

ANNUAL REPORT
THE ADMINISTRATIVE RULES REVIEW COMMITTEE
1984

I. Introduction. In 1984 58 administrative agencies promulgated 415 filings, representing over 1600 individual rule additions, amendments or repealers. This represents a significant decrease from the 458 filings promulgated in 1983. The agencies which promulgated rules are listed below together with the number of filings put into effect:

While the volume of rule-making is down, the degree of controversy remains constant. In 1984 the committee imposed one substantive objection, equalling the number imposed in 1983. No forty-five day delays were imposed. A total of 96 objections have been imposed since 1977. The controversial number of rules may even be increasing, due at least in part to the number of legislative decisions being made by agencies.

Statutes are becoming increasingly less detailed and issues that at one time were settled by debate in the House and Senate are delegated to the rule-making process.

II. MAJOR ISSUES OF 1984.

Conservation Commission, Steel Shot only in duck hunting. After two years of controversy, the committee finally allowed the "steel shot" rule to go into effect. The rule bans the use of lead shot in waterfowl hunting. The rule was controversial because of allegations that steel shot it damaged gun barrels and was far more expensive than lead. Both the committee and the legislature examined the issue and ultimately allowed the rule to go into effect.

Commerce Commission, Alternate energy production. In a marathon rule-making process, the commission took over 14 months to adopt rules relating to alternate energy production. §476.36, 1985 Code became effective 1 July 1983. It required utilities to purchase the energy produced by small 'alternate energy facilities', mainly wind turbines and low head dams. The problem facing the commission was to set rates for the purchase of the power that was fair both to the utility and the small facility. The commission decided to do this by rule instead of tariff, setting a state-wide rate of 6.5 cents per hour. The rule was strong supported by various municipalities who were looking to the construction of low head dams. They alleged that the 6.5 cent rate was essential to make the projects economically justifiable. Other supporters suggested that the rate was a 'bargain', noting that the Louisa Generating Station cost over 16 cents per kilowatt.

Utilities opposed the rate and the program itself. They commented that dependability was a key factor in power generation and neither wind nor water power provided a consistent source of electricity. They also commented that the 6.5 cent rate was not reasonable when compared with the generating rates of older facilities.

The committee determined that §476.36 mandated the purchase of alternate power and that the commission was clearly delegated the authority to set rates, up to eight cents per kilowatt. The committee took no action on the proposal.

CORRECTIONS DEPARTMENT, Board of parole hearings. By consent agreement in district court, the attorney general conceded that parole board meetings were to be opened to the public, pursuant to the Open Meetings Law. The problem presented by this decision is that meetings are held in the institution, which is under high security. The department proposed highly restrictive rules to carefully screen those persons wishing to attend parole hearing. The problem this presented was that a state statute provided access to public meetings, while security considerations mandated restricting access. The problem was complicated by an additional set of rules promulgated by the board itself. These rules restricted

activities of persons once they were admitted to the hearing. The rules were not entirely acceptable to the committee; however, no action was taken because of the pressing security consideration. The department informed the committee that they would experiment with closed circuit TV monitoring of the meetings.

Insurance Department, Board of Directors of Blue Cross/Blue Shield. In 1983 the legislature enacted H.F. 196, requiring BS/BC to be governed by a board of directors made up of two thirds subscribers and one third providers. Special committee were established by statute to select nominees to the board. The legislation also contained vague language allowing nomination by petition. The department proposed rules providing that the committee nomination process was the exclusive means of nomination; effectively removing the current board of directors from the nomination process. The departments rules provided that the petitions went only to the nominating board for their consideration, not to the board of directors themselves.

The committee determined after several meetings that the statute was ambiguous and referred H.F 196 and the insurance rules to the legislature. The legislature enacted amendment that upheld and reinforced the department's rules. Blue Cross/Blue Shield is now challenging the constitutionality of both the statute and the rules in federal court. On 4 May 1985 the federal district court in Des Moines ruled that the statute and the rules reorganizing Blue Cross/Blue Shield were reasonable and the court upheld their validity.

DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC INSTRUCTION, Limitations on the use of AEA printing facilities. Private printing companies have long complained that area education agencies were unfairly providing printing services to local schools. They contended that much of the printing was non-educational and for that reason should not be performed by AEA's. The department agreed, and proposed a rule to limit printing services to educational materials for students and materials for "school corporations". This rule also eliminated all printing services for the administrators of non-public schools, since these schools are not "school corporations".

The committee opposed this amendment, noting that the only requested change was that AEA's cease printing non-educational material. It was the departments position that unauthorized as well as unfair printing should be prohibited; the department felt that it was beyond the scope of the statute for AEA's to provide printing to the governing administration of non-public schools. It was the committee's position that the department was manufacturing an issue that did not exist by extending the prohibition far beyond the original request; the committee refused to support the proposed rule. The proposal was subsequently dropped.

DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC SAFETY, Licensing of private detectives. SF 449 was enacted in 1984 to 'tighten up' the licensing

provisions for private detectives; the provisions were tightened up to the point of strangulation. The Act required testing of applicants and licensees, and for the first time required liability insurance. The Act also contained numerous problems that could not be corrected through rule-making. Most serious was the required amount of insurance; it was set so high that many small companies could not obtain adequate coverage. Applicants also had to list all of their "operatives", but there was no exemption from the Open Records Law, meaning that anyone could demand to see who was acting as a "snitch" for a licensee.

The committee recommended that corrective legislation be enacted to solve these and several other problems. The department provided the draft language and legislation was ultimately enacted in 1985 [SF 456].

REVENUE DEPARTMENT, Taxation of films. These rules were highly controversial when published under notice, in July. Item ten of the notice established the principle that the rental of video tapes, motion pictures, taped advertisements, etc., was subject to sales tax. This interpretation was based on SF 2330 which imposed a sales tax on the rental of tangible personal property. The department's interpretation was that film and videotape fell within this definition.

This notice was strongly opposed by the motion picture and radio/tv industries, who argued that it was not the tape that was rented, it was the images carried by the tape. They argued that images were intangible and not subject to tax.

The committee noted that the statute supported the department's position, but did refer the rule to the General Assembly for further study. Legislation is not pending in both houses to exempt the movie and video industry from the tax.

Productivity formula in ag. land values. The most controversial rule-making since Chapter 17A began, The formula began with a statutory amendment which mandated that the method of calculating the value of farmland be established by rule [1983 Act, Ch. 202, §22]. The greatest controversy surrounding the formula was the use of the corn suitability utilization ratio (CSUR). This statistical calculation yields an average valuation for farmland. The earlier method simply calculated productivity uses actual production data compiled on a county-by-county basis. Farmers in the Southwestern portion of the state were especially concerned with the rule, alleging that the formula, especially the CSUR factor, overstated the productivity of their farmland.

The committee took the unusual of requesting the department to hold a series of public meetings on the rule in all of the various geographic regions of the state. The committee itself held two public meetings, in August and October of 1984; the committee heard extensive testimony concerning the rules' impact on Southern Iowa farmers.

A second unusual step was taken by the Governor. After the conclusion of the meetings in October the rules coordinator and the Governor held a series of private meetings with the various interested parties. At the conclusion of

those meetings the Governor requested the department to prepare a new notice of intended action containing a revised formula. This revision restored the county-by-county method of determining productivity and made other changes in the formula as requested in the public meetings. This new notice appeared in the January 16th, 1985 issue of the 'Bulletin' and has been finalized in the April 24th, 1985 issue.

III. STATUTORY CHANGES

Regulatory flexibility analysis. 1984 session, Chapter 1007 contains perhaps the most significant amendment to the rule-making process since the enactment of Chapter 17A. This additional division to the Administrative Procedures Act establishes The Regulatory Flexibility Analysis. This provision is based on the assumption that many regulatory programs have a disproportionate impact on small businesses, due to their relative lack of expertise and resources to comply with complicated regulatory schemes.

The Act provides a mechanism that allows 'small business' to demand that agencies analyze their proposed rules to 1) identify proposed rules which will impact small business, 2) solicit public comment especially from small business and 3) study the impact their proposal will have on small business and, if possible, tailor the rule to minimize the impact the proposal will have on small business.

Legislative Veto. In November of 1984 the voters approved a Constitutional amendment allowing the legislature to "nullify" an administrative rule by a joint resolution. Under the rules adopted by the House and Senate these resolutions can be introduced by the ARRC and by committees in the Senate and by any legislator in the House. Only one such resolution was introduced into the 1985 session; the agency rescinded the rule before it could come to a vote.
