We appreciated visiting with Lieutenant Governor Jo Ann Zimmerman, Representative Don Avenson, Senator Bill Hutchins, Senator Cal Hultman, Representative Del Stromer, and Representative Dorothy Carpenter during the legislative session about the idea of having Iowa sponsor the First Midwest Conference on Children and Youth. In our discussions, we talked about the conference being held in late August, 1988. Because of the current time frame, we highly recommend that the conference be held in August of next year. It will be very difficult to raise adequate funds, enlist support of other states, combine other conferences with this one, and engage nationally recognized speakers with such late notice.

As we discussed, the Southeast has held such a conference for seven years with much success. Each year a state in the Southeast is responsible for sponsoring the conference with assistance from NCSL, NGA, and other national organizations. The Northeast held its first conference on children this year.

Iowa would be the first state in the Midwest to sponsor a legislative conference on children and youth. Other states would be encouraged to sponsor future conferences; Missouri has expressed an interest in sponsoring the conference next.

To accomplish this goal, the Legislative Council would need to approve the concept and provide seed money of approximately \$25,000.

We have also spoken with the Directors of the Departments of Human Services and Public Health.

In our discussions, the following ideas have been generated:

Funding:

Pay for start up costs with:

- 1. Legislative Council funding,
- 2. National Council of State Government funds,

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- 3. Government Department and/or private donations,
- 4. Staffing from the Lieutenant Governor's Office.

Coordination:

- 1. All pertinent state agencies should assist in planning and funding.
- 2. Make efforts to combine other conferences with this one.

Alternatives:

Attempt to interest the Midwest National Council of State Governments to hold a Midwest Children's Conference.

Attached is a draft budget, concept paper, and time lines.

We hope the Legislative Council will discuss this matter in the near future and give us direction. We are pleased with the enthusiasm that's been expressed regarding Iowa hosting a conference on children.

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EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Proposal for the Evaluation and Development of Statewide Private Fund Attraction for Public Education in Iowa

PURPOSE:

The purpose of this proposal is to provide state government, the lowa educational community and the private sector with the requisite information on the environment for state-wide private fund attraction for public education in lowa and to implement the necessary strategies to affect successful outcomes.

BACKGROUND:

The Iowa Legislature has been in the process of reforming the public education system for the past few years. Current initiatives include studies of the implementation of mandated school standards, assessment of vocational training systems, implementation of a new school funding formula and the like. What has not been addressed in its entirety is the involvement of the private sector, particularly major corporations, and the significant contributions of both funds and public focus that they can provide.

The Iowa Legislature has shown leadership in this area through the creation of the FINE Foundation (First In the Nation in Education) in 1985. However, history has shown that educational foundation entities have the greatest chance for success when they provide opportunity for the private sector to be involved in direct impact on students as opposed to only educational research or the building of endowment for some unknown future need.

This proposal seeks to determine the potential for private funding for a variety of educational needs congruent with those of state government; the organizational and operational structure necessary to maximize giving; the appropriateness of and strategies for utilizing existing structures such as FINE to implement such a broad based program and the talents and influences of private sector participants necessary for ultimate success

PROPOSAL:

While all factors in the foundation development process are difficult to predict, certain steps are essential. For this reason, this proposal is divided into two distinct phases. Phase I covers the analysis and evaluation necessary to provide state government, the Iowa educational community and the private sector with information on which to base future actions.

Phase II involves the implementation of recommendations from Phase I as well as the direct attraction of funds to help state government to implement appropriate parts of its long range educational agenda.

It is proposed that public funding through the Iowa Legislature be used for Phase I as its <u>total</u> financial commitment to the process and to ensure that adopted legislative goals become a central focus of the foundation effort.

Funding for Phase II can and should come from the private sector including any associated development and administrative costs.

PHASE I

Program Elements:

- 1. Evaluation of other statewide educational foundation models.
- 2. Analysis of current structures in Iowa (including FINE)
- 3. Survey and analysis of donor base
- 4. Private/public sector coalition development and enhancement.
- 5. Development of a "Strategic Blueprint" (long-range plan) - for private fund attraction.
- 6. The attraction of private funds for the implementation of Phase II.

Products:

- Interim report to the Iowa Legislation on existing structures (including FINE) with recommendations as to any necessary changes in organization, legal authority, composition, mission or direction (after 90 days).
- Potential donor list of corporations and other organizations willing to support various types of projects and programs.
- 3. Final report to the Iowa Legislature, the educational community and private sector participants covereing the "Strategic Blueprint" (item 5 above) as well as other recommendations for next steps.

COST: Consultant fees and all required expenses.....\$63,700.00

PHASE II

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Based on the outcomes of Phase I, some or all of the following actions may be indicated.

Possible Program Elements:

- 1. Implement organizational model
- 2. New legal documentation (if necessary)
- 3. Recruit new or additional foundation trustees
- 4. Implement marketing plan
- 5. Direct solicitation of funds
- 6. Train staff and volunteers (where necessary) >
- 7. Regular reports and updates to the Iowa Legislature on progress and next steps.

Products:

- 1. A foundation process for public education in lowa focused on state wide needs, structured for Maximum private sector involvement and organized for perpetual success
- 2. Private funding for a variety of state wide educational needs.

COSTS: To be provided by the private sector
