judges shall have the effect of removing a judge from office.]<sup>20</sup>

SEC. 11. The Judges of the Supreme and District Courts shall be chosen at the general election; and the term of office of each Judge shall commence on the first day of January next, after his election.

SEC. 12. The General Assembly shall provide, by law, for the election of an Attorney General by the people, whose term of office shall be two years, and until his successor shall have been elected and qualified.

SEC. 13. *The qualified electors of each judicial district shall, at the time of the election of District Judge, elect a District Attorney, who shall be a resident of the district for which he is elected, and who shall hold his office for the term of four years, and until his successor shall have been elected and qualified.*<sup>21</sup>

[SECTION 13. The qualified electors of each county shall, at the general election in the year 1886, and every two years thereafter elect a county attorney, who shall be a resident of the county for which he is elected, and shall hold his office for two years, and until his successor shall have been elected and qualified.]<sup>22</sup>

SEC. 14. It shall be the duty of the General Assembly to provide for the carrying into effect of this article, and to provide for a general system of practice in all the Courts of this State.

[The grand jury may consist of any number of members not less than five, nor more than fifteen, as the general assembly may by law provide, or the general assembly may provide for holding persons to answer for any criminal offense without the intervention of a grand jury.]<sup>23</sup>

## ARTICLE VI.

### MILITIA.

SECTION 1. The militia of this State shall be composed of all able-bodied *white*<sup>24</sup> male citizens, between the ages of eighteen and forty five years, except such as are or may hereafter be exempt by the laws of the United States, or of this State, and shall be armed, equipped, and trained, as the General Assembly may provide by law.

SEC. 2. No person or persons conscientiously scrupulous of bearing arms shall be compelled to do military duty in time of peace: provided, that such person or persons shall pay an equivalent for such exemption in the same manner as other citizens.

SEC. 3. All commissioned officers of the militia, (staff officers excepted,) shall be elected by the persons liable to perform military duty, and shall be commissioned by the Governor.

## ARTICLE VII.

### STATE DEBTS.

SECTION 1. The credit of the State shall not, in any manner, be given or loaned to, or in aid of, any individual, association, or corporation; and the State shall never assume, or become responsible for, the debts or liabilities of any individual, association, or corporation, unless incurred in time of war for the benefit of the State.

SEC. 2. The State may contract debts to supply casual deficits or failures in revenues, or to meet expenses not otherwise provided for; but the aggregate amount of such debts, direct and contingent, whether contracted by virtue of one or more acts of the General Assembly, or at different periods of time, shall never exceed the sum of two hundred and fifty thousand dollars; and the money arising from the creation of such debts, shall be applied to the purpose for which it was obtained, or to repay the debts so contracted, and to no other purpose whatever.

SEC. 3. All losses to the permanent, School, or University fund of this State, which shall have been occasioned by the default, mismanagement or fraud

of the agents or officers controlling and managing the same, shall be audited by the proper authorities of the State. The amount so audited shall be a permanent funded debt against the State, in favor of the respective fund, sustaining the loss, upon which not less than six per cent. annual interest shall be paid. The amount of liability so created shall not be counted as a part of the indebtedness authorized by the second section of this article.

SEC. 4. In addition to the above limited power to contract debts, the State may contract debts to repel invasion, suppress insurrection, or defend the State in war; but the money arising from the debts so contracted shall be applied to the purpose for which it was raised, or to repay such debts, and to no other purpose whatever.

SEC. 5. Except the debts hereinbefore specified in this article, no debt shall be hereafter contracted by, or on behalf of this State, unless such debt shall be authorized by some law for some single work or object, to be distinctly specified therein; and such law shall impose and provide for the collection of a direct annual tax, sufficient to pay the interest on such debt, as it falls due, and also to pay and discharge the principal of such debt, within twenty years from the time of the contracting thereof; but no such law shall take effect until at a general election it shall have been submitted to the people, and have received a majority of all the votes cast for and against it at such election; and all money raised by authority of such law, shall be applied only to the specific object therein stated, or to the payment of the debt created thereby; and such law shall be published in at least one newspaper in each County, if one is published therein, throughout the State, for three months preceding the election at which it is submitted to the people.

SEC. 6. The Legislature may, at any time, after the approval of such law by the people, if no debt shall have been contracted in pursuance thereof, repeal the same; and may, at any time, forbid the contracting of any further debt, or liability, under such law; but the tax imposed by such law, in proportion to the debt or liability, which may have been contracted in pursuance thereof, shall remain in force and be irrevocable, and be annually collected, until the principal and interest are fully paid.

SEC. 7. Every law which imposes, continues, or revives a tax, shall distinctly state the tax, and the object to which it is to be applied; and it shall not be sufficient to refer to any other law to fix such tax or object.

#### ARTICLE VIII. CORPORATIONS.

SECTION 1. No corporation shall be created by special laws; but the General Assembly shall provide, by general laws, for the organization of all corporations hereafter to be created, except as hereinafter provided.

SEC. 2. The property of all corporations for pecuniary profit, shall be subject to taxation, the same as that of individuals.

SEC. 3. The State shall not become a stockholder in any corporation, nor shall it assume or pay the debt or liability of any corporation, unless incurred in time of war for the benefit of the State.

SEC. 4. No political or municipal corporation shall become a stockholder in any banking corporation, directly or indirectly.

SEC. 5. No act of the General Assembly, authorizing or creating corporations or associations with banking powers, nor amendments thereto shall take effect, or in any manner be in force, until the same shall have been submitted, separately, to the people, at a general or special election, as provided by law, to be held not less than three months after the passage of the act, and shall have been approved by a majority of all the electors voting for and against it at such election.

SEC. 6. Subject to the provisions of the foregoing section, the General Assembly may also provide for the establishment of a State Bank with branches.

SEC. 7. If a State Bank be established, it shall be founded on an actual specie basis, and the branches shall be mutually responsible for each other's liabilities upon all notes, bills, and other issues intended for circulation as money.

SEC. 8. If a general Banking law shall be enacted, it shall provide for the registry and countersigning by an officer of State, of all bills or paper credit designed to circulate as money, and require security to the full amount thereof, to be deposited with the State Treasurer, in United States stocks, or in interest paying stocks of States in good credit and standing, to be rated at ten per cent. below their average value in the City of New York, for the thirty days next preceding their deposit; and in case of a depreciation of any portion of said stocks, to the amount of ten per cent. on the dollar, the bank or banks owning such stock shall be required to make up said deficiency by depositing additional stocks; and said law shall also provide for the recording of the names of the stockholders in such corporations, the amount of stock held by each, the time of any transfer, and to whom.

SEC. 9. Every stockholder in a banking corporation or institution shall be individually responsible and liable to its creditors, over and above the amount of stock by him or her held, to an amount equal to his or her respective shares so held for all of its liabilities, accruing while he or she remains such stockholder.

SEC. 10. In case of the insolvency of any banking institution, the bill-holders shall have a preference over its other creditors.

SEC. 11. The suspension of specie payment by banking institutions shall never be permitted or sanctioned.

SEC. 12. Subject to the provisions of this article, the General Assembly shall have power to amend or repeal all laws for the organization or creation of corporations, or granting of special or exclusive privileges or immunities, by a vote of two thirds of each branch of the General Assembly; and no exclusive privileges, except as in this article provided, shall ever be granted.

## ARTICLE IX.

### EDUCATION AND SCHOOL LAWS

#### 1ST. EDUCATION.

SECTION 1. The educational interest of the State, including Common Schools and other educational institutions, shall be under the management of a Board of Education,<sup>25</sup> which shall consist of the Lieutenant Governor, who shall be the presiding officer of the Board, and have the casting vote in case of a tie, and one member to be elected from each judicial district in the State.

SEC. 2. No person shall be eligible as a member of said Board who shall not have attained the age of twenty five years, and shall have been one year a citizen of the State.

SEC. 3. One member of said Board shall be chosen by the qualified electors of each district, and shall hold the office for the term of four years, and until his successor is elected and qualified. After the first election under this Constitution, the Board shall be divided, as nearly as practicable, into two equal classes, and the seats of the first class shall be vacated after the expiration of two years; and one half of the Board shall be chosen every two years thereafter.

SEC. 4. The first session of the Board of Education shall be held at the Seat of Government, on the first Monday of December, after their election; after which the General Assembly may fix the time and place of meeting.

SEC. 5. The session of the Board shall be limited to twenty days, and but one session shall be held in any one year, except upon extraordinary occasions, when, upon the recommendation of two thirds of the Board, the Governor may order a special session.

SEC. 6. The Board of Education shall appoint a Secretary, who shall be the executive officer of the Board, and perform such duties as may be imposed upon him by the Board, and the laws of the State. They shall keep a journal of their proceedings, which shall be published and distributed in the same manner as the journals of the General Assembly.

SEC. 7. All rules and regulations made by the Board shall be published and distributed to the several Counties, Townships, and School Districts, as may be provided for by the Board, and when so made, published and distributed, they shall have the force and effect of law.

SEC. 8. The Board of Education shall have full power and authority to legislate and make all needful rules and regulations in relation to Common Schools, and other educational institutions, that are instituted, to receive aid from the School or University fund of this State; but all acts, rules, and regulations of said Board may be altered, amended or repealed by the General Assembly; and when so altered, amended, or repealed they shall not be re-enacted by the Board of Education.

SEC. 9. The Governor of the State shall be, *EX OFFICIO*, a member of said Board.

SEC. 10. The Board shall have no power to levy taxes, or make appropriations of money. Their contingent expenses shall be provided for by the General Assembly.

SEC. 11. The State University shall be established at one place without branches at any other place, and the University fund shall be applied to that Institution and no other.

SEC. 12. The Board of Education shall provide for the education of all the youths of the State, through a system of Common Schools, and such schools shall be organized and kept in each school district at least three months in each year. Any district failing, for two consecutive years, to organize and keep up a school as aforesaid may be deprived of their portion of the school fund.

SEC. 13. The members of the Board of Education shall each receive the same per diem during the time of their session, and mileage going to and returning therefrom, as members of the General Assembly.

SEC. 14. A majority of the Board shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business; but no rule, regulation, or law, for the government of Common

Schools or other educational institutions, shall pass without the concurrence of a majority of all the members of the Board, which shall be expressed by the yeas and nays of the final passage. The style of all acts of the Board shall be "Be it enacted by the Board of Education of the State of Iowa."

Sec. 15. At any time after the year One thousand eight hundred and sixty three, the General Assembly shall have power to abolish or re-organize said Board of Education, and provide for the educational interest of the State in any other manner that to them shall seem best and proper.

## 2ND. SCHOOL FUNDS AND SCHOOL LANDS.

SECTION 1. The educational and school funds and lands, shall be under the control and management of the General Assembly of this State.

Sec. 2. The University lands, and the proceeds thereof, and all monies belonging to said fund shall be a permanent fund for the sole use of the State University. The interest arising from the same shall be annually appropriated for the support and benefit of said University.

Sec. 3. The General Assembly shall encourage, by all suitable means, the promotion of intellectual, scientific, moral, and agricultural improvement. The proceeds of all lands that have been, or hereafter may be, granted by the United States to this State, for the support of schools, which may have been, or shall hereafter be sold, or disposed of, and the five hundred thousand acres of land granted to the new States, under an act of Congress, distributing the proceeds of the public lands among the several States of the Union, approved in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and forty one, and all estates of deceased persons who may have died without leaving a will or heir, and also such per cent. as has been or may hereafter be granted by Congress, on the sale of lands in this State, shall be, and remain a perpetual fund, the interest of which, together with all rents of the unsold lands, and such other means as the General Assembly may provide, shall be inviolably appropriated to the support of Common schools throughout the State.

Sec. 4. The money which may have been or shall be paid by persons as an equivalent for exemption from military duty, and the clear proceeds of all fines collected in the several Counties for any breach of the penal laws, shall be exclusively applied, in the several Counties in which such money is paid, or fine collected, among the several school districts of said Counties, in proportion to the number of youths subject to enumeration in such districts, to the support of Common Schools, or the establishment of libraries, as the Board of Education shall, from time to time provide.

Sec. 5. The General Assembly shall take measures for the protection, improvement, or other disposition of such lands as have been, or may hereafter be reserved, or granted by the United States, or any person or persons, to this State, for the use of the University, and the funds accruing from the rents or sale of such lands, or from any other source for the purpose aforesaid, shall be, and remain, a permanent fund, the interest of which shall be applied to the support of said University, for the promotion of literature, the arts and sciences, as may be authorized by the terms of such grant. And it shall be the duty of the General Assembly as soon as may be, to provide official means for the improvement and permanent security of the funds of said University.

Sec. 6. The financial agents of the school funds shall be the same, that by law, receive and control the State and county revenue for other civil purposes, under such regulations as may be provided by law.

Sec. 7. The money subject to the support and maintenance of common schools shall be distributed to the districts in proportion to the number of youth, between the ages of five and twenty-one years, in such manner as may be provided by the General Assembly.

## ARTICLE X.

### AMENDMENTS TO THE CONSTITUTION.

SECTION 1. Any amendment or amendments to this Constitution may be proposed in either House of the General Assembly; and if the same shall be agreed to by a majority of the members elected to each of the two Houses, such proposed amendment shall be entered on their journals, with the yeas and nays taken thereon, and referred to the Legislature to be chosen at the next general election, and shall be published, as provided by law, for three months previous to the time of making such choice; and if, in the General Assembly so next chosen as aforesaid, such proposed amendment or amendments shall be agreed to, by a majority of all the members elected to each House, then it shall be the duty of the General Assembly to submit such proposed amendment or amendments to the people, in such manner, and at such time as the General Assembly shall provide; and if the people shall approve and ratify such amendment or amendments, by a majority of the electors qualified to vote for members of the General Assembly, voting thereon, such amendment or amendments shall become a part of the Constitution of this State.

Sec. 2. If two or more amendments shall be submitted at the same time, they shall be submitted in such manner that the electors shall vote for or against each of such amendments separately.

SEC. 3. At the general election to be held in the year one thousand eight hundred and seventy, and in each tenth year thereafter, and also at such times as the General Assembly may, by law, provide, the question, "Shall there be a Convention to revise the Constitution, and amend the same?" shall be decided by the electors qualified to vote for members of the General Asssmbly; and in case a majority of the electors so qualified, voting at such election, for and against such proposition, shall decide in favor of a Convention for such purpose, the General Assembly, at its next session, shall provide by law for the election of delegates to such Convention.

## ARTICLE XI.

### MISCELLANEOUS.

SECTION 1. The jurisdiction of Justices of the Peace shall extend to all civil cases, (except cases in chancery, and cases where the question of title to real estate may arise,) where the amount in controversy does not exceed one hundred dollars, and by the consent of parties may be extended to any amount not exceeding three hundred dollars.

SEC. 2. No new County shall be hereafter created containing less than four hundred and thirty-two square miles; nor shall the territory of any organized county be reduced below that area; except the County of Worth, and the counties west of it, along the Northern boundary of this State, may be organized without additional territory.

SEC. 3. No county, or other political or municipal corporation shall be allowed to become indebted in any manner, or for any purpose, to an amount, in the aggregate, exceeding five per centum on the value of the taxable property within such county or corporation—to be ascertained by the last State and county tax lists, previous to the incurring of such indebtedness.

SEC. 4. The boundaries of the State may be enlarged, with the consent of Congress and the General Assembly.

SEC. 5. Every person elected or appointed to any office, shall, before entering upon the duties thereof, take an oath or affirmation to support the Constitution of the United States, and of this State, and also an oath of office.

SEC. 6. In all cases of elections to fill vacancies in office occurring before the expiration of a full term, the person so elected shall hold for the residue of the unexpired term; and all persons appointed to fill vacancies in office, shall hold until the next general election, and until their successors are elected and qualified.

SEC. 7. The General Assembly shall not locate any of the public lands, which have been, or may be granted by Congress to this State, and the location of which may be given to the General Assembly, upon lands actually settled, without the consent of the occupant. The extent of the claim of such occupant, so exempted, shall not exceed three hundred and twenty acres.

SEC. 8. The seat of Government is hereby permanently established, as now fixed by law at the City of Des Moines, in the County of Polk; and the State University, at Iowa City, in the County of Johnson.

## ARTICLE XII.

### SCHEDULE.

SECTION 1. This Constitution shall be the supreme law of the State, and any law inconsistent therewith, shall be void. The General Assembly shall pass all laws necessary to carry this Constitution into effect.

SEC. 2. All laws now in force and not inconsistent with this Constitution, shall remain in force until they shall expire or be repealed.

SEC. 3. All indictments, prosecutions, suits, pleas, complaints, process, and other proceedings pending in any of the courts, shall be prosecuted to final judgment and execution; and all appeals, writs of error, certiorari, and injunctions, shall be carried on in the several courts, in the same manner as now provided by law; and all offences, misdemeanors, and crimes that may have been committed before the taking effect of this Constitution, shall be subject to indictment, trial and punishment, in the same manner as they would have been, had not this Constitution been made.

SEC. 4. All fines, penalties, or forfeitures due, or to become due, or accruing to the State, or to any County therein, or to the school fund, shall inure to the State, county, or school fund, in the manner prescribed by law.

SEC. 5. All bonds executed to the State, or to any officer in his official capacity, shall remain in force and inure to the use of those concerned.

SEC. 6. The first election under this Constitution shall be held on the second Tuesday in October, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty seven, at which time the electors of the State shall elect the Governor and Lieutenant Governor. There shall also be elected at such election, the successors of such State Senators as were elected at the August election, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-four, and members of the House of Representatives, who shall be elected in accordance with the act of apportionment, enacted at the session of the General Assembly which commenced on the first Monday of December one thousand eight hundred and fifty six.

SEC. 7. The first election for Secretary, Auditor, and Treasurer of State, Attorney General, District Judges, Members of the Board of Education, District Attorneys, members of Congress, and such State officers as shall be elected at the April election, in the year One thousand eight hundred and fifty seven, (except the Superintendent of Public Instruction,) and such county officers as were elected at the August election, in the year One thousand eight hundred and fifty six, except Prosecuting Attorneys, shall be held on the second Tuesday of October, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-eight: **PROVIDED**, That the time for which any District Judge or other State or County officer elected at the April election in the year One thousand eight hundred and fifty eight, shall not extend beyond the time fixed for filling like offices at the October election in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty eight.

SEC. 8. The first election for Judges of the Supreme Court, and such County officers as shall be elected at the August election, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven, shall be held on the second Tuesday of October, in the year One thousand eight hundred and fifty nine.

SEC. 9. The first regular session of the General Assembly shall be held in the year One thousand eight hundred and fifty-eight, commencing on the second Monday of January of said year.

SEC. 10. Senators elected at the August election, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six, shall continue in office until the second Tuesday of October, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty nine, at which time their successors shall be elected as may be prescribed by law.

SEC. 11. Every person elected by popular vote, by a vote of the General Assembly, or who may hold office by executive appointment, which office is continued by this Constitution, and every person who shall be so elected or appointed, to any such office, before the taking effect of this constitution, (except as in this Constitution otherwise provided,) shall continue in office until the term for which such person has been or may be elected or appointed shall expire; but no such person shall continue in office after the taking effect of this Constitution, for a longer period than the term of such office, in this Constitution prescribed.

SEC. 12. The General Assembly, at the first session under this Constitution, shall district the State into eleven Judicial Districts, for District Court purposes; and shall also provide for the apportionment of the members of the General Assembly, in accordance with the provisions of this Constitution.

SEC. 13. This Constitution shall be submitted to the electors of the State at the August election, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven, in the several election districts in this State. The ballots at such election shall be written or printed as follows: Those in favor of the Constitution, "New Constitution—Yes." Those against the Constitution, "New Constitution—No." The election shall be conducted in the same manner as the general elections of the State, and the poll-books shall be returned and canvassed as provided in the twenty-fifth chapter of the code, and abstracts shall be forwarded to the Secretary of State, which abstracts shall be canvassed in the manner provided for the canvass of State officers. And if it shall appear that a majority of all the votes cast at such election for and against this Constitution are in favor of the same, the Governor shall immediately issue his proclamation stating that fact, and such Constitution shall be the Constitution of the State of Iowa, and shall take effect from and after the publication of said proclamation.

SEC. 14. At the same election that this Constitution is submitted to the people for its adoption or rejection, a proposition to amend the same by striking out the word "white" from the article on the Right of Suffrage, shall be separately submitted to the electors of this State for adoption or rejection in the manner following—Namely: A separate ballot may be given by every person having a right to vote at said election, to be deposited in a separate box; and those given for the adoption of such proposition shall have the words, "Shall the word 'White' be stricken out of the Article on the Right of Suffrage? Yes." And those given against the proposition shall have the words, "Shall the word 'White' be stricken out of the Article on the Right of Suffrage? No." And if at said election the number of ballots cast in favor of said proposition shall be equal to a majority of those cast for and against this Constitution, then said word "White" shall be stricken from said Article and be no part thereof.<sup>26</sup>

SEC. 15. Until otherwise directed by law, the County of Mills shall be in and a part of the sixth Judicial District of this State.

SEC. 16. The first general election after the adoption of this amendment shall be held on the Tuesday next after the first Monday in November in the year one thousand nine hundred and six, and general elections shall be held biennially thereafter. In the year one thousand nine hundred and six there shall be elected a governor, lieutenant-governor, secretary of state, auditor of state, treasurer of state, attorney general, two judges of the supreme court, the successors of the judges of the district court whose terms of office expire on December 31st, one thousand nine hundred and six, state senators who would otherwise be chosen in the year one thousand nine hundred and five, and members of the house of representatives. The terms of office of the judges of the supreme court which would otherwise expire on December 31st, in odd numbered years, and all other elective state, county and township officers whose terms of office would otherwise expire in January in the year one thousand nine hundred and six, and members of the general assembly whose successors would otherwise be chosen at the

general election in the year one thousand nine hundred and five, are hereby extended one year and until their successors are elected and qualified. The terms of offices of senators whose successors would otherwise be chosen in the year one thousand nine hundred and seven are hereby extended one year and until their successors are elected and qualified. The general assembly shall make such changes in the law governing the time of election and term of office of all other elective officers as shall be necessary to make the time of their election and terms of office conform to this amendment, and shall provide which of the judges of the supreme court shall serve as chief justice. The general assembly shall meet in regular session on the second Monday in January, in the year one thousand nine hundred and six, and also on the second Monday in January in the year one thousand nine hundred and seven, and biennially thereafter.]<sup>27</sup> Done in Convention at Iowa City, this fifth day of March in the year of our Lord One thousand eight hundred and fifty seven, and of the Independence of the United States of America, the eighty first.

## AMENDMENTS TO THE CONSTITUTION OF IOWA 1857-1940

### AMENDMENTS OF 1868<sup>28</sup>

- 1st. Strike the word "white" from section one of article two thereof.
- 2d. Strike the word "white" from section thirty-three of article three thereof.
- 3d. Strike the word "white" from section thirty-four of article three thereof.
- 4th. Strike the word "white" from section thirty-five of article three thereof.
- 5th. Strike the word "white" from section one of article six thereof.

### AMENDMENT OF 1880<sup>29</sup>

Strike out the words "free white" from the third line of section four (4) of article three (3) of said constitution, relating to the legislative department.

### AMENDMENT OF 1882<sup>30</sup>

Add as section 26 to article I of said constitution the following: Section 26. No person shall manufacture for sale, or sell, or keep for sale, as a beverage any intoxicating liquors whatever, including ale, wine and beer. The general assembly shall by law prescribe regulations for the enforcement of the prohibition herein contained, and shall thereby provide suitable penalties for the violation of the provisions hereof.

AMENDMENTS OF 1884<sup>31</sup>

Amendment 1. The general election for state, district county and township officers shall be held on the Tuesday next after the first Monday in November.

Amendment 2. At any regular session of the general assembly, the state may be divided into the necessary judicial districts for district court purposes, or the said districts may be reorganized and the number of the districts and the judges of said courts increased or diminished; but no reorganization of the districts or diminution of the judges shall have the effect of removing a judge from office.

Amendment 3. The grand jury may consist of any number of members not less than five, nor more than fifteen, as the general assembly may by law provide, or the general assembly may provide for holding persons to answer for any criminal offense without the intervention of a grand jury.

Amendment 4. That section 13 of article 5 of the constitution be stricken therefrom, and the following adopted as such section.

SECTION 13. The qualified electors of each county shall, at the general election in the year 1886, and every two years thereafter elect a county attorney, who shall be a resident of the county for which he is elected, and shall hold his office for two years, and until his successor shall have been elected and qualified.

AMENDMENTS OF 1904<sup>32</sup>

Add as section 16, to article XII of the constitution, the following:

Sec. 16. The first general election after the adoption of this amendment shall be held on the Tuesday next after the first Monday in November in the year one thousand nine hundred and six, and general elections shall be held biennially thereafter. In the year one thousand nine hundred and six there shall be elected a governor, lieutenant-governor, secretary of state, auditor of state, treasurer of state, attorney general, two judges of the supreme court, the successors of the judges of the district court whose terms of office expire on December 31st, one thousand nine hundred and six, state senators who would otherwise be chosen in the year one thousand nine hundred and five, and members of the house of representatives. The terms of office of the judges of the supreme court which would otherwise expire on December 31st, in odd numbered years, and all other elective state, county and township officers whose terms of office would otherwise expire in January in the year one thousand nine hundred and six, and members of the general assembly whose successors would otherwise be chosen at the general election in the year one thousand nine hundred and five, are hereby extended one year and until their successors are elected and qualified. The terms of offices of senators whose successors would otherwise be chosen in the year one thousand nine hundred and seven are hereby extended one year and until their successors are elected and qualified. The general assembly shall make such changes in the law governing the time of election and term of office of all other elective officers as shall be necessary to make the time of their election and terms of office conform to this amendment, and shall provide which of the judges of the supreme court shall serve as chief justice. The general assembly shall meet in regular session on the second Monday in January, in the year one thousand nine hundred and six, and also on the second Monday in January in the year one thousand nine hundred and seven, and biennially thereafter.

That sections thirty-four (34) thirty-five (35) and thirty-six (36) of article three (3) of the constitution of the State of Iowa, be repealed and the following be adopted in lieu thereof:

SECTION 34. The senate shall be composed of fifty members to be elected from the several senatorial districts, established by law and at the next session of the general assembly held following the taking of the state and national census, they shall be apportioned among the several counties or districts of the state, according to population as shown by the last preceding census.

Sec. 35. The house of representatives shall consist of not more than one hundred and eight members. The ratio of representation shall be determined by dividing the whole number of the population of the state as shown by the last preceding state or national census, by the whole number of counties then existing or organized, but each county shall constitute one representative district and be entitled to one representative, but each county having a population in excess of the ratio number, as herein provided of three fifths or more of such ratio number shall be entitled to one additional representative, but said addition shall extend only to the nine counties having the greatest population.

Sec. 36. The general assembly shall, at the first regular session held following the adoption of this amendment, and at each succeeding regular session held next after the taking of such census, fix the ratio of representation, and apportion the additional representatives, as hereinbefore required.

AMENDMENT OF 1908<sup>33</sup>

That there be added to section eighteen (18) of article one (1) of the constitution of the State of Iowa, the following:

"The general assembly, however, may pass laws permitting the owners of lands to construct drains, ditches, and levees for agricultural, sanitary or mining purposes across the lands of others, and provide for the organization of drainage districts, vest the proper authorities with power to construct and maintain levees, drains and ditches and to keep in repair all drains, ditches, and levees heretofore constructed under the laws of the state, by special assessments upon the property benefited thereby. The General Assembly may provide by law for the condemnation of such real estate as shall be necessary for the construction and maintenance of such drains, ditches and levees, and prescribe the method of making such condemnation."

AMENDMENT OF 1916<sup>34</sup>

To repeal section seven (7) of article two (2) of the constitution of Iowa and to adopt in lieu thereof the following, to wit:

"The general election for state, district, county and township officers in the year 1916 shall be held in the same month and on the same day as that fixed by the laws of the United States for the election of presidential electors, or of president and vice-president of the United States; and thereafter such election shall be held at such time as the general assembly may by law provide."

AMENDMENT OF 1926<sup>35</sup>

Strike out the word "male" from section four (4) of article three (3) of said constitution, relating to the legislative department.

AMENDMENT OF 1928<sup>36</sup>

That the period (.) at the end of said section thirty-four (34) of article three (3) of the constitution of the state of Iowa be stricken and the following inserted: ", but no county shall be entitled to more than one (1) senator."

AMENDMENT OF 1936<sup>37</sup>

Amend article three (III) by repealing section thirty-three (33) relating to the state census.

## AMENDMENT OF 1942

That article seven (VII) of the constitution of the state of Iowa be amended by adding thereto, as section eight (8) thereof, the following:

"All motor vehicle registration fees and all licenses and excise taxes on motor vehicle fuel, except cost of administration, shall be used exclusively for the construction, maintenance and supervision of the public highways exclusively within the state or for the payment of bonds issued or to be issued for the construction of such public highways and the payment of interest on such bonds."

THE DECLARATION OF INDEPENDENCE<sup>1</sup>

When in the Course of human events, it becomes necessary for one people to dissolve the political bands which have connected them with another, and to assume among the powers of the earth, the separate and equal station to which the Laws of Nature and of Nature's God entitle them, a decent respect to the opinions of mankind requires that they should declare the causes which impel them to the separation.—We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men are created equal, that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable Rights, that among these are Life, Liberty and the pursuit of Happiness.—That to secure these rights, Governments are instituted among Men, deriving their just powers from the consent of the governed.—That whenever any Form of Government becomes destructive to these ends, it is the Right of the People to alter or to abolish it, and to institute new Government, laying its foundation on such principles and organizing its powers in such form, as to them shall seem most likely to effect their Safety and Happiness. Prudence, indeed, will dictate that Governments long established should not be changed for light and transient causes; and accordingly all experience hath shown, that mankind are more disposed to suffer, while evils are sufferable, than to right themselves by abolishing the forms to which they are accustomed. But when a long train of abuses and usurpations, pursuing invariably the same Object evinces a design to reduce them under absolute Despotism, it is their right, it is their duty, to throw off such Government, and to provide new Guards for their future security.—Such has been the patient sufferance of these Colonies; and such is now the necessity which constrains them to alter their former Systems of Government. The history of the present King of Great Britain is a history of repeated injuries and usurpations, all having in direct object the establishment of an absolute Tyranny over these States. To prove this, let Facts be submitted to a candid world.—He has refused his Assent to Laws, the most wholesome and necessary for the public good.—He has forbidden his Governors to pass Laws of immediate and pressing importance, unless suspended in their operation till his Assent should be obtained; and when so suspended, he has utterly neglected to attend to them.—He has refused to pass other Laws for the accommodation of large districts of people, unless those people would relinquish the right of Representation in the Legislature, a right inestimable to them and formidable to tyrants only.—He has called together legislative bodies at places unusual, uncomfortable, and distant from the depository of their public Records, for the sole purpose of fatiguing them into compliance with his measures.—He has dissolved Representative Houses repeatedly, for opposing with manly firmness his invasions on the rights of the people.—He has refused for a long time, after such dissolutions, to cause others to be elected; whereby the Legislative powers, incapable of Annihilation, have returned to the People at large for their exercise; the State remaining in the mean time exposed to all the dangers of invasion from without, and convulsions within.—He has endeavored to prevent the population of these States; for that purpose obstructing the Laws for Naturalization of Foreigners; refusing to pass others to encourage their migration hither, and raising the conditions of new Appropriations of Lands.—He has obstructed the Administration of Justice, by refusing his Assent to Laws for establishing Judiciary powers.—He has made Judges dependent on his Will alone, for the tenure of their offices, and the amount and payment of their salaries.—He has erected a multitude of New Offices, and sent hither swarms of Officers to harrass our people, and eat out their substance.—He has kept among us, in times of peace, Standing Armies, without the Consent of our legislatures.—He has affected to render the Military independent of and superior to the Civil power.—He has combined with other to subject us to a jurisdiction foreign to our constitution, and unacknowledged by our laws; giving his Assent to their Acts of pretended Legislation:—For quartering large bodies of armed troops among us:—For protecting them, by a mock Trial, from punishment for any Murders which they should commit on the Inhabitants of these States:—For cutting off our Trade with all parts of the world:—For imposing Taxes on us without our Consent:—For depriving us in many cases, of the benefits of Trial by Jury:—For transporting us beyond Seas to be tried for pretended offenses:—For abolishing the free System of English Laws in a neighboring Province, establishing therein an Arbitrary government, and enlarging its Boundaries so as to render it at once an example and fit instrument for introducing the same absolute rule into these Colonies:—For taking away our Charters, abolishing our most valuable Laws, and altering fundamentally the Forms of our Governments:—For suspending our own Legislatures, and declaring themselves invested with power to legislate for us in all *Formation of the Union of the American States*, published by the United States government in 1927, which in turn printed it from the engrossed copy of the original manuscript in the Library of Congress.

cases whatsoever.—He had abdicated Government here, by declaring us out of his Protection and waging War against us.—He has plundered our seas, ravaged our Coasts, burnt our towns, and destroyed the lives of our people.—He is at this time transporting large Armies of foreign Mercenaries to compleat the works of death, desolation and tyranny, already begun with circumstances of Cruelty & perfidy scarcely paralleled in the most barbarous ages, and totally unworthy the Head of a civilized nation.—He has constrained our fellow Citizens taken Captive on the high Seas to bear Arms against their Country, to become the

executioners of their friends and Brethren, or to fall themselves by their Hands.—He has excited domestic insurrections amongst us, and has endeavoured to bring on the inhabitants of our frontiers, the merciless Indian Savages, whose known rule of warfare, is an undistinguished destruction of all ages, sexes and conditions. In every stage of these Oppressions We have Petitioned for Redress in the most humble terms: Our repeated Petitions have been answered only by repeated injury. A prince, whose character is thus marked by every act which may define a Tyrant, is unfit to be the ruler of a free people. Nor have We been wanting in attentions to our British brethren. We have warned them from time to time of attempts by their legislature to extend an unwarrantable jurisdiction over us. We have reminded them of the circumstances of our emigration and settlement here. We have appealed to their native justice and magnanimity, and we have conjured them by the ties of our common kindred to disavow these usurpations, which, would inevitably interrupt our connections and correspondence. They too have been deaf to the voice of justice and of consanguinity. We must, therefore, acquiesce in the necessity, which denounces our Separation, and hold them, as we hold the rest of mankind, Enemies in War, in Peace Friends.—

WE, THEREFORE, the REPRESENTATIVES of the UNITED STATES OF AMERICA, in General Congress, Assembled, appealing to the Supreme Judge of the world for the rectitude of our intentions, do, in the Name, and by Authority of the good People of these Colonies, solemnly publish and declare, That these United Colonies are, and of Right ought to be FREE AND INDEPENDENT STATES; that they are Absolved from all Allegiance to the British Crown, and that all political connection between them and the State of Great Britain, is and ought to be totally dissolved; and that as Free and Independent States, they have full Power to levy War, conclude Peace, contract Alliances, establish Commerce, and to do all other Acts and Things which Independent States may of right do.—And for the support of this Declaration, with a firm reliance on the protection of Divine Providence, we mutually pledge to each other our Lives, our Fortunes and our sacred Honor.

THE CONSTITUTION OF THE UNITED STATES<sup>1</sup>

We the People of the United States, in order to form a more perfect Union, establish Justice, insure domestic Tranquility, provide for the common defence, promote the general Welfare, and secure the Blessings of Liberty to ourselves and our Posterity, do ordain and establish this Constitution for the United States of America.

## Article. I.

Section 1. All legislative Powers herein granted shall be vested in a Congress of the United States, which shall consist of a Senate and House of Representatives.

Section 2. The House of Representatives shall be composed of Members chosen every second Year by the People of the several States, and the Electors in each State shall have the Qualifications requisite for Electors of the most numerous Branch of the State Legislature.

No person shall be a Representative who shall not have attained to the Age of twenty-five Years, and been seven Years a Citizen of the United States, and who shall not, when elected, be an Inhabitant of that State in which he shall be chosen.<sup>2</sup>

Representatives and direct Taxes shall be apportioned among the several States which may be included within this Union, according to their respective Numbers, which shall be determined by adding to the whole Number of free Persons, including those bound to Service for a Term of Years, and excluding Indians not taxed, three fifths of all other Persons. [counting the whole number of persons in each State, excluding Indians not taxed.]<sup>3</sup> The actual Enumeration shall be made within three Years after the first Meeting of the Congress of the United States, and within every subsequent Term of ten Years, in such Manner as they shall by Law direct. The Number of Representatives shall not exceed one for every thirty Thousand, but each State shall have at Least one Representative; and until such enumeration shall be made, the State of New Hampshire shall be entitled to chuse three, Massachusetts eight, Rhode-Island and Providence Plantations one, Connecticut five, New York six, New Jersey four, Pennsylvania eight, Delaware one, Maryland six, Virginia ten, North Carolina five, South Carolina five, and Georgia three.

When vacancies happen in the Representation from any State, the Executive Authority thereof shall issue Writs of Election to fill such Vacancies.

The House of Representatives shall chuse their Speaker and other Officers; and shall have the sole Power of Impeachment.

Section 3. *The Senate of the United States shall be composed of two Senators from each State, chosen by the Legislature thereof, for six Years; and each Senator shall have one Vote.*<sup>4</sup>

[The Senate of the United States shall be composed of two Senators from each State, elected by the people thereof, for six years; and each Senator shall have one vote. The electors in each State shall have the qualifications requisite for electors of the most numerous branch of the State legislatures.]

Immediately after they shall be assembled in Consequence of the first Election, they shall be divided as equally as may be into three Classes. The Seats of the Senators of the first Class shall be vacated at the Expiration of the second Year, of the second Class at the Expiration of the fourth Year, and of the third Class at the Expiration of the sixth Year, so that one third may be chosen every second Year; and if Vacancies happen by Resignation, or otherwise, during the Recess of the Legislature of any State, the Executive thereof may make temporary Appointments until the next Meeting of the Legislature, which shall then fill such Vacancies.<sup>5</sup>

[When vacancies happen in the representation of any State in the Senate, the executive authority of such State shall issue writs of election to fill such vacancies: *Provided*, That the legislature of any State may empower the executive thereof to make temporary appointments until the people fill the vacancies by election as the legislature may direct.]

No Person shall be a Senator who shall not have attained to the Age of thirty Years, and been nine Years a Citizen of the United States, and who shall not, when elected, be an Inhabitant of that State for which he shall be chosen.<sup>6</sup>

The Vice President of the United States shall be President of the Senate, but shall have no Vote, unless they be equally divided.

The Senate shall chuse their other officers, and also a President pro tempore, in the Absence of the Vice President, or when he shall exercise the Office of President of the United States.

The Senate shall have the sole Power to try all Impeachments. When sitting for that Purpose, they shall be on Oath or Affirmation. When the President of the United States is tried the Chief Justice shall preside: And no Person shall be convicted without the Concurrence of two thirds of the Members present.

Judgment in Cases of Impeachment shall not extend further than to removal from Office, and disqualification to hold and enjoy any Office of honor, Trust or Profit under the United States: but the Party convicted shall nevertheless be liable and subject to Indictment, Trial, Judgment and Punishment, according to Law.

Section 4. The Times, Places and Manner of holding Elections for Senators and Representatives, shall be prescribed in each State by the Legislature thereof: but the Congress may at any time by Law make or alter such Regulations, except as to the Places of chusing Senators.

*The Congress shall assemble at least once in every Year, and such Meeting shall be on the first Monday in December, unless they shall by Law appoint a different Day.*<sup>7</sup>

[The Congress shall assemble at least once in every year, and such meeting shall begin at noon on the 3d day of January, unless they shall by law appoint a different day.]

Section 5. Each House shall be the Judge of the Elections, Returns and Qualifications of its own Members, and a Majority of each shall constitute a Quorum to do Business: but a smaller Number may adjourn from day to day, and may be authorized to compel the Attendance of absent members, in such Manner, and under such Penalties as each House may provide.

Each House may determine the Rules of its Proceedings, punish its Members for disorderly Behavior, and, with the Concurrence of two thirds, expel a Member.

Each House shall keep a Journal of its Proceedings, and from time to time publish the same, excepting such Parts as may in their Judgment require Secrecy; and the Yeas and Nays of the Members of either House on any question shall, at the Desire of one fifth of those Present, be entered on the Journal.

Neither House, during the Session of Congress, shall, without the Consent of the other, adjourn for more than three days, nor to any other Place than that in which the two Houses shall be sitting.

Section 6. The Senators and Representatives shall receive a Compensation for their Services, to be ascertained by Law, and paid out of the Treasury of the United States. They shall in all Cases, except Treason, Felony and Breach of the Peace, be privileged from Arrest during their Attendance at the Session of their respective Houses, and in going to and returning from the same; and for any Speech or Debate in either House, they shall not be questioned in any other Place.

No Senator or Representative shall, during the Time for which he was elected, be appointed to any Civil Office under the Authority of the United States, which shall have been created, or the Emoluments whereof shall have been increased during such time; and no Person holding any Office under the United States, shall be a Member of either House during his Continuance in Office.

Section 7. All Bills for raising Revenue shall originate in the House of Representatives; but the Senate may propose or concur with Amendments as on other Bills.

Every Bill which shall have passed the House of Representatives and the Senate, shall, before it become a Law, be presented to the President of the United States; If he approve he shall sign it, but if not he shall return it, with his Objections to that House in which it shall have originated, who shall enter the Objections at large on their Journal, and proceed to reconsider it. If after such Reconsideration two thirds of that House shall agree to pass the Bill, it shall be sent, together with the Objections, to the other House, by which it shall likewise be reconsidered, and if approved by two thirds of that House, it shall become a Law. But in all such Cases the Votes of both Houses shall be determined by yeas and Nays, and the Names of the Persons voting for and against the Bill shall be entered on the Journal of each House respectively. If any Bill shall not be returned by the President within ten Days (Sundays excepted) after it shall have been presented to him, the Same shall be a Law, in like Manner as

if he had signed it, unless the Congress by their Adjournment prevent its Return, in which Case it shall not be a Law.

Every Order, Resolution, or Vote to which the Concurrence of the Senate and House of Representatives may be necessary (except on a question of Adjournment) shall be presented to the President of the United States; and before the Same shall take Effect, shall be approved by him, or being disapproved by him, shall be repassed by two thirds of the Senate and House of Representatives, according to the Rules and Limitations prescribed in the Case of a Bill.

Section 8. The Congress shall have power To lay and collect Taxes, Duties, Imposts and Excises, to pay the Debts and provide for the common Defence and general Welfare of the United States; but all Duties, Imposts and Excises shall be uniform throughout the United States;

To borrow Money on the credit of the United States;

To regulate Commerce with foreign Nations, and among the several States, and with the Indian Tribes;

To establish a uniform Rule of Naturalization, and uniform Laws on the subject of Bankruptcies throughout the United States;

To coin Money, regulate the Value thereof, and of foreign Coin, and fix the Standard of Weights and Measures;

To provide for the Punishment of counterfeiting the Securities and current Coin of the United States;

To establish Post Offices and post Roads;

To promote the Progress of Science and useful Arts, by securing for limited Times to Authors and Inventors the exclusive Right to their respective Writings and Discoveries;

To constitute Tribunals inferior to the Supreme Court;

To define and punish Piracies and Felonies committed on the high Seas, and Offences against the Law of Nations;

To declare War, grant Letters of Marque and Reprisal, and make Rules concerning Captures on Land and Water;

To raise and support Armies, but no Appropriation of Money to that Use shall be for a longer Term than two Years;

To provide and maintain a Navy;

To make Rules for the Government and Regulation of the land and naval Forces;

To provide for calling forth the Militia to execute the Laws of the Union, suppress Insurrections and repel Invasions;

To provide for organizing, arming, and disciplining, the Militia, and for governing such Part of them as may be employed in the Service of the United States, reserving to the States respectively, the Appointment of the Officers, and the Authority of training the Militia according to the discipline prescribed by Congress;

To exercise exclusive Legislation in all Cases whatsoever, over such District (not exceeding ten Miles square) as may, by Cession of particular States, and the Acceptance of Congress, become the Seat of the Government of the United States, and to exercise like Authority over all Places purchased by the Consent of the Legislature of the State in which the Same shall be, for the Erection of Forts, Magazines, Arsenals, dock-Yards, and other needful Buildings;—And

To make all Laws which shall be necessary and proper for carrying into Execution the foregoing Powers, and all other Powers vested by this Constitution in the Government of the United States, or in any Department or Officer thereof.

Section 9. The Migration or Importation of such Persons as any of the States now existing shall think proper to admit, shall not be prohibited by the Congress prior to the Year one thousand eight hundred and eight, but a Tax or duty may be imposed on such Importation, not exceeding ten dollars for each Person.

The Privilege of the Writ of Habeas Corpus shall not be suspended, unless when in Cases of Rebellion or Invasion the public Safety may require it.

No Bill of Attainder or ex post facto Law shall be passed.

No Capitation, or other direct, Tax shall be laid, unless in Proportion to the Census or Enumeration herein before directed to be taken.

[The Congress shall have power to lay and collect taxes on incomes, from whatever source derived, without apportionment among the several States, and without regard to any census or enumeration.]<sup>8</sup>

No Tax or Duty shall be laid on Articles exported from any State.

No Preference shall be given by any Regulation of Commerce or Revenue to the Ports of one State over those of another: nor shall Vessels bound to, or from, one State, be obliged to enter, clear, or pay Duties in another.

No Money shall be drawn from the Treasury, but in Consequence of Appropriations made by Law; and a regular Statement and Account of the Receipts and Expenditures of all public Money shall be published from time to time.

No Title of Nobility shall be granted by the United States: And no Person holding any Office of Profit or Trust under them, shall, without the Consent of the Congress, accept of any present, Emolument, Office, or Title, of any kind whatever, from any King, Prince, or foreign State.

Section 10. No State shall enter into any Treaty, Alliance, or Confederation; grant Letters of Marque and Reprisal; coin Money; emit Bills of Credit; make any Thing but gold and silver Coin a Tender in Payment of Debts; pass any Bill of Attainder, ex post facto Law, or Law impairing the Obligation of Contracts, or grant any Title of Nobility.

No State shall, without the Consent of the Congress, lay any Imposts or Duties on Imports or Exports, except what may be absolutely necessary for executing it's Inspection Laws: and the net Produce of all Duties and Imposts, laid by any State on Imports or Exports, shall be for the Use of the Treasury of the United States; and all such Laws shall be subject to the Revision and Controul of the Congress.

No State shall, without the Consent of Congress, lay any Duty of Tonnage, keep Troops, or Ships of War in time of Peace, enter into any Agreement or Compacts with another State, or with a foreign Power, or engage in War, unless actually invaded, or in such imminent Danger as will not admit of delay.

[All persons born or naturalized in the United States, and subject to the jurisdiction thereof, are citizens of the United States and of the State wherein they reside. No State shall make or enforce any law which shall abridge the privileges or immunities of citizens of the United States; nor shall any State deprive any person of life, liberty, or property, without due process of law; nor deny to any person within its jurisdiction the equal protection of the laws.]<sup>9</sup>

## Article. II.

Section 1. The executive Power shall be vested in a President of the United States of America. He shall hold his Office during the Term of four Years, and, together with the Vice President, chosen for the same Term, be elected, as follows: Each State shall appoint, in such Manner as the Legislature thereof may direct, a Number of Electors, equal to the whole Number of Senators and Representatives to which the State may be entitled in the Congress: but no Senator or Representative, or Person holding an Office of Trust or Profit under the United States, shall be appointed an Elector.

*The Electors shall meet in their respective States, and vote by Ballot for two Persons, of whom one at least shall not be an Inhabitant of the same State with themselves. And they shall make a List of all the Persons voted for, and of the Number of Votes for each; which List they shall sign and certify, and transmit sealed to the Seat of the Government of the United States, directed to the President of the Senate. The President of the Senate shall, in the Presence of the Senate and House of Representatives, open all the Certificates, and the Votes shall then be counted. The Person having the greatest Number of Votes shall be the President, if such Number be a Majority of the whole Number of Electors appointed; and if there be more than one who have such Majority, and have an equal Number of Votes, then the House of Representatives shall immediately chuse by Ballot one of them for President; and if no Person have a Majority, then from the five highest on the List the said House shall in like Manner chuse the President. But in chusing the President, the Votes shall be taken by States, the Representation from each State having one Vote; A quorum for this Purpose shall consist of a Member or Members from two thirds of the States, and a Majority of all the States shall be necessary to a Choice. In every Case, after the Choice of the President, the Person having the greatest Number of Votes of the Electors shall be the Vice President. But if there should remain two or more who have equal Votes, the Senate shall chuse from them by Ballot the Vice President.*<sup>10</sup>

The Congress may determine the Time of chusing the Electors, and the Day on which they shall give their Votes; which Day shall be the same throughout the United States.

[The Electors shall meet in their respective states, and vote by ballot for President and Vice-President, one of whom, at least, shall not be an inhabitant of the same state with themselves; they shall name in their ballots the person voted for as President, and in distinct ballots the person voted for as Vice-President, and they shall make distinct lists of all persons voted for as President, and of all persons voted for as Vice-President, and of the number of votes for each, which lists they shall sign and certify, and transmit sealed to the seat of the government of the United States, directed to the President of the Senate; The President of the Senate shall, in the presence of the Senate and House of Representatives, open all the certificates and the votes shall then be counted; —The person having the greatest number of votes for President, shall be the President, if such number be a majority of the whole number of Electors appointed; and if no person have such majority, then from the persons having the highest numbers not exceeding three on the list of those voted for as President, the House of Representatives shall choose immediately, by ballot, the President. But in choosing the President, the votes shall be taken by states, the representation from each state having one vote; a quorum for this purpose shall consist of a member or members from two-thirds of the states, and a majority of all the states shall be necessary to a choice. And if the House of Representatives shall not choose a President whenever the right of choice shall devolve upon them, before the fourth day of March next following, then the Vice-President shall act as President, as in the case of the death or other constitutional disability of the President.<sup>11</sup> The person having the greatest number of votes as Vice-President, shall be the Vice-President, if such number be a majority of the whole number of Electors appointed, and if no person have a majority, then from the

two highest numbers on the list, the Senate shall choose the Vice-President; a quorum for the purpose shall consist of two-thirds of the whole number of Senators, and a majority of the whole number shall be necessary to a choice. But no person constitutionally ineligible to the office of President shall be eligible to that of Vice President of the United States.]<sup>12</sup>

[The terms of the President and Vice President shall end at noon on the 20th day of January, and terms of Senators and Representatives at noon on the 3d day of January, of the years in which such terms would have ended if this article had not been ratified; and the terms of their successors shall then begin.

If, at the time fixed for the beginning of the term of the President, the President elect shall have died, the Vice President elect shall become president. If a President shall not have been chosen before the time fixed for the beginning of his term, or if the President elect shall have failed to qualify, then the Vice President elect shall act as President until a President shall have qualified; and the Congress may by law provide for the case wherein neither a President elect nor a Vice President elect shall have qualified, declaring who shall then act as President, or the manner in which one who is to act shall be selected, and such person shall act accordingly until a President or Vice President shall have qualified.

The Congress may by law provide for the case of the death of any of the persons from whom the House of Representatives may choose a President whenever the right of choice shall have devolved upon them, and for the case of the death of any of the persons from whom the Senate may choose a Vice President whenever the right of choice shall have devolved upon them.]<sup>13</sup>

No Person except a natural born Citizen, or a Citizen of the United States, at the time of the Adoption of this Constitution, shall be eligible to the Office of President; neither shall any Person be eligible to that Office who shall not have attained to the Age of thirty five Years, and been fourteen Years a Resident within the United States.<sup>14</sup>

In Case of the Removal of the President from Office, or of his Death, Resignation, or Inability to discharge the Powers and Duties of the said Office, the Same shall devolve on the Vice President, and the Congress may by Law provide for the Case of Removal, Death, Resignation or Inability, both of the President and Vice President, declaring what Officer shall then act as President, and such Officer shall act accordingly, until the Disability be removed, or a President shall be elected.

The President shall, at stated Times, receive for his Services, a Compensation, which shall neither be increased nor diminished during the Period for which he shall have been elected, and he shall not receive within that Period any other Emolument from the United States, or any of them.

Before he enter on the Execution of his Office, he shall take the following Oath or Affirmation:—"I do solemnly swear (or affirm) that I will faithfully execute the Office of President of the United States, and will to the best of my Ability, preserve, protect and defend the Constitution of the United States."

Section 2. The President shall be Commander in Chief of the Army and Navy of the United States, and of the Militia of the several States, when called into the actual Service of the United States; he may require the Opinion, in writing, of the principal Officer in each of the executive Departments, upon any Subject relating to the Duties of their respective Offices, and he shall have Power to grant Reprieves and Pardons for Offences against the United States, except in Cases of Impeachment.

He shall have Power, by and with the Advice and Consent of the Senate, to make Treaties, provided two thirds of the Senators present concur; and he shall nominate, and by and with the Advice and Consent of the Senate, shall appoint Ambassadors, other public Ministers and Consuls, Judges of the supreme Court, and all other Officers of the United States, whose Appointments are not herein otherwise provided for, and which shall be established by Law; but the Congress may by Law vest the Appointment of such inferior Officers, as they think proper, in the President alone, in the Courts of Law, or in the Heads of Departments.

The President shall have Power to fill up all Vacancies that may happen during the Recess of the Senate, by granting Commissions which shall expire at the End of their next Session.

Section 3. He shall from time to time give to the Congress Information of the State of the Union, and recommend to their Consideration such Measures as he shall judge necessary and expedient; he may, on extraordinary Occasions, convene both Houses, or either of them, and in Case of Disagreement between them, with Respect to the Time of Adjournment, he may adjourn them to such Time as he shall think proper; he shall receive Ambassadors and other public Ministers; he shall take Care that the Laws be faithfully executed, and shall Commission all the Officers of the United States.

Section 4. The President, Vice President and all civil Officers of the United States, shall be removed from Office on Impeachment for, and Conviction of, Treason, Bribery, or other high Crimes and Misdemeanors.

### Article III.

Section 1. The judicial Power of the United States, shall be vested in one supreme Court, and in such inferior Courts as the Congress may from time to time ordain and establish. The Judges, both of the supreme and inferior Courts, shall hold their Offices during good Behaviour, and shall, at stated Times, receive for their Services, a Compensation, which shall not be diminished during their Continuance in Office.

Section 2. The judicial Power shall extend to all Cases, in Law and Equity, arising under this Constitution, the Laws of the United States, and Treaties made, or which shall be made, under their Authority;—to all Cases affecting Ambassadors, other public Ministers and Consuls;—to all Cases of admiralty and maritime Jurisdiction;—to Controversies to which the United States shall be a Party;—to Controversies between two or more States;—between a State and Citizens of another State;—between Citizens of different States;—between Citizens of the same State claiming Lands under Grants of different States, and between a State, or the Citizens thereof, and foreign States, Citizens or Subjects.

[The Judicial power of the United States shall not be construed to extend to any suit in law or equity, commenced or prosecuted against one of the United States by Citizens of another State, or by Citizens or Subjects of any Foreign State.]<sup>15</sup>

In all Cases affecting Ambassadors, other public Ministers and Consuls, and those in which a State shall be Party, the supreme Court shall have original Jurisdiction. In all the other Cases before mentioned, the supreme Court shall have appellate Jurisdiction, both as to Law and Fact, with such Exceptions, and under such Regulations as the Congress shall make.

The Trial of all Crimes, except in Cases of Impeachment, shall be by Jury; and such Trial shall be held in the State where the said Crimes shall have been committed; but when not committed within any State, the Trial shall be at such Place or Places as the Congress may by Law have directed.

Section 3. Treason against the United States, shall consist only in levying War against them, or in adhering to their Enemies, giving them Aid and Comfort. No Person shall be convicted of Treason unless on the Testimony of two Witnesses to the same overt Act, or on Confession in open Court.

The Congress shall have Power to declare the Punishment of Treason, but no Attainder of Treason shall work Corruption of Blood, or Forfeiture except during the Life of the Person attained.

### Article. IV.

Section 1. Full Faith and Credit shall be given in each State to the public Acts, Records, and judicial Proceedings of every other State. And the Congress may by general Laws prescribe the Manner in which such Acts, Records and Proceedings shall be proved, and the Effect thereof.

Section 2. The Citizens of each State shall be entitled to all Privileges and Immunities of Citizens in the several States.

A Person charged in any State with Treason, Felony, or other Crime, who shall flee from Justice, and be found in another State, shall on Demand of the executive Authority of the State from which he fled, be delivered up, to be removed to the State having Jurisdiction of the Crime.

No Person held to Service or Labour in one State, under the Laws thereof, escaping into another, shall, in Consequence of any Law or Regulation therein, be discharged from such Service or Labour, but shall be delivered up on Claim of the Party to whom such Service or Labour may be due.<sup>16</sup>

Section 3. New States may be admitted by the Congress into this Union; but no new State shall be formed or erected within the Jurisdiction of any other State; nor any State be formed by the Junction of two or more States, or Parts of States, without the Consent of the Legislatures of the States concerned as well as of the Congress.

The Congress shall have Power to dispose of and make all needful Rules and Regulations respecting the Territory or other Property belonging to the United States; and nothing in this Constitution shall be so construed as to Prejudice any Claims of the United States, or of any particular State.

Section 4. The United States shall guarantee to every State in this Union a Republican Form of Government, and shall protect each of them against Invasion; and on Application of the Legislature, or of the Executive (when the Legislature cannot be convened) against domestic Violence.

### Article. V.

The Congress, whenever two thirds of both Houses shall deem it necessary, shall propose Amendments to this Constitution, or, on the Application of the Legislatures of two thirds of the several States, shall call a Convention for proposing Amendments, which, in either Case, shall be valid to all Intents and

Purposes, as Part of this Constitution, when ratified by the Legislatures of three fourths of the several State, or by Conventions in three fourths thereof, as the one or the other mode of Ratification may be proposed by the Congress; Provided that no Amendment which may be made prior to the Year One thousand eight hundred and eight shall in any Manner affect the first and fourth Clauses in the Ninth Section of the first Article; and that no State, without its Consent, shall be deprived of it's equal Suffrage in the Senate.

#### Article. VI.

All Debts contracted and Engagements entered into, before the Adoption of this Constitution, shall be as valid against the United States under this Constitution, as under the Confederation.

[The validity of the public debt of the United States, authorized by law, including debts incurred for payment of pensions and bounties for services in suppressing insurrection or rebellion, shall not be questioned. But neither the United States nor any State shall assume or pay any debt or obligation incurred in aid of insurrection or rebellion against the United States, or any claim for the loss or emancipation of any slave; but all such debts obligations and claims shall be held illegal and void.]<sup>17</sup>

This Constitution, and the Laws of the United States which shall be made in Pursuance thereof; and all Treaties made, or which shall be made, under the Authority of the United States, shall be the supreme Law of the Land; and the Judges in every State shall be bound thereby, any Thing in the Constitution or Laws of any State to the Contrary notwithstanding.

The Senators and Representatives before mentioned, and the Members of the several State Legislatures, and all executive and judicial Officers, both of the United States and of the several States, shall be bound by Oath or Affirmation, to support this Constitution; but no religious Test shall ever be required as a Qualification to any Office or public Trust under the United States.

#### Article. VII.

The Ratification of the Conventions of nine States, shall be sufficient for the Establishment of this Constitution between the States so ratifying the Same. done in Convention by the Unanimous Consent of the States present the Seventeenth Day of September in the Year of our Lord one thousand seven hundred and Eighty seven and of the Independence of the United States of America the Twelfth In witness whereof We have hereunto subscribed our Names,

### AMENDMENTS<sup>18</sup> TO THE CONSTITUTION OF THE UNITED STATES

#### Article I

Congress shall make no law respecting an establishment of religion, or prohibiting the free exercise thereof; or abridging the freedom of speech, or of the press; or the right of the people peaceably to assemble, and to petition the Government for a redress of grievances.

#### Article II

A well regulated Militia, being necessary to the security of a free State, the right of the people to keep and bear Arms, shall not be infringed.

## Article III

No Soldier shall, in time of peace be quartered in any house, without the consent of the Owner, nor in time of war, but in a manner to be prescribed by law.

## Article IV

The right of the people to be secure in their persons, houses, papers, and effects, against unreasonable searches and seizures, shall not be violated, and no Warrants shall issue, but upon probable cause, supported by Oath or affirmation, and particularly describing the place to be searched, and the persons or things to be seized.

## Article V

No person shall be held to answer for a capital, or otherwise infamous crime, unless on a presentment or indictment of a Grand Jury, except in cases arising in the land or naval forces, or in the Militia, when in actual service in time of War or public danger; nor shall any person be subject for the same offence to be twice put in jeopardy of life or limb; nor shall be compelled in any criminal case to be a witness against himself, nor be deprived of life, liberty, or property, without due process of law; nor shall private property be taken for public use, without just compensation.

## Article VI

In all criminal prosecutions, the accused shall enjoy the right to a speedy and public trial, by an impartial jury of the State and district wherein the crime shall have been committed, which district shall have been previously ascertained by law, and to be informed of the nature and cause of the accusation; to be confronted with the witnesses against him; to have compulsory process for obtaining witnesses in his favor, and to have the Assistance of Counsel for his defence.

## Article VII

In suits at common law, where the value in controversy shall exceed twenty dollars, the right of trial by jury shall be preserved, and no fact tried by a jury, shall be otherwise re-examined in any Court of the United States, than according to the rules of the common law.

## Article VIII

Excessive bail shall not be required, nor excessive fines imposed, nor cruel and unusual punishments inflicted.

## Article IX

The enumeration in the Constitution, of certain rights, shall not be construed to deny or disparage others retained by the people.

## Article X

The powers not delegated to the United States by the Constitution, nor prohibited by it to the States, are reserved to the States respectively, or to the people.

## Article XI

The Judicial power of the United States shall not be construed to extend to any suit in law or equity, commenced or prosecuted against one of the United States by Citizens of another State, or by Citizens or Subjects of any Foreign State.<sup>19</sup>

## Article XII

The Electors shall meet in their respective states, and vote by ballot for President and Vice-President, one of whom, at least, shall not be an inhabitant of the same state with themselves; they shall name in their ballots the person voted for as President, and in distinct ballots the person voted for as Vice-President, and they shall make distinct lists of all persons voted for as President, and of all persons voted for as Vice-President, and of the number of votes for each, which lists they shall sign and certify, and transmit sealed to the seat of the government of the United States, directed to the President of the Senate;—The President of the Senate shall, in the presence of the Senate and House of Representatives, open all the certificates and the votes shall then be counted;—The person having the greatest number of votes for President, shall be the President, if such number be a majority of the whole number of Electors appointed; and if no person have such majority, then from the persons having the highest numbers not exceeding three on the list of those voted for as President, the House of Representatives shall choose, immediately, by ballot, the President. But in choosing the President, the votes shall be taken by states, the representation from each state having one vote; a quorum for this purpose shall consist of a member or members from two-thirds of the states, and a majority of all the states shall be necessary to a choice. And if the House of Representatives shall not choose a President whenever the right of choice shall devolve upon them, *before the fourth day of March next following*, then the Vice-President shall act as President, as in the case of the death or other constitutional disability of the President. The person having the greatest number of votes as Vice-President, shall be the Vice-President, if such number be a majority of the

whole number of Electors appointed, and if no person have a majority, then from the two highest numbers on the list, the Senate shall choose the Vice-President; a quorum for the purpose shall consist of two-thirds of the whole number of Senators, and a majority of the whole number shall be necessary to a choice. But no person constitutionally ineligible to the office of President shall be eligible to that of Vice-President of the United States.<sup>20</sup>

#### Article XIII

Section 1. Neither slavery nor involuntary servitude, except as a punishment for crime whereof the party shall have been duly convicted, shall exist within the United States, or any place subject to their jurisdiction.

Section 2. Congress shall have power to enforce this article by appropriate legislation.<sup>21</sup>

#### Article XIV

Section 1. All persons born or naturalized in the United States, and subject to the jurisdiction thereof, are citizens of the United States and of the State wherein they reside. No State shall make or enforce any law which shall abridge the privileges or immunities of citizens of the United States; nor shall any State deprive any person of life, liberty, or property, without due process of law; nor deny to any person within its jurisdiction the equal protection of the laws.

Section 2. Representatives shall be apportioned among the several States according to their respective numbers, counting the whole number of persons in each State, excluding Indians not taxed. But when the right to vote at any election for the choice of electors for President and Vice President of the United States, Representatives in Congress, the Executive and Judicial officers of a State, or the members of the Legislature thereof, is denied to any of the male inhabitants of such State, being twenty-one years of age, and citizens of the United States, or in any way abridged, except for participation in rebellion, or other crime, the basis of representation therein shall be reduced in the proportion which the number of such male citizens shall bear to the whole number of male citizens twenty-one years of age in such State.

Section 3. No person shall be a Senator or Representative in Congress, or elector of President and Vice President, or hold any office, civil or military, under the United States, or under any State, who, having previously taken an oath, as a member of Congress, or as an officer of the United States, or as a member of any State legislature, or as an executive or judicial officer of any State, to support the Constitution of the United States, shall have engaged in insurrection or rebellion against the same, or given aid or comfort to the enemies thereof. But Congress may by a vote of two-thirds of each House, remove such disability.

Section 4. The validity of the public debt of the United States, authorized by law, including debts incurred for payment of pensions and bounties for services in suppressing insurrection or rebellion, shall not be questioned. But neither the United States nor any State shall assume or pay any debt or obligation incurred in aid of insurrection or rebellion against the United States, or any claim for the loss of emancipation of any slave; but all such debts, obligations and claims shall be held illegal and void.

Section 5. The Congress shall have power to enforce, by appropriate legislation, the provisions of this article.<sup>22</sup>

#### Article XV

Section 1. The right of citizens of the United States to vote shall not be denied or abridged by the United States or by any State on account of race, color, or previous condition of servitude.

Section 2. The Congress shall have power to enforce this article by appropriate legislation.<sup>23</sup>

#### Article XVI

The Congress shall have power to lay and collect taxes on incomes, from whatever source derived, without apportionment among the several States, and without regard to any census or enumeration.<sup>24</sup>

### Article XVII

The Senate of the United States shall be composed of two Senators from each State, elected by the people thereof, for six years; and each Senator shall have one vote. The electors in each State shall have the qualifications requisite for electors of the most numerous branch of the State legislatures.

When vacancies happen in the representation of any State in the Senate, the executive authority of such State shall issue writs of election to fill such vacancies: *Provided*, That the legislature of any State may empower the executive thereof to make temporary appointments until the people fill the vacancies by election as the legislature may direct.

This amendment shall not be so construed as to affect the election or term of any Senator chosen before it becomes valid as part of the Constitution.<sup>25</sup>

### Article XVIII

Section 1. After one year from the ratification of this article the manufacture, sale, or transportation of intoxicating liquors within, the importation thereof into, or the exportation thereof from the United States and all territory subject to the jurisdiction thereof for beverage purposes is hereby prohibited.

Section 2. The Congress and the several States shall have concurrent power to enforce this article by appropriate legislation.

Section 3. This article shall be inoperative unless it shall have been ratified as an amendment to the Constitution by the legislatures of the several States, as provided in the Constitution, within seven years from the date of the submission hereof to the States by the Congress.<sup>26</sup>

### Article XIX

The right of the citizens of the United States to vote shall not be denied or abridged by the United States or by any State on account of sex.

Congress shall have power to enforce this article by appropriate legislation.<sup>27</sup>

### Article XX

Section 1. The terms of the President and Vice President shall end at noon on the 20th day of January, and the terms of Senators and Representatives at noon on the 3d day of January, of the years in which such terms would have ended if this article had not been ratified; and the terms of their successors shall then begin.

Section 2. The Congress shall assemble at least once in every year, and such meeting shall begin at noon on the 3d day of January, unless they shall by law appoint a different day.

Section 3. If, at the time fixed for the beginning of the term of the President, the President elect shall have died, the Vice President elect shall become President. If a President shall not have been chosen before the time fixed for the beginning of his term, or if the President elect shall have failed to qualify, then the Vice President elect shall act as President until a President shall have qualified; and the Congress may by law provide for the case wherein neither a President elect nor a Vice President elect shall have qualified, declaring who shall then act as President, or the manner in which one who is to act shall be selected, and such person shall act accordingly until a President or Vice-President shall have qualified.

Section 4. The Congress may by law provide for the case of the death of any of the persons from whom the House of Representatives may choose a President whenever the right of choice shall have devolved upon them, and for the case of the death of any of the persons from whom the Senate may choose a Vice President whenever the right of choice shall have devolved upon them.

Section 5. Sections 1 and 2 shall take effect on the 15th day of October following the ratification of this article.

Section 6. This article shall be inoperative unless it shall have been ratified as an amendment to the Constitution by the legislatures of three-fourths of the several States within seven years from the date of its submission.<sup>28</sup>

### Article XXI

Section 1. The eighteenth article of amendment to the Constitution of the United States is hereby repealed.

SECTION 2. The transportation or importation into any State, Territory, or Possession of the United States for delivery or use therein of intoxicating liquors, in violation of the laws thereof, is hereby prohibited.

SECTION 3. This article shall be inoperative unless it shall have been ratified as an amendment to the Constitution by conventions in the several States, as provided in the Constitution, within seven years from the date of the submission hereof to the States by the Congress.<sup>29</sup>

#### PROPOSED CHILD LABOR AMENDMENT

Section 1. The Congress shall have power to limit, regulate, and prohibit the labor of persons under eighteen years of age.

Section 2. The power of the several States is unimpaired by this article except that the operation of State laws shall be suspended to the extent necessary to give effect to legislation enacted by the Congress.<sup>30</sup>
