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INDEXER'S PREFATORY NOTE

This index is, for the most part, the index of 1950 with additions and deletions as required to include the acts of the 54th and 55th General Assemblies. The main heading CITIES AND TOWNS has been completely revised; FUNERAL DIRECTORS AND EMBALMERS and NATIONAL GUARD have been added; material has been removed from the heading PUBLIC INSTRUCTION DEPARTMENT, STATE, and placed under PUBLIC INSTRUCTION, STATE BOARD and PUBLIC INSTRUCTION, SUPERINTENDENT; other less sweeping changes were made to include legislation since 1949.

In general, references are made to section numbers. Where the reference is to chapter or page, such is indicated. Rules of Civil Procedure are referred to by rule number only. These rules, which are printed in Volume II of the code, after the chapters on criminal procedure, are followed by notes indicating related sections of the code. The rules are also printed in the code itself, together with the related code sections. However, no reference to this second printing is made in the index, as it is felt that double references would be confusing, rather than helpful.

Many of the cross references between main headings have been eliminated by replacing them with direct references to the code. An effort has been made to index code sections in those places where the reader is most likely to look first, and the decision to retain specific cross references or to eliminate them by the above method has been made primarily with this in mind. Very little has been done with cross references within the main headings.

In some cases, more general references to groups of sections have replaced a section by section analysis. This has been done in the belief that a general reference will be of more value to the reader, either because of the interrelationship of the sections or because of the fact that a detailed analysis, unless carried to absurd lengths, may tend to conceal certain points. Our purpose is to direct, not to analyze, and it is felt that these changes will not decrease the efficiency of the index.

Time limitations and general expediency have played a part in the revision of the index. However, neither have consciously been permitted to dictate policies which would make this index a less effective aid for finding the law.
