STUDIES COMMITTEE

July 15, 1980

The Studies Committee met at 2:00 p.m. in the Speaker's Conference Room on July 15, 1980 at which time the membership of the respective subcommittees was recommended. The Committee also reviewed the list of 1980 interim studies as recommended by the Studies Committee and approved by the Legislative Council on June 11, 1980. The Studies Committee submits the following membership recommendations, a listing of which is attached and by this reference made a part of this report, to the Council for its approval. The Studies Committee also submits the following recommendations regarding studies to the Legislative Council for its approval:

- 1. That the membership of the Grain Elevator and Grain Grading Study be selected from the respective Standing Committees on Agriculture and Commerce.
- 2. That part of the membership of the Governor's Economy Recommendations study be appointed from the Standing Committees on Appropriations rather than the State Government Appropriations Subcommittee.
- 3. That the membership for the Transportation Study may include members from the Standing Committees on Ways and Means.
- 4. That the Iowa Coal study be expanded to include a study of Hazardous Waste Disposal, that the number of meetings be increased from one to two, and that the membership be increased from five members from each house to seven, and that the Subcommittee be directed to use one day exclusively for the Iowa Coal issue and one day exclusively for the Hazardous Waste Disposal issue.
- 5. That the Probate Code study be deleted from the list of 1980 interim studies.
- 6. That the Mandatory Spending Limits study membership be appointed from the respective Standing Committees on Ways and Means, Appropriations, and the Appropriations Subcommittees.
- 7. That the Fair Play Subcommittee membership be composed of members of the respective Standing Committees on State Government and County Government.

ADMINISTRATION COMMITTEE

to the

LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL

July 16, 1980

The Administration Committee of the Legislative Council met on Wednesday, July 16 at 9:30 a.m. and again at 1:15 p.m. to discuss furnishing and lighting for the remodeled legislative areas on the first floor of the Capitol building. General Services Director Stanley McCausland presented photographs and a cost estimate from Mr. David Snow for a chandelier design Mr. Snow felt was particularly suited for the area. Mr. McCausland also reported that sufficient furniture is available from current legislative facilities to furnish the meeting rooms. He added that additional stacking spectator chairs can be provided by Iowa Prison Industries at a cost of \$22.00 per chair.

The Committee requested and Mr. McCausland provided general cost estimates for florescent lighting for the remodeled legislative areas instead of chandeliers.

The Committee recommends the following to the Legislative Council:

- 1. That the Legislative Council authorize the purchase of five chandeliers for the remodeled legislative area at a maximum cost of \$3,500 each. Three of the chandeliers would be of the design described in the attached letter from Mr. Snow. The Committee has requested that another design for the two remaining chandeliers be presented to the Committee members for consideration.
- 2. That the Legislative Council approve the furnishing of the remodeled areas with tables and chairs currently belonging to the state. The Committee recommends that no additional expenditures be incurred for furniture with the exception of funds for the purchase of spectator chairs from Iowa Prison Industries if additional spectator chairs are needed.

Dear Stan:

To start with, I certainly enjoyed my trip to Des Moines and your courteous service and hospitality. It was very helpful to see the Capital bldg. and the hearing area where the Chandeliers go.

I am sending enclosed a Blue print (to be expanded)# 20879 and two color photoprints of the Chandelier I proposed for the Hearing Chambers (3 required). If the Photoprints are held up to a lightbulb they show off the details much better. I am getting blownup black and white prints which I will send as soon as they come in.

The # 20879 Chandelier is made of Cast and spun Solid brass finished in Polished Brass (toned like the Rotunda Railing), with Chezech Cohonial Crystal drapes and pendalogues to give an elegant and detailed support for the three dimensions of lighting. The fixture will weigh under 200 pounds and will be approx. 60" high in the body section, and 66" in diameter. The opal balls are 6" in diameter. There are 6 upper arms and 12 lower arms, both on individual circuits, that can take 75 Watts in each arm. The down floodlight on one circuit takes up to 500 Watts. The upper bowl has four lights on one circuit for a total of 400Watts. Giving a total of 2250 Watts per Chandelier on four circuits.

It would take about 8 weeks to manufacture from date of order. I will send along with shipment all light bulbs and a few extra for replacements.

The cost of each Chandelier is \$ 3200.00. There would be a Jobsite delivery of the Chandeliers (Bulbs, Shipping & Packing) for \$ 500.00. Trip to Des Moines Cost of \$ 250.00. Total of All--\$ 10350.00

We respectfully request 1/3 of Ital Cost with placement of order and balance 30 days after receipt of Chandeliers.

Please return the enclosed Photgraph (Phblic Instruction) to Ruth in the Treasurer's Office with my thanks for its use.

SERVICE COMMITTEE

TO THE

LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL

July 16, 1980

The Service Committee makes the following recommendations to the Legislative Council:

- 1. That the Service Committee be authorized to meet with members of the appropriate committees of the House and Senate to coordinate salary schedules for legislative positions with similar responsibilities and duties. The coordination would include a comparison with salaries paid for similar positions in the exeutive and judicial branches and the private sector.
- 2. That the Legislative Council consider amending the rules relating to acceptance and reporting of gifts by members of legislative agencies to include a definition of "occurrence". The Service Committee suggests that the acceptance of a gift per occurrence from a donor means the acceptance of a gift from a donor at a function, regardless of the duration of the function, that seems to include a continuous unbroken chain of events.

ITEM VETO SUBCOMMITTEE -- REVIEW OF DISCUSSION

Members present: Representatives Halvorson, and Welden; Senators Rush and Ramsey. Absent Senator Murray and Representative Cusack.

A majority of the members present agreed that it would not be a good policy or precedent for the Legislative Council to initiate a lawsuit challenging an item veto and questioned the authority of the Legislative Council to initiate and pay for such lawsuit. This latter conclusion agreed with a Legislative Service Bureau memorandum.

Most members agreed that an item veto that is ruled invalid in an attorney general's opinion places a department head in an awkward and difficult position.

Discussion was carried out in regard to changing section 8.39, the transfer of funds authority of the governor, to provide that legislature can limit such authority. Another possible amendment would be one which provides that the authority cannot be exercised when the transfer would affect major government programs.
