## **RULES**

### **IOWA LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL**

1997-1998

1. Thirteen members shall constitute a quorum.
2. At least thirteen affirmative votes are required for final action on any motion except a motion to recess or adjourn.
3. A substitute motion may be offered in lieu of a pending motion at any time unless the question has been called on the pending motion. A substitute motion takes precedence over any pending amendment to the original motion and, if adopted, disposes of the original motion and any pending amendments to the original motion.
4. Whenever Mason's Manual of Legislative Procedure does not conflict with the rules specifically adopted by the Council, Mason's Manual of Legislative Procedure shall govern the deliberations of the Council.
5. Meetings shall be set by motion before adjournment, or by call of the Council Chairperson with the approval of the Vice Chairperson if meetings are necessary before the date set in the motion.
6. Rules may be changed by a majority vote of the Council as provided in Rule 2.
7. The Council upon its motion may create committees in addition to those provided by statute to carry out its duties and shall designate the members of those committees. The committees shall include members of both political parties. The actions of the committees shall be reported to the Council at each meeting.
8. The Speaker of the House, Majority Leader of the Senate, and Minority Leaders of the Senate and House of Representatives shall appoint the members of their respective caucuses to interim study committees created by the Legislative Council or by statute or resolution.
9. If the appointing authority for members of permanent legislative committees, committees created under rule 7, statutory bodies, and other bodies is the Legislative Council, the Speaker of the House, Majority Leader of the Senate, and the Minority Leaders of the Senate and House of Representatives, shall make the appointment or appointments.

## LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL RESOLUTION

A Legislative Council Resolution relating to Capitol renovation projects and Capitol space usage and providing that jurisdiction over these issues is delegated to the Capital Projects Committee of the Legislative Council.

WHEREAS, the Legislative Council, pursuant to Code section 2.43, is granted authority to assign the use of areas in the Capitol except for areas used by the Governor and the Courts as of January 1, 1986; and

WHEREAS, the Legislative Council is also statutorily empowered to authorize the renovation, remodeling, and preparation of the physical facilities used or to be used by the General Assembly or legislative agencies; and

WHEREAS, the Legislative Council is to consult with the Director of the Department of General Services and the Capitol Planning Commission, but is not bound by any decision of the Director with respect to the duties of the Legislative Council pursuant to Code section 2.43; and

WHEREAS, the Legislative Council, at the Council's discretion, may direct the Director of the Department of General Services or other state employees to carry out the Council's directives in regard to the physical facilities of the General Assembly, or may employ other personnel to carry out such functions; and

WHEREAS, the Legislative Capital Projects Committee of the Legislative Council, pursuant to Code section 2.47A, is to receive the recommendations of the Governor regarding the funding and priorities of proposed capital projects pursuant to Code section 8.3A; receive the reports of all capital project budgeting requests of all state agencies pursuant to Code section 8.6, subsection 13; receive the five-year capital project priority plan for all state agencies pursuant to Code section 8.6, subsection 14; receive annual status reports for all ongoing capital projects of state agencies pursuant to Code section 18.12, subsection 15; and examine and evaluate, on a continuing

basis, the state's system of contracting and subcontracting in regard to capital projects; and

WHEREAS, renovation of the Capitol's exterior greatly affects the usage of interior space occupied by legislative employees during exterior renovation and therefore affects decisions which are vested statutorily with the Legislative Council; NOW THEREFORE,

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL, That the Legislative Capital Projects Committee of the Legislative Council is delegated jurisdiction over issues concerning Capitol space usage and Capitol renovation, and is charged by the Legislative Council as the Committee responsible for providing legislative comment and recommendations regarding such issues to the Legislative Council and the Department of General Services; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Director of the Department of General Services contact a Capital Projects Work Group, consisting of the Chairperson and Vice Chairperson of the Capital Projects Committee and a designee of the Minority Leader of the Senate and a designee of the Minority Leader of the House of Representatives, as soon as possible regarding current progress on interior and exterior renovation of the Capitol and Old Historical Building and provide additional reports regarding such work as agreed to between the Director and the Capital Projects Work Group; and that the Director consult with the Capital Projects Work Group regarding any new contractual commitments prior to entering into such contracts or encumbering any funding related to such contracts. The Capital Projects Work Group shall report to the Capital Projects Committee.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Capital Projects Work Group is authorized to negotiate the retention of a consultant to assist in the planning for Capitol space usage. Final approval of any consultant contract and related expenditures shall be made pursuant to Code section 2.12 by the Chairperson and Vice Chairperson of the Legislative Council.

## JUDICIAL DEPARTMENT PLANNING PROPOSAL

Under the authority granted to the Legislative Council in Code section 2.43 for preparation and use of facilities by the General Assembly and its agencies, I move to authorize an immediate expenditure of up to \$150,000 pursuant to Code section 2.12 for a study to assess the use of areas in the State Capitol by the legislative branch. The study shall include planning for the relocation of the judicial department's offices out of the State Capitol. If moneys become available to the judicial department for all or a portion of the study, the judicial department shall reimburse the General Assembly for moneys expended pursuant to section 2.12.

If the costs of the study to assess the use of areas in the State Capitol by the legislative branch, including planning for the relocation of the judicial department's offices out of the Capitol, exceed moneys otherwise available to the General Assembly or the judicial department, I move to authorize an expenditure pursuant to Code section 2.12 to cover the excess costs of the study, not to exceed \$100,000, which amount may be determined by the chair and vice chair of the Legislative Council in consultation with the minority leaders of the Senate and the House of Representatives, upon the recommendation of the chair and vice chair of the Capital Projects Committee.

# **REPORT OF THE SERVICE COMMITTEE OF THE LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL**

**May 21, 1997**

The Service Committee of the Legislative Council met on May 21, 1997, and makes the following report and recommendations to the Legislative Council:

1. The Service Committee received and filed the February 1997 and May 1997 reports of the Computer User Policy Direction Committee and makes the following recommendations:

a. That the Computer Support Bureau continue to create, maintain, and store nonpartisan information about the Iowa General Assembly on the Iowa General Assembly's home page on the Internet.

b. That the Computer Support Bureau not create, maintain, or store an Internet home page for a member of the Iowa General Assembly and that the Computer Support Bureau shall, on a six-month trial basis, store home pages for each of the four legislative caucuses on the Iowa General Assembly's Internet home page.

c. That the Computer Support Bureau provide a notification on each link from the Iowa General Assembly's state-supported home page to another Internet site, including links to home pages of members of the General Assembly, that the user is leaving the Iowa General Assembly's state-supported home page and that the legislative branch has no responsibility for the content and opinions expressed in the linked home pages.

d. That the Service Committee recommends to the Legislative Council that the Council approve the following electronic links from the Internet site on the Iowa General Assembly's Internet server to home pages hosted on other Internet servers:

- Any Iowa General Assembly member's official home page.
- Any central nonpartisan legislative staff agency's official home page.
- The official home page of any elected member of Congress from Iowa.
- The official home page of either house of Congress.
- The official home page of the President of the United States.
- The official home page of any major political party in Iowa.
- The official home page of any major national political party.
- The official home page of the State of Iowa.
- The official home page of any official state government library in Iowa.



- The official home page of any educational or nonprofit organization holding a copyright over information made available on the Iowa General Assembly's Internet site.
- Any official site of the United States Library of Congress (such as Thomas).
- The official home page of any national or regional government organization of which the Iowa General Assembly is a member or to which the State of Iowa pays dues or a membership assessment on behalf of the legislative branch.

In addition, the Service Committee recommends that any additional links from those listed in this paragraph shall be approved by the Chair and Vice Chair of the Legislative Council and the Minority Leaders of the Senate and House of Representatives.

e. That the Director of the Legislative Computer Support Bureau develop a mission statement for the Bureau and provide copies of the mission statement to the members of the Service Committee at least 10 days prior to the June 1997 meeting of the Service Committee.

f. That decisions regarding the software, training, and support for the laptop computers in the possession of the members of the Senate and the House of Representatives be made by the Senate Rules and Administration Committee and the House of Representatives Administration and Rules Committee.

g. That the Service Committee received a report from the Computer User Policy Direction Committee approving the Computer Support Bureau's acquisition of printers and scanning stations from moneys received as payment for various electronic or printed copies of the Code of Iowa.

2. The Service Committee reviewed proposed changes to portions of the Personnel Guidelines for the Central Legislative Staff Agencies and referred further consideration of the proposed changes to a subcommittee of the whole Committee.

3. The Service Committee received and filed the personnel reports from the Legislative Fiscal Bureau, Legislative Service Bureau, Computer Support Bureau, and the Office of Citizens' Aide/Ombudsman.

# **GUIDELINES FOR INTERIM STUDY COMMITTEES**

## **1997 - 1998 INTERIMS**

(Adopted by Legislative Council on May 21, 1997)

### **ADOPTION OF RULES**

Interim study committees must have a majority of the members representing each house voting affirmatively in order to adopt rules.

### **COMPENSATION OF PUBLIC MEMBERS**

Persons serving as public members of study committees are eligible to receive actual expenses only, if they are not eligible for expense reimbursement by an organization that they represent.

### **STAFF WORK FOR PUBLIC MEMBERS**

After consultation with, as appropriate, the Legislative Service Bureau (LSB) or Legislative Fiscal Bureau (LFB) Director, a study committee chair may authorize research or legislative drafting work by the LSB or LFB for public members of study committees.

### **APPROVAL OF NOMINEES**

Public members of study committees may be nominated by designated organizations, subject to Legislative Council approval or subject to the approval of the chair and vice chair of the Legislative Council and the minority leaders of the Senate and House of Representatives.

### **GENDER BALANCE**

Appointment of public members to study committees shall be gender balanced.

### **VOTING BY PUBLIC MEMBERS**

Unless otherwise provided by the General Assembly or the Legislative Council, public members of study committees are nonvoting.

## APPROVAL OF MEETINGS OUTSIDE DES MOINES

Any meeting or public hearing by a study committee held outside of Des Moines requires the prior approval of the Studies Committee or legislative leadership.

## PUBLIC HEARINGS

When authorization is given for a study committee to hold a public hearing, the committee may hold one hearing as a body or individual members may each hold a public hearing or groups of two or more members may hold public hearings. However, for each authorized public hearing, no members of the study committee may receive compensation for attendance at more than one session.

## APPROVAL OF EXPENSES FOR SPEAKERS AND CONSULTING WORK

Any expenditure by a study committee for a speaker or presentation requires the prior approval of the Studies Committee and Legislative Council, or legislative leadership. Contractual consulting work for a study committee requires the prior approval of the Studies Committee and the Legislative Council.

## SCHEDULING GUIDELINES

If the Legislative Council adopts deadlines for meeting dates of an interim study committee, the interim study committee must meet those deadlines or receive an exemption or a revised deadline date from the Legislative Council.

### ADOPTION OF RULES

Persons serving as public members of study committees are eligible to receive actual expenses only, if they are not eligible for expense reimbursement by an organization that they represent.

### STAFF WORK FOR PUBLIC MEMBERS

After consultation with, as appropriate, the Legislative Service Bureau (LSB) or Legislative Fiscal Bureau (LFB) Director, a study committee chair may authorize research or legislative drafting work by the LSB or LFB for public members of study committees.

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Public members of study committees may be nominated by designated organizations, subject to Legislative Council approval or subject to the approval of the chair and vice chair of the Legislative Council and the minority leaders of the Senate and House of Representatives.

### GENDER BALANCE

Appointment of public members to study committees shall be gender balanced.

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Any meeting or public hearing by a study committee held outside of Des Moines requires the prior approval of the Studies Committee or legislative leadership.

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## APPROVAL OF EXPENSES FOR SPEAKERS AND CONSULTING WORK

Any expenditure by a study committee for a speaker or presentation ~~or for contractual consulting work~~ requires the prior approval of the Studies Committee and Legislative Council or legislative leadership. Contractual consulting work for a study committee requires the prior approval of the Studies Committee and the Legislative Council.

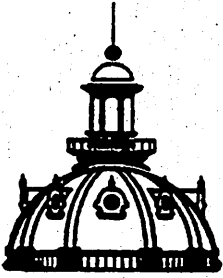
**RE: MAY LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL MEETING**

# SESSION SUMMARY

## 77TH IOWA GENERAL ASSEMBLY • 1997 SESSION

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### Taxes, Business, Crime, Youth Major Issues

Tax policy, business regulation, penalties for crimes, and issues affecting children and youth were among the more frequently addressed subjects in significant legislation passed during the 1997 Session of the 77th General Assembly, which adjourned April 29.

This year's Legislature passed and sent to the Governor a total of 217 bills. In addition, two joint resolutions proposing amendments to the Iowa Constitution were passed. Both amendments will be submitted to the voters in the November 1998 general election. Bills passed by the Legislature must be signed by the Governor in order to become law.

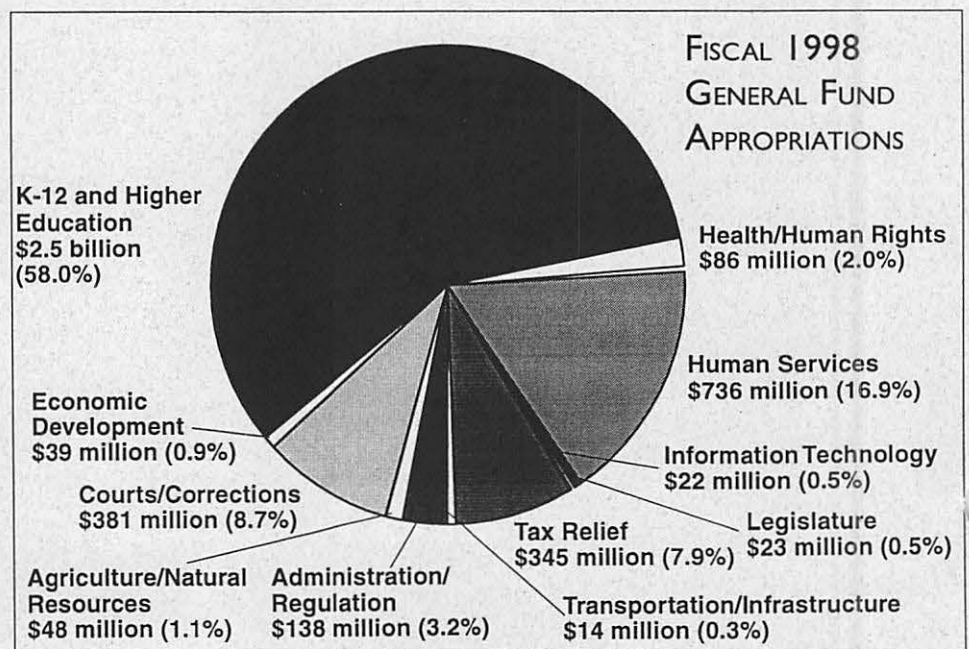

# Legislature appropriates \$4.363 billion for fiscal 1998

The 1997 Session of the Iowa Legislature passed 18 different bills containing significant appropriations of state funds.

The bills authorize spending for state government expenses for the 1997-1998 fiscal year (and for subsequent years, in some cases). They also contain modifications to annual appropriations found in the Iowa Code, and related law changes.

In all, this year's Legislature appropriated \$4.363 billion from the state's general fund. The chart at right shows the total amount appropriated in each of the several budgeting areas and the percentage of the total. Data for the chart was supplied by the Legislative Fiscal Bureau.

## JUDICIAL DEPARTMENT PLANNING PROPOSAL

Under the authority granted to the Legislative Council in Code section 2.43 for preparation and use of facilities by the General Assembly and its agencies, I move to authorize an immediate expenditure of up to \$150,000 pursuant to Code section 2.12 for a study to assess the use of areas in the State Capitol by the legislative branch. The study shall include planning for the relocation of the judicial department's offices out of the State Capitol. If moneys become available to the judicial department for all or a portion of the study, the judicial department shall reimburse the General Assembly for moneys expended pursuant to section 2.12.

If the costs of the study to assess the use of areas in the State Capitol by the legislative branch, including planning for the relocation of the judicial department's offices out of the Capitol, exceed moneys otherwise available to the General Assembly or the judicial department, I move to authorize an expenditure pursuant to Code section 2.12 to cover the excess costs of the study, not to exceed \$100,000, which amount may be determined by the chair and vice chair of the Legislative Council in consultation with the minority leaders of the Senate and the House of Representatives, upon the recommendation of the chair and vice chair of the Capital Projects Committee.

**RE: MEETING OF LEGISLATIVE STAFF TO DISCUSS PROPOSED PERSONNEL GUIDELINES**

On January 9, 1997, representatives from partisan legislative staffs, chamber administrative staffs, and central legislative staffs met with Grant Dugdale from the Attorney General's Office, to discuss proposed changes to the personnel guidelines for legislative staff. Mr. Dugdale outlined the following major issues to be considered by the members of the General Assembly:

1. Employment status of legislative employees (at will or just cause). The current personnel guidelines are not clear about the status.
2. Changes to the provisions relating to unpaid sick leave so that the policy is consistent with the federal Americans with Disabilities Act.
3. The process by which grievances of employees are resolved and the extent to which members of the General Assembly are involved.

The staff members present asked questions of Mr. Dugdale and expressed comments about the differences between employees employed on an at will basis and those employed on a just cause basis.

The staff members present asked Mr. Dugdale to develop a schematic outline of the major substantive and procedural components for each of the two types of employment. The schematic could be used as members of the Legislative Council and of the rules committees of the Senate and House determine the policy for the personnel guidelines. It was also noted that an employing agency might have both types of employees on staff. The staff members asked that Mr. Dugdale, working with representatives of the Legislative Service Bureau, complete work on the schematic and meet with the staff members on Friday, January 31.

The Legislative Service Bureau agreed to ask the National Conference of State Legislatures about the employment status of employees in other state legislatures.

**RE:** Renumbering and Reformatting the Iowa Court Rules -- Update

The joint project between the Iowa Supreme Court and the Legislative Service Bureau to consider renumbering and reformatting the Iowa Court Rules to provide a more computer and user friendly format is progressing. On December 5, 1996, the Iowa Supreme Court issued an order concluding that the rules should be renumbered and reformatted with assistance from the Legislative Service Bureau. The Court decided that the rules should be organized by major subject areas with uniquely numbered chapters and rules. The Court authorized the Legislative Service Bureau to prepare and submit proposed changes to the rules to the Court for final review and consideration.

Now that the legislative session has concluded, progress on preparing a final version of the newly numbered and formatted rules can proceed in earnest. The Court has already been provided a preliminary version of the renumbered and reformatted rules which formed the basis for the Court's December 5, 1996 order. Since the Court is also considering substantive changes to the Iowa Rules of Civil Procedure this summer, the hope is that the renumbering project can be finalized in conjunction with the Court's decision on the substantive changes to the civil procedure rules. The Legislative Service Bureau included in its budget for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1997, funding for publishing the revised Iowa Court Rules.

**RE:** COURT RULES

Iowa Code section 602.4202 requires the Supreme Court to submit rules or forms prescribed by the Supreme Court under section 602.4201, or other authority, to the Legislative Council. Those rules submitted to the Legislative Council take effect 60 days after submission to the Legislative Council or at a later date specified by the Supreme Court unless the Legislative Council within 60 days after submission, and by a majority vote of its members, delays the effective date of the rule or form.

During the period since the last Legislative Council meeting on November 20, 1996, 2 sets of rules changes were submitted to the Legislative Council. Under Code section 602.4202, copies of the rules changes were also sent to the chairs and ranking members of the Senate and House of Representatives Committees on Judiciary. Since more than 60 days have elapsed since the sets of rules changes were submitted, the rules changes have taken effect. Copies of the rules changes are attached to this memorandum.

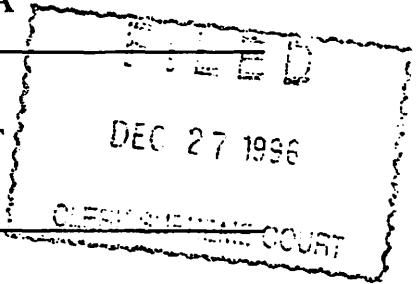

**PROCEEDINGS FOR JUDICIAL WAIVER OF PARENTAL  
NOTIFICATION UNDER IOWA CODE SECTION 135L.4**

**Rule 5. General principles.**

(a) These rules shall be interpreted to provide expeditious and confidential proceedings in accordance with Iowa Code chapter 135L.

(b) All references in these rules to the clerk shall include the clerk's designee.

**Rule 5.1 Petition for waiver.**

(a) A minor who seeks waiver of parental notification prior to obtaining an abortion, or following an emergency abortion under Iowa Code section 135L.6, shall petition the court in a manner substantially complying with the forms attached to these rules.

(b) The form petition shall be available at the offices of all clerks of court.

(c) The clerk shall assist the minor in completing the petition.

(d) The clerk shall present the completed petition to the court immediately upon filing but not later than the end of the following business day.

(e) The petition shall state whether a similar petition has previously been presented to and refused by any court.

**Rule 5.2 Advisory notice to minor.**

(a) Upon the filing of any petition for waiver of parental notification, the clerk shall provide the minor a copy of the Advisory Notice to Minor attached to these rules.

(b) The clerk shall document in the court file that a copy of the advisory notice has been provided to the minor.

**Rule 5.3 Scheduling.**

A hearing on a petition to waive parental notification shall be held without delay, but in any event, not later than ten calendar days from the filing of the petition unless good cause to the contrary is shown.

**Rule 5.4 Notice of hearing.**

If the court determines that a guardian ad litem and/or an attorney for the minor should be appointed in accordance with Iowa Code section 135L.4(3)(b), notice to said person(s) shall be given not less than five days before the time fixed



for a hearing, unless the time is reduced or extended by the court for good cause shown. Notice, if required, shall be served upon the following: the guardian ad litem of the minor, legal counsel for the minor, and persons designated by the minor to receive notice, which service may be by acceptance of service. The only notice to be provided to the minor shall be by the minor making inquiry of the clerk of court following the entry of the order scheduling the hearing. Notice shall be provided by the clerk only to those above-named persons and to no other persons. Notice shall also be provided to the juvenile court case scheduler or case coordinator.

**Rule 5.5 Standard of evidence.**

The minor shall have the burden of providing the allegations by a preponderance of the evidence.

**Rule 5.6 Record required.**

In accordance with Iowa Code section 624.9, stenographic notes or electronic recordings shall be taken of all hearings held pursuant to Iowa Code chapter 135L and said record shall not be waived.

**Rule 5.7 Order granting or denying petition.**

An order either granting or denying waiver of parental notification shall be filed immediately following the hearing but not later than the end of the next business day. The order shall specify the persons to whom the clerk shall provide a copy of the order granting or denying relief. The court shall inquire of the minor at the conclusion of the hearing the method by which she desires to receive notification of the court's decision. Notice of the court's decision shall be provided to the minor by the method designated by her. A copy of the order shall also be available to the minor at the clerk's office.

## AGRICULTURE

### ANHYDROUS AMMONIA

Regulates anhydrous ammonia by prohibiting tampering with related equipment and the unauthorized possession and transportation of containers and receptacles used to store anhydrous ammonia. Provides a civil penalty for violating the prohibitions related to anhydrous ammonia. **SF 2082**

**Effective: 2/19/98**

### ANIMAL FEEDING OPERATIONS

Prohibits a county from adopting or enforcing county legislation regulating a condition or activity occurring on land used for production, care, feeding, or housing of animals unless the regulation is expressly authorized under state law. Prohibits the issuance of permits to certain persons or confinement feeding operations classified as a habitual violator. Defines the adjacency of two or more confinement feeding operations and when an animal feeding operation structure is constructed. Amends provisions of the Code relating to habitual violators and pending actions. Amends the animal feeding operations nuisance provisions in the Code. Amends provisions in the 1995 Iowa Acts relating to the animal agriculture consulting organization and indemnity fees for prior confinement feeding operation permittees, provides an amnesty period for persons who have not paid an indemnity fee, and provides that the indemnity fees may be nonrefundable. **HF 2494 - Sections 9, 10, 14, 27, 29, 38 through 43, 48, and 49**

**Effective: 5/21/98**

## COOPERATIVES

Amends Code Chapter 501 which provides for cooperative corporations which may hold agricultural land in this state. Changes a number of terms used in the chapter. Provides that a general partner that is authorized to hold an interest in a cooperative must include all natural persons. Increases the number of acres of agricultural land that a cooperative may hold from 640 to 1,500. Amends Code section 501.106 which provides for maintaining a registered office or registered agent in this state for purpose of service of process. Incorporates into Code Chapter 501 a number of provisions from Code Chapter 490 governing corporations and Code Chapter 499 governing cooperative associations that were formerly included by reference in Code Chapter 501. **SF 2404**

**Effective: 4/23/98**

## FARMERS ENTITIES

Provides for the holding of agricultural land by networking farmers corporations, networking farmers limited liability companies, farmers cooperative associations, and farmers cooperative limited liability companies. Limits the amount of land that may be held by the farmers entities and limits how the land may be used. Requires annual reporting to the Secretary of State. Provides penalties for the failure to file a report or for the filing of false information. **HF 2335**

**Effective: 4/16/98**

## ORGANIC FOODS

Establishes the Organic Standards Board. Requires a state fee for persons required to be certified as producers, handlers, and processors

of agricultural products labeled, sold, or advertised as organic. Allows regional organic associations to be formed upon approval by the Department of Agriculture and Land Stewardship. Establishes organic food standards, certification procedures, labeling requirements, and record keeping. Provides for the general enforcement of the organic food requirements by the Attorney General and the Department of Agriculture and Land Stewardship. **SF 2332**  
**Effective: 5/20/98**

### APPROPRIATIONS

#### ADMINISTRATION AND REGULATION

Provides for the use of moneys appropriated from excess lottery revenues to the Department of Commerce for the Insurance Division for the fiscal year 1997-98, which are unobligated and unencumbered, to be used in developing a transition plan for the community health management information system. **HF 2498 - Section 37**  
**Effective: 5/19/98**

#### AGRICULTURE AND NATURAL RESOURCES

Transfers unencumbered or unobligated moneys which were appropriated to Iowa State University for the fiscal year 1997-98 for odor control applications to the Livestock Disease Research Fund for use by the Iowa State University College of Veterinary Medicine upon recommendation of the Livestock Health Advisory Council. **SF 2295 - Section 15**  
**Effective: 5/19/98**

#### ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

Requires the Department of Economic Development and the Department of Workforce Development to undertake a workforce recruitment initiative with projects intended to retain and recruit new skilled and unskilled employees to fill the needs of both communities and businesses. Establishes a certified school-to-career program within the Department of Economic

Development to provide incentives to employers to hire individuals ages 16 through 24. Provides for the liquidation of the Iowa Seed Capital Corporation. **SF 2296 - Sections 14 through 21, and 27**  
**Effective: 5/22/98**

#### EDUCATION

Permits the Board of Educational Examiners to use for its own purposes during fiscal year 1998-99, up to 85 percent of any funds received resulting from any increase in licensing fees it approves and implements after July 1, 1997; amends the education appropriations Act, SF 549, passed by the 1997 Session of the General Assembly to strike language permitting unencumbered tuition replacement moneys appropriated for fiscal year 1997-98 to carryover to the next fiscal year, resulting in reversion to the General Fund of the State at the end of fiscal year 1997-98; and repeals new Code Section 256.17A, which would have established a Teacher Internship Pilot Program if the Governor had not item vetoed the provision. **HF 2533 - Sections 14, 22, and 56**  
**Effective: 5/8/98**

#### HEALTH AND HUMAN RIGHTS

Provides for the continuation of the Vital Records Modernization Project and for the collection of increased fees pursuant to the project, until June 30, 1999. **SF 2280 - Section 9**  
**Effective: 5/19/98**

#### HUMAN SERVICES

Appropriates moneys received under the Federal Temporary Assistance for Needy Families Block Grant to the Department of Human Services. Provides for the nonreversion of moneys appropriated to the department for fiscal year 1997-98 for purposes of costs associated with the development of the computer system. Requires the department to proceed with a request for proposals for managed behavioral health care and provides for the continued work of the child welfare services work group. Provides for the



reinstatement of the employment earnings disregard eliminated in 1997. Modifies the applicability of the requirements of Code Section 232.143. Extends the existence of the current clinical assessment and consultation teams and requires the department to develop and implement a new rehabilitative treatment and supportive services authorization model. Provides for the expenditure of any additional moneys received under Title IV-E of the federal Social Security Act as a result of administrative activities performed by juvenile court services or community providers. Allows the State Court Administrator to allocate moneys to judicial districts for purposes of paying the expenses of court-ordered services provided to juveniles which are a charge upon the state. Authorizes a pilot program or programs for provision of financial assistance services. Provides for the development of a process for exempting certain private agencies from the requirement of obtaining a certification from the Auditor of State. Provides for the nonreversion of moneys appropriated to the Department for fiscal year 1997-98 from moneys received under the Federal Temporary Assistance for Needy Families Block Grant. Provides the method for calculating the August 31, 1998, fiscal year 1997-98 ending balance for the pilot project of operating the hospital-school with a net general fund appropriation authorized in the 1997 Iowa Acts. Strikes the July 1, 1998, repeal of Code section 225C.48 relating to the Personal Assistance and Family Support Services Council. Provides for the General Fund of the State to pay claims for savings refunds approved pursuant to Code Section 541A.3. **SF 2410 - Section 1; Section 5, subsection 7; Section 7, subsection 4; Section 7, subsection 12; Section 15, subsection 2, paragraph "e"; Section 15, subsection 18; Section 15, subsection 19, paragraph "b"; Section 18, subsection 1; and Sections 43, 62, 64, 65, 72, and 78**

**Section 78 retroactive to 1/1/98**

**Effective: 5/19/98**

### **INFRASTRUCTURE**

Appropriates moneys from the Rebuild Iowa Infrastructure Fund to the Department of Corrections for the construction of two additional cellblocks at the Fort Dodge Correctional Facility. Reduces the amount of moneys appropriated from the Rebuild Iowa Infrastructure Fund to the Department of Natural Resources for use in the Restore the Outdoors Program. Eliminates the matching contribution contingency of an appropriation to the Department of Cultural Affairs for the fiscal year 1997-98. Provides for the nonreversion of fiscal year 1997-98 moneys appropriated for upgrades to the Iowa financial accounting system. **SF 2381 - Section 2, subsection 2; Sections 19, 20, and 24**

**Effective: 5/19/98**

### **JUSTICE**

Provides appropriations to the Department of Justice (Attorney General) for the Prosecuting Attorney Training Program and enforcement of the Iowa competition law. Provides inspection requirements for certain jacketed direct or indirect steam fired vessels. Allows the Court of Appeals to meet outside of Des Moines from the effective date of the Act to June 30, 1999. Provides for the transfer of \$1.0 million from the fiscal year 1997-98 ending balance of the Prison Infrastructure Fund to the Department of Corrections. **HF 2539 - Section 1, subsections 3 and 4; Sections 21, 23, 24, and 25**

**Effective: 5/21/98**

### **STATE GOVERNMENT TECHNOLOGY AND OPERATIONS**

Establishes and makes appropriations to a Reversion Technology Initiatives Account in the Office of the Treasurer of State under the control of the Division of Information Technology Services of the Department of General Services; provides for a monthly report by every department, institution under the control of the State Board of Regents, and office of a statewide elected official other than the Governor regarding progress in implementing century date



change programming; amends provisions relating to information technology hardware and software devices, equipment, or systems that are date or time sensitive; provides that the Iowa Telecommunications and Technology Commission is authorized to use designated funding to convert any leased analog circuit to a leased DS-3 circuit when the existing contract vendor agrees to upgrade the service; amends the amount of the appropriation made from the Rebuild Iowa Infrastructure Fund to the Iowa Communications Network Fund for fiscal year 1998-99; and provides that the Year 2000 Program Office shall conduct an initial Year 2000 Compliance Assessment of each office of a statewide elected official other than the Office of the Governor and the Lieutenant Governor. **SF 2418 - Sections 7, 8, and 22 through 28**

**SUPPLEMENTAL AND STANDING APPROPRIATIONS**

Provides supplemental appropriations for fiscal year 1997-98 and transfers lottery revenue. Provides grounds for what constitutes a vacancy in an elected county office. Provides technical and conforming amendments to 1998 enactments. **HF 2395 - Sections 1 through 10; Section 12, subsections 1, 2, and 3; Sections 13, 14, 18, 22, 32, 33, and 34**  
**Effective: 5/21/98**

**BUSINESS, BANKING & INSURANCE**

**HEALTHY AND WELL KIDS IN IOWA PROGRAM**

Establishes the Healthy and Well Kids in Iowa (HAWK-I) Program, beginning January 1, 1999, to provide health insurance for children under 19 years of age who are eligible under Title XXI of the federal Social Security Act and expands the Medical Assistance Program, beginning July 1, 1998, to include children whose family income does not exceed 133 percent of the federal poverty level. **HF 2517**  
**Effective: 5/14/98**

**MOTOR VEHICLE PROOF OF FINANCIAL RESPONSIBILITY**

Amends provisions relating to the Motor Vehicle Mandatory Financial Liability Coverage legislation passed during the 1997 legislative session. **HF 2454**  
**Retroactive to July 1, 1997**  
**Effective: 4/17/98**

**MULTIPLE EMPLOYER WELFARE ARRANGEMENTS**

Extends the repeal date from July 1, 1998, to July 1, 2001, for the exemption of certain multiple employer welfare arrangements from regulation by the Insurance Division of the Department of Commerce when specified requirements are met. **HF 2189**  
**Effective: 3/17/98**

**PUBLIC UTILITY REORGANIZATION**

Provides that the Utilities Board, for good cause shown, may extend the deadline for acting on an application for the reorganization of a public utility for an additional period not to exceed 90 days. **HF 2351**  
**Effective: 4/15/98**

**CHILDREN & YOUTH**

**CHILD DAY CARE**

Provides for child day care requirements involving volunteers and amends provisions applicable to child day care home pilot projects which began in 1997 for child day care homes operating in two counties. **SF 2312**  
**Effective: 4/20/98**

**REVIEW OF THE CHILD PROTECTION SYSTEM**

Provides for a review of the state's child protection system by the Citizens' Aide/Ombudsman Office. **SF 2359**  
**Effective: 5/14/98**





**CIVIL LAW, PROCEDURE & COURT  
ADMINISTRATION**

**ADOPTION OF DECEASED PERSONS**

Provides for the completion of an adoption of a person for whom parental rights of the biological parents have been terminated, for whom an adoption petition has been filed, but who has died prior to completion of the adoption procedure. **SF 2338 - Section 1**

**Effective: 4/9/98**

**DRUG AND ALCOHOL OFFENSES**

Provides for the deletion of certain license revocations from motor vehicle records, permits the court to suspend execution of a sentence for certain less serious offenders and to impose a period of probation after service of the mandatory minimum sentence, and eliminates the applicability of the standard of error associated with the test device for a defendant who tests .15 or higher. Amends previously passed drug testing legislation. **SF 2391 - Divisions I and VI**

**Sections 4 and 5 - Retroactive to 7/1/97**

**Effective: 4/22/98**

**JUDICIAL ADMINISTRATION**

Eliminates the requirement in the Code that Iowa Court Rules be indexed and that changes to the rules be included in the published Session Laws. Designates which changes to the Iowa Court Rules by the Supreme Court shall be submitted to the Legislative Council prior to the rules becoming effective. Exempts certain categories of rules from the requirement to submit changes to the Legislative Council but does provide that certain changes shall be submitted to the Legislative Council. **SF 2235 - Sections 1, 2, 7, 8, 9, 10, and 17**

**PRISONER AND INMATE LAWSUITS**

Regulates civil lawsuits filed by prisoners and inmates. **SF 2330**

**LEGAL DEFENSE COSTS FOR PRISON  
DISCIPLINARY CASES**

Amends the procedures applicable to payment of costs and expenses in postconviction actions relating to forfeiture of reductions in sentence based on good conduct time which had been earned by an inmate against the sentence. For procedures on or after 7/1/98, see SF 2339. **SF 2090**

**Retroactively applicable to claims for costs and expenses approved on or before 3/31/98**

**Effective: 3/31/98**

**MANDATORY SERVICE OF SENTENCE**

Adds attempted murder to the list of crimes for which an inmate must serve 100 percent of the inmate's sentence less any of the limited amount of good time which may be granted to the inmate.

**PILOT PROBATION REVOCATION  
PROJECT**

Amends the Probation Revocation Pilot Project being carried out in the Sixth Judicial District. **SF 2377 - Sections 1, 2, 3, and 13**

**ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT**

**AGRICULTURAL INDUSTRY FINANCE**

Transfers moneys from the Iowa Comprehensive Petroleum Underground Storage Tank Marketability Fund from January 1, 1998, until July 1, 1998, to the Department of Economic Development to be used for purposes of the Agricultural Industry Finance Act. **SF 2415 - Section 20**

**Section 20 - Retroactive to January 1, 1998**

**PORT COMMISSION**

Provides that the Mid-America Port Commission Agreement is entered into and enacted into law with the State of Illinois and the State of Missouri if those states join the agreement in substantially the same form. Provides for the Mid-America Port Commission Act which enables the state to participate in the agreement. **HF 2135**

**EDUCATION**

**SCHOOL DISTRICT RETIREMENT INCENTIVE PROGRAMS**

Provides changes affecting retirement incentive programs which school districts may offer to employees and pay for through the district management levy by lowering the minimum employee retirement age to age 55 and providing that a school district may include in the district management levy an amount to pay the total estimated accumulated program cost to the district, whether or not the cost exceeds savings. **SF 2366 - Section 27 retroactively applicable to retirement incentive programs in existence on December 31, 1997**

**SCHOOL INFRASTRUCTURE FUNDING**

Provides for the imposition of a local sales and services tax by a county to be utilized for school infrastructure purposes, and provides for the creation of a School Infrastructure Safety Fund administered by the School Budget Review Committee in conjunction with the State Fire Marshal. The fund will contain distributions from the federal funds allocated to the state as described in Conference Committee Report 105-390, accompanying House Resolution 2264, in the amount of \$8 million for school infrastructure improvement grants relating to fire and personal safety. **HF 2282**

**ELECTIONS, ETHICS & CAMPAIGN FINANCE**

**ELECTIONS**

Changes the method of selection of trustees of an emergency medical services district from election by the voters of the district to appointment by the city council. Repeals Code Section 39.5 which prohibits a local government from holding an election not authorized by state law but which specifically does not prohibit all local elections called pursuant to ordinance. **HF 2495 - Sections 14 and 17**  
Effective: 4/17/98

**GAMING**

**ADMINISTRATION OF LASIX**

Changes the procedures for administering lasix to race horses. **SF 2121**  
Effective: 2/26/98

**HEALTH AND SAFETY**

**HEPATITIS TYPE B IMMUNIZATIONS**

Requires the Iowa Department of Public Health to develop a plan for protecting persons against hepatitis type B by October 1, 1998, and requires evidence of hepatitis type B immunization for children born on or after July 1, 1999, enrolling in kindergarten or any grade level for the 1999-2000 school year. **SF 2341**  
Effective: 4/2/98

**HUMAN SERVICES**

**COUNTY MANAGEMENT PLANS**

Directs the State-County Management Committee to review requirements for county mental health and developmental disabilities management plans and deletes the requirement that a county management plan must allow for the service needs of all ages of persons for whom expenditures may be made from the county's services fund. Additionally, repeals a provision which directed counties which did not comply with the "all ages" management plan requirement



to amend their management plan as necessary for compliance, and provides a requirement for management plans to provide for services to children from community mental health centers and other accredited providers. **HF 2558 - Division VI - Sections 18 and 19**

## **LABOR AND EMPLOYMENT**

### **EMPLOYEE DRUG TESTING**

Authorizes drug and alcohol testing of employees and prospective employees in the private sector, as opposed to employees of state and political subdivisions, Native American tribes, and the federal government. The new provisions include procedures for conducting a drug or alcohol test and providing for the collection of samples, the scheduling and conducting of tests, the establishment of written policies governing drug or alcohol testing by employers, employer liability, the confidentiality of test results, and the reporting of the frequency and results of tests conducted by laboratories to the Iowa Department of Public Health. **HF 299**

**Effective: 4/16/98**

### **SECOND INJURY FUND CONTRIBUTIONS AND PAYMENTS**

Provides for an increase in the amount payable to the Second Injury Fund by employers or their insurance carrier in cases of an injury or death, directs the Commissioner of Insurance to annually examine Second Injury Compensation Act claims prior to each fiscal year and to determine outstanding liability for such claims, authorizes the Commissioner of Insurance to impose by rule a surcharge on employers if it is determined that there are insufficient funds in the Second Injury Fund to pay claims, and provides that the Labor Commissioner shall be responsible for the collection of contributions and payments to the Second Injury Fund required under Code Section 85.65. **SF 540**

**Effective: 4/17/98**

## **LOCAL GOVERNMENT**

### **COMMUNITY EMPOWERMENT**

Creates the Iowa Empowerment Board, and authorizes local communities to create community empowerment areas and community empowerment area boards, in order to facilitate a partnership between communities and state government by implementing a statewide system of community empowerment areas. Establishes a school ready children grant program for collaborative planning for and funding of early childhood programs. **SF 2406**

**Effective: 5/20/98**

### **EMERGENCY TELEPHONE SYSTEM**

Establishes an E911 wireless communications surcharge and an E911 administrator in the Department of Public Defense, expands the membership on the E911 Communications Council, and provides appropriations for the E911 administrator and for telecommunicator training. **SF 530**

**Effective: 4/16/98**

### **MODULAR HOUSING PROVISIONS**

Removes "modular homes" from the definition of a land-leased community relating to county and city zoning of land-leased communities and provides that manufactured homes in land-leased communities shall be taxed on a square footage basis, and removes "modular home" from the type of housing which for property tax purposes is taxed on a square footage basis if located in a mobile home park. **SF 2400 - Sections 10, 16 through 20, and 22 through 25**

**Retroactive to 1/1/98**

**Effective: 4/16/98**

### **STATEWIDE UNIFORM PROPERTY TAX STATEMENT DESIGN**

Requires representatives of the Iowa State Treasurers Association to recommend to the Legislative Council's Task Force on Iowa's System of State and Local Taxation a process by which a statewide uniform property tax state-



ment design can be put in place and used state-wide for tax statements issued beginning with fiscal year 1999-2000, and contains provisions regarding deferral of property tax statement comparative date requirements by counties, and the furnishing of property tax statements and related fees. **SF 2061**

**Effective: 5/14/98**

**NATURAL RESOURCES AND OUT-DOOR RECREATION**

**ADDITIONAL ANTLERLESS DEER LICENSE**

Provides that the Natural Resource Commission is authorized to issue an additional antlerless deer license to a person who has been issued an antlerless deer license, for a \$10 additional license fee. **HF 2290 - Section 6**

**Effective: 5/19/98**

**STATE GOVERNMENT**

**MARITAL AND FAMILY THERAPY OR MENTAL HEALTH COUNSELING – MANDATORY LICENSURE**

Provides for the mandatory licensure of individuals engaged in the professional practice of Marital and Family Therapy or Mental Health Counseling, and provides applicability and exemption provisions regarding licensure requirements. **HF 2516**

**Effective: 4/2/98**

**PUBLIC RETIREMENT SYSTEMS**

Provides that a spouse of a retired member under the Iowa Public Employees Retirement System (IPERS) is entitled to continue to purchase group insurance coverage from the applicable employer upon the death of the retired member until reaching age 65. Provides that full-time associate juvenile judges and full-time associate probate judges hired on or after July 1, 1998, shall be members of the Judicial Retirement System and not members of IPERS,

and that current full-time associate juvenile judges and associate probate judges have the option of remaining in IPERS, changing to the Judicial Retirement System but leaving their contributions in IPERS, or changing to the Judicial Retirement System and transferring a portion of their IPERS money in order to purchase additional service credit. **HF 2496 - Sections 71, 100, and 103**

**Section 71 retroactive to July 1, 1994**

**Effective: 5/8/98**

**TAXATION**

**CAPITAL GAINS TAX AND PENSION INCOME EXCLUSION**

Eliminates individual income taxation of certain qualifying net capital gains, including gains from the sale of certain livestock and timber and business real property, eliminates the material participation requirement from sales of businesses to lineal descendants for net capital gains taxation, and provides for complete exemption from individual income taxation of capital gains from each capital asset when it is part of a sale of the taxpayer's business if the sale is made to a lineal descendant of the taxpayer. Additionally, increases the exemption allowed under the individual income tax for pension and deferred compensation income. **HF 2513 - Divisions I and II retroactive to 1/1/98**

**Effective: 5/6/98**

**FOOD AND BEVERAGE SALES TAX EXEMPTION**

Provides an exemption from the sales and use taxes applicable to sales of food and beverages by nonprofit organizations if they are not subject to federal income tax, and have a primary purpose of the promotion of a food or beverage product for human consumption produced, grown, or raised in the state. **SF 2364**

**Retroactive to July 1, 1988**

**Effective: 4/14/98**



**IOWA INCOME TAX UPDATES AND REVISIONS**

Updates the Iowa Code references to the state research activities credit for individuals, corporations, corporations in economic development areas, and corporations in quality jobs enterprise zones to include the 1997 changes to the federal research activities credits; updates Iowa Code references to include the federal income tax revisions made by Congress in the 1997 calendar year; exempts preneed funeral trusts electing special tax treatment for federal tax purposes, and beneficiaries of such trusts, from Iowa income tax on the income accruing to such trusts; revises the carryback and carryforward periods for net operating losses and casualty losses to conform with federal changes in the federal Taxpayer Relief Act of 1997; and authorizes refunds beyond the state's three-year statute of limitations if a taxpayer qualified for a refund for federal tax purposes as a result of retroactive application of a provision of the federal Taxpayer Relief Act of 1997. SF 2357

**Sections 1, 2, 3, 6, and 7 - Retroactive to January 1, 1997**

**Sections 4, 5, and 8 - Retroactive to August 5, 1997**

**Section 9 - Retroactive to January 1, 1977**  
**Effective: 4/13/98**

**REPLACEMENT TAX TASK FORCE**

Directs the Department of Management, in consultation with the Department of Revenue and Finance, to initiate and coordinate the establishment of a task force to study the effects of replacing the current central property tax assessment procedures utilized by the Director of Revenue and Finance in valuing the property of entities involved primarily in the production, delivery, and transmission of electricity and natural gas within the state. **SALES AND USE TAX EXEMPTIONS**

Expands the sales and use tax exemption allowed to sales of fuel and electricity used in computers, machinery, and equipment, provides that sales of vehicles subject to registration are not exempt machinery or equipment sales unless the vehicles are directly and primarily used in the recycling or reprocessing of waste products, and defines "receipt or producing of raw materials" to confine the phrase to activities performed on tangible personal property only. SF 2288

**TRANSPORTATION**

**NONRESIDENT MOTOR VEHICLE DEALER DISPLAYS**

Permits nonresident motor truck dealers to display motor trucks at an event which does not allow the sale of motor vehicles, is not open to the public, promotes the trucking industry, and is conducted within the area of the permittee's contractual responsibility. HF 2392

**Effective: 4/6/98**

**TRANSFER FROM REVITALIZE IOWA'S SOUND ECONOMY FUND**

Authorizes the State Transportation Commission to temporarily transfer moneys from the Revitalize Iowa's Sound Economy Fund to the Primary Road Fund if the Commission receives a letter from the Director of Transportation certifying that federal transportation funding is not available. SF 2022
