Committee members asked for background on the change of routine inspections of food establishments from 36 months to 60 months. Mr. Speltz explained that the department is conducting more food inspections than it ever has, but it is focusing more on nonroutine inspections of higher-risk facilities, and adjusting to the frequency of routine inspections will facilitate that. Members asked what oversight the department will maintain over lower-risk facilities. He explained that the department will investigate complaints and conduct routine inspections.

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Committee members asked what the department's authority is to change the inspection frequency and if the department will seek additional resources in order to increase the routine inspection frequency. Mr. Speltz explained that inspection frequency is not set by statute, but is based on the department's risk-based assessment methodology which has a 5-tier graduated inspection frequency. He stated that the frequency provided in the rule had not been updated in many years and that he would discuss the need for any additional resources with the director of the department. Members asked him to provide the committee with the risk-based assessment methodology. Members asked if the results of inspections are published, and he explained that they are available on a searchable website, although unverifiable or unfounded complaints are not published.

Committee members asked the department to explain why the department had awarded \$1 million to Choice Charter School (Choice) for startup costs while Hamburg Charter High School (Hamburg) received no funding. Members also stated that Choice had found the department difficult to work with. Mr. Mayes explained that Hamburg uses the state charter model, so it has existing resources to rely on such as a school building, while Choice uses the founder model, so it has fewer resources. He further explained that the \$1 million was part of federal Covid relief funding for innovative schools that serve struggling students. Such funding is subject to various state and federal requirements and must be paid on a reimbursement basis, not paid up front.

Dr. Cynthia Knight, speaking on behalf of Choice, stated that she was grateful for the \$1 million, as Choice would not have been able to open without it. She stated that there should be more innovative methods of funding charter schools and that charter schools should receive funds on a schedule similar to public schools. She explained that the current funding schedule for charter schools causes too much fluctuation. Committee members asked for more information about the structure of Choice, and Dr.

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Knight explained that Choice is a fully online school that is based in the "metaverse;" it has no physical location. Students attend from wherever they are physically located. She further explained that Choice is the first charter school in the state that is not affiliated with a public school, that students are not charged tuition, that the first school year had recently begun, and that graduating students earn a diploma. She described Choice as a high school mostly consisting of tenth graders, including some with special needs and 504 plans, with a goal of helping students age 18-21 earn a diploma.

Additional discussion occurred regarding the funding process for Choice. Dr. Knight stated that for the first year of funding, she was required to provide an estimate of how many students she expected, and she estimated 300. Choice actually has 75 students in its first year, and that is how many Choice receives funding for under the rules. As a result, she stated Choice is unable to pay its expenses. Mr. Mayes explained that while the first year funding is paid based on the estimated number of students, the second year payment includes a recoupment by the department of any funds paid due to an overestimation in the first year. Legislation enacted in the 2022 session made the transition from the first year to the second year less difficult financially. He further explained that the \$1 million is a different source of funds than those paid out under state law and described the criteria for receiving the federal funds. He explained that the purpose of the federal funding is so that the department can receive data from Choice on its innovative practices in order to determine whether such practices can be scaled up for use by school districts. He additionally explained state and federal accountability measures with which Choice must comply as a condition of receiving the funds and noted that the federal funding was not a subject of the rulemaking, which only covers state funding. Dr. Cline provided additional background on the state funding process. Members asked Dr. Knight if she considered the rulemaking helpful to charter schools and if it could be improved. She described it as a work-in-progress and urged further effort to improve the process by which charter schools are started.
