THE STATE FLOWER OF IOWA

The Wild Rose was officially designated as the flower of the state by the twenty-sixth general assembly in extraordinary session. The resolution was adopted May 7, 1897.

No particular species of the Wild Rose was designated by the general assembly, but it is supposed that the legislators had in mind the "Wild Prairie Rose," or *Rosa Pratincola*, as it is the most common and most widely distributed species in the state.

THE STATE BIRD OF IOWA

The forty-fifth general assembly, by a concurrent resolution adopted March 22, 1933, designated the Eastern Goldfinch, *Spinus tristis tristis* as the official bird of Iowa.

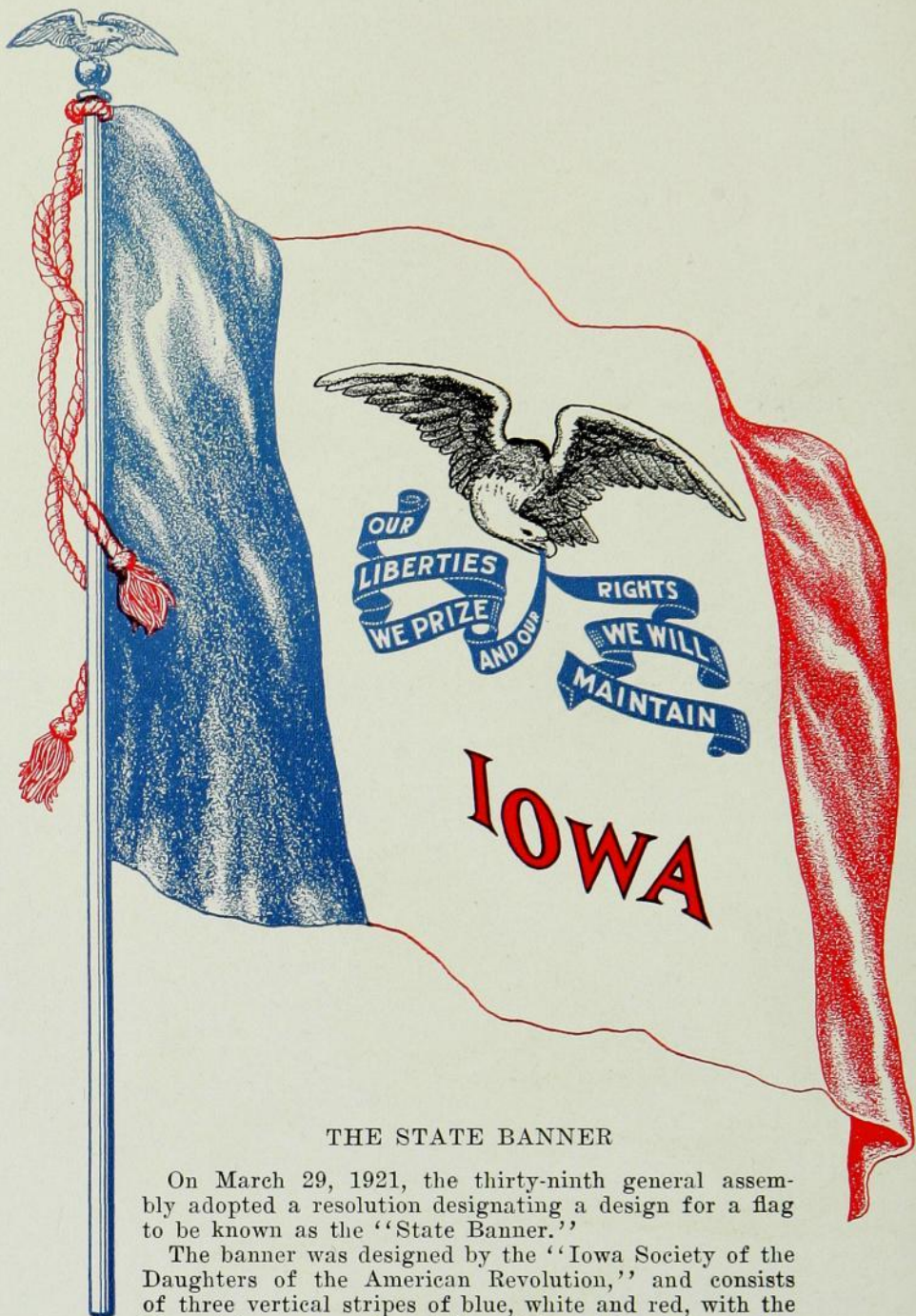
The Goldfinch is generally designated as a wild canary. The male is a bright yellow with black wings, tail and the top of its head. The female is similarly marked, but not so brilliant. These birds are rather common in the southern part of the state, but less numerous in the northern part.

THE STATE BANNER

On March 29, 1921, the thirty-ninth general assembly adopted a resolution designating a design for a flag to be known as the "State Banner."

The banner was designed by the "Iowa Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution," and consists of three vertical stripes of blue, white and red, with the blue stripe nearest the staff and the white stripe in the center depicting a spreading eagle bearing in its beak blue streamers on which is inscribed in white letters the state motto, "Our liberties we prize and our rights we will maintain." The word "Iowa" in red letters is just below the streamers.

THE HISTORY OF IOWA*

A Brief Summary

The Land

MILLIONS of years ago an ocean covered what is now the Mississippi valley. As the waters receded, sand and clay were deposited upon the remains of the shell-covered animals which had lived in this sea and under pressure of successive layers the sand became sandstone and the clay turned into shale, while the animal deposits became limestone. Lead ore accumulated in the vicinity of Dubuque.

Later the climate became tropical and giant trees and ferns grew in the swamps. Their remains were, in turn, covered by clay or sand and became coal. In some places beds of gypsum were left as the water evaporated, forming a soft, gray rock now used for plaster or stucco.

In the centuries which followed, at least five great ice sheets covered the whole or some parts of Iowa. As each one melted, it left a layer of powdered rock, sprinkled with flinty boulders. In the intervals between the glaciers, plants grew and their remains mingled with the glacial deposits to make the deep, rich soil of Iowa.

The Indians of Iowa

The earliest remains of human life in Iowa are found in the rock-shelters and mounds of pre-historic Indians. Thousand of these mounds once existed in Iowa and hundreds may still be seen, especially in northeastern Iowa. When white men first saw the Iowa country several tribes of Indians hunted, fished, and fought here. These Indians usually lived in small temporary villages on the river terraces and their homes were tepees or wickiups made of bark or skin and nearby were the gardens where the women raised small patches of corn, beans, and pumpkins. Their weapons were bows and arrows; their implements were made of stone or bone.

When the white traders came among them, the Indians learned to sell their furs and buy guns, powder, traps, knives, blankets, calico, cooking utensils, mirrors, paint, tobacco, and whisky, but they soon discovered that settlers followed the traders and that the settlers wanted their lands.

By 1832 the van of white settlement had reached the east bank of the Mississippi river and the Sauk and Fox Indians were ordered to leave their cornfields on Rock river and cross the Mississippi. Black Hawk, a famous chief of that period, claimed that the treaty (1804) giving up the land in Illinois had been illegally signed and he and his band resisted the removal. They were defeated and compelled to surrender not only their lands in Illinois but a strip west of the Mississippi river, known as the Black Hawk purchase. The title to the land west of the river passed to the Federal government on June 1, 1833.

This was the beginning of the end for the Indians in Iowa. Keokuk's Reserve on the Iowa river was sold in 1836, and a year later an additional strip of land was added to the Black Hawk purchase. The Sauk and Fox Indians, by a treaty signed in 1842, were compelled to cede about one-third of the area of Iowa, agreeing to withdraw across the Missouri river in 1845. The Pottawattamie Indians had been given (by a treaty of 1833) lands in southwestern Iowa, but in 1846 they were moved to Kansas. The Winnebago Indians had been settled in what was called the "neutral ground," a narrow strip of land in northeastern Iowa ceded (1830) as a buffer strip by the Sioux and the Sauk and Fox. In accordance with a treaty signed in 1846, the Winnebagoes were moved to Minnesota. The Sioux retained their hunting grounds in the north and northwest until 1851 when they too were forced to cede their Iowa lands to the government.

Two later incidents connect the Indians with Iowa. In the summer of 1856, a number of white families settled in the region around the Okoboji lakes and Spirit lake. The following spring a band of Sioux Indians, wandering through the region, killed more than thirty of the settlers and carried off three women and a girl as prisoners.

About the same time some Sauk and Fox Indians came back to their beloved Iowa. The Iowa legislature passed a law (1856) permitting a band of these homesick Indians to remain in Tama county, and in 1857, with the assistance of Governor James W. Grimes, they bought eighty acres of land. There are now about 400 of these Indians, mostly Foxes, and they own nearly four thousand acres of land along the Iowa river. They have been made citizens and, if otherwise qualified, may vote.

Exploration

The first white men to see Iowa were Father Marquette and Louis Joliet who, with five boatmen, came down the Mississippi river in June, 1673. At some spot along the shore, probably near the mouth of the Iowa river, the party landed and Marquette and Joliet visited a nearby village of Illinois Indians. During the next century a number of white soldiers and traders came through the Iowa country.

In 1788 (five years after the close of the Revolution) Julien Dubuque, a French-Canadian trader, crossed the Mississippi river to the lead mines in the vicinity of Dubuque and established his home there. Eight years later (1796) he received from the Spanish governor a grant of land, including the lead mines, which he named the "Mines of Spain." Dubuque remained at the mines until his death in 1810. A man named Basil Giard also secured a grant of some 5,680 acres in Clayton county, and in 1799 Louis Honoré Tesson was granted about 6,000 acres in what is now Lee county, where he planted the first apple orchard in Iowa.

All of these grants were obtained from the Spanish government, for France had ceded the western half of Louisiana to Spain in 1762. Napoleon, however, compelled Spain to recede Louisiana to France in 1800. In the meantime American merchants quarreled with the Spanish officials over the commerce down the Mississippi and President Jefferson decided to buy the port of New Orleans. To the surprise of the Americans, Napoleon offered to sell the whole of Louisiana, since he felt he could not defend it against the English, and in 1803 the United States bought Louisiana, including Iowa, for \$15,000,000.

President Jefferson sent Meriwether Lewis and William Clark with a party to explore the new purchase. Sergeant Charles Floyd, one of the explorers, who died near the present site of Sioux City (August 20, 1804), was the first white man known to have died on Iowa soil. In 1805 Lieutenant Zebulon M. Pike led an expedition up the Mississippi river. Major Stephen H. Long (1819, 1820), Henry R. Schoolcraft (1820, 1832), William H. Keating (1823), and Colonel Stephen Watts Kearny (1820, 1824, 1835), were other explorers of Iowaland.

Settlement

Little by little traders, miners, and farmers edged into Iowa. Settlements were not permitted in the Indian country, but a number of white families were allowed to settle in the "half-breed tract," the triangle in southeastern Iowa at the junction of the Mississippi and Des Moines rivers which had been given to the half breeds (in 1824) by the Sauk and Fox. To the north, the lead mines of Dubuque tempted white men to cross the river as early as 1829, but United States troops drove them back across the river until after June 1, 1833, when the Black Hawk purchase became part of the public domain. When the government surveys began in 1836, there were more than ten thousand white settlers in Iowa. The first land offices were opened at Dubuque and Burlington in 1838. The land was sold by the government for \$1.25 an acre. To protect their claims before the land was offered for sale settlers often formed "claim associations."

The early pioneers of Iowa came chiefly from eastern and southeastern states, but there were also many settlers who came directly from Europe. Most of the immigrants who settled in Iowa soon learned the English language, became American citizens, and were soon assimilated with the general population. By 1847 there were 116,454 people in Iowa and in 1860 the population was 674,913, of which 106,081 were foreign born. In 1930 the population of Iowa was 2,470,939.

There have been some interesting group settlements in Iowa. In 1846 several thousand Mormons crossed the state on their way from Nauvoo, Illinois, to Utah. They established a number of permanent camps and some of them remained in southern Iowa. One of their settlements was Kanessville, later Council Bluffs. Ten years later some 1,300 Mormons pushed handcarts from Iowa City westward on their way to Salt Lake City. Hollanders came to Pella in 1847, and English to Le Mars thirty years later. Germans, Irish, Scandanavians, and Czechoslovakians (Bohemians) added to the immigrant total.

There were also a number of communistic settlements in Iowa. One of these was made (1855) by members of the Amana society (now a joint stock company), which owns about twenty-six thousand acres of land, chiefly in Iowa county. The members, numbering about 1,500, live in seven villages. Some French people who called themselves Icarians organized a communistic settlement at Nauvoo, Illinois, in 1849, and ten years later moved to Adams county, Iowa, near Corning, where they built a village called Icaria. After several divisions and withdrawals, the Icarian community was finally dissolved in 1895.

The History of Government in Iowa

The beginning of settlements, of course, brought up the question of government. Soon after the United States bought Louisiana (in 1803), the northern part, including Iowa, was included in the District of Louisiana and attached to the Territory of Indiana. Later the Iowa country was made a part of the Territory of Louisiana and still later (1812) it was included in the Territory of Missouri. When Missouri was admitted as a state (1821), the part of the Louisiana purchase north of Missouri was left without governmental organization until 1834, when it was attached to the Territory of Michigan. Two years later the western part of Michigan territory was organized as the Territory of Wisconsin. Through its connection with Indiana, Michigan, and Wisconsin, the Iowa country inherited much of the spirit of the Northwest Ordinance.

How and when was Iowa named? In 1835 a party of dragoons made a march up the Des Moines river, starting from Fort Des Moines (No. 1), near the mouth of the Des Moines river. Among the officers of this expedition was Lieut. Albert M. Lea. The next year he wrote a book in which he referred to the part of Wisconsin territory west of the Mississippi as the Iowa district. The name, he said, was derived from the Iowa river.

When congress decided to create a new territory west of the Mississippi river, the name suggested by Lea's book was adopted and a bill creating the Territory of Iowa was approved on June 12, 1838. It went into effect on July 4th. Robert Lucas, who had been governor of Ohio, was appointed governor of Iowa. The first election was held on September 10, 1838.

The act creating the Territory of Iowa named Burlington as the temporary capital, but left the choice of the permanent seat of government to the legislature. After much discussion, it was finally decided to lay out a new capital city in Johnson county and name it Iowa City. The cornerstone of the capitol building was laid on July 4, 1840, and the legislature held its first session in the new capitol (now the old capitol) in the fall of 1842.

As the white settlers increased in numbers, men began to talk of statehood, but it was not until 1844 that the first constitution was drafted and it was twice rejected by the voters. A second constitution was approved (in 1846) and on December 28, 1846, President Polk signed the bill admitting Iowa into the union. The first state election was held on August 20, 1846,

and Ansel Briggs was the first governor elected. In 1857 a new constitution was adopted and the capital was moved to Des Moines.

The Iowa constitution gave the suffrage to white male citizens over twenty-one, but in 1868 an amendment extended this right to colored men. Women vote in Iowa by virtue of the nineteenth amendment to the United States Constitution (1920). As electors women became eligible to serve on juries and to hold all offices except those in the general assembly. In 1926 a constitutional amendment removed this sex qualification for membership in the legislature.

The legislature of Michigan (in 1834) created two counties in the Iowa area—Dubuque and Des Moines. Lyon and Osceola counties, the last of the ninety-nine counties to be organized, elected their first officers in 1871. Burlington and Fort Madison, chartered by the legislature of Wisconsin (January, 1838) were the first incorporated municipalities in Iowa.

Military History

Although there are accounts of a few battles between Indian tribes, the soil of Iowa has been unusually free from bloodshed. Only one battle between whites and Indians (between French soldiers and the Sauk and Fox Indians in 1735) and one massacre of whites by the Indians (at Spirit Lake in 1857) are recorded. The first fort built in Iowa was Fort Madison erected on the site of the present city of Fort Madison in 1808. It was abandoned and destroyed in 1813 during the War of 1812.

During the period when the Indians were being crowded out of Iowa and the white settlers were coming in, a number of temporary forts or posts were established. Among these were the first Fort Des Moines on the west bank of the Mississippi river near the mouth of the Des Moines (1834); Fort Atkinson, in the "neutral ground" (1840); and the second Fort Des Moines, at the junction of the Des Moines and Raccoon rivers (1843).

The interest of Iowans in the Mexican war is indicated by the names given to Iowa counties—Mills, Guthrie, Butler, Taylor, Hardin, Ringgold, Yell, Risley, Buena Vista, Cerro Gordo, and Palo Alto. Yell and Risley counties were later united to form Webster county. During the Civil war, Iowa furnished forty-eight regiments of infantry, nine regiments of cavalry, and four batteries of artillery, nearly 80,000 men (men who reenlisted are counted twice in this figure), of whom more than 12,000 lost their lives. In the Spanish-American war in 1898, Iowa sent four regiments of infantry, two batteries of artillery, a signal corps unit, and a company of colored soldiers.

More than 113,000 Iowa men served in the army, navy, or marine corps during the World war, and more than two thousand Iowa men were killed or died of disease. Fort Des Moines (No. 3), established near Des Moines in 1901, was used for an officers' training camp and later for a hospital. Thousands of men were trained at Camp Dodge, a new cantonment established near the capital.

Transportation and Communication

The pioneers of Iowa traveled by ox-wagon, on horseback, or on foot; or, if they did not use their own conveyances, they went by stagecoach or river boat. Some attempts were made to build plank roads, but Iowans soon transferred their interest to railroad building.

The first railroad to enter Iowa was the Mississippi and Missouri in 1855. The cost of this railroad was approximately the same as that of present day paving, about \$26,000 a mile. The first railroad bridge across the Mississippi was opened at Davenport in 1856. The Union Pacific bridge across the Missouri river at Council Bluffs was completed in 1873. The first automobiles were brought into Iowa at the close of the nineteenth century and about 1920 Iowa began the program of paving its main highways. By the close of 1936 more than 4,500 miles of primary roads had been paved, 3,130 miles had been graveled, and 470 miles had bituminous surfacing.

The twentieth century brought experiments with air transportation but it was not until after the World war that the airplane was accepted as one of the important means of transporting passengers, mail, and express. The first regular transcontinental mail service across Iowa began in 1924 although mail had been carried as early as 1914.

Two post offices, the first in Iowa, were established on April 19, 1836. The one at Augusta is still in operation. The first newspaper published in Iowa was the *Dubuque Visitor*, which made its initial appearance on May 11, 1836. The first daily paper in Iowa appeared in 1851, also at Dubuque.

As early as 1848, a telegraph line was in use between Bloomington (now Muscatine) and Burlington. Most of the early telegraph lines in Iowa were built by the sale of stock to public spirited citizens most of whom lost their money. In 1852 the rate from New York to Iowa City was \$1.75 for ten words. The first telephone line entered Iowa about 1877.

At the close of the World war radio came into use as a means of communication. WSUI at the State University of Iowa, furnishing regular programs in 1919, claims to be the oldest broadcasting station west of the Mississippi river.

Schools and Churches

The Iowa pioneers believed in schools. In 1830, Berryman Jennings taught the first school in Iowa in the "half-breed tract," at what is now Galland in Lee county. The first act concerning public schools adopted by the legislature of Iowa territory was approved on January 1, 1839. The educational system of Iowa, elementary schools and high schools with the state university as the cap sheaf, was outlined in a bill approved on March 12, 1858. The public schools in Iowa have always been coeducational.

The Iowa pioneers, however, were not satisfied with elementary schools; they soon established academies, seminaries, and colleges. Iowa Wesleyan college dates back to the opening of the Mount Pleasant Collegiate institute in 1844. Grinnell college continues the existence of Iowa college which first opened its doors to students in 1848. In 1847 the State University of Iowa was established at Iowa City. The State Historical Society of Iowa, established by law in 1857, is also located at Iowa City. It has published a large number of books, pamphlets, and periodicals dealing with the history of Iowa. The State College of Agriculture and Mechanic Arts was opened at Ames in 1868. A state normal school, now the State Teachers college, held its first session at Cedar Falls in 1876.

The first church building in Iowa was erected at Dubuque by the Methodists in 1834. This was of logs and cost \$255. The Catholics built a church there the following year. One of the events which permanently influenced Iowa history was the coming of the "Iowa Band" in 1843, a group of Congregational and Presbyterian ministers from New England. Revivals and camp meetings were popular among the pioneers, but on the whole, the religious history of Iowa has been characterized by a combination of religious fervor, good judgment, tolerance, and emphasis on education.

Social Problems

The first case to come before the supreme court of the Territory of Iowa involved the right of a master to return a slave, a negro named Ralph, to Missouri. The court decided that slavery could not exist in Iowa and Ralph was set free. In the years preceding the Civil war, there was, however, much dispute in Iowa as to the return of fugitive slaves. Many settlers, especially the Quakers and the people from New England, were opposed to slavery, and some of them organized as a part of the underground railroad and assisted fugitive slaves across the state. John Brown visited Iowa several times and some of his men spent the winter of 1857-1858 at a Quaker settlement named Springdale in Cedar county.

The first temperance society in Iowa was organized in 1838 at Fort Madison. The first statewide prohibitory law was adopted by a popular vote in April, 1855, but in 1857 this was amended to provide a license system. In

1870 a form of county local option was adopted and in 1882 a constitutional prohibitory amendment was added to the state constitution, only to be declared invalid by the state supreme court in January, 1883. Statutory prohibition was then adopted in 1884, but difficulties of enforcement led to the adoption (in 1894) of the mulct law (repealed in 1915). Beginning on January 1, 1916, Iowa had statewide prohibition, but in 1933 the general assembly authorized the sale of beer and a year later provided state stores for the sale of intoxicating liquors.

The first state institution established by Iowa was the penitentiary located at Fort Madison in 1839. An additional penitentiary, now known as the men's reformatory, was opened at Anamosa in 1873, and a women's reformatory at Rockwell City in 1918. The training school for boys, now located at Eldora, received its first inmates in 1868 and the training school for girls, located at Mitchellville, was opened in 1873.

The Civil war made necessary some provision for the care of the orphan children of soldiers. Three homes for such orphans (at Glenwood, Cedar Falls, and Davenport) were established in Iowa, but only the institution at Davenport is now in operation. A state juvenile home was opened at Toledo in 1920.

The care of persons who are defective mentally has been met in Iowa by the establishment of seven institutions. The first hospital for the insane was located at Mt. Pleasant and received its first patients in March, 1861. Similar institutions have since been opened by the state at Independence, Clarinda, and Cherokee. An institution for feeble-minded children (now including some adults) was opened at Glenwood in 1876 in the buildings formerly occupied by the soldiers' orphans' home. An institution for the care of epileptics was opened at Woodward in 1917. A psychopathic hospital was established at Iowa City in 1921.

Iowa Industries

The earliest industry in Iowa was the fur trade, but agriculture was the chief occupation of the pioneers. Indeed it was the rich farming land which attracted most of the settlers to Iowa. This predominance of agriculture has continued and in 1930 approximately half of those listed as gainfully employed (not counting the farmers' wives) were connected with agriculture. Gradually horses took the place of oxen as draft animals and of late years tractors have tended to displace horses. Reapers, binders, hayloaders, and other labor-saving machinery took the place of man-power. Beginning even before the Civil war, a marked improvement has been made in the breeds of cattle, horses, hogs, and sheep, and in the strains of corn, wheat, and oats. Partly because of the ravages of the chinch bugs on the wheat fields, corn soon took the lead on Iowa farms and as a rule is marketed in the form of cattle and hogs. Agricultural societies were authorized in 1838 and county fairs were held as early as 1841. The first state fair was held at Fairfield in 1854. Since 1885, the state fairs have been held at Des Moines.

Flour, cornmeal, and lumber were necessities on the frontier and mills were soon built on many streams, the gristmills alone numbering about 600. An oatmeal mill (now the Quaker Oats plant) was established at Cedar Rapids in 1873. Pork packing began in Iowa as early as 1840. In 1877 a packing plant (now the John Morrell & Co.) was opened at Ottumwa and about the same time plants were opened at Sioux City. In normal times the packing plants of Iowa now slaughter approximately four and one-half million hogs. The first creamery in Iowa was established at Spring Branch (near Manchester) in 1872 and early in the nineties the manufacture of pearl buttons was begun at Muscatine. A washing machine factory, begun at Newton in 1900, has developed into one of the state's leading industries.

Money was scarce in early Iowa and much of it was in the form of private and state bank notes of doubtful value. In 1846 it was estimated that there was in Iowa only \$183,426 in gold, silver, and bank notes. The first bank in Iowa (the Miners' Bank of Dubuque) was chartered by the legislature of Wisconsin in 1836. The first constitution of Iowa prohibited banks of issue

(all banks at that time expected to issue bank notes) but the constitution of 1857 authorized the establishment of a state bank and the incorporation of other banks. The state bank went out of existence in 1865 because the national bank act made it unprofitable for banks organized under state laws to issue bank notes. The First National bank at Davenport was the first national bank in the United States.

Bibliography

THE GOVERNMENT OF IOWA*

THE government of the state of Iowa is based upon a constitution adopted by the people and upon statute laws enacted from time to time by the general assembly. Iowa has had two state constitutions, the first approved in 1846, the second one in 1857. The present constitution has been amended a number of times.

The Electorate

All men and women who have lived in Iowa for six months and in the county in which they claim a residence for sixty days are entitled to vote if they are citizens of the United States and are twenty-one years of age or over. Persons convicted of infamous crimes and those declared idiotic or insane are, however, disfranchised. The right of women to vote in Iowa is based upon the nineteenth amendment to the United States constitution.

The regular elections for national, state, district, and county officers are held on the Tuesday following the first Monday of November of the even-numbered years. Candidates, with a few exceptions, are nominated at the primary election held on the first Monday in June preceding the general election. Provision is also made for nominations by petition or convention. Political parties must use the primary for nominating candidates, but in case no candidate receives the necessary thirty-five per cent at the primary, a convention may nominate.

The Legislative Department

The legislative authority of the state of Iowa is vested by the constitution in a general assembly which consists of a senate and a house of representatives. The terms of both senators and representatives begin on the first day of January following their election. Regular sessions are held biennially, commencing on the second Monday of January of the odd-numbered years. Special sessions of the general assembly may be called by the proclamation of the governor.

The house of representatives consists of one hundred and eight members, elected for two years. Each of the ninety-nine counties is entitled to one representative and each of the nine counties having the largest population elects one additional representative. Any person who has resided in the state one year and has the qualifications of a voter is eligible for election as a representative. Women were admitted to the general assembly by an amendment to the state constitution adopted in 1926. The house of representatives elects a speaker and other officers.

The senate consists of fifty members, elected by districts for a term of four years. A senatorial district contains from one to five counties, according to population, and elects one senator. According to the constitution approximately one-half the senators are to be elected at each alternate biennial election, but due to changes in the districts, the terms of twenty-one senators now expire at the end of each alternate legislative biennium and those of twenty-nine in the intervening years. Senators must be twenty-five years of age and have the other qualifications required of representatives.

The Executive Department

The constitution of Iowa makes provision for a governor, lieutenant governor, secretary of state, auditor of state, and treasurer of state, who are elected for terms of two years at the regular biennial elections in the even-numbered years. In addition, the general assembly has made provision for a secretary of agriculture, elected for two years, and a board of railroad commissioners of three members and a superintendent of public instruction, chosen for four years.

The supreme executive power of the state is vested in the governor. It is his duty to see that the laws are enforced, to supervise the official business of the state, to make recommendations to the general assembly, and to appoint various officers and boards. He has the power to call special sessions of the legislature and to veto acts passed by the general assembly, but a majority of two-thirds of each house may pass a bill over his veto. To qualify as governor, a person must have been a citizen of the United States and a resident of the state for at least two years and must be thirty years of age or over at the date of election.

The lieutenant governor succeeds the governor in case of his death, resignation, or disability. His chief function is to act as president of the senate.

In addition to the executive officers mentioned, all of whom are elected, there are a number of appointive officers, including the comptroller, the superintendent of banking, the insurance commissioner, the labor commissioner, the adjutant general, the commissioner of public health, the industrial commissioner, and the fire marshal, all appointed by the governor, usually with the approval of the senate. The governor also appoints, with the approval of the senate, the members of a number of administrative boards, including the state board of education, the board of control of state institutions, the state board of assessment and review, the board of parole, the state board of conservation, the liquor control commission, and state highway commission, and the unemployment compensation commission.

The executive council is an ex officio board made up of the governor, secretary of state, auditor, treasurer, and secretary of agriculture. The state printing board has three ex officio members—the secretary of state, auditor, and attorney general—and two members appointed by the governor. This board appoints the superintendent of printing.

The Judicial Department

The judicial department of the state of Iowa is vested by the constitution in a supreme court, district courts, and such other inferior courts as the general assembly shall provide.

The supreme court at present consists of nine justices, elected for terms of six years, approximately one-third being elected at each regular biennial election. The senior in time of service is chief justice for six months until each judge has served in that capacity. The supreme court appoints a reporter of the supreme court who is also the code editor, and a clerk. Both appointments are for four years.

The constitution also provides for an attorney general who is elected at the regular biennial election for a term of two years. He represents the state in legal matters, gives advice to state officers, and has, in addition, some administrative functions.

The state of Iowa is divided by law into twenty-one judicial districts, composed of from one to nine counties. Each district elects from two to six judges, there being at present seventy district judges in the state. One of the district judges presides over the district court sessions in each county. A county attorney and a clerk of the court are elected by the voters in each county.

The general assembly has provided also for other inferior courts. Each township is authorized to elect two justices of the peace who hear cases involving minor offenses and hold preliminary hearings on more serious charges. Municipal courts, superior courts, police courts, and mayors' courts are authorized in cities and towns under various restrictions. Municipal courts are optional in cities having a population of five thousand or more and superior courts in cities with four thousand or over. Both municipal and superior court judges are elected for four year terms.

If a city of the first class has neither a municipal nor a superior court, the council shall appoint a police judge in commissioned governed and city manager cities and may provide for the election of a police judge in such cities under the general law. In all municipalities having none of these special courts, the mayor acts as the police judge.

Jury trials are the rule for trials of serious cases, but under certain conditions may be waived or denied. Petit juries consist of twelve persons who must be "electors," except in some courts of restricted jurisdiction where the number of jurors may be six persons.

Local Government in Iowa

The state of Iowa is divided into ninety-nine counties, the boundaries of which may not be changed unless the change is approved by the voters of each county concerned. A board of supervisors consisting of three, five, or seven members is the chief administrative agency in the county. They appoint a county engineer. In addition, an auditor, who is the clerk of the board of supervisors, a sheriff, county attorney, recorder, treasurer, coroner, and clerk of the district court are elected biennially by the voters. A county superintendent of schools is chosen every three years by a convention composed of representatives of the school districts.

The Iowa county is a quasi-political corporation which collects municipal, school, county, and state taxes, enforces state laws, has charge of poor relief and certain other welfare activities, and shares with the state highway commission the management of the roads and bridges in the county. Townships, which in earlier days were effective units of local government within the counties, have lost almost all their functions, except for the assessment of property for taxation by the township assessor, and the election of justices of the peace in which many townships default.

The laws of Iowa also authorize the incorporation of cities and towns. These municipalities derive their authority from the general assembly and have only the powers specifically granted to them. Four cities and towns are governed by special charters granted before the adoption of the present constitution which forbids such acts of incorporation. Seven cities have the commission form of government; three have adopted the city manager plan by popular election; and a few others have a city manager by ordinance. Members of the commission are elected by the voters. The city manager in cities adopting that plan by a popular vote is appointed by a commission.

All other municipalities are under the general law. They are classified according to population into cities of the first class, having over 15,000 population; cities of the second class, having from 2,000 to 15,000 population; and towns having less than 2,000 population. All these municipalities have the mayor-council form of government, both the mayor and the members of the council being elected by the voters for two-year terms. A treasurer, assessor, and park commissioners, and in some cities a police, superior, or municipal court judge, are also elected.

The council is the law-making body in municipal government and it is also the chief administrative agency. The mayor presides over the council, although he is not a member, and has the power to veto acts of the council subject to a two-thirds majority vote over his veto. He supervises municipal activities and in cities and towns which do not have a municipal, superior, or police court, he serves as police judge. He also appoints certain officers, including the marshal or chief of police, the city health officer, and members of the police and fire board. The city solicitor and clerk, and in some cases the engineer and members of the zoning board of adjustment are chosen by the council.

Taxation

Taxation is probably the most important governmental power. The present tax system in Iowa is based largely on property, sales, income, and corporation taxes, although there are taxes on inheritances, poll taxes, and sales or license taxes on gasoline, cigarettes, beer, and chain stores.

Property is assessed by township assessors elected by the people, subject to revision by local boards of review and by the state board of assessment and review. The various mill levies for state, county, school, and municipal purposes are computed by the county auditor on the assessed valuation and the tax money is paid to the county treasurer who distributes it to the proper fund. Levies for county, school, and municipal purposes are, in most cases, limited by state law.

HOW IOWA LAWS ARE MADE*

THE state laws of Iowa are made by the general assembly which consists of two houses—the senate and the house of representatives. Members of the senate (50 in number) are elected by the people for terms of four years, approximately half being elected at each biennial election; representatives (108 in number) are elected for two year terms.

In general the procedure of “making” a law involves: (1) a demand for legislation; (2) the drafting of a bill which presents the desired legislation in a form to be presented to the general assembly; (3) the passage of this bill by the two branches of the general assembly; and (4) the approval of the act by the governor.

A demand for new laws or for the amendment or repeal of statutes already enacted is usually due to changes in economic conditions or to the development of new social standards or attitudes. Laws are often proposed with the intent of improving administrative procedure. There may be an almost general agreement that certain changes should be made but more often public opinion is indifferent or uncertain until a bill is drafted and debate begins. Occasionally the question of the adoption of a proposed law becomes a campaign issue. In any case, proposed changes are usually sponsored and supported by interested groups, societies, organizations, or institutions. The motive may be an entirely unselfish interest in the public welfare or it may, on the other hand, be a desire for some advantage to individuals or groups to be benefited.

Before it is presented to the general assembly, the proposed legislation must be put in the form of a bill (in a few cases joint resolutions are used). This bill may be drafted by the senator or representative who introduces it, by a group of members, by a senate or house committee, or by a committee or commission appointed by the governor or general assembly to study some problem, or it may be formulated by persons outside the general assembly. In any case the bill must be formally presented to one house or the other by a member, a group of members, or a committee of that house. No member of the general assembly is, however, required to introduce a bill when requested to do so and no one who is not a member of the general assembly may introduce a bill, not even the governor or lieutenant governor. Formerly even a member had to secure the consent of his house before he could introduce a bill; now such consent is taken for granted. In some cases identical bills, called companion bills, are introduced in both houses.

Bills, says the constitution of Iowa, may originate in either house, and may be amended, altered, or rejected by the other, and every bill having passed both houses shall be signed by the speaker of the house and the president of the senate. Furthermore the Iowa constitution provides that a bill may not become a law unless it receives the affirmative vote of a majority of all the members elected to each branch of the legislature (each house voting separately). This means that at least 26 senators and 55 representatives must vote for a bill if it is to pass. The constitution also provides that the vote on the passage of a bill must be taken immediately after the “last reading.” This vote shall be by yeas and nays and shall be recorded on the journal—the official record kept by each house.

The two houses make their own rules of procedure, subject to the constitutional provisions, and whenever a parliamentary situation is not covered by a rule, the procedure is governed by “Roberts’ Rules of Order,” as provided by statute. In the senate the usual order of business is: (1) correction of the journal; (2) presentation of petitions and memorials; (3) introduction of bills; (4) resolutions; (5) communications on the president’s table; (6) reports of standing committees; (7) reports of select committees; (8) unfinished business; (9) third reading of bills; (10) reports for indefinite postponement; and (11) general order of business. The order of business in the house, after the correction of the journal, is: (1) unfinished

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business; (2) presentation of petitions and remonstrances; (3) reports of committees; (4) resolutions laid over; (5) introduction of bills; (6) resolutions; (7) messages and communications on the speaker's table; (8) bills and resolutions read a second time; (9) bills on their passage; and (10) reports in the possession of the house.

Much of the work in the Iowa general assembly is done in the committees. The number of members on these committees varies, but the political party in control of a house almost invariably has a majority of the members of each committee and the chairman, at least in the case of the important committees, usually belongs to the dominant party. The votes in committees are not recorded and are not made public. The number of committees varies from time to time. In the Forty-seventh General Assembly the senate had forty-two standing committees and the house fifty-three. Additional committees may be created by resolutions. For the purpose of informal debate and to avoid a record vote on a measure until an agreement has been reached, the house or senate occasionally votes to act as a committee of the whole.

Suppose we visit the state capitol at Des Moines during a session of the general assembly. (It meets in regular session on the second Monday in January of each odd numbered year.) The senate sits in the south wing of the second floor; opposite it, across the rotunda, is the house of representatives. Just before the senate is called to order, we may see a secretary take typed copies of a bill to the desk of one of the senators. He looks them over, then beckons a page, and sends the papers to the desk of the presiding officer—the lieutenant governor, who serves as president of the senate. There the bill is numbered by the secretary of the senate in the order of its presentation and becomes, for example, "Senate File 92." At the next regular order of business for the introduction of bills, a copy is handed to a clerk who reads aloud its number, its title, and the name of the senator who presented it. The president then calls for the second reading. Again the clerk reads by title only. These two readings are purely perfunctory—what is left of the practice of reading each bill aloud at least three times in the early days of representative government when bills were not typed or printed for the use of legislators. (The senators know they will soon have a printed copy of the bill.)

After this formality the president refers the bill, now known as "Senate File 92," to one of the senate committees. The original copy of "Senate File 92" is enclosed in a paper wrapper (the senate and house use different colors for these) on which are blanks for recording the various actions taken on the bill. In the senate this record is kept by the secretary (in the house by the chief clerk). When the bill goes to the committee, the secretary gives the original copy to the chairman of the committee, taking a receipt for it.

A copy of the bill is then sent to the printer and on the following day, a printed copy of "Senate File 92" will be on the desk of each senator. Such copies are kept in a loose-leaf file furnished to each legislator. At the upper right hand corner of the printed copy is the number (Senate File 92) and the name of the senator who introduced it. On the left are the committee to which the bill was referred and the date of introduction. Below are the words "A bill for an act" followed by a brief statement indicating its purpose and content—usually referred to as the title of the bill. According to the Iowa constitution every act shall embrace but one subject, and matters properly connected therewith, and any subject included in a law which is not "expressed" in the title is null and void. The title is, therefore, an important part of a bill, although it is not legally a part of the law after it is enacted.

Some bills (now comparatively few) contain preambles, usually short explanations of the conditions which, in the opinion of the person who drafted the bill, explain why the proposed law is needed. Then comes the enacting clause prescribed by the constitution for the enactment of legislation—"Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Iowa"—followed by the main part of the bill—the proposed law. This part of a bill is usually

divided into sections and all lines are numbered by section to facilitate the designation of changes made by amendments.

After the original bill has been handed to the proper committee chairman and the printed copies are on the desks of the senators, nothing may be heard of "Senate File 92" for several days or weeks. Indeed, bills frequently remain in the hands of a committee until adjournment, never getting any consideration on the floor. While the committee considers "Senate File 92," other senators may file motions to amend it, but these will not be discussed until the bill itself is up for action.

The Enactment of a Law

Any number of complications may develop during the consideration of a bill, but let us assume that "Senate File 92" is enacted into law in the simplest manner possible. Suppose the committee (perhaps the committee on highways) has eleven members. A majority of this committee, we will say, decides that the bill should be passed. At the proper time the chairman of the committee on highways makes the report, recommending that "the bill do pass." "Senate File 92" is then placed on the senate calendar (a list giving the order in which bills are to be considered) and when its turn comes (or it is called up by special arrangement) it is before the senate for debate and finally for the decisive vote.

In the old days a bill was engrossed—rewritten to incorporate any changes made—and was then given a final reading from the engrossed copy. In both the house and senate the rules now provide that a bill is to be considered engrossed when it is ordered to its third reading, unless there is an affirmative vote for its engrossment. At the present time both engrossment and the third, or final, reading are more or less vague formalities. Occasionally a clerk does read a bill, but for the most part printing and typing have displaced the voice of the clerk. According to the constitution the vote on a bill must follow immediately after the last reading, but the rules provide that certain corrections may be made. On the final vote the names of the senators are called in alphabetical order and each one votes "aye" or "no" as his name is called.

The vote on "Senate File 92" is, we will assume, favorable—26 to 21, with 3 senators absent—and the bill has passed the senate. The secretary signs it and endorses on the record the date of passage. "Senate File 92" is now ready for consideration by the house to which it is sent by a messenger. Here it is not renumbered, but as "Senate File 92" it is given to the chief clerk, and at the proper time it is read twice by title and referred by the speaker of the house to a committee. Let us assume that this committee also reports favorably on "Senate File 92" and it comes before the house for a final vote. An electric voting device, operated from the desks of the representatives, is used to record the votes, a red light opposite a member's name indicating "no," while a green light shows that the member favors the measure. Let us assume that the lights indicate a favorable vote of 60 to 40 (with 8 absent or not voting) and "Senate File 92" has passed the house without change.

The act is then enrolled—copied in its final form—by the enrolling clerk of the senate (this being a senate bill) and the enrolled act is examined by a joint committee on enrolled bills. When it is reported correctly enrolled, "Senate File 92" is signed by the president of the senate and the speaker of the house. In the enrolled bill the words "A bill for" are omitted so the introduction now reads only "An act" etc. The enrollment of a bill is very important in case of dispute over the meaning of a law, since the supreme court, at least until very recently, considered the enrolled bill as conclusive evidence of legislative action.

After "Senate File 92" is correctly enrolled and signed by the two presiding officers, it is sent to the governor's office for his signature. If he approves it, he signs it and notifies the senate—the house in which it originated. Thus does the bill become part of the law of Iowa. The official copy of "Senate File 92" is then sent to the office of the secretary of

state to await publication. Under ordinary procedure the law enacted from "Senate File 92" would go into effect on the following July 4th, but many bills now have publication clauses which provide that the act shall go into effect immediately following its publication in two designated newspapers. In any case "Senate File 92" will appear in a printed volume of the laws enacted at that session and will soon lose its identity in a new chapter number, later perhaps to become a section or sections of the Code.

The procedure in the case of a house bill would have been similar except that the order of consideration by the two houses would have been reversed. Few bills, however, have careers so simple or so favorable. Only about one-third of the bills introduced at any recent session of the Iowa general assembly are enacted into law, and many of those passed are amended and revised almost beyond recognition. What happens to all these bills as they are ground through the legislative mill?

Amendments

A bill may be amended in either house. Let us suppose that the committee on highways, to which "Senate File 92" is referred, believes that certain changes should be made in the original bill before it is adopted and so recommends in its report. Amendments may also be made on the floor of the senate. Such amendments may be incorporated in "Senate File 92" by a majority vote of those present (providing there is a quorum), but the bill on its final vote must have a constitutional majority—at least 26 in the senate (55 in the house).

After "Senate File 92" (as amended by the senate) goes to the house, it may be passed as it came from the senate or it may be amended in the house before it is passed. If the house amends the bill it must be returned to the senate where a vote is taken as to whether the senate will concur in the house amendment or amendments. If the motion to concur prevails, "Senate File 92" as amended is again placed upon its passage. If adopted it is enrolled, signed, and submitted to the governor.

The senate may, however, refuse to concur in the house amendment. In this case "Senate File 92" would be sent back to the house where a motion to recede from the amendment or a motion to insist on the amendment might be made, a motion to recede taking precedence over a motion to insist. If the house votes to recede from its amendment by the required constitutional majority, the bill is passed, is enrolled in the senate, signed, and sent to the governor. A vote to insist on an amendment, defeated by a constitutional majority, is equivalent to a vote to recede.

If the house votes to insist on its amendment, it requests a conference committee, made up of four members from each house (unless otherwise specified), appointed by the presiding officers. This conference committee is really two committees acting as one for the members from each house vote separately and a majority of each group must agree to amendments proposed. It attempts to formulate some compromise on the disputed amendment or amendments acceptable to a majority in both the senate and the house.

Since the supreme court ruled (in the case involving the salary reduction act adopted in 1933) that the adoption of the report of a conference committee does not satisfy the constitutional requirement that both houses must adopt an act in exactly the same form, the general assembly has prescribed a definite rule of procedure. A report of a conference committee may be adopted or rejected, but it can not be changed. If it is rejected in either house, a new committee may be appointed or the bill may be dropped. When the report of the conference committee is approved, the bill as amended by this report is again put on its passage, but neither debate nor amendment are permitted. If the vote in both houses is favorable, the bill is adopted.

The senate may, however, decide to make an amendment to the house amendment and such a motion, if made, takes precedence over a motion to concur. If this compromise amendment is adopted by the required con-

stitutional majority, the bill goes back to the house where the amendment may be agreed to and the bill passed. If the house refuses to agree to the compromise amendment and the senate still refuses to accept the house amendment or to recede from its compromise amendment, a conference committee is necessary. These complications merely illustrate the tangle which may develop over the enactment of disputed legislation. Motions to lay on the table or to postpone indefinitely may not be used in respect to motions to recede or to insist on amendments or motions to amend bills which have passed both houses.

Defeat

A majority of the bills introduced in the Iowa general assembly are, however, neither adopted as introduced nor passed after amendment: they fail of enactment in one way or another. Many of these bills are never reported out by the committees to which they are referred. Bills are seldom called from committees and a majority of a committee may, therefore, hold a bill indefinitely and thus prevent a vote. Sometimes the chairman does not even call for a committee vote on a bill. Since the speaker of the house and the president of the senate appoint the committees and committee chairmen and also refer bills to these committees, it is evident that these officers can do much to help or hinder the passage of a bill by referring it to a favorable or unfavorable committee.

If a committee does decide to report a bill it may do so with various recommendations—that it pass, that it be amended and passed, that it do not pass, or that it be indefinitely postponed. Usually, however, a committee prefers to hold a bill it does not want passed. When a bill is reported out from a committee it is put on the calendar—the list of bills to be acted on by the house or senate as the case may be. Although it might be expected that bills will receive consideration in turn, it frequently happens that some are left on the calendar throughout the session and thus fail of enactment. A few bills are withdrawn by their sponsors. Others are voted on but fail to receive a constitutional majority in one house or the other. Many bills are indefinitely postponed—a decision which, under the present rules of the house prevents further consideration and in both houses is equivalent to an outright rejection. An amendment striking out the enacting clause may also be adopted. Without its enacting clause a bill can not become law. In case of disagreement between the two houses, action on a bill may be suspended and the act fail of adoption even though it has (in different forms) passed both houses. Bills not otherwise disposed of by the house or senate are often referred to the sifting committee and die there.

The Sifting Committee

Toward the end of the session it is customary for both houses to appoint a "sifting" committee, to which are referred all bills not yet acted upon, except appropriation bills and certain other measures specified by the resolution providing for the committee.

At present, sifting committees are created by the rules of the house and senate and whenever the members of either house agree that such a committee should begin to function, the members of that committee are appointed by the speaker of the house and the president of the senate, as the case may be. Although measures referred to a sifting committee may be recalled by the house or senate, such action is seldom taken and the sifting committee has a decisive influence as to which bills are passed, amended, or defeated in the final days of the session. Occasionally the work of sifting out the bills to be acted upon is given to some other committee.

Tie Votes

The Iowa constitution requires that all laws passed by the general assembly must receive the affirmative vote of a majority of those elected

to each house. A tie in the case of the final vote on a bill in either the senate or the house would, therefore, defeat the measure and it would do no good to break the tie. In deciding many other questions, however, a tie vote may occur and the right to decide such a tie may be important.

The president of the senate is not a member and he votes only in case of a tie. He can thus decide votes on which the senate is equally divided, except in the case of a final vote on an act, on which a majority vote is required. The speaker of the house, being a member of the body over which he presides, may vote in all cases where the yeas and nays are called for, his name being called last. In other cases the speaker votes only when the house is equally divided or to make a tie. If his vote makes a tie, the motion is lost.

Reconsideration

Even after action is taken on a bill, some one who voted on the prevailing side (perhaps with this in mind) may move that the vote be reconsidered. Motions to reconsider a vote must be made on the day of the vote or the next legislative day and must have a constitutional majority in order to pass. To clinch a vote on a measure, a motion to reconsider the vote is often made, with the additional provision that the motion to reconsider be laid on the table. The rules of the Iowa senate specifically require a two-thirds vote to take a motion from the table and in the house the same rule applies because that body uses "Roberts' Rules of Order" to cover this particular procedure.

Resolutions

In Iowa proposed legislation which relates to the general policy of the state, ratification of amendments to the United States constitution, and some other similar matters, is put in the form of joint resolutions, which begin "Be it resolved by the general assembly of the state of Iowa." The rules of the Iowa general assembly make the procedure in handling joint resolutions in the senate and the house exactly the same as for bills. Joint resolutions proposing amendments to the state constitution and those ratifying amendments to the United States constitution do not require the signature of the governor, although they are usually signed by him.

Most of the legislation in the Iowa general assembly is presented in the form of bills. The average number of bills presented in the senate and house of the forty-second, forty-third, forty-fourth, and forty-fifth general assemblies was 973 per session; the average number of joint resolutions introduced per session was 16.

The senate or the house of representatives may adopt a simple resolution by a majority vote of those present. Such resolutions are used only to express some sentiment or to take care of routine matters which concern that one house only. Matters which primarily concern the organization of the general assembly, such as fixing the date of recess or adjournment, or expressing the sentiment of the legislature, are frequently presented in the form of concurrent resolutions. These resolutions are not laws. They may be adopted by a majority vote of those present and voting, but do not require a constitutional majority, and are not sent to the governor.

The Governor's Part in Law-Making

The governor is the chief executive officer of the state, but he has also a considerable share in the responsibility of making the laws. The increasing complexity of government and the increased importance of administrative functions have emphasized the importance of political leadership. This leadership is one of the duties of the governor and in his message to the general assembly and by his advice he may do much to secure the legislation he approves or prevent the adoption of what he considers undesirable laws.

An act which has passed both houses of the general assembly and has been properly enrolled and signed by the presiding officers of the two houses it still not law; it must go to the governor. The constitution prescribes the governor's duties in this matter. If he approves a bill sent to him by the general assembly, he signs it and thereby makes it a law.

If the governor does not approve an act, he may return it to the house in which it originated with a message stating his objections—that is veto it. In Iowa the governor may not approve one part of a bill and veto an objectionable section.

Whenever the governor vetoes a bill and returns it to the house in which it originated, his objections are entered on the journal and the bill is reconsidered. If, after such reconsideration in both houses, the bill receives a two-thirds majority vote—34 in the senate and 72 in the house—it becomes a law without the governor's approval. If the necessary two-thirds majority can not be secured, a vetoed bill fails to become law. The general assembly of the state of Iowa has not so far passed a bill over the governor's veto.

Any bill kept by the governor longer than three days (Sundays excepted) without his signature becomes a law automatically unless the general assembly adjourns before the three days elapse and thus prevents the return of the bill. All bills submitted to the governor during the last three days must be deposited by him in the office of the secretary of state, with his signature, if he approves them, and with his objections, if he does not approve them. Such bills, if not signed by the governor, do not become law.

The Attorney General

Although the attorney general has no part in making laws, he is the official legal adviser of state officials and is frequently called upon for an opinion as to whether certain acts are constitutional. Sometimes he is asked for his opinion during the formulation and passage of a law; more often he is consulted after the law has been adopted. In either case the opinion of the attorney general is advisory and his ruling that a law is unconstitutional or otherwise invalid does not of itself render the law inoperative.

Judicial Decisions and Interpretations

After laws have been adopted and are on the statute books, they must meet at least four possible challenges: they must not contain provisions contrary to the constitution of the United States or the constitution of Iowa; they must not conflict with laws and treaties of the United States; and they must have been legally enacted. The supreme court of Iowa may declare an Iowa law invalid for any of these reasons. In Iowa the state supreme court does not render advisory opinions and decisions are given only on cases brought before the court. Federal courts may decide cases involving the United States constitution and United States laws and treaties and other cases involving the state of Iowa and another state or the citizens of another state, a citizen of Iowa and a citizen of another state, or a citizen of Iowa and any other state. Usually the United States court follows the state supreme court in deciding whether or not a law conflicts with the state constitution.

In deciding whether or not Iowa laws have been legally adopted, the Iowa supreme court has until recently relied to a large extent on the enrolled bill signed by the presiding officers of both houses. In the decision made in 1934 concerning the salary reduction act the state court, however, went back of the enrolled bill and decided that the senate and house had not taken a final vote on exactly the same bill and that the law was, therefore, invalid.

Comparatively few laws are declared null and void by the courts, but there is constant demand for interpretation of laws. Just what does a law

mean? How is it to be applied to a certain case? Does it conflict with another statute and if so which one is to be followed? All these questions are constantly asked in the courts. Indeed a large part of the litigation in this state, as in other states, is an attempt to interpret the meaning of laws and to determine how they are to be applied.

It is impossible, in a short sketch of this kind, to give all the details of the making of laws. For a detailed study of law-making in Iowa, the reader is referred to *Statute Law-Making in Iowa*, published in 1916 by the State Historical Society of Iowa as Volume III of the Iowa Applied History Series.

THE STATE CAPITOL

THE capitol building was dedicated in January, 1884. On the main floor are located the supreme court rooms, the offices of the governor, secretary of state, auditor of state, treasurer of state, secretary of agriculture, attorney general, and superintendent of public instruction.

The offices on the first floor or basement floor of the state house are: adjutant general, custodian, G. A. R., motor vehicle department, real estate, post office, comptroller, banking department, cigarette tax department, mine inspectors, secretary of the executive council, state veterinarian, and the state fair board.

The house and senate chambers are on the second floor, as well as two departments of the state library, the printing board, pharmacy commission, and code editor.

On the balcony or third floor are located the bureau of investigation, department of vocational education, department of health engineer, barber examiners, cosmetology examiners, chiropractor examiners, nurses' examining board, and the telephone exchange.

Other Buildings

Departments of the state government are located in other buildings outside the main capitol building. In the old Amos Hiatt high school building southeast of the main building are located the board of control, commerce commission, state architect, bonus board, commerce counsel, commission for the blind, and the graves registration bureau.

In the state historical building on the north side of Grand avenue are located the offices of the library commission and the state librarian, the historical department and the curator, newspaper collection, historical library, general library, medical library, and the archives department.

Just north of the state house, across Grand avenue, is the document storage building, where official reports and documents are stored. The shipping and mailing department of the printing board is also located in this building.

At the rear is the heating plant and the carpenter shop, and just to the north of these is the printing board warehouse, the paint shop, and garages.

Just east of the warehouse and facing on Des Moines street is the old governors' mansion, containing the offices of the board of health.

Just west of the garage and facing on Des Moines street is a building known as "The flats," where the offices of the board of education and the industrial commission are located.

In the old Bryant school building west of the state house on Grand avenue are located the bureau of labor, bureau of re-employment, fire marshal, state chemist and horticultural society.

Historical Building

The historical, memorial and art building is 260 by 110 feet in size and was commenced in 1899, at first as a home for the Aldrich collection of historical matter. It is occupied by the historical department, two departments of the state library, and the library commission.

The historical department has a large library of history and genealogy, a famous collection of autographs and photographs, many valuable historical relics, and antiquities, a vast natural history museum, a gallery of portraits of distinguished Iowa persons, a Civil war collection, portraits and information regarding Iowa boys who died in the World war, the public archives, and Iowa newspaper collection.

Decorations in Capitol Building

Over the main stairway at the east end is the large painting entitled "Westward," the work of Edwin H. Blashfield of New York, and this was placed at a cost of \$10,000. It is regarded as one of the notable American

decorative pictures. It shows a pioneer group traveling from the eastern fields of plenty to the far away lands of the west to make new homes.

Above the large picture are six mosaics, designed by Frederick Dielman of New York, and were made in Venice. The colors are worked out in colored stone pieces and are indestructible. The subjects represented are Defense, Charities, the Executive, the Legislative, the Judiciary, and Education. These cost the state \$10,000. They are among the finest and largest in America.

The largest reproduced or enlarged photograph in the world hangs in the south corridor of the main floor. This picture of the 168th infantry assembled on the capitol grounds upon its return from the World war, is twenty-six feet long and six feet high.

The twelve statues high within the rotunda represent History, Science, Law, Fame, Art, Industry, Peace, Commerce, Agriculture, Victory, Truth, Justice.

The eight lunettes, or half-moon shaped paintings surrounding the rotunda, are the work of Kenyon Cox, famous American artist, who was paid \$8,000 for the same. They are entitled by the artist: Hunting, Herding, Agriculture, The Forge, Commerce, Education, Science, Art. They are allegorical and indicate the progress of civilization.

Monuments and Memorials

The soldiers' and sailors' monument, erected by authority of an act of the twenty-fourth general assembly, approved April 7, 1892, is 145 feet high and cost \$150,000. It was designed by Harriet A. Ketcham, of Mount Pleasant.

The Allison memorial, near by, was constructed in honor of the late Senator W. B. Allison, of Dubuque, and is a fine work of art.

The battle flags of Iowa regiments in the Civil war and in the Spanish-American war are preserved in niches in the rotunda of the capitol.

The monument west of the capitol on Ninth street represents "the Pioneers." It is cast in bronze.

The old guns located on the grounds were taken in the Spanish-American war. The bronze gun in front of the historical building was taken from a Spanish gun ship.

Just east of the state house is a monument honoring the Iowa citizens who served in the army, navy or marine corps during the China relief expedition, the war with Spain or the Philippine insurrection.

At the southeast corner of the grounds, near the flag pole, is a tablet which marks the grave of Wilson Alexander Scott, who gave to the state the land upon which the capitol now stands. The tablet bears the following inscription:

WILSON ALEXANDER SCOTT

BORN IN CRAWFORD COUNTY, INDIANA, NOVEMBER 20, 1818,

HE ACQUIRED SOME FIVE HUNDRED ACRES OF LAND HEREABOUTS

AND SETTLED ON THE SITE IN 1846.

OVERWHELMED IN THE FINANCIAL CRASH OF 1857

HE DIED NEAR FORT KEARNEY, NEBRASKA TERRITORY

EN ROUTE TO PIKE'S PEAK JUNE 23, 1859.

BY HIS EXPRESSED WISH HIS BODY WAS RETURNED AND INTERRED

IN EARTH WHICH AS HIS HOMESTEAD

HAD BEEN EXEMPTED FROM SEIZURE FOR HIS DEBTS.

Filing Nomination Papers

State and national: For United States senator, representatives in congress, and all elective state offices, to be filed in the office of the secretary of state not more than sixty nor less than forty days prior to the date set for holding the primary election. (C. '35, §537.)

County: For all elective county offices, to be filed in the office of the county auditor at least thirty days prior to the date fixed for holding the primary election. (C. '35, §537.)

Township or precinct: For elective offices of a subdivision of a county to be filed with county auditor thirty days prior to the primary. (C. '35, §547.)

Cities: For elective offices in cities of over 15,000 population, except cities under a nonpartisan form of government, to be filed with the city clerk at least thirty days before primary election. (C. '35, §§639, 640.)

Cities and towns: For elective offices in cities and towns under 15,000 population, nomination is made by an organization in a convention or caucus and the certificate of nomination to be filed with the clerk not more than forty nor less than fifteen days before the election. (C. 35, §655-a14.)

Cities under commission or manager plan: For all elective offices to be filed with the city clerk at least ten days before the primary or election. (C. '35, §§6495 and 6634.)

School: For all elective offices in each independent city, town or consolidated district, shall be filed with the secretary of the school board not more than thirty nor less than ten days before the election. (C. '35, §4216-c4.)

Primary Election Dates

Municipal: The primary election the last Monday in February of the year in which general municipal elections are held. (C. '35, §641.)

Cities under commission plan: The primary election shall be held the second Tuesday preceding the general municipal election. (C. '35, §6493.)

General: "The primary election shall be held the first Monday in June in each even-numbered year. (C. '35, §533.)

Election Dates

Cities and towns: Regular city and town elections shall be held biennially on the last Monday in March. (C. 35, §5627.)

School: The regular school election shall be held annually on the second Monday in March; except in cities of over 125,000 population where the election will be held biennially on the second Monday in March of odd-numbered years. (C. '35, §4216-c1.)

General: The general election for state, district, county and township offices shall be held on the first Tuesday next after the first Monday in November of each even-numbered year. (C. '35, §504.)

Political Convention Dates

County: Each political party shall hold its county convention on the fourth Saturday following each primary election. (C. '35, §616.)

State: Each political party shall hold a state convention not earlier than the first nor later than the fifth Wednesday following the county convention. (C. '35, §634.)

Judicial: Each political party shall hold a state judicial convention not less than one nor more than two weeks after their regular state convention. (C. '35, §656.)

District: Each political party shall hold a district judicial convention in districts where judges are to be elected not earlier than the first nor later than the fifth Thursday following the county convention. (C. '35, §663.)

Presidential or special: Precinct caucuses, county conventions and state conventions of each political party are held in the years presidents are elected and usually during the months of March and April on call of the state chairmen of the political parties.

Assessments

Call by Auditor: The county auditor of each county shall before the third day of January annually issue a call to all the assessors to meet within ten days to receive such information as the auditor has to give and to receive their supplies. (Sections 7113, 7114, Code of 1935.)

Beginning: Each assessor shall enter upon the discharge of the duties of his office immediately after the second Monday of January each year. (Section 7106.)

Completion: The assessment shall be completed by the 1st day of April. (Section 7121.) The rolls shall be laid before the local board of review on or before the first Monday of April in each year for correction. In cities of 10,000 or over the rolls shall be laid before the local board of review on or before the first Monday of May each year.

Boards of Review

Townships: The township trustees shall constitute the local board of review for the township and shall meet on the first Monday of April and sit from day to day until its duties are completed, which shall be not later than the first day of May, except in townships having a population of 20,000 or

more situated within the limits of a city under special charter where the city council of said city shall be the board of review.

Cities and towns: The city or town council shall constitute the board of review for such city or town and shall meet on the first Monday of April and sit from day to day until its duties are completed which shall be no later than the first day of May, except cities having a population of 10,000 or over where such board shall meet on the first Monday of May and shall complete its duties not later than the first Monday in June. In cities of 20,000 or over, including cities under special charter, the board of review may begin on and after the first day of March each year and in cities under special charter having a population of 20,000, or more, the city council of said city shall be the board of review except that the township trustees of said township may, in the event the city council does not act as such board of review, act the same as township trustees should be in townships in which the township lines are not co-terminus with the city limits.

Raises or additions: In case the assessment of any person, partnership, corporation, or association is raised or new property is added by the board, then the clerk shall give immediate notice thereof by mail to each person, partnership, corporation or association and at the conclusion of the action of the board, the clerk shall post an alphabetical list of those whose assessments have been raised or added in a conspicuous place and the board shall hold an adjourned meeting with at least five days intervening after the posting of said notices before final action is taken on the proposed changes. (Section 7131.)

Complaints: Any person aggrieved by the action of the assessor may make an oral or written complaint to the township, city, or town board of review.

Appeals: Any party may appeal from the action of the township, city or town board of review to the district court. (Section 7133 as amended by Chapter 128—45th G. A.)

Budgets Prepared and Submitted

Preparation: All taxing districts except townships must at least twenty days prior to August 15 each year prepare a budget of anticipated expenditures and estimated amount to be raised by taxation by funds. Rural schools post budget estimate ten days before dates of hearing. Other taxing districts subject to the budget law publish their budgets in a newspaper. (C. '35, §375.)

Certification: After hearing and decision of local board, budgets are certified to the county auditor not later than August 15. (C. '35, §383.)

Submitted to state comptroller: As soon as taxes are certified by each local board have been computed by the county auditor he shall forward a copy of each budget, together with a summary of all budgets, to the state comptroller. (C. '35, §384.)

County budget: On or before December 31 each year, each county is required to appropriate in detail anticipated expenditures for every office or department for each and every purpose for which expenditures are authorized or demanded. The budget in detail must be completed and adopted by January 31 of the year to which it applies. This procedure is appropriating in detail the budget certified in August by funds. (C. '35, §§5260-c1 and c2.)

City and town budgets: Cities and towns may adopt and levy a consolidated tax when certifying their budget in August, and prior to the beginning of their next fiscal year may apportion said consolidated tax in detail to the funds embraced therein in a ratio suitable to their requirements. The consolidated plan is optional with cities and towns.

State: "On or before October first, next prior to each biennial legislative session, all departments and establishments of the government shall transmit to the state comptroller estimates of their expenditure requirements for each fiscal year of ensuing biennium * * *." (45th G. A., chs. 4, 16.)

STATE EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT**GOVERNOR**

The supreme executive power of the state is vested in the governor, whose term of office is two years.

No person is eligible who has not been a citizen of the United States and a resident of this state two years next preceding the election, and attained the age of thirty years at the time of said election.

He is commander-in-chief of the military forces of the state.

He transacts all executive business with the officers of government, civil and military, and may require information in writing from the officers of the executive department upon any subject relating to the duties of their respective offices.

The governor approves or disapproves any and all appropriations for administration, operation and maintenance.

When any office, from any cause, becomes vacant, and no mode is provided by the constitution and laws for filling such vacancy, the governor has power to fill such vacancy, by granting a commission, which expires at the end of the next session of the general assembly, or at the next election by the people.

He may on extraordinary occasions, convene the general assembly by proclamation and shall state to both houses when assembled, the purpose for which they shall have convened.

He is required to communicate, by message, to the general assembly, at every regular session, the condition of the state, and may make such recommendations to the body as he shall judge expedient.

In case of disagreement between the two houses with respect to the time of adjournment, the governor has power to adjourn the general assembly to such time as he may think proper; but no such adjournment shall be beyond the time fixed for the regular meeting of the next general assembly.

All bills must be submitted to him for approval, and a two-thirds vote of both branches of the legislature is required to pass a bill over his veto.

The governor has power to grant reprieves, commutations and pardons, after conviction, for all offenses except treason and cases of impeachment, subject to such regulations as may be provided by law. Upon conviction for treason, he has power to suspend the execution of the sentence until the case shall be reported to the general assembly at its next meeting. He has power to remit fines and forfeitures, under such regulations as may be prescribed by law; and shall report to the general assembly, at its next meeting, each case of reprieve, commutation or pardon granted, and the reason therefor.

He appoints all principal officers of the state not elected by the people, and certain officers connected with the state government, by and with the consent of the senate.

He signs patents for state lands, and appoints and commissions notaries public and commissioners in other states to take acknowledgments of deeds for this state.

He may demand fugitives from justice from the executives of other states, and may issue warrants, upon the requests of other governors, for fugitives found in this state.

LIEUTENANT GOVERNOR

The lieutenant governor is elected for a term of two years and is required to have the same qualifications, as to age and residence, as the governor.

In case of the death, impeachment, resignation, removal from office, or other disability of the governor, the powers and duties of that office devolve upon the lieutenant governor.

The lieutenant-governor is president of the senate, but can only vote when the senate is equally divided. In case of his death or other disability incapacitating him from discharging the duties of his office, the same devolve upon the president *pro tempore* of the senate.

He receives the same mileage and expense allowance as a member and double the compensation of a senator. He maintains an office at the capitol building during the meetings of the general assembly.

The Secretary of State is a constitutional official, serving as the secretarial officer of the commonwealth. The secretary also is the administrative head of various statutory departments or divisions of the department of state and, in addition, is a member of the executive council, the state board of health, the state printing board, the board of trustees of the state library and the state historical department.

The functions of a general nature of the secretary of state are to attest the official acts of the governor and to serve as custodian of the original and official documents of the state, including the constitution, the official copies of the laws of Iowa, the authenticated journals of the general assembly, official records pertaining to the nomination, election and qualification of elective state and district officials; the bonds of various elective and appointive officials, records relating to the incorporation of cities and towns and the annexation or severance of territory, documents of the state land office, articles and records of corporations operating in Iowa and registered trademarks.

The statutes make the secretary of state the administrative authority over the divisions of government having to do with corporations, securities, motor vehicles and real estate brokers and salesmen.

Articles of incorporation are filed for approval with the secretary of state, who issues authorization for corporate operations in Iowa, records corporation reports and exercises a general authority over operation of domestic and foreign corporate bodies.

The state securities laws, designed to protect the Iowa investing public through regulation of securities dealers and qualification of securities offered for sale, are administered by the secretary of state through the superintendent of securities.

The motor vehicle division of the department of state has jurisdiction over the licensing of motor vehicles and motor vehicle drivers, and the enforcement, through the state highway patrol, of the state traffic laws.

Under the real estate dealers' licensing law, the secretary of state is designated as the Iowa real estate commissioner. Brokers and salesmen are licensed annually, examinations are held for persons seeking such licenses and a real estate business code is enforced under the direct supervision of a secretary to the real estate commissioner.

AUDITOR OF STATE

The Auditor of State is a constitutional official and at least once each year, makes full settlement between the state and all state officers and departments and all persons receiving or expending state funds, and makes a complete audit of the books, records and accounts of every department of state. These departments include the office of the governor, the executive council, state comptroller, secretary of state, state treasurer, attorney general, supreme court, superintendent of printing, adjutant general, state board of control and all institutions under its control department of health, board of education and all institutions under its control, department of public instruction, department of agriculture, highway commission, liquor commission, state fair board, board of assessment and review (including sales, income, and chain-store tax divisions), board of railroad commissioners, banking department, fish and game department, state relief association, and all other departments, boards and commissions.

The auditor of state also has charge of the municipal finance department, the county accounting department, the fiscal affairs of all political subdivisions including schools and school districts, as well as having supervision of companies selling stock on the installment plan, and building and loan associations. He appoints the county examiners, the municipal and school examiners, and the examiners of building and loan associations, examining their reports, conferring and discussing with said examiners the affairs of the counties, cities, etc., as disclosed by the reports, advising, suggesting and recommending such changes in policy as he deems expedient. All reports by building and loan associations and stock companies mentioned above are made to him, and all fees, except fees for incorporation are paid to him, and all deposits required by law of any such companies or associations are deposited in the auditor's office. None of the companies or associations named can transact business in the state without a certificate of authority from the auditor of state. All offices of the 99 counties and the 1,056 school districts are examined annually, as well as all cities and all townships or municipal corporations are examined upon request.

For the purpose of examining, auditing and checking, the various departments of the state may be classified roughly into three groups, viz.: all those departments, boards and commissions located in or adjacent to the state house;

the state highway commission and the institutions under control of the board of control and the board of education; counties, cities, towns and schools.

The auditor of state submits annual and biennial reports to the governor, as well as individual audit reports. The annual reports are on municipal finances, and the biennial reports on the operations of the auditor's office, and on the state and county, and building and loan affairs, are as narrative and statistical as the auditor deems necessary, and the individual audit reports contain schedules, exhibits, comparative figures, etc.

Ex officio, the auditor of state is a member of the executive council, printing board, geological board, bonus board, and department of health.

The Treasurer of State is a constitutional official. The public revenues of the state are received and disbursed by the treasury department; a record being maintained showing the sources of all income, the funds to which such income applies, the date received and the amount received. Disbursements are made only upon warrants issued as certified by the state comptroller. A record is kept of each warrant paid, showing date of issuance, date of payment, to whom paid and against which fund such warrant is drawn.

When remittance of state revenue is made by bank draft, check or money order, such items are deposited for collection in a bank or banks in the state which have previously been duly designated and approved as depositories for state funds.

The treasurer of state, with the consent and approval of the executive council, may designate banks in the state of Iowa as depositories of state funds in amounts not exceeding the limits fixed by said council. Each bank so designated shall pay interest at the rate adjusted by the treasurer of state with the approval of the executive council, but in no event shall such rate of interest be adjusted below 1 per cent per annum on 90 per cent of the collected daily balances, payable by the bank at the end of each month.

Chapter 82, section 61.3, acts of the forty-fifth general assembly, extraordinary session, abolished the state levy on general property, and provided that on January 1, 1935, and quarterly thereafter, the board of assessment and review shall set aside and cause to be paid into the general fund of the state from the amount collected from the sales, income, and corporation taxes, a sum of not to exceed \$1,500,000.00 quarterly, which together with other state revenues expendable for such purpose, to pay all items of general expense of the state government for the current calendar year as authorized and appropriated for by the general assembly; the soldiers bonus tax fund collected by the county treasurers is drawn into the state treasury only at such times and in such amounts as is necessary to pay interest and bonds as they become due.

The treasurer of state shall maintain in the state treasury a cash balance sufficient to pay the anticipated expenditures by the highway commission for the ensuing month. When necessary to restore the cash balance in the state treasury, he shall draw against the motor vehicle funds collected by the treasurers of each county of the state in proportion to the amounts in their

possession respectively, a sum sufficient in the aggregate to restore said cash balance. Such drafts shall be honored by the treasurer of each county upon presentation.

Acts of the forty-fifth general assembly, extraordinary session, require the treasurer of state to collect from distributors a license fee of three cents per gallon on all gasoline used in the state of Iowa, except federal and state owned cars and equipment. Provision was made for the refund of the license fee paid when the gasoline was used for certain purposes. Five-ninths of the proceeds is distributed to the primary road fund, and four-ninths to the secondary road funds of the several counties of the state.

The state stamp tax, on all cigarettes, cigarette papers, wrappers and tubes sold within the state; also under the supervision of the state treasurer, is a source of revenue of no small importance; said revenue all being applied to the general fund of the state.

An important department in the office of the treasurer of state is the inheritance tax department, the administration of which pertains to the collection of inheritance taxes on estates and the revenues from which source aggregates a considerable amount.

An act of the forty-sixth general assembly provides for the issuance of permits for the manufacture and sale of and taxation of certain non-intoxicating liquor, with the provision that such fees and taxes be collected by the treasurer of state. All license fees and taxes collected by the treasurer of state shall accrue to the "state sinking fund for public deposits." This act also provides for the creation of the state permit board, composed of the treasurer of state, who is the chairman, the secretary of state and the auditor of state, whose duties shall be to review the action of any governing body in any case where a hearing has been had relative to the cancellation or revocation of a permit issued under the provisions of this chapter.

The state treasurer is the custodian of the permanent endowment fund of the State Agricultural College, which fund aggregates \$664,000.00 invested in first mortgage loans upon real estate in Iowa.

The treasurer of state also handles funds diverted under the public fund deposit guarantee acts of the forty-first general assembly, reimbursing losses of public funds which may be sustained on deposits in banks placed in receivership for liquidation.

The treasurer of state is *ex officio* treasurer of the unemployment compensation commission.

All accounts of the treasury department are audited daily by the auditor of state and examined quarterly under the direction of the governor.

The attorney general is a constitutional official and he is elected for a period of two years.

It is the duty of the attorney general to appear for the state, prosecute or

defend all actions and proceedings, civil and criminal, in which the state shall be a party or interested, when requested to do so by the governor, executive council or general assembly, or he may so appear on his own motion; and shall prosecute or defend for the state all causes in the supreme court in which the state is a party or interested.

The attorney general is given supervisory power over county attorneys and in a general way looks after the enforcement of the law over the entire state.

He shall also, when requested, give his opinion in writing upon all questions of law submitted to him by the general assembly or any state department.

It is also the duty of the attorney general to prepare drafts for contracts, forms and other writings which may be required for the use of the state, and shall at the close of each biennial period report to the governor the condition of his office, the opinions rendered and the business transacted in the office.

The attorney general is chairman of the state board of law examiners, *ex officio* a member of the state printing board, and has charge of the bureau of investigation.

The state board of law examiners was created by an act of the twenty-eighth general assembly which went into effect on the 4th day of July, 1901.

The attorney general is, by virtue of his office, chairman of the board and the other members are appointed by the supreme court.

The members of the board are paid as compensation fifteen dollars per day out of the fund arising from examination fees. The supreme court may appoint temporary examiners to serve for one examination.

Every applicant for admission to the bar must pass an examination by the board in compliance with the statutes and the rules established by the supreme court and the board. Examination fee, \$5; certificate fee, \$1; persons admitted on motion from other states, \$10.

DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE

(Office located on main floor of capitol building)

The Iowa Department of Agriculture was created by the fortieth general assembly in 1923 by consolidating several bureaus and commissions under one executive head designated as the Secretary of Agriculture. The secretary was made an elective officer and a member of the executive council.

The objects of the department are set out in the code as follows:

“1. To encourage, promote, and advance the interests of agriculture, including horticulture, live stock industry, dairying, cheese making, poultry raising, bee keeping, forestry, production of wool and other kindred and allied industries.

“2. To promote and devise methods of conducting said industries with the view of increasing production and facilitating an adequate distribution of the same at the least cost to the producer.

"3. To administer efficiently and impartially the inspection service of the state as is now or may hereafter be placed under its supervision."

Until very recent years the department gave most of its attention to the third object listed above. It could more properly have been known as a department of standards and inspection as most attention was given to enforcement of some thirty laws relating to processing and sale of food products and a few other commodities.

The trend of the department's activities now is toward a more balanced program including formation of agriculture policy and certain services to the agricultural interests of the state. One example is the administration of the unbonded warehouse act by the department under which more than sixty million dollars were loaned on sealed corn in cooperation with the federal government.

The work of the department may best be explained by setting forth the activities of the several divisions as follows:

Dairy and Food Division

John A. Feeney, Davenport, is chief of the dairy and food division and has general supervision over 32 field inspectors. These inspectors enforce the sanitary laws, weights and measures law and the labeling laws as they relate to handling, processing and sale of food. They also enforce laws relating to manufacture, processing, storage and sale of such products as live stock feed, fertilizers, gasoline, oil and paint. Others among the 31 laws enforced by the division include the grading of cream, candling of eggs and the sale of farm seeds. Mr. Feeney is assisted in his work by C. S. Bogle, chief inspector, who has direct supervision over the field inspectors.

Animal Industry Division

Dr. H. A. Seidell, Fort Dodge, chief of the division, is responsible for enforcement of laws relating to live stock disease control in the state. He is aided by a staff of nine district veterinarians.

Laws enforced by the division include those relating to the movement of livestock, T. B. eradication, Bang's disease control, hog cholera law, veterinary practice act, live stock auction sales, stallion registration and those laws governing plants for the disposal of dead animals.

State Chemist

Harry Irwin, Melcher, is state chemist. He and his four assistants have the important work of making all laboratory tests of official samples collected by the field inspectors.

State Entomologist

Dr. Carl J. Drake, Ames, by virtue of his office as head of the entomology department of Iowa State College, is also charged with the responsibility of inspecting all nursery stock sold in the state, issues quarantine regulations to prevent importation of crop pests and diseases in the state and has charge of all crop pest control work such as chinch bugs, grasshoppers and army worms.

Division of Agricultural Statistics

Leslie M. Carl is head of the division of agricultural statistics created by the forty-seventh general assembly. This division, cooperating with the United States bureau of agricultural economics, is directed to gather, compile, and publish statistical information concerning the condition and progress of crops, the production of crops, livestock, livestock products, poultry and other such related agricultural statistics, as will generally promote knowledge of the agricultural industry in the state of Iowa.

Weather Division

C. D. Reed, Des Moines, is director of the weather division. This division is operated in cooperation with the federal government in that the director's salary is paid from federal funds. Gathering and disseminating of weather statistics and phenological data are the chief functions of the weather division.

Miscellaneous Division

Homer Hush, Essex, is assistant secretary of agriculture. In addition to the preceding divisions of the department of agriculture, there are several other miscellaneous sections under the general supervision of the assistant secretary. These include the agricultural warehouse section under which farm grains are sealed and stored on the farm, farmers' institutes, short courses and poultry shows and the six affiliated societies of the department known as the Iowa state dairy association, Iowa horticultural society, Iowa horse and mule breeders association, Iowa beef producers association, Iowa corn and small grain growers association and Iowa swine breeders association.

The superintendent of public instruction, under the first constitution, from 1847 to 1857, was a constitutional rather than a statutory state officer. Under the regime of the state board of education, provided for by the new or present constitution, the office of superintendent of public instruction was abolished December 24, 1858. When the state board of education was itself abolished by the legislature in 1864, the office of superintendent of public instruction was restored as an elective state office and since that time, except for the four-year period from 1914 to 1918, when the superintendent of public instruction was appointed by the governor with the approval of two-thirds of the senate, the office has remained as an elective state office, under the provisions of section 515, C. '35.

The superintendent of public instruction is charged by section 3831 with general supervision and control over the public schools of the state, including rural, graded, high schools, and public junior colleges. In addition to the foregoing duties, the superintendent of public instruction under section 3858, C. '35, is president *ex officio* of the state board of educational examiners which has charge of the certification of teachers. Section 3838, C. '35, designates the superintendent of public instruction chairman *ex officio* of the state board for vocational education which promotes a program of vocational education and rehabilitation.

The state board of educational examiners was instituted by the nineteenth general assembly in 1882. Section 3858, C. '35, provides that the membership of the board of educational examiners shall consist of the superintendent of public instruction, who is president and executive officer of the board and four additional members appointed by the governor for a term of four years including: the president of one of the three state institutions of higher learning; the president of one of the privately endowed institutions of higher learning in the state that maintain teacher training courses; a county superintendent of schools; and a city superintendent of schools.

Section 3858-e1, C. '35, charges the board with authority to administer the statutes pertaining to the granting of all teachers' certificates except those which have to do with high school normal training. In that function it fixes the standards for teacher training courses; accredits colleges which offer teacher training courses for teachers' certificates; evaluates certificates of other states, and determines what recognition can be given them in Iowa.

The state board for vocational education was established by the thirty-seventh general assembly in an act accepting the terms of the national vocational education act commonly known as the Smith-Hughes Law.

Vocational education, as organized under the provisions of the national and state vocational education acts, includes education and training of less than college grade, the specific purpose of which is to equip boys, girls, men and women for the effective pursuit of occupations. Such training prepares those of regular school age for employment which they propose to follow. It helps those who are already employed to acquire the new skill and knowledge which progress demands of their occupations and consequently to do better work and to take advantage of opportunities for promotion. Vocational education is offered in three major fields; namely, agricultural, trade and industrial and homemaking education. Instruction in each of these three occupational fields may be offered to three age groups of individuals: the regular high school student, the student who attends school part of the time and works part of the time, and the adult worker.

In general, vocational schools and classes are organized in accordance with the needs of the persons to be trained. Usually the classes are held in local public school buildings. Under certain conditions, and when better facilities for vocational training exist elsewhere, instruction may be offered in places other than regular school buildings. However, under all circumstances the vocational work is under public supervision and control and is maintained as a

definite part of the educational program of the state. The state board for vocational education reimburses local school districts from federal funds for salaries paid to the teachers of vocational classes.

The state board for vocational education also cooperates with the proper authorities at Iowa State College at Ames in preparing teachers of the above subjects.

The state board of vocational education also cooperates with the federal government in maintaining vocational rehabilitation programs for physically disabled persons. The thirty-ninth general assembly passed an act accepting the provisions of the national rehabilitation act and designated the state board for vocational education, which had been previously created in the state's acceptance of the Smith-Hughes Act, as the state's administrative and cooperative agency. Under certain rules and regulations the rehabilitation service provides for the vocational training and placement of physically handicapped persons 16 years of age or over with the exception of those coming directly under the training program maintained by the federal government for persons disabled as a result of enlisted service in the army or navy.

In 1878, the seventeenth general assembly created a board of railroad commissioners consisting of three members to be appointed by the governor and confirmed by the executive council. In 1888, the twenty-second general assembly passed a law making the commissioners elective. In 1937, the forty-seventh general assembly, by house file 133, changed the name from "board of railroad commissioners" to "Iowa state commerce commission."

The powers and duties of the Iowa state commerce commission are: To generally supervise all railroads in the state, both steam and electric, except street railroads; to inquire into any neglect or violation of the laws of the state by any railroad corporation doing business therein; to make examinations and inspections of the physical condition, conduct and management of such railroads and report their condition to said companies; to stop and prevent railroad companies, under certain circumstances, from running or passing their trains over unsafe bridges; to adjudge changes in station houses, rolling stock and rates of fare; to pass on necessity for spur tracks to be constructed and maintained not exceeding three miles in length to an existing industry under

terms and conditions approved by the commission as set out by law; to make reasonable rules for the crossing of steam and interurban railways and to require, when necessary, interlocking switches at railroad crossings; to make report on first Monday in December in each year to the governor of its doings for the preceding year, accompanied with appropriate suggestions and recommendations; to receive, tabulate and report upon the annual reports filed with it by railroad companies; to examine any of the books, papers or documents of any such corporation; to examine under oath employees of such corporation; to issue subpoenas, administer oaths and compel the attendance of witnesses; to make and fix maximum schedules of freight rates for such corporations, such schedules to be deemed reasonable until disproved; to examine into rates in force, upon complaint that the rate charged by a railroad company, or that the maximum rates fixed by the commission are unreasonably high or discriminating, and to fix the rate again, which must not be higher than any rate established by law, such decision of the commission is prima facie evidence that the rate so made is a reasonable minimum rate; to bring suits to enforce its orders; to inquire into the management of the business of such carriers and to obtain from them full and complete information necessary to enable the commissioners to carry out the objects of the law; to hear, investigate and determine all complaints alleging unreasonable rates; unjust discrimination, undue preference, violation of the long and short haul clause, or other infractions of the commission law, and make proper orders thereupon; to establish joint through rates, upon application, over two or more connecting lines; and to have the same authority over express companies as the act confers concerning railroads.

Before a railroad company may appropriate coal, coke or oil received for shipment, it must first secure the written consent of the commerce commission.

Before any railway company may condemn lands for additional depot grounds, or for straightening or relocating track, the permission of the commission must be obtained. Interlocking switches may be placed at grade railroad crossings or draw bridges, thus obviating the necessity of stopping trains before passing over such grade crossings or draw bridges, but before the interlocking switch may be used consent of the commission must be obtained.

The thirty-fifth general assembly gave to the commission the power to grant to individuals or corporations "engaged in the manufacture, sale, or distribution for sale of electric current for light, power, or heating purposes, the right within the state, except in cities and towns, to erect and maintain poles, wires, towers, fixtures and other necessary construction for the purpose of conducting electricity for lighting, power and heating purposes, over, along and across any public land, highways or streams or the lands of any person or persons, and to acquire the necessary interests in real estate therefor." It also provided that transmission lines proceeding under the provisions of the law should be subject to "such reasonable regulations as the commission may from time to time prescribe."

The commission is directed by an act of the thirty-ninth general assembly to "undertake and carry forward such investigation and preparation as shall be necessary to properly represent the interests of the state in connection with the valuation of the property of common carriers now being conducted by the interstate commerce commission."

An act of the forty-sixth general assembly provides that operators of grain elevators must be licensed in order to receive grain for storage. It also makes provisions for using warehouse receipts issued by the warehouseman on his own products and on products for others as collateral for financing loans. The act also provides for storage of other agricultural products in warehouses of types different to that of grain elevators which covers such products as wool, canned goods, sugar, etc.

The fortieth general assembly conferred on the commission the power to issue certificates authorizing motor carriers to operate over the public highways of the state, upon a showing that the proposed service would promote "the public convenience" and authorized the board to prescribe rules and regulations for the operation of motor vehicles used by such carriers "for the

protection and safety of the public." The forty-first general assembly revised the laws on this subject, but left their administration with the railroad commission.

The forty-third general assembly provided for the supervision or regulation by the commission of persons operating motor trucks principally used for the public transportation of freight for compensation, not operating over regular routes nor between fixed termini. It also provided that the cost of regulating truck operators and motor carriers and the maintenance of the motor carrier department be paid from fees and taxes collected from such carriers.

Under the act of the forty-third general assembly before an airport is acquired by any city or town plans and specifications must be approved by the board.

The forty-fourth general assembly provided that pipe lines shall be subject to regulation by the board under a permit issued by the board.

COMMERCE COUNSEL

The thirty-fourth general assembly created the office of commerce counsel, to be appointed by the Iowa state commerce commission for a term of four years, subject to confirmation by senate. The law provides that the counsel may appoint assistants, subject to the approval of the commissioners.

The duties of the office briefly are as follows: legal advisor of state commerce commissioners; investigate and present matters with reference to interstate rates to board, prosecute same before said board, or before any court to which same may be taken; investigate on his own motion, or at request of board, all matters involving interstate rates in which the people of Iowa are interested, and present same to interstate commerce commission and prosecute same to final determination; act as attorney for and represent board in all courts of this state or of the United States, in which the validity of any order of said board is in issue; to institute and prosecute in any of the courts any and all suits necessary to proper enforcement of any rule or order of said Iowa state commerce commission or make defense therein wherever said rule or order may be called in question.

The executive council was created by the adoption of the code of 1860. The secretary of state acted as secretary of the council until the enactment of the code of 1897 which provided for a secretary.

Among the duties placed upon the executive council by the laws of Iowa, are the following: to purchase all stores, supplies and furniture for state departments and officers; the execution of contracts for fuel, lights, repairs; the approval of articles of incorporation and by-laws of building and loan associations, and plan for liquidation of said associations; the custody of supplies for state officers and commissions; the canvass of votes cast for state and district officers; the declaration of changes in classification of cities; the assignment of office rooms to state officers; the appointment of the board of examiners of mine inspectors; approval for the repayment of inheritance taxes when wrongfully paid; the approval of plans for buildings at the state educational institutions, under certain conditions; and the determination of the value at which property may be taken by Iowa corporations and the

amount of stock which may be issued on account thereof. The secretary of the executive council is also secretary of the conservation commission and of the board of engineering examiners.

It is the duty of the custodian, except as otherwise provided by law: To have charge of, preserve and adequately protect the state capitol and grounds, and all other state grounds and buildings at the seat of government, and all property connected therewith or used therein or thereon; to see that all parts and apartments of said buildings are properly ventilated and kept clean and in order; to see that all visitors, at proper hours, are properly escorted over said grounds and through said buildings, free of expense; to have at all times, charge of and supervision over the police, janitors, and other employees of his department in and about the capitol and other state buildings at the seat of government; to institute in the name of the state, and with the advice and consent of the attorney general, civil and criminal proceedings against any person for injury or threatened injury to any public property under his control; and to keep plans and surveys of the public grounds, buildings and underground constructions at the seat of government; to perform all duties required by law or order of the executive council.

The custodian shall, on or before September thirtieth preceding each regular session of the general assembly, make a verified report to the executive council which shall cover all transactions for the preceding biennial period.

The board of control of state institutions was created under the provisions of chapter 118, laws of the twenty-seventh general assembly, which, with the amendments thereto, clothes the board with full power to manage, control and govern, subject only to the limitations contained in the act, the institutions under its management.

The board of control was organized on April 6, 1898, and took full control, as provided by statute, on July 1, 1898, of the institutions subject to its control.

The board is required to inspect county and private institutions in which insane persons are kept.

The board is required to investigate the management and financial condition of the state institutions under its control, to determine questions as to the sanity of patients in state hospitals, and to determine when persons shall be admitted to them as state charges, and is required to divide the state into hospital districts. It is required to make biennial reports to the governor and legislature showing the cost of operating the institutions for the preceding two years and to visit all institutions twice each year. Some member of the

board or its agent is required to visit each hospital for insane once each month. The board is required to meet the superintendents and other heads of institutions in quarterly conferences, to gather statistics, to publish a bulletin, to require officials' bonds of certain institution officers, to make a semi-annual invoice of all the stores of the institutions, to fix annually the salaries of officers and employees not fixed by law, and to perform other duties provided by law. STATE COMPTROLLER

The office of State Comptroller was created by senate file 470, an act of the forty-fifth general assembly known as the "Budget and Financial Control Act." It is now chapter 7-E1 of the code. The office of state comptroller is under the general direction, supervision and control of the governor. He is appointed by the governor, with the approval of two-thirds of the senate, and shall hold office at his pleasure. He is required to give a surety bond in such penalty as may be fixed by the governor, but in an amount not less than twenty-five thousand dollars conditioned upon the faithful discharge of his duties.

The state comptroller audits all demands by the state and preaudits all accounts submitted for the issuance of state warrants; controls the payment of all moneys into the state treasury and all payments from the state treasury; prescribes all accounting and business forms and the system of accounts and reports of financial transactions by all departments and agencies of the state government other than those of the legislative branch; keeps a central budget and proprietary control accounts of the state government; establishes a reasonable cash revolving fund for each department or institution for disbursement purposes where needed; has the custody of all books, papers, records, documents, conveyances, leases and other documents appertaining to the fiscal affairs and property of the state which are not required to be kept in some other office; apportions the interest of the permanent school fund; prepares

biennially a list of all standing appropriations and furnishes a report of same to each member of the legislature; prepares the budget document and drafts the legislation to make it effective; reviews requests for allotments as are submitted to the governor for approval; determines the need for all transfers of appropriations submitted to the governor; makes such investigations of the organizations, activities and methods of procedure of the several departments and establishments as he may be called upon to make by the governor and executive council of the legislature; furnishes any committee of either house of the legislature having jurisdiction over revenues or appropriations such aid and information regarding financial affairs of the government as it may request; prepares and submits to the governor and the legislature on or before December 15 of each year, an annual report, setting forth in detail and in summary form the financial condition and operations of the government; and prepares such other reports as the governor or the general assembly may from time to time require of him.

Local Budget

Chapter twenty-four (24) of the code known as the "Local Budget Law" was amended by senate file 89, acts of the forty-seventh general assembly, by creating a state board of appeal composed of the state comptroller, auditor of state and treasurer of state with authority to review certain budgets of proposed expenditures and tax levies. The law was further amended by substituting "State Board" wherever the word "Comptroller" appears in chapter twenty-four (24).

The state board, through the office of state comptroller, is charged with the duty of administering the local budget law. It involves a certain amount of supervision over the preparation of the budgets of local subdivisions and in planning and adjusting their expenditures according to their needs and funds available. The state comptroller (state board) is authorized to approve the transfer of funds of local taxing districts upon a showing of necessity. These duties necessarily require many conferences with public officials.

Public Contracts and Bonds

Under this law the state comptroller is called upon to decide questions relating to public contracts and bonds and to advise public officials regarding expenditures of public money for improvements and financing same by the issuance of bonds when necessary. When appeals are filed with him by the requisite number of taxpayers, his approval is necessary before the local board can proceed with the proposed improvement or bond issue.

The state comptroller is a member of the state appeal board, which body handles appeals of taxpayers in connection with certain improvements by the state government.

The board of parole was established in 1907 by the thirty-second general assembly and the statutes of Iowa provide the sentence of a prisoner convicted of a felony shall be for the maximum term provided for the crime committed, thus leaving to the court imposing the sentence no discretion as to the time of confinement. The board of parole is given authority to release on parole either within or without the state of Iowa, all prisoners, except those sentenced for life terms. Parole rules are provided which must be observed by the man while on parole, and for the violation of which he may be remanded to prison.

The state board of assessment and review was created by act of the forty-third general assembly in 1929 for the purpose of bringing about a more equitable assessment of property in the state of Iowa, and with the idea in mind that gross unfairness existed in the apportionment of the tax burden to the taxpayers.

It was given very broad general powers, its duties as fixed by law not only including a supervision of the assessment of all property in the state but also that of studying and investigating all matters pertaining to the improvement of the state's revenue system.

The board was organized on July 15th, of 1929, and has been functioning since that time.

Under the law this board exercises general supervision of the tax laws, of boards of supervisors and other officers and boards in matters pertaining to assessment and taxation; it has power to order re-assessments, to prescribe and promulgate books and forms; to confer with, advise and direct those obligated by law to make levies and assessments as to their duties under the law; to require information from taxing districts as to assessment of property and collection of taxes; to hold public hearings with safeguards as to evidence there produced; to cause depositions to be taken within or without the state; to investigate the work and methods of local boards of review, boards of supervisors and other officers in tax matters; to require boards of review to make such orders as this board determines are just and necessary; to direct and order any board to raise or lower the valuation of property, real or personal; to direct the county boards of equalization to raise or lower the valuation of any class or classes of property; to examine into alleged evasion or violation of the law for assessment and taxation; to ascertain wherein existing laws are defective or are improperly or negligently administered, and cause remedial proceedings to be instituted in such cases; to make a summary of the tax situation in the state; to formulate and recommend legislation for the better administration of the fiscal laws so as to secure just and equal taxation; to recommend such additions and changes in the present system of taxation that in its judgment is for the best interests of the state and will eliminate the necessity of any millage levy for state purposes; to transmit biennially to the governor and to each member and member-elect of the legislature, thirty days before the meeting of the legislature, the report of the board, covering the subject of assessment and taxation, the result of the investigation of the board, its recommendations for improvement in the system of taxation in the state, together with such measures as may be formulated for the consideration of the legislature; to publish the revenue laws of the state and distribute them as prescribed; to procure information pertaining to the discovery of property subject to taxation; to call upon any state department for technical advice and data which may be of value in connection with the work of assessment and taxation; to certify to the auditor of state on January first of each year the aggregate

of each state tax for each county for said years; all former powers and duties of the state executive council as a board of review, as to valuations, levies and assessments, and determination of tax rates for state purposes are now vested in the state board of assessment and review, as are the former principal powers and duties of the auditor of state with relation to the assessment and collection of taxes.

Assessment of Utilities

Another highly important duty delegated to this board since its original grant of powers by the legislature has to do with the listing and assessment of privately owned utilities. This board is now required to list and assess for tax purposes privately owned property of:

Tax Revision Act

The special session of the forty-fifth general assembly enacted a law which had for its declared purpose the equalization and replacement in part of the tax on property.

Section 2 of the act provides as follows:

"Purpose or object. This act shall be known as the 'property relief act,' and shall have for its purpose the direct replacement of taxes already levied or to be levied on property to the extent of the net revenue obtained from the taxes imposed herein, which shall be apportioned back to the credit of individual taxpayers on the basis of the assessed valuation of taxable property as provided in division VI of this act."

The law provides for a personal net income tax, a business tax on corporations, and for a tax on the gross receipts from retail sales, and further provides for the collection of such taxes, the distribution and use of the revenues derived therefrom, and the administration of the law.

The forty-seventh general assembly re-enacted the "retail sales tax act," and in addition passed what is known as the "personal property use tax act," and also an income tax on earnings of non-residents. The board is charged with the administration of all these laws.

Chain Store Tax

The forty-sixth general assembly passed what is known as the "Chain store tax act of 1935," which places graduated unit tax upon all systems of chain stores operated in the state, and also imposed a graduated tax upon the gross income of chain stores operated within the state. This law became effective on July 1, 1935. The graduated gross income tax is no longer in force, having been held unconstitutional by the supreme court of the United States.

The chain store tax now in effect is administered by this board.

IOWA STATE HIGHWAY COMMISSION

The first law creating a state highway commission in Iowa was adopted by the general assembly in 1904. That law simply stated that the Iowa State College should act as a state highway commission. Acting under said law, the state board of education appointed Dean Anson Marston of the engineering division, and Dean Chas. F. Curtiss of the agricultural department, of Iowa State College, as the directors of the commission. Mr. Thomas H. MacDonald, now chief of the U. S. bureau of public roads, was appointed by the directors as secretary and engineer for the commission. The duties of the commission at that time were to make investigations and studies of highway conditions and to advise with local authorities with respect to highway improvements.

This organization continued until 1913, when the thirty-fifth general assembly passed an act creating a state highway commission of three members and separated said commission from the Iowa State College.

In 1927 the general assembly passed an act which now appears as chapter 238 of the code of 1935 creating a state highway commission of five members, all to be appointed by the governor, not more than three of whom could be from the same political party.

The law of 1927 placed the primary road system under the direct control and supervision of the state highway commission. Mr. Thomas H. MacDonald, who became secretary and engineer of the highway commission in 1904, was designated as chief engineer of the highway commission in 1913 and continued in that capacity until 1919, when he resigned and Mr. F. R. White, present chief engineer of the state highway commission, was appointed to that position.

The highway commission's duties are three-fold:

First: Construction and maintenance of primary roads.

Second: General supervision of secondary roads.

Third: Engineering assistance to other departments.

The commission has entire charge of and responsibility for all construction and maintenance work on the primary road system. It prepares the necessary surveys, plans and specifications for primary road improvements, lets the necessary contracts and supervises the construction work. It has charge, for the state of Iowa, of the expenditure of all federal aid road funds allotted to this state.

All maintenance work on the primary roads is under the supervision of the commission.

The secondary roads (county and township roads) are under the supervision of the county boards of supervisors in their respective counties. However, the law places on the highway commission certain duties and responsibilities in connection with such secondary road work. Changes in or modifications of the county trunk road system must be approved by the commission. Secondary road construction programs proposed by the county boards must receive the commission's approval. Plans prepared by the county engineers for secondary road improvements, must be submitted to the state highway commission for approval. Contracts awarded by the boards of supervisors for secondary road work involving a cost of \$2,000 or more per mile, or more than \$5,000 in the aggregate, or more than \$2,000 for any one bridge or culvert, must be approved by the state highway commission, before becoming effective. In case two adjacent counties are unable to agree on any county line road or bridge construction or maintenance matter, either board may appeal to the highway commission to determine said controversy.

The commission, on request, renders engineering assistance to various other state departments. This includes the making of surveys and preparation of plans and general supervision of construction and maintenance of public highways upon or adjacent to lands belonging to the state at the various educational, charitable, and penal institutions and at the state parks, engineering assistance to the executive council on street improvements upon and adjacent to the capitol grounds, assistance to the national guard on projects in connection with the national guard camp, and various other technical matters which may come before such other state departments.

The office of Commissioner of Insurance, as the executive head of the insurance department of Iowa, was created by chapter 146 of the laws of the thirty-fifth general assembly (1913) and the first commissioner took office July 1, 1914. Previous to that time, the supervision of insurance had been under the direction of the auditor of state.

The commissioner of insurance has general control, supervision and direction over all insurance business transacted in the state, and is charged with the responsibility of enforcing all the laws of the state relating to insurance. He

collects all license fees and premium taxes due the state from insurance companies. In the year ending July 1, 1936, the commissioner collected and turned over to the treasurer of state for the general funds a total of \$1,745,177.12.

Under the law, all securities in which the reserves of Iowa life insurance companies are invested are required to be deposited with the commissioner and complete records are kept showing each item on deposit at all times. The amount of approved securities representing these and other incidental deposits in the hands of the commissioner on June 18, 1937, amounted to \$485,032,072.54.

The commissioner supervises all transactions relating to the organization, reorganization, liquidation and dissolution of domestic insurance corporations. He supervises the sale in the state of all stock or other evidences of interest either by domestic or foreign insurance companies. He is the statutory receiver in the event of liquidation of any Iowa insurance company.

All foreign companies, as well as all local companies, must, before engaging in the insurance business in this state, obtain a certificate of authority from the commissioner of insurance. These certificates expire annually on April 1st, and action is taken on their renewals after analysis of complete financial statements filed covering the condition of the company as of the previous year end. All insurance agents must likewise obtain individual licenses to solicit business. In 1936, there were 763 insurance companies authorized in the state, and approximately 60,000 individual agents' licenses were issued.

The commissioner conducts examination of all domestic insurance organizations at least every two years. He also may make an examination of any foreign insurance company authorized or seeking to be authorized to do business within the state. All policy forms used by any company within the state are required to be approved by the department.

The commissioner is a member of the National Association of Insurance Commissioners composed of the insurance supervising officials of each of the various states and meets with and cooperates with this organization in the many matters that arise involving the common interests of the separate states in insurance matters.

The Superintendent of Banking is the head of the banking department of Iowa and has general control, supervision and direction of all banks and trust companies incorporated under the laws of Iowa, as well as all small loan companies operating under the small loan act passed by the forty-fifth general assembly, extraordinary session, and he is charged with the execution of the laws of the state relating to banking, including the public funds deposit guaranty act passed by the forty-first general assembly.

The deputy superintendent and bank examiners are appointed by the superintendent of banking subject to the approval of the state banking board, and their salaries are fixed by the state banking board within certain limits prescribed by law. The banking department is self-supporting.

The superintendent of banking is *ex officio* a member and chairman of the state banking board created by act of the forty-first general assembly. This board acts in an advisory capacity concerning all matters pertaining to the banking department and the Iowa banking laws.

In 1913, the thirty-fifth general assembly provided for "employers liability and workmen's compensation" and authorized the appointment of an industrial commissioner.

Iowa was among the first of the states to provide workmen's compensation for industrial accidents. All employers, with a few exceptions, must provide insurance, or assume responsibility for compensation benefits, based on 60 per cent of the average weekly wage, and a limited liability for medical expense. The minimum is \$6 per week and the maximum \$15 per week. Provision is made for arbitration and review, and appeals may go to the courts. State and other public employes are included. Reports are made of injuries to the industrial commissioner and settlements must have his approval. Arbitration decisions now number about one hundred and forty per year, together with the filing of about forty review decisions.

BUREAU OF LABOR

The office of Labor Commissioner was created by the twentieth general assembly in 1884.

Under the provisions of law, the commissioner is also a member of the board for vocational education, rehabilitation, the Iowa emergency relief committee, and the employment agency commission. The commissioner is executive secretary of the employment agency commission.

The bureau is responsible for the enforcement of laws relating to health and safety, child labor, fire escapes, passenger and freight elevators, private employment agencies, arbitration and conciliation, and industrial accidents for reinspection and statistical purposes.

Three factory inspectors devote full time to inspection and reinspection of factories, mills, work shops, theatres, buildings, public buildings, passenger and freight elevators, private employment agencies and general employment conditions. The law requires that one of the inspectors shall be a woman who shall give special attention to places employing women and children.

The official publication of the bureau "Iowa Employment Survey" is issued the first of each month based upon conditions as of the fifteenth of the preceding month and compared with the previous month. Statistical information is furnished by the employer on a specially prepared questionnaire which is compiled showing employment and payroll trends, building conditions, and activities in the Iowa state employment service.

The bureau issues, with the consent of the executive council, special bulletins relating to child labor, labor organizations, employment service, and manufacturing directory, etc., which is in addition to the biennial report required by law.

According to laws regulating the operation of free public employment offices, the commissioner is also director for the Iowa state employment service, a system of free public employment offices operated by the state of Iowa in cooperation with the U. S. department of labor and known officially as the Iowa state employment service affiliated with the U. S. employment service. This service is now operating in twenty-one principal cities of the state, the Federal government matching dollar for dollar any public funds used in the operations and maintenance of this system of free public employment offices.

STATE FIRE MARSHAL

The office of state fire marshal was created by an act of the thirty-fourth general assembly. The principal duties of the fire marshal are to investigate the cause, origin and circumstances of every fire occurring in the state; to determine if any buildings or structures, by reason of want of proper repair or by reason of age and dilapidated conditions, are especially liable to fire and to order their repair or removal; to require teachers in public and private schools to have at least one fire drill a month and instruct the pupils at least four times a year in the causes and dangers of fires; and to make an annual report to the governor. For the purpose of enforcing the orders of the fire marshal suitable penalties and fines are provided and he and his deputy are empowered to administer oaths and compel the attendance of witnesses. If the state fire marshal shall be of the opinion that there is evidence sufficient to charge any person with the crime of arson or criminal conduct in connection with any fire he shall cause such person to be arrested. Reports are required to be made to the fire marshal by all chiefs of fire departments of each and every fire, and where there is no established fire department the report is to be made by mayors and by township clerks outside of incorporated cities and towns.

The forty-sixth general assembly abolished the former fish and game commission and the state board of conservation and created the state conservation commission to carry on the duties of these former agencies. The duties relating to state forests formerly under the secretary of agriculture were also assigned to this commission.

The conservation commission makes recommendations for the requirement of state parks and preserves, forests and other state conservation areas, and is charged with the duty of administering same. The commission is charged with the duty of protecting, propagating, increasing and preserving the fish, game, fur bearing animals and protecting the birds of the state and the enforcement of laws relating thereto. The administration and enforcement of laws relating to boats and navigation in the state owned inland waters of the state is a duty of the commission. The commission has jurisdiction over the state owned meandered lakes and streams of the state and the construction of dams and other improvements relating to such waters.

In 1937, the conservation commission had jurisdiction over 71 state parks of 18,548 acres; 21 forest preserves of 10,000 acres; 65 meandered lakes of 41,862 acres; 17 artificial lakes of 1,607 acres; 14 drained lake beds of 4,197 acres; 11 meandered rivers of 800 miles; 86 ponds of 371 acres; 3 fish hatcheries; 2 fish rescue stations, and 26 fish rearing ponds. In 1936, the commission stocked Iowa waters with 2,501,638 adult fish and 99,870,000 fish fry.

The Iowa liquor control commission was created under the provisions of H. F. 292 as passed by the forty-fifth general assembly in extraordinary session and signed by the governor, March 6, 1934.

The commission has sole power to buy, import and have in its possession for sale and sell liquors; to establish, maintain and discontinue state liquor stores and special distributors in such cities and towns as deemed advisable; to rent, lease and equip any building or any land necessary to carry out the provisions of the act; to appoint necessary employees; to determine the nature, form and capacity of packages kept or sold under the act and to prescribe the labels and seals to be placed on same; to license, inspect and control the manufacture of alcoholic liquors in Iowa; and to make rules and regulations necessary for carrying out the provisions of the act.

The commission has the responsibility of administering the Iowa unemployment compensation act. The purpose of this act is to encourage the stabilization of employment, provide employment service, provide funds for the payment of benefits to unemployed, and to pay benefits for periods of unemployment to eligible unemployed persons. There are two divisions created under this act. They are the unemployment compensation division, whose duties are to collect the contributions, keep the records, pay the benefits, and the employment service division, whose duties are to find employment for persons who become unemployed. Only employers of eight or more persons are required to come under the provisions of this act, but employers of less than eight persons may come under the act upon application to the commission.

Employers are required to pay contributions on their wage payrolls as follows: For the year 1936, .9 of one per cent, for the year 1937, 1.8 per cent, and for the years 1938-1941 inclusive, 2.7 per cent. The contributions are payable quarterly and due on the last day of each calendar quarter and must be paid by the last day of the following month. Contributions not paid when due draw interest at the rate of one per cent per month until paid.

The commission maintains a separate account for each person who earns wages under the provisions of this act, and credits to such account an amount equal to one-sixth of the wages earned by such person during each calendar quarter, but not more than \$65.00 in any one calendar quarter.

After July 1, 1938, when benefits will be paid, there will be established in each county in the state an employment service agency through which all benefits shall be paid. Benefits will be paid to eligible persons who have been employed by the employers covered by this act and who have become either totally or partially unemployed as defined in the act. The amount of benefits paid to any person will depend upon the credit their account has received from wages paid to them during the benefit period, which is eight calendar quarters. The weekly benefit paid to any person shall be an amount equal to fifty per centum of his full time weekly wage but shall not be more than \$15.00 per week, nor less than \$5.00 per week or his full time weekly wage, whichever is the lesser.

When a person becomes unemployed he shall report to the employment service agency in his county and shall make application for work, and shall also make application for benefits provided for in this act. If no suitable work is found for him after a waiting period of two weeks, he will receive weekly benefits for a period of fifteen weeks provided his account has been credited with a sufficient amount.

Agricultural labor, domestic service in a private home and persons employed in the service of the United States, the State of Iowa, or any subdivision thereof, are exempt from the provisions of this act.

The state printing board has charge of all matters pertaining to state printing, including printing for institutions and officials outside of Des Moines. Contracts for all work and material are let on competitive bids. The laws of the state are very explicit in directing the manner of advertising for and securing bids on all items of printing and there can be no deviation from the strict and impartial adherence to this law.

The superintendent of printing is appointed by the board. He is *ex officio* secretary of the board and its executive officer. The law directs that the manuscript of every report or document, book, booklet, bulletin or anything to be printed shall be transmitted to the superintendent of printing as soon as it is ready for printing, and he shall edit, revise, condense and arrange the same for printing. He has the custody of and attends to the distribution and sale of codes, session laws, supreme court reports and public documents; supervises the compilation and publication of the session laws, the legislative bill index, and the official register. Also the journals of the house and senate are indexed under his supervision.

The Board of Social Welfare was created by act of the forty-seventh general assembly in 1937. The board, bipartisan in membership, is vested with authority to administer old age assistance, aid to the blind and child welfare.

The board of social welfare has authority to administer state and federal funds appropriated by the federal social security law and the Iowa legislature for old age assistance, aid to the blind, and child welfare services.

Under the terms of the law, county social welfare boards, also bipartisan, are appointed by the county boards of supervisors. The county welfare boards receive applications for assistance from needy aged and blind in the various counties and make recommendations for assistance to the state board. The county boards also cooperate with the state board in giving service to neglected and dependent children.

The board of social welfare is required to cooperate with the federal government according to the provisions of the federal social security law, to make reports to the federal social security board on administration of assistance, and to the federal bureau of child welfare on its services to children.

The division of child welfare will carry on all services to children in the state of Iowa except those performed by the institutions under the jurisdiction of the board of control.

The commissioner of public health directs the work of the department. He formulates objectives and outlines detailed programs in public health. He serves as the executive officer of the nine boards of examiners for the various professions affecting the public health. He is the executive officer of the state department of health.

The board of health serves in an advisory capacity to the commissioner of public health and is empowered to make rules and regulations.

Preventable Diseases—Epidemiology

Preventable diseases are by their very nature of vital concern to the community and the state. Reports of various infectious diseases are received daily

from physicians and health officers throughout the state. These reports are surveyed and tabulated so as to make possible a study by weeks and months of the current prevalence of disease as compared with the preceding year or period of years. Field investigations are made upon request of local health officers or other officials, to determine the nature and extent of outbreaks, and to assist in control measures. The department through articles, reports, literature, talks, correspondence and graphic presentations aims to inform the public about disease prevention.

Activities of this department include a division of tuberculosis under the direction of a physician with special training and experience and nurses who have specialized in the study of tuberculosis. Staff members cooperate with the attending physicians and health officers in the reporting of cases and in the conduct of special surveys and the various measures to prevent the spread of tuberculosis.

Every effort is being put forth in cooperation of physicians, so as to obtain complete reports of cases of venereal diseases. This work is carried out under the direction of physicians with special training and experience. Control measures include provisions for care of the indigent patient with particular reference to followup work and investigation of sources of infection.

A serum center has been established which makes possible the preparation of convalescent serum for the control and prevention of such diseases as measles, scarlet fever and infantile paralysis.

Sanitation, Public Health Engineering and Industrial Hygiene

The activities of the division include supervision of construction and operation of public and semi-public water supplies, sewerage, sewage disposal, garbage disposal and swimming pools; the control of pollution of streams and lakes by domestic and industrial wastes; general administration of the housing law and state plumbing code; the promotion of sanitary production and handling of milk; the study of occupational disease hazard among industrial workers; the promotion of better rural sanitation; the investigation of tourist and summer camps; the investigation of major nuisances; and the general supervision of district and county personnel engaged in public health engineering activities.

Child Health and Health Education

One of the most important activities of a health department is to present information on health subjects to the public and to stimulate the community to meet the needs of the whole child in such a manner that the greatest good will come to the greatest number. An advisory service is offered to lay organizations. This service includes guidance, direction and even supervision in planning and outlining health programs and the preparation of study course outlines.

Public Health Nursing

The department maintains a division of public health nursing and provides a whole-time supervisory service for public health nurses and an advisory service for boards employing nurses and for associations or committees interested in public health nursing.

The public health nurse:

1. Helps to secure early medical diagnosis and treatment for the sick.
2. Renders or secures nursing care of the sick, teaches through demonstration and supervises care given by relatives and attendants.
3. Assists the family to carry out medical, sanitary and social procedures for the prevention of disease and the promotion of health.
4. Helps to secure adjustment of social conditions which affect health.
5. Influences the community to develop public health facilities through participating in appropriate channels of community education for the promotion of a sound, adequate community health program. Shares in community action leading to betterment of health conditions.

Vital Statistics

The division is charged with the collecting, recording and filing reports of births, deaths, marriages and divorces. Statistical studies and analyses of these records are made and the results of these studies are released for the information of the public. The division supervises the work of the local registrars of vital statistics and cooperates closely with the bureau of census, department of commerce, Washington, D. C.

Law Enforcement

The work of the division of law enforcement is under the direct supervision of our attorney, who is immediately responsible for the enforcement of laws pertaining to all matters affecting the following professions under title VIII of the code: medicine and surgery, podiatry, osteopathy, chiropractic, dentistry, optometry, embalming, barbering and cosmetology.

The division provides an advisory service to the lay public, as well as to the members of professional groups, in matters relating to legal phases of public health.

Examinations, Licensure and Registration

This division is under the direct supervision of a lay-director who is not licensed to practice any of the professions. The division keeps a permanent record of all applications, examinations, licenses, reciprocal licenses and renewal of licenses of the various professions under title VIII of the code of Iowa, 1935 (except the practice of pharmacy, osteopathy, chiropractic and nursing). The director carries on all correspondence and keeps all records incident to the examining and licensing of the following professions: medicine and surgery, dentistry, embalming, podiatry, optometry, barbering and cosmetology. The respective examining boards give the examinations, the director assisting.

The Iowa state board of education was created by chapter 170, acts of the thirty-third general assembly, as the governing body for the State University, the Iowa State College of Agriculture and Mechanic Arts and the Iowa State Teachers College. The law went into effect July 1, 1909. Two years later chapter 141, enacted by the thirty-fourth general assembly, placed the school for the blind under the control of the board. Chapter 160, acts of the thirty-seventh general assembly, 1917, transferred the control and management of the school for the deaf to the board.

The board of education of nine members is appointed by the governor for six-year terms, subject to approval by the senate. The board chooses from outside its own membership a finance committee of three members. The committee selects its chairman and secretary, the secretary of the committee also serving as secretary of the board, and he is in charge of the general offices and has his office at the seat of government.

IOWA SCHOOL FOR THE BLIND—VINTON

Francis Eber Palmer, Superintendent

The aim and purpose of the Iowa School for the Blind is purely educational. The course of study includes not only the subjects leading up to and required for admission to the colleges and the university of the state, but also subjects that aim to prepare the students for some of the occupations in which it has been demonstrated that the blind are usually successful. After a pupil of this school reaches the high school department, he is given some latitude in the choice of courses of study. Both literary and industrial work is required of all students, besides some music.

IOWA SCHOOL FOR THE DEAF—COUNCIL BLUFFS

Lloyd E. Berg, Superintendent

The Iowa School for the Deaf was founded in 1855, and was first located at Iowa City and then moved to Council Bluffs in 1870. In 1902 a fire completely destroyed the main building which housed the executive quarters and dormitories for pupils. A substantial fireproof structure now stands in its place where sufficient room is provided for 325 pupils. A separate building to accommodate seventy-five pupils is also provided, wherein only oral instruction is employed. Approximately ninety per cent of all pupils are taught by the oral method which employs for the purpose, speech, lip-reading and writing. The course of study is extensive and provides not only an elementary education for the deaf children of the state but also a secondary, the high school department, covering a full four years course, being on the accredited list of the North Central Association, the only school for the deaf in the country so accredited.

A well equipped vocational department is maintained for the purpose of teaching trades. Students become skilled workmen and graduates, with remarkably few exceptions, are self-supporting, useful citizens of the state.

IOWA STATE LIBRARY

The library of the state of Iowa was authorized by an act of the first general assembly and approved February 15, 1847. Prior to this, the territory of Iowa was provided with a librarian and library by an act and appropriation by congress and also by an act of the territorial legislature approved January 4, 1840.

The state library consists of four departments.

I.

The general library, which is a collection of books covering literature, philosophy, science, history, general works, religion, sociology, philology, useful arts, and fine arts. This consists of approximately 90,000 volumes, as of June, 1937. It is a reference library, as distinguished from circulating library, and is located in the east wing of the Historical building.

II.

The library of sociology and economics consists as of June, 1937, of philosophy, science, history, general works, religion, sociology, philology, useful state capitol, where it is available for the use of the officers of the state, and the members of the general assembly. It is much used by the members of the legislature during the legislative season. It is also a reference library.

III.

The law library consists of 125,000 volumes and 10,000 documents, as of June, 1937. This collection of books comprehends a vast body of law books in the English language. It is said to rank third among the law libraries of the United States. This division of the state library is located in the west wing of the state capitol building; the south end of the room being used for the library of sociology and economics.

IV.

The medical library consists, as of June, 1937, of approximately 20,016 volumes. It is located on the second floor of the east wing of the Historical building and contains all the modern texts on medicine and surgery, and a very comprehensive file of medical publications, very much up to date. This library serves all the schools of doctors and medicine and surgery; also, veterinarians and dentists. Members of the legal profession consult it on medico-legal questions. The information contained in this library is constantly moving in and out to the advantage of the groups served by it.

All these divisions of the state library in addition to the books which they contain, have a vast number of pamphlets, magazines and the like. Much research work is done by the respective library staffs on request of interested parties, and elaborate bibliographies are made for workers and investigators. Requests come from all parts of the state for these services.

The medical department circulates among nurses, club women, medical students, pharmacy students and all such groups, a large number of books, bibliographies and magazines.

The library commission cooperates with local communities in the establishment and development of public libraries and aids in the organization of libraries according to modern methods, gives assistance in book selection, advice to trustees, and instruction to librarians by personal visits and correspondence.

The library commission also collects and publishes statistics of libraries in the state for guidance and information of trustees and others and furnishes blanks for keeping records and making reports to the commission, as required by law.

The library commission also issues the Iowa Library Quarterly, devoted to library purposes and news of the state, and also publishes selected lists, leaflets, and aids of various kinds.

The second activity of the commission is the traveling library from which books are loaned to schools, communities without public libraries, small libraries to supplement their own collections, clubs, other organizations, and individuals. Much reference help is given to study clubs in preparing their programs. Books for the blind, picture collections, and stereoscopic views are also loaned from the traveling library.

In 1935, 115,647 books were loaned from the traveling library. Most of these books are loaned for three months and the use of the traveling books is therefore much larger than the figures indicate.

HISTORICAL, MEMORIAL AND ART DEPARTMENT OF IOWA

(Office located in the Historical building)

The department, created by law April 16, 1892 (Laws 24th G.A., chapter 56) began functioning July 1, 1892. Its functions are "to collect, preserve, organize, arrange and classify, works of art, books, maps, charts, public documents, manuscripts, newspapers, and other objects and materials illustrative of the natural and political history of the territory and state and of the central west, and of the traditions and history of the Indian tribes and prior occupants of the region, and publish such matter and display such material as may be of value and interest to the public." The department publishes the Annals of Iowa, a quarterly, historical magazine of eighty pages.

It also "collects memorials and mementoes of the pioneers of Iowa and soldiers of all our wars." (Section 4525, code of Iowa, 1935.) The de-

partment has a splendid collection of Civil war, Spanish-American war and World war materials, one entire room being given to those of the World war.

It maintains a library made up of books and pamphlets pertaining to the history of the state, general western history, publications of Iowa authors, war histories, works relating to North American Indians, county histories, and every kind of material that deals with local, state or western history. Its works in genealogy make it one of the best libraries in this field in the United States.

Portraits of distinguished Iowans constitute the portrait gallery.

The museum display includes many fine specimens of mammals and birds, including moose, buffalo, elk, as well as a fine display of eagles, wild turkeys, etc. A section of the museum is devoted to Indian relics and handiwork. Another section is devoted to the collection of war materials including weapons, medals, citations, battle flags. A splendid collection of rocks, etc., illustrates Iowa's geological column.

The department conducts pupils accompanied by teachers through the building in specific courses that are illustrated by museum specimens covering Indian life and pioneer life. It, of course, complies with the course of study for Iowa schools.

It also maintains collections of mounted specimens of common birds for the benefit of the Iowa schools who are willing to apply for and pay transportation on these collections.

The newspaper collection is fairly complete. Since its inception it has taken two newspapers from each county. Special effort has been made to collect Iowa newspapers for dates earlier than 1892.

The public archives material is derived from the state departments, boards, bureaus, etc., and dates from 1881 down to the ten-year period of its removal.

The private archives consist of manuscripts, letters and papers of many of Iowa's great men.

The public archives are consulted by approximately 12,000 people a year for matters pertaining to their own history, such as births, marriages, etc.

Thousands of inquiries are received annually from people over the state asking for information dealing with rock specimens, animal remains, fossils, mineral resources, and historic data of all kinds dealing with the state and middle west.

The department is open every day in the year.

The Iowa State Planning Board was made an official state agency by the forty-seventh general assembly. It had functioned for three years previously as an unofficial body appointed by the governor.

The planning board is authorized to study the physical, social and economic resources of the state, and to make recommendations regarding their best use and preservation. It is charged with the duty of providing such information and research service to the governor and general assembly as they may request to assist in preparing legislation for the welfare of the state.

Cooperation by the federal government is provided through the national resources committee, which has furnished the services of a state planning consultant.

The planning board is expected to advise with other state agencies with a view toward the coordination of state development plans, and to advise with county and municipal agencies on request for the purpose of assisting local planning. Other duties include the preparation and maintenance of an up-to-date file of base maps of the state and its various subdivisions.

The state planning board is a fact-finding, coordinating, advisory planning body. In recognizing the need for such a technical agency to assist in the study and interpretation of complex public problems, the forty-seventh general assembly followed a precedent established in thirty-eight other states.

The Iowa state fair as an institution has existed since the first fair was held at Fairfield October 25, 26 and 27, 1854, but it remained for the fortieth general assembly in 1923 and the extra session thereof to set out the Iowa state fair board as a separate and distinct department.

Previous to 1923 the fair was operated under the state department of agriculture. The fortieth general assembly, however, created a new department of agriculture, consolidating therewith a number of other departments and at the extra session the law was passed creating the state fair board, effective October 28, 1924.

The law provides for a state agricultural convention to be held at the state capitol in Des Moines on the second Wednesday in December of each year. The delegates to this convention are the officers and members of the state fair board; the president, secretary or accredited delegate of each of the county and district fairs; the president or accredited representative of the following organizations: each farmers' institute organized according to law and receiving aid; the state horticultural society; the Iowa state dairy association; the Iowa beef producers' association, and the Iowa corn and small grain growers' association. In counties where no fair is held the board of supervisors may appoint a delegate.

The convention elects a president and a vice president for a term of one year, and a director from each congressional district, whose term expires the day following the convention, for a term of two years. The terms of the directors representing the first, fourth, fifth, seventh and eighth congressional districts expire December 13, 1936, and the terms of the directors for the second, third, sixth and ninth congressional districts expire December 12, 1937. The secretary and treasurer are elected annually by the state fair board. The law fixes the compensation of the president, vice president and directors at ten dollars (\$10) per day and expenses while in attendance at board and committee meetings. The law also fixes the maximum amount to be paid the treasurer at \$250 and the secretary at \$5,000 annually.

By statute the state fair board is made the custodian of the state fair grounds and the board of managers of the annual state fair. The state makes no regular appropriations for the operating expenses of the state fair. The law specifically provides that all operating expense, maintenance, etc., shall be paid out of the receipts of the state fair unless there is a special appropriation providing for same. The law also provides that the state will not be liable for any debt incurred by the board. The state has appropriated since 1902, \$990,500 for buildings, \$93,013 for additional land, \$14,000 for sanitary sewer system, and \$28,280 for paving and sewer assessments against the grounds. In the same period \$478,700 has been appropriated for insurance premiums and maintenance of grounds and buildings.

During this same thirty-five year period there has been expended from the fair receipts, \$1,080,524 for buildings and other improvements, \$236,900 for insurance premiums and maintenance of the grounds and buildings, and the entire operating expense of the fair amounting to \$6,915,304.

The inventory taken November 30, 1936, shows the present value of the grounds and buildings to be worth \$2,220,664. This inventory takes into consideration the original cost of all permanent buildings and other improvements with the usual annual depreciation. It is safe to say that the replacement value of buildings and other improvements would be more than double the amount carried in the inventory.

The title to the state fair grounds and all property is held in the name of the state of Iowa and all deeds and abstracts are on file in the state comptroller's office.

The Adjutant General issues and transmits all orders of the commander-in-chief and keeps a record of all appointments of officers commissioned by

the governor, of all general and special orders and regulations, and of such matters as pertain to the organization of the military forces and the duties thereof. He has charge of the state arsenal and grounds and all other property of the state kept or used for military purposes. He furnishes at the expense of the state such blanks and forms as are approved by the commander-in-chief. In each year, preceding a regular session of the general assembly, or at any other time the governor may direct, he makes out a detailed report of the transactions of his office, the expenses thereof and such other matters as shall be required by the commander in chief for the period since the last preceding report.

All muster rolls, reports, returns, enlistments, discharges and complete records of the national guard are filed and made a matter of record in his office. The records of Iowa soldiers of the Civil, Spanish-American, and World wars are on file in his office and all information desired from such records is furnished by him. Certificates of military service of Iowa soldiers of the late wars or past service in the organized militia and national guard are given by him under the seal of his office. He is disbursing officer of all state appropriations for the use and support of the national guard and as adjutant general all military property is committed to his custody which he is required to issue for the use of the national guard, keeping an account of the same. He is required to furnish such reports of the national guard of the state as the war department may from time to time require.

The board of nurse examiners was made a department separate from the department of health by S. F. 50, passed by the forty-sixth general assembly and became effective upon publication.

The board of nurse examiners not only gives the state board examinations required of every graduate nurse before she is entitled to practice her profession, but also formulates the curriculum and standards for accredited schools of nursing. Through the activities of the educational director, all accredited schools of nursing are supervised.

The board, through its executive secretary, keeps all records pertaining to the licensing of nurses in the state; receives all applications for licensure; collects all fees and issues all licenses.

The basic science law enacted by the forty-sixth general assembly establishes a state board of examiners in the fundamental sciences underlying the practice of the healing arts, providing for its organization and powers, and that certification by such board following examination in the six basic sciences of anatomy, physiology, chemistry, pathology, bacteriology and hygiene is prerequisite to eligibility for examination for a license to practice medicine and surgery, osteopathy, osteopathy and surgery, and chiropractic. It establishes uniform educational standards in the fundamental sciences for all applicants for license to diagnose and treat human ailments. The act does not apply to dentists, dental hygienists, nurses, pharmacists, optometrists, embalmers, podiatrists, barbers or cosmetologists practicing within the limits of their respective professions, or Christian scientists.

The personnel of the board consists of six members learned in the basic sciences, having no degrees in the healing arts. The members of the board receive as compensation \$10.00 per diem for the time actually employed and necessary expense incurred in the discharge of their duties which is paid out of funds in the state treasury received as fees from applicants for examination.

The board meets in Des Moines and there conducts the examinations in the basic sciences four (4) times each year, respectively on the second Tuesday in January, April, July and October. The examination fee is \$10.00.

The advisory board of the Iowa Pharmaceutical Association annually recommends to the governor a list of six persons for appointment (code of Iowa, 1935, section 2457), who have the qualifications prescribed for examiners of the profession, and the governor in making the appointment to the board may select one of the persons so named. Confirmation by the senate is not required.

It is the duty of the board to enforce the laws governing the sale and distribution of drugs, medicines, and poisons in the state, as well as hold examinations for the licensing of pharmacists. The examination fee is \$10.00. A record is kept of all pharmacists licensed and a fee of \$2.00 is required each year for the renewal of certificates. Itinerant vendors of medicines are licensed by the department and the license fee is \$50.00 per year.

The Iowa commission for the blind was created in 1926 for the purpose of helping the adult blind, educationally and industrially, in their own homes. No material aid is permitted. Under the provisions of the law, a register of the blind is maintained; assistance given in manufacturing and marketing their products; conditions ameliorated in various ways; program for the conservation of vision and prevention of blindness carried on; vocational training provided; and begging discouraged in cooperation with other agencies. Home teaching is carried on and workshops may be provided if deemed advisable.

The state board of mine examiners was created by the twenty-second general assembly, and is composed of five members; two coal operators, two miners, and one engineer. Their duties are to examine and issue certificates to those qualified to act as state mine inspectors, hoisting engineers and mine foremen. An examination for state mine inspectors is held the first Monday in March in even-numbered years in the office of the state mine inspectors in the state house. Examinations for hoisting engineers and mine foremen are held every two months at the state mine inspector's office. A fee of two dollars for registration and an additional fee of two dollars is required of those taking and passing the examination for mine foremen and hoisting engineers. The law requires that each certificate issued by the board shall be recorded in the office of the examining board, and shall show the name, age, residence and years of experience of the person to whom it was issued.

The state board of engineering examiners was created by the thirty-eighth general assembly in 1919. No person can practice professional engineering or land surveying without first being registered with this board. Each member of the board shall be a professional engineer at least thirty-five years of age, and shall have been a resident of this state for at least three years immediately preceding his appointment and shall have had at least ten years' active practice preceding his appointment and during such time shall have had charge of engineering work as principal or assistant for at least two years, and shall be a member in good standing of a recognized state or national engineering society. No two members of said board shall be from the same branch of the profession of engineering.

The office of state mine inspector was created by the eighteenth general assembly in the year 1880. At that time there was only one inspector, but now it takes the entire time of three inspectors to inspect the mines in the state to see that they are worked in conformity with the mining laws, and everything that would tend to guard against accidents to men employed in the mines.

A secretary, elected by the inspectors, has charge of the correspondence and books in the office maintained in the state house, and also a record of every inspection, accident reports, etc. A monthly report of the general conditions of all mines is made to the mine inspectors. A general report of the conditions of the mines of the state, tonnage, accidents, number of employees, number of days worked, and other information relative to the coal industry is published every two years. This is the state mine inspector's report to the governor. Maps of the mines of the state are on file in the office of the mine inspectors and are open for public inspection.

It is the duty of the geological survey to furnish information to the public on such subjects as the mineral resources of Iowa, the geological formations present in the state and what uses may be made of them, the possibilities of investment in enterprises that involve geological materials, and any other questions that have to do with geology. In order to be able to give useful and intelligent answers to such questions as these, the survey has made preliminary examinations of the coal beds of the state and of the strata associated with them. Additional and more detailed studies of the coal measures are now being made. Studies have been made of the rock resources of Iowa, the gypsum, the clays and shales and the sands and gravels, both of the bed-rock and of the overlying loose materials. The possibilities of cement manufacture have been examined, also the deposit of iron ore at Waukon. The ground water resources of the state have been constantly studied since the organization of the survey over forty years ago. During the years 1934-1935 the survey had direct supervision of extensive field and laboratory investigations for the emergency relief administration and state planning board on underground water and subsurface geology of Iowa. The possibility of finding oil and gas in the Iowa strata has always been kept in mind, and close attention is given to all wells drilled as oil or gas prospects. The survey has always sounded a note of caution in pointing out the extreme hazard of investing funds in oil prospecting in the state.

The survey has published, as the result of its geological work, 35 large volumes, most of which are called annual reports. In addition, seven bulletins have been issued on the botany and biology of the state.

DELAWARE SWEDISH TRICENTENARY COMMISSION OF IOWA

By the provisions of house concurrent resolution No. 19, forty-seventh general assembly, the governor of Iowa was authorized to appoint a commission of eleven members to represent this state at the celebration of the three hundredth anniversary of the first permanent settlement upon Delaware soil, same to be held in the year 1938, on the site of the present city of Wilmington. This was the first settlement of the colony of New Sweden. The purpose of the celebration, which is interstate, national, and international in scope, is to commemorate the first permanent establishment of European civilization by persons of Swedish blood in the new world.

ORGANIZATION

The supreme court consists of nine judges, elected by the people, five of whom constitute a quorum for the transaction of business, but one alone may adjourn from day to day, or to a particular day, or until the next term.

Through a provision passed by the forty-fourth general assembly, the senior in time of service is chief justice for six months instead of a year as formerly and so on in rotation until all judges shall have been chief justice.

JURISDICTION

The supreme court has appellate jurisdiction over all judgments and decisions of all courts of record, except as otherwise provided by law.

APPEALS FROM ORDERS.—An appeal may also be taken to the supreme court from:

1. An order made affecting a substantial right in an action, when such order, in effect, determines the action and prevents a judgment from which an appeal might be taken.

2. A final order made in special actions affecting a substantial right therein, or made on a summary application in an action after judgment.

3. An order which grants or refuses, continues or modifies, a provisional remedy; grants or refuses, dissolves or refuses to dissolve, an injunction or attachment, grants or refuses a new trial; sustains or overrules a demurrer in a law action; or sustains or overrules a motion to dismiss in an equitable action.

4. An intermediate order involving the merits or materially affecting the final decision.

5. An order or judgment on habeas corpus.

If any of the above orders or judgments are made or rendered by a judge, the same are reviewable, the same as if made by a court.

The supreme court has power to issue all writs and processes necessary to secure justice to parties, and to enforce its appellate jurisdiction, and it may exercise supervisory control over all inferior judicial tribunals.

It may enforce its mandates upon inferior courts and officers by fine and imprisonment, which imprisonment may continue until mandates are obeyed.

CLERK OF THE SUPREME COURT

(Office located on the main floor of capitol building)

The office of the clerk of the supreme court is a part of the judicial branch of the state government. The law provides that the clerk of the supreme court shall have an office at the seat of government, that he shall file all printed matter and papers of all kinds appertaining to pending matters and cases, issue writs, orders and executions to carry out orders of the court.

The clerk shall announce by mail to one attorney on each side any ruling made or decision rendered, as soon as filed, and permit no original opinion filed to be removed by anyone except the reporter of the supreme court.

The clerk of the supreme court is required to be present in the court room when the court sits for the hearing and submission of cases, and keep a record of the cases submitted in the order of their submission. When a case is called for submission the clerk distributes to the respective members of the court a set of the pleadings in such case.

The clerk receives and files all applications for admission to the bar except those applying to be admitted on motion, prepares the lists of applicants for the bar examinations for the use of the board of law examiners, issues certificates to all successful applicants and keeps a record of the same. Collects and accounts for all fees incident to admission to the bar. Each applicant pays to the clerk an examination fee of \$5.00. Attorneys from other states admitted on motion pay the clerk a fee of \$10.00. Out of the fees so collected the clerk pays the board of law examiners their per diem on certificate of the attorney general.

REPORTER OF THE SUPREME COURT AND EDITOR OF THE CODE

(Office located on second floor of capitol building)

It is the duty of the reporter of the supreme court and code editor to cause to be printed the official volumes of the opinions of the supreme court, with proper syllabi for each opinion; also to edit and compile the code and cause the same to be published immediately following each even-numbered session of the general assembly; also to prepare and cause to be published, biennially, annotations to the code; also to submit to each general assembly bills for the codification, amendment, and revision of such portions of the law as may be conflicting, redundant, or ambiguous.

THE DISTRICT COURT OF IOWA

There are at the present time seventy judges of the district court of the state of Iowa. The state is divided into twenty-one judicial districts and each district is entitled to from one to six judges, the number being fixed by statute. The judges are elected for terms of four years. Each judge appoints a shorthand reporter.

The district court shall have general and exclusive jurisdiction of all actions, proceedings and remedies, both civil and criminal, except in cases where exclusive or concurrent jurisdiction is or may hereafter be conferred upon some other court or tribunal by the constitution and laws of the state, and shall have and exercise all the powers usually possessed and exercised by courts of record. It shall also possess and exercise jurisdiction in all appeals and writs of error taken in civil and criminal actions and special proceedings authorized to be taken from all inferior courts, tribunals, boards or officers, under any provisions of the laws of this state, and shall have a general supervision thereof, in all matters, to prevent and correct abuses, where no other remedy is provided.

The district court of each county shall have original and exclusive jurisdiction to probate the wills of, and to grant administration upon the estates of, all persons who at the time of their death were residents of the county, and non-residents of the state who die leaving property within the county subject to administration, or whose property is afterwards brought into the county.

To appoint guardians of the persons and property of all persons resident in the county subject to guardianship.

To appoint guardians of the property of all such persons non-residents of the state who have property within the county subject to guardianship or whose property is afterwards brought into the county.

It shall have jurisdiction in all matters in relation to the appointment of executors and trustees, and the management and disposition of the property of and settlement of such estates; *provided*, that where jurisdiction has heretofore been acquired, the same shall be retained until such estate is closed.

The district court shall succeed to and exercise full authority and jurisdiction over the records of the circuit court, and may enforce all judgments, decrees and orders thereof in the same manner and to the same extent as it may exercise like jurisdiction and authority over its own records, and for the purpose of the issuance of process, and of any and all other acts necessary to the due and efficient enforcement of the orders, judgments and decrees of the circuit court, the records thereof shall be deemed records of the district court.

Transcripts and process from the judgments, decrees and records of the circuit court shall be issued by the clerk of the district court and under the seal of his office.

MUNICIPAL COURTS

Any city, whether organized under a special charter, commission form of government or the general law for the incorporation of cities or towns, now or hereafter having a population of five thousand or more, as shown by the last preceding state or United States census, may establish a municipal court. All civil townships in which said city or any part thereof is located shall constitute the municipal court district and its jurisdiction is coextensive with the territorial limits of the county in which the court is located.

The salary of municipal court judges is \$3,000 in cities with population less than 30,000, \$3,400 with population between 30,000 and less than 75,000, \$3,600 with population 75,000 or over. Compensation of court reporter is fixed by the judge at not to exceed \$8.00 per day. Salary of clerk is \$1,800, \$2,200 and \$2,600 according to population of the city as above indicated.

JURISDICTION.—Municipal courts are courts of record and have concurrent jurisdiction with the district court in all civil matters, where the amount in controversy does not exceed one thousand dollars, except in probate matters, actions for divorce, alimony, separate maintenance, those directly affecting the title to real estate, and juvenile proceedings unless otherwise authorized.

In all criminal matters the court shall exercise the jurisdiction conferred on district courts for the trial of misdemeanors, justice of the peace courts, mayor's courts, and police courts, except that the mayor's court of any incorporated city or town within such municipal court district other than the city in which said court is established shall have exclusive jurisdiction of prosecutions for violations of city ordinances.

In all matters of which the municipal court has jurisdiction, it has the same powers in reference to injunctions, writs, orders and other proceedings in and out of court as are possessed by the district court and the judges thereof.

SUPERIOR COURT

The statutes provide that any city containing four thousand inhabitants, may establish a superior court. There are at present five such courts, located as follows: Cedar Rapids, Grinnell, Iowa Falls, Keokuk and Oelwein. The judges are elected for terms of four years and receive an annual salary, which is paid quarterly, the first two quarters being paid from the city treasury and the last two quarters from the county treasury of the county in which court is located. Salary of judge, \$2,000 per annum in cities up to 25,000 population; \$3,000 in cities of 25,000 up to 40,000, and \$3,750 in cities of 40,000 or more.

The judges appoint a shorthand reporter, whose compensation is fixed by order of the court not exceeding \$8.00 per day for the time actually employed.

The following is a copy of sections 10704 and 10705 of the code, governing the jurisdiction of the superior court:

Said court shall have jurisdiction concurrent with the district court in all civil matters except in probate matters and actions for divorce, alimony, and separate maintenance.

It shall have exclusive original jurisdiction to try and determine all actions, civil and criminal, for the violation of city ordinances and all jurisdiction conferred on police courts as now or as may hereafter be provided by law and concurrent jurisdiction with justices of the peace.

THE LEGISLATIVE DEPARTMENT

The legislative department of the state of Iowa is vested in a general assembly, which consists of a senate and house of representatives.

The senate consists of fifty members. Senators are elected for terms of four years; twenty-one senators being elected at one general election and twenty-nine at the next.

The house of representatives consists at present of one hundred and eight members who are elected for a term of two years.

Sessions of the general assembly are held biennially in the odd-numbered years, and they commence on the second Monday of January.

The compensation of the members of the general assembly is \$1,000 for the session. This is in accordance with an act of the thirty-fourth general assembly which went into effect July 4, 1911. They were also allowed five cents a mile from their homes to the capital and return for traveling expenses. Members are permitted to draw such stationery as they need during the session, the cost to the state for the supplies varying from \$1.50 to \$14.00 per member. No allowance is permitted for postage.

The lieutenant governor is the presiding officer of the senate. His pay is twice that of a member, being \$2,000 for the session of the general assembly.

The speaker of the house is chosen by the members from among their own membership. His pay is twice that of a member, being \$2,000 for the session.

The lieutenant governor appoints all committees in the senate and the speaker of the house all committees in the house.

In the regular proceedings of the general assembly motions made by members are not seconded but are put directly by the presiding officer, the formality of a second being waived.

Sessions in both branches of the general assembly are opened by prayer. No regular chaplains are employed, but ministers from Des Moines and elsewhere over the state are assigned dates for these services and are allowed \$5 for each opening prayer.

Bills passed are copied (enrolled) by the enrolling clerk of the branch of the general assembly where the bill originates; they are then signed by the president of the senate and speaker of the house in presence of these respective bodies, in open session; then by the governor, if meeting with his approval, and then are filed with the secretary of state. Following adjournment they are printed under the direction of the superintendent of printing.

BIOGRAPHIES

ELECTIVE STATE OFFICIALS

NELSON G. KRASCHEL, Harlan.—Governor, was born on a farm near Macon, Illinois, October 27, 1889. His entire boyhood life was spent on that farm, which was known for miles around for its pure bred live stock. In 1910, at the age of 21, he moved to Harlan, Iowa, where he engaged in the profession of live stock auctioneering. He was married April 2, 1913, to Agnes Johnson of Harlan, Iowa, and has three sons, Frederick 20, Dick 15, and James 11. Some of the most notable live stock auctions ever held in the United States and Canada have been under his management and direction. He has conducted sales in twenty-six states of the Union and two provinces of Canada, selling more than fifty million dollars worth of agricultural property. Several animals have passed under his hammer at more than ten thousand dollars each. Throughout his life, he has been an ardent admirer of good live stock, and on his farms has bred some of the best cattle produced in the State. In 1922, he was a candidate for state senator from the Cass-Shelby district, and in that campaign he spent much time in the support of Clyde L. Herring in his campaign for United States senator against Smith W. Brookhart. He was nominated for the office of lieutenant governor at the democratic state convention July 22, 1932, to fill a vacancy and was elected at the general election in November; re-elected, November, 1934. Elected governor of Iowa in November, 1936. A democrat.

JOHN K. VALENTINE, Centerville.—Lieutenant Governor, was born at Oskaloosa, Iowa, February 5, 1904. Received early education in Centerville, Iowa, public schools and graduated from University of Wisconsin in 1926 and from law college of University of Iowa in 1929. Formed a partnership in 1929 with his father, H. E. Valentine, and has since been engaged in the practice of law at Centerville. Elected senator in 1932. Member and chairman of the state board of assessment and review from July 1, 1935, to September 1, 1936. Elected lieutenant governor in November, 1936. A democrat.

ROBERT E. O'BRIAN, Sioux City.—Secretary of State, was born in Bryant, Illinois. Received B.A. degree from Depauw University, Greencastle, Indiana, and M.A. and Ph.D. degrees from Northwestern University at Evanston, Illinois; was pastor of three different Methodist churches while attending school at Evanston, and of First Methodist church, Grand Forks, North Dakota, where he also was professor of psychology. He was president of Morningside College, Sioux City, Iowa, for five years and is known as a lecturer and writer. Has been interested for several years in hardwood lumber milling. Married Mabel Day of Greensburg, Indiana, and has one son, Edward, aged eleven. Member of the American Legion, Phi Beta Kappa, Delta Sigma Rho, Phi Delta Kappa, Alpha Pi Zeta, Methodist Episcopal church, second degree Mason, N.E.A., H.L.A., Rotary and chamber of commerce. Appointed secretary of state January 27, 1937, by Governor Kraschel to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Mrs. Miller. A democrat.

CHARLES W. STORMS, Fort Madison.—Auditor of State, was born in Fort Madison, Lee county, Iowa, October 12, 1870. Educated in the public schools and business college. Married and has five children. Business man and lumber broker. Served twelve years as member of the Fort Madison city council; two terms as county chairman and twelve years on the democratic state committee. Was a member of the war board during the World war in charge of distribution of fuel. Elected auditor of state in 1932; re-elected in 1934 and 1936. A democrat.

LEO J. WEGMAN, Carroll.—Treasurer of State, was born at Maries, Missouri, May 17, 1875, and educated in the rural schools with collegiate course at Colum-

bus, Ohio. Entered railway service at an early age, holding various posts as telegraph operator or station agent with the C. M. & St. P. railway, Iowa Central and C., R. I. & P. railway. Entered banking business, first in a bank at Madill and also at Tishomingo, Indian Territory. Then moved to Iowa and for some five years was cashier of the Peoples Savings Bank at St. Benedict, Kossuth county, then spent three years in Omaha, returning to Halbur, Iowa, after purchasing the Farmers Savings Bank at that place. Located in Carroll in 1914, resided there until elected treasurer of state, November, 1932. Democratic chairman of Carroll county for fourteen years. Married to Ida Heinen of Loose Creek, Missouri, in 1902 and they have four children: Clarence, Irma, Edwin and Leonard. Re-elected in 1934 and 1936. A democrat.

JOHN H. MITCHELL, Fort Dodge.—Attorney General of the state of Iowa, was born at Fort Dodge, Iowa, November 5, 1899; attended Columbia College in Dubuque and the University of Iowa, where he was affiliated with the Sigma Chi social fraternity and Phi Delta Phi legal fraternity; was admitted to the bar in 1923; practiced law at Humboldt, Iowa, until 1927, when he became his father's partner in the firm of Mitchell & Mitchell at Fort Dodge. He was commander of the Humboldt post of the American Legion, and in 1927 was tenth district commander. He was married in 1927 to Miss Ruth Jaqua of Humboldt and they have two daughters, Martha and Jean. Served as state representative from Webster county in the forty-fifth, forty-fifth extra, forty-sixth and forty-sixth extra general assembly. In his second term in the legislature, he was elected speaker of the house of representatives and served as speaker during the forty-sixth and forty-sixth extra sessions of the general assembly. He was elected attorney general of the state in November of 1936, and took office on January 1, 1937. A democrat.

DR. THOMAS L. CURRAN, Ottumwa.—Secretary of Agriculture, was born in Ottumwa, Wapello county, Iowa, February 27, 1883. Educated in rural and parochial schools and was graduated from St. Joseph's College, St. Joseph, Missouri, receiving a degree in veterinary medicine. Practiced veterinary medicine; served with the United States department of interior as agricultural instructor. Adviser in animal industry to one Vincent Gomez, President of Venezuela, Central America, two years. Served with troop "G" United States cavalry. Served with General John Pershing in the Philippines for three years in the Moro uprising. Was in Europe during the World war. Elected secretary of agriculture, November, 1936. A member of the Spanish-American War Veterans, Veterans of Foreign Wars and Knights of Columbus. A democrat.

AGNES SAMUELSON, Shenandoah.—Superintendent of Public Instruction, was born in Page county, Iowa. Graduate Shenandoah high school, Western Normal College, and State University of Iowa. Phi Beta Kappa. Experience as rural teacher, high school principal, town superintendent, county superintendent, and member of faculty of Iowa State Teachers College. President of National Education Association 1935-36, member of Educational Policies Commission and National Council of Chief School Officers. Honorary degrees conferred by Augustana College, Rock Island, Illinois; MacMurray College for Girls, Jacksonville, Illinois; Simpson College, Indianola, Iowa; Luther College, Decorah, Iowa; and Tarkio College, Tarkio, Missouri. A republican.

M. P. CONWAY, Atlantic.—Railroad Commissioner, was born in Cass county, Iowa. Attended country school, city school and business college. Spent boyhood days on farm; one year railroading. Married an Atlantic girl in 1899. Moved to Anita and became a realtor. Has four children, three girls and a boy. Moved back to Atlantic in 1908 and has lived there since, being engaged in the real estate and insurance business except during the war, at which time he was chairman of the council of defense, assisted in liberty bond drives and all war activities in Cass county, and was in a group assigned to go across when armistice

was signed. Member of the democratic state central committee for sixteen years. Never ran for elective office except that of railroad commissioner, and was elected November 8, 1932. Was selected a chairman of the board of railroad commissioners January, 1935, and again in January, 1936. Re-elected as a member of the commission at the general election in 1936. A democrat.

HARRY B. DUNLAP, Ames.—Railroad Commissioner, was born in Victor, Iowa. He was reared in Perry, attending grade and high school, and C. C. C. business college, Des Moines. Was manager of the Des Moines Creamery Company from 1903-1915. In 1915 he moved to Marshalltown and became associated with the Rude Auto Company, Ford dealer, operating several places. In 1918, he organized the Dunlap Motor Company, Ames, and continued as a retail and wholesale dealer until 1932. Married Ethel M. Bailey of Perry, Iowa, June 28, 1905, and they have four children, one daughter, Marjorie, and three sons, Harry B., Jr., Zac, and Norman, all attending Iowa State College. Elected railroad commissioner November 6, 1934. A democrat.

GEORGE A. HUFFMAN, Des Moines.—Railroad Commissioner, was born at Madina, Ohio; resident of Iowa forty years; former newspaper publisher; former chairman democratic state central committee; delegate to democratic national convention in Baltimore, 1912; postmaster of Des Moines, Iowa, 1915 to 1924; has wife and two daughters, Bethel (deceased) and Mirlam, a teacher in Roosevelt high school, Des Moines, Iowa; has two grandchildren, Barbara and Phillip Nye. A Mason and Methodist. Elected railroad commissioner in 1934. Selected as chairman of the commission in January, 1937. A democrat.

JOHN W. ANDERSON, Sioux City.—Judge of the Supreme Court, was born on a farm in Buchanan county, Iowa, July 21, 1871, of Scotch and English parentage. Attended public schools and the Upper Iowa University, and was admitted to the bar of Iowa, May 11, 1893. Has two children; Mrs. Marjora B. Schneider of Des Moines and Mrs. Elma I. Bails of Sioux City. Mr. Anderson practiced law in Woodbury and Monona counties, Iowa, since his admission to the bar. He was elected and served as county attorney of Monona county 1908-1912. He was elected judge of the fourth judicial district in 1914, re-elected without opposition in 1918, and resigned such office in 1920, and resumed the practice of law in Sioux City, and so continued until January 1, 1933. He is a past presiding officer of many fraternal organizations and has been active in the work of the various Masonic bodies and in the B. P. O. Elks. Elected justice of the supreme court in 1932. A democrat.

MAURICE FRANCIS DONEGAN, Davenport.—Judge of the Supreme Court, was born on a farm near Welton, Clinton county, Iowa. He attended the local district school and Dewitt high school. He later attended Creighton College, Omaha, Nebraska, from which he received the degree of A.B., and also Georgetown University, Washington, D. C., from which he received the degree A.M. He began the study of law at Georgetown University and continued it at the State University of Iowa, where he received the degree LL.B., in 1901. He began the practice of law in Davenport, Iowa, the same year, and from 1903 to 1908 was associated with the firm of Sharon & Donegan. From 1908 to 1912 he was city attorney of Davenport, and from 1912 to 1921 he was judge of the district court, from which office he resigned and entered private practice. In 1932 he was elected justice of the supreme court of Iowa. A democrat.

JOHN W. KINTZINGER, Dubuque.—Judge of the Supreme Court, was born in the city and county of Dubuque, Iowa, August 12, 1870. Graduated from the public grade and high schools in the city of Dubuque. Attended the State University of Iowa and graduated from its law department in June, 1897, with the degree of LL.B., and immediately entered the practice of law in Dubuque. Was a member of the city council of Dubuque in 1900 and 1901 and was elected city

attorney in 1904 and served several years. Was elected judge of the district court of the 19th judicial district, and served in that capacity for 12 years from 1911. Was a delegate to the national democratic convention at Baltimore in 1912. Was chairman of the legal advisory board of the war department for Dubuque county during the World war. Married in July, 1893, to Fannie E. Webb of Fayette county, Iowa, and has three children, Helen J., John W., Jr., and Robert H. Elected to the supreme court in November, 1932. A democrat.

W. H. HAMILTON, Sigourney.—Judge of the Supreme Court, was born on a farm in Warren township, Keokuk county, Iowa, on May 1, 1877. He attended country school and graduated from the high school at Delta, Iowa; graduated from Drake University law school in 1900 with degree of LL.B.; practiced law in Sigourney until the fall of 1934, when he was elected justice of the Iowa supreme court; was made chief justice of the Iowa supreme court on July 1, 1937. Served as county attorney of Keokuk county from 1902 to 1904. Candidate for congress from the old sixth congressional district of Iowa in 1914. His family consists of his wife and three children, Edgar C., who is a practicing attorney in Sigourney; Jack, who operates his father's farm near Delta, Iowa; and Martha E. Hansen (Mrs. Roy J.), who resides in Sigourney. Mrs. Hamilton has for years been prominent in state and national D.A.R. circles and in the P.E.O. sisterhood. He is a member of the Methodist church, and a member of the Masonic, I.O.O.F. and W.O.W. lodges. Elected to the supreme court in 1932. A democrat.

JAMES M. PARSONS, Des Moines.—Judge of the Supreme Court, was born on a farm about four miles southwest of Anamosa, in Jones county, Iowa, October 16, 1858. His father died in 1864 and his mother in 1868. He attended various grade schools and finally entered Ames College in March, 1876. In September, 1877, entered Cornell College, taking the engineering course. In 1879 he left school and entered the office of Sheean & McCan, where he read law, and was admitted to the bar in the then circuit court October 10, 1880. He commenced the practice of law in Rock Rapids, Iowa, April, 1881, where he remained until May 8, 1906, when he removed to Des Moines and remained in the practice there until January 1, 1935, having been elected to his present position at the 1934 election. A democrat.

PAUL W. RICHARDS, Red Oak.—Judge of the Supreme Court, was born in Red Oak, Iowa, where he has since lived and practiced law since 1896. Graduated from Grinnell College in 1894, A.B. degree. He served as city attorney of Red Oak, as county attorney of Montgomery county, and for eight years was referee in bankruptcy at Council Bluffs. His family consists of Mrs. Richards and two sons. His law practice in Red Oak was established by his father, C. E. Richards, in 1867. Elected justice of the supreme court in 1934. A democrat.

RICHARD F. MITCHELL, Fort Dodge.—Judge of the Supreme Court, was born at Fort Dodge, Webster county, Iowa, on October 11, 1889, the son of Peter M. and Sarah F. Mitchell. He attended the German Lutheran school at Fort Dodge, and then graduated from the Fort Dodge high school. He received a B.A. degree in 1912, and an LL.B. degree in 1913 from the State University of Iowa, and was admitted to practice law in the state of Iowa in 1913. Started practicing at Fort Dodge, Iowa, and for ten years practiced in the firm of Kelleher & Mitchell. He was a candidate for congress from the tenth congressional district, and was defeated by Congressman Dickinson, later Senator Dickinson. In 1928, elected state chairman of the democratic state central committee, and in 1930 was elected democratic national committeeman for Iowa, and was re-elected in 1932. Was a delegate to the democratic national convention at Houston in 1928; again at Chicago in 1932, and Philadelphia in 1936. Was elected to the supreme court of Iowa in the general election of 1932, and re-elected in 1936. Served as chief justice during 1934. A democrat.

CARL B. STIGER, Toledo.—Judge of the Supreme Court, was born in Toledo, Iowa, February 21, 1873. Graduated from Toledo public schools and from Western College. Attended the University of Chicago law school, graduating in 1912. Served as mayor of Toledo, state representative from Tama county in the forty-fourth and forty-fifth general assemblies. Appointed judge of the seventeenth judicial district in 1933, and was elected to this office in 1934. Was appointed a member of the supreme court in February, 1936, and was elected justice of the supreme court of Iowa in 1936. Member of the American Legion, Lions club and Masonic order. Married December 25, 1930, to Mary E. Dugan and has three children, Larry of Perry, Iowa, Harry and Mary of Toledo. A democrat.

EDWARD A. SAGER, Waverly.—Judge of the Supreme Court, was born October 17, 1872, in Maxfield township, Bremer county, Iowa. Was graduated from the State University of Iowa law school June 13, 1894, and entered upon the practice of law in Waverly, forming a partnership with Burton E. Sweet, in which he continued until his election to the supreme bench in November, 1936. A democrat.

UNITED STATES SENATORS AND REPRESENTATIVES

GUY MARK GILLETTE, Cherokee.—United States senator, was born in Cherokee February 3, 1875; attended the Cherokee public schools; graduated from the Drake University College of Law in 1900 and was admitted to the bar of Iowa the same year; served as prosecuting attorney of Cherokee county, 1907-1909; member of the state senate, 1912-1916; served as sergeant in the Spanish-American war and as captain of infantry during the World war; since World war, engaged in farming. Married and has one son 8 years old. Elected to the seventy-third congress on November 8, 1932; re-elected to the seventy-fourth congress, having a majority of 26,000 votes, and served until his resignation on November 3, 1936, having been elected to the United States senate on November 3, 1936, to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Hon. Louis Murphy, for the term ending January 3, 1939. A democrat.

CLYDE LA VERNE HERRING, Des Moines.—United States senator, was born in Jackson, Michigan, May 3, 1879; son of James Gwynn and Stella Mae (Addison); educated in the public schools; married Emma Pearl Spinney, of Mobile, Alabama, February 7, 1901; children, La Verne Barlow, Lawrence Winthrop, and Clyde Edsel; rancher, Colorado, 1902-1906; moved to Massena, Iowa, in 1906; farmer, 1906-1908; in automobile business, Atlantic, Iowa, 1908-1910; moved to Des Moines, Iowa, in 1910; president of Herring Motor Company, Herring-Wissler Company; director of Greater Des Moines Committee; congregationalist; democratic nominee for governor of Iowa in 1920, and for United States senator in 1922; member of the Democratic National Committee for Iowa; elected governor of Iowa for 1933-1935 term; re-elected for 1935-1937 term; elected to the United States senate on November 3, 1936, for the term ending January 3, 1943. A democrat.

EDWARD CLAYTON EICHER, Washington.—Representative in congress for the first congressional district, was born on a farm near Noble, Washington county, Iowa; graduate University of Chicago; lawyer; member of Iowa, Illinois, and Supreme Court of the United States bars; member of Alpha Delta Phi college fraternity and Phi Delta Phi legal fraternity; married on August 19, 1908, to Hazel Mount; member of governor's commission to take Iowa soldiers' vote, 1918; member of Washington county, Iowa state, and American bar associations; delegate to democratic national convention, 1932; elected to the seventy-third congress; re-elected to each succeeding congress; member of the committee on interstate and foreign commerce. A democrat.

WILLIAM SEBASTIAN JACOBSEN, Clinton.—Representative in congress for the second congressional district, was born in Clinton on January 15, 1887 (son of Bernhard M. Jacobsen, a member of congress from 1931 to 1936). Married to

Mad Madsen, of Clinton, in 1915; wife died in 1920; has two sons, B. M. Jacobsen, 2d, aged 19, and Maenard W. Jacobsen, aged 16; attended the Clinton schools and the normal college of American Gymnastic Union, Indianapolis, Indiana; started working as a timekeeper and shipping clerk; physical director of Turner Society and of Y. M. C. A.; manager of department store and part owner with his father from 1915 to 1927; present occupation, secretary, treasurer, and manager of the Clinton Thrift Company; also manager of his father's business property and farm interests; member of the Clinton Turner society, Masonic lodge, Scottish Rite Consistory, Shrine, and Rotary club; elected to the seventy-fifth congress on November 3, 1936, receiving 70,923 votes against three opponents receiving a total of 62,735. A democrat.

JOHN W. GWYNNE, Waterloo.—Representative in congress for the third congressional district, was born in Iowa county, Iowa, October 20, 1889; received degree of B. A. in 1912 and LL. B. in 1914, from the State University of Iowa; judge of the municipal court of city of Waterloo for 6 years; prosecuting attorney of Black Hawk county for 6 years; served in the World war with the eighty-eighth division; married and has two children; elected to the seventy-fourth congress on November 6, 1934; re-elected to the seventy-fifth congress on November 3, 1936. A republican.

FRED BIERMANN, Decorah.—Representative in congress for the fourth congressional district, was born March 20, 1884, at Rochester, Minnesota; graduated from the Decorah high school in 1901; attended the university of Minnesota for 3 years; graduated from Columbia University with a bachelor of arts degree in 1905; attended Valder's business college in Decorah in 1906 and Harvard law school 1907-1908; homesteaded in North Dakota; editor and publisher of the Decorah Journal, 1908-1931; married Miss Adel Rygg, January 25, 1930; during the World war was a volunteer in the United States army and served from May, 1917, until June, 1919; of this period ten months was spent overseas as first lieutenant in the eighty-eighth division; postmaster at Decorah, 1913-1923; elected park commissioner of Decorah in 1923, in which capacity he is still serving; for about twenty years was chairman of the democratic central committee of Winneshiek county, and for eight years was a member of the democratic state central committee; delegate to the democratic national convention in Houston in 1928; temporary chairman democratic state convention April 3, 1936; elected to the seventy-third, seventy-fourth, and seventy-fifth congresses. A democrat.

LOYD THURSTON, Osceola.—Representative in congress for the fifth congressional district, was born in Clarke county, Iowa, March 27, 1880; served in Spanish-American, Philippine, and World wars; married; graduate of State University of Iowa, 1902; county attorney Clarke county 4 years; member of the Jefferson National Memorial Expansion Association; director of the American Home Finding Association of Ottumwa, Iowa; elected to sixty-ninth, seventieth, seventy-first, and seventy-second congresses for the old eighth congressional district; elected to the seventy-third, seventy-fourth, and seventy-fifth congresses from the fifth congressional district. A republican.

CASSIUS C. DOWELL, Des Moines.—Representative in congress for the sixth congressional district, was born near Summerset, Warren county, Iowa; attended the public schools, the Baptist College, Des Moines, Iowa, Simpson College, Indianola, Iowa, was graduated from the liberal arts department, Drake University, Des Moines, Iowa, in 1886, and from the law department of Drake University in 1887, receiving the degree of LL. B.; was admitted to the bar in 1888 at Des Moines, Iowa, and practiced law in Des Moines until elected to congress in 1915; was a member of the Iowa house of representatives, 1894-1898, and was elected speaker pro tempore of the house; served in the state senate, 1902-1912; member of Loyal Order of Moose, Modern Woodmen of America, Maccabees, Odd Fellows, Knights of Pythias, Masons, Grotto, Consistory, Mystic Shrine, Delta Theta Phi, Phi Beta Kappa, and the University Church of Christ; married

Miss Belle I. Riddle, of Des Moines, Iowa; elected as a representative to the sixty-fourth congress and to each succeeding congress, including the seventy-third; elected to the seventy-fifth congress. A republican.

OTHA D. WEARIN, Hastings.—Representative in congress for the seventh congressional district, was born on a farm near Hastings on January 10, 1903; attended country school; graduated from Tabor Academy in 1920, and received a B. A. degree from Grinnell College in 1924; married Lola Brazelton, 1931; prior to and since 1924 has been associated with his father in farm work; elected treasurer of Wearin rural school district in 1926; always been active in farm organizations; delegate to Iowa state democratic conventions of 1924, 1926, 1928, and 1930; assistant secretary of Iowa democratic convention, 1928; temporary chairman, keynoter, and permanent chairman of Iowa state democratic judicial convention, 1930; elected to Iowa state legislature in 1928 and re-elected in 1930; assistant floor leader of minority party in forty-fourth general assembly of Iowa; appointed by governor of Iowa as a delegate to the International Mid-West Aeronautics convention in Minneapolis, 1930; alternate delegate to the democratic national convention at Chicago in 1932; trustee of re-established Tabor College; while abroad in 1927 studied farm production and did research work in the International Institute of Agriculture in Rome; author of "An Iowa Farmer Abroad," 1928; "History of Tabor College," 1931; editor of weekly syndicate, "An Iowa Farmer in Foreign Fields," and co-editor of weekly syndicate, "New Roads in Old Mexico"; staff contributor to Wallaces' Farmer; member of Iowa State Historical Society, Valley Forge Historical Society, Grinnell alumnae, and farm organizations; elected to the seventy-third congress; re-elected to the seventy-fourth congress; re-elected to the seventy-fifth congress. GILCHRIST, Laurens.—Representative in congress for the eighth congressional district, was born in Pennsylvania in 1868 and moved to Iowa in 1871; educated in common schools and at Iowa State Teachers College; superintendent town schools; county superintendent; law course, State University; lawyer; president school board; member lower house in legislature and of state senate; member seventy-second, seventy-third, seventy-fourth, and seventy-fifth congresses; married; three children. A republican.

VINCENT F. HARRINGTON.—Representative in congress for the ninth congressional district, was born in Sioux City, Iowa, May 16, 1903; son of T. F. and Maria Harrington; educated in the Sioux City schools and Trinity College, and was graduated from Notre Dame University in June, 1925, with B.A. degree; instructor in history and economics, and athletic director, University of Portland, Oregon, 1926-1927; vice president and general manager, Continental Mortgage Company, Sioux City, Iowa, since 1927; served in three sessions of the Iowa state senate, 1932-1936; nominated for lieutenant governor of Iowa on democratic ticket in June, 1936 primary; withdrew in August to accept convention nomination for congress from the ninth district to fill vacancy caused by resignation of representative Guy M. Gillette, who had received convention nomination for United States senator; elected to the seventy-fifth congress on November 3, 1936, by plurality of 11,000 votes; married Catherine O'Connor, of Homer, Nebraska, in 1929, and they have two daughters—Patricia Ann, aged 3, and Catherine Tim, aged 6. A democrat.

HARRY C. WHITE, Vinton.—Member of the Board of Control, was born in Guernsey county, Ohio, October 6, 1869, of Irish parents. When he was six months old his parents moved to Benton county and settled on a farm near Garrison. Educated in the district schools, Tilford Academy, and Cornell College, Mount Vernon. Taught school for several terms. Now owns and operates a large stock farm.

For many years president of the Peoples Savings Bank of Garrison. Was married in 1894. Elected representative from Benton county in 1910. Re-elected in 1912. Elected senator in 1914, re-elected in 1918, in 1922, and 1930. Appointed a member of the board of control while serving as senator in the forty-fifth general assembly. A democrat.

FRANK M. STEVENS, Garden Grove.—Member of the Board of Control of state institutions, was born on a farm near Salem, Illinois, May 14, 1872. He went to Chicago at the age of fifteen, an orphan, and became superintendent of Empire Warehouses, Inc., of Chicago, at age of 26. Married Evelyn M. E. H. FELTON, Indianola.—Member of the Board of Control of state institutions, was born in New Virginia, Warren county, Iowa, November 11, 1890, the son of Z. T. and Sara Felton. Educated in the New Virginia schools. Married Velda Frederick of New Virginia, March 24, 1913. Father of five children, four sons and a daughter. Is engaged in business at Indianola. Chairman Warren county republican central committee ten years. Selected as member Iowa republican state central committee from the seventh district in 1930. Member of the Methodist church, a thirty-second degree Mason and a member of the Mystic Shrine. Appointed a member of the board of control by Governor Turner in 1931 and re-appointed by Governor Kraschel in 1937. A republican.

CHARLES B. MURTAGH, Algona.—State Comptroller, was born at Waverly, Bremer county, Iowa, November 14, 1881, the son of James X. and Mercy L. Murtagh. Moved to Shell Rock, Butler county, Iowa, in April, 1884, and graduated from high school there in 1898. Moved to Kossuth county in April, 1899, where for one year was bookkeeper and assistant in Fenton State Bank. Moved to Ringsted in Emmet county in 1900, where he was first cashier and later president of Ringsted State Bank for many years. While at Ringsted he served on the town council and as mayor. Was also elected state representative from Emmet county and served in the thirty-fourth general assembly. Moved to Algona in Kossuth county in March, 1912, and for more than fifteen years was cashier of the County Savings Bank. He is a member of the board of trustees of Buena Vista College. Utterback and Julia Esther Hayes (now deceased); educated in country school, Hedrick normal and commercial college, and Drake University, Des Moines, Iowa; receiving degrees of A.B. 1903, LL.B. 1906, LL.M. 1908. Member of Phi Beta Kappa, Acacia fraternity, Alpha Phi Omega, and Delta Theta Phi legal fraternity. Married October 4, 1904, to Edith Gwynne (now deceased), and they had two children—Mrs. Morris O. (Esther) Penquite and Mrs. Paul K. (Gretchen) Ashby. Married again December 25, 1934, to Mrs. Cora Alice Prine. Member of the University Church of Christ, Des Moines, Iowa; chairman, Des Moines chapter American Red Cross, 14 years; chairman, Iowa state council Red Cross chapters, from organization to 1934, now resigned; instructor, law department, Drake University, 26 years; lecturer, Still College, 20 years; active member for Iowa of grand council, order of DeMolay for boys; chairman, court of honor, Boy Scouts of America, Des Moines, Iowa, since 1915; member Lions club; past

district governor of Iowa Lions clubs; chairman, major activities committee of Lions International, 4 years; chairman, legislative committee of Iowa state conference of social work, 3 years; former vice president of Iowa humane society; lawyer; admitted to bar in 1906; police judge of Des Moines, 1912-14; judge, ninth Iowa judicial district, January 1, 1915, to January 1, 1927; elected judge, Iowa supreme court, November 8, 1932; elected to the seventy-fourth Congress in 1934; elected democratic national committeeman for Iowa in 1916. ERNEST R. MOORE, Cedar Rapids.—Member of the Board of Parole, was born in Anamosa, Iowa, November 1, 1868, and he has been a resident of Cedar Rapids since 1877. In his local community, he has served as a member of the city water board; soldiers relief commission, county old age pension board and the board of education. He was a member of the Iowa house of representatives for six years and he was lieutenant governor of Iowa for two terms. A member of the Elks and Masons. Appointed a member of the board of parole by Governor Kraschel in 1937. A republican.

LESLIE O. ROSS, Sidney.—Member of Board of Parole, was born on a farm in Fremont county on October 19, 1891; attended Fremont county schools and completed a commercial course of study in Boyles College of Omaha, Nebraska. Married Margaret Mitchell of Sidney, Iowa, and has three children, Betty, Mary and Robert. Has always been engaged in farming. Elected clerk of district court of Fremont county, on the democratic ticket, in 1926, which position he held for ten years. Was quite active in state organization of county officers, being chairman of clerk's association of state for three years. Was unsuccessful candidate for democratic nomination for secretary of state in 1936. Member of Presbyterian church, and Masonic, Elk and Knights of Pythias lodges. Democratic chairman of Fremont county. Appointed by Governor Clyde L. Herring to fill vacancy on the board of parole caused by death of Frank Carrell, and began serving on the board January 1, 1937. A democrat.

LOUIS E. RODDEWIG, Davenport.—Member of State Board of Assessment and Review, was born March 4, 1880, in Davenport, Iowa, where he has made his home continuously. Attended State University of Iowa, graduating with degree of LL.B. in June, 1906, elected police magistrate 1906 and served until 1916. Elected mayor of city of Davenport and served from April, 1924, to April, 1928. Practiced law in Davenport, Iowa, for the past twenty-seven years. Member of American Bar association; Iowa State Bar association and Scott County Bar association. While at the university was a member of Phi Delta Phi legal fraternity and the Phi Delta Theta fraternal society. Other affiliations, Knight Templar, Scottish Rite Mason, Shrine, Knights of Pythias, B. P. O. Elks, Moose, Eagles, and member of Episcopal church. Appointed to the state board of assessment and review by Governor Herring, July 1, 1933, for a six-year term. A democrat.

C. F. GREEN, Sioux City.—Member of Iowa State Board of Assessment and Review. Born at Sioux City, Iowa, on July 6, 1879. Appointed to present position by Governor Clyde L. Herring on June 1, 1935. A republican.

DAVID L. MURROW, Corydon.—Member of the Iowa State Board of Assessment and Review and vice chairman, was born May 9, 1871, in Poweshiek county, Iowa. When a small boy he moved with his parents to Wayne county, Iowa, on a farm. He attended the country schools, farmed in the summer and taught country school in the winter until 1900, when he entered the Iowa College of Law, which was connected with Drake University, graduating in 1901 with a degree of LL.B.

Admitted to the bar in 1901, practiced law continuously in Corydon, Iowa, until his appointment to this board by Governor Herring to succeed Senator John K. Valentine, for the term ending July 1, 1937. Was reappointed by Governor Kraschel for the full term ending July 1, 1943. Member of the American Bar association; Iowa State Bar association and Wayne County Bar association. Member of the Delta Theta Phi fraternal society; Mason; Knight Templar; Shrine; member of Christian church. A democrat.

IRVING H. KNUDSON, Jewell.—Member of the State Highway Commission, was born April 27, 1896, at Jewell, Iowa. Received his education in the Jewell public schools, the Jewell Lutheran college, and the State University of Iowa. World war veteran and a member of the American Legion. Married in 1921 to Miss Leafy Bergum of Westby, Wisconsin, and they have two children living, Irving Howard and Metta Nell. Member of the Lutheran church. Engaged in the auction, real estate and general insurance business. Was elected state representative in 1924, 1926 and 1928, and state senator in 1930 and in 1934. In March, 1935, while serving as state senator, received a republican appointment by governor Herring to the state highway commission for a four-year term beginning July 1, 1935. A republican.

H. M. GREENE, Avoca.—Member of the State Highway Commission, was born on a farm near Avoca, Iowa, September 6, 1882. He attended rural school and Avoca high school; graduated from the law department of the State University of Iowa in 1906. He was admitted to the bar the same year but returned to farming, at which he is engaged at the present time. He enlisted as a private in L company, 168th infantry, Rainbow division, and was later made a sergeant. He was twice wounded. He is a charter member and first commander of Fred Funston post, American Legion at Avoca, Iowa. He is a Mason and Elk. Served as a member of the forty-second, forty-second extra and forty-third and forty-fourth general assemblies. Appointed by Governor Herring as a member of the highway commission for term beginning July, 1935. A republican.

CURTIS L. MCKINNON, New London.—Member of the State Highway Commission, was born in New London, Iowa, October 10, 1889. He has been a farmer and business man of Henry county practically all his life and was educated in the public schools of Henry county. He is married, has a wife and two children. Elected state representative in 1932 and 1934, appointed to highway commission while serving in the forty-sixth general assembly. A democrat.

A. A. HURST, Maquoketa.—Member of the Iowa State Highway Commission, was born in Hurstville, Iowa, June 16, 1876. Received his education in the Hurstville and Maquoketa public schools and Davenport Business College, Davenport, Iowa. Farmed and was manufacturer of Maquoketa lime for 38 years. Served as member Jackson county board of supervisors and of board of directors of American Savings bank. Affiliated with Knight Templars, Mystic Shrine, B.P.O. Elks, and Episcopal church. Appointed by Governor Kraschel as a member of the highway commission for term beginning July, 1937. A democrat.

GUS A. OLSON, Whiting.—Member of the Iowa State Highway Commission, was born in Monona county, Iowa, July 16, 1879, and was educated in the public schools. He lived on the home farm for forty-two years engaging in farming and stock raising. In 1921, he entered the hardware business in Whiting and continued this business for five years when he returned to the business of feeding live stock. He has served the public as township trustee, town councilman and county supervisor. Appointed a member of the highway commission by Governor Kraschel for the term beginning July, 1937. A democrat.

F. R. WHITE.—Chief Engineer of the Iowa State Highway Commission, was born May 21, 1884, near Selma, Van Buren county, Iowa. Graduated from

Keosauqua high school in 1902. Graduated from the civil engineering department, Iowa State College, in 1907. Served as rodman and instrumentman on the Key West extension of the Florida East Coast Railroad from June, 1907, to February, 1908. Served as inspector on highway bridge construction under the Iowa state highway commission from July, 1908, to December, 1910, and from June to August, 1911. Served as instrumentman and chief of party on drainage surveys under the Morgan Engineering Company of Memphis, Tennessee, from December, 1910, to May, 1911. Served as field engineer, Iowa state highway commission, August, 1911, to March, 1915. Served as road engineer, Iowa state highway commission, March, 1915, to April, 1919. Served as chief engineer of the Iowa state highway commission, April, 1919, to the present time. In 1923 vice president, and in 1924 president of the American Association of State Highway Officials. From 1924 to date, member executive council American Association of State Highway Officials. On October 31, 1912, married Miss Mary M. DeHart of Keosauqua and has two children, Margaret and James.

BERNARD E. MANLEY, Mason City.—Member of the Iowa Liquor Control Commission, was born January 22, 1884, on a farm in Woodbury county, Iowa. Attended country school and Sloan high school finishing in 1901. Graduated from the University of Iowa Ph.G. in 1905. Clerked in a country store in Sloan until 1915. From 1915 until 1934, associated with his brothers in the Manley Brothers Company, department store, Mason City, Iowa. Appointed by Governor Herring in 1934 for the short term and reappointed by him in 1935 for a six-year term. A democrat.

DICK R. LANE, Davenport.—Member of the Iowa Liquor Control Commission, was born in Davenport, Scott county, Iowa, October 27, 1882. Educated in Davenport public schools. Graduated from the law school at the State University of Iowa, LL.B. 1904. Practiced law 1904-1914. Engaged in hotel business from 1914 until appointment as commissioner of Iowa Liquor Control Commission, for the term March 15, 1934, to July 1, 1937. He was reappointed in 1937 by Governor Kraschel for a six-year term. A republican.

ANDREW STEWART, Rockwell City.—Member of the Iowa Liquor Control Commission, was born in Newton, Jasper county, Iowa, March 15, 1872. His father and mother, Mr. and Mrs. Andrew Stewart, were natives of Scotland; they moved to Maryland and later to Jasper county, where they resided until their death. Andrew Stewart obtained his early education in the schools at Newton and later attended Hazel Dell academy. On March 1, 1907, he moved to Rockwell City, where he has since resided. All his life he has been engaged in farming, paying special attention to the raising of Shorthorn cattle and Percheron horses. He helped organize the Rockwell City county fair twenty-six years ago, and has been its president ever since. He served as a representative from Calhoun county in the forty-fifth, forty-fifth extra and forty-sixth general assemblies. Appointed by Governor Herring in 1935 as a member of the Iowa Liquor Control Commission. A democrat.

RAY MURPHY, Ida Grove.—Commissioner of Insurance, was born in Dubuque county, Iowa, May 2, 1887. Has spent most of his life in Ida Grove where he was city attorney for ten years and county attorney for four years. World war veteran, former department commander of American Legion and graduate of State University of Iowa law college. Formerly chairman of the Board of Parole and the Board of Assessment and Review. Appointed by Governor Herring Commissioner of Insurance for the term beginning July 1, 1935, served as national commander of the American Legion, 1935-1936. A democrat.

D. W. BATES, Albia.—Superintendent of Banking, was born January 16, 1873; raised on a farm and attended the grade public schools. On April 13, 1893, he entered the law office of L. T. Richmond in Albia, Iowa, where he studied law

for three years, during which period he taught 18 months in the country schools. On May 13, 1896, he was admitted to the bar. On January 1, 1897, he was appointed deputy clerk of district court, Monroe county, Iowa. On February 8, 1899, he was appointed clerk of courts and served until January 1, 1901. In January, 1901, he entered the practice of law. In 1908, he was elected county attorney of Monroe county, Iowa, and served six years. Engaged in banking business in 1906, and has been connected with the business since that time acting as executive officer of the institutions with which he was connected. Acted as director of state banks under S. F. 111 from January 23, 1933, until July 1, when he became Superintendent of Banking under an appointment from Governor Herring, reappointed by Governor Kraschel for the term beginning July 1, 1937. A democrat.

MILTON PEACO, Clinton.—Labor Commissioner, was born in Belle Plaine, Iowa, and when two years of age moved with his parents, Thomas C. and Mary E. Peaco, to Clinton county, where he has since resided. Was educated in the public schools of Clinton. Entered the service of the Chicago & North Western Railroad Company when fifteen years of age, and is still employed by the company as a machinist. In 1899, married to Sadie E. Cook, a daughter of Robert E. and Nancy M. Cook. Member of the Christian church, a thirty-second degree Mason, member of the Eastern Star, and a charter member of Dewey lodge No. 283, International Association of Machinists. Elected state representative in 1930 and re-elected in 1932 and 1934. Appointed labor commissioner by Governor Kraschel for the term beginning July 1, 1937. A democrat.

JOHN T. CLARKSON, Albia.—Iowa Industrial Commissioner, was born at Johnstown, Pennsylvania, December 16, 1861. Attended public schools until ten years of age when he went to work in the coal mines and thereafter his education was obtained by home study and special instruction from school superintendents, thus obtaining the equivalent of a college education. He moved to Iowa in 1884 and located in Kirksville, Wapello county. Read law in the office of A. C. Steck of Ottumwa, Iowa, and was admitted to the practice of law in May, 1885, and practiced law in Albia, Iowa, until July 1, 1937. Was elected county attorney of Monroe county in 1896 and served two terms. In 1908, he was elected state senator, representing Monroe and Marion counties and served two terms. During his service in the senate, he was the author of the workmen's compensation law, the law which he will now administer. Appointed industrial commissioner by Governor Kraschel July 1, 1937. A democrat.

J. V. PYLE, Chariton.—Fire Marshal, was born in Ottumwa, Iowa, January 27, 1903, son of Mr. and Mrs. C. A. Pyle now living in Chariton, Iowa. Graduated from Chariton high school. Fifteen years in clothing business and active in all community activities. Member of Knights of Columbus and officer in Iowa Fireman's Association. A democrat.

WALTER L. BIERRING, Des Moines.—Commissioner of Health, was born in Davenport, Iowa, July 15, 1868, of Danish parentage. Education: Davenport high school, University of Iowa graduate of medicine in 1892. Graduate studies Heidelberg, Vienna and Pasteur institute in Paris 1892-93-94-95-96 and 1901. Professor of pathology and bacteriology State University of Iowa 1893-1903. Professor of medicine, State University of Iowa, 1903-1910. Professor of medicine, Drake University, 1910-13. President Iowa State Board of Health and Board of Medical Examiners 1913-21. President Iowa State Medical Society, 1908. President American Medical Association, 1933. Appointed Commissioner of Health by Governor Herring, July, 1933, and reappointed by Governor Kraschel in 1937.

JOHN D. DENISON, Des Moines.—State Librarian, was born at Clarion, Iowa, September 29, 1872, and was raised on a farm. He was graduated from Clarion high school in June, 1889, and Upper Iowa University, at Fayette, Iowa, in June

of 1893. Was principal of high school in Kansas for three years and then entered the law department of the University of Nebraska in 1896, and was graduated from there in 1898. Returned to Clarion, Iowa, and entered the practice of law on August 12, 1898. Served as head auditor of the Modern Woodmen, 1901-1905; as a member of the governing board, of the Royal Neighbors of America, from 1905 to 1908; as director of the Brotherhood of American Yeomen from 1905 to 1913, and as trial attorney from 1913-1917, and as general counsel from 1917-1921. Removed from Clarion, Iowa, to Dubuque, Iowa, in 1905 and was assistant county attorney, Dubuque county, from 1907 to 1910. Removed to Des Moines, Iowa, in 1915 and engaged in the general practice of law in 1921. Served as referee in bankruptcy, for the central division, southern district of Iowa, from September, 1930, to September, 1936, when he returned to the general practice of law. Mr. Denison, was married to Lulu Clark, of Freeport, Illinois, in November, 1900. One son, John D. Denison, Jr., was born of this marriage in 1903. ORIE ERB KLINGAMAN, Davenport.—Curator, Historical, Memorial and Art Department, was born in La Grange county, Indiana, on a farm July 7, 1874, son of Jonathan and Jennie Klingaman; attended country schools and came to Guthrie county, Iowa, in 1888. He worked on a farm, later taught in rural schools and in Guthrie Center, Creston and Afton; graduated from Highland Park College, did graduate work in the State University of Iowa, receiving the degree of M.A.; was director of the extension division of the State University of Iowa, 1913-23, resigning to become a research man in retail business in New York and Boston; returned to Iowa in 1926; practiced law in Des Moines in 1927 and 1928, became assistant director of the Davenport Public Museum, 1929; later county director of relief in 1933; was adviser on clothing in Washington, D. C., for the Federal Surplus Relief Corporation in the early days of the depression. He married Katharine Marley February 19, 1903. They are the parents of three sons, Murray O. and Roger M., with the New York Telephone Company, Albany, New York, and Halsey E., in the land section of the United States engineers. He is a Methodist and Mason; Sigma Phi Epsilon, Sigma Delta Chi (journalistic), Phi Delta Kappa (educational); did educational work during the war, and was director of Americanization for Iowa; appointed February 15, 1937, as curator, taking office April 1, 1937.

S. J. GALVIN, Hampton.—Member of the State Board of Education, was born in Marion county, Iowa, August 7, 1878, the oldest son of J. A. and Margaret Haynes Galvin. Attended country schools in Marion and Calhoun counties, graduated from Knoxville (Iowa) high school 1897. Attended Northern Illinois Normal School (Dixon, Ill.) and Highland Park College, Des Moines. Married Ethel Craig, of Knoxville, in 1899. Has two children, Ruth and Richard. Started business career as stenographer and accountant for the Iowa Pipe & Tile Co., Des Moines, in 1899, and with the exception of three years as assistant manager of the John Deere Plow Co. of Moline, has been in the clay products business continuously since 1899. Has been secretary and general manager of the Sheffield (Iowa) Brick & Tile Co. since 1923. Was the democratic nominee for the office of state railroad commissioner in 1928. Is a member of the Masonic fraternity, the Christian Science church and the Hampton Rotary club. Served as chairman of the Franklin county democratic central committee and chairman of the executive committee of the Iowa Manufacturers association. Was appointed by Governor John Hammill to succeed Claude R. Porter as a member of the state board of education in 1929 for the term expiring June 30, 1931. Reappointed by Governor Clyde L. Herring for a six-year term beginning July 1, 1933. A democrat.

HENRY C. SHULL, Sioux City.—Member of the State Board of Education, was born January 16, 1892, at Sioux City, Iowa, son of Deloss Carlton and Frances Edith Shull. Was educated in Sioux City public schools and graduated from the Sioux City central high school in June, 1910. Collegiate education, University of Chicago (Ph.B. 1914). Legal education, Harvard law school and University of Chicago law school (J.D. 1916). Practiced law in Sioux City, Iowa, since June, 1916, except for two years in the United States navy during the World war. Now a member of the law firm of Shull & Stilwill. Married in August, 1921, to Alice Lincoln, Alton, Iowa. A member of the American Legion, the Masonic fraternity, and the First Baptist church. A member of the Iowa State Bar association and American Bar association. Appointed to the state board of education by Governor Hammill in March, 1925, to fill out the unexpired term to July 1, 1925, of Charles R. Brenton, deceased, and the long term, July 1, 1925, to July 1, 1931. Reappointed July 1, 1933, by Governor Herring. A republican.

CORA E. SIMPSON, Decorah.—Member of the State Board of Education, was born at Lansing, daughter of Chas. Carrol and Sarah Bates, one of the pioneer families of northeastern Iowa. Moved to Decorah with her parents when a young girl and has made that city her home except for a few years spent in Spokane, where her husband died. She is a graduate of Decorah high school, was a student at the State University of Iowa and later studied voice in Chicago. She taught several years in Decorah public schools and has always kept up her interest in school work. She served as secretary in the county superintendent's office and in recent years has been one of the judges in their spelling contest. For many years served as vice chairman of the democratic county central committee. A member of the D. A. R., Ladies of the G. A. R. and Rebekah lodge. She has one daughter, Mrs. L. W. Buckton. Appointed a member of the board of education by Governor Herring in 1933. A democrat.

GEORGE T. BAKER, Davenport.—Member of State Board of Education, was born July 9, 1857, on a farm in Iowa county, Iowa. He was educated in the district schools of Iowa, Hall's school for boys, at Ellington, Connecticut, McClain's Academy at Iowa City, and the State University of Iowa. He remained one year at the state university and then completed four years of special work in civil engineering at Cornell University, Ithaca, class of 1879. During the years from 1879 to 1889 he was engaged in railway location, construction and maintenance work, after which he was chief engineer for the high bridges built across the Mississippi river at Muscatine and Clinton, and consulting engineer of the high bridge at Winona, Minnesota. From 1893 until January, 1910, he was engaged in general construction work on railways, paving, sewerage, water works, heavy building construction. Served as a member of the general assembly in the twenty-sixth regular and special sessions, was elected mayor of the city of Davenport in 1898, serving two years, and was delegate-at-large to the democratic national convention in 1900. Member state board of education since 1909. A democrat.

ANNA B. LAWTHER, Dubuque.—Member of State Board of Education, born in Dubuque, Iowa, the daughter of William Lawther and Annie Elizabeth (Bell) Lawther. Her grandparents were among the earliest settlers of the state. Received early education in public schools of Dubuque and prepared for college at Miss Stevens' school, Germantown, Pennsylvania. Received her bachelor of arts degree from Bryn Mawr College in 1897. The year following her graduation she became assistant bursar of Bryn Mawr College. From 1904 to 1905 she was the warden of Merion Hall, Bryn Mawr College, and from 1907 to 1912 she was the secretary of Bryn Mawr College. During the campaign for equal suffrage in the spring of 1916, Miss Lawther was the chairman of the Dubuque county equal suffrage league and in the autumn of the same year was elected president of the Iowa equal suffrage association and was twice re-elected to that position. She was a member of the state council of defense during the war. When presidential suffrage was granted to the women of Iowa by the thirty-eighth general assembly,

Miss Lawther was made the democratic national committeewoman for Iowa. Was sent as a delegate to the democratic national convention at San Francisco in 1920, and to the democratic national convention in New York City in 1924. Miss Lawther was an alumnae director of Bryn Mawr College from 1923 to 1928. Appointed a member of the board of education by Governor Kendall in 1921, re-appointed by Governor Hammill in 1927 and by Governor Herring in 1933. A democrat.

JOHN P. WALLACE, Des Moines.—Member of the State Board of Education, was born at Davenport, Iowa, April 20, 1871, the son of Henry Wallace and Nannie Cantwell Wallace, the former being known as "Uncle Henry" all over Iowa. His education was received in the grade school at Winterset, West high school at Des Moines, and Iowa State College at Ames. He was one of the founders of Wallaces' Farmer, his father Henry and brother Henry C. and John being equal owners of the publication that became one of the foremost publications in the field of agriculture. John was married in 1896 to Elizabeth Maud Gibson of Des Moines. They have one son, Ross Wallace, and two daughters, Margaret (now Mrs. A. W. Voorhees of Tucson, Arizona), and Josephine (Mrs. Foster F. Farrell) of Des Moines. He is a member of the national executive board of the Boy Scouts of America and chairman of the national committee on rural scouting. For more than thirty years he has been a director of the Des Moines Y. M. C. A. Member of Central Presbyterian church of Des Moines for over forty years and has served on the national board of missions of the Presbyterian church. He was awarded the silver buffalo by the Boy Scouts of America for distinguished service to boyhood. During the war was director of two Red Cross campaigns for the state of Iowa. Appointed by Governor Herring for the six-year term beginning July 1, 1935. A republican.

THOMAS W. KEENAN, Shenandoah.—Member of the State Board of Education, was born on a farm near Batesville, Ohio, March 3, 1875. Graduated from Batesville high school 1890, and from Northern Indiana Normal School, Valparaiso, Indiana, B.S. degree, 1897. Taught mathematics Lincoln Normal University, Lincoln, Nebraska, 1897-1898, and at Shenandoah, Iowa, 1899-1904. During this time studied law and was admitted to the bar in 1904 and has practiced law in Shenandoah ever since then. Served in France with Y. M. C. A. October, 1918, to May, 1919. Delegate democratic national convention, New York City, 1924. Member state board of education since July 1, 1931. A democrat.

W. EARL HALL, Mason City.—Member of the State Board of Education, was born on a farm near Jefferson, Iowa, on April 7, 1897, and graduated from the Jefferson high school in 1914. He holds a B.A. degree from the State University of Iowa and was a member of the editorial staff of the Milwaukee Journal before assuming the managing editorship of the Mason City Globe-Gazette in 1920. In 1932 Mr. Hall was commander of the Iowa department of the American Legion. Appointed to the board of education by Governor Kraschel in 1937. A republican.

RICHARD H. PLOCK, Burlington.—Member of the State Board of Education, was born at Burlington, Iowa, on September 6, 1908, the son of Mr. and Mrs. William H. Plock of Burlington, and attended the Burlington grammar schools and Burlington high school, being graduated from the latter in 1926. Graduated from Amherst College, Amherst, Massachusetts, in 1930, with an A.B. degree, and from Harvard law school, in 1933, with an LL.B. degree, and was admitted to the practice of law in Iowa on June 14, 1933, entering the firm of Seerley, Clark and Hale in Burlington, Iowa. The firm name was changed to Clark, Hale and Plock on July 1, 1935. Married to Helen M. Swisher of Waterloo, Iowa, in October, 1934, and have one son, Richard H. Fraternities are: Delta Kappa Epsilon, Phi Beta Kappa and Delta Sigma Rho. A member of the First Congregational church. Secretary of the Burlington armory-auditorium commission, and secretary of the social service league, a welfare organization in Bur-

lington. A former president of the Burlington junior chamber of commerce, also secretary of the Des Moines County Bar association, and a member of the Iowa State Bar association. He has served the latter association as a member of its grievance committee and its citizenship committee, and is now on the executive committee of the junior division of the Iowa State Bar association. Appointed by Governor Kraschel as a member of the Iowa state board of education in 1937. A republican.

WILLIAM R. BOYD, Cedar Rapids.—Chairman of the Finance Committee of the Board of Education, is a native of Iowa, having been born in Lisbon, Linn county, May 19, 1864. His boyhood was spent in Tipton, Iowa, where he attended the public schools. He was graduated from the college of liberal arts of the State University of Iowa in June, 1889, having earned his way by teaching school and clerking in a store. He was principal of the school at Mechanicsville, Iowa, two years. He was editor of the Tipton Advertiser two years, editor and associate editor of the Cedar Rapids Republican sixteen years. Mr. Boyd served as postmaster of Cedar Rapids from 1899 to 1909, resigning this office to accept his present position. He has long been interested in educational matters, and was for several years a member of the board of trustees of Coe College, and for a time lectured on political economy in that institution. Mr. Boyd is a director of the American Trust and Savings bank, and president of the Perpetual Savings and Loan association, both located in Cedar Rapids. Member board of trustees Cornell College, Mt. Vernon. A republican.

WILLIAM G. NOTH, Des Moines.—Member of the Finance Committee of the State Board of Education, was born in Davenport, Iowa, and resided there continuously until his appointment as a member of the finance committee of the Iowa state board of education in 1931. Educated in public and commercial schools of Davenport; trained in banking and associated with different banks there. Was elected clerk of the district court for a period of two years; and city treasurer of Davenport for eight years. Served in the World war. A democrat.

MERRILL R. PIERSON, Des Moines.—Secretary of the State Board of Education, was born on a farm in Fremont county, Iowa, June 20, 1901. Attended the rural school, Shenandoah high school, and Iowa State College, graduating in the class of 1922. Engaged in farming until appointment to the business office staff of the Iowa School for the Deaf in 1933. Elected secretary of the state board of education, taking up the work January 1, 1937.

PETER J. KIES, Dubuque.—Member of the Iowa Unemployment Compensation Commission, was born on a farm 14 miles south of the city of Dubuque, in Jackson county, Iowa, on January 10, 1886; second eldest son of Matt and Margaret Kies. Moved to the city of Dubuque in the year 1892 and has been a resident of that city since. Educated in the parochial and public schools in Dubuque. Worked at the monumental trade from June, 1905, to April 1, 1912. Appointed deputy city recorder on April 1, 1912, and served in that capacity until April 1, 1917, on which date was appointed deputy city assessor which position he held until April 1, 1919, when he was made city assessor. He held this post till June 1, 1920, when he was again appointed deputy city assessor and held this position until April 1, 1924. Worked at monumental trade from April 1, 1924, to December 1, 1924. Elected county auditor of Dubuque county, Iowa, in November, 1924, and was re-elected in 1926, 1928, 1930, 1932, 1934 and 1936. Resigned as Dubuque county auditor on March 2, 1937. Appointed as a member of the Iowa Unemployment Compensation Commission by Governor Kraschel on March 1, 1937, for a term of six years, term ending July 1, 1943. CLAUDE M. STANLEY, Corning.—Member of Iowa Unemployment Compensation Commission, was born on a farm near Milo, Iowa. He received his early education in a country school and graduated from the Corning Academy at Corning, Iowa, in 1892. Taught school from 1892-1898 and was principal of the school at Carlisle, Iowa, 1896-1897. During the time he taught school he studied law attending Drake University during the summer months and graduated from that school in 1900 with degree of LL.B. Since his admission to the bar he has practiced his profession at Corning as a member of the law firm of Stanley & Stanley. He served as city attorney 1902-1904, as county attorney 1904-1908, and as a member of school board of which he was president from 1927-1932. Was elected state senator from the sixth senatorial district composed of Adams and Taylor counties in 1932 and served in the forty-fifth, forty-fifth extra, forty-sixth and forty-sixth extra general assemblies. Was appointed a member of the Iowa unemployment compensation commission on March 1, 1937, for a four-year term. He has been active in military affairs, serving in the war with Spain in the 51st Iowa infantry. In the national guard of Iowa from 1900-1917, and in the 168th infantry of the Rainbow division as a major and lieutenant colonel during the World war. President and business agent district No. 15 Chicago Northwestern Railroad Company Boiler-makers and Helpers, 1913. Many years executive board member district No. 15. President of Council Bluffs, Iowa, Central Labor Union for 10 years. Executive board member of Iowa State Federation of Labor for three years. Member of Presbyterian church. He was married to Mary F. Beckwith of Lincoln, Nebraska, January 23, 1905, and has four children, Catherine, Helen, Walter and Kenneth. Appointed on unemployment compensation commission by Governor Kraschel May 1, 1936. A democrat.

TOM J. WHITE, Jefferson.—Superintendent of Printing and ex-officio secretary of State Printing Board. Born in Palo Alto county in 1869. Learned printing trade in Emmetsburg. Entire life, since learning trade, spent in printing or publishing. A democrat.

GRANT L. CASWELL, Ames.—Member of the State Printing Board, was born in Boone county, Iowa, and has been a resident of this state all his life. His parents were pioneers of Chickasaw and Boone counties, Iowa. He got most of his high school education at Boone. Becoming a printer's apprentice at Coon Rapids, Iowa, in 1883, he followed that trade and the newspaper business all his life, owning and editing newspapers at Ashton, Sibley, Rock Rapids and Denison, Iowa. He was democratic county chairman of Crawford county for ten years, and became a candidate for state treasurer in 1912. In 1914 he was elected state senator from the Crawford-Harrison-Monona district, serving in the thirty-sixth and thirty-seventh general assemblies. From 1915 to 1938 he has been managing director of the Iowa Press Association, during which time he has also been owner and joint owner of several Iowa newspapers. Appointed a member of the state printing board by Governor Kraschel July 1, 1937. A democrat.

J. R. BAHNE, Eldora.—Member of the State Printing Board, was born at Sioux City, Iowa, February 26, 1889, the son of Jacob H. and Lenora Bahne. In 1905, moved with parents to Sibley, Iowa. Attended Morningside College and the State University of Iowa. While attending Morningside College worked for the

Sioux City Tribune and while attending the State University worked for the Iowa City Citizen and in job printing plants. In 1909, joined his father in the publication of the Sibley Tribune, a democratic newspaper. He continued as co-publisher and publisher of this paper until 1931 when he purchased the Hardin County Ledger and consolidated this paper with the Eldora Herald, being now the publisher of the consolidated paper, the Eldora Herald-Ledger. Mr. Bahne is a practical printer, having set type from the case as well as by linotype. He has done everything connected with the operation of a newspaper and a printing shop. He was married in 1912 to Vera B. Shell and they have one child, Elizabeth. Member of the Congregational church, Masonic lodge, Rotary and civic clubs. A democrat.

WARREN F. MILLER, Independence.—Member of the Board of Social Welfare, was born in Buchanan county November 13, 1866. Graduated from Lenox College 1884, and from the University of Iowa law department 1894. Practiced law two years in Independence. Served one term as city attorney and two terms as mayor. Entered newspaper business in 1896 as part owner of Independence Conservative. Sold out in 1903 and went to Seneca, Kansas, where he published Courier-Democrat till 1909. Sold there and bought the Globe-Post at Le Mars, Iowa. In 1914 sold Globe-Post and returned to Independence and purchased the Independence Conservative, which he is still publishing. Served as senator from the thirty-third district in the forty-fifth and forty-fifth extra general assemblies. Postmaster of Independence 1933-37. Appointed by Governor Kraschel to present position June 1, 1937. A democrat.

MRS. BURTRAM COLLVER HOPKINS, Des Moines.—Member of the Board of Social Welfare, was born in Eldora, Hardin county, Iowa, daughter of Elizabeth Anne Parks and William Vance Willcox; married Burtram Collver Hopkins in Des Moines in 1900 and is the mother of three children, one daughter and two sons. Has for many years been active in child welfare work; serving as state president of the Iowa Congress of Parents and Teachers from 1925 to 1929; as chairman of the child welfare division of the Iowa Federation of Women's Club from 1929 to 1931; as vice president and director of the home service department of the National Congress of Parents and Teachers from 1930 to 1934. Was appointed a member of the Governor's planning committee for the Iowa white house conference on child health and protection (April 14-15, 1932). In this connection she served as chairman of the committee on "Co-operation of Home with the School," and as a member of three additional committees, "The Family and Parent Education," "Professional Training of Teachers and Leaders," and "The Handicapped." For many years she was chairman of the "Volunteer" committee of the Polk county chapter of the American red cross when she organized the red cross work room where clothing was remade for underprivileged children. During the World war she was company mother for the girl's volunteer aid. Attended a country grade school, the Humeston high school and was graduated from the commercial department of Drake University. Entered the banking business in 1907 at Humeston, later transferring to Ames, Des Moines and Jefferson. Interested in Iowa bankers association affairs and served as president. Organized the original Rotary club at Ames and is interested in boy scout and Y. M. C. A. activities. Has served on the boy scout council at Ames and Des Moines and for one year was a director on the International Boy Scout Council of America.

Has also served on the state Y. M. C. A. board. Married Gertrude Heggen and they have four sons: Wayne; Ivan, Jr.; Jay, and Lester Richard. Is affiliated with the Presbyterian church and is a Mason. A republican.

RT. REV. MONSIGNOR MARTIN CONE, Davenport.—Member of the State Board of Social Welfare, was born at Clinton, Iowa, December 14, 1882; son of Michael Thomas and Mary Elizabeth (Kelleher) Cone; B.A., Columbia College, Dubuque, Iowa, 1909; S. T. B., St. Mary's University, Baltimore, Maryland, 1912; M. A., Catholic University of America, 1918; Ph. D., University of Iowa, 1921. Ordained priest, Roman Catholic church, 1912. Professor, social sciences, St. Ambrose College, Davenport, Iowa, 1912-1930; president since 1930; diocesan director, Catholic charities since 1927. Appointed domestic prelate, title of Monsignor by Pope Pius XI, 1931. Member community chest, Davenport. Appointed member of the state board of social welfare by Governor Kraschel in 1937. A democrat.

EDWARD P. SCHOENTGEN, Council Bluffs.—Member of the State Board of Social Welfare, was born August 16, 1873, in Council Bluffs. Attended local schools until 12 years of age; then entered an academy in Milwaukee, Wisconsin, preparatory to entering the manual training school in Washington University, St. Louis. In 1891, he entered the Massachusetts Institute of Technology at Boston, taking the course in architecture, receiving the degree of S. B. in architecture in 1895. Then followed about three years' foreign study, two of which were spent in Paris, France, as a pupil of Jean Louis Pascal, Membre de L'Institute, and architect of the national library. The balance of the time was spent in the French provinces and Italy. Upon returning to this country, he was identified with architectural work in St. Louis and in 1899 opened an office in Council Bluffs, practicing in that city during the next ten years. He relinquished the practice of his profession soon after the death of his father, John Schoentgen, of the wholesale grocery firm of Groneweg & Schoentgen company, and became actively connected with the business. Was chief of the auxiliary to the Federal department of justice and special agent in the state department of justice during the World war. President of the Forest City chamber of commerce for three terms. Trustee of the Forest City community foundation. Member of the Lions Club, I. O. O. F. and Knights of Pythias lodges. Also member of several national and state sportsmen's organizations. Lifetime hobby has been conservation work, fishing, hunting and skeet shooting. A democrat.

LOGAN BLIZZARD, McGregor.—Member of the Iowa State Conservation Commission, was born in Jasper county, Iowa, on September 8, 1879; educated in the public schools and the Newton Normal College at Newton, Iowa; taught school in the country schools of Jasper county for a period of 4 years; moved to McGregor, Iowa, in 1917, and has been interested in the crushed stone, sand and gravel industry since that time. Appointed a republican member of the Iowa state conservation commission, May 17, 1935, by Governor Clyde Herring. A republican.

WILLIAM ALFRED BURHANS, Burlington.—Member of the Iowa State Conservation Commission, was born in Burlington, Iowa, October 16, 1864. His ancestors came

from Holland in 1860 and settled in New York state. This old Dutch stock included Jacob Burhans who was justice magistrate at Kingston, New York, and later appointed collector by order of the noble Stuyvesant. Mr. Burhans is the direct descendant of two lieutenants, three sergeants, and twenty-four privates who served their country in the Revolutionary war. Denslow Burhans, the father of Mr. Burhans, came to Iowa when Burlington had no railroads and transportation was made by the waterways. As a young man of twenty-one years of age, Mr. Burhans went out to southwest Kansas to engage in the cattle business. Later in life, Mr. Burhans went to Florida where he found much interest in roaming the swamps where he found strange bird life and many game fish. When the hot Iowa sun blazes down in August Mr. Burhans seeks relief among the lakes in northern Minnesota where the wall-eyed pike abound and where the tall pines form cathedral towers affording man time to appreciate nature and all of her handiwork. Mr. Burhans has been in the candy business for nearly forty years. He is connected with the Clinton Copeland Candy Company of which firm he serves as vice president. A democrat.

E. W. NEENAN, D.D.S., Sioux City.—Member of the Iowa State Conservation Commission, was born July 12, 1903, in Sioux City, graduated from Trinity College in 1921. Granted doctor's degree by St. Louis University college of dentistry in 1925. Engaged in practice of dentistry in Sioux City since that time. Appointed to conservation commission by Governor Herring and re-appointed by Governor Kraschel in 1937. A democrat.

ROSCOE E. STEWART—Member of Iowa State Conservation Commission, was born in Spencer, Iowa, October 3, 1896, and attended public schools there and in Dickinson county. Graduated from the University of Iowa in 1917, served overseas in the World war as lieutenant of infantry. At the close of the war he located in Ottumwa, Iowa, where he has been engaged in the wholesale and retail dry goods business. Appointed a member of the conservation commission in 1936 to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Dr. W. C. Boone. A republican.

MRS. ADDISON PARKER, Des Moines.—Member State Board of Conservation, was born in Muskegon, Michigan, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Paul W. Lange. Received early education in public schools of Chicago, and graduated from State University of Illinois in liberal arts and library training. After her graduation she became assistant librarian at Armour Institute, Chicago, where she remained one year, and then came to Des Moines, as a member of the staff of the state traveling library. In 1912 she married Addison Parker of Des Moines. She is a past president of the Des Moines garden club. She was appointed by Governor Kraschel in April, 1937, as a member of the board of conservation. A republican.

M. L. HUTTON, Ames.—Director, Iowa State Conservation Commission, was born February 11, 1886, on a farm in Washington county, Iowa. Attended public schools in Columbus City and Columbus Junction. Was a student at Iowa State College, civil engineering department, during the period of September, 1905, to May, 1909, being in the employ of the C. M. & St. P. Ry. on Pacific coast extension in Montana and Washington for fifteen months of the above period; in maintenance of way department of Great Northern Railway in Minnesota, North Dakota, Montana, and Manitoba, Canada, from May, 1909, to August, 1910; engaged in drainage engineering work in Humboldt county from September, 1910, to December, 1911; served as county engineer of Louisa county during 1912, 1913, and 1914; engaged in private engineering practice the first half of 1915, and in general engineering work for the Central States Engineering Company of Muscatine, Iowa, the second half of 1915; served as county engineer of Des Moines county in 1916, 1917, and seven months of 1918; in employ of Iowa State Highway Commission from June, 1919, to July, 1929, having charge of road work at state institutions under Board of Education and Board of Control at different times during this period, and per-

Received the A.B. degree in 1915 and the ph.D. degree in 1920 from the University of Pennsylvania, where he was professor of zoology prior to 1929. Since 1929, he has been professor and head of the department of zoology at the State University of Iowa. Served in medical corps in A.E.F. during World war. A Methodist, Mason and member of Kiwanis club.

BENJAMIN H. PETERSON, Cedar Rapids.—Member of the Board of Examiners in the Basic Sciences, was born June 6, 1893, at Maceonia, Iowa, and attended country school and high school at that place. Graduated from Coe College in 1918. Served in the A. E. F. for one year, with the base laboratory No. 1. Received master of science degree in 1924 and doctor of philosophy degree in 1926 from the State University of Iowa. Since 1928, has served as head of the department of chemistry at Coe College. Married, 1921, to Eda Swenson, Sioux Falls, South Dakota, and they have one child, Roger Franklyn. Member of the American Chemical Society, Phi Lambda Upsilon, Sigma Xi, and Presbyterian church.

W. L. STRUNK, Decorah.—Member of the Board of Examiners in the Basic Sciences, was born in New Uim, Minnesota, August 14, 1901. Graduate of Irving grade school, and South high school, Minneapolis, 1918; graduate of University of Minnesota, 1922, Bachelor of Arts degree and in 1923 with Master of Science degree, majors for both of above degrees being zoology and geology. From 1923 to 1925 was mine examiner for an eastern concern; from 1925 to 1927 was chemist in charge of laboratories of Twin City plant of Ford Motor Company; 1927-1928, head of department of chemistry, North Dakota State School of Science, Wahpeton, North Dakota; and from 1928 to present, head department of biology, Luther College, Decorah, Iowa. Doctor of Science degree was obtained from University of Michigan in 1931, major for degree being biology and paleontology.

GEORGE WILLIAM HEITKAMP, Dubuque.—Member of the Board of Examiners in the Basic Sciences, was born August 30, 1887, on a farm in Jo Davies county, Illinois; attended country school until 1894. In 1894 family moved to Cuba, Wisconsin. Attended grade and high school until 1905. Finished high school in 1905. Taught a country school in southwestern Wisconsin until 1907. Attended University of Wisconsin and received A.B. in 1912. Assistant instructor in University of Illinois for two years. Received A.M. degree from University of Illinois in 1914. Member Sigma Xi scientific fraternity, and Phi Kappa social fraternity. Appointed member of faculty at Columbia College in 1914, and still retains that position. Married Jessie Mousseau of Platteville, Wisconsin, in 1925 and they have two daughters. Appointed member of Iowa basic science board April 1, 1937.

CHARLES H. GRAHL, Des Moines.—Adjutant General, was born in Council Bluffs, Iowa, September 23, 1894. Attended public schools in Council Bluffs and Des Moines, graduating from West high school Des Moines, Iowa, in 1913. Enlisted in company "B," 3rd Iowa infantry June 24, 1916. Served overseas with 168th

JOHN C. DE MAR, Des Moines.—Commerce Counsel, was born in Davis county, Iowa, September 27, 1879. He attended the country schools and the Southern Iowa Normal school at Bloomfield, Iowa, and then received the degrees of Ph.D. and LL.M. from Drake University in Des Moines. Mr. De Mar served as a member of the house of representatives from Davis county in the thirty-first, thirty-second and thirty-second extra general assemblies and he was assistant district attorney for the southern district of Iowa during President Wilson's administration. A member of the city library board of Des Moines. He edited the revision of the city ordinances of Des Moines in 1932. His parents moved to Kossuth county, Iowa, in 1883, where he resided on a farm until seventeen years old. He received his education in the public schools of Kossuth county and graduated from Toland's Business University in 1903. pointed director. Member American Society of Civil Engineers and American Society of Planning Officials; member Delta Kappa Epsilon social fraternity. Married Ruby Dewhirst on December 1, 1927, and has one child, Mary Ross.

ULYSSES GRANT WHITNEY.—Reporter of the Supreme Court and Code Editor, was born July 10, 1864, on a farm near Union, Iowa. Was admitted to the bar in June, 1890. Was county attorney in Woodbury county for ten years. Was a member of the thirty-fourth and thirty-fifth general assemblies from Woodbury county. Was appointed by the judges of the supreme court to his present position in 1914. Was a member of the Iowa code commission in 1919.

OTTO S. MUNTZ, Chairman of the Greater Iowa Commission, and *ex officio* member of the Iowa State Planning Board, was born on a farm in Dubuque county, Iowa, July 23, 1896, the son of Iowa native-born parents, Edward L. and Minnie M. Muntz. Educated in the Dubuque public schools, his entire business career has been devoted to sales, sales management, and promotion in the field of motor trucks, fire engines, and similar merchandise requiring intensive sales campaigns. Following several years in executive positions with the International Harvester Company, he came to Des Moines in 1933 as manager for the Mack International Motor Truck Company. Traveling the state in this capacity, he was forcibly impressed by the lack of coordination between the various governmental agencies, departments, civic groups, and industrial, commercial, labor and agricultural interests. Visioning the great good that could come from a program combining all Iowa interests into a united non-political movement, he developed and presented to the forty-sixth general assembly the greater Iowa commission plan, which was unanimously adopted. The commission has adopted a six-point greater Iowa program, created the greater Iowa council, and formed the greater Iowa commission advisory board, consisting of delegated representatives from thirty-one state-wide civic organizations. He presented the greater Iowa program to the forty-seventh general assembly, and secured passage of a joint resolution which requested the cooperation of all appropriate governmental agencies in assisting the commission to attain the objectives outlined in the program. Has probably bred more pure bred Tamworth hogs and produced more champions and grand champions than any man in America. In 1920 and 1929 was superintendent of the Fox Chemical Experimental Farms. In 1930 and 1931 was engaged by the Soviet Government as agricultural advisor in Russia. A Methodist and a Mason. At present engaged in real estate and farm management work in Oskaloosa. Served in the forty-sixth extra and forty-seventh general assemblies. A democrat.

HOWARD C. BALDWIN, Cascade.—Senator from the thirty-fifth district, Dubuque county, was born at Cascade, Iowa, August 1, 1904, the son of Charles Dunn Baldwin and Frances Fagan Baldwin. A graduate of the Cascade high school and the State University of Iowa. His first business experience after leaving school was with Marshall Field and Company of Chicago. At present he is managing editor of the Cascade Pioneer. Elected at special election to fill vacancy occasioned by the appointment of Matt D. Cooney as member of the board of parole and re-elected November 6, 1934, thus serving in the forty-fifth extra, the forty-sixth, the forty-sixth extra and the forty-seventh general assemblies. A democrat.

WILLIAM S. BEARDSLEY, New Virginia.—Senator from the eleventh district composed of Clarke and Warren counties, son of William and Carrie Shane Beardsley, born at Beacon, Mahaska county, Iowa, May 13, 1901. Grew to manhood at Birmingham, Van Buren county, Iowa, and graduated from the schools of that place, also a graduate in pharmacy and chemistry. At present engaged in business at New Virginia. Married Charlotte Ellen Manning of Birmingham, Iowa, and has five children: James Blaine, Charlotte Shane, Mary Jane, and Dan Richard, living; one son, William Jr., deceased. Member of several Masonic bodies and I. O. O. F. Elected to Senate in 1932 and re-elected in 1936. Republican caucus chairman of the forty-sixth and forty-seventh general assemblies. A republican.

ANDREW BELL, Denison.—Senator from the thirty-fourth district, comprising Crawford, Monona, and Harrison counties, was born in Aspinwall, Crawford county, Iowa, December 7, 1886. Reared on a farm in the same county, he attended Denison normal college, from which he was graduated in 1909. 1916; twice elected mayor of Burlington, Iowa, 1916-1920; member H. Co., Iowa national guard at age fifteen years (with parents' consent). Married Julia E. Leake of Burlington in 1925. Twice democratic candidate for congress first congressional district, 1926 and 1928; member Citizens Water Company board, Burlington, Iowa, appointed 1934. Elected to the senate in 1934 and served in the forty-sixth, forty-sixth extra and forty-seventh general assemblies. A democrat.

Is now and has been engaged in business in Iowa since 1908. Married Edyth Schuneman in 1920. They have two sons, John Richard and Philip Schuneman. Member Presbyterian church, Masonic and Elks lodges, and is a World war veteran. A republican.

JOHN W. BILLINGSLEY, Newton.—Senator from the twenty-ninth district, Jasper county, was born in Lenexa, Kansas, November 11, 1889. His father was Rev. L. K. Billingsley, a methodist minister. Graduated from East Des Moines high school in 1906; from Simpson college, Indianola, Iowa, in 1910 with the degree of bachelor of arts; and from Western Reserve University school of medicine, Cleveland, Ohio, in 1914 with the degree of M.D. Was an interne in the Iowa Methodist hospital, Des Moines, Iowa, in 1914 and 1915. Was first lieutenant, medical corps, regular army, during the World war, serving fifteen months in France and Germany. Is chief of the surgical staff, Skiff Memorial hospital, Newton, Iowa. FRANK C. BYERS, Cedar Rapids.—Senator from the twenty-sixth district, Linn county, was born in Alden, Hardin county, June 20, 1883. Attended public school at Alden and graduated from the Alden high school. Attended Grinnell college. Graduated from the law department of the University of Iowa and admitted to the practice of law in 1904. Married October, 1909, to Myra Lyon of Iowa City. Has three children, Mrs. Alden D. Avery of Spencer, Iowa, Ganson L. and Frank C., Jr. Located at Cedar Rapids, Iowa in 1905, and has practiced law there since that time. Served in the forty-fifth, forty-fifth extra, forty-sixth, forty-sixth extra and forty-seventh general assemblies. A democrat.

E. P. CORWIN, Fruitland.—Senator from the twentieth district, composed of Muscatine and Louisa counties, was born in Fruitland township, Muscatine county, Iowa, July 15, 1883. Spent entire life, with the exception of six years, in the retail drug business, in that community. For the past twenty-five years has followed the growing and shipping of Muscatine island products. Received education in Muscatine county, and attended business and normal college. Was married in 1908 to Jessie E. Smith of Chariton, Iowa, and they have two children, Donald and Marjorie. A member of the Methodist Episcopal church, and belongs to all the Masonic orders. Elected to the senate in 1934. A republican.

EARL DEAN, Mason City.—Senator from the forty-third district composed of Cerro Gordo, Franklin and Hancock counties, was born October 4, 1894, on a farm near Mason City. He attended rural schools, Mason City high school and Iowa State college, where he received a B. S. degree in animal husbandry in 1918. Served in the army in the World war as second lieutenant of infantry. Was married in 1923 to Florence Wilkinson and they have two sons, Richard and Gerald who are attending rural schools in Cerro Gordo county. Is a member of American Legion, I. O. O. F. and Loyal Order of Moose lodges. Is past president of County Farm Bureau and has served on board of directors of the local fair and shipping associations. Member of Congregational church. Is now actively engaged in farming. Served in the house of representatives in the forty-fifth and forty-fifth extra general assemblies. Elected to the senate in 1936. A democrat.

A. CLAIRE DEWEY, Washington.—Senator from the tenth district, composed of Henry and Washington counties, was born in Washington, Iowa, September 1, 1886, the son of Seneca B. Dewey and Elinora Smouse Dewey. Educated in the Washington schools, the Washington academy and graduated from Drake University, department of commerce in 1906. Geiser, New Hampton, and has practiced law in New Hampton in the law firm of Geiser & Donohue since that time. Served as county attorney in Chickasaw county from 1930 to 1934. Married in June, 1924 to Edna Grimm of Clear Lake, and they have one child, Richard Donohue. Elected to the senate in 1934. A republican.

L. H. DORAN, Boone.—Senator from the thirty-first district, composed of Boone and Story counties, was born at Beaver, Iowa, May 4, 1893; being one of thirteen children born to Justin R. and Olive F. Doran. Resided on the farm with his parents except for the time spent in school and in the army. His father served

as a member of the Iowa house of representatives from Boone county in the thirtieth, thirty-first, thirty-second and thirty-second extra general assemblies, and as a member of the state senate from the thirty-first senatorial district in the thirty-fifth and thirty-sixth general assemblies of Iowa. Graduate of the public school at Beaver, Iowa, and the Drake University law school in 1920. Married De Elda Kinson of Minneapolis, Minnesota, and they have one daughter and two sons. Since 1920 he has been engaged in the practice of law in the city of Boone, Iowa, and is a member of the firm of Doran and Doran. Member of the American Legion, A. F. and A. M., B. P. O. E., K. He attended the elementary schools at Fertile and graduated from the high school there in 1917. Later he attended the Augsburg Seminary, Minneapolis, Minnesota, Iowa State Teachers college, Cedar Falls, and Hamilton's University of Commerce, Mason City, Iowa. He taught school during two years, 1918 and 1919, instructing manual training and athletics at Clear Lake, Iowa, and later as principal in the high school at Fertile. He started farming in 1920. His farming operations include truck gardening, pickle processing, and in the winter, cattle and hog feeding. Attended the Emerson public schools, St. James school at Faribault, Minnesota, and Mercersburg academy at Mercersburg, Pennsylvania, and the University of Illinois. Member of Phi Kappa Psi fraternity, all Masonic bodies and Shrine. Served ten years as member of town council at

Emerson and two years as chairman of the republican central committee of Mills county. Engaged in the operation and management of farms in Iowa and Nebraska. Married Elsie B. Sharp, June 8, 1921, at Manchester, Iowa, and they have three children, Robert L., Rosalie Ann, and Arnold A. Serving first term in senate. A republican.

M. X. GESKE, McGregor.—Senator from the thirty-sixth district, Clayton county, was born at McGregor, Iowa, the son of F. F. Geske and Sophia Geske, both having migrated to the United States from Germany. He is a member of a family of fourteen and was raised on a farm and graduated from the McGregor high school. Clerked in a country store and taught country schools and with the earnings attended and graduated from the Valparaiso normal school at Valparaiso, Indiana, in 1893, after which he taught in the public schools at Windom, Minnesota, and was superintendent of schools at Lake Crystal, Minnesota, and then attended the University of Minnesota for a period of two years. Later read law with D. D. GILLETTE, Fostoria.—Senator from the forty-seventh district, comprising Clay, Dickinson, Emmet, Kossuth and Palo Alto counties, was born in Iowa and attended rural schools, Milford high school, Iowa State college, and the University of Missouri, where he received a master's degree. A member of Alpha Zeta, Delta Sigma Rho, Phi Kappa Phi and Sigma Ki, fraternities. Member, staff of Iowa State college and experiment station 1914 to 1919. Has farmed since 1919. Has judged various breeds of dairy cattle, and served as chairman of Dickinson county farm debt advisory board, Dickinson county farm bureau, Milford Township school board and C-D. Farm Service Company. Former member county committee, agricultural programs 1934-1936, and of the Iowa farm bureau executive committee. Married Cecelia E. Murray in 1917, and they have seven children, Jean, Mary, Riley, John, Charles, Rita and Frances. Elected to the senate in 1936. A democrat.

Main occupation has been farming and real estate business and some years in the general mercantile business. Was elected to the senate in 1934. A democrat.

H. J. GRUNEWALD, Blairstown.—Senator from forty-fifth district, composed of Benton and Tama counties, was born on a farm near Blairstown, Iowa. Attended Northern Indiana normal school for three years at Valparaiso, Indiana. Married

Gertrude Helen Giesecke of St. Louis in 1913 and has two sons, John, 22, attended Iowa State College; Henry 19, a sophomore at Iowa State College; and twin daughters, Marie and Emma, 16, Juniors in Blairstown high school. Has engaged in farming since 1900, and became a master farmer in 1930. Elected to the senate in 1934. A democrat.

HUGH G. GUERNSEY, Centerville.—Senator from the third district, composed of Davis and Appanoose counties, was born on a farm in Appanoose county, Iowa, August 10, 1892, and received his early education in the rural schools of Appanoose county and in the high school at Centerville, Iowa. Graduated from the college of liberal arts at the State University of Iowa in 1916 and from the college of law in 1920. Served with the A. E. F. during the World war. Has practiced law at Centerville, Iowa, since the fall of 1920. Was married in 1926 to Marguerite Naumann of Davenport, and they have two daughters, Kathryn and Marguerite. Elected to fill unexpired term in the forty-seventh general assembly of the late Honorable Senator T. F. Driscoll. A republican.

(Ray) HILL, Clarion.—Senator from the thirty-seventh district, composed of Hamilton, Hardin and Wright counties, was born on a farm near Woodburn, Clarke county, Iowa, on November 7, 1888, and lived there until he started the practice of law. Graduated from Drake University; was admitted to the bar in 1910; farmed for one year, then entered the practice of law at Belmond, Iowa. Graduate of Alton high school, 1913; college of liberal arts of the State University of Iowa, 1921; and college of law of the State University of Iowa, 1922. Married in 1928 to Velma Ruth Pike of Toledo, Iowa, and they have two children: Pauline Ruth and Charles Pike. World war veteran, serving overseas. Member American Legion and past commander of his local post. County attorney of Sioux county from 1925 to 1937 and past president of the County Attorneys' Association of Iowa. President, board of education, Alton public schools; member of the First Presbyterian church of Alton, Iowa; member of Phi Alpha Delta law fraternity and numerous other organizations. Engaged in the practice of law at Alton, Iowa. Elected to the Senate in 1936. A republican.

Was elected representative in 1914 and re-elected in 1916, and elected to the senate in 1918, 1922, 1926, 1930 and 1934. A republican.

O. J. KIRKETEG, Bedford.—Senator from the sixth district, composed of Adams and Taylor counties, was born near Eagle Grove (but in Humboldt county) Iowa, on May 2, 1891. The son of the late Mr. and Mrs. K. K. Kirketeg. He spent his

HUGH W. LUNDY, Albia.—Senator from the fifteenth district, composed of Monroe and Marion counties, was born in Spring Hill, Iowa, August 28, 1893, the son of James W. Lundy and Anna Peverley Lundy. He attended public schools at Indianola and graduated from the Indianola high school in 1911; from Simpson college, Indianola, in 1915 with the degree of bachelor of arts. He attended the University of Pennsylvania, Wharton school of commerce in 1915 and 1916, and the college of law, Drake University, and was admitted to the practice of law in 1924, prior to which time he served as principal of the high school at Winterset, Iowa, one year and principal of the high school at Albia, Iowa, seven years. In 1916 he married Miss June Skinner of Genoa, New York, and they have one daughter, Lorraine Lundy, a student at the University of Iowa. in Ida county in 1884; worked on farm and attended country school winter terms. Admitted to Iowa State college at Ames in 1892 on examination, attending three years. Taught school and farmed till 1904. Graduated at Iowa City with degree of M.D. in 1908. Practiced medicine and surgery in Washington state and Iowa till 1932, at the same time taking an active part in farming and stock production. Was married to Sadie B. Gleason of Cherokee county, April 10, 1901, and they have one son and two daughters, Ronald L., a senior economist in the department of agriculture, Washington, D. C., Winifred Viola, now Mrs. Geo. He was distributor for the Buick Motor Company during the years 1910 to 1926, and has the distinction of being the only man or firm who shipped automobiles by the train load into the state of Iowa. Besides his farming business, he conducted a general store at Morley for a period of fourteen years, also has been interested in the banking business during these years, and has built up and at this time maintains one of the largest and most select herds of pure bred Aberdeen Angus cattle in the world, and he is the largest individual farmer in Jones or Cedar counties. Elected to the senate in 1932, and re-elected in 1936. A democrat.

PAUL L. MILLHONE, Clarinda.—Senator from the seventh district, composed of Page and Fremont counties, was born in Page county, Iowa, December 8, 1892. He was educated in the public schools of Page county, and graduated from Simpson college, Indianola, Iowa, and from Western Reserve law school of Cleveland, Ohio. He has practiced law in Shenandoah and Clarinda, Iowa, since 1922. He was county attorney of Page county from 1925 to 1931. He was married to Margaret Griffith of Des Moines, Iowa, in June, 1926, and they have four children: Martha Mary, Margaret Ruth, John Paul and James Newton. He is a member of Alpha Tau Omega college fraternity, Phi Delta Phi law fraternity, the Masonic lodge, and the Presbyterian church. City, Iowa, in 1924. Appointed and served as first assistant county attorney of Woodbury county from January 1, 1933, to January 1, 1937. Married Frances Margaret Bodin of Sioux City, Iowa, on November 21, 1928, and they have one daughter, Anne. Elected senator in 1936. A democrat.

GEORGE L. PARKER, Independence.—Senator from thirty-third district, composed of Delaware and Buchanan counties, was born in Independence, Iowa, July 31, 1879. Graduate of Independence high school and attended Drake University. Married, August 30, 1901, to Maude Lincoln and has three children: Thomas, George and Margaret. Druggist in Independence for thirty-four years. Elected to the senate in 1934. A republican.

FRANK PELZER, Marne.—Senator from the eighteenth district, composed of Cass and Shelby counties, was born near Griswold, Iowa, January 27, 1876. Parents were Henry and Sophia Pelzer. Educated in rural schools of Cass county. He was married to Mary Borth, June 20, 1900, and has seven children, six sons, and one daughter. Was a member of Cass county board of supervisors, for six years, and the board of education ten years. A farmer, stockman, and breeder of pure bred hogs for thirty-seven years. Member of Masonic Order. Elected to the senate November 3, 1936. A republican.

FREDERICK C. SCHADT, Williamsburg.—Senator from the twenty-fifth district, composed of Iowa and Johnson counties, was born and reared at Amana, Iowa, son of the late Conrad Schadt. Took his college work at the State University of Iowa in professional and liberal arts colleges. Extra training in medicine, mostly in surgery and surgical diagnosis, and he holds the degrees of Ph. C., M. S. and M. D. Has practiced medicine at Williamsburg over twenty years. Married to Miss Louise Setzer of Amana, Iowa, and has one son, Conrad F. Author of treatises on government, economics, and sociology in general. Member of state political science, historical, economists and sociologists associations, and the American Political Science Association. Also a member of county and state medical societies. Graduated from State Center high school and attended Grinnell college. Enlisted in the forty-ninth Iowa infantry in the Spanish-American war, serving in Cuba. Married Manie L. Vance, of Laurens, Iowa, April 5, 1900, and has two sons, Nelson and Joseph, both of whom reside in Marshalltown. For a number of years he was in the mercantile business at State Center, where he was a member of the town council and school board. Served for a time as county chairman of the republican central committee. HENRY W. BURMA, Allison.—Representative from Butler county, was born November 7, 1895, in Butler county, Iowa. Served overseas during the World war. Sheriff of Butler county fourteen years. Married and has two children. Attends Associated church. Serving first term in the legislature. A republican.

IVER CHRISTOFFERSEN, Cedar Falls.—Representative from Black Hawk county, was born in Cedar Rapids, Iowa, on January 6, 1899. His parents, Hans J. Christoffersen and Mary (Jensen) Christoffersen, came to Iowa from Denmark in the early eighties. In 1930, he married Veronica Sedar and they have one child, Liane Mae. He has been a resident of Iowa practically his entire life, having resided on a farm for several years in Cass county and he has also lived in Corning, Winfield and Waterloo, Iowa, and is now a resident of Cedar Falls, Iowa. He graduated from Iowa State Teachers College with a B. A. degree in 1923, and from the college of law at the State University of Iowa in 1926. After receiving his education he engaged in the drug business, and now operates the Northwest Drug Co. and the Northwest Laboratories at Davenport. Unmarried. Member of the Catholic church, Knights of Columbus, junior chamber of commerce, Eastern Iowa Druggists Association, treasurer of the Scott County Young Democratic Club, and associate member of the Iowa Policemen's Association. Serving first term in legislature. A democrat.

EARL C. FISHBAUGH, JR., Shenandoah.—Representative from Page county, was born in the city of Shenandoah, Iowa, December 27, 1909, the elder son of Earl C. Fishbaugh and Irene Fender Fishbaugh. Educated in the grade school and high school at Shenandoah, Iowa, and graduated from the University of Nebraska law college in 1933. Began the practice of law at Shenandoah, Iowa, in June, 1933, and married to Esther Elizabeth Miller, December 27, 1934. Director of the Security Trust and Savings Bank of Shenandoah, Iowa, member Delta Theta Phi law fraternity, and affiliated with the Presbyterian church. Elected to the legislature in 1934; re-elected in 1936. A republican.

JOE FLYNN, Decorah.—Representative from Winneshiek county, was born on a farm at Rumpus Ridge, Fayette county, Iowa, August 8, 1902. He was educated in the rural schools, graduated from New Hampton high school and attended Iowa State Teachers College at Cedar Falls. In 1923 he entered news-

Attended rural schools and Iowa City grade schools, Iowa City academy, graduated from the State University of Iowa medical college in March, 1899. Served in the Spanish-American and World war; over seas ten months. At present colonel, medical officers reserve corps. Located in Lisbon, Iowa, in March, 1900. Married April, 1905 to Pearl O. Smith and they have three children. Member and trustee of Methodist church. Member of I. O. O. F., Masonic lodge, including Scottish Rite and Shrine, drum major of El Kahir Shrine band. Past president of Rotary club, past president Linn County Medical Society, past president Iowa department R. O. A. Elected representative in 1936. A republican.

A republican.

B. B. HICKENLOOPER, Cedar Rapids.—Representative from Linn county, was born in Blockton, Iowa, July 21, 1896, the son of Nathan O. and Margaret A. Hickenlooper, both of whom were born in Taylor county. Graduate of Iowa State College department of industrial science and of the law school of the University of Iowa. Entered the practice of law in Cedar Rapids, Iowa, in 1922. Served twenty-one months in the army during the World war, a portion of which was spent over-seas with the three hundred thirty-ninth field artillery. Married in 1927 to Verna E. Bensch, and has two children, Jane Carroll and David B. Member of the Consistory and Shrine, B. P. O. E. and American Legion. Affiliated with the Methodist church. Serving second term in the general assembly. A republican.

LEO A. HOEGH, Chariton.—Representative from Lucas county, was born in Audubon county, March 30, 1908, the son of William Hoegh, who was also born in Audubon county. He received his early education in the public schools of Elkhorn, Iowa; his B. A. degree at the University of Iowa in 1929 and his J. D. (law) degree at the University of Iowa in 1932. Entered the practice of law in Chariton, Iowa in 1933 and in 1936 married Mary Louise Foster. Member of the Knights of Pythias, Rotary club, Pi Kappa Alpha and Delta Theta Phi. O. N. HULTMAN, Stanton.—Representative from Montgomery county, was born in Stanton, Iowa, of Swedish descent. JOHN R. IRWIN, Keokuk.—Representative from Lee county, was born in Keokuk, Iowa. He was educated in Mahaska county public schools, and also attended Penn College and Oskaloosa Business College. Married and has four children. Moved to Illinois in 1896 and returned to Mahaska county in 1898 and has been engaged in farming, stock raising, and feeding since. He is a member of the Baptist church. Serving first term in the legislature. A republican.

P. C. RASMUSSEN, Council Bluffs.—Representative for Pottawattamie county. Public school education and graduate of University of Omaha law school, receiving his LL. B. degree in 1921. He was an instructor at this university during 1922. Admitted to practice law in Nebraska in 1920 and in Iowa in 1921. He is married and has been a home owner and resident of Council Bluffs, Iowa, for twenty-six years. Engaged in general law practice at present time. He was city attorney of Council Bluffs, for two terms: 1926-1928 and 1932-1934. He was United States commissioner for the years 1924-1928. Serving first term in the legislature. A democrat.

EUGENE H. REILLY, Dubuque.—Representative from Dubuque county, the eighth son of Thomas E. and Margaret Reilly, was born in Dubuque, Iowa, on the eighth day of December, 1906, educated in the parochial schools of Dubuque and received high school education at Columbia Academy, Dubuque, graduated from Columbia College in 1928 with a B. A. degree. Following graduation served as instructor of English and History at St. Ignatius high school, Chicago, for one year, then entered the college of law at De Paul University, Chicago, and spent the two remaining years in law at the University of Iowa, graduating in 1932 with a degree of Juris Doctor. Admitted to the Iowa bar in 1932 and began the practice of law in Dubuque with George T. Lyon now deceased, and is now associated with Al J. Nelson at Dubuque. Appointed January 15, 1935, by

Madam Secretary of Labor, Frances Perkins, to act as referee representing the United States Department of Labor at a hearing at Muscatine, Iowa, for the predetermination of prevailing rates of wages as prescribed by the Davis-Bacon act of 1935. Member of the Dubuque bar association, Knights of Columbus, Catholic Order of Foresters and Phi Alpha Delta national law fraternity. Now serving second term in the legislature. A democrat.

CLARENCE L. RICE, Delta.—Representative from Keokuk county, was born in Mahaska county on a farm near Wright in 1889, the son of W. I. and M. A. Rice. Was educated in the schools of Mahaska county. He spent one year in Colorado and five years in Oklahoma, and has visited at different times in many of the other states of the union. Married and has four children, three sons and one daughter. With the exception of one year, has been actively engaged in farming and for the past 19 years has farmed in Keokuk county. Serving third term in legislature. A democrat.

MATT. B. RIDDLE, Ute.—Representative of Monona county, and a native thereof, born April 26, 1877, on the farm he now owns. Father, I. U. Riddle, native of Ohio, veteran of the Civil war, third Iowa infantry, pioneered in Soldier township, Monona county, March, 1865. Mother, Mary D. Koontz, native of Pennsylvania, four of whose brothers also fought in the Civil war, one of them giving up his life. The family lived in a dugout, on the farm purchased from the government, where their four children, all sons, were born, of which Matt B. was the second. He attended country school, later Southwestern Normal of Shenandoah, Iowa, and after its destruction by fire he attended Highland Park College, at Des Moines. He was married to Martha H. Hanssen of Charter Oak, Iowa, April 24, 1899, and is the father of two children; Mrs. Bernice E. Kowalke, R. N., and Richard H., who attended the University of Iowa. OVE T. ROE, Waukon.—Representative from Allamakee county, was born in that county September 4, 1887. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Tolef Roe, and received his early education in the rural schools and Upper Iowa University at Fayette, Iowa. He married Emma Kolsrud of Waterville, Iowa, and five children were born to them: Thomas, Melvin, Doris, Kenneth and Willard. Is president of the Paint Creek farmers telephone company and a member of the Lutheran church. He has followed the occupation of farming with the exception of eight years while he was engaged in business with his brother. Served in the forty-fourth, forty-fifth, forty-fifth extra, forty-sixth, forty-sixth extra, and forty-seventh general assemblies. A democrat.

College, Des Moines, Iowa, and he has been in the automobile business since 1912. He was the first Grundy county soldier to enter the World war. Serving in the army two years, one of which was spent in France. Charter member of Ashing post American Legion and served as first post commander, county commander, and third district vice commander. He has been mayor of Wellsburg, Iowa, since 1932. Serving his first term as representative. A democrat.

THOMAS RUTHERFORD, JR., Audubon.—Representative from Audubon county, was born in Poweshiek county, Iowa, February 14, 1869. Moved with his parents when twelve years of age, to Audubon, Iowa, where he has since resided. Received his education in the Audubon public schools. Has been engaged in farming continually until recent years. During this time he has served as township trustee and six years as county supervisor. Was married March 11, 1896, to Belle Hunt, of Dallas county, Iowa, and they have four children, Clark H., Vera, Inez, and Alice. Is a member of the M. E. church, Masonic order, and Eastern Star. Serving second term in the legislature. A republican.

JOHN RYDER, Dubuque.—Senior representative from Dubuque county, was born and reared in Dubuque, Iowa, and educated in the parochial schools. He graduated from the Bayless business college. For twenty-five years he was the junior member of the Ryder Brothers wholesale grocery firm. Elected to fill vacancy in the forty-fifth special session and re-elected in 1934 and in 1936. A democrat.

GEO. L. SCOTT, West Union.—Representative from Fayette county, was born July 21, 1887, on a farm in Fayette county. His father and mother, Mr. and Mrs. Alexander Scott, were natives of Scotland, who came to America and were early settlers in northeastern Iowa. Mr. Scott has spent his entire life in Fayette county, where he received his education in the public schools. He was married November 26, 1910, to Miss Merle Saltgiver and their family consists of two children, Donald and Robert. Mr. Scott is an extensive farmer, stock raiser and feeder and a member of the Presbyterian church and the Masonic lodge. He is serving his second term in the legislature. A republican.

DEMOCRATIC STATE CONVENTION

The regular democratic state convention was held in Des Moines July 23, 1936. Governor Clyde L. Herring of Des Moines was chairman and Mrs. Mary S. Kelleher was secretary.

It was the duty of the convention to nominate a candidate for United States senator to fill a vacancy caused by the death of Senator Murphy and a candidate for attorney general because no candidate for this office received thirty-five per cent of the vote cast.

David J. Murphy of Dubuque, Guy M. Gillette of Cherokee, E. G. Dunn of Mason City, M. R. Stansell of Osceola, S. J. Galvin of Hampton and E. W. McManus of Keokuk were nominated from the floor as candidates for United States senator. Guy M. Gillette was the choice of the convention.

Claire E. Hamilton of Winterset, William Matt D. Cooney of Dubuque, Joseph E. Campbell of Charles City and John H. Mitchell were nominated as candidates for attorney general. John H. Mitchell was the choice of the convention.

Following is the platform adopted by the convention:

We, the democrats of Iowa, in convention assembled, resident in the heart of the richest agricultural and industrial section in the union, resolve:

We are committed to the principle enunciated in the American creed of liberty:

"All men are created equal, and that they are endowed by their creator with certain inalienable rights, that among these are life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness."

We hold that under the institutions and framework of our government that the divisions thereof, to-wit, legislative, executive and judicial, are clothed with powers and the right of the free exercise thereof, within their proper spheres; independent of control, each of the other; and that whenever the right to act has been denied to one by either of such branches, the power lies with the people to declare the future policy of governmental administration.

NATIONAL ADMINISTRATION.—We dedicate our support to the continuation of the ideals of the Roosevelt administration; and we pledge continued co-operation with that administration to the end that all the people of this state may enjoy the opportunities and privileges of better government and continued prosperity.

We gratefully acknowledge the assistance given by the federal government to the people of Iowa during the period of depression and drought.

We indorse the national democratic platform and pledge our party to its fulfillment.

STATE ADMINISTRATION.—This convention commends the successful democratic administration of the state of Iowa during the past three and one-half years.

Working in close co-operation with the federal government, that administration, under the most trying circumstances, and in the face of bitter partisan opposition, has fulfilled its pledges and has rendered a service of which the people of this state are justly proud:

1. The credit of the great state has been restored, the budget balanced, and a surplus accumulated, all without depriving the people of the proper services and benefits of government, and our children of the opportunity for education.

2. It has rehabilitated the banking and financial institutions and has restored public confidence in them.

3. It has provided legislation that has taken from the aged the fear of poverty and dependence.

4. It has given to agriculture sympathetic aid and assistance.

5. It has made thoughtful provision for labor and has at all times assisted in the solution of its problems.

TAXATION.—We recognize that to preserve the proper functions and institutions of government taxes must be levied, and we believe it the duty of government to make such taxes just and equitable. We therefore favor the continuation of the three-point tax law, and recommend that the proceeds therefrom be used as follows:

1. Sufficient sums shall be set aside which, with such federal funds as may be available, shall be adequate to pay to every eligible applicant the full pension payments intended under the Iowa old age assistance act.

2. The balance shall be allocated to replace property taxes and to effect an equitable distribution of the tax burden, provided, that resident farm and city home owners shall be given every preference legally possible in such allocation, to the end that the ownership of homes by Iowa citizenry shall be encouraged and fostered.

AGRICULTURE.—The democratic party is the first and only party to translate words into action in behalf of agriculture.

We commend the national democratic administration for having provided the farmers of America with the first workable and effective program for their protection.

We commend the state democratic administration for its prompt responses to every appeal for justified aid and assistance to the farmer and for the splendid manner in which it has co-operated with the federal government in making the agricultural program effective in Iowa.

Let it be remembered that the farmers of America, through their duly authorized leaders and spokesman, formulated and administered with governmental authority, this farm program.

We pledge the democratic party of Iowa to the continued support of the national farm leadership in the operation and administration of any program adopted for Iowa farmers.

We commend the members of the Iowa farm debt advisory committees, the members of the corn loan committees, the members of the corn-hog committees, and all others who have rendered assistance, much of it without compensation, to the many agricultural activities.

We pledge to the farmers of Iowa that we will, without regard to partisan politics, continue to place all such matters and programs in the hands of farmers.

And we pledge ourselves to such state legislation as may be required to make effective their efforts.

LABOR.—We take justifiable pride that the democratic party is responsible for creating the office of the secretary of labor in the president's cabinet.

Our present national administration has shown a sympathetic and practical understanding of the problems of the laboring people by the enactment of laws designed to give to labor broader opportunities and greater security in employment and we heartily indorse its actions, and the provisions of the national democratic platform relating to labor.

We approve the national labor relations act which gives to labor the right

to organize free from intimidation or coercion by employers, and to bargain collectively through representatives of its own choosing.

We favor appropriate state legislation for a furtherance of this program.

RURAL ELECTRIFICATION.—We favor the encouragement of, and assistance to, the rural electrification program to the end that electricity, at a fair price, will be available in every farm home in Iowa.

RELIEF.—We definitely commit ourselves to whatever assistance is necessary properly to protect all our citizens from hunger, misery, and want.

SOCIAL SECURITY.—Under the leadership of our democratic president, more progress has been made in social security than in all the preceeding years of our national life. The democrats of Iowa pledge themselves to any reasonable state legislation to further this humanitarian program.

FARM TO MARKET ROADS.—We favor continued construction of farm-to-market roads to the end that every community will be served by an adequate all-weather system.

HOME-OWNED STORES.—We favor legislation that will protect the independent home-owned merchant from unfair competition.

HIGHWAY SAFETY.—We favor a continuation of our efficient and effective highway patrol and pledge ourselves to more adequately safeguard life and property on our highways.

IOWA INDUSTRY.—We favor a program for encouraging Iowa industries by giving preference to the products of our factories. We believe that state government can aid the expansion of industry, thereby greatly increasing employment, and to that end we pledge our support.

VETERANS.—We commend the present democratic administration for its friendly and understanding attitude toward war veterans and favor continued fair treatment, with particular attention to enactment of constructive legislation for the benefit of disabled and distressed veterans and their dependents.

COAL.—Mine operators, who are complying with the labor laws of this state and paying living wages to our citizens, are entitled to favorable consideration.

We favor giving preference to Iowa coal when public moneys are expended therefore.

FARM TENANCY.—We urge the leadership of the democratic party to turn its attention toward increasing the number of owner-operated farms through the aid of lower interest rates and a revised policy of land purchase and resale.

MORTGAGE MORATORIUM.—Because of the effects of the devastating drought, we favor an extension of mortgage moratorium acts and the continuation of the farm debt advisory council operating as an Iowa state institution under the management of public spirited citizens in the various counties who are interested in retaining farm and home ownership for Iowa citizens.

SCHOOLS.—We commend the present democratic administration on the maintenance of the high standard Iowa school system, with no curtailment of its curriculum, and we favor adherence to, and the continuation of, that policy for the benefit of the children of Iowa.

CONCLUSION.—The performance of pledges is imperative in the successful operation of government. We do not retreat from the principles of party responsibility.

We pledge again that we will economize, consolidate gains made, and by legislation remove any defects that may exist, to the end that our advancements may apply more equitably and justly and provide for a continuation of the prosperity and well-being of all the people.

During the recent years of republican control the state of Iowa sank to the lowest level in its history. Faith and credit were destroyed, farmers were destitute, and misery, want and poverty stalked the land.

Today, the people of Iowa are again hopeful, proud, and confident of the future. We point with pride to the accomplishment of the democratic administration and

REPUBLICAN STATE CONVENTION

The republican regular state convention was held in Des Moines July 10, 1936. Joseph R. Frailey of Fort Madison was chairman and Mrs. Blanche Allbee of Marshalltown was secretary.

It was the duty of the convention to nominate candidates for secretary of state, attorney general and railroad commissioner because of the failure of any candidates for these offices to receive thirty-five per cent of the votes cast in the primary. Following was the choice of the convention for nominees for these offices: Mrs. Henry Wood of Merville for secretary of state; Harold E. Davidson of Clarinda for attorney general and George L. McCaughan of Ankeny for railroad commissioner.

Following is the platform adopted by the convention:

PREAMBLE.—We, the republicans of Iowa, a typical prairie state, in convention assembled with a full realization of the importance of the problems now confronting the American people, do solemnly pledge our wholehearted and loyal support to the furtherance and the carrying out of the following principles; and the acceptance by a candidate of a place on the republican ticket for any office

in this state, either high or low, shall carry with it a pledge of loyalty to the principles and program hereinafter set forth.

CONSTITUTION AND GOVERNMENT.—The liberties of the American people are being violated. The American system of constitutional and local self-government is being destroyed. The authority of the Supreme Court of the United States is being questioned. The American system of free government, private competition and equality of opportunities are being denied.

We therefore renew our declaration of faith in the government founded by the framers of the constitution, and assert our conviction that the legislative, executive and judicial branches of the government must be maintained at all hazards.

We declare our faith in the wisdom, power and integrity of the Supreme Court which has in these trying hours of our national history unflinchingly upheld our principles of government and denied to the New Dealers the attempt to centralize all power and authority in the president and his numerous commissioners. We denounce any and all public officials who solemnly take the oath of office to support and defend the constitution of the United States, and then openly and expressly seek to tear it down by the enactment of laws known to be contrary to its provisions.

LAW ENFORCEMENT.—Disclosure of graft and corruption in high places and deliberate flouting of moral and social laws under the present state administration, and by its members, has brought humiliation and shame to the state of Iowa. The party responsible for this condition is no longer entitled to the confidence and support of the electorate. We pledge the people of Iowa to rid the state of such maladministration of public affairs and to put in authority officials who will enforce the law impartially and efficiently.

SOCIAL SECURITY.—We favor a fair and honest plan to provide old-age pensions to all elderly persons in need, without prejudice or discrimination, making use of such federal aid as may be available; an active program for the care and training of our blind and our cripples to the end that they may be helped to lead as useful and happy lives as possible; furtherance of the provisions of our statutes for the care of widows and children, and the revision of the federal social security act to eliminate provisions which are unsound and unworkable. We particularly deplore the attempt to build up large sums in so-called reserves to be used for political and partisan purposes when they should be used for the alleviation of human distress.

RELIEF.—We demand that the administration of relief be returned to the local authorities as provided by the law of Iowa.

We do emphatically condemn the criminal waste of public funds by Washington Bureaucrats for political and frivolous purposes under the guise of relief. We further emphatically condemn the injection into the relief problem of partisan politics and coercion directed toward the beneficiaries of such relief.

We believe that moneys and supplies provided for the relief of those suffering from poverty through the lack of employment should be distributed according to the need of the sufferers and not through favoritism or patronage therefore.

TAXATION.—We denounce the reckless, heedless and unwarranted extravagance of the democratic administration, both state and national. In all known history of the world no nation in time of peace has piled up such billions of deficit.

The republican party pledges that it will place our financial house both state and nation in order and that we will eliminate all unnecessary functions of government, all superfluous bureaus and employees.

We demand a budget annually balanced as to both ordinary and extraordinary expenditures and that governmental credit be maintained on a sound basis.

We set as our definite goal, a reduction of 25 per cent in Iowa taxes, and if the people of the state will give us a republican governor and a republican legislature, we will attain that objective.

We deplore the need of the sales tax in Iowa, and urge its discontinuance as soon as possible.

We declare that such taxes are justified only and should be devoted exclusively to relief of the distressed and as a mandatory replacement of direct property tax upon our homesteads the benefits to be equitably apportioned to the farm and city homesteads, to the end that all taxes collected from the people of Iowa may be retained for their benefits.

AGRICULTURE.—We heartily endorse the agriculture policies given expression in the 1936 national republican platform, and we wish to especially emphasize the following portions of the said platform:

1. That an agricultural policy be pursued for the protection and restoration of the land resources, designed to bring about such a balance between soil-building and soil-depleting crops as will permanently insure productivity, with reasonable benefits to cooperating farmers on family-type farms, but so regulated as to eliminate the New Deal's destructive policy toward the dairy and live stock industries.

2. To extend experimental aid to farmers developing new crops suited to our soil and climate.

3. To promote the industrial use of farm products by applied science.

4. To protect the American farmer against the importation of all live stock, dairy, and agricultural products, substitutes therefor, and derivatives therefrom, which will depress American farm prices.

5. To provide effective quarantine against imported live stock, dairy and other farm products from countries which do not impose health and sanitary regulations fully equal to those required by our own producers.

6. To provide for ample farm credit at rates as low as those enjoyed by other industries, including commodity live stock loans, and preference in land loans to the farmer acquiring or refinancing a farm as a home.

7. To provide for decentralized, nonpartisan control of the farm credit administration and the election by national farm loan associations of at least one-half of each board of directors of the Federal Land Banks and thereby remove these institutions from politics.

8. To provide in the case of agricultural products of which there are exportable surpluses, the payment of reasonable benefits upon the domestically consumed portion of such crops in order to make the tariff effective. These payments are to be limited to the production level of the family-type farm.

9. To encourage and further develop cooperative marketing.

10. To furnish government assistance in disposing of surpluses in foreign trade by bargaining for foreign markets selectively by countries both as to exports and imports. We strenuously oppose so-called reciprocal treaties which trade off the American farmer.

11. To give every reasonable assistance to producers in areas suffering from temporary disaster, so that they may regain and maintain a self-supporting status.

Iowa deprecates the attitude of the administration in calling crop loans at a time when the nation is confronted by a famine.

FARM TO MARKET ROADS.—We realize to the fullest extent the importance and necessity of all weather roads for the convenience of the farming industry.

We pledge ourselves to the rapid improvement of the secondary road system so that the farmers now living on dirt roads may enjoy the benefits of all weather roads for which they are now paying and to which they are justly entitled.

IOWA INDUSTRIES.—We believe that the industrial activities of Iowa should be furthered in every way reasonably possible and that the use of products manufactured, mined, or produced in Iowa, should be encouraged and fostered.

LABOR.—The attitude of the Roosevelt New Deal administration toward labor has been one of opportunism with the desire to attract labor by glittering promises and magnificent but unconstitutional gestures for the purpose of perpetuating itself in power, while its policies are such as to ultimately make of labor a mere pawn of a socialized and regimented state with no rights except those that a dictator may choose to give.

We believe in the right of labor to organize and bargain collectively, and we favor extension of the principles of voluntary arbitration and conciliation.

We favor proper protection of women employees as set out in the national platform, and are opposed to the exploitation of child labor.

We believe that employment in the United States belongs to citizens of the United States, and not to aliens, and that immigration should be strictly limited.

CONSERVATION.—The republican party solemnly promises that the money raised for the fish and game fund will be expended for the purposes of the protection and propagation of wild life, the preservation of the state's natural resources and the practical application of true conservation rather than the maintenance of political jobs.

VETERANS.—We pledge the continuance of the all time exclusively republican policy of friendliness to the service men of all wars.

CONCLUSION.—We commend the homely virtues of initiative, courage, industry and thrift exemplified in both private and public life by Hon. Alfred M. Landon, republican nominee for president. We endorse most earnestly our candidate for vice president, Colonel Frank Knox, a man eminently qualified for that high office.

We commend our senatorial, congressional and state nominees to the people of Iowa as men and women of high moral standing well versed in public affairs, honest and sincere in their desire to provide the people of Iowa with a public service never excelled in the history of this state.

In the present crisis when the very foundation of our free government is in danger, we invite all the people regardless of former political affiliations to unite with us to the end that personal liberty and the right to use and control property honestly acquired may be preserved.

FARMER-LABOR STATE CONVENTION

The regular farmer-labor state convention was held in Des Moines, July 11, 1936. Gus Erickson of Des Moines was chairman. Following is the platform adopted by the convention:

PREAMBLE.—After more than six years of a so-called depression—in reality a period of chaos, of starving and suffering in America—we, the members of the farmer-labor party of Iowa, in state convention assembled, hereby reaffirm our stand heretofore taken against the present obsolete system of competition, aggrandizement of property and aggregation of wealth in favor of and in behalf of a system based upon co-operation and service, which is a co-operative commonwealth, through and by which the great mass of people of this state and the American nation shall reach a higher and better plane of living.

We denounce the economy of planned scarcity and insist that there is no over-production so long as millions are hungry, in rags and poorly housed. We declare that American production must be geared up to the consuming power of the people and not down to the purchasing capacity of their now-empty pocket-books. We stand for an expansion of production in a co-operative way to meet the needs of all of the people rather than a curtailed production to the end that an ever-diminishing few may profit.

The farmer-labor party of Iowa declares itself unalterably opposed to the Liberty League, the American Chamber of Commerce, or any other kindred organizations that wish to establish a fascist or property dictatorship in the midst of the most abundant natural resources which should be enjoyed by all for their happiness and benefit.

The farmer-labor party therefore declares its unalterable opposition to any aggregation of wealth in the hands of the few, and on its ultimate object and aim stands firm in its determination that a system based upon co-operation and service, which is a co-operative commonwealth, shall and must of necessity be established if civilization is to be maintained in these United States of America.

The farmer-labor party, however, believes that the establishment of a system based upon co-operation and service in this nation should and ought of right be achieved by pacific means at the ballot boxes, and that while this ultimate aim is being achieved there must of necessity be a provision for the period of transition from the present autocracy of wealth in the hands of the few to the co-operative era for all.

The farmer-labor party of Iowa, therefore, adopts as its platform for the coming campaign and the next biennium the following proposals for the period of transition:

AGRICULTURE.—Both the farmer and the consumer have suffered from excessive profits in the distribution of farm products. First, we would attack this problem by eliminating speculation in farm products through publicly owned or co-operatively owned exchanges, where the price of farm products is set. Second, we favor the co-operative marketing of farm products, and especially the organization of consumers' co-operatives.

The destruction of food products while people are in need is wrong and stupid. Curtailed production is asinine when offset by increased importation.

The government, both state and federal, must assist the farmer in an orderly marketing of his products.

No farmer should lose his farm because of economic conditions over which he has no control. We support moratorium legislation. We favor refinancing farm mortgages on a plan identical or similar with the original Frazier-Lemke bill. We insist that the farmer is entitled to as much assistance in the form of federal credit and low interest as are the railroads and banks and insurance companies.

We favor the same rights to organization for farmers as we favor for workers.

We hold that the state department of agriculture and markets must be made responsive to the needs and to the will of organized farmers.

We favor a tax reform program based on ability to pay which will lighten the tax burden upon the farmer.

We pledge ourselves to the foregoing program and to the other parts of this platform to assist the farmer in getting the cost of production to which he is entitled.

We stand for a graduated land and property tax that will exempt and safeguard the homestead of the farmer and the cottage of the laboring man from confiscation through taxation.

PEACE AND WAR.—1. We are unalterably opposed and favor a constitutional amendment prohibiting any future government of this country again permitting any armed forces to go outside the boundaries of the United States.

2. We favor government ownership and operation of plants for the manufacture of armaments and munitions of war.

HOUSING.—We favor the immediate establishment of a federal and/or state government housing program, and particularly that the federal government loan money for long time loans at extremely low rates of interest to home builders building houses of \$3,000 or less.

CIVIL RIGHTS.—We pledge ourselves to work against all legislation which seeks to repress the civil liberties of the people of Iowa, such as teachers' loyalty oath bills, compulsory flag salute laws or legislation to deny the ballot to minority parties. We stand for the abolition of compulsory military training in the tax supported schools and colleges. We advocate the repeal of the Iowa criminal syndicalism act.

We are unalterably opposed to all legal and social discrimination against the foreign born, and racial and religious minorities.

EDUCATION.—We believe that the support of our schools should be a responsibility of the state as a whole, making educational advantages for the children of the state as nearly equal as possible. Teachers of the schools of Iowa should be placed under civil service with an adequate salary, and that all people who train and qualify for teachers should be legally placed upon a teaching staff with secure tenure during good behavior.

TAXATION.—We are unalterably opposed to and favor immediate repeal of the general sales tax.

We favor an improved and increased chain store tax.

We advocate a corporate excess tax law and an increase therein.

We advocate an income tax on large corporations excepting bona fide co-operative organizations.

We favor a steeply graduated income tax on all net incomes in excess of \$5,000.

BANKING.—We demand that congress exercise the exclusive and constitutional power to coin money and regulate the value thereof.

We advocate nationalization of banking with government monopoly of money and credit, operated without profit.

Until we attain nationalization of banking, we advocate the establishment of a central state bank of deposit to be owned wholly by the state of Iowa.

INDUSTRIES.—As the only adequate means of preventing the concentration of wealth in the hands of a few, we favor an extension of the American principle of public ownership such as has been exercised over roads, schools, libraries, fire and police protection, postal service and national defense. We demand an extension of this principle of public or co-operative ownership to natural resources, banks, public utilities, packing plants, transportation and communication systems and monopolized industries so that America may cease to be a land of increasing tenants and paupers.

LABOR.—We advocate for the protection of labor the immediate passage of legislation that will provide a decent standard of living and eliminate child labor in industry.

We favor a strong law providing for the right to organize and bargain collectively through genuine labor unions, and are unalterably opposed to strike thugs and strike breakers and the use of the militia and police as strike breakers.

SOCIAL SECURITY.—Section 1. We demand that the inalienable right of every person to security against unemployment and incapacitation be immediately and definitely established through a security act as embodied in the provisions of the Frazier-Lundeen bill.

Sec. 2. Inasmuch as our aged people have had a large part in developing the resources of our country and creating the wealth thereof; and inasmuch as machine power will continue to replace man power so that there will probably never again be sufficient jobs, under our present system, to require the steady employment of all our laboring men at a living wage; therefore, we favor legislation that will retire our aged people from all gainful employment (thus creating jobs for younger men) on a pension adequate to provide comfort and leisure in their declining years; that will also require the young and middle aged, during their years of service, to systematically create a revolving retirement fund for their old age. We believe that the O. A. R. P., Ltd., more commonly known as the Townsend Recovery Plan, will not only provide such security for the aged, but also, by the compulsory spending of the pension money within thirty days from receipt thereof, will establish and maintain a purchasing power in the hands of the masses which will put millions of the now idle men to work in the various industries to produce the goods purchased by the recipients of the pension money, thus aiding materially in the creating and maintenance of a permanent prosperity as well as an adequate security for the aged. We plan and pledge our full co-operation and faithful effort to secure its enactment into federal law.

INITIATIVE, REFERENDUM AND RECALL.—We favor a change in the Iowa primary laws from the system of direct primary vote to the system of preferential voting; also we favor the adoption of the initiative, referendum and recall.

GENERAL.—We advocate any and all such laws as will aid in the organization of the consumers' co-operatives, co-operative credit unions, co-operative banking, and co-operative service organizations, including co-operative enterprises for rural and city health and housing and rural electrification.

We favor that all appointive employes in this state be brought under a civil service law.

We strongly advocate and demand that the state of Iowa shall accept its responsibility to the unemployed and discontinue the dole and gift system, and in lieu of the dole we advocate the opening of the closed shops and factories and the employment of the unemployed in connection with the opening of such shops, together with a huge public works program.

We are unalterably opposed to the existence or further establishment of state bureaus or state jobs for the purpose of paying political debts.

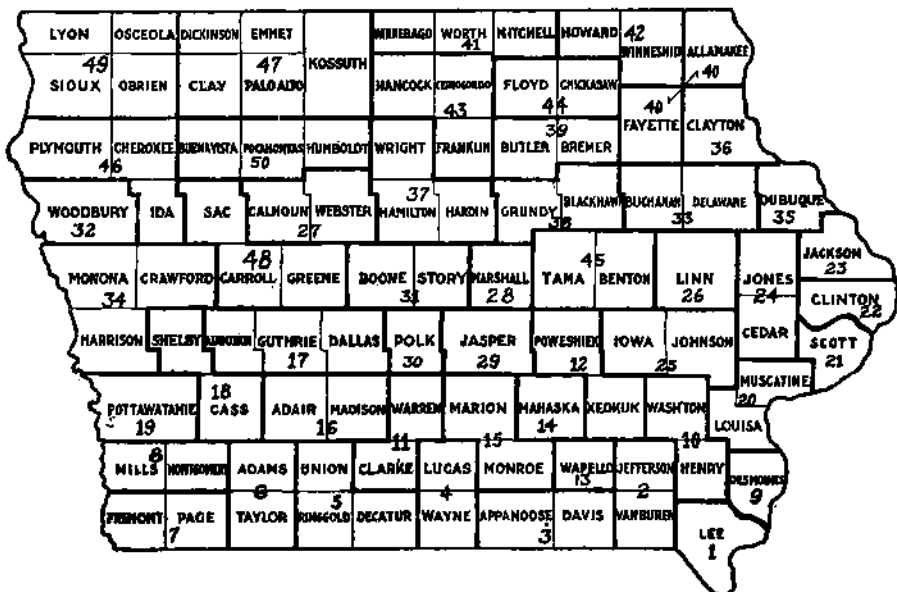

THE DECLARATION OF INDEPENDENCE¹

When in the Course of human events, it becomes necessary for one people to dissolve the political bands which have connected them with another, and to assume among the powers of the earth, the separate and equal station to which the Laws of Nature and of Nature's God entitle them, a decent respect to the opinions of mankind requires that they should declare the causes which impel them to the separation.—We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men are created equal, that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable Rights, that among these are Life, Liberty and the pursuit of Happiness.—That to secure these rights, Governments are instituted among Men, deriving their just powers from the consent of the governed.—That whenever any Form of Government becomes destructive of these ends, it is the Right of the People to alter or to abolish it, and to institute new Government, laying its foundation on such principles and organizing its powers in such form, as to them shall seem most likely to effect their Safety and Happiness. Prudence, indeed, will dictate that Governments long established should not be changed for light and transient causes; and accordingly all experience hath shown, that mankind are more disposed to suffer, while evils are sufferable, than to right themselves by abolishing the forms to which they are accustomed. But when a long train of abuses and usurpations, pursuing invariably the same Object evinces a design to reduce them under absolute Despotism, it is their right, it is their duty, to throw off such Government, and to provide new Guards for their future security.—Such has been the patient sufferance of these Colonies; and such is now the necessity which constrains them to alter their former Systems of Government. The history of the present King of Great Britain is a history of repeated injuries and usurpations, all having in direct object the establishment of an absolute Tyranny over these States. To prove this, let Facts be submitted to a candid world.—He has refused his Assent to Laws, the most wholesome and necessary for the public good.—He has forbidden his Governors to pass Laws of immediate and pressing importance, unless suspended in their operation till his Assent should be obtained; and when so suspended, he has utterly neglected to attend to them.—He has refused to pass other Laws for the accommodation of large districts of people, unless those people would relinquish the right of Representation in the Legislature, a right inestimable to them and formidable to tyrants only.—He has called together legislative bodies at places unusual, uncomfortable, and distant from the depository of their public Records, for the sole purpose of fatiguing them into compliance with his measures.—He has dissolved Representative Houses repeatedly, for opposing with manly firmness his invasions on the rights of the people.—He has refused for a long time, after such dissolutions, to cause others to be elected; whereby the Legislative powers, incapable of Annihilation, have returned to the People at large for their exercise; the State remaining in the mean time exposed to all the dangers of invasion from without, and convulsions within.—He has endeavored to prevent the population of these States; for that purpose obstructing the Laws for Naturalization of Foreigners; refusing to pass others to encourage their migration hither, and raising the conditions of new Appropriations of Lands.—He has obstructed the Administration of Justice, by refusing his Assent to Laws for establishing Judiciary powers.—He has made Judges dependent on his Will alone, for the tenure of their offices, and the amount and payment of their salaries.—He has erected a multitude of New Offices, and sent hither swarms of Officers to harrass our people, and eat out their substance.—He has kept among us, in times of peace, Standing Armies, without the Consent of our legislatures.—He has affected to render the Military independent of and superior to the Civil power.—He has combined with others to subject us to a jurisdiction foreign to our constitution, and unacknowledged by

our laws; giving his Assent to their Acts of pretended Legislation:—For quartering large bodies of armed troops among us:—For protecting them, by a mock Trial, from punishment for any Murders which they should commit on the Inhabitants of these States:—For cutting off our Trade with all parts of the world:—For imposing Taxes on us without our Consent:—For depriving us in many cases, of the benefits of Trial by Jury:—For transporting us beyond Seas to be tried for pretended offences:—For abolishing the free System of English Laws in a neighbouring Province, establishing therein an Arbitrary government, and enlarging its Boundaries so as to render it at once an example and fit instrument for introducing the same absolute rule into these Colonies:—For taking away our Charters, abolishing our most valuable Laws, and altering fundamentally the Forms of our Governments:—For suspending our own Legislatures, and declaring themselves invested with power to legislate for us in all cases whatsoever.—He has abdicated Government here, by declaring us out of his Protection and waging War against us.—He has plundered our seas, ravaged our Coasts, burnt our towns, and destroyed the lives of our people.—He is at this time transporting large Armies of foreign Mercenaries to compleat the works of death, desolation and tyranny, already begun with circumstances of Cruelty & perfidy scarcely paralleled in the most barbarous ages, and totally unworthy the Head of a civilized nation.—He has constrained our fellow Citizens taken Captive on the high Seas to bear Arms against their Country, to become the executioners of their friends and Brethren, or to fall themselves by their Hands.—He has excited domestic Insurrections amongst us, and has endeavoured to bring on the inhabitants of our frontiers, the merciless Indian Savages, whose known rule of warfare, is an undistinguished destruction of all ages, sexes and conditions. In every stage of these Oppressions We have Petitioned for Redress in the most humble terms: Our repeated Petitions have been answered only by repeated injury. A Prince, whose character is thus marked by every act which may define a Tyrant, is unfit to be the ruler of a free people. Nor have We been wanting in attentions to our Brittish brethren. We have warned them from time to time of attempts by their legislature to extend an unwarrantable jurisdiction over us. We have reminded them of the circumstances of our emigration and settlement here. We have appealed to their native justice and magnanimity, and we have conjured them by the ties of our common kindred to dissavow these usurpations, which, would inevitably interrupt our connections and correspondence. They too have been deaf to the voice of justice and of consanguinity. We must, therefore, acquiesce in the necessity, which denounces our Separation, and hold them, as we hold the rest of mankind, Enemies in War, in Peace Friends.—

WE, THEREFORE, the REPRESENTATIVES of the UNITED STATES OF AMERICA, in General Congress, Assembled, appealing to the Supreme Judge of the world for the rectitude of our intentions, do, in the Name, and by Authority of the good People of these Colonies, solemnly publish and declare, That these United Colonies are, and of Right ought to be FREE AND INDEPENDENT STATES; that they are Absolved from all Allegiance to the British Crown, and that all political connection between them and the State of Great Britain, is and ought to be totally dissolved; and that as Free and Independent States, they have full Power to levy War, conclude Peace, contract Alliances, establish Commerce, and to do all other Acts and Things which Independent States may of right do.—And for the support of this Declaration, with a firm reliance on the protection of Divine Providence, we mutually pledge to each other our Lives, our Fortunes and our sacred Honor.

THE CONSTITUTION OF THE UNITED STATES¹

We the People of the United States, in Order to form a more perfect Union, establish Justice, insure domestic Tranquility, provide for the common defence, promote the general Welfare, and secure the Blessings of Liberty to ourselves and our Posterity, do ordain and establish this Constitution for the United States of America.

Article. I.

Section 1. All legislative Powers herein granted shall be vested in a Congress of the United States, which shall consist of a Senate and House of Representatives.

Section 2. The House of Representatives shall be composed of Members chosen every second Year by the People of the several States, and the Electors in each State shall have the Qualifications requisite for Electors of the most numerous Branch of the State Legislature.

No person shall be a Representative who shall not have attained to the Age of twenty-five Years, and been seven Years a Citizen of the United States, and who shall not, when elected, be an Inhabitant of that State in which he shall be chosen.²

Representatives and direct Taxes shall be apportioned among the several States which may be included within this Union, according to their respective Numbers, which shall be determined by *adding to the whole Number of free Persons, including those bound to Service for a Term of Years, and excluding*

Indians not taxed, three fifths of all other Persons. [counting the whole number of persons in each State, excluding Indians not taxed.]³ The actual Enumeration shall be made within three Years after the first Meeting of the Congress of the United States, and within every subsequent Term of ten Years, in such Manner as they shall by Law direct. The Number of Representatives shall not exceed one for every thirty Thousand, but each State shall have at Least one Representative; and until such enumeration shall be made, the State of New Hampshire shall be entitled to chuse three, Massachusetts eight, Rhode-Island and Providence Plantations one, Connecticut five, New-York six, New Jersey four, Pennsylvania eight, Delaware one, Maryland six, Virginia ten, North Carolina five, South Carolina five, and Georgia three.

When vacancies happen in the Representation from any State, the Executive Authority thereof shall issue Writs of Election to fill such Vacancies.

The House of Representatives shall chuse their Speaker and other Officers; and shall have the sole Power of Impeachment.

Section 3. *The Senate of the United States shall be composed of two Senators from each State, chosen by the Legislature thereof, for six Years; and each Senator shall have one Vote.*⁴

[The Senate of the United States shall be composed of two Senators from each State, elected by the people thereof, for six years; and each Senator shall have one vote. The electors in each State shall have the qualifications requisite for electors of the most numerous branch of the State legislatures.]

Immediately after they shall be assembled in Consequence of the first Election, they shall be divided as equally as may be into three Classes. The Seats of the Senators of the first Class shall be vacated at the Expiration of the second Year, of the second Class at the Expiration of the fourth Year, and of the third Class at the Expiration of the sixth Year, so that one third may be chosen every second Year; and if Vacancies happen by Resignation, or otherwise, during the Recess of the Legislature of any State, the Executive thereof may make temporary Appointments until the next Meeting of the Legislature, which shall then fill such Vacancies.⁵

[When vacancies happen in the representation of any State in the Senate, the executive authority of such State shall issue writs of election to fill such vacancies: *Provided*, That the legislature of any State may empower the executive thereof to make temporary appointments until the people fill the vacancies by election as the legislature may direct.]

No Person shall be a Senator who shall not have attained to the Age of thirty Years, and been nine Years a Citizen of the United States, and who shall not, when elected, be an Inhabitant of that State for which he shall be chosen.⁶

The Vice President of the United States shall be President of the Senate, but shall have no Vote, unless they be equally divided.

The Senate shall chuse their other Officers, and also a President pro tempore, in the Absence of the Vice President, or when he shall exercise the Office of President of the United States.

The Senate shall have the sole Power to try all Impeachments. When sitting for that Purpose, they shall be on Oath or Affirmation. When the President of the United States is tried the Chief Justice shall preside: And no Person shall be convicted without the Concurrence of two thirds of the Members present.

Judgment in Cases of Impeachment shall not extend further than to removal from Office, and disqualification to hold and enjoy any Office of honor, Trust or Profit under the United States: but the Party convicted shall nevertheless be

liable and subject to Indictment, Trial, Judgment and Punishment, according to Law.

Section 4. The Times, Places and Manner of holding Elections for Senators and Representatives, shall be prescribed in each State by the Legislature thereof; but the Congress may at any time by Law make or alter such Regulations, except as to the Places of chusing Senators.

*The Congress shall assemble at least once in every Year, and such Meeting shall be on the first Monday in December, unless they shall by Law appoint a different Day.*⁷

[The Congress shall assemble at least once in every year, and such meeting shall begin at noon on the 3d day of January, unless they shall by law appoint a different day.]

Section 5. Each House shall be the Judge of the Elections, Returns and Qualifications of its own Members, and a Majority of each shall constitute a Quorum to do Business; but a smaller Number may adjourn from day to day, and may be authorized to compel the Attendance of absent Members, in such Manner, and under such Penalties as each House may provide.

Each House may determine the Rules of its Proceedings, punish its Members for disorderly Behaviour, and, with the Concurrence of two thirds, expel a Member.

Each House shall keep a Journal of its Proceedings, and from time to time publish the same, excepting such Parts as may in their Judgment require Secrecy; and the Yeas and Nays of the Members of either House on any question shall, at the Desire of one fifth of those Present, be entered on the Journal.

Neither House, during the Session of Congress, shall, without the Consent of the other, adjourn for more than three days, nor to any other Place than that in which the two Houses shall be sitting.

Section 6. The Senators and Representatives shall receive a Compensation for their Services, to be ascertained by Law, and paid out of the Treasury of the United States. They shall in all Cases, except Treason, Felony and Breach of the Peace, be privileged from Arrest during their Attendance at the Session of their respective Houses, and in going to and returning from the same; and for any Speech or Debate in either House, they shall not be questioned in any other Place.

No Senator or Representative shall, during the Time for which he was elected, be appointed to any Civil Office under the Authority of the United States, which shall have been created, or the Emoluments whereof shall have been increased during such time; and no Person holding any Office under the United States, shall be a Member of either House during his Continuance in Office.

Section 7. All Bills for raising Revenue shall originate in the House of Representatives; but the Senate may propose or concur with Amendments as on other Bills.

Every Bill which shall have passed the House of Representatives and the Senate, shall, before it become a Law, be presented to the President of the United States; If he approve he shall sign it, but if not he shall return it, with his Objections to that House in which it shall have originated, who shall enter the Objections at large on their Journal, and proceed to reconsider it. If after such Reconsideration two thirds of that House shall agree to pass the Bill, it shall be sent, together with the Objections, to the other House, by which it shall likewise be reconsidered, and if approved by two thirds of that House, it shall become a Law. But in all such Cases the Votes of both Houses shall be determined by yeas and Nays, and the Names of the Persons voting for and against the Bill shall be entered on the Journal of each House respectively. If any Bill shall not be returned by the President within ten days (Sundays excepted) after it shall have been presented to him, the Same shall be a Law, in like Manner as if he had signed it, unless the Congress by their Adjournment prevent its Return in which Case it shall not be a Law.

Every Order, Resolution, or Vote to which the Concurrence of the Senate and House of Representatives may be necessary (except on a question of Adjournment) shall be presented to the President of the United States; and before the Same shall take Effect, shall be approved by him, or being disapproved by him, shall be repassed by two thirds of the Senate and House of Representatives, according to the Rules and Limitations prescribed in the Case of a Bill.

Section 8. The Congress shall have Power To lay and collect Taxes, Duties, Imposts and Excises, to pay the Debts and provide for the common Defence and general Welfare of the United States; but all Duties, Imposts and Excises shall be uniform throughout the United States;

To borrow Money on the credit of the United States;

To regulate Commerce with foreign Nations, and among the several States, and with the Indian Tribes;

To establish a uniform Rule of Naturalization, and uniform Laws on the subject of Bankruptcies throughout the United States;

To coin Money, regulate the Value thereof, and of foreign Coin, and fix the Standard of Weights and Measures;

To provide for the Punishment of counterfeiting the Securities and current Coin of the United States;

To establish Post Offices and post Roads;

To promote the Progress of Science and useful Arts, by securing for limited Times to Authors and Inventors the exclusive Right to their respective Writings and Discoveries;

To constitute Tribunals inferior to the supreme Court;

To define and punish Piracies and Felonies committed on the high Seas, and Offences against the Law of Nations;

To declare War, grant Letters of Marque and Reprisal, and make Rules concerning Captures on Land and Water;

To raise and support Armies, but no Appropriation of Money to that Use shall be for a longer Term than two Years;

To provide and maintain a Navy;

To make Rules for the Government and Regulation of the land and naval Forces;

To provide for calling forth the Militia to execute the Laws of the Union, suppress Insurrections and repel Invasions;

To provide for organizing, arming, and disciplining, the Militia, and for governing such Part of them as may be employed in the Service of the United States, reserving to the States respectively, the Appointment of the Officers, and the Authority of training the Militia according to the discipline prescribed by Congress;

To exercise exclusive Legislation in all Cases whatsoever, over such District (not exceeding ten Miles square) as may, by Cession of particular States, and the Acceptance of Congress, become the Seat of the Government of the United States, and to exercise like Authority over all Places purchased by the Consent of the Legislature of the State in which the Same shall be, for the Erection of Forts, Magazines, Arsenals, dock-Yards, and other needful Buildings;—And

To make all Laws which shall be necessary and proper for carrying into Execution the foregoing Powers, and all other Powers vested by this Constitution in the Government of the United States, or in any Department or Officer thereof.

Section 9. The Migration or Importation of such Persons as any of the States now existing shall think proper to admit, shall not be prohibited by the Congress prior to the Year one thousand eight hundred and eight, but a Tax or duty may be imposed on such Importation, not exceeding ten dollars for each Person.

The Privilege of the Writ of Habeas Corpus shall not be suspended, unless when in Cases of Rebellion or Invasion the public Safety may require it.

No Bill of Attainder or ex post facto Law shall be passed.

No Capitation, or other direct, Tax shall be laid, unless in Proportion to the Census or Enumeration herein before directed to be taken.

[The Congress shall have power to lay and collect taxes on incomes, from whatever source derived, without apportionment among the several States, and without regard to any census or enumeration.]⁸

No Tax or Duty shall be laid on Articles exported from any State.

No Preference shall be given by any Regulation of Commerce or Revenue to the Ports of one State over those of another: nor shall Vessels bound to, or from, one State, be obliged to enter, clear, or pay Duties in another.

No Money shall be drawn from the Treasury, but in Consequence of Appropriations made by Law; and a regular Statement and Account of the Receipts and Expenditures of all public Money shall be published from time to time.

No Title of Nobility shall be granted by the United States: And no Person holding any Office of Profit or Trust under them, shall, without the Consent of the Congress, accept of any present, Emolument, Office, or Title, of any kind whatever, from any King, Prince, or foreign State.

Section. 10. No State shall enter into any Treaty, Alliance, or Confederation; grant Letters of Marque and Reprisal; coin Money; emit Bills of Credit; make any Thing but gold and silver Coin a Tender in Payment of Debts; pass any Bill of Attainder, ex post facto Law, or Law impairing the Obligation of Contracts, or grant any Title of Nobility.

No State shall, without the Consent of the Congress, lay any Imposts or Duties on Imports or Exports, except what may be absolutely necessary for executing it's inspection Laws: and the net Produce of all Duties and Imposts, laid by any State on Imports or Exports, shall be for the Use of the Treasury of the United States; and all such Laws shall be subject to the Revision and Controul of the Congress.

No State shall, without the Consent of Congress, lay any Duty of Tonnage, keep Troops, or Ships of War in time of Peace, enter into any Agreement or Compact with another State, or with a foreign Power, or engage in War, unless actually invaded, or in such imminent Danger as will not admit of delay.

[All persons born or naturalized in the United States, and subject to the jurisdiction thereof, are citizens of the United States and of the State wherein they reside. No State shall make or enforce any law which shall abridge the privileges or immunities of citizens of the United States; nor shall any State deprive any person of life, liberty, or property, without due process of law; nor deny to any person within its jurisdiction the equal protection of the laws.]⁹

Article. II.

Section 1. The executive Power shall be vested in a President of the United States of America. He shall hold his Office during the Term of four Years, and, together with the Vice President, chosen for the same Term, be elected as follows

Each State shall appoint, in such Manner as the Legislature thereof may direct, a Number of Electors, equal to the whole Number of Senators and Representatives to which the State may be entitled in the Congress: but no Senator or Representative, or Person holding an Office of Trust or Profit under the United States, shall be appointed an Elector.

The Electors shall meet in their respective States, and vote by Ballot for two Persons, of whom one at least shall not be an Inhabitant of the same State with themselves. And they shall make a List of all the Persons voted for, and of the Number of Votes for each; which List they shall sign and certify, and transmit sealed to the Seat of the Government of the United States, directed to the President of the Senate. The President of the Senate shall, in the Presence of the Senate and House of Representatives, open all the Certificates, and the Votes shall then be counted. The Person having the greatest Number of Votes shall be the President, if such Number be a Majority of the whole Number of Electors appointed; and if there be more than one who have such Majority, and have an equal Number of Votes, then the House of Representatives shall immediately chuse by Ballot one of them for President; and if no Person have a Majority, then from the five highest on the List the said House shall in like

*Manner chuse the President. But on chusing the President, the Votes shall be taken by States, the Representation from each State having one Vote; A quorum for this Purpose shall consist of a Member or Members from two thirds of the States, and a Majority of all the States shall be necessary to a Choice. In every Case, after the Choice of the President, the Person having the greatest Number of Votes of the Electors shall be the Vice President. But if there should remain two or more who have equal Votes, the Senate shall chuse from them by Ballot the Vice President.*¹⁰

The Congress may determine the Time of chusing the Electors, and the Day on which they shall give their Votes; which Day shall be the same throughout the United States.

[The Electors shall meet in their respective states, and vote by ballot for President and Vice-President, one of whom, at least, shall not be an inhabitant of the same state with themselves; they shall name in their ballots the person voted for as President, and in distinct ballots the person voted for as Vice-President, and they shall make distinct lists of all persons voted for as President, and of all persons voted for as Vice-President, and of the number of votes for each, which lists they shall sign and certify, and transmit sealed to the seat of the government of the United States, directed to the President of the Senate;—The President of the Senate shall, in the presence of the Senate and House of Representatives, open all the certificates and the votes shall then be counted; —The person having the greatest number of votes for President, shall be the President, if such number be a majority of the whole number of Electors appointed; and if no person have such majority, then from the persons having the highest numbers not exceeding three on the list of those voted for as President, the House of Representatives shall choose immediately, by ballot, the President. But in choosing the President, the votes shall be taken by states, the representation from each state having one vote; a quorum for this purpose shall consist of a member or members from two-thirds of the states, and a majority of all the states shall be necessary to a choice. *And if the House of Representatives shall not choose a President whenever the right of choice shall devolve upon them, before the fourth day of March next following, then the Vice-President shall act as President, as in the case of the death or other constitutional disability of the President.*¹¹ The person having the greatest number of votes as Vice-President, shall be the Vice-President, if such number be a majority of the whole number of Electors appointed, and if no person have a majority, then from the two highest numbers on the list, the Senate shall choose the Vice-President; a quorum for the purpose shall consist of two-thirds of the whole number of Senators, and a majority of the whole number shall be necessary to a choice. But no person constitutionally ineligible to the office of President shall be eligible to that of Vice-President of the United States.]¹²

[The terms of the President and Vice President shall end at noon on the 20th day of January, and the terms of Senators and Representatives at noon on the 3d day of January, of the years in which such terms would have ended if this article had not been ratified; and the terms of their successors shall then begin.

If, at the time fixed for the beginning of the term of the President, the President elect shall have died, the Vice President elect shall become President. If a President shall not have been chosen before the time fixed for the beginning of his term, or if the President elect shall have failed to qualify, then the Vice President elect shall act as President until a President shall have qualified; and the Congress may by law provide for the case wherein neither a President elect nor a Vice President elect shall have qualified, declaring who shall then act as President, or the manner in which one who is to act shall be selected, and such person shall act accordingly until a President or Vice President shall have qualified.

The Congress may by law provide for the case of the death of any of the persons from whom the House of Representatives may choose a President when-

ever the right of choice shall have devolved upon them, and for the case of the death of any of the persons from whom the Senate may choose a Vice President whenever the right of choice shall have devolved upon them.]¹³

No Person except a natural born Citizen, or a Citizen of the United States, at the time of the Adoption of this Constitution, shall be eligible to the Office of President; neither shall any Person be eligible to that Office who shall not have attained to the Age of thirty five Years, and been fourteen Years a Resident within the United States.¹⁴

In Case of the Removal of the President from Office, or of his Death, Resignation, or Inability to discharge the Powers and Duties of the said Office, the Same shall devolve on the Vice President, and the Congress may by Law provide for the Case of Removal, Death, Resignation or Inability, both of the President and Vice President, declaring what Officer shall then act as President, and such Officer shall act accordingly, until the Disability be removed, or a President shall be elected.

The President shall, at stated Times, receive for his Services, a Compensation, which shall neither be increased nor diminished during the Period for which he shall have been elected, and he shall not receive within that Period any other Emolument from the United States, or any of them.

Before he enter on the Execution of his Office, he shall take the following Oath or Affirmation:—"I do solemnly swear (or affirm) that I will faithfully execute the Office of President of the United States, and will to the best of my Ability, preserve, protect and defend the Constitution of the United States."

Section 2. The President shall be Commander in Chief of the Army and Navy of the United States, and of the Militia of the several States, when called into the actual Service of the United States; he may require the Opinion, in writing, of the principal Officer in each of the executive Departments, upon any Subject relating to the Duties of their respective Offices, and he shall have Power to grant Reprieves and Pardons for Offences against the United States, except in Cases of Impeachment.

He shall have Power, by and with the Advice and Consent of the Senate, to make Treaties, provided two thirds of the Senators present concur; and he shall nominate, and by and with the Advice and Consent of the Senate, shall appoint Ambassadors, other public Ministers and Consuls, Judges of the supreme Court, and all other Officers of the United States, whose Appointments are not herein otherwise provided for, and which shall be established by Law: but the Congress may by Law vest the Appointment of such inferior Officers, as they think proper, in the President alone, in the Courts of Law, or in the Heads of Departments.

The President shall have Power to fill up all Vacancies that may happen during the Recess of the Senate, by granting Commissions which shall expire at the End of their next Session.

Section 3. He shall from time to time give to the Congress Information of the State of the Union, and recommend to their Consideration such Measures as he shall judge necessary and expedient; he may, on extraordinary Occasions, convene both Houses, or either of them, and in Case of Disagreement between them, with Respect to the Time of Adjournment, he may adjourn them to such Time as he shall think proper; he shall receive Ambassadors and other public Ministers; he shall take Care that the Laws be faithfully executed, and shall Commission all the Officers of the United States.

Section 4. The President, Vice President and all civil Officers of the United States, shall be removed from Office on Impeachment for, and Conviction of, Treason, Bribery, or other high Crimes and Misdemeanors.

Article III.

Section 1. The judicial Power of the United States, shall be vested in one supreme Court, and in such inferior Courts as the Congress may from time to time ordain and establish. The Judges, both of the supreme and inferior Courts,

shall hold their Offices during good Behaviour, and shall, at stated Times, receive for their Services, a Compensation, which shall not be diminished during their Continuance in Office.

Section 2. The judicial Power shall extend to all Cases, in Law and Equity, arising under this Constitution, the Laws of the United States, and Treaties made, or which shall be made, under their Authority;—to all Cases affecting Ambassadors, other public Ministers and Consuls;—to all Cases of admiralty and maritime Jurisdiction;—to Controversies to which the United States shall be a Party;—to Controversies between two or more States;—between a State and Citizens of another State;—between Citizens of different States,—between Citizens of the same State claiming Lands under Grants of different States, and between a State, or the Citizens thereof, and foreign States, Citizens or Subjects.

[The Judicial power of the United States shall not be construed to extend to any suit in law or equity, commenced or prosecuted against one of the United States by Citizens of another State, or by Citizens or Subjects of any Foreign State.]¹⁵

In all Cases affecting Ambassadors, other public Ministers and Consuls, and those in which a State shall be Party, the supreme Court shall have original Jurisdiction. In all the other Cases before mentioned, the supreme Court shall have appellate Jurisdiction, both as to Law and Fact, with such Exceptions, and under such Regulations as the Congress shall make.

The Trial of all Crimes, except in Cases of Impeachment, shall be by Jury; and such Trial shall be held in the State where the said Crimes shall have been committed; but when not committed within any State, the Trial shall be at such Place or Places as the Congress may by Law have directed.

Section 3. Treason against the United States, shall consist only in levying War against them, or in adhering to their Enemies, giving them Aid and Comfort. No Person shall be convicted of Treason unless on the Testimony of two Witnesses to the same overt Act, or on Confession in open Court.

The Congress shall have Power to declare the Punishment of Treason, but no Attainder of Treason shall work Corruption of Blood, or Forfeiture except during the Life of the Person attainted.

Article. IV.

Section 1. Full Faith and Credit shall be given in each State to the public Acts, Records, and judicial Proceedings of every other State. And the Congress may by general Laws prescribe the Manner in which such Acts, Records and Proceedings shall be proved, and the Effect thereof.

Section 2. The Citizens of each State shall be entitled to all Privileges and Immunities of Citizens in the several States.

A Person charged in any State with Treason, Felony, or other Crime, who shall flee from Justice, and be found in another State, shall on Demand of the executive Authority of the State from which he fled, be delivered up, to be removed to the State having Jurisdiction of the Crime.

No Person held to Service or Labour in one State, under the Laws thereof, escaping into another, shall, in Consequence of any Law or Regulation therein, be discharged from such Service or Labour, but shall be delivered up on Claim of the Party to whom such Service or Labour may be due.¹⁶

Section 3. New States may be admitted by the Congress into this Union; but no new State shall be formed or erected within the Jurisdiction of any other State; nor any State be formed by the Junction of two or more States, or Parts of States, without the Consent of the Legislatures of the States concerned as well as of the Congress.

The Congress shall have Power to dispose of and make all needful Rules and Regulations respecting the Territory or other Property belonging to the United States; and nothing in this Constitution shall be so construed as to Prejudice any Claims of the United States, or of any particular State.

Section 4. The United States shall guarantee to every State in this Union a Republican Form of Government, and shall protect each of them against Invasion; and on Application of the Legislature, or of the Executive (when the Legislature cannot be convened) against domestic Violence.

Article. V.

The Congress, whenever two thirds of both Houses shall deem it necessary, shall propose Amendments to this Constitution, or, on the Application of the Legislatures of two thirds of the several States, shall call a Convention for proposing Amendments, which, in either Case, shall be valid to all Intents and Purposes, as Part of this Constitution, when ratified by the Legislatures of three fourths of the several States, or by Conventions in three fourths thereof, as the one or the other mode of Ratification may be proposed by the Congress; Provided that no Amendment which may be made prior to the Year One thousand eight hundred and eight shall in any Manner affect the first and fourth Clauses in the Ninth Section of the first Article; and that no State, without its Consent, shall be deprived of its equal Suffrage in the Senate.

Article. VI.

All Debts contracted and Engagements entered into, before the Adoption of this Constitution, shall be as valid against the United States under this Constitution, as under the Confederation.

[The validity of the public debt of the United States, authorized by law, including debts incurred for payment of pensions and bounties for services in suppressing insurrection or rebellion, shall not be questioned. But neither the United States nor any State shall assume or pay any debt or obligation incurred in aid of insurrection or rebellion against the United States, or any claim for the loss or emancipation of any slave; but all such debts, obligations and claims shall be held illegal and void.]¹⁷

This Constitution, and the Laws of the United States which shall be made in Pursuance thereof; and all Treaties made, or which shall be made, under the Authority of the United States, shall be the supreme Law of the Land; and the Judges in every State shall be bound thereby, any Thing in the Constitution or Laws of any State to the Contrary notwithstanding.

The Senators and Representatives before mentioned, and the Members of the several State Legislatures, and all executive and judicial Officers, both of the United States and of the several States, shall be bound by Oath or Affirmation, to support this Constitution; but no religious Test shall ever be required as a Qualification to any Office or public Trust under the United States.

Article. VII.

The Ratification of the Conventions of nine States, shall be sufficient for the Establishment of this Constitution between the States so ratifying the Same.

AMENDMENTS¹⁸ TO THE CONSTITUTION OF THE UNITED STATES

Article I

Congress shall make no law respecting an establishment of religion, or prohibiting the free exercise thereof; or abridging the freedom of speech, or of the press; or the right of the people peaceably to assemble, and to petition the Government for a redress of grievances.

Article II

A well regulated Militia, being necessary to the security of a free State, the right of the people to keep and bear Arms, shall not be infringed.

Article III

No Soldier shall, in time of peace be quartered in any house, without the consent of the Owner, nor in time of war, but in a manner to be prescribed by law.

Article IV

The right of the people to be secure in their persons, houses, papers, and effects, against unreasonable searches and seizures, shall not be violated, and no Warrants shall issue, but upon probable cause, supported by Oath or affirmation, and particularly describing the place to be searched, and the persons or things to be seized.

Article V

No person shall be held to answer for a capital, or otherwise infamous crime, unless on a presentment or indictment of a Grand Jury, except in cases arising in the land or naval forces, or in the Militia, when in actual service in time of War or public danger; nor shall any person be subject for the same offence to be twice put in jeopardy of life or limb; nor shall be compelled in any criminal case to be a witness against himself, nor be deprived of life, liberty, or property, without due process of law; nor shall private property be taken for public use, without just compensation.

Article VI

In all criminal prosecutions, the accused shall enjoy the right to a speedy and public trial, by an impartial jury of the State and district wherein the crime shall have been committed, which district shall have been previously ascertained by law, and to be informed of the nature and cause of the accusation; to be confronted with the witnesses against him; to have compulsory process for obtaining witnesses in his favor, and to have the Assistance of Counsel for his defence.

Article VII

In Suits at common law, where the value in controversy shall exceed twenty dollars, the right of trial by jury shall be preserved, and no fact tried by a jury, shall be otherwise re-examined in any Court of the United States, than according to the rules of the common law.

Article VIII

Excessive bail shall not be required, nor excessive fines imposed, nor cruel and unusual punishments inflicted.

Article IX

The enumeration in the Constitution, of certain rights, shall not be construed to deny or disparage others retained by the people.

Article X

The powers not delegated to the United States by the Constitution, nor prohibited by it to the States, are reserved to the States respectively, or to the people.

Article XI

The Judicial power of the United States shall not be construed to extend to any suit in law or equity, commenced or prosecuted against one of the United States by Citizens of another State, or by Citizens or Subjects of any Foreign State.¹⁹

Article XII

The Electors shall meet in their respective states, and vote by ballot for President and Vice-President, one of whom, at least, shall not be an inhabitant of the same state with themselves; they shall name in their ballots the person voted for as President, and in distinct ballots the person voted for as Vice-President, and they shall make distinct lists of all persons voted for as President, and of all persons voted for as Vice-President, and of the number of votes for each, which lists they shall sign and certify, and transmit sealed to the seat of the government of the United States, directed to the President of the Senate;—The President of the Senate shall, in the presence of the Senate and House of Representatives, open all the certificates and the votes shall then be counted;—The person having the greatest number of votes for President, shall be the President, if such number be a majority of the whole number of Electors appointed; and if no person have such majority, then from the persons having the highest numbers not exceeding three on the list of those voted for as President, the House of Representatives shall choose immediately, by ballot, the President. But in choosing the President, the votes shall be taken by states, the representation from each state having one vote; a quorum for this purpose shall consist of a member or members from two-thirds of the states, and a majority of all the states shall be necessary to a choice. And if the House of Representatives shall not choose a President whenever the right of choice shall devolve upon them, *before the fourth day of March next following*, then the Vice-President shall act as President, as in the case of the death or other constitutional disability of the President. - The person having the greatest number of votes as Vice-President, shall be the Vice-President, if such number be a majority of the whole number of Electors appointed, and if no person have a majority, then from the two highest numbers on the list, the Senate shall choose the Vice-President; a quorum for the purpose shall consist of two-thirds of the whole number of Senators, and a majority of the whole number shall be necessary to a choice. But no person constitutionally ineligible to the office of President shall be eligible to that of Vice-President of the United States.²⁰

Article XIII

Section 1. Neither slavery nor involuntary servitude except as a punishment for crime whereof the party shall have been duly convicted, shall exist within the United States, or any place subject to their jurisdiction.

Section 2. Congress shall have power to enforce this article by appropriate legislation.²¹

Article XIV

Section 1. All persons born or naturalized in the United States, and subject to the jurisdiction thereof, are citizens of the United States and of the State wherein they reside. No State shall make or enforce any law which shall abridge the privileges or immunities of citizens of the United States; nor shall any State deprive any person of life, liberty, or property, without due process of law; nor deny to any person within its jurisdiction the equal protection of the laws.

Section 2. Representatives shall be apportioned among the several States according to their respective numbers, counting the whole number of persons in each State, excluding Indians not taxed. But when the right to vote at any election for the choice of electors for President and Vice President of the United States, Representatives in Congress, the Executive and Judicial officers of a State, or the members of the Legislature thereof, is denied to any of the male inhabitants of such State, being twenty-one years of age, and citizens of the United States, or in any way abridged, except for participation in rebellion, or other crime, the basis of representation therein shall be reduced in the proportion which the number of such male citizens shall bear to the whole number of male citizens twenty-one years of age in such State.

Section 3. No person shall be a Senator or Representative in Congress, or elector of President and Vice President, or hold any office, civil or military, under the United States, or under any State, who, having previously taken an oath, as a member of Congress, or as an officer of the United States, or as a member of any State legislature, or as an executive or judicial officer of any State, to support the Constitution of the United States, shall have engaged in insurrection or rebellion against the same, or given aid or comfort to the enemies thereof. But Congress may by a vote of two-thirds of each House, remove such disability.

Section 4. The validity of the public debt of the United States, authorized by law, including debts incurred for payment of pensions and bounties for services in suppressing insurrection or rebellion, shall not be questioned. But neither the United States nor any State shall assume or pay any debt or obligation incurred in aid of insurrection or rebellion against the United States, or any claim for the loss or emancipation of any slave; but all such debts, obligations and claims shall be held illegal and void.

Section 5. The Congress shall have power to enforce, by appropriate legislation, the provisions of this article.²²

Article XV

Section 1. The right of citizens of the United States to vote shall not be denied or abridged by the United States or by any State on account of race, color, or previous condition of servitude.

Section 2. The Congress shall have power to enforce this article by appropriate legislation.²³

Article XVI

The Congress shall have power to lay and collect taxes on incomes, from whatever source derived, without apportionment among the several States, and without regard to any census or enumeration.²⁴

Article XVII

The Senate of the United States shall be composed of two Senators from each State, elected by the people thereof, for six years; and each Senator shall have

one vote. The electors in each State shall have the qualifications requisite for electors of the most numerous branch of the State legislatures.

When vacancies happen in the representation of any State in the Senate, the executive authority of such State shall issue writs of election to fill such vacancies: *Provided*, That the legislature of any State may empower the executive thereof to make temporary appointments until the people fill the vacancies by election as the legislature may direct.

This amendment shall not be so construed as to affect the election or term of any Senator chosen before it becomes valid as part of the Constitution.²⁵

Article XVIII

Section 1. After one year from the ratification of this article the manufacture, sale, or transportation of intoxicating liquors within, the importation thereof into, or the exportation thereof from the United States and all territory subject to the jurisdiction thereof for beverage purposes is hereby prohibited.

Section 2. The Congress and the several States shall have concurrent power to enforce this article by appropriate legislation.

Section 3. This article shall be inoperative unless it shall have been ratified as an amendment to the Constitution by the legislatures of the several States, as provided in the Constitution, within seven years from the date of the submission hereof to the States by the Congress.²⁶

Article XIX

The right of the citizens of the United States to vote shall not be denied or abridged by the United States or by any State on account of sex.

Congress shall have power to enforce this article by appropriate legislation.²⁷

Article XX

Section 1. The terms of the President and Vice President shall end at noon on the 20th day of January, and the terms of Senators and Representatives at noon on the 3d day of January, of the years in which such terms would have ended if this article had not been ratified; and the terms of their successors shall then begin.

Section 2. The Congress shall assemble at least once in every year, and such meeting shall begin at noon on the 3d day of January, unless they shall by law appoint a different day.

Section 3. If, at the time fixed for the beginning of the term of the President, the President elect shall have died, the Vice President elect shall become President. If a President shall not have been chosen before the time fixed for the beginning of his term, or if the President elect shall have failed to qualify, then the Vice President elect shall act as President until a President shall have qualified; and the Congress may by law provide for the case wherein neither a President elect nor a Vice President elect shall have qualified, declaring who shall then act as President, or the manner in which one who is to act shall be selected, and such person shall act accordingly until a President or Vice President shall have qualified.

Section 4. The Congress may by law provide for the case of the death of any of the persons from whom the House of Representatives may choose a President whenever the right of choice shall have devolved upon them, and for the case of the death of any of the persons from whom the Senate may choose a Vice President whenever the right of choice shall have devolved upon them.

Section 5. Sections 1 and 2 shall take effect on the 15th day of October following the ratification of this article.

Section 6. This article shall be inoperative unless it shall have been ratified as an amendment to the Constitution by the legislatures of three-fourths of the several States within seven years from the date of its submission.²⁸

Article XXI

Section 1. The eighteenth article of amendment to the Constitution of the United States is hereby repealed.

Section 2. The transportation or importation into any State, Territory, or Possession of the United States for delivery or use therein of intoxicating liquors, in violation of the laws thereof, is hereby prohibited.

Section 3. This article shall be inoperative unless it shall have been ratified as an amendment to the Constitution by conventions in the several States, as provided in the Constitution, within seven years from the date of the submission hereof to the States by the Congress.²⁹

PROPOSED CHILD LABOR AMENDMENT

Section 1. The Congress shall have power to limit, regulate, and prohibit the labor of persons under eighteen years of age.

Section 2. The power of the several States is unimpaired by this article except that the operation of State laws shall be suspended to the extent necessary to give effect to legislation enacted by the Congress.³⁰

THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF IOWA

INTRODUCTION

Iowa was organized as a separate Territory by an act of Congress approved on June 12, 1838, but it was not until 1844 that steps were taken to secure admission into the Union. A constitutional convention met at Iowa City in October, 1844. The Constitution drafted by this convention was twice submitted to the voters of the Territory of Iowa and twice rejected by them, largely because of dissatisfaction with the boundaries of the proposed State.

A second constitutional convention met at Iowa City in May, 1846. The Constitution drafted by this convention was ratified by a majority of 456 votes at an election held on August 3, 1846, and Iowa was admitted as a State on December 28, 1846.

The Constitution of 1846, however, contained a number of provisions which were found to be unsatisfactory in practice. One of these was the prohibition of banking institutions. As a result of this dissatisfaction, the legislature in 1855 provided for an election on the question of calling a convention to revise or amend the Constitution of 1846. The vote was 32,390 for a convention and 14,162 against a convention. Delegates were elected on November 4, 1856, and the convention met at Iowa City on January 19, 1857.

The delegates drafted a new constitution which was submitted to the people at an election held on August 3, 1857, and ratified by a vote of 40,311 to 38,681. This Constitution went into effect by proclamation of the governor on September 3, 1857.

The Constitution of 1857 has, since that time, remained the fundamental law of the State of Iowa; but it has been amended a number of times.

THE CONSTITUTION¹

WE, THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF IOWA, grateful to the Supreme Being for the blessings hitherto enjoyed, and feeling our dependence on Him for a continuation of those blessings, do ordain and establish a free and independent government, by the name of the STATE OF IOWA, the boundaries whereof shall be as follows:

Beginning in the middle of the main channel of the Mississippi River, at a point due East of the middle of the mouth of the main channel of the Des Moines River, thence up the middle of the main channel of the said Des Moines River, to a point on said river where the Northern boundary line of the State of Missouri—as established by the constitution of that State—adopted June 12th, 1820—crosses the said middle of the main channel of the said Des Moines River; thence Westwardly along the said Northern boundary line of the State of Missouri, as established at the time aforesaid, until an extension of said line intersects the middle of main channel of the Missouri River; thence up the middle of the main channel of the said Missouri River to a point opposite the middle of the main channel of the Big Sioux River, according to Nicollett's Map; thence up the main channel of the said Big Sioux River, according to the said map, until it is intersected by the parallel of forty-three degrees and thirty minutes North latitude; thence East along said parallel of forty three degrees and thirty minutes until said parallel intersects the middle of the main channel of the Mississippi River; thence down the middle of the main channel of said Mississippi River to the place of beginning.

Besides being indicated in their proper place in the text, the amendments are also printed in full in chronological order following the Constitution.

ARTICLE I.
BILL OF RIGHTS.

SECTION 1. All men are, by nature, free and equal, and have certain inalienable rights—among which are those of enjoying and defending life and liberty, acquiring, possessing and protecting property, and pursuing and obtaining safety and happiness.

SEC. 2. All political power is inherent in the people. Government is instituted for the protection, security, and benefit of the people, and they have the right, at all times, to alter or reform the same, whenever the public good may require it.

SEC. 3. The General Assembly shall make no law respecting an establishment of religion, or prohibiting the free exercise thereof; nor shall any person be compelled to attend any place of worship, pay tithes, taxes, or other rates for building or repairing places of worship, or the maintenance of any minister, or ministry.

SEC. 4. No religious test shall be required as a qualification for any office, or public trust, and no person shall be deprived of any of his rights, privileges, or capacities, or disqualified from the performance of any of his public or private duties, or rendered incompetent to give evidence in any court of law or equity, in consequence of his opinions on the subject of religion; and any party to any judicial proceeding shall have the right to use as a witness, or take the testimony of, any other person not disqualified on account of interest, who may be cognizant of any fact material to the case; and parties to suits may be witnesses, as provided by law.

SEC. 5. Any citizen of this State who may hereafter be engaged, either directly, or indirectly, in a duel, either as principal, or accessory before the fact, shall forever be disqualified from holding any office under the Constitution and laws of this State.

SEC. 6. All laws of a general nature shall have a uniform operation; the General Assembly shall not grant to any citizen, or class of citizens, privileges or immunities, which, upon the same terms shall not equally belong to all citizens.

SEC. 7. Every person may speak, write, and publish his sentiments on all subjects, being responsible for the abuse of that right. No law shall be passed to restrain or abridge the liberty of speech, or of the press. In all prosecutions or indictments for libel, the truth may be given in evidence to the jury, and if it appear to the jury that the matter charged as libellous was true, and was published with good motives and for justifiable ends, the party shall be acquitted.

SEC. 8. The right of the people to be secure in their persons, houses, papers and effects, against unreasonable seizures and searches shall not be violated; and no warrant shall issue but on probable cause, supported by oath or affirmation, particularly describing the place to be searched, and the persons and things to be seized.

SEC. 9. The right of trial by jury shall remain inviolate; but the General Assembly may authorize trial by a jury of a less number than twelve men in inferior courts; but no person shall be deprived of life, liberty, or property, without due process of law.

SEC. 10. In all criminal prosecutions, and in cases involving the life, or liberty of an individual the accused shall have a right to a speedy and public trial by an impartial jury; to be informed of the accusation against him, to have a copy of the same when demanded; to be confronted with the witnesses against him; to have compulsory process for his witnesses; and, to have the assistance of counsel.

SEC. 11. All offenses less than felony and in which the punishment does not exceed a fine of one hundred dollars, or imprisonment for thirty days, shall be tried summarily before a Justice of the Peace, or other officer authorized by law, on information under oath, without indictment, or the intervention of a grand jury, saving to the defendant the right of appeal; and no person shall be held to answer for any higher criminal offence, unless on presentment or indictment by a grand jury,² except in cases arising in the army, or navy, or in the militia, when in actual service, in time of war or public danger.

SEC. 12. No person shall after acquittal, be tried for the same offence. All persons shall, before conviction, be bailable, by sufficient sureties, except for capital offences where the proof is evident, or the presumption great.

SEC. 13. The writ of habeas corpus shall not be suspended, or refused when application is made as required by law, unless in case of rebellion, or invasion the public safety may require it.

SEC. 14. The military shall be subordinate to the civil power. No standing army shall be kept up by the State in time of peace; and in time of war, no appropriation for a standing army shall be for a longer time than two years.

SEC. 15. No soldier shall, in time of peace, be quartered in any house without the consent of the owner, nor in time of war except in the manner prescribed by law.

SEC. 16. Treason against the State shall consist only in levying war against it, adhering to its enemies, or giving them aid and comfort. No person shall be convicted of treason, unless on the evidence of two witnesses to the same overt act, or confession in open Court.

SEC. 17. Excessive bail shall not be required; excessive fines shall not be imposed, and cruel and unusual punishment shall not be inflicted.

SEC. 18. Private property shall not be taken for public use without just compensation first being made, or secured to be made to the owner thereof, as soon as the damages shall be assessed by a jury, who shall not take into consideration any advantages that may result to said owner on account of the improvement for which it is taken.

[The general assembly, however, may pass laws permitting the owners of lands to construct drains, ditches, and levees for agricultural, sanitary or mining purposes across the lands of others, and provide for the organization of drainage districts, vest the proper authorities with power to construct and maintain levees, drains and ditches and to keep in repair all drains, ditches, and levees heretofore constructed under the laws of the state, by special assessments upon the property benefited thereby. The General Assembly may provide by law for the condemnation of such real estate as shall be necessary for the construction and maintenance of such drains, ditches and levees, and prescribe the method of making such condemnation.]³

SEC. 19. No person shall be imprisoned for debt in any civil action, on mesne or final process, unless in case of fraud; and no person shall be imprisoned for a militia fine in time of peace.

SEC. 20. The people have the right freely to assemble together to counsel for the common good; to make known their opinions to their representatives and to petition for a redress of grievances.

SEC. 21. No bill of attainder, ex post facto law, or law impairing the obligation of contracts, shall ever be passed.

SEC. 22. Foreigners who are, or may hereafter become residents of this State, shall enjoy the same rights in respect to the possession, enjoyment and descent of property, as native born citizens.

SEC. 23. There shall be no slavery in this State; nor shall there be involuntary servitude, unless for the punishment of crime.

SEC. 24. No lease or grant of agricultural lands, reserving any rent, or service of any kind, shall be valid for a longer period than twenty years.

SEC. 25. This enumeration of rights shall not be construed to impair or deny others, retained by the people.

[SECTION 26. No person shall manufacture for sale, or sell, or keep for sale, as a beverage any intoxicating liquors whatever, including ale, wine and beer. The general assembly shall by law prescribe regulations for the enforcement of the prohibition herein contained, and shall thereby provide suitable penalties for the violation of the provisions hereof.]⁴

ARTICLE II.

RIGHT OF SUFFRAGE.

SECTION 1. Every *white*⁵ *male*⁶ citizen of the United States, of the age of twenty one years, who shall have been a resident of this State six months next preceding the election, and of the County in which he claims his vote sixty days, shall be entitled to vote at all elections which are now or hereafter may be authorized by law.

SEC. 2. Electors shall, in all cases except treason, felony, or breach of the peace, be privileged from arrest on the days of election, during their attendance at such election, going to and returning therefrom.

SEC. 3. No elector shall be obliged to perform military duty on the day of election, except in time of war, or public danger.

SEC. 4. No person in the military, naval, or marine service of the United States shall be considered a resident of this State by being stationed in any garrison, barrack, or military or naval place, or station within this State.

SEC. 5. No idiot, or insane person, or person convicted of any infamous crime, shall be entitled to the privilege of an elector.

SEC. 6. All elections by the people shall be by ballot.

[*The general election for state, district county and township officers shall be held on the Tuesday next after the first Monday in November.*]⁷

[SEC. 7. The general election for state, district, county and township officers in the year 1916 shall be held in the same month and on the same day as that fixed by the laws of the United States for the election of presidential electors, or of president and vice-president of the United States; and thereafter such election shall be held at such time as the general assembly may by law provide.]⁸

ARTICLE III.

OF THE DISTRIBUTION OF POWERS.

SECTION 1. The powers of the government of Iowa shall be divided into three separate departments—the Legislative, the Executive, and the Judicial: and no person charged with the exercise of powers properly belonging to one of these departments shall exercise any function appertaining to either of the others, except in cases hereinafter expressly directed or permitted.

LEGISLATIVE DEPARTMENT.

SECTION 1. The Legislative authority of this State shall be vested in a General Assembly, which shall consist of a Senate and House of Representatives; and the style of every law shall be, "Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Iowa."

SEC. 2. The sessions of the General Assembly shall be biennial, and shall commence on the second Monday in January next ensuing the election of its members; unless the Governor of the State shall, in the meantime, convene the General Assembly by proclamation.

SEC. 3. The members of the House of Representatives shall be chosen every second year, by the qualified electors of their respective districts, *on the second Tuesday in October, except the years of the Presidential election, when the election shall be on the Tuesday next after the first Monday in November;*⁹ and their term of office shall commence on the first day of January next after their election, and continue two years, and until their successors are elected and qualified.

SEC. 4. No person shall be a member of the House of Representatives who shall not have attained the age of twenty-one years, be a *free white*¹⁰ male¹¹ citizen of the United States, and shall have been an inhabitant of this State one year next preceding his election, and at the time of his election shall have had an actual residence of sixty days in the County, or District he may have been chosen to represent.

SEC. 5. Senators shall be chosen for the term of four years, at the same time and place as Representatives; they shall be twenty-five years of age, and possess the qualifications of Representatives as to residence and citizenship.

SEC. 6. The number of Senators shall not be less than one third, nor more than one half the representative body; and shall be so classified by lot, that one class, being as nearly one half as possible, shall be elected every two years. When the number of Senators is increased, they shall be annexed by lot to one or the other of the two classes, so as to keep them as nearly equal in numbers as practicable.

SEC. 7. Each house shall choose its own officers, and judge of the qualification, election, and return of its own members. A contested election shall be determined in such manner as shall be directed by law.

SEC. 8. A majority of each house shall constitute a quorum to transact business; but a smaller number may adjourn from day to day, and may compel the attendance of absent members in such manner and under such penalties as each house may provide.

SEC. 9. Each house shall sit upon its own adjournments, keep a journal of its proceedings, and publish the same; determine its rules of proceedings, punish members for disorderly behavior, and, with the consent of two thirds, expel a member, but not a second time for the same offense; and shall have all other powers necessary for a branch of the General Assembly of a free and independent State.

SEC. 10. Every member of the General Assembly shall have the liberty to dissent from, or protest against any act or resolution which he may think injurious to the public, or an individual, and have the reasons for his dissent entered on the journals; and the yeas and nays of the members of either house, on any question, shall, at the desire of any two members present, be entered on the journals.

SEC. 11. Senators and Representatives, in all cases, except treason, felony, or breach of the peace, shall be privileged from arrest during the session of the General Assembly, and in going to and returning from the same.

SEC. 12. When vacancies occur in either house, the Governor, or the person exercising the functions of Governor, shall issue writs of election to fill such vacancies.

SEC. 13. The doors of each house shall be open, except on such occasions, as, in the opinion of the house, may require secrecy.

SEC. 14. Neither house shall, without the consent of the other, adjourn for more than three days, nor to any other place than that in which they may be sitting.

SEC. 15. Bills may originate in either house, and may be amended, altered, or rejected by the other; and every bill having passed both houses, shall be signed by the Speaker and President of their respective houses.

SEC. 16. Every bill which shall have passed the General Assembly, shall, before it becomes a law, be presented to the Governor. If he approve, he shall sign it; but if not, he shall return it with his objections, to the house in which it originated, which shall enter the same upon their journal, and proceed to reconsider it; if, after such re-consideration, it again pass both houses, by yeas and nays, by a majority of two thirds of the members of each house, it shall become a law, notwithstanding the Governor's objections. If any bill shall not be returned within three days after it shall have been presented to him, Sunday excepted, the same shall be a law in like manner as if he had signed it, unless

the General Assembly, by adjournment, prevent such return. Any bill submitted to the Governor for his approval during the last three days of a session of the General Assembly, shall be deposited by him in the office of the Secretary of State, within thirty days after the adjournment, with his approval, if approved by him, and with his objections, if he disapproves thereof.

SEC. 17. No bill shall be passed unless by the assent of a majority of all the members elected to each branch of the General Assembly, and the question upon the final passage shall be taken immediately upon its last reading, and the yeas and nays entered on the journal.

SEC. 18. An accurate statement of the receipts and expenditures of the public money shall be attached to and published with the laws, at every regular session of the General Assembly.

SEC. 19. The House of Representatives shall have the sole power of impeachment, and all impeachments shall be tried by the Senate. When sitting for that purpose, the senators shall be upon oath or affirmation; and no person shall be convicted without the concurrence of two thirds of the members present.

SEC. 20. The Governor, Judges of the Supreme and District Courts, and other State officers, shall be liable to impeachment for any misdemeanor or malfeasance in office: but judgment in such cases shall extend only to removal from office, and disqualification to hold any office of honor, trust, or profit, under this State; but the party convicted or acquitted shall nevertheless be liable to indictment, trial, and punishment, according to law. All other civil officers shall be tried for misdemeanors and malfeasance in office, in such manner as the General Assembly may provide.

SEC. 21. No senator or representative shall, during the time for which he shall have been elected, be appointed to any civil office of profit under this State, which shall have been created, or the emoluments of which shall have been increased during such term, except such offices as may be filled by elections by the people.

SEC. 22. No person holding any lucrative office under the United States, or this State, or any other power, shall be eligible to hold a seat in the General Assembly: but offices in the militia, to which there is attached no annual salary, or the office of justice of the peace, or postmaster whose compensation does not exceed one hundred dollars per annum, or notary public, shall not be deemed lucrative.

SEC. 23. No person who may hereafter be a collector or holder of public monies, shall have a seat in either House of the General Assembly, or be eligible to hold any office of trust or profit in this State, until he shall have accounted for and paid into the treasury all sums for which he may be liable.

SEC. 24. No money shall be drawn from the treasury but in consequence of appropriations made by law.

SEC. 25. Each member of the first General Assembly under this Constitution, shall receive three dollars per diem while in session; and the further sum of three dollars for every twenty miles traveled, in going to and returning from the place where such session is held, by the nearest traveled route; after which they shall receive such compensation as shall be fixed by law; but no General Assembly shall have power to increase the compensation of its own members. And when convened in extra session they shall receive the same mileage and per diem compensation, as fixed by law for the regular session, and none other.

SEC. 26. No law of the General Assembly, passed at a regular session, of a public nature, shall take effect until the fourth day of July next after the passage thereof. Laws passed at a special session, shall take effect ninety days after the adjournment of the General Assembly by which they were passed. If the General Assembly shall deem any law of immediate importance, they may provide that the same shall take effect by publication in newspapers in the State.

SEC. 27. No divorce shall be granted by the General Assembly.

SEC. 28. No lottery shall be authorized by this State; nor shall the sale of lottery tickets be allowed.

SEC. 29. Every act shall embrace but one subject, and matters properly connected therewith; which subject shall be expressed in the title. But if any subject shall be embraced in an act which shall not be expressed in the title, such act shall be void only as to so much thereof as shall not be expressed in the title,

Sec. 30. The General Assembly shall not pass local or special laws in the following cases:

For the assessment and collection of taxes for State, County, or road purposes;
 For laying out, opening, and working roads or highways;
 For changing the names of persons;
 For the incorporation of cities and towns;
 For vacating roads, town plats, streets, alleys, or public squares;
 For locating or changing county seats.

In all the cases above enumerated, and in all other cases where a general law can be made applicable, all laws shall be general, and of uniform operation throughout the State; and no law changing the boundary lines of any county shall have effect until upon being submitted to the people of the counties affected by the change, at a general election, it shall be approved by a majority of the votes in each county, cast for and against it.

Sec. 31. No extra compensation shall be made to any officer, public agent, or contractor, after the service shall have been rendered, or the contract entered into; nor, shall any money be paid on any claim, the subject matter of which shall not have been provided for by pre-existing laws, and no public money or property shall be appropriated for local, or private purposes, unless such appropriation, compensation, or claim, be allowed by two-thirds of the members elected to each branch of the General Assembly.

Sec. 32. Members of the General Assembly shall, before they enter upon the duties of their respective offices, take and subscribe the following oath or affirmation: "I do solemnly swear, or affirm, (as the case may be,) that I will support the Constitution of the United States, and the Constitution of the State of Iowa, and that I will faithfully discharge the duties of Senator, (or Representative, as the case may be,) according to the best of my ability." And members of the General Assembly are hereby empowered to administer to each other the said oath or affirmation.

Sec. 33. The General Assembly shall, in the years One thousand eight hundred and fifty nine, One thousand eight hundred and sixty three, One thousand eight hundred and sixty five, One thousand eight hundred and sixty seven, One thousand eight hundred and sixty nine, and One thousand eight hundred and seventy five, and every ten years thereafter, cause an enumeration to be made of all the white¹² inhabitants of the State.¹³

Sec. 34. The number of senators shall, at the next session following each period of making such enumeration, and the next session following each United States census, be fixed by law, and apportioned among the several counties, according to the number of white¹⁴ inhabitants in each.

Sec. 35. The Senate shall not consist of more than fifty members, nor the House of Representatives of more than one hundred; and they shall be apportioned among the several counties and representative districts of the State, according to the number of white¹⁵ inhabitants in each, upon ratios to be fixed by law; but no representative district shall contain more than four organized counties, and each district shall be entitled to at least one representative. Every county and district which shall have a number of inhabitants equal to one-half of the ratio fixed by law, shall be entitled to one representative; and any one county containing in addition to the ratio fixed by law, one half of that number, or more, shall be entitled to one additional representative. No floating district shall hereafter be formed.

Sec. 36. At its first session under this Constitution, and at every subsequent regular session, the General Assembly shall fix the ratio of representation, and also form into representative districts those counties which will not be entitled singly to a representative.¹⁶

[SECTION 34. The senate shall be composed of fifty members to be elected from the several senatorial districts, established by law and at the next session of the general assembly held following the taking of the state and national census, they shall be apportioned among the several counties or districts of the state, according to population as shown by the last preceding census (, but no county shall be entitled to more than one (1) senator).¹⁷

[SEC. 35. The house of representatives shall consist of not more than one hundred and eight members. The ratio of representation shall be determined by dividing the whole number of the population of the state as shown by the last preceding state or national census, by the whole number of counties then existing or organized, but each county shall constitute one representative district and be entitled to one representative, but each county having a population in excess of the ratio number, as herein provided of three fifths or more of such ratio number shall be entitled to one additional representative, but said addition shall extend only to the nine counties having the greatest population.

[SEC. 36. The general assembly shall, at the first regular session held following the adoption of this amendment, and at each succeeding regular session held next after the taking of such census, fix the ratio of representation, and apportion the additional representatives, as hereinbefore required.]¹⁸

SEC. 37. When a congressional, senatorial, or representative district shall be composed of two or more counties, it shall not be entirely separated by any county belonging to another district; and no county shall be divided in forming a congressional, senatorial, or representative district.

SEC. 38. In all elections by the General Assembly, the members thereof shall vote viva voce and the votes shall be entered on the journal.

ARTICLE IV.

EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT.

SECTION 1. The Supreme Executive power of this State shall be vested in a Chief Magistrate, who shall be styled the Governor of the State of Iowa.

SEC. 2. The Governor shall be elected by the qualified electors at the time and place of voting for members of the General Assembly, and shall hold his office two years from the time of his installation, and until his successor is elected and qualified.

SEC. 3. There shall be a Lieutenant Governor, who shall hold his office two years, and be elected at the same time as the Governor. In voting for Governor and Lieutenant Governor, the electors shall designate for whom they vote as Governor, and for whom as Lieutenant Governor. The returns of every election for Governor, and Lieutenant Governor, shall be sealed up and transmitted to the seat of government of the State, directed to the Speaker of the House of Representatives, who shall open and publish them in the presence of both Houses of the General Assembly.

SEC. 4. The persons respectively having the highest number of votes for Governor and Lieutenant Governor, shall be declared duly elected; but in case two or more persons shall have an equal and the highest number of votes for either office, the General Assembly shall, by joint vote, forthwith proceed to elect one of said persons Governor, or Lieutenant Governor, as the case may be.

SEC. 5. Contested elections for Governor, or Lieutenant Governor, shall be determined by the General Assembly in such manner as may be prescribed by law.

SEC. 6. No person shall be eligible to the office of Governor, or Lieutenant Governor, who shall not have been a citizen of the United States, and a resident of the State, two years next preceding the election, and attained the age of thirty years at the time of said election.

SEC. 7. The Governor shall be commander in chief of the militia, the army, and navy of this State.

SEC. 8. He shall transact all executive business with the officers of government, civil and military, and may require information in writing from the officers

of the executive department upon any subject relating to the duties of their respective offices.

SEC. 9. He shall take care that the laws are faithfully executed.

SEC. 10. When any office shall, from any cause, become vacant, and no mode is provided by the Constitution and laws for filling such vacancy, the Governor shall have power to fill such vacancy, by granting a commission, which shall expire at the end of the next session of the General Assembly, or at the next election by the people.

SEC. 11. He may, on extraordinary occasions, convene the General Assembly by proclamation, and shall state to both Houses, when assembled, the purpose for which they shall have been convened.

SEC. 12. He shall communicate, by message, to the General Assembly, at every regular session, the condition of the State, and recommend such matters as he shall deem expedient.

SEC. 13. In case of disagreement between the two Houses with respect to the time of adjournment, the Governor shall have power to adjourn the General Assembly to such time as he may think proper; but no such adjournment shall be beyond the time fixed for the regular meeting of the next General Assembly.

SEC. 14. No person shall, while holding any office under the authority of the United States, or this State, execute the office of Governor, or Lieutenant Governor, except as hereinafter expressly provided.

SEC. 15. The official term of the Governor, and Lieutenant Governor, shall commence on the second Monday of January next after their election, and continue for two years, and until their successors are elected and qualified. The Lieutenant Governor, while acting as Governor, shall receive the same pay as provided for Governor; and while presiding in the Senate, shall receive as compensation therefor, the same mileage and double the per diem pay provided for a Senator, and none other.

SEC. 16. The Governor shall have power to grant reprieves, commutations and pardons, after conviction, for all offenses except treason and cases of impeachment, subject to such regulations as may be provided by law. Upon conviction for treason, he shall have power to suspend the execution of the sentence until the case shall be reported to the General Assembly at its next meeting, when the General Assembly shall either grant a pardon, commute the sentence, direct the execution of the sentence, or grant a further reprieve. He shall have power to remit fines and forfeitures, under such regulations as may be prescribed by law; and shall report to the General Assembly, at its next meeting, each case of reprieve, commutation, or pardon granted, and the reason therefor; and also all persons in whose favor remission of fines and forfeitures shall have been made, and the several amounts remitted.

SEC. 17. In case of the death, impeachment, resignation, removal from office, or other disability of the Governor, the powers and duties of the office for the residue of the term, or until he shall be acquitted, or the disability removed, shall devolve upon the Lieutenant Governor.

SEC. 18. The Lieutenant Governor shall be President of the Senate, but shall only vote when the Senate is equally divided; and in case of his absence, or impeachment, or when he shall exercise the office of Governor, the Senate shall choose a President pro tempore.

SEC. 19. If the Lieutenant Governor, while acting as Governor, shall be impeached, displaced, resign, or die, or otherwise become incapable of performing the duties of the office, the President pro tempore of the senate shall act as Governor until the vacancy is filled, or the disability removed; and if the President of the Senate, for any of the above causes, shall be rendered incapable of performing the duties pertaining to the office of Governor, the same shall devolve upon the Speaker of the House of Representatives.

SEC. 20. There shall be a seal of this State, which shall be kept by the Governor, and used by him officially, and shall be called the Great Seal of the State of Iowa.

SEC. 21. All grants and commissions shall be in the name and by the authority of the people of the State of Iowa, sealed with the Great Seal of the State, signed by the Governor, and countersigned by the Secretary of State.

SEC. 22. A Secretary of State, Auditor of State and Treasurer of State, shall be elected by the qualified electors, who shall continue in office two years, and until their successors are elected and qualified; and perform such duties as may be required by law.

ARTICLE V.

JUDICIAL DEPARTMENT.

SECTION 1. The Judicial power shall be vested in a Supreme Court, District Courts, and such other Courts, inferior to the Supreme Court, as the General Assembly may, from time to time, establish.

SEC. 2. The Supreme Court shall consist of three Judges, two of whom shall constitute a quorum to hold Court.

SEC. 3. The Judges of the Supreme Court shall be elected by the qualified electors of the State, and shall hold their Court at such time and place as the General Assembly may prescribe. The Judges of the Supreme Court so elected, shall be classified so that one Judge shall go out of office every two years; and the Judge holding the shortest term of office under such classification, shall be Chief Justice of the Court, during his term, and so on in rotation. After the expiration of their terms of office, under such classification, the term of each Judge of the Supreme Court shall be six years, and until his successor shall have been elected and qualified. The Judges of the Supreme Court shall be ineligible to any other office in the State, during the term for which they shall have been elected.

SEC. 4. The Supreme Court shall have appellate jurisdiction only in cases of chancery, and shall constitute a Court for the correction of errors at law, under such restrictions as the General Assembly may, by law, prescribe; and shall have power to issue all writs and process necessary to secure justice to parties, and exercise a supervisory control over all inferior Judicial tribunals throughout the State.

SEC. 5. The District Court shall consist of a single Judge, who shall be elected by the qualified electors of the District in which he resides. The Judge of the District Court shall hold his office for the term of four years, and until his successor shall have been elected and qualified; and shall be ineligible to any other office, except that of Judge of the Supreme Court, during the term for which he was elected.

SEC. 6. The District Court shall be a court of law and equity, which shall be distinct and separate jurisdictions, and have jurisdiction in civil and criminal matters arising in their respective districts, in such manner as shall be prescribed by law.

SEC. 7. The Judges of the Supreme and District Courts shall be conservators of the peace throughout the State.

SEC. 8. The style of all process shall be, "The State of Iowa", and all prosecutions shall be conducted in the name and by the authority of the same.

SEC. 9. The salary of each Judge of the Supreme Court shall be two thousand dollars per annum; and that of each District Judge, one thousand six hundred dollars per annum, until the year Eighteen hundred and Sixty; after which time they shall severally receive such compensation as the General Assembly may, by law, prescribe; which compensation shall not be increased or diminished during the term for which they shall have been elected.

SEC. 10. *The State shall be divided into eleven Judicial Districts; and after the year Eighteen hundred and sixty, the General Assembly may re-organize the Judicial Districts and increase or diminish the number of Districts, or the number of Judges of the said Court, and may increase the number of Judges of the Supreme Court; but such increase or diminution shall not be more than one District, or one Judge of either Court, at any one session; and no re-organization of the districts, or diminution of the number of Judges, shall have the effect of removing a Judge from office. Such re-organization of the districts, or any change in the boundaries thereof, or increase or diminution of the number of Judges, shall take place every four years thereafter, if necessary, and at no other time.*¹⁹

[At any regular session of the general assembly, the state may be divided into the necessary judicial districts for district court purposes, or the said districts may be reorganized and the number of the districts and the judges of said courts increased or diminished; but no reorganization of the districts or diminution of the judges shall have the effect of removing a judge from office.]²⁰

SEC. 11. The Judges of the Supreme and District Courts shall be chosen at the general election; and the term of office of each Judge shall commence on the first day of January next, after his election.

SEC. 12. The General Assembly shall provide, by law, for the election of an Attorney General by the people, whose term of office shall be two years, and until his successor shall have been elected and qualified.

*Sec. 13. The qualified electors of each judicial district shall, at the time of the election of District Judge, elect a District Attorney, who shall be a resident of the district for which he is elected, and who shall hold his office for the term of four years, and until his successor shall have been elected and qualified.*²¹

[SECTION 13. The qualified electors of each county shall, at the general election in the year 1836, and every two years thereafter elect a county attorney, who shall be a resident of the county for which he is elected, and shall hold his office for two years, and until his successor shall have been elected and qualified.]²²

SEC. 14. It shall be the duty of the General Assembly to provide for the carrying into effect of this article, and to provide for a general system of practice in all the Courts of this State.

[The grand jury may consist of any number of members not less than five, nor more than fifteen, as the general assembly may by law provide, or the general assembly may provide for holding persons to answer for any criminal offense without the intervention of a grand jury.]²³

ARTICLE VI.

MILITIA.

SECTION 1. The militia of this State shall be composed of all able-bodied *white*²⁴ male citizens, between the ages of eighteen and forty five years, except such as are or may hereafter be exempt by the laws of the United States, or of this State, and shall be armed, equipped, and trained, as the General Assembly may provide by law.

SEC. 2. No person or persons conscientiously scrupulous of bearing arms shall be compelled to do military duty in time of peace; provided, that such person or persons shall pay an equivalent for such exemption in the same manner as other citizens.

SEC. 3. All commissioned officers of the militia, (staff officers excepted,) shall be elected by the persons liable to perform military duty, and shall be commissioned by the Governor.

ARTICLE VII.

STATE DEBTS.

SECTION 1. The credit of the State shall not, in any manner, be given or loaned to, or in aid of, any individual, association, or corporation; and the State shall never assume, or become responsible for, the debts or liabilities of any individual, association, or corporation, unless incurred in time of war for the benefit of the State.

SEC. 2. The State may contract debts to supply casual deficits or failures in revenues, or to meet expenses not otherwise provided for; but the aggregate amount of such debts, direct and contingent, whether contracted by virtue of one or more acts of the General Assembly, or at different periods of time, shall

never exceed the sum of two hundred and fifty thousand dollars; and the money arising from the creation of such debts, shall be applied to the purpose for which it was obtained, or to repay the debts so contracted, and to no other purpose whatever.

Sec. 3. All losses to the permanent, School, or University fund of this State, which shall have been occasioned by the defalcation, mismanagement or fraud of the agents or officers controlling and managing the same, shall be audited by the proper authorities of the State. The amount so audited shall be a permanent funded debt against the State, in favor of the respective fund, sustaining the loss, upon which not less than six per cent. annual interest shall be paid. The amount of liability so created shall not be counted as a part of the indebtedness authorized by the second section of this article.

Sec. 4. In addition to the above limited power to contract debts, the State may contract debts to repel invasion, suppress insurrection, or defend the State in war; but the money arising from the debts so contracted shall be applied to the purpose for which it was raised, or to repay such debts, and to no other purpose whatever.

Sec. 5. Except the debts hereinbefore specified in this article, no debt shall be hereafter contracted by, or on behalf of this State, unless such debt shall be authorized by some law for some single work or object, to be distinctly specified therein; and such law shall impose and provide for the collection of a direct annual tax, sufficient to pay the interest on such debt, as it falls due, and also to pay and discharge the principal of such debt, within twenty years from the time of the contracting thereof; but no such law shall take effect until at a general election it shall have been submitted to the people, and have received a majority of all the votes cast for and against it at such election; and all money raised by authority of such law, shall be applied only to the specific object therein stated, or to the payment of the debt created thereby; and such law shall be published in at least one newspaper in each County, if one is published therein, throughout the State, for three months preceding the election at which it is submitted to the people.

Sec. 6. The Legislature may, at any time, after the approval of such law by the people, if no debt shall have been contracted in pursuance thereof, repeal the same; and may, at any time, forbid the contracting of any further debt, or liability, under such law; but the tax imposed by such law, in proportion to the debt or liability, which may have been contracted in pursuance thereof, shall remain in force and be irrevocable, and be annually collected, until the principal and interest are fully paid.

Sec. 7. Every law which imposes, continues, or revives a tax, shall distinctly state the tax, and the object to which it is to be applied; and it shall not be sufficient to refer to any other law to fix such tax or object.

ARTICLE VIII.

CORPORATIONS.

SECTION 1. No corporation shall be created by special laws; but the General Assembly shall provide, by general laws, for the organization of all corporations hereafter to be created, except as hereinafter provided.

Sec. 2. The property of all corporations for pecuniary profit, shall be subject to taxation, the same as that of individuals.

Sec. 3. The State shall not become a stockholder in any corporation, nor shall it assume or pay the debt or liability of any corporation, unless incurred in time of war for the benefit of the State.

Sec. 4. No political or municipal corporation shall become a stockholder in any banking corporation, directly or indirectly.

Sec. 5. No act of the General Assembly, authorizing or creating corporations or associations with banking powers, nor amendments thereto shall take effect, or in any manner be in force, until the same shall have been submitted, separately, to the people, at a general or special election, as provided by law, to be held not less than three months after the passage of the act, and shall have been approved by a majority of all the electors voting for and against it at such election.

SEC. 6. Subject to the provisions of the foregoing section, the General Assembly may also provide for the establishment of a State Bank with branches.

SEC. 7. If a State Bank be established, it shall be founded on an actual specie basis, and the branches shall be mutually responsible for each other's liabilities upon all notes, bills, and other issues intended for circulation as money.

SEC. 8. If a general Banking law shall be enacted, it shall provide for the registry and countersigning, by an officer of State, of all bills, or paper credit designed to circulate as money, and require security to the full amount thereof, to be deposited with the State Treasurer, in United States stocks, or in interest paying stocks of States in good credit and standing, to be rated at ten per cent. below their average value in the City of New York, for the thirty days next preceding their deposit; and in case of a depreciation of any portion of said stocks, to the amount of ten per cent; on the dollar, the bank or banks owning such stock shall be required to make up said deficiency by depositing additional stocks; and said law shall also provide for the recording of the names of all stockholders in such corporations, the amount of stock held by each, the time of any transfer, and to whom.

SEC. 9. Every stockholder in a banking corporation or institution shall be individually responsible and liable to its creditors, over and above the amount of stock by him or her held, to an amount equal to his or her respective shares so held for all of its liabilities, accruing while he or she remains such stockholder.

SEC. 10. In case of the insolvency of any banking institution, the bill-holders shall have a preference over its other creditors.

SEC. 11. The suspension of specie payment by banking institutions shall never be permitted or sanctioned.

SEC. 12. Subject to the provisions of this article, the General Assembly shall have power to amend or repeal all laws for the organization or creation of corporations, or granting of special or exclusive privileges or immunities, by a vote of two thirds of each branch of the General Assembly; and no exclusive privileges, except as in this article provided, shall ever be granted.

ARTICLE IX.

EDUCATION AND SCHOOL LANDS.

1ST. EDUCATION.

SECTION 1. The educational interest of the State, including Common Schools and other educational institutions, shall be under the management of a Board of Education,²⁵ which shall consist of the Lieutenant Governor, who shall be the presiding officer of the Board, and have the casting vote in case of a tie, and one member to be elected from each judicial district in the State.

SEC. 2. No person shall be eligible as a member of said Board who shall not have attained the age of twenty five years, and shall have been one year a citizen of the State.

SEC. 3. One member of said Board shall be chosen by the qualified electors of each district, and shall hold the office for the term of four years, and until his successor is elected and qualified. After the first election under this Constitution, the Board shall be divided, as nearly as practicable, into two equal classes, and the seats of the first class shall be vacated after the expiration of two years; and one half of the Board shall be chosen every two years thereafter.

SEC. 4. The first session of the Board of Education shall be held at the Seat of Government, on the first Monday of December, after their election; after which the General Assembly may fix the time and place of meeting.

SEC. 5. The session of the Board shall be limited to twenty days, and but one session shall be held in any one year, except upon extraordinary occasions, when, upon the recommendation of two thirds of the Board, the Governor may order a special session.

SEC. 6. The Board of Education shall appoint a Secretary, who shall be the executive officer of the Board, and perform such duties as may be imposed upon him by the Board, and the laws of the State. They shall keep a journal of their proceedings, which shall be published and distributed in the same manner as the journals of the General Assembly.

SEC. 7. All rules and regulations made by the Board shall be published and distributed to the several Counties, Townships, and School Districts, as may be provided for by the Board, and when so made, published and distributed, they shall have the force and effect of law.

SEC. 8. The Board of Education shall have full power and authority to legislate and make all needful rules and regulations in relation to Common Schools, and other educational institutions, that are instituted, to receive aid from the School or University fund of this State: but all acts, rules, and regulations of said Board may be altered, amended or repealed by the General Assembly; and when so altered, amended, or repealed they shall not be re-enacted by the Board of Education.

SEC. 9. The Governor of the State shall be, *EX OFFICIO*, a member of said Board.

SEC. 10. The Board shall have no power to levy taxes, or make appropriations of money. Their contingent expenses shall be provided for by the General Assembly.

SEC. 11. The State University shall be established at one place without branches at any other place, and the University fund shall be applied to that Institution and no other.

SEC. 12. The Board of Education shall provide for the education of all the youths of the State, through a system of Common Schools, and such schools shall be organized and kept in each school district at least three months in each year. Any district failing, for two consecutive years, to organize and keep up a school as aforesaid may be deprived of their portion of the school fund.

SEC. 13. The members of the Board of Education shall each receive the same *per diem* during the time of their session, and mileage going to and returning therefrom, as members of the General Assembly.

SEC. 14. A majority of the Board shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business; but no rule, regulation, or law, for the government of Common Schools or other educational institutions, shall pass without the concurrence of a majority of all the members of the Board, which shall be expressed by the yeas and nays on the final passage. The style of all acts of the Board shall be, "Be it enacted by the Board of Education of the State of Iowa."

SEC. 15. At any time after the year One thousand eight hundred and sixty three, the General Assembly shall have power to abolish or re-organize said Board of Education, and provide for the educational interest of the State in any other manner that to them shall seem best and proper.

2ND. SCHOOL FUNDS AND SCHOOL LANDS.

SECTION 1. The educational and school funds and lands, shall be under the control and management of the General Assembly of this State.

SEC. 2. The University lands, and the proceeds thereof, and all monies belonging to said fund shall be a permanent fund for the sole use of the State University. The interest arising from the same shall be annually appropriated for the support and benefit of said University.

SEC. 3. The General Assembly shall encourage, by all suitable means, the promotion of intellectual, scientific, moral, and agricultural improvement. The proceeds of all lands that have been, or hereafter may be, granted by the United States to this State, for the support of schools, which may have been, or shall hereafter be sold, or disposed of, and the five hundred thousand acres of land granted to the new States, under an act of Congress, distributing the proceeds of the public lands among the several States of the Union, approved in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and forty one, and all estates of deceased persons who may have died without leaving a will or heir, and also such per cent. as has been or may hereafter be granted by Congress, on the sale of lands in this State, shall be, and remain a perpetual fund, the interest of which,

together with all rents of the unsold lands, and such other means as the General Assembly may provide, shall be inviolably appropriated to the support of Common schools throughout the State.

SEC. 4. The money which may have been or shall be paid by persons as an equivalent for exemption from military duty, and the clear proceeds of all fines collected in the several Counties for any breach of the penal laws, shall be exclusively applied, in the several Counties in which such money is paid, or fine collected, among the several school districts of said Counties, in proportion to the number of youths subject to enumeration in such districts, to the support of Common Schools, or the establishment of libraries, as the Board of Education shall, from time to time provide.

SEC. 5. The General Assembly shall take measures for the protection, improvement, or other disposition of such lands as have been, or may hereafter be reserved, or granted by the United States, or any person or persons, to this State, for the use of the University, and the funds accruing from the rents or sale of such lands, or from any other source for the purpose aforesaid, shall be, and remain, a permanent fund, the interest of which shall be applied to the support of said University, for the promotion of literature, the arts and sciences, as may be authorized by the terms of such grant. And it shall be the duty of the General Assembly as soon as may be, to provide effectual means for the improvement and permanent security of the funds of said University.

SEC. 6. The financial agents of the school funds shall be the same, that by law, receive and control the State and county revenue for other civil purposes, under such regulations as may be provided by law.

SEC. 7. The money subject to the support and maintenance of common schools shall be distributed to the districts in proportion to the number of youths, between the ages of five and twenty-one years, in such manner as may be provided by the General Assembly.

ARTICLE X.

AMENDMENTS TO THE CONSTITUTION.

SECTION 1. Any amendment or amendments to this Constitution may be proposed in either House of the General Assembly; and if the same shall be agreed to by a majority of the members elected to each of the two Houses, such proposed amendment shall be entered on their journals, with the yeas and nays taken thereon, and referred to the Legislature to be chosen at the next general election, and shall be published, as provided by law, for three months previous to the time of making such choice; and if, in the General Assembly so next chosen as aforesaid, such proposed amendment or amendments shall be agreed to, by a majority of all the members elected to each House, then it shall be the duty of the General Assembly to submit such proposed amendment or amendments to the people, in such manner, and at such time as the General Assembly shall provide; and if the people shall approve and ratify such amendment or amendments, by a majority of the electors qualified to vote for members of the General Assembly, voting thereon, such amendment or amendments shall become a part of the Constitution of this State.

SEC. 2. If two or more amendments shall be submitted at the same time, they shall be submitted in such manner that the electors shall vote for or against each of such amendments separately.

SEC. 3. At the general election to be held in the year one thousand eight hundred and seventy, and in each tenth year thereafter, and also at such times as the General Assembly may, by law, provide, the question, "Shall there be a Convention to revise the Constitution, and amend the same?" shall be decided by the electors qualified to vote for members of the General Assembly; and in case a majority of the electors so qualified, voting at such election, for and against such proposition, shall decide in favor of a Convention for such purpose, the General Assembly, at its next session, shall provide by law for the election of delegates to such Convention.

ARTICLE XI.
MISCELLANEOUS.

SECTION 1. The jurisdiction of Justices of the Peace shall extend to all civil cases, (except cases in chancery, and cases where the question of title to real estate may arise,) where the amount in controversy does not exceed one hundred dollars, and by the consent of parties may be extended to any amount not exceeding three hundred dollars.

SEC. 2. No new County shall be hereafter created containing less than four hundred and thirty-two square miles; nor shall the territory of any organized county be reduced below that area; except the County of Worth, and the counties west of it, along the Northern boundary of this State, may be organized without additional territory.

SEC. 3. No county, or other political or municipal corporation shall be allowed to become indebted in any manner, or for any purpose, to an amount, in the aggregate, exceeding five per centum on the value of the taxable property within such county or corporation—to be ascertained by the last State and county tax lists, previous to the incurring of such indebtedness.

SEC. 4. The boundaries of the State may be enlarged, with the consent of Congress and the General Assembly.

SEC. 5. Every person elected or appointed to any office, shall, before entering upon the duties thereof, take an oath or affirmation to support the Constitution of the United States, and of this State, and also an oath of office.

SEC. 6. In all cases of elections to fill vacancies in office occurring before the expiration of a full term, the person so elected shall hold for the residue of the unexpired term; and all persons appointed to fill vacancies in office, shall hold until the next general election, and until their successors are elected and qualified.

SEC. 7. The General Assembly shall not locate any of the public lands, which have been, or may be granted by Congress to this State, and the location of which may be given to the General Assembly, upon lands actually settled, without the consent of the occupant. The extent of the claim of such occupant, so exempted, shall not exceed three hundred and twenty acres.

SEC. 8. The seat of Government is hereby permanently established, as now fixed by law at the City of Des Moines, in the County of Polk; and the State University, at Iowa City, in the County of Johnson.

ARTICLE XII.

SCHEDULE.

SECTION 1. This Constitution shall be the supreme law of the State, and any law inconsistent therewith, shall be void. The General Assembly shall pass all laws necessary to carry this Constitution into effect.

SEC. 2. All laws now in force and not inconsistent with this Constitution, shall remain in force until they shall expire or be repealed.

SEC. 3. All indictments, prosecutions, suits, pleas, complaints, process, and other proceedings pending in any of the courts, shall be prosecuted to final judgment and execution; and all appeals, writs of error, certiorari, and injunctions, shall be carried on in the several courts, in the same manner as now provided by law; and all offences, misdemeanors, and crimes that may have been committed before the taking effect of this Constitution, shall be subject to indictment, trial and punishment, in the same manner as they would have been, had not this Constitution been made.

SEC. 4. All fines, penalties, or forfeitures due, or to become due, or accruing to the State, or to any County therein, or to the school fund, shall inure to the State, county, or school fund, in the manner prescribed by law.

SEC. 5. All bonds executed to the State, or to any officer in his official capacity, shall remain in force and inure to the use of those concerned.

SEC. 6. The first election under this Constitution shall be held on the second Tuesday in October, in the year One thousand eight hundred and fifty seven, at which time the electors of the State shall elect the Governor and Lieutenant Governor. There shall also be elected at such election, the successors of such State Senators as were elected at the August election, in the year One thousand eight hundred and fifty-four, and members of the House of Representatives, who

shall be elected in accordance with the act of apportionment, enacted at the session of the General Assembly which commenced on the first Monday of December One thousand eight hundred and fifty six.

SEC. 7. The first election for Secretary, Auditor, and Treasurer of State, Attorney General, District Judges, Members of the Board of Education, District Attorneys, members of Congress, and such State officers as shall be elected at the April election, in the year One thousand eight hundred and fifty seven, (except the Superintendent of Public Instruction,) and such county officers as were elected at the August election, in the year One thousand eight hundred and fifty six, except Prosecuting Attorneys, shall be held on the second Tuesday of October, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-eight: PROVIDED, That the time for which any District Judge or other State or County officer elected at the April election in the year One thousand eight hundred and fifty eight, shall not extend beyond the time fixed for filling like offices at the October election in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty eight.

SEC. 8. The first election for Judges of the Supreme Court, and such County officers as shall be elected at the August election, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven, shall be held on the second Tuesday of October, in the year One thousand eight hundred and fifty nine.

SEC. 9. The first regular session of the General Assembly shall be held in the year One thousand eight hundred and fifty-eight, commencing on the second Monday of January of said year.

SEC. 10. Senators elected at the August election, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six, shall continue in office until the second Tuesday of October, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty nine, at which time their successors shall be elected as may be prescribed by law.

SEC. 11. Every person elected by popular vote, by a vote of the General Assembly, or who may hold office by executive appointment, which office is continued by this Constitution, and every person who shall be so elected or appointed, to any such office, before the taking effect of this constitution, (except as in this Constitution otherwise provided,) shall continue in office until the term for which such person has been or may be elected or appointed shall expire: but no such person shall continue in office after the taking effect of this Constitution, for a longer period than the term of such office, in this Constitution prescribed.

SEC. 12. The General Assembly, at the first session under this Constitution, shall district the State into eleven Judicial Districts, for District Court purposes; and shall also provide for the apportionment of the members of the General Assembly, in accordance with the provisions of this Constitution.

SEC. 13. This Constitution shall be submitted to the electors of the State at the August election, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven, in the several election districts in this State. The ballots at such election shall be written or printed as follows: Those in favor of the Constitution, "New Constitution—Yes." Those against the Constitution, "New Constitution—No." The election shall be conducted in the same manner as the general elections of the State, and the poll-books shall be returned and canvassed as provided in the twenty-fifth chapter of the code, and abstracts shall be forwarded to the Secretary of State, which abstracts shall be canvassed in the manner provided for the canvass of State officers. And if it shall appear that a majority of all the votes cast at such election for and against this Constitution are in favor of the same, the Governor shall immediately issue his proclamation stating that fact, and such Constitution shall be the Constitution of the State of Iowa, and shall take effect from and after the publication of said proclamation.

SEC. 14. At the same election that this Constitution is submitted to the people for its adoption or rejection, a proposition to amend the same by striking out the word "white" from the article on the Right of Suffrage, shall be separately submitted to the electors of this State for adoption or rejection in the manner following—Namely: A separate ballot may be given by every person having a right to vote at said election, to be deposited in a separate box; and those given for the adoption of such proposition shall have the words, "Shall the word 'White' be stricken out of the Article on the Right of Suffrage? Yes." And those given against the proposition shall have the words, "Shall the word 'White'

be stricken out of the Article on the Right of Suffrage? No." And if at said election the number of ballots cast in favor of said proposition shall be equal to a majority of those cast for and against this Constitution, then said word "White" shall be stricken from said Article and be no part thereof.²⁶

SEC. 15. Until otherwise directed by law, the County of Mills shall be in and a part of the sixth Judicial District of this State.

[SEC. 16. The first general election after the adoption of this amendment shall be held on the Tuesday next after the first Monday in November in the year one thousand nine hundred and six, and general elections shall be held biennially thereafter. In the year one thousand nine hundred and six there shall be elected a governor, lieutenant-governor, secretary of state, auditor of state, treasurer of state, attorney general, two judges of the supreme court, the successors of the judges of the district court whose terms of office expire on December 31st, one thousand nine hundred and six, state senators who would otherwise be chosen in the year one thousand nine hundred and five, and members of the house of representatives. The terms of office of the judges of the supreme court which would otherwise expire on December 31st, in odd numbered years, and all other elective state, county and township officers whose terms of office would otherwise expire in January in the year one thousand nine hundred and six, and members of the general assembly whose successors would otherwise be chosen at the general election in the year one thousand nine hundred and five, are hereby extended one year and until their successors are elected and qualified. The terms of offices of senators whose successors would otherwise be chosen in the year one thousand nine hundred and seven are hereby extended one year and until their successors are elected and qualified. The general assembly shall make such changes in the law governing the time of election and term of office of all other elective officers as shall be necessary to make the time of their election and terms of office conform to this amendment, and shall provide which of the judges of the supreme court shall serve as chief justice. The general assembly shall meet in regular session on the second Monday in January, in the year one thousand nine hundred and six, and also on the second Monday in January in the year one thousand nine hundred and seven, and biennially thereafter.]²⁷

Done in Convention at Iowa City, this fifth day of March in the year of our Lord One thousand eight hundred and fifty seven, and of the Independence of the United States of America, the eighty first.

AMENDMENTS TO THE CONSTITUTION OF IOWA 1857-1937

AMENDMENTS OF 1868²⁸

- 1st. Strike the word "white" from section one of article two thereof.
- 2d. Strike the word "white" from section thirty-three of article three thereof.
- 3d. Strike the word "white" from section thirty-four of article three thereof.
- 4th. Strike the word "white" from section thirty-five of article three thereof.
- 5th. Strike the word "white" from section one of article six thereof.

AMENDMENT OF 1880²⁹

Strike out the words "free white" from the third line of section four (4) of article three (3) of said constitution, relating to the legislative department.

AMENDMENT OF 1882³⁰

Add as section 26 to article I of said constitution the following: Section 26. No person shall manufacture for sale, or sell, or keep for sale, as a beverage any intoxicating liquors whatever, including ale, wine and beer. The general assembly shall by law prescribe regulations for the enforcement of the prohibition herein contained, and shall thereby provide suitable penalties for the violation of the provisions hereof.

AMENDMENTS OF 1884³¹

Amendment 1. The general election for state, district county and township officers shall be held on the Tuesday next after the first Monday in November.

Amendment 2. At any regular session of the general assembly, the state may be divided into the necessary judicial districts for district court purposes, or the said districts may be reorganized and the number of the districts and the judges of said courts increased or diminished; but no reorganization of the districts or diminution of the judges shall have the effect of removing a judge from office.

Amendment 3. The grand jury may consist of any number of members not less than five, nor more than fifteen, as the general assembly may by law provide, or the general assembly may provide for holding persons to answer for any criminal offense without the intervention of a grand jury.

Amendment 4. That section 13 of article 5 of the constitution be stricken therefrom, and the following adopted as such section.

SECTION 13. The qualified electors of each county shall, at the general election in the year 1886, and every two years thereafter elect a county attorney, who shall be a resident of the county for which he is elected, and shall hold his office for two years, and until his successor shall have been elected and qualified.

AMENDMENTS OF 1904³²

Add as section 16, to article XII of the constitution, the following:

SEC. 16. The first general election after the adoption of this amendment shall be held on the Tuesday next after the first Monday in November in the year one

That sections thirty-four (34) thirty-five (35) and thirty-six (36) of article three (3) of the constitution of the state of Iowa, be repealed and the following be adopted in lieu thereof:

SECTION 34. The senate shall be composed of fifty members to be elected from the several senatorial districts, established by law and at the next session of the general assembly held following the taking of the state and national census, they shall be apportioned among the several counties or districts of the state, according to population as shown by the last preceding census.

SEC. 35. The house of representatives shall consist of not more than one hundred and eight members. The ratio of representation shall be determined by dividing the whole number of the population of the state as shown by the last preceding state or national census, by the whole number of counties then existing or organized, but each county shall constitute one representative district and be entitled to one representative, but each county having a population in excess of the ratio number, as herein provided of three fifths or more of such ratio number shall be entitled to one additional representative, but said addition shall extend only to the nine counties having the greatest population.

SEC. 36. The general assembly shall, at the first regular session held following the adoption of this amendment, and at each succeeding regular session held next after the taking of such census, fix the ratio of representation, and apportion the additional representatives, as hereinbefore required.

AMENDMENT OF 1908³³

That there be added to section eighteen (18) of article one (1) of the constitution of the state of Iowa, the following:

"The general assembly, however, may pass laws permitting the owners of lands to construct drains, ditches, and levees for agricultural, sanitary or mining purposes across the lands of others, and provide for the organization of drainage districts, vest the proper authorities with power to construct and maintain levees, drains and ditches and to keep in repair all drains, ditches, and levees heretofore constructed under the laws of the state, by special assessments upon the property benefited thereby. The General Assembly may provide by law for the condemna-

tion of such real estate as shall be necessary for the construction and maintenance of such drains, ditches and levees, and prescribe the method of making such condemnation."

AMENDMENT OF 1916⁸⁴

To repeal section (7) of article two (2) of the constitution of Iowa and to adopt in lieu thereof the following, to wit:

"The general election for state, district, county and township officers in the year 1916 shall be held in the same month and on the same day as that fixed by the laws of the United States for the election of presidential electors, or of president and vice-president of the United States; and thereafter such election shall be held at such time as the general assembly may by law provide."

AMENDMENT OF 1926⁸⁵

Strike out the word "male" from section four (4) of article three (3) of said constitution, relating to the legislative department.

AMENDMENT OF 1928⁸⁶

That the period (.) at the end of said section thirty-four (34) of article three (3) of the constitution of the state of Iowa be stricken and the following inserted: " , but no county shall be entitled to more than one (1) senator."

AMENDMENT OF 1936⁸⁷

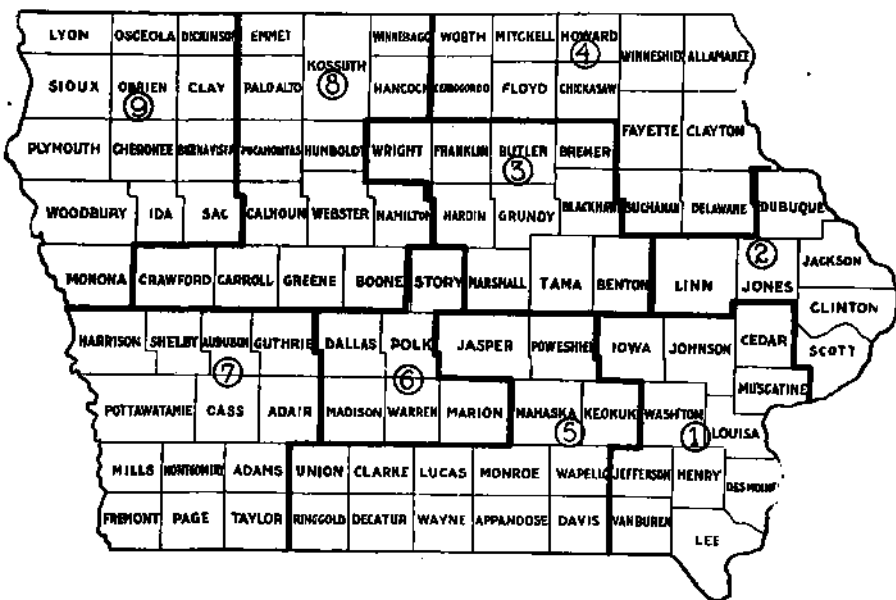
Amend article three (III) by repealing section thirty-three (33) relating to the state census.

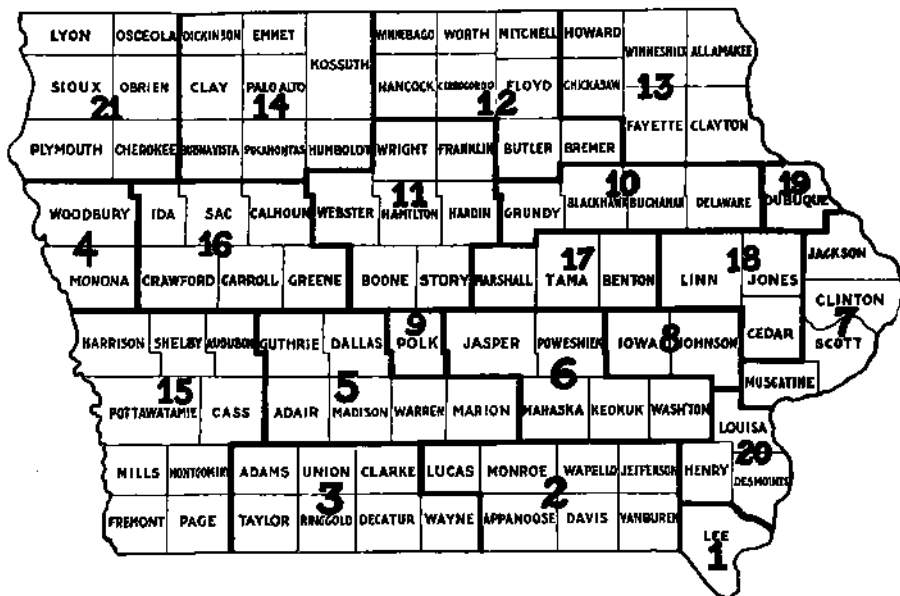
